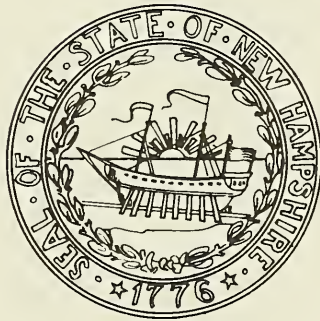

I would also like to thank Jim Somerville, our Town Manager for providing the board with both good technical and resource information in order that we could arrive at sound decisions. A special thanks goes to Gail Currier, the Board's secretary for a job well done.

Some of the larger scale projects we were faced with in 1994 were:

- Property Revaluation - This project went very well considering all the interruptions, such as having to search for a new Tax Assessor in the middle of the Revaluation. - Mill Street Bridge Construction.

CONWAY TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY,
County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote
in Town Affairs:

Your are hereby notified to meet at the Karl Seidenstuecker Auditorium at Kennett High School, Conway, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, 1995, at eight o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. Voting on Articles 1 through 5 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall be open for balloting at eight o'clock in the forenoon or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order and declares a quorum present. The remaining articles of the Warrant shall be acted upon at eight thirty o'clock in the forenoon on Saturday, the twenty fifth day of March, 1995.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as petitioned by Daniel Bailey and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance to enlarge the Recreational Resort District by including a substantial area of East Conway and increasing the permitted uses in the district to include a trail system and overnight lodging facilities plus sales, rentals, and repairs of all off highway recreational vehicles and related clothing and equipment.

Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board.

ARTICLE 3. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as petitioned by Bayard W. Kennett and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance to enlarge the Highway Commercial District on the Redstone Road between Conway Tractor & Equipment business location to the junction of Route 16 so as to extend back to a depth of 1200 feet westerly of Route 302.

Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board.

ARTICLE 4. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as petitioned by Bayard W. Kennett and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance to establish an Industrial District on Hobbs Street in Conway Village and establish the permitted uses including setbacks and structure heights for the District.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board.

ARTICLE 5. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as petitioned by W. Curtis Kennett and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance to create a new special exception in the Residential/Agricultural District which may permit a resort hotel constructed on and in conjunction with a commercial golf facility having special setbacks and other specified criteria.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) (gross budget) for construction costs and related expenses for the CLOSURE OF THE TOWN'S OLD LANDFILL AND SEPTAGE LAGOONS, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$2,000,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the terms and the rate of interest thereon. Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$6,700) for the purpose of partially funding improvements to Town facilities to bring them into ADA AND BUILDING CODE COMPLIANCE. Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of Four Hundred Forty Six Thousand Four Hundred Eight Dollars (\$446,408) to be paid to the following precincts/district for the services indicated:

Adoption of this article will result in a more uniform and equitable assessment of the costs for emergency services. The exact amount to be raised will be adjusted based upon appropriations and other revenues reported by each precinct/district to the NH Department of Revenue Administration at the time the property tax rates are established. However, in no case shall the amount raised exceed the amounts indicated above for each precinct/district. Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-1-0). \$426,408, with an amount to Conway Village Fire District of \$123,990, recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of Ten Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty One Dollars (\$10,921) to be paid to the Redstone Private Volunteer Fire Department for Fire Service. An agreement covering fire protection services shall be mutually approved by the Redstone Department and the Conway Board of Selectmen with all terms and conditions thereof to be as finally accepted and executed by said Board of Selectmen (and which agreement shall require the Department to meet all requirements of private Firefighting Units pursuant to RSA 154:1-c and related controlling Statutes on or before January 1, 1996, in order to continue to qualify for further municipal funding support after said date). Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) for the CONSTRUCTION AND UPGRADING OF WATER LINES SERVICING HOBBS STREET, Conway Village, industrial/commercial properties, and to provide additional water storage capacity at the Bald Hill site. Further, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Conway Village Fire District Commissioners to facilitate the project. This action is subject to submission of an article by the Conway Village Fire District Commissioners for the District annual meeting warrant, and approval thereof by the District voters, for funding of the District's portion of the water storage construction. Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-1).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to assume responsibility for maintaining the STREET LIGHTS WITHIN CONWAY VILLAGE FIRE DISTRICT (effective April 1, 1995) and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) for maintenance of the existing lights. This action is subject to approval

of the District at its 1995 Annual Meeting to relinquish responsibility of Street Lighting within the District boundaries to the Town of Conway. Requested by Conway Village Fire District Commissioners. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-1).

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a one year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT for the calendar year 1995 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME #93, Local #859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, having a total estimated contract cost for 1995 of Five Hundred Eleven Thousand and Three Dollars (511,003). No further amount of money is required to be raised and appropriated as there are no addition increases in total salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Proposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-3-0).

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a one year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT for the calendar year 1995 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME Local #3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT having a total estimated contract cost for 1995 of Six Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Two Dollars (\$627,382). To further see if the Town will authorize to raise and appropriate a sum of Seventy Nine Thousand Five Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars (\$79,578) for the 1995 fiscal year. Nineteen Thousand Nine Hundred Two Dollars (\$19,902) of said sum to be transferred from the December 31, 1994, undesignated fund balance to cover 1994 retroactive contract costs included in the total estimated contract cost for 1995. The balance and the remainder of Fifty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$59,676) to be raised and appropriated for the 1995 fiscal year. Such sums represent the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Proposed by the Conway Police Commission. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-2-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-2).

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Sixty Dollars (\$80,060.00), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER Board of Directors. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dennis J. Duprey and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-7-0).

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500), for the support of the COMMUNITY ACTION OUTREACH PROGRAM. Also to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the support of the BIG BROTHERS/BIG SISTERS ORGANIZATION administered also by the Tri-County Community Action Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Paula H. Lehmann and others. Not recommended by Board of Selectmen (1-3-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$7150 for Community Action Outreach Program and \$200 for Big Brothers/Big Sisters respectively.] Community Action Outreach Program recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0). Big Brothers/Big Sisters recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Forty Three Dollars (\$2,043.00), in support of CARROLL COUNTY AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & RAPE'S SHELTER FOR BATTERED WOMEN AND CHILDREN. Agreeable to a petition signed by Alice S. Proctor and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Three Thousand Seven Hundred Nineteen Dollars (\$23,719.00), for support of the GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary P. Cowperthwait and others. Recommended by Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Four Hundred Forty Dollars (\$10,440.00) for the VISITING NURSE & HOSPICE CARE SERVICES OF NORTHERN CARROLL COUNTY, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Deborah J. Cassidy and others. Recommended by Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Dollars

(\$17,930) for the support of the CHILDREN'S HEALTH CENTER. Agreeable to a petition signed by Evelyn B.Dole and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the CONWAY VILLAGE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. These funds to be utilized to operate and administer the Information Booth, as well as to organize the Christmas Parade, the Conway Village Festival, and other activities which benefit the Conway Community. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Gaudreau and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) for the Early Intervention Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Three Hundred Eighty Six Dollars (\$3,386.00) for the FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM OF THE CENTER OF HOPE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Judith L. Durkee and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-4-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$1,776.] Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-6-1).

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00), to defray the operating expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS. Agreeable to a petition signed by a Kymberly A L'Heureux and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$5,000.] Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, said funds to be dedicated to the Chamber's Visitor Information Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Russ Seybold and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended

by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to assist CARROLL COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary-Anne Lane and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-4-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$7,478.] Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-3-2).

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Eight Dollars (\$7,908.00) to assist the FAMILY HEALTH CENTRE. Agreeable to a petition signed by Benita Silver and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-4-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$7,678.] Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-6-1).

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for operating expenses for the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ralph W. Wiggin and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for the Construction Project for the EASTERN SLOPE REGIONAL AIRPORT. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ralph W. Wiggin and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-4-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to assist the CONWAY HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Agreeable to a petition signed by Bradford E. Bemis and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-3-0). [The Board will support funding at 1994 level of \$1,300.] Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-6-1).

