## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls Will Be Open From 1:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at 1:00 of the clock in the P.M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The business meeting shall begin at 7:30 P.M. in the evening.

2. To act upon the following articles in this warrant.
3. To see if the Town will move to appropriate the sum of \$31,915.00 for general government.

\$7000 for Town Officer's salaries  
\$3500 for Town Officer's expenses  
\$500 for elections and registration  
\$1200 for cemeteries  
\$2000 for Town Hall expenses  
\$100 for Planning Board  
\$300 for legal expenses  
\$715 for advertising and regional associations  
\$500 for police  
\$2000 for Fire Department  
\$1100 for radio communications  
\$6000 for insurance  
\$3000 for dump rental  
\$2000 for interest on tax anticipation notes  
\$1000 for handicapped costs  
\$900 for appraisal of Town property  
\$100 for the Colebrook Public Library

4. To see if the Town will move to appropriate the sum of \$52,500.00 for summer and winter

maintenance of highways.

\$32,000 for winter maintenance  
\$6000 for summer maintenance  
\$12,000 for gravel, construction and reconstruction  
\$2500 for general expenses of highways including chloride

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,405.00 for Health and Welfare.

\$850 for UCV Hospital  
\$240 for ambulance district  
\$5.00 for vital statistics  
\$150 for UCV Mental Health Service  
\$1500 for Northern Coos Community Health Association  
\$500 for General Welfare Assistance  
\$160 for Community Action Outreach Program

6. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V & VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veteran's exemption is \$100.00 rather than \$50.00.
7. To see if the voters of the Town of Clarksville will vote to allow the Selectmen to develop a contract between the Towns of Stewartstown, Clarksville and Pittsburg to collectively develop, maintain and operate a regional transfer station/recycling center in the Town of Pittsburg. The Town of Pittsburg will take the lead in the contract.
8. To see if the voters of the Town of Clarksville will vote to allow the Selectmen or an appointed representative of the Selectmen to negotiate for the purchase and buy a piece of land adjacent to the Pittsburg dump to develop as a regional transfer station/recycling center.
9. To see if the voters of the Town of Clarksville will vote to appropriate \$9,500.00 (Capital Reserve Fund) for the development of the

regional transfer station (recycling center which would be used by the Towns of Clarksville, Stewartstown and Pittsburg). The funds will be used for the following activities; 1. development of the agreement between the three communities, 2. purchase of the land, 3. planning of the recycling facility, 4. permitting of the recycling center, 5. developing the site, and 6. purchasing equipment.

10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend such Federal, State or other governmental unit or private source of funding which becomes available during the year in accordance with RSA 31:95-b.
12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT  
PITTSBURG - CLARKSVILLE**

As Pittsburg School opened for the 1988-89 school year, eleven (11) new teachers were present, including an art teacher (a new position). Though staff turn-over was unusually high, the school district was fortunate to obtain well-qualified people, many experienced.

The school board and building committee (comprised of citizens of the community) continued to analyze possible facility improvement and/or expansion. The plans are in the long-range category, not necessarily immediate.

As part of the S A U #7 curriculum development project, teachers continued to work with Colebrook and Stewartstown teachers to improve instructional programs for our youngsters.

During the school year, additional citizens participated in the formulation of Advisory Committees in the areas of Business Education, Industrial Arts, and Home Economics. Through the cooperative efforts of school board members, staff, and interested citizens, the instructional programs continue to improve to better serve our students.

Computer purchases continued to be a priority, using both budgeted funds and State/Federal monies, to upgrade the business and math departments and by 1989-90 have a computer in each elementary classroom. The school office also has computer capability to more efficiently take care of a variety of student data.

The Clarksville School District generously donated approximately \$2,000 to purchase computer software, globes, maps and activity book sets, and a geography wall chart for use by all Pittsburg School students.

A new evaluation procedure went into effect for both teachers and the principal to further enhance professional growth and improvement.



As usual, revenue sources continue to be a problem. Costs seemingly continue to increase and property taxes, also. Board members, administrators, and teachers are working cooperatively to develop cost effective programs to meet students' educational needs.

I ask that you keep informed and involved regarding State and local educational issues.

## COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

During the 1988-89 school year, there were approximately 100 students within S A U #7 needing Special Education Services. These services have been offered through regular and special education classrooms except in a few cases where the severity of the handicap or an order of the court has necessitated out-of-district placement.

I continue to be pleased with the dedication that teachers, both regular and special education, exhibit when working with special needs students. This collaboration is an essential component enabling these students to receive the full spectrum of educational opportunities.

Within the S A U, we have four staff members who are pursuing special education certification through the Pool Expansion Plan (PEP). One of our teachers, Jo-Anne Bergeron, has successfully completed this rigorous training and has been fully certified by the State Department of Education.

At Colebrook Elementary School, two special education programs were combined into one this past year. At the Middle School, we developed a Daily Living Skills Program to provide more practical applications in teaching students.

Pittsburg School has also developed an afternoon Daily Living Skills Class and has been investigating expanding this program to include a community-based Work Study Program.

Pittsburg is also developing an Intervention Program that will address the needs of students primarily in grades 4-8 who are experiencing academic difficulties.

We were able to provide services in Speech and Language, Occupational Therapy and Psychology through exceptional local professionals. Physical Therapy, Vision and Diagnostic Services have also been provided through local and regional agencies.

Preschool services for handicapped children are provided by local preschool programs. The personnel at these programs have been instrumental in helping to meet the needs of these children.

There continue to be areas that need to be addressed. We have to expand our programming for secondary students, enabling these students to be exposed to work-related experiences. We also need to explore inservice training for regular education teachers who work with special needs students in their classrooms.

Continued support from the community is the vital link in our ability to make educational opportunity available to all children.

## SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The school health program strengthens and facilitates the educational process by changing or removing health-related barriers to learning and by promoting an optimal level of wellness for students and staff.

In 1988-89, our second year of Drug-Free Schools and Community Act grant money was received. It was used to purchase additional drug education kits to be used in our S A U. Materials for grades five through nine were acquired. Our first year of using this program was very successful. The U S Border Patrol, Richard Lapoint, Donald Dickson, and Tim Cummings, a drug and alcohol counselor, came into the school to give students information concerning drugs and alcohol.

Brenda Dorman, president and founder of the Panther's Den, has been invited by the State of New Hampshire to give presentations about the formation of the den and its activities. The Den provides assistance as the budget allows, with the help of Joanne O'Brien, to fund staff members' and students' attendance at drug education workshops.

We had an epidemic of chickenpox this year. The State requires that a child be excluded from school and avoid contact with susceptible children until at least one week after the rash appears or until all the vesicles (blisters) have dried or become crusted over.

An important excerpt from our new 1988 Immunization Law states that no child may be enrolled in school without first presenting an immunization record, partial or complete, or a medical or religious exemption. The thirty-day waiting period is no longer allowed.

Our basic program for providing services has remained the same. I would encourage any parent who has a question about available state, community, or school health programs to contact me at any time.

## PITTSBURG-CLARKSVILLE CHAPTER ONE PROJECT

Chapter I had an exciting and productive year in 1988-1989. In reading, the first grade loved to take the part of characters in plays, which were interspersed with other reading activities; the printed words had more meaning when the students could "get inside" the characters and read the lines with authentic feeling.

Second graders were challenged to read for meaning, to answer literal questions from the selection, and then to think on a higher level by making inferences, figuring out what might have happened previously, predicting what might happen next, and discussing how the characters might feel.

Third graders wrote a business letter to a travel agent to ask about traveling to the country of their choice; and when the replies came in, they were challenged to read the answers to their questions as well as to read the colorful brochures. A very special "Thank You!" goes to the Berlin Travel Bureau! Also, we studied the parts of a story: setting, plot, character development, etc... in preparation for entering the Highlights for Children contest to write an ending for a partially written story. We are still waiting for the results of those efforts. One of our entries may be chosen to be published.

Conventional math games and creative computer games played significant roles in the math program. The computer not only changes the examples to be completed, but it requires that the students accomplish the tasks in a specified amount of time. This challenges the students to really learn the facts because they do not have time to figure them out "on their fingers." Using manipulatives made math concrete for those who needed that approach.
