WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITIES

The Hillsborough Wastewater Treatment Facilities are a culmination of over 21 years of wastewater facilities planning. The project was initiated to reduce pollution in the Contoocook River by eliminating raw sewage discharges from the existing sewer system. The obstacles and delays that the project encountered were substantial, but through the efforts of many dedicated individuals in the Town of Hillsborough, the project reached a successful conclusion.

Designed by SEA Consultants, Inc. of Cambridge, MA and constructed by Daniel D'Onfro's Sons, Inc. of Leominster, MA the treatment facility began accepting wastewater on September 7, 1986 and by the spring of 1987, the raw sewage discharges to the Contoocook River were finally eliminated.

Prior to this project, over 65 percent of the town was served by an older sewer system which discharged untreated wastewater to the Contoocook River through five outfalls. The project included two pumping stations, a double siphon and dosing chamber under the river, the elimination of some sections of old sewer that contributed excessive infiltration of surface water into the system, and over 40,000 linear feet of new interceptor and lateral sewers. The project added about 200 customers to the municipal system. It is a project in which the residents, the Sewer Study Committee members, the Selectmen, the Water and Sewer Commissioners and all those involved over the years, can feel a sense of accomplishment and pride.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The calendar year 1987 drew to a close leaving behind yet another year of growth and change for our community. Throughout the year your Selectmen have been working diligently to help guide this growth and change into real progress for Hillsborough.

The tragedy in the collapse of the Highway Garage turned into a plus for the Town as the structure was rebuilt, under the watchful eye of Selectman Lachut, to more exacting specifications than originally constructed and at no additional cost to the Town.

At the March Town Meeting, Bob Charron joined the Board. He has worked hard to properly represent Hillsborough in the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative. In conjunction with this project there are several articles on the 1988 Town Meeting Warrant which will facilitate our transferring of trash to the incinerator project, hopefully as soon as March of 1989.

Selectman Charron has also been the Board's representative to the Municipal Building Feasibility Study Committee. This committee of local citizens was appointed to study the current and future space needs for all town departments. This study and suggestions as how best to fill the needs, will be presented to the Town sometime in 1988.

The Municipal Wastewater Treatment Facility, which we waited so many years for, has been on line for more than a year now and, with few exceptions, is performing up to expectations. In fact, the plant has been judged to be a model plant both in design and performance and is used by both the State and engineering firms as an example of how to build a unit such as this. This facility is now under the jurisdiction and in the capable hands of our Water & Sewer Commissioners.

As is well known, we lost a fine Chief of Police when Dave Miles made a decision to return to Maine. Even with Chief Miles premature departure we are hopeful the appointment as Chief of someone from within the Department will bring long term positive benefits to the Town. Chief Charles Kowalski has the background in police work and knowledge of the community to make our Police Department one to be proud of.

The year closed out with our community in a positive mode in which we can all look forward to a progressive New Year. The tax rate has been lowered due to outstanding growth in the tax base coupled with careful budget planning and control.

Our Community Development Block Grant application is progressing well. A great deal of input and support has been provided by the Chamber of Commerce Downtown Revitalization Committee and we are confident that Hillsborough's application will be successful.

Resignalization of the Rte 9 & 202 intersection seems to have taken a giant step forward along with improved communication between the Town and various state and federal agencies as a result of a meeting called by your Selectmen in December.

The Board of Selectmen wish to thank all of those citizens who have once again put forth that volunteer effort to help make our community a better place in which to live and work.

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Hillsborough-Deering High School Auditorium in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Balloting on Article one, election of officers; Article two, proposed changes to the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance and Article three, proposed changes to election procedures, will take place between ten o'clock in the forenoon and seven o'clock in the afternoon. Article four through twenty-five will be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years; Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Town Treasurer for one year; Town Moderator for one year; Supervisor of Checklist for six years; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for three years; Water and Sewer Commissioner for three years and all other necessary Town Officers or agents for the ensuing year.

(To be voted by the official ballot)

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance.

