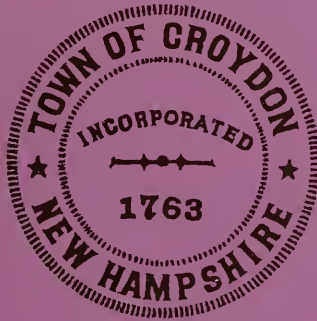

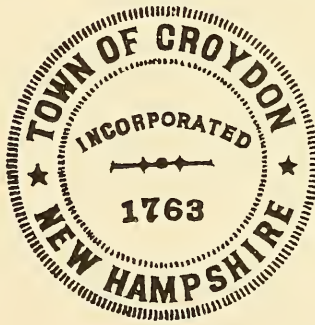

**TOWN OF CROYDON
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 13th of March next at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon), to act upon Article One; and to meet at said Town Hall on Saturday the 17th of March next at 1:00 o'clock to act upon the remaining warrant Articles:

ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Moderator for two years, one Treasurer for three years, two Auditors for one year, one Trustee of Trust Fund for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Supervisor of Checklist for six years, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for transaction of Town's business for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176,100 (one hundred seventy-six thousand one hundred dollars) for general town operations.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of Taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 (four thousand dollars) for the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a lease agreement for the purpose of leasing a backhoe/loader for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,775 (eight thousand seven hundred seventy-five dollars) for that purpose.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 (ten thousand dollars) for the purpose of paying toward the New Highway Garage Note.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 (ten thousand dollars) for the Capital Reserve Fund for New Equipment.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 (three hundred dollars) for the support of the Newport Senior Citizens, Inc.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the County Coach.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of an official outside Town Audit.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to approve that a user fee system be utilized at the Town Dump, and authorize the Board of Selectmen to set the fee schedule and the date of implementation.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will be in favor of increasing the fee for a Building Permit.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to increase the fee for a cemetery lot to the amount of \$100 (one hundred dollars) per lot, said increase to become effective June 30, 1990.

ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to improve that portion of Old Route 10 so-called, beginning at Route 10 and continuing to the Grantham Town Line, and to raise and appropriate any amount of monies for said purpose.

ART. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000. and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield, Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING OFFICIAL

For the first time in my seven year tenure as Croydon's Building Official there has been a drop in the number of building permits issued from the previous year. The 1989 permits totaled 33, down from a peak of 43 in 1988. This decrease was hardly unexpected since many aspects of the nation's economy have been experiencing a "recession" for some time now. The construction industry seems to have been hit harder than most.

Permits given last year for the construction of new homes dwindled by only one from 1988, going from 11 to 10. The majority of these permits were issued during the first half of the year. There have been no new home permits awarded for the past six months.

I also issued more than one permit for the following categories: garages, 5; storage structures, 5; open decks, 3; and new roofs (that is, rafters, sheathing, and shingles complete), 2. I made out one permit for each of the following projects: installation of mobile home; house addition; gazebo; chicken coup; transforming a garage to a residence; moving an existing home to a new foundation; and remodeling a second floor into an apartment. Finally, a permit was given to YMCA Camp Coniston for the construction of an open pavillion, bathroom and storage complex honoring its 25th anniversary of sponsoring the coed camp.

A zoning ordinance was passed and subsequently instituted by townspeople at a special meeting last summer. The ordinance is more general than restrictively specific in nature. In my opinion its passage was a positive move, and the document should serve as an adequate blueprint to guide the town's future growth.

Speaking of what's ahead, your Selectpersons may be suggesting soon that changes be made in the way building permits are handled and how much they cost. Do we need or want some sort of adherence to a local building code? Would this cost more to implement and maintain than it's worth? If you have an opinion or feeling which would improve the present setup, please contact any Selectperson, Planning Board member, or me. Your ideas are needed.

Two annual reminders: First, State of N.H. statutes require an approved septic system plan before a new home can be built or a mobile home installed. I can't issue a permit without the approval document. Second, each level of a new residence must have an electrically wired-in smoke detector installed at the time of construction.

Newport Ambulance wishes to thank the citizens of Croydon for their support in 1989. We also wish to express our appreciation to the Croydon Police and Fire Departments for their highly professional assistance.

In 1989, Newport Ambulance responded to 20 emergency calls for service in the Town of Croydon.

