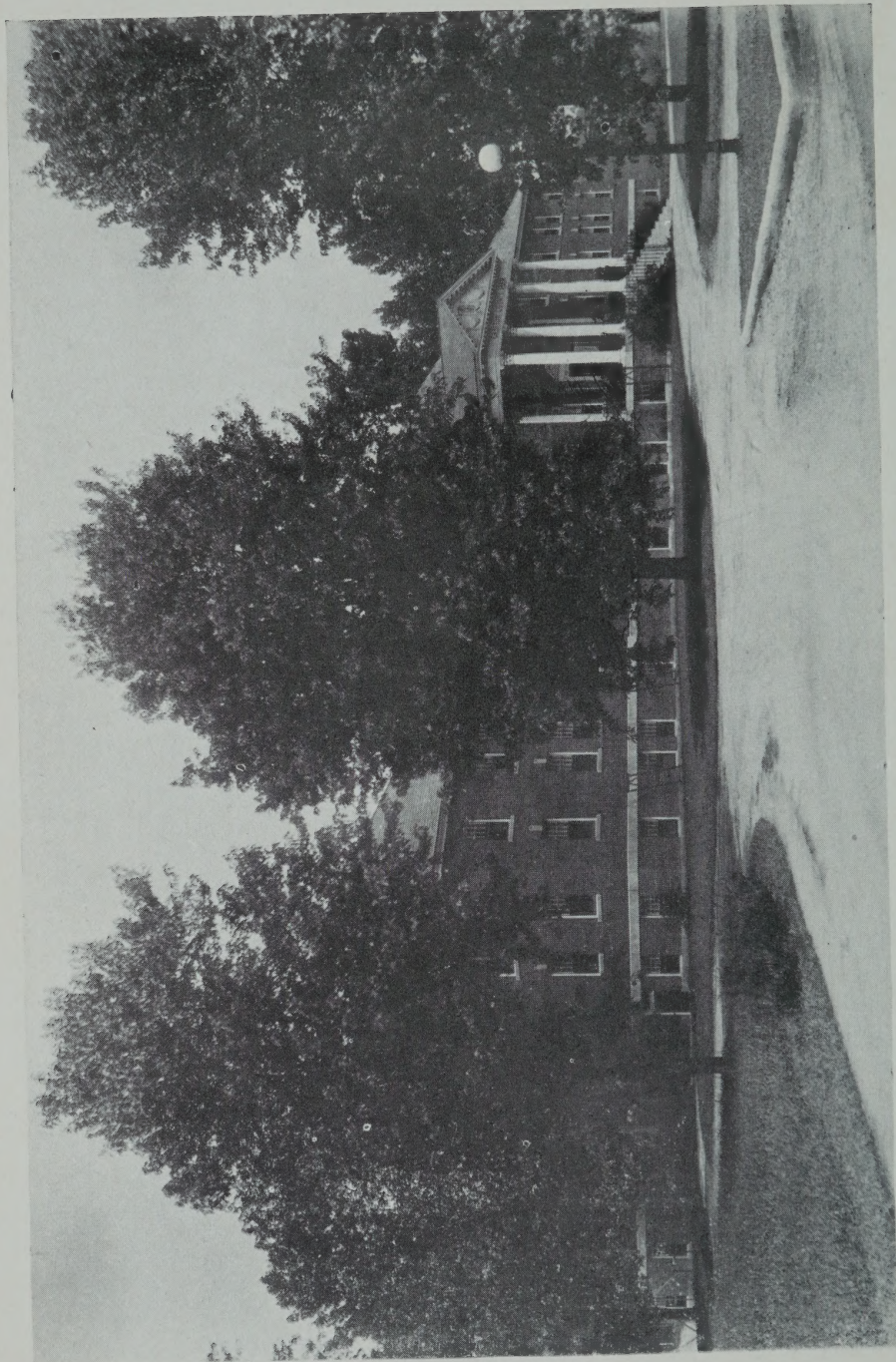

January 11, 1949

The organization meeting of the Grafton County Delegation was held in Room 308, State House, Tuesday, January 11, 1949.

The Clerk called the meeting to order at 12:45 o'clock.