QUESTION #1. Are you in favor of the proposed Ordinance changes as presented at Public Hearing on February 3, 1988:

- A. Under Land Use Ordinance, Section III. E. Expenses and Fees. To raise application fee to \$25.00 per lot for any subdivision application.
- B. Site Plan Review Regulations. Section 7.2. To raise application fee to \$25.00 per dwelling unit and/or \$50.00 per 1,000 square feet of gross commercial building area.
- C. Excavation Permit Regulations. Add cost of publication and posting to the fee schedule.

(A copy of which is on file at the Selectmen's and Town Clerk's office)

(To be voted on by the official ballot)(Recommended by the Planning Board)

QUESTION #2. Are you in favor of adopting an Official Town Map as required by State Statute R.S.A. 647:10. Said map includes existing streets, public and private.

(To be voted on by the official ballot)(Recommended by the Planning Board)

QUESTION #3. Are you in favor of adopting the petition to have Map 12, Lot 124 of the Town of Hillsborough Tax Map, now or formerly the property of the Estate of Howard Flanders, rezoned from rural to commercial.

(A copy of which is on file at the Selectmen's and Town Clerk's office)

(To be voted on by the official ballot)(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 654:34a to permit changes in Party affiliation, or not to be a member of any party, to be registered with the Town Clerk.

(By Petition) (To be voted on by the official ballot)

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$950,000.00 for the costs of constructing a solid waste transfer station, including costs incidental and related

thereto, such appropriation to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, and to authorize the treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to determine the details of such bonds or notes and to provide for their sale and award and specifically to appropriate to the purposes of said bond or note issue any interest or premium earned on the same; or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen) (To be voted on by ballot)

Article 5. To hear the reports of the Town Officers to Auditors, Agents, Committees or other Town Officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the operating expenses of the Town including General Government, Public Safety, Highways, Streets and Bridges, Sanitation, Health, Welfare, Culture and Recreation, Debt Service, Operating Transfers Out and all other current expenses of the Town; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-two Thousand Dollars (\$82,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new four wheel drive dump truck and equipment for the Highway Department to be raised by the issuance of notes not to exceed Eighty-two Thousand Dollars (\$82,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes as shall be in the interest of the Town of Hillsborough; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing and raising the property now or formerly of the Hillsborough Improvement Corporation and further described as Map 23 Lot 155 of the Town of Hillsborough Tax Map (Page's Garage Property); or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen & Downtown Revitalization Committee)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred and Seven Thousand Two Hundred and Forty-five Dollars (\$107,245.00) from the Sewer Department Revenue for the purpose of operating the Sewer Department and to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be withdrawn from the Sewer Reserve Fund for the purpose of improvements to the Sewer system as required during 1988; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Water & Sewer Commissioners)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Forty-five Thousand Four Hundred and Ninety-two Dollars (\$45,492.00) from the Water Department Revenue for the purpose of operating the Water Department and to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be withdrawn from the Water Reserve Fund for the purpose of making improvements to the water system as required during 1988; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Water & Sewer Commissioners)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt, pursuant to RSA 31:39, an ordinance

to control and limit the collection and disposal of solid waste in the Town of Hillsborough; to ensure the supply of acceptable solid waste to the solid waste disposal facility to be constructed on behalf of the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative by requiring that solid waste be delivered to such facility; to provide procedures and requirements for licensing of solid waste disposal sites; to prohibit violations of the ordinance or of orders or licenses issued thereunder; to provide penalties for such violations, a copy of which is on file at the Town Office; or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Board of Selectmen) (See Copy Attached To Posted Warrant)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that the tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

(By Petition) (To be voted on by ballot) (Recommended By The Selectmen)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to name or change the name of streets, as permitted by NH RSA 231:33; or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt by reference as an ordinance the 1981 BOCA Basic Building Code, as amended, as established by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. Enforcement penalties and remedies for Code violations shall be as permitted by N.H. RSA 676:17 and 676:15, as amended.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt by reference as an ordinance the 1984 BOCA Basic National Fire Prevention Code, as amended, as established by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. Enforcement penalties and remedies for Code violations shall be as permitted by N.H. RSA 676:17 and 676:15, as amended.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to amend the bylaws regulating taxicabs as follows:

Section 3 Insurance. Repeal the present requirements and replace with the following:

All persons who make application for a license to operate a taxicab shall file proof of insurance with the Selectmen for the period during which the license is issued.

