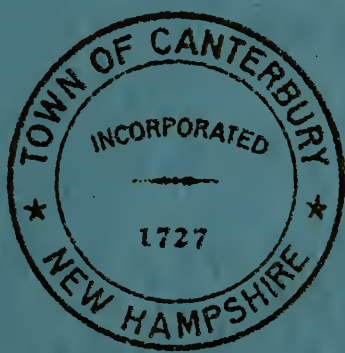

DEFENSE ACTIVITIES

A defense organization has been established in Canterbury according to a plan uniform throughout the country. This program has four branches that everyone should understand.

1. The Defense Chairman and Vice-Chairman have supervision over all activities except the Air Raid Warning Service.

2. The Public Safety Chairman has a coordinating committee, which is an emergency council of Town and Society Officers, each member of which is chairman of his own committee in charge of one special job; such as Emergency Housing, Food, Transportation, etc.

3. The Air Raid Warden Service. This must not be confused with the Air Raid Warning Service. The Air Raid Wardens warn the townspeople of air raids and enforce blackouts. They have a Report Center through which information is handled by special arrangement with the telephone company. The Church bells will be rung for 5 minutes as a warning, and tolled for the all clear.

4. The Air Raid Warning Service. This is under the Army, is organized by the American Legion, supervised by a Chief Observer, and manned by volunteers. They have a Warning Center from which a central office is notified of all passing aircraft. By this system the course of enemy aircraft can be calculated and air raid wardens at its objective warned before its arrival.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Canterbury, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on property taxes paid within 30 days of the date of the tax bill.
6. To see if the Town will vote to assess a penalty of .20 on each poll tax not paid before September 1st.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid, with the Town's share to be \$778.11 and the State's share \$3,112.44, and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction, with the Town's share to be \$819.00 and the State's share \$1,638.00, and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to provide additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for further repairs to the inside of the Town Hall.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 to improve the road in Maple Grove Cemetery.

14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest of Sam W. Lake.

15. To see if the Town will vote to build a combination Town Garage and Fire House on the Lake property as soon as the income from the Lake Estate shall be sufficient to do so.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the taxes of the Canterbury Shakers; and, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money to cover the cost of such proposed action.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to rent or lease some suitable place for a town dump.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Canterbury:

The 1941 fire season was the worst on record in the State of New Hampshire. More fires occurred, more area was burned over, greater damage was done to our woodlands, higher losses were sustained in other real property burned and the cost of suppressing fires was greater.

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden to burn brush or other debris in or near woodlands, or where fire may be communicated to such lands, once the snow has left the ground. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable.
 - a. To a fine not to exceed \$500.00 or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
 - b. To the town for expenses incurred by the warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
 - c. For damage to abutting owners if fire runs upon abutters' property.
2. DON'T drop or throw from any vehicle while same is upon a public highway or private way and
DON'T drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.
Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty with a fine of not more than \$25.00
3. DON'T fail to promptly notify your local warden of any fires you see.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and Voters
of the Canterbury School District:*

Since December 7, 1940, the calm manner of our living and working has been affected radically. It is apparent now that as each month advances we shall need to adjust ourselves to rapid changes, to shortages in personnel and materials, to curtailment of activities, to the development of new skills in everyday living. The day on which you may read this report will bring its demands which may be much different from those on the days in which this is being written. Come what may, this is being prepared to give you a brief summary of the year's responsibilities and achievements and not to forecast the future.

TEACHERS

Last spring the School Board considered favorably the employment of a man to teach some of the larger boys in handicrafts and discussed the possibilities in making a work room in one section of Kezer School.

In the early summer, Robert W. Mealey of Machias, Maine, was hired to teach at the Kezer School and to instruct boys in hand work. He was a graduate of the Washington State Normal School at Machias, Maine. He took Mrs. Tenney's place after she was transferred to the Blanchard school, to be near her home in Boscawen.

Mr. Mealey was offered a position in a junior high school in Maine a few weeks after school opened and asked to be released from his contract so he might accept the attractive offer. Miss Helen L. McCarthy, who did not seek reelection in June 1940, was secured to substitute for an indefinite period.