The following members answered roll call:

Wadhams of Alexandria, Brown of Ashland, Chamberlin of Bath, Wheeler of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Eggleston of Canaan, Dunbar of Enfield, Grass of Franconia, Williams of Grafton, Atkins of Hanover, Fuller of Hanover, Holden of Hanover, Chamberlin of Haverhill, Clough of Haverhill, Perry of Haverhill, Sommers of Holderness, Adams, Ashley, Cole, Dwinell and Jones of Lebanon, Collins and Hamilton of Lisbon, Gardner and Kelley of Littleton, Dusik of Lyman, Roberts of Orford, Bell of Plymouth, Barney of Rumney and Anderson of Warren.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted the Clerk cast one vote for Arthur L. Hamilton for Chairman. Mr. Hamilton having received the vote was declared elected and took the chair.

Mr. Kelley nominated Glenn L. Wheeler for Clerk and moved that Mr. Holden cast one vote for her. Motion carried and she was declared elected.

Mr. Kelley nominated Lane Dwinell for Vice-Chairman and moved that the Clerk cast one vote for him. Mr. Dwinell received one vote and was declared elected.

Mr. Jones moved that the Executive Committee be elected instead of appointed by the Chair. Motion carried.

Mr. Kelley nominated Mr. Willey for membership on Executive Committee. Mr. Gardner nominated Mr. Jones. Mr. Holden moved, seconded by Mr. Fuller, that nominations be closed. It was voted that the Clerk cast one vote each for Mr. Willey and Mr. Jones. Mr. Willey and Mr. Jones having received one vote each, were declared elected.

Meeting adjourned at one o'clock.

March 7, 1949

The public hearing on the Budget Estimates as submitted by the County Commissioners was held at the Court House, Plymouth, Monday afternoon, March 7, 1949, at 2 o'clock.

The following members of the delegation answered to roll call:

Wadhams of Alexandria, Brown of Ashland, Whittier of Bethlehem, Wheeler of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Williams of Grafton, Ashley and Cole of Lebanon, Hamilton of Lisbon, Pushee of Lyme, Roberts of Orford, Bell of Plymouth, and Barney of Rumney.

Other people present were George Noyes and Joseph Graham, County Commissioners; Harry S. Huckins, County Treasurer; Joel Barney, President of Grafton County Farm Bureau; Allie Batchelder, Selectman of Ellsworth and Bert Martin, Selectman of Ashland.

The Chairman, Mr. Hamilton, called on Mr. Noyes to present the budget estimates which were discussed in detail with particular attention given to the items dealing with the operation of the farm, poor off the farm and soldiers' aid.

Mr. Barney explained the budget request for county extension service.

Mr. Noyes described in detail the program for insurance of the county farm buildings which is apportioned to twenty-five agencies within the county.

The Chairman, Mr. Hamilton, called the meeting to order.

Other people present were: Graham, Peckett, Noyes, Clara Birch, Mr. Rutherford, Fremont Ritchie, Mr. Bevan, Ext. Serv.

The Chairman read the resignation of Fred Jones as a member of the Executive Committee. On motion of Mr. Gardner, duly seconded, it was voted that the resignation be accepted.

Mr. Kelley moved and Mr. Whittier seconded, that Mr. Sawyer of Woodstock be elected to fill the vacancy on the Executive Committee. Motion carried.

The budget was discussed at length, particularly the items dealing with sheriff and deputies, the board and care of children and county extension services.

Mr. Roberts presented information regarding the sheriff's accounts in other counties in comparison to Grafton County.

It was voted to act on the budget in executive session.

Meeting adjourned at 5:40 p.m.

Grafton County Delegation met in Executive Session in Room 309, State House, Tuesday afternoon, April 19, 1949 at 4:00 o'clock, for action on the budget.

The following members were present: Chairman, Arthur L. Hamilton, Wadhams of Alexandria, Brown of Ashland, Chamberlin of Bath, Whittier of Bethlehem, Wheeler of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Eggleston of Canaan, Dunbar of Enfield, Grass of Franconia, Williams of Grafton, Atkins and Fuller of Hanover, Chamberlin and Clough of Haverhill, Somers of Holderness, Oakes of Landaff, Adams, Ashley, Cole, Jones and Edson of Lebanon, Madden of Lincoln, Gardner and Kelley of Littleton, Orr of Littleton, Dusik of Lyman, Pushee of Lyme, Bell and Loizeau of Plymouth, Barney of Rumney and Sawyer of Woodstock.

