TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to games of Beano be adopted in this Town?
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$711.64 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,744.26.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and tarring of improved Class V roads.

7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new truck for the Highway Department, applying the old truck towards the cost of the new one, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to improve the section of dirt road leading from A. Guyotte's residence to the residence of E. Inkel, a distance of 700 feet, more or less, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the road leading from the residence of Harold Prince toward Treasure Valley Inc., the Treatment Center operated by Eva Reid and Martha Buttenheim.

10. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to improve the road leading from the Pinnacle Farm, southerly, towards the Meredith town line, a distance of approximately 450 yards, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to tar the road leading from the highway to the power plant of the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Forest Fire Equipment.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of Hospitals.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of old cemeteries.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and maintenance of the New Hampton Village Cemetery.

19. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176.00 to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

20. (By Request) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176.00 to the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Newfound Region.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for legal expenses.

22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Snow Plow for use on the highway department truck, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local Forest Fire Warden is very glad to report that there were only two forest fires during the year 1951, and the expense to the town for these fires was a little over \$30. There were over 50 permits issued this year and I wish at this time to thank each and every one for your cooperation. PLEASE REMEMBER TO —

No. 1. Always secure a written permit from your warden before kindling a fire when the ground is not covered with snow.

No. 2. Be careful with matches and smoking equipment while in or near woodlands.

No. 3. Call your warden promptly when smoke or fire is seen.

No. 4. If a fire is kindled without a permit the party is responsible for all costs involved in the warden's investigation.

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in or near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 90% of all forest fires result from human carelessness. We may say forest fires are our most shameful waste.

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the products of our forests, the protection forests provide for game and supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditures of public funds to extinguish them.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New Hampton qualified to vote in District affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said District on the 11th day of March 1952, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Auditors, Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to pay High School tuition in excess of the state average which is the legal limit of District obligation.

10. To see if the School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the School District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36.00 to defray the School District's share of the cost thereof.

11. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the School District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the School District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

12. To see if the District is in favor of refinancing the District Bonds for the purpose of decreasing the annual debt payment and raise and appropriate money for same.

13. To see if the School District will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ANNUAL REPORT of the SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the New Hampton School District:

I herewith submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Each year brings with it new problems which the schools must face. This year is no exception. We read widely of the alleged decline in the morality of politics, scandals in athletics, attacks on certain school systems and a growing antagonism to increased taxes.

Your school is facing up these problems as are the other schools in this Supervisory Union. Before the opening of school in September a two day workshop was held in Franklin. The theme of this meeting was "Teaching of Moral and Spiritual Values in the Public Schools." Your teachers attended and participated in this valuable two days. Your children are reaping the harvest during this year. They are being taught the fundamental attitudes which are so necessary for living in this democratic way of life we enjoy.

During the summer of 1951 Mrs. Mildred Currier Langley submitted her resignation which was accepted with deep regret. We were most fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Margaret Benson of Laconia. Mrs. Benson brings to the school system many years of valuable experience in these grade levels. The pupils are continuing to show growth steadily under her expert leadership.

Mr. George Rochfort, the Principal of the Community School, is giving to it leadership, vigor and growth. The District is fortunate to have one who will devote so much of his time to the youth of the community. Mrs. Edith Plant in the Primary Room and Mrs. Estelle

Watts, Music Supervisor round out the teaching personnel at the school. I wish to mention the fact that Mrs. Watts is again giving of her time in order that the pupils may enjoy the opportunity to take piano lessons. We are fortunate to have people on our staff who will take upon themselves these added duties.

The Health Program of the school has been given a tremendous "shot-in-the-arm" by the appointment of Mrs. Helen Thomas as our School Nurse. She has had many years of experience with children and the New Hampton children have been afforded much better health coverage this year than has been their lot in the past.

The Parent Teacher Association has been most helpful to the School. They have undertaken a map program which is proving most worthwhile. They continue to assist daily in the lunch program and are ever on the alert to improve the schools. Such participation and cooperation is most heartwarming to the school administrator.

The Gordon-Nash Library is continuing its excellent program of cooperating with the school in bringing better books and reading material of all kinds to the pupils.

