



WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE The Polls Will Be Open From 12 A.M. to 6 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Columbia Town Hall on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To vote to bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the Town of Columbia for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Department and the Stratford Fire Department for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for stand-by fire protection from the Stratford Fire Department.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to support the operation of the Colebrook Communications Center.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise as a contribution for the support and services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service,
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate as a contribution for the support and services of the Ver-Shire Center.

- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Ambulance District A-1 services.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association to help defray the cost of maintaining standby alert personnel to cover medical emergencies.
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operating expenses and matching funds of the Northern Coos Community Health Association.
- Article 12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.
- Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of appraising buildings, mobile homes, land transfers, etc. to keep the Town at 100% valuation and to keep real estate records current.
- Article 14. To see what sum the Town will vote to appropriate as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1984.
- Article 15. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- Article 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the Old Age, Blind and Disability Assistance and Nursing Care for the year ensuing.
- Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Community Action Outreach Program.
- Article 18. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of summer roads and bridges.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seem conducive to the best interest of the Town and appropriate money for the same.

- Article 20. To authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend \$27,435.13 (estimated) revenue from the State Highway Department (Block Grant Aid) for additional maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class V highways.
- Article 21. To see what action the Town will take regarding Waste Disposal and appropriate money for same.
- Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to contribute to the Colebrook Library.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when same is received.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to disasters and incur debts for temporary loans for same should the need arise.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to anpply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1983 to the defraying of Town charges and appropriations for the year 1984 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.

- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, selectmen, and all other officers and ratify and confirm the same.
- Article 29. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

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PROCEEDINGS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 8, 1983

The Columbia School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Margaret Salls, at 9:10 P.M.

ARTICLE 1. The Moderator asked the School Clerk to read the results of the election of School District Officers as voted on earlier in the day.

ARTICLE 2. Walter Laro made the motion to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen of the Columbia School District. Isabelle Parkhurst seconded the motion which passed.

Motion was made by Edward Poulin that the School Board be authorized to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States. The motion was seconded by Patty Hart. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. Walter Laro made the motion that the Columbia School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$343,412.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. The motion was seconded by LaVerna Haynes. The Moderator called for discussion on the article. Isabelle Parkhurst asked, "if bus transportation was ever put up for bids?" Edward Poulin answered they would if there would be any likelihood of competitive bidding but that in the event of there being only one bid they felt they could do better for the town through negotiating the bussing contract. Some discussion of the reasons for increased costs ensued. A vote was called for and the \$343,412.00 appropriation was unanimously approved.

ARTICLE 5. Richard Johnsen asked "why Columbia voters can't

vote in Colebrook?" Edward Poulin responded that not unless we were in a Co-op School District plan. Ensuing discussion centered around the possible advantages of a Co-op School District over the present system. Perley Davis provided figures and statistics demonstrating the financial advantages of a Co-op School District to the Town of Columbia. Mr. Davis indicated the need for further study.

There being no further business, Isabelle Parkhurst moved to adjourn. Patty Hart seconded the motion and the meeting adjourned at 9:40 P.M.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

A RECOMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

On April 26, 1983, the National Commission on Excellence in Education submitted its final report to U. S. Secretary of Education, Terrell H. Bell. The report, now commonly referred to as the "Nation At Risk Report", has rekindled public interest and concern on the quality and status of education in our Nation. The Commission's report gave particular attention to an assessment of the quality of teaching and learning in our Nation's public and private schools, colleges, and universities, and also, to defining problems which must be faced and overcome if we are successfully to pursue the course of excellence in education.

Reaction to the report has been varied and wide spread. In our state alone, three formal studies are presently being conducted in response to the sweeping indictment made by the Commission. Areas being studied are the curriculum in high schools, graduation requirements, the length of the school day, the school year, and the time on task spent on various subjects both in the classroom and on homework assignments.

Although it is anticipated that New Hampshire schools will fare fairly well in terms of the Commission's findings, (recent public reports indicate that New Hampshire ranks top in the Nation in regard to Scholastic Aptitute Tests taken by seniors) there is concensus by all concerned with education that there is a need for a recommitment to excellence; from the parent, the student, the school, the community, and ultimately the nation.