Insurance shall be with a company legally doing business in the State of New Hampshire and acceptable to the Selectmen. Minimum limits of coverage shall be \$300,000 bodily injury liability for each person; \$500,000 bodily injury liability for each occurrence; and \$25,000 property damage liability. Other coverages shall be as required by New Hampshire statutes.

The Town of Hillsborough shall be named as an insured, and the coverage shall not be cancelled without at least ten (10) days notice to the Selectmen.

Section 4 Fees for License. Increase the fees to \$25.00 for each taxicab for which a license certificate is issued.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the road known as the Hubbard-Wilson Road starting from a point at the junction of Stowe Mt. Road west of the Plumer house to the end of the road at the former Hubbard Pasture Gate; or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By the Selectmen)

Article 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the Conservation Fund for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the New Hampshire Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A or other State or Federal Programs, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP or other programs for the purposes of acquisition of the fee of lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and State matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission; or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By Petition)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Three Hundred and Eighty-six Dollars (\$13,386.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new Police Cruiser; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

(By Petition) (Not recommended by the Selectmen)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for the purposes of which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided (1) that such grants and other moneys do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and moneys; (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to the limitations and expenditures of Town moneys, all as provided by RSA 31:95-b; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to accept land or other assets given to the town upon such terms or conditions that they consider to be in the best interest of the Town; or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed at a public auction, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale or acquired by gift or other means; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town and in anticipation of taxes; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Selectmen
Town of Hillsborough, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Hillsborough, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1986 as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and included such tests of the accounting records, and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As discussed in Note I(F)i(b) to the financial statements, the Town's method of property tax revenue recognition does not conform with generally accepted accounting principles. This results in an overstatement of the December 31, 1986 general fund balance of \$495,624.

The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

In our opinion, except for the effects on the financial statements of the matters referred to in the second and third paragraphs of this report, the aforementioned general purpose financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Town of Hillsborough, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1986, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

MANAGEMENT REPORT

We have examined the financial statements of the Town of Hillsborough, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1986, and have issued our report thereon dated June 8, 1987. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary solely to determine the nature, timing, and extent of our auditing procedures. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole.

During our examination, we did not become aware of any material weakness in the Town's system of internal accounting control. We wish to compliment the Town for the considerable progress that was made in implementing our previous recommendations. We would also like to compliment the Tax Collector for the progress that was made on the computer. However, we did observe some bookkeeping practices of the Town and related procedures which could be improved. Our observations are summarized below.

Tax Overpayments

During our testing of uncollected taxes we observed a large number of accounts with credit balances, resulting from overpayment of taxes. The majority of these accounts had very small balances, typically under \$10.00.

We recommend that the Tax Collector perform a comprehensive analysis of the overpaid accounts, and either issue a refund to the taxpayers, or apply the overpayment to 1987 tax levies.

We further recommend that the general ledger "overpaid taxes" account be reconciled monthly with the Tax Collector's detail records. This will provide further assurance that the general ledger balances are reported properly throughout the year.

Tax Sale Outside Investors

Until recently, the Town has been the only purchaser of delinquent taxes at tax sale. However, because interest charges for delinquent taxes have increased, there have been several outside investors purchasing delinquent taxes at tax sale.

Since the Town must act as trustee for tax sale investors, the related bookkeeping requirements have become more complex. For instance, when a property owner pays the delinquent tax, the Collector must also calculate and collect interest and penalties. Then the outside investors must be refunded their investment with interest. The current Collector's bookkeeping records were not designed to handle this type of activity.

We recommend that the Tax Collector establish a system (either manually or computerized) to maintain records of taxes bought by outside investors. This will enable the Collector to easily determine the balance of the outside investments.