The Village School heating plant has been repaired and a new oil burner installed. This enables us to make wide use of the building for activities and special events. It also affords the District an additional classroom should the future enrollment justify its use.

Countrywide there has been undercurrents about the rising cost of government including the schools. New Hampton I am sure is no exception. I should like to take a portion of this report to discuss school district financing of its schools.

In a report to the people during the last legislature the State Board of Education said that the average school tax on adjusted valuation is 18 mills. New Hampton does not spend that much on its schools. We do not qualify for state aid because of the small number of pupils and

the high valuation. We are classed as a community wealthy enough to take care of its own school expenditures without reaching this average tax.

Just where, you may well ask, has the increased cost been the most apparent in the New Hampton School District? In trying to get a picture I took the year 1946-47 when you were operating the rural schools in the district. That year you had more teachers than at present and you were paying more money for salaries per year. You did not have running water in the schools. There were no modern toilets. Lights were inadequate and lunch facilities were not available. There was not enough playground area at most schools. The number of pupils going to high school was small and not all eighth grade graduates attended. That year you spent 24.9% of the total budget for the support of high schools. The remainder was for the operation of the local elementary schools. Salaries were low and tuition costs were also small.

In the year 1950-51, the first full year of the Community School, 22.1% of the total budget went for the payment of the Debt and Interest. High School Costs were 21.4% and the elementary costs were 56.5%. You had the most modern plant in the state with the very best of facilities. The pupils had the advantage of more teacher time, an excellent play area, a lunch program equal to any, and a well rounded instructional program. You were paying slightly more than \$9000 for the new plant.

The proposed budget for the school year 1952-53 calls for the expenditure of 20.7% for Debt and Interest, 24.1% for high schools, and 55.3% for elementary schools. This budget shows a real increase in the cost of high schools to the district. There will be a larger number of pupils attending high schools and tuition costs have increased. Last year we had 22 pupils attending high school. This year it is expected that we will have 34. This increase of 12 pupils adds \$3000 to the budget if all attend Bristol. If they decide to attend Laconia it will mean an added

\$25 per pupil. This factor of high school costs is the primary one for the increase asked in the school budget this year.

I invite all of you to analyze the costs for the support of your schools. Evaluate it fairly, realizing your school plant and the many advantages your pupils enjoy, and I am sure that you will arrive at the conclusion that your investment is a sound, efficient, and economical one. Do not lay the blame of the rising costs on the fact that you have a new school. When you do this you do not take into consideration all factors of the situation. When all factors are considered I am sure that you will find your plant of today much better and more effective than would be the old ones repaired and put into the condition they should be to give the pupils similar advantages which they enjoy today.

It has been a pleasure working with all the people concerned with the school during the past year. I am grateful to Headmaster Frederick Smith for the arrangements whereby we were able to use the same Nurse. The P. T. A., Library Trustees, School Board, Teachers and citizens have been most helpful. For all this I am grateful. I hope that our future years will continue to be as pleasant and productive.

The following is a summary of the work done by the Nurse for the past year September 6, 1951 to January 31, 1952 :

Pupils inspected 88—School Visits 20—Home Visits 3

All pupils have been weighed, measured and examined by the School Nurse. Individual inspections were made when necessary for head and skin infections.

Dr. Adrian Marshall gave thorough physical examinations to 15 pupils with the following results :

Enlarged tonsils	6
Creptic tonsils with adenitis	1
Enlarged adenoids	2
Defective teeth	4
Defective vision	4
Enlarged glands	4
Cardiac condition	2

One pupil was taken to Dr. McIver for Vision Tests and glasses while four were taken to Dr. Wolston and Dr. Snow for the same.

One pupil was vaccinated by Dr. Marshall.

Appointments have been made with Miss Joanna Carter to give Patch Tests within a short while. Hearing Tests are to be given the pupils when the Audiometer can be obtained. This is expected shortly.

All Health records have been examined and completed to date. The Nurse has treated many small cuts and bruises.

The Red Cross has furnished the school with Vitamin pills and Cod Liver Oil. These are being administered daily to the children.

I wish to thank the Red Cross, the parents, the teachers and the school authorities for their cooperation.