On motion of Mr. Jones, duly seconded, it was voted that the items relating to the salaries and expenses of the commissioners, treasurer, auditors, solicitor, medical referees and sheriff be approved as presented.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted that the items relating to the expenses of the Register of Deeds and the Register of Probate be approved as presented.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted to raise \$4,300 for the care and support of the court houses.

On motion of Mr. Grass, duly seconded, it was voted that the items relating to jury payrolls, and state vs. —payrolls be approved as read.

On motion of Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted to appropriate \$1,000 for counsel fees.

On motion of Mr. Clough, duly seconded, it was voted that \$4,000 be appropriated for stenographer.

On motion of Mr. Fuller, duly seconded, it was voted to approve the request for \$9,000 for Clerk of the superior court.

After lengthy discussion on motion made by Mr. Willey, duly seconded, it was voted to raise \$10,000 for the sheriff and deputies.

On motion of Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted to appropriate \$80,000 for the county farm.

On motion of Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted to approve the request for \$18,000 for poor off the farm and \$9,000 for old age assistance.

On motion of Mr. Fuller, duly seconded by Mr. Edson, it was voted to raise \$25,000 for board and care of children.

On motion of Mr. Edson, seconded by Mr. Willey, it was voted that the delegation instruct the commissioners to be more liberal in providing care and clothing for children.

On motion of Mr. Ashley, duly seconded, it was voted that \$1,000 be appropriated for soldiers' aid.

On motion made by Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted to approve the request for \$8,500 for the administration of welfare.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted to raise \$1,500 for interest on temporary loans.

On motion of Mr. Clough, duly seconded, it was voted to raise \$500 for interest on bonds for the year 1949.

On motion of Mr. Oakes, duly seconded, it was voted to pay the \$10,000 bond due in 1949.

On motion of Mr. Grass, duly seconded, it was voted to pay the deficit of \$4,814.17 in 1949.

Mr. Edson moved, and Mr. Willey seconded, that \$13,000 be appropriated for the extension service for 1949 and \$13,000 for 1950, and it was so voted.

After lengthy discussion, on motion of Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted to reconsider the previous vote the vote being 19 for and 6 against reconsideration. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Edson moved, and Mr. Willey seconded, that

the sum of \$12,000 be appropriated for each of the two years with the provision that no additional persons be added to the payroll. Motion carried.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, seconded by Mr. Bell, it was voted that \$2,500 be raised for the retirement system.

On motion of Mr. Whittier, seconded by Mr. Bell, it was voted that \$2,500 be raised for miscellaneous.

It was voted that a meeting of the delegation be held at the county farm on Friday, April 29. *

The Grafton County Delegation held a meeting in Room 100, State House, at 4 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, May 10, 1949, to reconsider the budget.

The following members were present: CHAIRMAN, Arthur L. Hamilton, Brown of Ashland; Chamberlin of Bath; Wheeler of Bristol; Willey of Campton; Eggleston of Canaan; Dunbar of Enfield; Grass of Franconia; Williams of Grafton; Atkins and Fuller of Hanover; Chamberlin, Clough, and Perry of Haverhill; Oakes of Landaff; Adams, Cole, Dwinell and Jones of Lebanon; Collins of Lisbon; Gardner, Kelley and Orr of Littleton; Pushee of Lyme; Roberts of Orford; Bell and Loizeaux of Plymouth; Sawyer of Woodstock.

The Chairman stated that he had appointed William J. Clough, Albert J. Orr, Forrest B. Cole and Theodore Chamberlin to act as a committee to look over the Grafton County Farm equipment and report their findings at this meeting. The report of this committee, read by the clerk, recommends repairs on appliances and the purchase of new equipment at an estimated cost of \$10,050.

* No official business transpired at this meeting.

Mr. Willey moved and Mr. Gardner seconded, that the report be accepted and the sum of \$10,050 be appropriated. Motion carried.

Discussion ensued.

At the request of the Chairman, the Vice-chairman Mr. Dwinell, took the chair. Mr. Hamilton took the floor in protest of too hasty action on this measure.

On motion of Mr. Kelley, duly seconded, it was voted that \$7,500 be appropriated for rebuilding the cottage at the farm and that this appropriation be charged to the 1950 budget.

On motion made by Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted to rescind all previous action taken at this meeting.