Again, we recommend that this balance be reconciled monthly with the Town's general ledger records.

Tax Receivable Reconciliations

The Town has established sound controls to reconcile tax receipts reported in the general

ledger with the Tax Collector's records. There is currently no reconciliation done, however, of the general ledger tax receivable balances with the Tax Collector's records.

We recommend that the current reconciliation procedures be expanded to include tax receivable balances. This will provide additional assurance that the Collector's records, and general ledger records are complete and in agreement for the following activities:

1. Tax levies
2. Added taxes
3. Abatements
4. Refunds
5. Tax sale transactions, and
6. Overpayments

In order to simplify this reconciliation, we suggest that a preprinted form be used to summarize the current activity affecting the tax receivable accounts.

Monthly Cash Reconciliations

The Town reconciles the general ledger cash balance monthly with the balance reported by the Treasurer. We observed that occasionally when the balances do not agree, the general ledger balance is automatically adjusted to equal the Treasurer's balance.

We recommend that the Town place more emphasis on the cause of the discrepancy, since the balances should be the same at all times. If adjustments are required to correct the general ledger balance, there should be an adequate explanation documented to explain the reason for the difference.

* * *

This letter summarizes the accounting and internal control weaknesses and potential system improvements that came to our attention in the review of internal control performed in connection with the audit of the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 1986.

1987 LIBRARY REPORT

Marked growth in the Town of Hillsborough this year has been reflected in the increased usage of the Fuller Public Library. Many new families have moved to the area and taken out library membership cards. A total of 755 new cards were issued in 1987.

Total circulation of library materials for the year was 28,666. The most significant increase has been in the number of children utilizing the library. The circulation of children's books this year was 13,296, an increase of 3,300 over last year.

To meet the growing demand, the Children's Room is now staffed each week day with a team of three alternating librarians, whose background experience enables them to serve a variety of age groups: from Pre-school, thru Elementary to Junior High levels.

A total of 1386 books were added to the library collection in 1987 (337 novels and 509 non-fiction to the Adult Collection; 319 picture books and junior novels and 221 non-fiction to the Children's Collection). A new set of World Book Encyclopedia was also purchased.

To enable the Library Director to select the best books available in the rapidly expanding field of Children's Literature, she attended a number of special workshops and conferences in 1987: The New Hampshire Children's Librarians Spring Books Selection Workshop in North Conway, N.H.; In July, a three day Children's Literature Conference at the Univ. of So. Maine; and a 2-day young Adult Literature Workshop at the Univ. of New Hampshire; In the fall she attended the 11th Annual Children's Literature Festival at Keene State College and the New England Educational Media Association's Winter Publishers Book Preview in Worcester, Mass.

Library programs offered during the year included; monthly Social Security Clinics, weekly films at the Hillsborough House and After School Films at the Community Building; a spring Reading/Discussion Group at the Hillsboro-Deering Media Center; a summer Disney Film Festival and Summer Children's Reading Program; summer and fall flower pressing and leaf printing activities; a popular Pre-school Story and Activity Hour with special Halloween and Christmas Parties; and ending the year with the Community Children's Christmas Party in the Gilbert Room, in conjunction with Hillsborough's Old Fashion Christmas Celebration.

New equipment this year included a 70 drawer card catalog, acquired at no cost from Bryant College; and a large oak magazine rack, from the Gilford Library, to display the library's growing magazine collection.

The library received many generous contributions of books this year, both for use in the collections and the annual Summer Book Sale. A magnificent collection of Persian Art books was received from the estate of St. John Smith. Our appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. John Colman for contributions toward the mystery collection, Susan Gibson for the new set of Books in Print, Henry I. Baldwin for more than a dozen magazines each month, and Katherine Bliss for a subscription to the Concord Monitor.

Memorial books were given this year in the names of Spencer Lucas Gleason, Lois Lockwood, Mildred Feldblum and Ralph Stuart. The Eunice Baldwin Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution gave books in the memory of Dorothy Butler, Maude G. Clough and Caroline Williams.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Hillsborough: Home Care, Hospice, and Health Promotion.