Mrs. Lillian M. Davidson was released from her contract a few days after the opening date to accept a posi-

tion in Andover. Miss Alice V. Smith, formerly a teacher in Meredith, was put in as a substitute in Mrs. Davidson's place until Christmas vacation.

Miss Alice D. Thibodeau was married to Mr. Rolland Michelin in November, but is remaining in her position at the Uplands School until the end of the contract period.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR

At the instance of many citizens of Canterbury by petition, the School Board arranged with Miss Ruth F. Sawyer, Music Supervisor in Tilton-Northfield, to devote two afternoons a week to the instruction of Canterbury boys and girls in music. Her report which follows explains the program.

COMBINING SCHOOLS

The School Board has discussed several plans for the improvement of schools in Canterbury. One of these is to combine certain schools so there will be fewer grades to be taught in a school. The Board acted favorably on the proposal to transport some pupils attending Carter School to the Center and to return with some of the Center pupils to the Carter School. In this way, it was planned to have at the

Carter School	4 grades
Grades V-VI-VII-VIII

All plans were laid for this to take effect in September. In August a group of parents whose children attended the Carter School, petitioned the School Board not to effect this combination. On the petition there were the signatures of eight mothers. Acting on this petition, the School Board decided to postpone combination until such a vote might be taken at the school district meeting. We lost one of the best chances we have had to reduce the number of grades to be taught by one teacher and we have had to delay

the date on which we can give to each pupil twice as much instruction time and attention of a teacher as is possible in a rural school with eight grades.

The tendency through the United States is to have one, two, three, or four grades per teacher. Scores of one-room schools are closing every year. Students graduating from the teachers colleges receive practice-teaching experience in single or double grades, not in eight. It is increasingly difficult to obtain the service of your men and women for positions in eight-grade rural schools. They prefer and can secure positions in which the number of grades is limited to four at the most. As the supply of good teachers becomes more acute, this is a problem which Canterbury citizens must face fairly soon.

LIP READING CLASS

In 1939 the New Hampshire Legislature enacted a law to provide for the education of handicapped children, either through their transportation to a school or by having a special teacher train them at home. In Canterbury one pupil with impaired hearing needed lip reading instruction in order to be more successful in his school work. Mrs. Catherine E. SCHOOL LUNCH

Due to the efforts of Mrs. Herbert Pettes, Canterbury pupils have had the benefit of hot mid-day meals. Without her interest, enthusiasm, and hard work, it would have been impossible to have carried on this project, of which the following is a summary.

On March 3, 1941, Mrs. Pettes stated her willingness to start a school lunch program at the Blanchard school. Her plans were to have a group of mothers prepare the lunches at home in rotation and have the food transported to the school by the teacher in her car. The parents were to be asked to pay a quarter a week and furnish sandwiches and fruit daily. The menus were to be planned by the four volunteers and food purchased from the funds collected each Friday. 4-H Club girls were to serve the foods at school and pupils would take turns washing the dishes.

These tentative plans were modified somewhat when, on March 11, the Surplus Commodities Corporation gave a list of available foods: apples, wheat cereals for soups, prunes, raisins, canned milk for cocoa, grapefruit juice, eggs, and lard. These were to be distributed by truck to the school once a month.

Starting on April 29, the pupils at the Blanchard school received a hearty meal each noon. These are sample menus.

Monday—Chipped beef gravy, boiled potatoes, gingerbread, peaches, chocolate milk, bread.

Tuesday—Split pea soup, corn bread, rice pudding with raisins, chocolate milk.

Wednesday—Spanish rice, bread, apple tapioca, cookies, chocolate milk.

Thursday—Meat stew, dumplings, chocolate milk, cookies, peaches.

Friday—Macaroni with tomato sauce, string beans, stewed prunes, milk, plain cake.

Contributions of food were accepted whenever parents sent them. Donations consisted of sugar, eggs, canned

beans, carrots, beans, corn, turnips, milk, potatoes, lettuce, biscuits, peas, cheese.

