THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Loudon Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 for Old Age Assistance.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bills.

5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to eliminate White Pine Blister Rust.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the construction of more water holes for the use of the Fire Department; the details relating thereto to be the same as voted last year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Act providing Mutual Aid Service in connection with Fires as passed by the 1949 New Hampshire State Legislature.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00, the State to furnish \$4,000.00 to build a bridge at the foot of River Hill.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bond the Town for \$6,000.00 in serial notes maturing \$1,000.00 each year to build a bridge at the foot of River Hill.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to aid in the care of neglected lots in the following cemeteries: Loudon Ridge, Loudon Center, Moore and Mount Hope.

12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue such abandoned portions of the former Rocky Pond Trunk line Highway Route 106 between station 31/00 and station 70/00, as shown on a plan of Loudon F.A.S. No. S-21 (3) in the records of the N. H. Department of P. W. & Highways, as are more than 50 feet distant from the new center line of construction and south of the southerly driveway leading to the property of Elmer V. and Mildred R. Archibald (about opposite station 42/50 on the above mentioned plan) and northerly of the Clough Pond Road (about opposite station 57/00 on the above mentioned plan).

The above mentioned abandoned section of the former Rocky Pond Road was reclassified from Class I to Class V by letter of Deputy Commissioner John Morton dated December 24, 1951.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$100.00 (1/100th of one percent of the Town's valuation based on the 1951 assessment to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in this Region, or act in relation thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$384.00, the town's share of necessary funds

to meet the estimated deficit for 1952 of the Concord Hospital.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

General Government

You will notice in the Town Budget an estimated increase of \$740.00 in the budget figures of Town Officers' Salaries. The \$1,891.00 appropriation includes an increase of \$200.00 for each of the Selectmen, \$30.00 more for the Town Clerk, \$40.00 more for the Town Treasurer, and a raise of \$40.00 for the Tax Collector. Your Selectmen feel these raises are justified due to the increased amount of work caused by new legislation and travel expense.

New Construction

The road from Karl Moore's to the top of Oscar Smith's hill has been straightened, made wider, culverts installed and partly graveled with this year's T. R. A. funds. The State Highway Department requests a new bridge at the foot of River Hill; the town to pay its share on a sixty-fourth basis. If this bridge can be built, this road will be completed to River Hill.

Future T. R. A. Construction

The roads to be constructed by T. R. A. Funds in the near future are Pleasant Street, School Street, Upper City and the Chichester Road by Dodge and Freedman's Poultry Farm. The order in which they are done will be decided by the Selectmen and the State Highway Department.

REPORT OF THE LOUDON FIRE DEPARTMENT

From the standpoint of both the number of runs made and the seriousness of the fires occurring during 1951, this has been the best year's record since the organization of the Department eleven years ago.

A total of only twenty-seven calls were logged for the year, only two of these being for actual building fires and these of a minor nature.

A spectacular and potentially serious slash and woods fire occurred the 30th of May on the western end of Loudon Ridge. For a time it threatened several sets of valuable buildings. Firemen from Belmont, Gilmanton and Canterbury assisted in controlling it. Radio, very useful at any fire, played an important role during that afternoon. It proved exceptionally helpful when at the height of this fire, another blaze sprang up in Gilmanton and it was vital that their manpower and equipment be returned to duty in their own town.

During the year a major part of the presently proposed fire alarm system was completed and put into service. Street alarm boxes are now installed north from the village on Route 106 to Pearl's Corner. From there up Clough's Hill ending at the Center with the box at Arthur Anderson's. Lines have been run down the Currier Road from the Clough Hill schoolhouse to Edward Rowse's, with the boxes ready to be installed when weather conditions permit. We, in the Department, wish that further coverage of the Town might be made because with an up-to-date system such as we have started, there is no quicker way known in which to give an alarm, and minutes are mighty important.

The Department is still operating under many handicaps. Two items cause great difficulties and it is hoped that we may be able to do something about them. An air compressor is a "must." Tires must be kept properly inflated and hose lines blown out to prevent freezing. Caring for

the larger hose constitutes a major operation after each fire. At present we have to reload part of the hose bodies with wet hose. This is not good practice because wet hose will mildew, rot, freeze and crack. We have to make several trips to the Concord Fire station and avail ourselves of the use of their hose tower to care for ours. Hours of hard work could be eliminated and a lengthening of hose life be assured if some manner of hose drying could be secured. Several methods might be used but a hose tower seems to be the correct answer.