Home Care Services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

Hospice Services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical and emotional needs.

Health Promotion Services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior Health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Hillsborough may request service: patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All requests are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8:00am-7:00pm seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Hospice staff is on call (224-4093) 7:00pm-8:00am.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for that person without a health plan who is unable to pay the full charge. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or for which no fee is collectible.

This Agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of NH and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

REPORT OF THE HILLSBOROUGH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Pierce Homestead, under the administrative management of the Hillsborough Historical Society, was open to the public for a total of fifty-nine days during 1987, from May 23rd through October 12th. A total of thirty dedicated and concerned citizens comprised the volunteer staff on duty for a total of over seven hundred eighteen hours receiving visitors and conducting tours of the Homestead. Other volunteers contributed an additional three hundred fifty hours providing interior and exterior maintenance.

Five lecture programs were scheduled by the Society during the 1987 season in addition to a special program to celebrate the Bicentennial of the Constitution held on September 17th and co-sponsored with the Hillsborough D.A.R. Special arrangements were made at non-scheduled hours for visits to the Homestead by touring groups, school teachers and students.

The budget of One Thousand Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) allotted the Society by the Town of Hillsborough in 1987 covered expenditures for heating, electricity, telephone and the security system. It is expected that the State's Division of Parks and Recreation will provide some needed external building maintenance as well as grounds maintenance beginning in 1988.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE

The past year was a hectic and progressive one for the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative (CRSW/RRC) as the project to construct a waste-to-energy incinerator to serve the 27 communities in the Cooperative made significant progress.

Early in the year, the \$48 million financing package for the construction of the state-of-the-art facility was completed and secured after lengthy discussions and negotiations with bond counsels, financial advisors, industry officials, community leaders, legal counsel, state officials and others.

With the financing in hand, Wheelabrator Environmental Systems began construction of the incinerator facility on the 23.8 acre site in Penacook in August 1987. At the present time it is anticipated the facility will be operational by late summer of 1989.

The Cooperative also decided, after three years of operations, to hire a full-time project director to monitor the construction of the facility, to coordinate location and permitting of an ash disposal landfill, handle administrative responsibilities and accounting, and to serve as a day-to-day contact for member communities, state and federal agencies and other interested parties. After a multi-state search for a project director, the Cooperative hired Ronald H. Ford of Concord, former Director of Public Works for the City of Concord.

At the present time the CRSW/RRC is joining with Wheelabrator Environmental systems and the New Hampshire/Vermont Solid Waste District to contract the University of New Hampshire to conduct a scientific study of the effect of leachate from landfills. The results of this study will help our Cooperative to better plan its ash disposal landfill for the protection of our residents in the generations to come.

While 1987 was a busy year for the Cooperative, 1988 promises to be even busier as the Cooperative prepares to continue its efforts to insure the facility is constructed in a timely manner and our member communities are prepared to begin delivering their solid waste to the facility for incineration.

Together, we have all come a long way in addressing a critical problem facing the State as a whole and our communities specifically. Continued cooperation and hard work by our member communities will enable us to bring this project to fruition and successful operation.

The Commission reviewed the State Statutes as mandated by RSA during September 1987 meeting.

The Selectman Representative to the HCHDC advised that the District's Rules and Regulations would be included with the Master Plan and Zoning Ordinances at the time the Hillsborough Recodified Statutes are printed to comply with RSA 673:51.

**MINUTES OF
SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
SEPTEMBER 18, 1987**

Town Moderator Leigh Bosse brought the Special Town Meeting to order and opened the polls in the Hillsborough Community Hall in said Town on Friday, the eighteenth day of September at ten o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of balloting on Articles 1 and 2, proposed changes to the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance and Article 3, relative to the adoption of the blind exemption as previously posted in the warrant as follows:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance.

QUESTION – 1. Voted to adopt Amendment – 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- 1.) Delete SECTION 4.02—A6 which pertains to the placement of individual mobile homes or trailers in the Residential District

Delete SECTION 4.02—C3 which pertains to the placement of individual mobile homes or trailers in the Rural District.