Because of their timely importance and relevance the following excerpts from the Commission's report are presented:

"We define 'excellence' to mean several related things. At the level of the individual learner, it means performing on the boundary of individual ability in ways that test and push back personal limits, in school and in the workplace. Excellence characterizes a school or college that sets high expectations and goals for all learners, then tries in every way possible to help students reach them. Excellence characterizes a society that has adopted these policies, for it will then be prepared through the education and skill of its people to respond to the challenges of a rapidly changing world. Our Nation's people and its schools and colleges must be committed to achieving excellence in all these senses."

"The task of assuring the success of our recommendations does not fall to the schools and colleges alone. Obviously, faculty members and administrators along with policymakers and the mass media, will play a crucial role in the reform of the educational system. But even more important is the role of parents and students, and to them we speak directly. TO PARENTS: You know that you cannot launch your children into today's world unless they are of strong character and welleducated in the use of language, science, and mathematics. They must possess a deep respect for intelligence, achievement, and learning, and the skills needed to use them: for setting goals: and for disciplined work. That respect must be accompanied by an intolerance for the shoddy and second-rate masquerading as good enough.

You have the right to demand for your children the best our schools and colleges can provide. Your vigilance and your refusal to be satisfied with less than the best are the imperative first step. But your right to a proper education for vour children carries a double responsibility. As surely as you are your child's first and most influential teacher, your child's ideas about education and its significance begin with you. You must be a living example of what you expect your children to honor and emulate. Moreover you bear a responsibility to participate actively in your child's education. You should encourage more dilligent study and discourage satisfaction with mediocrity and the attitude that says 'let it slide'; monitor your child's study; encourage good study habits; encourage your child to take more demanding rather than less demanding courses; nuture your child's curiosity, creativity, and confidence; and be an active participant in the work of the schools. Finally help your children understand that excellence in education cannot be achieved without intellectual and moral integrity coupled with hard work and commitment. Children will look to their parents and teachers as models of such virtues.

TO STUDENTS: You forfeit your chance for life at its fullest when you withhold your best effort in learning, when you give only the minimum to learning, you receive only the minimum in return. Even with your parents' best example and your teachers' best effort, in the end it is your work that determines how much and how well you learn. When you work to your full capacity, you can hope to attain the knowledge and skills that will enable you to create your future and control your destiny. If you do not, you will have your future thrust upon you by others. Take hold of your life, apply your gifts and talents, work with dedication and self-discipline. Have high expectations for yourself and convert every challenge into an opportunity."

Copies of the entire report are available to any interested person and may be obtained in the Office of the Superintendent of Schools.

I extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the school boards, principals, and faculty. It is through their dedication, hard work and commitment that our schools strive for excellence. With support from you, the voter and taxpayer, our local school districts will meet the challenge in providing sound educational programs.

GUIDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

This year's graduating class was somewhat different than any in recent years and that was in the percentage of students who went on for some type of further training. Over fifty percent of the graduating seniors applied to and were accepted at colleges of their choice. This is a rate considerably higher than the state average and, I believe, signifies the continuing efforts of this office, the teachers, the administration and the parents to encourage our young people to obtain marketable skills. All should realize that today's job market is continually changing, that unskilled and semiskilled laborers are facing large reductions in their work force, and that the best security for a lasting career evolves from the ability to adjust work skills to the needs of the market place. This is best achieved by educating one's self to a point where obtaining any variety of skills is possible.

In addition to the high percentage of graduates pursuing further education, all of our student body continues to test above average on national standardized tests. Although testing for the overall school body is only slightly higher than the national average, I take particular pride in reporting that our Scholastic Aptitude Test scores were significantly above average. The SAT averages for our students in 1982-83 were 534 in math and 504 in the verbal section. The national averages are in the vicinity of 468 in math and 425 in verbal. Our students outdistanced the national average by more than 66 points in both categories.

The juniors and seniors were also administered the Differential Aptitude Test. This testing was provided free of charge through an arrangement between this office and the Department of Defense. As a result of our participation, Colebrook Academy received \$200 of free testing materials which can be used in the future. In the spring, arrangements were made to allow all juniors to take Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests (PSAT) free of charge in the fall of 1983. This represents a savings of \$4.50 per student for a total of \$225 to individual students and their parents.

Also of great concern to parents is the cost of sending a child to college. Although I do not have a complete survey of graduating seniors, a follow-up of ten of the graduates revealed a total financial aid award of more than \$40,000. Financial aid is available to most students and parents should apply as early as possible after January 1.

In addition to working with seniors, I try to see as many other students as possible including the elementary school. I encourage all of the students to visit the guidance office if they need assistance with anything from personal problems and course selection to tutorial help in a specific program area.