During the discussion which followed many things were considered, among them the best time to rebuild the cottage and the feasibility of using the insurance.

Mr. Kelley moved that we raise \$5,550 in 1949 to be used with the \$4,500 insurance proceeds to purchase farm machinery and make necessary repairs in the amount of \$10,050 and in 1950 raise \$7,500, together with the \$4,500 to replace the insurance money to rebuild the cottage. Mr. Willey seconded the motion which was carried by a vote of 14 to 1.

Mr. Noyes and a representative of the New Hampshire Fire Ins. Co., explained the plan of the commissioners to increase the insurance on the farm buildings from the present amount of \$450,000 to \$741,100.

On motion of Mr. Clough, seconded by Mr. Chamberlin, it was voted that the commissioners be instructed to work out a system of fire prevention and educate all employees as to its use.

Mr. Cole moved that the commissioners employ a competent person to go over the county buildings and make them as safe as possible. The motion was seconded by Mr. Clough and carried.

On motion of Mr. Edson, duly seconded, it was voted that the matter of insurance be laid upon the table until next week.

Meeting of GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION held in Room 317, State House, Concord, at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 18, 1949.

Present: Wadhams of Alexandria; Brown of Ashland; Chamberlin of Bath; Whittier of Bethlehem; Wheeler of Bristol; Willey of Campton; Eggleston of Canaan; Dunbar of Enfield; Grass of Franconia; Williams of Grafton; Fuller of Hanover; Chamberlin of Haverhill; Clough of Haverhill; Sommers of Holderness; Oakes of Landaff; Adams of Lebanon; Dwinell, Jones, and Edson of Lebanon; Collins of Lisbon; Hamilton of Lisbon; Gardner, Kelley and Orr of Littleton; Dusik of Lyman; Pushee of Lyme; Bell and Loizeaux of Plymouth.

On motion made by Mr. Willey it was voted that all motions made by members of the County Delegation be submitted in writing.

On motion made by Mr. Dwinell, seconded by Mr. Edson, it was unanimously voted that the Chairman of the Delegation be authorized to arrange for representatives of the management engineering firm of Bigelow, Kent, Willard & Co., to survey all county buildings and make a report as to insurable values thereof, together with recommendations as to amount and type of insurance to be carried; said report to be submitted as soon as possible at a special delegation meeting.

On motion made by Mr. Fuller it was voted that in view of the Dwinell Report action be postponed upon the report of the Insurance Engineer.

Mr. Eggleston presented the following resolution, and moved its adoption;

RESOLVED, That the Commissioners of Grafton County be authorized to borrow a sum of money not to exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) by a note on the credit of the county to replace the house which was burned at the County Farm. Said house to be built in 1949, and said note to be paid in 1950.

Mr. Willey seconded the motion and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion made by Mr. Edson it was voted that the Clerk draft a Resolution expressing our feelings in the death of Mr. Roberts and that all members sign the resolution.

Meeting adjourned at 4:20 p.m.

Tuesday, June 7, 1949, Room 317, State House.

To consider raising the amount of insurance on County properties.

In the absence of the chairman, the Vice-chairman, Mr. Lane Dwinell, called the meeting to order at 4:15 p.m. and appointed Mrs. Edith P. Atkins temporary clerk of the meeting.

Present: at this time 19 out of 37 members, constituting a quorum, as follows: Brown, Chamberlin, Willey, Williams, Atkins, Chamberlin of Haverhill, Clough, Perry, Adams, Cole, Dwinell, Edson, Gardner, Kelley, Orr, Dusik, and Bell. Within a short time the following came in: Wheeler, Dunbar, Grass, Fuller, Holden, Hamilton, and Loizeaux.

The minutes of the last meeting were omitted because of the absence of the Clerk, Mrs. Wheeler.

The Vice-Chairman read a report made by Bigelow, Kent and Willard to the Chairman, Mr. Hamilton, concerning the estimated replacement value of the county properties, and the recommended amount of insurance thereon.

This firm estimated the current cost of replacement of the properties at \$872,500, but considered that there would be a 15-20% reduction of building costs in the near future; they therefore recommend carrying insurance on a total replacement cost of \$600,000 to \$650,000.

Mr. Clough asked for the existing insurance in detail, on a total value of \$450,000. As they were read, Mr. Dwinell marked the figures opposite the current schedule from Bigelow, Kent and Willard, on a total replacement cost of \$872,500.