Change SECTION 4.02—C5: from five (5) acres to ten (10) acres,

Change SECTION 4.02—A5: Mobile home and trailer parks, provided that a minimum park area of ten (10) acres is provided and lot area of ten thousand (10,000) square feet is allocated to each manufactured house and that a connection is made to municipal water and sewer systems or systems approved by all state agencies. Licensing requirements for mobile home parks, as adopted by the Town of Hillsborough, shall apply.

RESULTS OF BALLOTING: YES 160 NO 41

QUESTION – 2. Voted to adopt Amendment – 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- 2.) Add ARTICLE VII, MOBILE HOME PARKS AND SUB-DIVISIONS

Section I. Mobile Homes

It shall be unlawful for any person to park a mobile home on any public or private property, except in accordance with these regulations as follows:

- 1.1 In an approved mobile home park.
- 1.2 In an approved mobile home sales lot.
- 1.3 In an approved mobile home subdivision.
- 1.4 In the rural and residential districts. Mobile homes will not be permitted in the historic district, commercial district, or within the one hundred (100) year flood plain.
- 1.5 Manufactured housing located on individual lots shall comply with lot size, frontage requirements, space limitation, suitable permanent foundation, and other reasonable controls that conventional single family housing in the same area must meet.

Section II. Mobile Home Park Standards

Mobile home parks may be permitted as a special exception in any district, except the historic district, commercial district, or within the one hundred (100) year

flood plain, subject to the following standards:

- 2.1 A mobile home park shall have an area of not less than ten (10) acres.
- 2.2 Mobile home parks shall provide for individual mobile home spaces, access driveways, parking and recreation open space.
- 2.3 Maximum Density: The maximum number of mobile homes in a mobile home park shall not exceed that permitted by the limitation within this Article.
- 2.4 Lot Sizes:
 - A. Where the lots in the mobile home park have either municipal or park supplied water and municipal sewage disposal, then each mobile home shall be located on an individual lot containing not less than ten thousand (10,000) square feet.
 - B. Where such lots have either park supplied or municipal water service and no municipal sewage disposal, then each mobile home shall be located on an individual lot containing not less than twenty thousand (20,000) square feet. Without municipal sewage disposal, a state approved septic system is required.
- 2.5 Open Space: A minimum of twenty (20) percent of land area of the entire tract shall be retained for Open Space and outdoor recreational areas. The following provisions shall apply:
 - A. Open space area shall be accessible and usable for the residents of the mobile home park.
 - B. There shall be legal restrictions running with the land to preserve open space for purposes of recreation, conservation and forestry.
 - C. Restrictions shall provide for the management and maintenance of the Open Space, including the manner and source of funds. These restrictions may be contained in any suitable legal instrument.
 - D. Upon the request of the park owners, such restrictions as have been provided may be modified by the Planning Board subsequent to the approval of the Final Plat. The Planning Board shall hold a public hearing for this purpose in the same manner and with the same notice as for a hearing on the Final Plat. Such modification shall be subject to terms and conditions deemed by the Planning Board as necessary to carry out the purpose and intent of open space.
- 2.6 Procedures and Standards: A mobile home subdivision shall conform to all of the requirements for a Major Subdivision as set forth in Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the Land Subdivision Ordinance of the Town of Hillsborough. In addition, the following special standards will apply:
 - A. A buffer area, suitably landscaped and not less than thirty (30) feet in width, shall be provided at the boundary of all adjacent properties. The buffer area shall not be part of the required setback. Additional buffer areas may be required within a development between groups of building lots. No buffer area will be considered as part of open space.
 - B. Access to all lots shall be from interior roads. Each lot shall have reasonable access to the common open space but need not front directly on such space.

C. All interior roads shall be constructed to Town Class V standards for new roads. Such roads shall be lighted at night.

D. The subdivision plan shall provide for the convenience and safety of vehicular and pedestrian movement within the development and for the necessary location of driveways in relation to street traffic.