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) for support of VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Agreeable to a petition signed by Eugene R. Hussey and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize an agreement among the Town, the Laurent Family, Trustees of Pequawket Foundation and the Kennett Company, modifying the duration of the

restriction on use at the Town's Abenaki Forest area in Intervale, to extend to the lineal blood Abenaki descendants of Dennis Obomsawin (nephew of Emanuel and Stephen Laurent) with the Board of Selectmen authorized to determine final terms and to execute the Agreement in behalf of the Town as the Board deems reasonable in its discretion.

ARTICLE 34. To see whether or not the Town will vote to accept and take over as public roads of the Town those roads which have been dedicated to the public use by being drawn and shown on plan of lands platted by the owners, filed and approved by the Town of Conway Planning Board, known as Kandahar Lane having a width of 50 feet and length of 1800 feet, and Whitaker Lane from its entrance onto Cranmore Birches Road to its intersection with Kandahar Lane having a width of 50 feet and length of 960 feet, pursuant to RSA 229:1 and RSA 231:51, agreeable to a petition signed by Arnold Blethen and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen, subject to test borings being done to verify that the substrate is up to Town specifications.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the CENTER CONWAY WATER SYSTEM CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1980. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund (approximately \$459). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY INCINERATOR EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1972. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund (approximately \$736). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0) Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the MUNICIPAL CENTER CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1983. Said funds, with accumulate interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund (approximately \$244). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the WEST SIDE ROAD CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1989. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund (approximately \$272). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by

the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The Selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gifts, and acceptance shall not bind the Town to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of any such personal property.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other government unit or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw Capital Reserve Funds established by the Town from time to time, and disburse the same in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were created respectively.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the authorization for borrowing the balance of the Landfill Construction Article of 1990 in the amount of Three Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$305,000). Purposed and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).

ARTICLE 44. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

I am very grateful for the responsible, professional, and committed staff of Town employees under my jurisdiction. We are constantly trying to better serve the public. It is important for the public to realize that the Townspeople and Town employees are all on the same team. We hope that the open communication, positive attitudes, helpful environment, and those little smiles, make you feel welcome in our workplace.

1994 proved to be a positive results-oriented year in which challenges and projects, both anticipated and unanticipated, stayed in the forefront. Some highlighted examples are:

- Property Revaluation - a tedious project interrupted with the changing of the guard, with Tom Holmes as a new Assessor. A new computer hardware/software system was included in the project.
- A new bridge and reconstructed beach on Mill Street.
- Successful reconstruction of a portion of West Side Road.
- Grant writing and project challenges relating to economic development needs.
- Improvements to Town facilities for structural integrity and ADA compliance.
- Studying ways to improve the workplace for employee efficiency, space utilization and equipment needs.
- Landfill and septage issues.
- Accountability of manpower and equipment.

These and other projects are discussed further in Department Reports.

In 1994 the employees went from 10% to 20% contribution of health insurance premiums, and in 1995 there will be a 70/30 cost sharing. An HMO plan through the New Hampshire Municipal Association is supposed to become available to us in 1995. A careful analysis is in order to evaluate continued efforts in lowering costs of insurance for both the employee and the taxpayer without undermining the integrity of the benefit.

I refer to the narrative budget portion of this year's Annual Report for the financial side of the house. We have, however, enjoyed a very stabilizing year while maintaining strong controls on spending.

There are many parts to the whole, and while some parts will always need tending to, I am confident that at the end of 1994 Conway's Town government was in good order. The staff and I are looking forward to a positive and productive 1995 with continued movement toward improved and accountable services.

As in years past, the public is encouraged to voice their concerns or prob-

lems with us. We do our best to have an open door policy. We also welcome your suggestions.

I want to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen for its continued support, and the flexible leadership parameters they allow me to function with. The Board and I operate as a team with a common goal to do our best for the citizens to make Conway a better place to live.

ANNUAL NARRATIVE FINANCIAL/BUDGET REPORT

Submitted by: James B. Somerville, Town Manger

January 1, 1995

OPENING COMMENTS:

The purpose of this report is to provide the Town's residents, taxpayers and voters with a vehicle to better understand the annual budget which they are being asked to vote on. The report attempts to take \$5 million of complex numbers and put them into logical words, with insight into management's financial philosophy, and how operations, services and manpower relate to the budget. In addition, the report highlights, increases and decreases, and provides an overview of the Town's financial condition and posturing in today's economy.

I carry forward my confidence from last year that the Town of Conway will vote with a better understanding of the operational budget, and will support the budget as accountable and responsible in the providing of municipal services in an efficient manner.

GENERAL OVERVIEW:

A. The Town's financial profile shows continued improvement for the 3rd consecutive year. Some causes of this encouraging trend are highlighted as follows:

1. Employees with budgetary responsibility and spending authority clearly understand the Town Manager's expectations and operational policies. The process of being accountable and exercising austerity is never ending.
2. Increased productivity resulting from continued professional development, time management, cross utilization of manpower, and work place attitude.
3. Improved management of vehicle and equipment maintenance programs.
4. Less dependency on outside resources for engineering, project management, and cost analysis.
5. Purchasing and bidding policies/procedures.
6. Ongoing and improved control of health benefit costs.
7. Improved cash flow and economic recovery indicators.
8. Accountable welfare assistance program.

9. Increased and better functioning recycling program.
10. Identifying methods and principles to maximize manpower and equipment abilities and capabilities.

B. All the ups and downs of operations and dealing with the unanticipated, emphasizes the need for our existing Gross Budget Law. Management flexibility and decision making with the check and balance of approval by the Board of Selectmen allows adjustments to operations based on necessity and prioritizing, while at the same time staying within total budget. With that vested authority, obligations of municipal services were maintained and the year closed out with a surplus of \$218,000 (subject to audit).

BUDGET PHILOSOPHY:

The budget philosophy for 1995 continues the trend of 1993 and 1994, which was stated as "continuing to evaluate each and every department, identify areas of excess, ways to consolidate and cross train/utilize manpower, find more effective ways to get the job done or to purchase services/supplies, continually ask questions such as: Can it wait? Do we need it? Can we do it for less cost? Can someone else do it? Where is it on a prioritized list? Is the service essential? etc." This budget philosophy has generated a 1995 budget which is manageable and is accountable. There is nothing arbitrary within the 1995 budget. It is a reflection of hard work by people who care and is another step in "running a five million dollar operation like a business."

BUDGET ANALYSIS:

Only significant changes from the 1994 budget are discussed:

Executive:

Salaries:

A. Welfare Officer salary is down as a result of efficiency of operations. 1994 saw a major department turn around from 1993, and it is anticipated that the excellent job performance of the Town's Welfare Officer will be carried over into 1995.

B. The Non Union Merit Account request is less than 1993 and 1994. During 1994 performance merit raises totaling \$12,258 were distributed amongst twenty employees. 3% of payroll was placed in the account and 91% of the account was expended. (The Library and Police non union personnel are reflected separately in their respective departments.)

Expenses:

A. Mileage - Doing away with transportation stipends and utilizing the retired police vehicles continues to generate further savings for 1995.

B. Reference Books & Professional Development - Creating a career environment and a staff of competent professionals bears a cost burden to the employer. Establishing and retaining a stabilized skilled work force is a sound investment.

Office:

The increase in Equipment and Maintenance provides for replacement of two computer stations, one new laser printer, and audio/video training equipment. Software/hardware maintenance contract costs is included for the Town's financial computer system.

Election, Registration & Vital Statistics:

A decrease as there are less elections and Town Meetings anticipated for 1995.

Revaluation of Property:

1995 should prove to be the year of stabilization in the Assessing Department. It has taken over two years to clearly identify the problems, revamp the department and operation through specific projects, and resolve the issues. The 1995 changes result in a \$6,465 net increase in the appropriation request. We are working toward an assessing organization, system and staffing which will preclude a reoccurrence of the inequities and inefficiencies which proved so costly.

Legal/Negotiations:

Always an unknown as it is impossible to predict legal actions. A decrease is requested based on known case load and satisfactory labor contracts.

Employee Benefits:

A slight overall decrease. However, there is a significant change in health insurance. This is a result of the employees having an increased contribution cost sharing of premiums (1993 - 10%, 1994 - 20%, 1995 - 30%). An employee with family will have contributed, for example: \$0 1992, \$530.16 1993, \$1,188.84 1994, \$1,760.80 in 1995.