Parents should also feel free to call or visit the guidance office to discuss the progress of their children.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

School nursing originated in England in the 1890's. It took root in the United States in the early 1900's and was well established by the 1920's. Today, the school nurse is the staff member responsible for protecting and promoting the health of all students. The goal of the school nurse is to maximize each child's potential to learn and to grow by providing the best possible health care. Our school program this year attempted to meet this goal through the use of screening programs, physical examinations, assistance from state and community agencies, immunization clinics, dental programs and parental support.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided professional medical advice as our school physician and Mary Sasser, family nurse practitioner, assisted her.

We expanded our school health program this year to include Family Life Education which is taught in the eighth and eleventh grades. This was made possible through community effort.

Also new this year was a Developmental Screening Clinic made available through NCES for children four and five years old. The children were tested for fine and gross motor skills, concepts and communication.

NCES was helpful in providing our district with equipment for impedance screening. Robin Henne, hearing consultant, tested the children for middle ear problems.

The American Cancer Society sponsored their Great American Smoke Out in November. The third grade students enjoyed sending helium balloons into the air. They received antismoking buttons and learned about the risks of smoking.

The State Department of Education required each child entering school to be completely immunized. Tuberculin testing, however, was no longer deemed necessary due to the low incidence of tuberculosis in our area.

Our district also began several much needed drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs. The ME/ME program was designated for grades one through six, Ombudsman for grades seven and eight and Quest for grades nine through twelve. Workshops were held for school personnel involved in implementing each program with the ultimate goal being drug abuse prevention through improving self concept and decision making. Also, the SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving) program was introduced this year. SADD has four goals: To help eliminate the drunk driver and save lives; to alert high school students to the dangers of drinking and driving; to conduct community awareness programs; and to organize peer counseling programs to help students who may have concerns about alcohol. Mary Sasser and Gary Dinco accompanied the students to Concord and then held several meetings with them as a follow-up. Ben Gadwah was elected student president.

The school nurses and the Staff Development Committee organized a Nutrition Workshop in May. It was presented by the New England Dairy and Food Council for the purpose of developing nutrition programs in the classrooms, grades K-12. Teaching kits were provided to the teachers who attended the workshop.

In closing, I wish to thank all those in the community who have helped me make this such a successful year.

A grant of federal funds under Title I ESEA, as amended by Chapter I of the Educational Consolidation and Improvement Act, was applied for and received. Consequently, identified children in grades 1-5 were provided with daily instructional reading activities and services executed according to each child's "special" learning style and geared to sustain individual gains made during program participation.

Results which include year- and cycle-long achievement test scores, affective measures and measures of kolistic reading for present and previous participants are continually examined and regular classroom participation monitored.

Evaluative findings indicated that all students gained significantly in their reading achievement as a result of this Chapter I ECIA participation. Data also strongly suggested that the reading program did perform the task for which it was designed by providing basic reading skill development and remediation when necessary.

I would like to express my thanks to the Chapter I staff. Their personal efforts to create and motivate special reading experiences for the children and their performances at the November State Chapter I Conferences should be commended.

Parent involvement is a valuable asset to any school system. The active participation of parents in our project was not only beneficial to the children, Chapter I staff and regular teachers but to the parents themselves. This year their involvement took many forms. We were able to continue offering a six-week pre-school program in April-May and our annual Spring Fling due mainly to super parental cooperation and support. My appreciation and compliments are extended to all of you.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all businesses that donated items needed to create special reading experiences and also to those individuals who were not parents but who dedicated hours to help us fulfill project hopes and dreams.

Special thanks to a gentleman named Sonny who volunteered his voice and guitar to tape our original song lyrics and to a

lady named Michelle who accompanied on guitar "The Chapter I Reader" as he sang his song for the public.

A very special highlight of the year was an invitation to the staff from a school in Newport, Vermont, to participate in John Peterson Day. Mr. Peterson, a well-known author of children's books, personally thanked the staff for sharing their expertise in using his books to develop and enhance reading skills. Innovative instructional activites used in Colebrook second grade Chapter I reading classes were performed for the author by Hillside Elementary School second graders.

I am extremely pleased to report that this has been a very rewarding year. The combined efforts of the children, their parents, the Chapter I staff, regular classroom teachers and the community were responsible for making Chapter I reading experiences very special.

I have always believed that no child fails alone and that no teacher succeeds alone. Thank you for believing this too!