It was moved by Mr. Willey and seconded by Mr. Kelley, "That the sum of \$1,500.00 for the year 1949 and the sum of \$1,000 for the year 1950 be raised for the

purchase of additional insurance on the county property." This was to meet the recommendation of the engineering firm above.

A previous figure for increased insurance on a first year basis of increase value of \$250,000 at a cost of \$2,500 for the first year and \$1,400 the second year was mentioned. Mr. Clough inquired concerning co-insurance on a basis of \$707,000.

Mr. Edson spoke in favor of Mr. Clough's suggestion, expressed himself as not in favor of full coverage but not opposed to additional coverage.

Discussion by Mr. Clough, Mr. Willey, Mr. Hamilton, Mr. Cole, Mr. Kelley, concerning co-insurance, mutual insurance, and a non-assessable clause.

The acting chairman, Mr. Dwinell, repeated the parliamentary situation for the benefit of late comers.

Question by Mr. Hamilton, would increase of insurance be pro-rated at discretion of insurance agents.

Question by Mr. Edson, concerning complete coverage of some buildings and taking care of others ourselves.

Mr. Kelley recommended proportionate increase of insurance on all buildings with the increased value of building at 75% of replacement value.

Discussion by Mr. Cole and Mr. Clough.

The question was called for.

On a voice vote the ayes had it with no noes, and Mr. Willey's motion was passed.

Other business brought before the meeting.

Mrs. Wheeler questioned licensing the hospital at the County Home, at a cost of \$1,500 for equipment, referring to the report by Mrs. Mary Swoboda with regard to making the hospital eligible for a license. A license as a nursing home would require no new equipment. Mrs. Wheeler stated that Mrs. Swoboda and Dr. Mary Atcheson recommended nursing homes, to care for chronic cases.

Question by Mr. Hamilton and remarks by Mr. Bell, Mr. Edson and Mr. Willey.

Mr. Dwinell read the letter sent from the State Board of Health to our County Commissioners re. licensing the County Farm as a Hospital. They recommend licensing it as a nursing home to avoid the necessity of purchase of much additional equipment.

Question by Mr. Cole and remarks by Mr. Edson,
Mr. Bell and Mr. Clough.

It was moved by Mr. Edson and seconded by Mr.
Cole that the matter be laid upon the table.

Remarks by Mr. Cole, Mr. Clough and Mr. Bell.

There being no further business to bring before the
meeting it was moved and seconded to adjourn, at 5:00
p.m.

REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Grafton County herewith present the annual report of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditors, Superintendent of County Farm, Jailer, Clerk of Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Chaplain, Physician and County Extension Service.

COUNTY FARM

There has been a slight increase in our per capita cost. However, we believe these costs of operating have reached their peak. We have had to continue our program of replacements of tools and equipment. The Delegation appointed a special committee to study our needs. Their investigation and report resulted in the Delegation voting an additional appropriation of \$10,050.00 for the purchase of new equipment. Following is a list of equipment, both Farm and Almshouse, that was purchased with funds raised under this vote.

These purchases were all very much needed and now contribute immensely to the efficiency of the plant. If normal repairs and replacements are made each year in the future, the County Farm should never have to have a large appropriation again for items of this nature.

The general condition of the Farm and buildings is good. The herd of Holstein cattle has received awards at three Fairs this year and the County continually receives compliments on the fine condition of this herd.

FINANCES

The financial condition of the County is sound. The 1950 budget carries an item to pay for the new duplex house, which is being constructed at a cost of approximately \$12,000.00. With the raising of this money,

all costs for Grafton County buildings will be fully paid; the final bond for the Almshouse having been paid this year.

The Commissioners wish again to express their appreciation to the Delegation, the various county and town officials and the State Welfare Department for their friendly assistance in carrying out the work of the County.

Again, the Commissioners extend an invitation to the people of Grafton County to visit and inspect the Home. Mr. and Mrs. Birch and the personnel of the Institution are always happy to show visitors every attention.

At present there are twenty employees at the farm. Changes made during the year brought us William Keyes, Sr. and Milo Eastman as turnkeys, Max Robinson as cook for the employees, and Louise Giles, R.N. as assistant in the Hospital.