E. Two off-street (each 10' x 20') parking spaces shall be provided for each mobile home.

- 2.7 Provisions for storage and disposal of household garbage and rubbish shall be made and meet all Town and State health standards.
- 2.8 A 220 volt electrical source, supplying at least 100 amperes or not less than that required by the National Electrical Code (whichever is greater), shall be provided for each mobile home space. The installation shall comply with all State and Local Electrical Laws and Regulations. Such electrical outlets shall be weatherproof. The use of underground utility installation shall be required.
- 2.9 Area and Dimensions: A mobile home subdivision shall have a minimum of five (5) lots and be subject to the physical specifications in the applicable district.
- 2.10 A suitable non-porous pad shall be provided for each mobile home.
- 2.11 A mobile home subdivision shall be approved by the Planning Board pursuant to its rules.

Section III. Mobile Home Definition

Mobile home or manufactured housing means any structure, transportable in one or more sections, which, in the traveling mode, is eight (8) body feet or more in width and forty (40) body feet or more in length, or when erected on site, is three hundred twenty (320) square feet or more, and which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation when connected to required utilities, which include plumbing, heating, and electrical heating systems contained therein.

RESULTS OF BALLOTING: YES 141 NO 62

Article 2. To see if the Town will adopt the petition to amend the zoning map of the Town of Hillsborough in the area of Whitney Road and Old Henniker Road to have the line of demarcation between the Rural and Residential Zones continue in its Easterly direction from the intersection of the Whitney and Old Henniker Roads to its eventual intersection with the State Route 202/9 Right of Way. Presently the line follows Whitney Road to the East, and at the above mentioned intersection turns and parallels Old Henniker Road to the South. This article was defeated.

RESULTS OF BALLOTING: YES 82 NO 119

Article 3. Voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be given a \$15,000.00 exemption from their property tax evaluation.

1987 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough qualified to vote in Town affairs on the tenth day of March, 1987 at ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Hillsborough/Deering School, the Moderator called the meeting to order.

Article 1. Voted that the voters of the Town of Hillsborough proceed to ballot for one Selectman for three years; Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Town Treasurer for one year; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for three years; Water and Sewer Commissioner for one year and three years and all other necessary Town Officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. Voted that the Town adopt the following amendment to the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance.

QUESTION – 1. Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment # 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Hillsborough Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- 1) To amend ARTICLE III, Section 4, "PHYSICAL SPECIFICATIONS: RESIDENTIAL USE IN RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL ZONES," as attached hereto:

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Leigh Bosse @ 7:30 P.M.

Selectman Ervin Lachut recognized Selectman Adelbert Skinner for seven years service to the Town of Hillsborough.

Article 5. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Five Hundred Forty-seven Thousand Three Hundred Fifty-six Dollars (\$1,547,356.00) for the operating expenses of the Town including General Government, Public Safety, Highways, Streets and Bridges, Sanitation, Health, Welfare, Culture and Recreation, Debt Service, Operating Transfers Out and all other current expenses of the Town as follows:

Article 6. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$12,700.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new Police Cruiser.

Article 7. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Five Dollars (\$3,705.00) for the purpose of subsidizing the cost of services (provided by the Contoocook Valley Counselling Center) to Hillsborough residents needing financial assistance.

Article 8. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$9,500.00) for the purpose of constructing a concrete ramp with iron railings, according to state specifications, to provide access for the handicapped to Fuller Public Library.

Article 9. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of recodification of all ordinances of the Town of Hillsborough.

Article 10. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$32,500.00) for the purpose of engineering and site work for the Solid Waste Transfer Station in 1987.

Article 11. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of improvements to town parks and playgrounds.

Article 12. Voted that the Town authorize the withdrawal of Sixty Eight Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy Dollars (\$68,770.00) from the Sewer Department Revenue for the purpose of operating the Sewer Department and to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be withdrawn from the Sewer Reserve Fund for the purpose of improvements to the Sewer system as required during 1987.