Planning & Zoning:

A contract services line item has been added to the budget for 1995. The money is being used to evaluate infrastructure and land use availability in the Hobbs Street area for industrial revitalization and employment growth.

Government Buildings:

Adjustments have been made to be more reflective of 1994's actual expenditures. The primary reason for the decrease is that the repair to two roofs, and rebuilding of Town Hall parking lot were one time projects.

Cemeteries:

Rarely used - \$1 left in line item to allow for transfer of funds should the need arise. Next year we will probably absorb this account into parks maintenance.

Insurance:

Broadening of available coverages with New Hampshire's Municipal Association non profit Property and Liability Trust allows for continued decrease in costs.

Police:

Some up and down line item changes with a minor bottom line decrease impact. I defer to their Annual Report for operational changes and philosophy.

Ambulance & Fire:

A. Ambulance: The actual projected increase in cost for the North Conway private ambulance service is \$3,405 (3% cost of living in accordance with the contract). In 1994 the contract cost was covered from two sources (\$25,092 operating budget, and \$82,503 special warrant article).

B. Townwide fire training is in full swing with expanding efforts each year. Volunteer fire fighters from all precincts and districts have been participating and providing input for current and future training needs.

Highway:

The budget increase is primarily caused by two items. Labor is up as by right-sizing the department it has been deemed to be operationally necessary and efficient to discontinue two summer hires and add one full time. This provides us with sufficient help for summer work and gives us a much needed winter equipment operator. School bus maintenance has been added, as of July 1 the Town will perform bus fleet maintenance. The School will be assessed a formula based cost which has been entered as an anticipated revenue, thereby making this item a budget wash.

Solid Waste:

Continued streamlining and operational efficiencies allow for a 10% budget reduction with no negative effect on services rendered.

Welfare:

As stated in the Town Manager's Report, we now have a tightly run welfare operation, and a reduction in expenditures has resulted. Those who demonstrate a need and qualify are served to the fullest of the town's policies and guidelines.

Library:

The Library Department budget will surely have Town Meeting floor discussion. The recommended Board of Selectmen's budget is \$57,745 lower than the Library's initially requested amount, and \$22,114 less than 1994. The Board's commitment to present the voters with a level budget compared to 1994 (inclusive of all Special Warrant Articles) caused careful deliberation on all budgets. The Selectmen did not agree with the Trustees' expenditure priorities and needs. It was also felt that available funds under the jurisdiction of the Trustees should be used for their statutory earmarked purposes (maintenance, equipment, books, etc.).

Conservation:

The usual encumbering of funds did not occur from 1994 to 1995 and their budget request was downsized when a wood cut project was temporarily tabled.

Interest TANS:

We had both favorable borrowing rates and borrowed considerably less in 1994 than 1993. The same trend is anticipated in 1995 as the Town's cash flow continues to improve.

Capital Reserve Fund:

While it appears there is a \$90,000 increase for 1995, \$151,000 of the amount (Highway and Solid Waste) was voted by Special Warrant Article in 1994 as the respective Capital Reserve Fund accounts were authorized.

CLOSING COMMENTS:

The Operating Budget and Special Warrant Articles when combined and compared to 1994, present a level funding need for 1995. (This is subject to adjustments through the budget process and action at Town Meeting.) The Town's portion of the budget, if approved as presented, will provide for a stable tax rate (exclusive of school and precincts/districts).

I have set a goal to submit operating budgets both currently and in the future which provide for a status quo tax rate in my area of responsibility. This commits to a concept that a budget can only go up or down in direct relation to

the total assessed values of taxable properties in Town. The budget is, therefore, economically driven.

The Town does continue to see a slow favorable recovery as identifiable through various economic indicators, e.g. cash flow, motor vehicle registrations, delinquent taxes, and building permits. The year end audit should result in showing that the Town's uncommitted funds has grown to \$750,000. This is up from the \$200,000 range of 2-1/2 years ago when I became Conway's Town Manager. It is important to continue to strive toward an amount of \$1,500,000 which will give the Town a very favorable long term bond rating as well as provide a strong "cash position" to offset budget needs on the next economic cycle. Because the current economy remains in a slow upturn, the Town is maintaining a conservative posture in predicting future revenues. This approach, in conjunction with accountable spending policies and tight operating budget, helps assure the future financial well being of Conway.

I trust readers of this report find it helpful and informative. Your comments and ideas to improve on this Annual Narrative Financial/Budget Report are welcome, appreciated and encouraged.

TREASURER'S REPORT TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE

The recent revelations in Orange County, California, warrant a few comments about our Town's finances.

The unsound investment and financial policies and practices being followed by the Treasury Office in Orange County have no place in municipal finance. I want to assure the people of Conway that the Town's financial operations and the investments of its funds, are following a very conservative approach. Our first priority is safety, followed by liquidity and rate of return.

Good investment grade ratings are experienced in the Town's placement of short term tax anticipation notes and long term bonding. We are fortunate to have the use of the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool and local banks for the investment of our funds. Both sources have provided us with maximum rates of return and liquidity consistent with a high level of safety.

Finally, I would like to pay special tribute to our Finance Director, Mary Conlon, who has provided the Town over many years with excellent, professional day to day management of the Town's finances.

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1993, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway as of December 31, 1993, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Being an assessor is like being a bus driver, it's only when the bus is late or when assessments become inequitable, that people tend to sit up and take notice. If things are going smoothly, if the assessment bus is always on time, then there is a tendency to forget how vital this department is to a community's fiscal health.

This is a small department, both in funding and manpower, but its size belies its importance. This department is the entry point for almost all the town's operating revenues. Small as the assessing department may be, it can cost a community BIG dollars if it is not maintained. The recent expenditure of almost \$400,000 for a revaluation is a case in point.

My department will strive to insure that everyone will pay their fair share in property taxes under the laws of New Hampshire... no more and no less. I plan to do this by maintaining and improving upon the recently completed revaluation. We are developing a plan whereby every property in town will be periodically re-inspected so that we can keep this information current. In this way, you and I, as property owners in the community, will not be picking up the tab for someone else's unassessed or underassessed property.

It has been said that taxes are the price tag of civilization. To me, local government is the best government in that it gives us the most value for our tax dollar. It is the most responsive to our local needs, and it truly is one "of the people, by the people." When I see local government, I see friends and our neighbors working together for the common good. When working with you, the taxpayer, I promise to try and keep this in the forefront of all of our dealings together.

TOWN OF CONWAY PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

A PERMANENT APPLICATION for each exemption claimed below must have been filed with the assessing officials of the town prior to April 15th this year. RSA 72:33.

Veteran Service Exemption: RSA 72:28-36

Amount=\$100 Regular Veteran, \$1,400 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption: RSA 72:43-h

Must be resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly, if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.

Net income of \$10,000 or, if married, \$12,000. Have assets of \$45,000 or less, excluding the value of residence. Amount of exemption:

65 to 74 years of age, \$25,000
75 to 79 years of age, \$40,000
80 years or older, \$50,000

The applicable amount is deducted from assessed value of property before tax is figured.

Physically Handicapped: RSA 72:37-a

“Physically handicapped person” means a person who by reason of a physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him to propel himself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

Blind Exemption: RSA 72:37

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department.

Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his or her residential real estate.

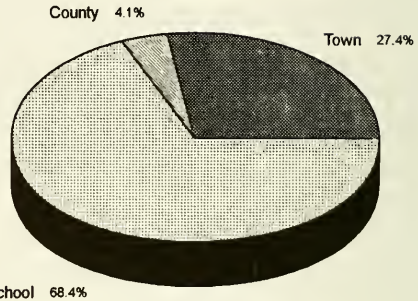

TOWN PLANNER'S REPORT

As Conway's Planning Director for almost two years, I have gained a further understanding of the issues and citizens of Conway. I am grateful for the continued support I receive from the citizens of Conway, and I hope that I meet your expectations in 1995. This past year the Planning Department furthered the planning efforts of the Town in the following areas:

Master Plan. Several chapters of the Master plan of Conway were written and adopted this year. The Planning Board's 1990 goal of adopting two-three chapters per year is being achieved, and I hope that even greater gains can be made in 1995.

