#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Fremont, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To consider the report of the Budget Committee and to raise such sums of money under the proposed budget as the Town deems necessary.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 toward the cost of providing housing for the tank truck purchased in 1958.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from surplus remaining at the cose of the 1958 fiscal year the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund established at Town Meeting, March 13, 1956, under provision of Chapter 34 RSA for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing Town highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Model T Ford Chemical Pumper for the sum of \$500.00 to Gas Light Village, Inc., Lake George, N. Y.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at private sale or public auction property acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest under the will of the late Daniel E. Burleigh giving \$1,000.00 to the Town for the purpose of erecting a wall around Leavitt Cemetery in accordance with the terms of said will, to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over to the Selectmen said bequest and any interest accumulated thereon, and to authorize the Selectmen to take whatever steps are necessary in order to carry out the intent of said Daniel E. Burleigh and give effect to said bequest.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Memorial to the late Bertha Stevenson, the tract of land on which is situated the Fremont Public Library, the gift of this land to be made by the heirs of the late Bertha Steven-

son.

10. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relating to playing Beano be adopted in this Town?"

11. To transact any other business that may be deem-

ed necessary.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Your Planning Board has devoted considerable time to studying the resources and long term trends of your community and the area in order that intelligent plans can be developed to insure orderly growth and best use of these resources. Such planning now can do much to retain the individual character of our community 10 and 15 years from now, to conserve and improve the value of homes, which represent the major portion of individuals' savings, and to keep property taxes at a reasonable and equitable level.

Pursuant to authority granted the Planning Board to regulate the subdivision of land by vote of Town Meeting in 1957 public hearings were held and regulations adopted. These have been printed and are available from members of the Planning Board or the Selectmen.

An Existing Land Use Map of the town has been prepared and will be available for inspection and discussion on Town Meeting day.

During the ensuing year a series of hearings is planned to discuss the preparation of a Zoning Map and Ordinance for possible consideration at Town Meeting in 1960. The members of the Planning Board earnestly request your participation in planning the orderly development of your community.

Our projects for the coming year include the running of another carnival and building an addition to our fire house. We are grateful to Spaulding and Frost Co., for lumber, and to Mr. Chester Kinart for sawing the lumber so very reasonably, and to all who helped stack the boards.

A sad note of this report is the death of two of our members. Forrest Rand and Russell Copp were good members of our department. We will sorely miss them.

#### REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

#### You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for youpersonally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden
   —the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump

statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the school district in consideration of one dollar or other consideration, will vote to deed to the People's Methodist Church of Fremont a right of way together with the rights and privileges of the use of the well located on school property adjacent to property owned by the People's Methodist Church of said Fremont.
- 10. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Many parents have asked how homework fits into the educational picture of Fremont. Although there are many people who denounce all home assignments and will continue to denounce them, home study has had and continues to have a traditional place in our American educational system. Though it may change form from time to time and from generation to generation, it seems likely that some form of home study will be maintained. Most school systems throughout the country continue to give home assignments in one form or another.

When homework is assigned, it is important for the teacher to check upon this work, to see that it is actually accomplished, and to note that something is achieved thereby. Regardless of whether it be a home study assignment or a classroom assignment, the assignment made by the teacher must be called for by him. Little or no desirable learning is achieved when teachers make assignments and then rarely hold students responsible for them.

The amount of time that a child is expected to spend in home study varies greatly in different localities. In Fremont I believe that a maximum should not exceed two hours in the upper grades, and one hour in the intermediate grades. None should be given in the primary grades.

When homework involves writing or study, it is highly important that the child have a definite place to do it. He certainly will not get much accomplished if home assignment must be made in the family living room with other people either televiewing, listening to the radio, or carrying on different types of conversation.

Once the child realized that homework is his own responsibility, it will be wiser for the parents to allow him to arrange the time he wishes to provide for it, and then observe whether he holds to the time agreed upon. If the child learns to budget his time, he will see to it that the home study is not neglected.

When work is assigned to be written it is of the utmost importance that the child do the work himself, rather than copy it after someone else has worked it out for him. When the latter occurs, little, if any real learning takes place. The child only learns to get others to do his work. If the child has difficulty with a certain problem or other point in the assignment, a parent might help him over a difficulty by explaining the matter to him. This is entirely different from copying out answers worked by someone else, without understanding how they were achieved.

Homework can greatly aid in the development of the child's character and personality as well as his academic achievement. Properly assigned and properly fulfilled, home study can build habits of self-reliance and responsibility and, when group assignments are made, of co-operation and working with others. Again, when the nature of the assignment is such as to permit it, a considerable amount of learning in related areas can be achieved.

Our school lunch program under the direction of Mrs. Kimball is one of which we can be proud. Mrs. Kimball is providing well balanced meals for your children. This is evidenced by the large number of children who partake of these meals.

In closing, I thank the children, Principal and teachers for their efforts in making the educational program successful. I also thank the Citizens and School Board for their part in making my task a pleasant one.

#### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent, School Board Members, and Citizens:

The school health program of 1958-59 began with three pre-school clinics at the Town Hall. These were held in conjunction with the State Dept. of Health. Parents of pre-school children were given the opportunity of bringing them for physicals, various shots, and vaccination for small-pox. Attendance was good.

Eye and ear testing are nearly completed. These programs have been greatly facilitated by the up-to-date pieces of apparatus which were recently purchased by the school Union.

Opportunities for informal health teaching were taken advantage of, and home visits were made by the nurse concerning physical defects.

Commendation is due Mrs. Kimball for the fine lunch program which she is carrying on.

Mrs. Davies reserves much credit for her excellent care of the physical plant. We who are interested in the health and well-being of our children are grateful to her for her part in the maintenance of these.

The Salvation Army gave, as it has in several previous years, a contribution to the dental fund. This, with the P.T.A.'s and the state's shares, enabled a fairly good number of children to benefit. The dental program is a very worthwhile one and deserves the support of all who can give.

Parents and teachers as usual have been most cooperative, helping to make Fremont a pleasant place in which to be school nurse-teacher.