The crops, while not as large as last year, were sufficient for the use of the institution. The forage crops were exceptionally good. Grass silage having been successfully used last year, the amount was increased to 140 ton this year. The new farm machinery was certainly appreciated and much used.

Milk production has increased. Cattle were shown at Fairs in North Haverhill, Canaan and Plymouth; bringing in ribbons from all, and cash prizes from Canaan and Plymouth.

A few repairs were made to the buildings. The operating room and corridors of the Hospital were re-tinted, and the white trim of the main house was painted.

The chapel services have been well attended. Rev.

Ivan Nickerson of the North Haverhill Community Methodist Church has held bi-monthly services. Rev. Robert Porter of St. Luke's Episcopal Church of Woodsville has given freely of his time and held frequent services in the chapel. Father Donnelly of St. Joseph's Catholic Church has been a frequent visitor in the hospital.

The social needs of the Institution have been well cared for. In April, a group from the Lyme Center Church presented a program which was much enjoyed. There have been many movies shown by Rev. Hugo Porter and the Orford Community Council and Lawrence Smith and the North Haverhill Fire Department.

The Christmas party was a great success. Eugene Burt acted as Santa and distributed gifts provided by the Commissioners, employees and the following friends: the Lebanon Women's Christian Temperance Union, Mrs. Mildred Lakeway and pupils of the Kilburn School of Littleton, Mrs. Weed and the 4-H group of Woodsville, the Littleton Garden Club, Miss Una Rice and the University Extension groups of Littleton, Salmon Hole, Center Haverhill, and Quincy, Mr. and Mrs. J. MacLauchlan of Hamden, Conn., the Catholic Daughters and the American Legion of Woodsville. To these, to the First National Warehouse of North Haverhill and to all who during the year sent us books, magazines, flowers or other gifts, we extend our sincere thanks.

I wish to add my sincere appreciation to the County Commissioners for their co-operation and counsel in all matters pertaining to the best interest of the County Home, to Mrs. Madeline Kirk for her willingness to help at all times, to Dr. Miller and the entire staff for their loyalty through the year.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I herewith submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1949.

During the past year, worship services were conducted twice monthly. These meetings were reasonably well attended, with many of the women noticeably faithful. An upsurge in male participation was evident when the sunshine and warm weather failed to be serious competitors.

The attention and the enthusiasm of the congregation were both commendable. Receiving Bibles from the Gideon society enabled many worshippers to follow the Scripture reading, as well as stimulating a new interest in the Bible for them. It was my intention, as the year progressed, to bring the people into closer association with the service by asking questions which required "obvious" answers.

The inmates received a picture of Christ, in addition to religious bookmarks for their Bibles.

On occasion, members of the Choir of the North Haverhill Methodist church sang at the service. At other times, a group of women from the farm comprised a hymn singing, choir. Mrs. Little assisted at the piano.

Visiting the hospital patients was, if not depressing, a rather pitiful experience. They all welcomed any word of hope or consolation.

Several times, I visited the Jail. There, I distributed little religious items and also, a supply of magazines.

It was my impression that the staff was ably fulfilling its duties and obligations to the men and women under its care. A fine spirit prevailed.

I do believe that both religious and civic organizations should be made aware of their responsibility to those confined to the County Farm, and demonstrate their awareness by acts and help, big or little. Appreciation, even for the slightest consideration, is not lacking at the Grafton County Farm.

It is well to state at the outset that this county institution is of four departments: the almshouse; the hospital; the house of correction and jail and the farm of 760 acres; all of which are under the management of the county commissioners and the direct supervision of Superintendent and Mrs. Birch. It has been my duty and privilege to prescribe for illness in most of these departments.

The hospital continues to serve the entire county of Grafton in caring for many of its indigent patients, a considerable number of them having been sent in from homes or other hospitals for terminal care.

Most of the patients have been well advanced in years and the kind care, which they have received is worthy of commendation; many of them, because of physical or mental incapacity, have required a great deal of individual attention.

Visitors have expressed their impressions as they have gone about the institution and it is a satisfaction to the management that they have often spoken of the neatness and good housekeeping which was manifest in the hospital and almshouse.

Old people require warm rooms and those in this building are always comfortable. The ventilation seems to be perfect, as you will notice in going about; something that is far too uncommon in large buildings where many people are housed. The sanitation is modern and those who make their home here seem to take pleasure in keeping both themselves and the building clean.