Grants. The Town, in cooperation with the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council was successful in securing a Federal grant through the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991, to construct a multiple-use pathway to service the commercial businesses along the White Mountain Highway.

Development Reviews. 1994 was a busy year for the Planning Board as the number of residential subdivisions and commercial Site Plan Reviews increased from 1993 levels. Additionally, for the first time in several years, the Planning Board began reviewing several very large projects. It is very exciting to see an increase in the number of developments resulting from a rebound of our sluggish economy.

Economic Development. In a concerted effort between the Town Manager, myself and many other departments, the Town embarked on an aggressive economic development campaign. This effort would not have been successful if it were not for the cooperation of the Precincts and Town Boards; I am very excited to continue working towards expanding our employment base in 1995.

I would like to offer special thanks to our former Administrative Assistant, Lianne Boelzner. While I wish her well in her new position with the Conway Village Fire District, she was an asset to the Planning Department and we miss her. After a brief hiatus without the support of Lianne, we were fortunate to have hired a very capable replacement in Holly Meserve. Holly has done a superior job in a very difficult position.

In closing, I would like to express my gratitude to all of the members of the Planning Board; they are dedicated to making Conway a better place to live for all of its citizens. It remains imperative that the residents of Conway remain involved with the planning process, after all, it is your town; the future is here and you are it. I truly enjoy working with the citizens, developers, Planning Board and all of the Town officials, and am excited about directing Conway's future growth.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

This year has proven to be another very interesting challenge for the Planning Board. It has been a year of large site plan reviews for commercial developments, which have necessarily caused greater public response and input than in recent years. This has been a welcomed resource, during the review process and allowed the Board the opportunity to hear many different viewpoints and concerns of the Town's residents and business owners. Several of the larger projects were Clementine Realty Trust (Shopping Mall) with consequential changes to the Settlers' Green Cinema complex, Yield House, Crown Ridge, a nine hole par-3 Golf Course, Red Jacket Inn and Wal-Mart to name a few. Due to the vast complexities of some of the proposed projects, the Town also found itself in the middle of the so-called "Mall Wars"; some of these entanglements have yet to be resolved. In addition, the Planning Board reviewed several Subdivisions, making this a very active year for the Town Planner, John Krebs and Board Members, as the following year-end chart depicts:

In conjunction with the Town Engineer, Paul DegliAngeli, the Planning Board reviewed and adopted changes and improvements to the Town Road Standards, bringing them closer to today's engineering and building practices, for more durable and safer construction. In maintaining the progress of the Town's Master Plan, the Recreation Chapter was adopted by the Board last April, which offers much thought and conceptual planning based upon the many recreational activities that our region has to offer. Additionally, the Tourism Chapter which certainly augments the previous chapter was also finalized and accepted. These chapters represent further commitment to the long range planning of the Town and the Board extends much deserved appreciation to the many people who became involved in the development and review of those documents.

As the community continues to grow, we as residents have many serious and thoughtful decisions to make about the future of our Town. Moderate and planned development is necessary for any progressive township, especially when it depends a great deal upon the tourist industry for its revenues. What particular direction that growth is allowed to proceed is a determination that should involve the greater majority of townspeople and not a select handful of well meaning volunteers or, the often times, sensationalism of a special interest group. The Board encourages the involvement of all citizens in the preparation and review of zoning ordinances and building regulations which will affect the environment, visual aesthetics, livelihood, expansion and character of our neighborhoods.

As we witness the growth of our Town, it is necessary for us to focus attention to the lagging improvements, to our infrastructure. If we are to encourage and welcome business and residential relocation, then we must address this ever threatening problem. Water, sewer, utilities and increasing demands on municipal services play an important role in any decision for development. These improvements do not take place without significant cost, both in monetary sense, as well as any "precinct-philosophy" realignment, which must necessarily occur before any improvements affecting the entire Town can happen.

As I look back over the past year, I have been very pleased with the high level of professionalism that the Board members have demonstrated during the many long and sometimes "heated" meetings. It has been a pleasure to work with such a diverse group of people with varied backgrounds, which has lent much objectivity in the review process.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL 1994 REPORT

The year 1994 has been a record project year for the Council. In 1994, we received approval for \$3 million of EDA Title I construction assistance for member towns and submitted a proposal for another \$1.5 million for a project in 1995. The \$4.5 million resulting from these projects will go a very long way toward development of jobs in three of the region's growth centers. We are working diligently to see another \$5 million investment in three other growth centers and development target areas over the next three years from EDA.

The Council's Transportation Planning program continues to grow in stature and accomplishments. In addition to completing a regional bike-pedestrian plan this year, we coordinated a regional transportation enhancement program which resulted in \$2 million worth of innovative transportation projects being funded in the North Country. We also provided major road and bridge technical assistance to eight towns in cooperation with NH DOT. Two additional towns received help with Road Surface Management Systems, bringing the total number of towns in the region with NCC RSMS programs to ten. This coming year will be busier than last with the assembly of our Regional Transportation Improvement Plan, Scenic Byways Initiative, Route 16 Corridor Study, Statewide Transportation Modeling Study and numerous local road and bridge projects.

In 1994 the Council hosted the second Annual Integrity Fair at Bretton Woods. The Fair showcased the products of 100 North Country manufacturers and was attended by 10,000 people. Our third Annual Business Conditions Survey was mailed to 3,000 businesses across the region. The results of the survey provided valuable insight into workers comp, credit availability, and general business conditions in the North Country. The fourth survey is being compiled at the time of this report.

The Council has also been involved in the design and development of three recreation facilities across the region and has provided engineering assistance for landfill closures, environmental site assessments, large septic projects, road drainage and realignment projects and water system installations in 12 different towns.

With funding from the Environmental Protection Agency the Council was able to digitize hydric soils and high altitude satellite image maps of wetlands for all 51 towns in the region. The maps were distributed gratis to all towns in the region. The Council provided floodplain management, and flood insurance technical assistance to 7 towns this year and provided over 600 hours of local planning technical assistance. We continued to provide circuit riding planning

assistance to two municipalities.

Two multi-community programs were started, one involving four communities, to begin a dialogue of use of the Moore Reservoir and the Connecticut River, and the other involving twelve towns to look at cooperative economic development in the central part of the region. Community Development Block Grants were written for five towns and all the grants were funded.

The Council has accomplished all these projects (and many more that cannot be listed here due to space limitations), with a very small staff. We are committed to staying as lean as possible. Staff people on board that are available for regional activities are: Preston Gilbert, Executive Director; Cathy Conway, Engineering Coordinator; Claire Douglass, Planning Coordinator; James Steele, GIS Coordinator; Sharon Penney, Transportation Planner; Liz Ward, Small Business Development Coordinator, Berta Clark, Secretary; and Marghie Seymour, Solid Waste Consultant.

The Council is your organization. We are membership based, and we exist to respond to the needs of the region. On behalf of the Board of Directors, I want to thank you for your involvement and support. We're here as you need us.

REPORT OF THE CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT

1994 was another year of change. This year witnessed an immense improvement in the construction industry throughout the Northeast and Conway. The number of building permits was up 33% from 1993 and covers all sectors from residential remodeling through new commercial structures. A ride through any part of Town on any day will turn up new construction activity. This activity has been beneficial for everyone in the industry as we're seeing most of the area architects, engineers and all of the building trade professionals struggling to keep up with the demands for their services. Hopefully 1995 will be equally active and once again prosperous.

With the increase in construction activity came increases in the other areas also. New businesses were created and old businesses are looking to expand or relocate. These changes bring an amazing amount of activity in the zoning and health official sector as businesses find themselves having to stretch every opportunity that they have to be more competitive and quite often their business aggression puts them into some type of non-compliance. We're still doing our best to balance between the knowledge that business is vital to the success of Conway, yet compliance to the wishes of the voters, as expressed in the adopted Zoning Ordinance, is also vital. Without a doubt, zoning issues consume most of my time and create most of our dilemmas. Is zoning needed? Is zoning repressive? I'd have to answer "yes, somewhat" to both of these questions. With zoning do we lose some of our "freedom", but without it, Conway could turn into a totally undesirable destination for Tourists and businesses. I believe we have to realize that Conway has not been destroyed, it's changed, and there's still a lot of fabulous Town left to be protected from the errors of uncontrolled growth. Zoning is the tool that you've chosen to protect your town.