The Ladies Auxiliary continues to be very active and worthwhile. Plans are now being made to build an addition on the station for the use of the Auxiliary and Firemen. It is expected that work on this will be started in the spring.

Considerable interest is being shown relative to the waterholes being planned for various locations. During the year surveys and recommendations were made but owing to the exceptionally wet condition of the ground it was decided not to start actual construction until conditions were more favorable. Anyone knowing of a worthwhile waterhole location should contact the Chief that it might be listed for consideration in the near future.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE

Activities for 1951

Organization of Civil Defense during the year has gone forward in accordance with state and national civil defense directives; and has been greatly furthered by the continued cooperation of the town officials and residents.

The several civil defense units have completed their basic organizations and are in a position to function effectively in case of need. However, the Ground Observer Unit requires additional members to spread the burden if conditions should require continuous watches. Volunteers should contact Mr. Herman Annis or Mr. Richard K. Moll.

At various times during the past year the State Director has tested the civil defense communications network by means of test alerts. Loudon's communication unit, Beatrice Robinson, Leader, successfully met all tests.

The Eastern Air Defense Command during the year conducted several drills for all Ground Observer Units in New England. Loudon's post was manned and participated fully in all tests.

The Refugee Unit, M. Inez Lovering, Leader, has made a survey of housing and facilities that would be available in Loudon to care for refugees should the emergency arise.

The Medical, Nursing, and First Aid Unit, Laura Hayward, R.N., Leader, has been actively promoting the enrollment of nurses, conducting home nursing classes, and preparing first aid baskets for use in emergencies. So that all residents may be informed of the work being done and the plans made to take care of the sick and injured a brief outline is printed below.

The home nursing classes are being conducted by Mrs. Lois Smith at the home of Mrs. Everett Jenkins. Further information can be obtained from Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Jenkins, or Miss Hayward.

An appropriation of \$50.00 for contingent expenses is being requested for 1952.

The Air Raid Warning Signals as designated by the Federal Civil Defense Administrator are again published for information.

Only two warnings will be used:

(1) A "Red Alert" when there is danger of imminent attack.

(2) An "All Clear" signal.

(a) The "Red Alert" signal will last three minutes. It will consist of warbling or fluctuating signals of varying pitch from sirens or a series of short blasts by horns or whistles. For Loudon this signal will be sounded on the Fire Department's siren.

(b) The "All Clear" signal will be a series of three steady one-minute blasts by horns, sirens or whistles with two-minute intervals of silence between blasts. This signal also will be sounded on the Fire Department's siren.

In case of emergency the Fire Station has been designated as the headquarters for the Civil Defense Organization. All Unit Leaders will report there for instructions. Other members of the civil defense units will, unless otherwise ordered, assemble at the Loudon Surprise Grange Hall. In this connection the whole hearted cooperation of the Fire Chief, the Loudon Volunteer Firemen's Association, the Grange membership and the various church and civic organizations are gratefully acknowledged.

In conclusion it is reported with pride that the Town of Loudon was awarded a Certificate of Merit by Freedoms Foundation for meritorious work in organizing civil defense.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Loudon:

My first report to you must be limited to brief comments upon your school situation because I have not been your Superintendent long enough to justify any lengthy report.

There is urgent need for more study of the previous suggestions for a consolidated school for Loudon. Its location, cost of construction, transportation of pupils, and increasing tuition rates of high schools are factors which could well be subjects of intensive study by a joint committee of School Board, Superintendent and citizens. Participation in such a survey would be extremely profitable and could lead to some definite conclusions as to needs, and point the way to action.

Your present staff of teachers is performing in a satisfactory manner, the instruction is good, the pupil morale is, for the most part, high and the education of your children is being accomplished.

Your present buildings need some minor repairs which your School Board is aware of. The White School needs some changes made in its chimney to take care of a down draft of smoke on certain days.

Your local P. T. A. is doing a fine piece of work in showing such cooperation with the teachers and school officials, and is setting a good example for even greater community cooperation.

I hope to be able to serve you better as I continue to work with you.

I want to express my appreciation to the School Board, to the teachers and to the citizens of Loudon for their help and willingness to aid in the great work of making possible the continuous educational growth of the children of Loudon.