In the seven weeks, April 29-June 13, 1941, inclusive, collections of money paid the expenses, leaving a balance of less than a dollar. A full meal at noon was served every day to 26 pupils, and pupils did not have to bring sandwiches or fruit from home.

Recognizing the success of the original school lunch program at the Blanchard School, the School Board decided to inaugurate a novel plan, the only one known to serve food to pupils in four rural schools from a central kitchen. The enterprise was a co-operative one, and all have worked towards its successful operation.

Sponsors: The Canterbury School Board.

Certified Workers: Works Progress Administration.

Surplus Commodities: County Commissioners.

Central Kitchen: Canterbury Church officials.

Wood and Equipment: School and Welfare departments and Church officials

Transportation: Mrs. Pettes.

Contributions of Food and Money: Parents and pupils.

At the Blanchard, Carter, Center, and Kezer schools, all pupils who desire a hot meal at noon are receiving one. There is nothing compulsory about the plan, nor is any one who is not able to bring 24c. a week barred from having a hot lunch.

The certified workers are under the direction of Mrs. Beatrice Pettes, the food is well prepared and served, and the boys and girls are benefitting. Altogether, it is a most satisfactory project.

CONSERVATION

What is being done to conserve work materials?

1. Pupils are using both sides of every sheet of paper.
2. The care with which written work is done has been improved so there are fewer sheets of paper wasted.

3. Duplicated copies are prepared with exercises on both sides of the sheet.
4. The pencil sharpeners are kept in good condition.
5. The number of paper towels used by pupils is limited to a small daily allotment.
6. Tops of thermos bottles and cups carried in lunch boxes are replacing paper drinking cups.
7. Kraft papers and cardboards from home are being collected for posters and displays.
8. Desk covers for lunch and pasting operations are being made from the colored pages in the Ladies' Home Journal, Saturday Evening Post, or some other large-sheet magazine.
9. The waste baskets, notebooks, workbooks, and desks are inspected every two or three days to discourage waste.
10. Conservation is being made a VIRTUE.

In what other ways are pupils being encouraged to save?

1. Tin and lead foil are being collected at home.
2. Newspapers and other waste papers are being saved for sale to junk dealers.
3. Tin cans and metal scraps are being collected.
4. Defense stamps and bonds are being purchased.
5. Life-preservation squads are being trained.
6. Morale squads are being organized.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORTS

You will find incorporated reports from the Music Supervisor, and the School Nurse. There are some interesting facts in each of these and they show the good work which is being done and the service which is being rendered.

Upon reading this report, you may have questions about some phases of it. You are cordially invited to request additional information and we shall attempt to provide the facts desired.

As your superintendent of schools, I am grateful for the fine spirit which exists here. Together, we shall continue to maintain high standards in our schools and to establish practices which are educationally effective, administratively efficient, and financially sound.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To Mr. Donald P. Mattoon, Superintendent of Schools:

The music supervisor is in Canterbury two afternoons a week, visiting the Center, Kezer, and Uplands schools on Tuesday and the Carter and Blanchard schools on Friday. In these visits the time is divided between the younger children and the older ones where there are enough in the younger group to warrant the division. The first and second graders learn to match tones and sing rote songs. The children in third grade and above have books and learn the fundamentals of sight singing along with rote songs. Much of the practice work is done by the classroom teacher. The supervisor organizes and directs the activities in the various schools, gives instruction and assists the teachers in achieving the general and specific aims set up for the groups.

One of the features of this year's music work is the introduction of the tonette. Every eligible pupil in the Uplands and Carter schools has bought instruments, and a good percentage of pupils in the Blanchard, Center, and Kezer schools are learning to play. This instruction is given by the regular teacher and the supervisor. Good progress is being made. This work carries over directly to singing, rhythm, and other music work, and is of proved value in the general music program.

The aims of the music work do not end with the ability to sing a succession of correct tones, but look toward the development of real enjoyment and a lasting appreciation of beauty which will carry over into all phases of the child's activity.