Lastly, what's in store for this coming year? I'd like to see some of our older Zoning problems resolved. We're currently working with some that have gone on for years and it's my feeling that if Conway had dealt with them when they were in their infancy, we wouldn't be in the messes that we're currently in. At the same time, we're trying to improve the quality of building inspection by continually educating ourselves in new areas and in forming positive working relationships with other agencies, both local and State, so that we can share the inspection burden without increasing operating costs. This year we're also planning on at least one, but possibly more, education seminars for the Construction Professionals of this area. Topics will range from fire resistive construction to radon mitigation to proper procedures for the procurement of building permits. We're still striving towards a relationship of "enforcement" through mutual cooperation rather than hard line tactics. It's faster and therefore less expensive.

In closing I have to say that last year was a challenge, but not so much of one that I'm not looking towards this year with positive feelings. No matter what, I'll do the best that I can for the Town of Conway and with all sincerity: thanks for all of your help. If anyone wants to see what we do, stop by any day, any time. There's nothing to hide and we can all learn something from each other.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In the calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

Again another year has passed. Many changes have taken place throughout the Town. We have seen many additions onto existing buildings and new building permit approvals are on the rise. Many projects have already received approvals and more are in the planning process with construction planned in the near future. Several of these proposed projects directly affect employment substantially within the area.

Town-wide Fire Funding which began last year has worked very well. For the first time the Precincts have not borne the entire cost of providing fire service throughout the Town. This funding was greatly supported last year and, hopefully, the support shown will continue this year. The Fire Departments are ready to provide quality service by many dedicated individuals who take great pride in serving the Town of Conway.

The Town has been working with the State in completing the requirements for the Enhanced 9-1-1 system, which is scheduled to be on-line this summer. This system will provide an accurate physical street address pinpointing from where the call for assistance was placed.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

The end of 1994 was a very busy time for us, we had installed a new computer and software package to bring the Police Department in line with State Wide reporting of the Uniform Crime Reports. The new computer system allows easy access and the recovery of information. The purchase included three laptop computers which are portable and can be taken in the cruisers with the patrol officers, this affords the officers time to do the reports while they are still out on the road instead of having to return to the Police Department to do their reports, this keeps the road units on the road. This new computer system is very user friendly.

Dispatch Supervisor John Reed was appointed by the Governor and his council to the State Wide 911 committee. John is the only Dispatcher in the State to be appointed to this committee. John was also elected as President of the New Hampshire Emergency Dispatch Association. This is another first for the Town of Conway.

Training of first line supervisors at The New England Institute of Law Enforcement at Babson College has been very successful. All administrators and supervisors from the rank of Chief to Sergeants have attended and completed the three week command training course.

The Cadet program is for high school students under the age of 18 who are interested in law enforcement. The budget only contained funding for one student full time for the summer months, however, we were able to fund a second student and we ran the program a shorter period of time than was planned. We went over budget in this account, but it was well worth it. Working with the Vocational Department at Kennett High School and New Hampshire Job Training Council we were able to put two more students through the Cadet program (a total of four). We hope to be able to repeat this process again next year.

The Traffic control personnel did an excellent job for us this year. One of our Sergeants trained nine in the spring and, after a couple were let go for lack of work, we ended up with five who can work on a part time basis, two of them are in college and only home on school vacation weeks. There is not enough that can be said about the job these people did for the Town of Conway this past year. They put up with bad weather, bad hours of work, and bad tempers of some of the public, but they hung in there and did a great job. They are already looking forward towards next year.

This year, after four long years of negotiating between the Police Union and the Police Commission, a fair and equitable contract has been signed by the two parties and hopefully will be passed at Town Meeting in March 1995.

As we approach the new year, we expect this year to be as busy if not busier than last year. We will be available to help in any way that we can.

POLICE COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

1994 was a year in which several of the Police Commission's long term goals became reality.

- 1) Comprehensive and updated training techniques as well as a renewed emphasis on continuing education have added significantly to the level of legal competence and professionalism within the department.
- 2) The new computer system, although a long time coming, is in place and fully operational. The system is helping to make the department more efficient and through the information and data it can provide, we will be prepared to meet the increasing demands of the future.
- 3) After several years of lengthy negotiation, we have finally reached what the Commission feels is an equitable agreement with the Police Union. It includes provisions for a "Merit" based pay system and employee health plan contributions, as mandated by the town. We are one of only a very few towns in the state that has been able to negotiate these elements into a union contract.

On another note, the department also did an excellent job this past year with Traffic Control and numerous other community related initiatives. So all in all the Commission considers 1994 a very good year for the Conway Police Department. The Chief, the Commissioners, the Officers and all the staff are committed to continuing to make the Department a source of local pride and security for everyone who travels to or lives in the Town of Conway.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT REPORT

This year we begin our report with a review of the solid waste department. 20.5% of our total waste was recycled in 1994. This is the current national average and is a 1% increase over last years amount. We would like to thank L.A. Drew and the Rotarians for supplying the materials and donating their time to build the recycling containers which were placed around Town this season. The economy continued to show signs of growth as displayed by our leading economic indicator... trash. (see charts on following page). Total waste volumes were up 9% over last year. While we enjoyed modest growth in the recycling percentage, the volume of recyclables is up 12% because of the increase in total waste. The combination of volume and price increases resulted in greater revenue for the Town. Income from recycling went from \$29,445 in 1993 to \$53,188 in 1994. Congratulation to the staff and the public for a job well done. Income from tipping fees went from \$122,470 in 1993 to \$130,406 in 1994. The actual operating expenses for 1994 were \$374,061 compared to \$408,073 in 1994. In summary, income was increased by \$31,679 while expenses were reduced by \$34,012 for a net reduction of \$65,691. The budget request for 1995 is \$385,535 or \$38,660 less than the previous year.

The highway department started the season off with an unscheduled replacement of a thirty inch storm drain which closed Seavey Street when it collapsed. Thanks to the help from the North Conway Water Precinct we were able to quickly complete the repair. Next we turned our attention to the second phase of the West Side Road project. This work accomplished a complete reconstruction of 2,600 feet of road. The project included the replacement of base and sub-base materials, placement of surface and sub-surface drainage, addition of a bike lane and the realignment of the Cross Farm curve. The crew did a great job on this project. Later in the season, Chase Ave. and Greenwood Ave. were reclaimed and paved through a cooperative project with the Conway Village Fire District. Other roads which were resurfaced include Westwind, Wedgewood and a portion of Stark. The extent of paving has been limited for the last two seasons. I am concerned that the current appropriations are insufficient to maintain our roadways in their present condition. The annual average appropriation for the five year period from 1986 to 1990 was \$118,800. The annual average appropriation for the last five years was \$86,000. The University of New Hampshire's Road surface management program was implemented this summer to assist us in developing a maintenance plan and cost estimate. The results were an estimated average annual expenditure of \$147,000 for the next five year period.

This was the second year for the Police Cruiser maintenance program which was started in 1993. The actual expenditures for cruiser maintenance are as follows: \$16,851 in '92; \$12,280 in '93 and \$8,428 in '94. Congratulations to the Town's mechanics who were responsible for implementing this program. The Town and the school district have been discussing a similar arrangement for the maintenance of buses. This year's budget shows a line item for bus maintenance. These expenses will be offset by revenue collected from the school department.

Our municipal buildings received some attention this year. The Gymnasium roof at the recreation center and the roof at the Town Garage were replaced. Both roofs had been leaking for several seasons and the patching effort was no longer effective. ADA access ramps and rest rooms were added to the recreation building and the town hall. We would like to thank Mr. Scott VanDyne and the members of the Home Builders Association who volunteered their time to design and build the roof on the ADA access ramp at the town hall. Other projects included expansion of the town hall parking lot, repairs to the Davis Park tennis courts and the addition of emergency lighting at the Conway Library.