Croydon's 1989 call volume is down 35% from the 30 responses in 1988. Overall, Newport Ambulance showed an 18% increase in response volume, from 743 calls in 1988 to 879 calls in 1989.

The members of the Newport Ambulance remind you that CPR saves lives, but time is the key factor. We urge everyone in the community to enroll in a CPR program. A few hours, once a year, can help save a life.

SCHOOL WARRANT**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the School District, in the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 17th day of March, 1990, at 10:00 a.m. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant not covering the election of District Officers. Said Officers will be acted upon at Town Meeting on the 13th day of March, 1990 in said Town Hall at 11:00 a.m. with voting by official ballot and checklists, and the polls will remain open for this purpose from 11:00 a.m. until at least 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Auditor and Treasurer for the ensuing year; and to choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 2. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from State sources together with income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the revenue and appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the amount of any unencumbered balance not to exceed \$5,000, accruing in the 1989-90 budget as of June 30, 1990 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for school transportation needs.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the amount of any unencumbered balance, after the appropriation in the preceding article, not to exceed \$5,000, accruing in the 1989-90 budget as of June 30, 1990, to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund-Special Education, to meet the expenses of educating handicapped children.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action of the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year, as outlined under RSA 198:20-b, provided that (1) such money is used for legal purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, (2) the School Board holds a public hearing on the expenditure of such money before it is expended, and (3) the expenditure of such money does not require the expenditure of other School District funds.

ARTICLE 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of the Croydon School District:

The Croydon Village School was fortunate to be the recipient of \$1,500 from Mr. William Ruger, who donated the money for the purchase of library books. His donation provided the school librarian with the opportunity to increase the collection of library materials -- books, magazines, maps and audio-visual materials -- to such a level that we now meet the Department of Education's minimum standards for our school. The Croydon School Board, parents and students, I know, join me in thanking Mr. Ruger for his generous gift and to Mrs. Becky Newcomb and Mrs. Jean Benoit, whose efforts brought the Croydon Village School to Mr. Ruger's attention.

We were sorry to see Mrs. Annette Dodge leave her position as teaching assistant after two years, but have been fortunate to have Mrs. Susan Spreadbury of Newport take her place.

Seven third graders who went on to fourth grade were replaced by ten first graders in September. Several more students moved to Croydon during the year and by January we had twenty-six students in grades one, two and three at the Village School.

The school continues to provide Croydon students an opportunity to learn to read, write, and do arithmetic under the caring tutelage of Mr. Charles Brettell.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Croydon School District works to provide an appropriate special education program to every student between the ages of 3 and 21 who resides in the district and needs such services. When a student is referred as a possible candidate for special education services, our local team of regular and special educators decides if further information is required, and, if necessary, carries out an evaluation plan. If a student is found eligible for special services, then an Individual Educational Plan is developed in cooperation with parents and the school team. Later, the same people are involved in deciding where the educational program can best be carried out.

Our first priority is to try to educate every student within our neighborhood schools whenever possible. We attempt to provide support to regular class teachers so that educationally handicapped students can be mainstreamed to the greatest extent. Most schools in School Administrative Unit (SAU) #43 have resource rooms that assist students in their difficult subject areas. Some schools have special "self-contained" programs working with students who require small classes, special groupings, or special curriculums. Some students may be mainstreamed in regular classes with the help of an individual aide. Other students may have to be enrolled in out-of-district programs operated by the SAU, other school districts, or private providers.

Special Education is a serious decision to make about a young person. We want to make sure that only students who really require such services get such services. We also want to be sure that students who get special education services receive them in the most natural, least restrictive, and neighborhood setting it is possible to provide. Most of the time, we reach this goal in a reasonable manner. Sometimes the unique needs of the student require that placements out of neighborhood be found. For these students, our goal is to bring them back to local programs as soon as possible.

In the future, we will see more locally situated programs for students with special educational needs. Regular class teachers will become more involved in learning how to deliver educational services to special needs youngsters right in our classrooms.

The success of our special education programs depends upon the ability of special and regular class teachers, parents, and special service providers to work together to develop good educational plans and to carry them out. For the most part, we see this happening in the Croydon School District. We are working hard to meet the federal mandate of a free and appropriate public education for every educationally handicapped student!