The policy of the commissioners in allowing any surgeon to operate on a patient that he refers to the hospital is being continued with satisfaction to all concerned. The hospital has but one aim—to serve.

Emergency cases are always admitted, but before they are sent in, one of the commissioners should be consulted.

I would gratefully acknowledge the valuable coun-

cil of the commissioners, the cooperation of the management, and the assistance of all those connected with the institution.

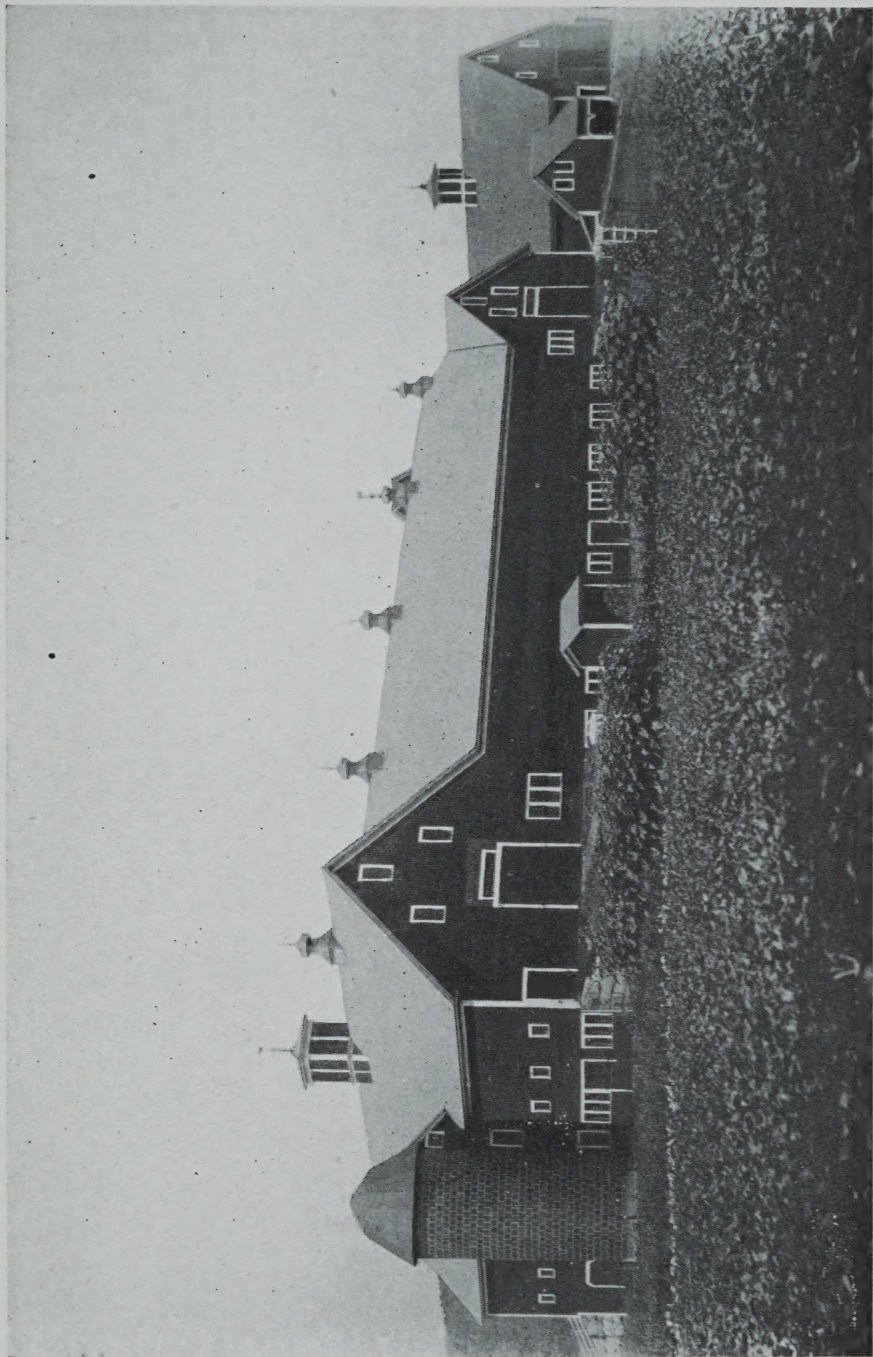