In the Engineering "department" our time was spent on various projects. By demonstrating the existence of additional capacity at the Conway Village Sewerage Treatment Plant, the Department of Environmental Services granted us permission to increase the volume of leachate delivered to this facility. This measure reduced the cost of leachate disposal from \$56,649 in '93 to \$46,543 in '94. In addition we continue to work closely with the North Conway Precinct on the design of their sewerage treatment plant. This facility will provide additional leachate disposal as well as townwide septage disposal. Also, the roads condition inventory and database were completed. This information is used with the Roads Surface Management System which was previously mentioned during the explanation of paving activity. Last, but not least was the Mill Street Bridge. We were very fortunate to secure the 80% funding from the State Department of Transportation, and thanks to the work of HEB Inc. and AJ Coleman Inc., this project was completed on time and under budget.

In closing I would like to summarize this year's budget requests by department. Excluding the replacement of Moat Brook Bridge and the school bus maintenance program, the highway department is level funded. The Solid Waste request is 9% below the previous year, the Municipal Building request is 25% below the previous year, and Parks Maintenance is level funded.

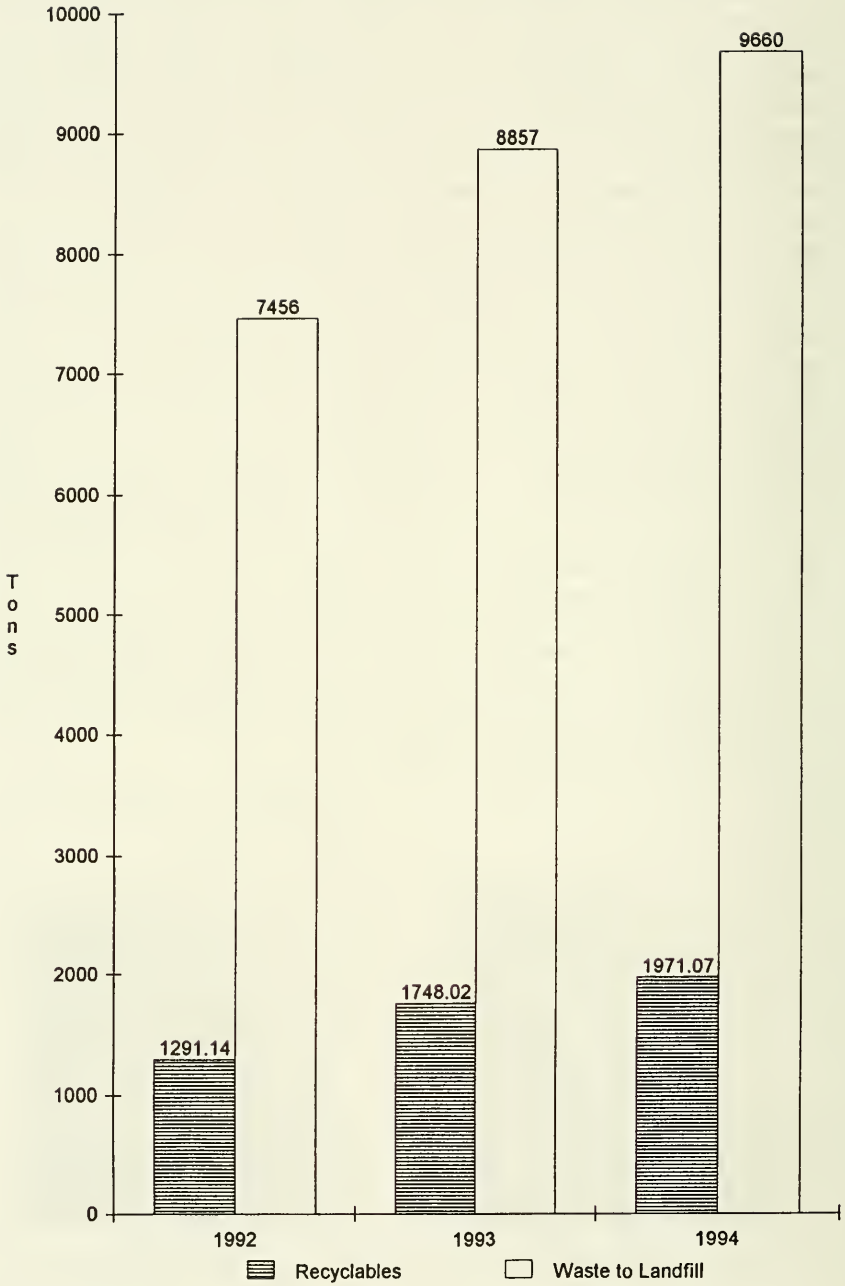

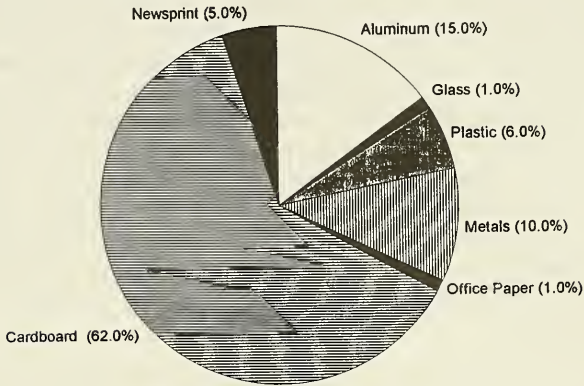

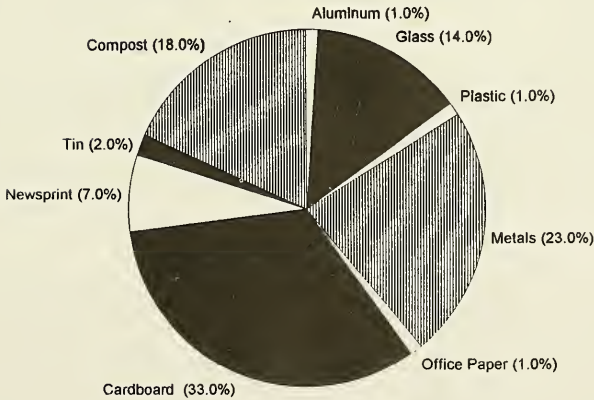


RECYCLING REVENUE PERCENTAGES

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT 1994

The Board has had a busy year with several cases taking more than one hearing night and involving the members in many meetings. The appeals to the Board have involved many sections of the Zoning Ordinance, where in the past most of the appeals centered on the sign section of the Ordinance. The Board has also faced several changes in members as well as the resignation of Recording Secretary, Lianne Boelzner. We accepted with regret the resignation of Susan Kuemmerle and the decision of long term member John Connolly not to accept reappointment. We welcomed Luigi Bartolomeo as a member of the Board and David Burdette, Jon Howe and Lianne Boelzner as alternate members to the Board. We would welcome anyone who is a resident of the Town who is interested in zoning issues to speak to the planning department for consideration for Board participation. And we welcome our new recording secretary, Holly Meserve.

In appeals that the Board heard this year, the following actions were taken. There were three appeals for Variances of which two were not granted and one was withdrawn without prejudice. There were sixteen appeals for Special Exceptions with fourteen granted, and special conditions placed on two. Two appeals were denied. There were eleven appeals from Administrative Decision. Four decisions were upheld, four decisions were overturned, and there were three that had not been decided by the end of the year.

TOWN OF CONWAY, NH CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Public Library can be a town's most valuable asset. The Town of Conway's Public Library is trying to be just that. It is more than just a repository for books. It is more than just a place for readers.

It is a shopping mall for the curious.

It is a cafeteria for the intellectually hungry.

It is a family place for those along.

It is a place where a dropped education can be picked up.

It is a place where one can learn a trade.

It is a place to do research.

It is a place to learn.

It is a land of adventure for a child.

It is a meeting place.

It is a place to display artworks.

It is a place of entertainment.

It is a source of videos, audios, puzzles, puppets & cameras.

It is a place where one can find guidance.

The Librarian, Margaret Marschner, and her staff of 7 full and part time assistants keep the library open 57 hours a week. This year they saw 36,154 persons visit the library to check out 69,355 items. This is a 7% increase over 1993. New borrowers registered total 791. Using the NH State Library's interlibrary loan system, our library was able to borrow 578 books from other libraries to fill requests for library users. The staff answered 9949 reference questions, an increase of 3% over 1993.