Article 13. Voted that the Town authorize the withdrawal of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) from the Water Department Revenue for the purpose of operating the Water Department and to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be withdrawn from the Water Reserve Fund for the purpose of making improvements to the water system as required during 1987.

Article 14. Motion was made and seconded that the Town vote, pursuant to RSA 80:42, to convey a piece of land adjacent to Lot - 103 on the Town of Hillsborough Tax Map - 12 to an abutter for the price of Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$750.00).

Voted that Article 14 be amended to add the following: That the Selectmen be further authorized to convey the piece of land known as Oak Street adjacent to Map 25 Lot 82 to Bruce and Iris Campbell for its appraised value. Motion was made and seconded to vote separately on the two tracts of land in Article 14. Motion was passed.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to convey the piece of land known as Oak Street adjacent to Map 25 Lot 82 to Bruce and Iris Campbell for its appraised value.

Article 14 as originally moved was defeated.

Motion was made to check on the Moderators decision as to the validity of Article 14's defeat. Voted that Moderator's decision stand.

Article 15. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the amount of Three Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$3,250.00) for the support of the Meals on Wheels Program provided to Hillsborough residents by St. Joseph's Community Services.

Article 16. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the purposes of the Hillsborough Conservation Commission.

Article 17. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of adding to the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund established in 1986.

Article 18. Voted that the Town accept, pursuant to the acceptance of a deed by the Board of Selectmen, Old Drift Way from it's intersection with Rte - 9 to it's terminus, as a Class V highway.

Article 19. Motion was made that the Town instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Hillsborough, N.H. unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

Motion was made to amend Article 19. to say that no low level radioactive waste shall be stored, disposed or transported in the Town of Hillsborough. This motioned was defeated. Voted to accept Article 19. as originally moved and printed in the Town Warrant of 1987.

Article 20. There was no motion made.

Article 21. Motion was made that the Town vote to adopt as an ordinance of the Town in order to protect the public health, safety and welfare of the Town pursuant to RSA 31:39 the proposed Ordinance Regulating Yard Sales and Flea Markets as printed in the Town Report. This motion was defeated.

Article 22. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purpose of researching and applying for a Federal Grant to be used for the revitalization of the downtown area.

Article 23. Motion was made that the Town vote to adopt the provision of RSA 72:1-C which authorize any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax. This motion was defeated.

Voted that the Town combine Articles - 24, 25 & 27 and to vote on them as one article as printed in the Town Report.

Article 24. Voted that the Town authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a.

Article 25. Voted that the Town authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for the purposes of which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided (1) that such grants and other moneys do not require the expenditure of other Town funds; (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and moneys; (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to the limitations and expenditures of Town moneys, all as provided by RSA 31:95-b.

Article 27. Voted that the Town instruct and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town and in anticipation of taxes.

Articles 24, 25 & 27 being voted on as one article all passed.

Article 26. Motion was made that the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed at a public auction, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale or acquired by gift or other means and further that the Town specifically authorize the Selectmen to sell and covey to the Hillsborough/Deering School District in consideration of the payment of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00)

that portion of the "dump land", so-called, consisting of 18.1 acres and a 50 foot strip to the end of Myrtle Street as shown on plans for the proposed new high school for the Hillsborough/Deering School District entitled "Preliminary Plan of Land Owned by Town of Hillsborough", dated 2/27/87, Donald R. Mellen, Surveyor.

Voted to split Article 26. into two parts. The first part being the sale of land to the Hillsborough/Deering School District and the second part the authorization to the Selectmen to sell and convey land by deed at public auction obtained by the Town.

Motion was made for the Town of Hillsborough to convey to the Hillsborough/Deering School District the 18.1 acres for one hundred dollars (\$100.00). This motion was defeated.

Voted that the land be conveyed to the Hillsborough/Deering School District for the appraised value of \$ 15,000.00.

Voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey by deed at a public auction, the title to real estate taken by the Town in default or redemption from tax sale or acquired by gift or other means.

Voted to adjourn at 10:42 P.M.
