TENTATIVE WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of Town of Madison, in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madison on Tuesday, March 11, 1952, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see what action Town will take in regard to discount on Taxes.

4. To see if the voters will authorize the selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$15,000 in anticipation of the Collection of Taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefore. Said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to straighten the road at the brow of Tasker Hill and appropriate money for same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to Tar the road leading from the West Ossipee Road to the bridge at the outlet of Silver Lake; and to raise and appropriate money for same.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for the support of Memorial Hospital at North Conway.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$400.00 for continuing control of White Pine Blister Rust.

9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Huggins Hospital at Wolfeboro.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$98.00 which is $1/100$ of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Ass'n for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns of the Region.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE
MADISON TOWN LIBRARY, 1951**

Through the co-operation of the School Board, the Madison Town Library was enabled, in November, 1951, to move into larger quarters in the old Corner Grammar School building and is henceforth to be known as the Madison School and Town Library. The Library, wishing to further this cooperation, and to make its facilities increasingly available to the school children, as well as to the citizens of the community, has opened the library on two school days each week, from noon until four o'clock. This enables the younger children to secure books in their lunch hour, if desired,

and the High School students, on their return from Conway. Both younger and adult readers have shown their appreciation of the new arrangements and more convenient hours by a circulation of books which is more than double the number borrowed in the old building.

Better lighting and sufficient space for study tables and chairs are two of the factors which go toward making the Library more effective and useful for all the townspeople, and it is expected that the future will show a continued growth as the younger readers learn to depend on the Library for information and recreation.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

In the past year your local forest fire organization did a very fine job of pre-suppression and suppression of forest fires. Our early spring was very dry and with extra high winds and all our fires were during that period. We find that the general public is still very careless with matches and cigarettes.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we call, "I don't care," he is the person that builds fires anywhere, never gets a permit

to burn brush or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He is also very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called, "I don't know any better," and the best way to describe him is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our pretty and valuable woodland to be destroyed by fire. Even your own home can be burned by them.

It is up to you and you alone to report these two characters to your local forest fire warden whenever you see them operating. To have our woodlands green and our mountain streams clear, your cooperation is needed by:

1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent it from spreading.
3. Never burn in dry windy weather.
4. In all cases a written permit is required from your local town fire warden.
5. Be sure that your matches, cigarettes and pipe ashes are out before discarding.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

I hereby submit my annual report of the health program for the year 1950-1951.

Throughout the year I have been able to have the eyes tested by the Mass. Eye Testing machine and all defects corrected or under treatment. The hearing was tested by the Maico Hearing machine with one defect and the tonsils were recommended to be checked by family doctor.

Sixty-nine children were given Tuberculin Patch Test, with nine receiving chest x-rays. I am glad to report no active T. B. cases in the school.

In the spring of 1951, a Well Child Conference and Immunization Clinic was held at the Town Hall, with five school children receiving inoculations, and the in-coming first grade received physical examinations. It would be excellent procedure if all children might receive these inoculations, as a preventive measure, thus alleviating this disease as a factor as in smallpox.

There has been considerable absence from school due to the common cold. I believe it might be helpful if parents would check the children in the morning and keep them home during the nasal discharge stage, the most contagious, and it might help prevent the spread of the disease.

I wish to express my appreciation for the help I have received from the members of the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers, T. B. Association, Salvation Army, and all interested persons. Their cooperation has made this program possible.

MADISON HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

Our hot lunch program sponsored by the Madison-Parent Teachers Association has been most successful. We were very fortunate in securing Mrs. Frank Nason as cook. She carried on her work with efficiency assisted by Mrs. Arthur Gilman and Mrs. William Kennett with the buying and the menu planning.

From February 5, 1951 to April 20, 1951, 28666 type A lunches were served at a cost of 15¢ per lunch per child if one or two children in the family. If there are three or more children in the same family the cost is 10¢ per child per lunch. Federal reimbursement of 7¢ per lunch per child for the first month and 5¢ per lunch per child for the remainder of the hot lunch period plus the receipt of 200 lb. of potatoes, 100lb. dry beans, 65 lb. cheese, 5 smoked shoulders, 8 cans honey, 6 cans peanut butter, 6 cans peach jam, 8 bu. apples, 40 lb. butter, a case of orange juice, prunes, flaked fish and 2 turkeys helped to defray the cost of the meals. Potatoes, cabbage, macaroni, cookies, string beans and blackberries were also given by parents and friends. The following is a copy of a typical week's menu:

Madison PTA Hot Lunch Program

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Madison:

During the year 1950-51 the teachers in the Madison School were Mrs. Erma Lyman, Principal, grades 6, 7, and 8; Mrs. Martha Kelley, grades 3, 4, and 5; and Mrs. Ethel Berry, grades 1 and 2. Mrs. Berry, the new staff member, holds a degree from Plymouth Teachers' College and has had several years teaching experience.

Mrs. Lyman resigned at the end of the year after several years of highly commendable service in the school. At the opening of school in September, 1951 Mr. David Love of Gorham, Maine joined the staff. Mr. Love is a graduate of Colby College and a veteran of World War II. He is teaching grades 6, 7, and 8 and is devoting much time to the development of a program of physical education and recreation.

During the years 1950-51 and 1951-52 much has been accomplished in improvement of school facilities. A new septic tank was installed, the old shop moved to the west end of the lot and the ground at the rear of the buildings graded and leveled. This enlarges the play area to such an extent that several groups may, at the same time, be participating in a wide variety of activities. This play area has been mapped by Mr. Love for the installation of several different kinds of playground apparatus, and certain areas designated for special group activities.

Inside the building the wall adjacent to the boys' washroom was moved to provide better access to the cafeteria, the room at the east end of the basement has been fitted with shelves to provide adequate, efficient storage of supplies, and a rodent-proof closet built under the stairs for storage of packaged foods used in the school lunch.

With the opening of school this year the school lunch program began the first day and is to be continued throughout the year. The Type A lunch is served. This is a complete, balanced meal and includes a half-pint of milk for each pupil. The Madison P.T.A. can take great pride in its accomplishment in providing one of the most attractive school cafeterias in the state, and its sponsorship of such an excellent lunch program. Presiding most efficiently in the kitchen is Mrs. Henrietta Nason assisted by interested mothers and P.T.A. members.

Enrolled at Kennett High School last year were 25 Madison pupils. Six were graduated at the year's end. One pupil was graduated from Gould Academy, Bethel, Maine. Currently there are 23 pupils enrolled at Kennett High School. The estimated number of high school pupils for 1952-53 is 26. Cost per high school pupil last year was \$229.17. The state average current cost for 1950-51 was \$280.95 per pupil. Cost per elementary pupil was \$245.90, (state average is not yet available). School Tax rate per \$1000.00 equalized valuation was \$16.94 with the state median \$18.71.

Few towns in the state have made progress comparable to that of Madison during the past few years in respect to improving its school facilities and its educational program.

The community may well take pride in the fact that it has a school board of competent members who are deeply interested in the welfare of the boys and girls, and who have an exceptional understanding of pupils' needs. A staff of competent teachers, devoted to duty, is priceless. Madison has such a staff. Add

to these a very active, helpful P.T.A. and so many interested citizens and the schools are bound to progress.