Three hundred forty-four (344) individuals received assistance in the History Room researching families, houses and local events. Ann Cullinan retired after 9 years as the History Room librarian. David Emerson was hired in September as the new History Room librarian. He is available to assist users in the History Room Tuesday 10:30-5:30, Wednesday 5:30-8:30 and Thursday 10:30-5:30.

The Literacy Center, coordinated by Larry Ross, has also seen a dramatic increase in use. It is providing a valuable service to those whose education has been interrupted. The use of the Center by volunteer tutors and their teachers (the Carroll County Adult Tutorial Program) has increased at a rapid rate. The Center is also used as a distribution point for GED materials and as a GED pre-testing facility. The Center works with the local GED graduation program, and monitors the database for tutors and adult students in the county. It is THE ONLY resource center in the county for GED candidates and their tutors. The Literacy Center has written a series of original tutor-directed exercises for com-

puter literacy in the areas of database, spreadsheets, and word processing. It has instituted a resume-writing program. It has started a series of English-As-A-Second-Language exercises. It assists in tutor-training workshops with the Carroll County Tutorial Program.

“Go Undercover With Books”, the library’s record-breaking summer reading program for children saw a participation of 216 children. Conway Elementary School and the NH State Library lent more than 130 books to supplement our own collection for the summer. Support for the program was received from many local businesses and a grant from NH State Library’s program “Kid’s, Books and the Arts”.

The Conway Public Library applied for and received a Library Service and Construction Act Title II technology enhancement grant with matching funds from Kennett High School and the CPL to interconnect with fiber optics the electronic reference resources and library catalogs of both libraries. This allows both libraries to share resources, maximize the effective use of the materials and of Conway tax dollars. This grant allowed the Conway Public Library to upgrade its network software and hardware. Conway is the first town in NH to connect school and public libraries using fiber optic technology. We can now offer a magazine index, a newspaper index, telephone books, street maps, an index to books in print and an encyclopedia on CD ROM.

The Conway Public Library sponsored 34 programs for adults and 84 programs for children. Among these programs were story hours for children, discussion groups for adults, and lectures. 58 programs, sponsored by other organizations, were held in the meeting room. The meeting room was also used to present monthly art displays by local artists.

The Conway Village Fire District provided a new residential water service for the library from the new line on Greenwood Avenue. This will put an end to some very bad water the library was receiving after a water main broke on Main Street, the previous source of library water.

The library seems to always be faced with the need for emergency repairs. The building, unfortunately is showing its 95 years of age. In 1994, the roof and chimney were repaired. Repairs are still needed to the sewer system.

Volunteers are an important part of any library system. Volunteers donated 220 hours of service to the Conway Public Library. The Conway Womens Club decorated the library for the holidays.

Library assistant Kate Cranage, children’s librarian Olga Morrill and librarian Margaret Marschner completed “Effective Reference Performance” training.

Because of its popularity and acknowledged value to the community, the

Conway Public Library is bursting at its seams. The Trustees have been struggling to find a solution or solutions to correct the inadequacies of the present facility. In 1994 we undertook the design of an addition and submitted it to the voters at Town Meeting. The vote failed to get the 2/3 vote necessary for a bond issue.

We considered re-submitting the same plan this year. We weighed the merits of submitting another plan, using the Smith property next door. We investigated the possibility of buying land in the village and moving the children's library to a new location. We thought we might ask only for a capital reserve fund. Finally, we opted to do nothing. The Smith property was deemed too expensive and not large enough, even after removing the house. The house itself could not be made to serve. Our purchase offer on Stone's Corner was rejected. Patrons didn't want to see the children's library separated from the main library.

Donations were received in memory of Persis Berry, Madeline Cass, Olive Ball, Blanch Ostroski and Norman "Bud" Blake. Donations were also received from White Birch Quilters, Stark Trek and the American Legion Auxiliary. The Literacy Center received a donation from North Conway Rotary Club.

So here we are - with a 95 year old building in need of repair and retrofitting to meet government mandated ADA requirements. In order to make-do, we will have to re-arrange, repair, update and adapt in whatever way we can. The public meeting room will probably become the new children's room. The present children's room will probably become the new Literacy Center. The present Literacy Center will revert to the lunch room for staff and storage that it used to be. New shelving, fixtures and furniture will need to be purchased. Parking will have to be increased.

The Trustees of the Conway Public Library want to provide the Town of Conway with a facility which will be viable well into the next century. In order to do that, we need the financial support of the community AND the involvement of its citizens.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1994

The Conway Conservation Commission is responsible for the oversight of actions affecting the Town of Conway's natural resources and is, along with the Board of Selectmen, custodian of the Town's public lands. This past year, the seven members of the Commission worked on a diversity of projects. The final draft of the text of the Natural Resource Inventory; and evaluating the environmental impacts of the proposed Bypass routes were the two major projects of the year. The Commission is very grateful to the many town officials and staff members; USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service; Peter Benson, The Nature Conservancy Green Hills Preserve Manager; in addition to the many townspeople who helped us with the following projects:

Natural Resource Inventory: The final draft of the text of the Natural Inventory Report for Conway's new Master Plan is being edited by the commissioners to detail the Town's natural resources. The text will correspond to a series of maps with overlays produced in 1992. With the assistance of the Town Planner, John Krebs, the Commission will work on completing the goals and objectives for the inventory.

Bypass Project: The Conservation Commission was asked to research and evaluate the impacts to the environment and the Town lands by the various bypass options. Countless hours were spent meeting with the federal and state project engineers and consultants in discussion and in on-site evaluations. Supported by the federal and state environmental agencies; and by national conservation societies and consultants; and after extensive research, the Conway Conservation Commission is opposed to an Eastern bypass and specifically, Option 9A. The seven member commission is outraged the the Department of Transportation is taking Town of Conway Conservation Lands and impacting unique, irreplaceable, valuable wetlands. The effect of an Eastern bypass on the Puddin' Pond tract and Whitaker Woods is extremely detrimental. We are opposed to the concept of a highway through these public holdings. In addition we are opposed to any destruction of neighborhoods that will drastically change the unique character and atmosphere of our community. We feel that significant changes should be made to improve the traffic situation in the Conway area without detrimentally impacting and/or destroying the remaining natural resources, green spaces, agricultural lands and neighborhoods of the area. We will continue to encourage mass transportation; alternative route information; modest improvements to local road infrastructure; multi-use trails systems; etc. The Commission has been working with the Town Planner, Parks and Recreation Department and the Nature Conservancy to promote an integrated trail network. We are also represented on the NH Scenic Byways committee.

Given our stated position above, the Commission must work through the bureaucratic process of the Environmental Impact Study supporting the Selectmen with recommendations for protecting and preserving Conway's natural resources, Replacement lands; wetland mitigation; and project design review continue to involve many hours researching environmentally sound decisions for Conway's future.

Recycling: The Commission continues to work closely with the Lower Mt. Washington Valley Solid Waste District to promote and expand the recycling program in Conway. Biology students at Kennett High School have instituted another new community recycling service. Plastic beverage six-pack rings can be brought to the Kennett cafeteria, disposed of in the ring-labeled blue recycling boxes to be shipped, free of charge, to ITW Hi-Cone for reuse in the manufacture of new rings. This action will also remove the rings from the environment where they dangerously entangle wildlife, causing suffering and often death to animals. Office paper is being recycled at Kennett Junior and Senior High Schools. We encourage all businesses to participate by bringing their office paper to the town transfer station. Conway's recycling program continues to grow thanks to the efforts and support of the community.

Town Properties: Each season, the commissioners make site visits to the town conservation properties to assess and plan for future management, educational and recreational projects. The following outlines some of the activities that have taken place on town properties this past year.

- **Whitaker Woods:** The home of X-C ski training area of Conway's Olympian, Carl Swenson hosted many competitive X-C ski meets this past year, including hosting 550 high school athletes from around the state. Whitaker Woods is also the home of the White Mt. Milers community running program. As a vital link in the multi-use trail network, Conway citizens and visitors alike have enjoyed biking recreationally or Treking for Tots as a community service through Whitaker Woods enabling a 30 mile loop through our valley.

During the fall of 95 and winter of 96, a 30+ acre timber thinning will occur in Whitaker woods with access via the former Bancroft property and over the railroad tracks. This work will be done in accordance with the Forest Management Plan developed five years ago and is an ongoing process. This plan includes complete mapping and recommendations for managing the property for recreation, wildlife and timber stand improvements.

The Kennett High School landscaping class and the ski team provided trail maintenance and improvements to the existing trail network for which the townspeople will be deeply appreciative. The Mt. Washington Valley Ski Touring Association continues to do an outstanding job grooming the cross-country ski trails and thanks also, to the White Mt. Milers for maintaining signage for local runners. The

Commission will continue to monitor the NH Electric Coop power line upgrade; installation of more poles; and the right of way agreement process. Prohibition of hunting will be continued to be enforced due to high frequency of recreational use and proximity to school and population base.

• **Puddin' Pond:** This property is a unique wetland in the state of NH and as such has been utilized by the grades K-12, Girl & Boy Scouts, and The Nature Conservancy as an educational site. The commission has provided interpretive tours for these groups and welcomes inquiries as to our next tour. The trail network and tree swallow boxes are maintained by the Kennett High School students. Parking is now available at the Thompson Road entrance to the trail network. Working in conjunction with The Nature Conservancy's Green Hills Preserve Manager, Peter Benson, an informational kiosk, new signage and a formal map depicting the integrated trail network were dedicated in the spring in a joint ceremony including the Commission, Nature Conservancy and KHS students who have assisted in this project. The commission's long range goal is to create a Wetland Interpretive Trail in a multi-disciplinary environmental education unit by KHS students. Please contact the Commission for a copy of the map. An informational kiosk was also placed on town land on the Black Cap Mountain Trail, and the Peaked Mountain Trail to provide for a town wide integrated multi-use, non-motorized trail network to Puddin' Pond.

Puddin' Pond has been the site of several scientific investigations over the past year. State archeologists have reported finding significant artifacts which are being cataloged and will be returned to the Town at the request of the Commission. Several inventories including air quality, white pine, and wetland assessments have been conducted under the auspices of the Commission. Kennett High School/Tin Mountain's Forests of the Future program is conducting a year long research project on the property regarding timber management and baseline biogeographical studies. Several sightings of bear and fishers have been documented. These professional studies will be formally presented at the Conservation Commission meetings in the spring.

• **Walker Pond:** This property has seen increasing use by the Pine Tree School students and teachers for environmental education. The fifth grade students have improved the trails. Tin Mountain utilized this historical site for an archeological field trip with Ed McKenzie of the Conway Historical Society in October. This property, located on Mill Street, has a self-guiding interpretive trail on the natural history of the land and the background of the mills on Walker Pond (now called Conway Lake). Due to the continued theft of the guidebooks from the storage box, the guides are now available at Town Hall.

• **Shedd Woods:** This property was surveyed because of encroachment

and the abutters notified of infractions. KHS Biology students will be monitoring the road salt runoff from the highway snow dump adjacent to the Saco River to maintain water quality.

- **Hubbard Davis:** Work was begun on deed clarification and the boundaries are being resurveyed prior to a forest management plan being developed. The brush work has been completed.
- **Common Lands:** The resurveying of common lands is in progress.

NH Wetlands Board Permits: The Commission reviewed NH Wetland Board applications and made site visitations to aid in making determinations of impact.

Conservation Education: The Commission sponsors education workshops on a variety of environmental topics for selectmen, planning board members, educators, and interested members of the public. Karen Franke conducted an energy audit of Kennett High School with the Physical Science students in an effective effort to reduce expenditures. Several members of the commission attended workshops related to conservation topics. We welcome specific topic requests.

In the coming year, the Conservation Commission will continue to work on projects promoting the conservation, protection, and enjoyment of our town's natural resources. We welcome your ideas and participation at our meetings held on the second Tuesday of the month at the North Conway Fire Station.

REPORT OF TOWN OF CONWAY RECREATION CENTER

The Conway Recreation Department's office and main facility has been located at the Old Pine Tree School in Center Conway since 1992. It is now called the Conway Community Building. There is a meeting room which is available to municipal agencies, non sectarian and non profit groups for their meetings and programs. Our multi-purpose gymnasium is used year round for the various recreation programs that we offer. The outdoor facilities include a playground and a multi-purpose field that is used for T-ball, softball, Little League, Lacrosse, flag football, special events such as our Easter Egg Hunt, Turkey Trot Race, and other recreation programs.

A new adult floor hockey program was introduced this past winter and a field hockey program was introduced this fall for grades four, five and six.

The other recreation areas that are managed by our department are Conway Lake Beach, Conway Skating Rink, Davis Park, Smith Eastman Recreation Area, First River Bridge, Conway Recreation Pathway, Hussey Park, Schouler Park and the Nasby King Ball Field.

The Nasby King Ball Field is a Recreation Department lease facility that is heavily used by the Little League teams, Conway Recreation Department's Junior Babe Ruth Teams, Men's and Women's Softball Teams. This past year two new dug-outs were constructed with the generous support of the following volunteers and contributors: Sweeney Foundation/Sweeney Family; Soroka Builders, Kennett Corp., Keith Hilton, Chip Kennett, Motion Dynamics, North Conway Rotary Club, Conway American Legion Post #46, Varsity Beverage, Chick Lumber, Town & Country Agway, Frechette Tire Co., Person's Concrete, F & S Sports, Profile Motors, Dr. Dennis Hiller, Abbott's Ice Cream, Inc., Pike, Conway Dahl Insurance, Porter Office Machine, Coleman Concrete, Eileen & Jim Koehane, Mt. Washington Valley Women's Softball League, Eastern Slope Emblem Club #330, Pepsi Softball Team, Saco Valley Softball League and Friends of the Conway Recreation Department. Without this community support projects like this would not be possible.

I would also like to thank all the various coaches and other volunteers that have contributed their time and commitment to the programs offered by the Recreation Department.

- 1) Served on the mitigation committee to substitute land taken by 9A bypass involving Whitaker Woods.
- 2) Offered to work with Saco Valley Softball League regarding improving lighting at Schouler Park in North Conway.
- 3) Requested to look at three parcels of land as a gift for possible recreation use - none of which we found suitable.
- 4) Additional trail signs for the Redstone Trail were purchased and placed on the trail.
- 5) Involved with the interconnecting business pathway grant in North Conway.
- 6) Under study is the recreation fee charged to the Towns of Albany and Eaton.
- 7) Budgets of both the Town of Conway Recreation Department and the North Conway Community Center were reviewed and supported.

The Recreation Advisory Committee is responsible to the Selectmen and its members are appointed by the Selectmen. The Committee is always open to new ideas and suggestions for improvement in meeting the recreational needs of the Town of Conway.

NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER 1994 ANNUAL REPORT

There always appears to be highs and lows of programs during the calendar year. 1994 in the Community Center was no exception.

In 1993 we received a generous contribution from Mr. Charles Sprague of Conway. He wanted to give money to the Community Center to enhance the recreational opportunities for the children. Funds were to be used for programs only. In the Spring of 1994 the Community Center purchased a baseball batting cage and pitching machine that was used by Little League, Babe Ruth League and Senior Babe Ruth baseball players. This has proven to be a well used piece of equipment that we could not afford to own unless Mr. Sprague made the funds available.

In the early part of last year we were able to get into our new storage building. This building has allowed us to keep all of our fund raising inventory on our own property. In past years we had donated space in Conway and North Conway that at times made our job a little harder and more time consuming.

Our low point this year had to be the lawsuit which was filed against us by a man who was injured in a Mud Bowl event in 1991. He dived into the mud in the opening ceremony and is now paralyzed because of a neck injury. The case is going to court in September of this year. We hope the case will be resolved satisfactorily to all involved parties.

In closing, even though we had highs and lows this past year our programs continued on with good participation from both young and old.

I will take this opportunity to say thank you to all the volunteers that work with us each year. Without you many of our programs would not be possible.
