

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear reports of agents or auditors and the budget committee heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$10,567.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,320.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year, \$300.00 of the appropriation to apply on the Hospital debt.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8,000.00 for summer maintenance and \$3,000.00 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks and make appropriation of the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$457.39 and the State to give \$1,829.56 to be expended on Class V highways and make appropriation of the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Hydrant Service.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 toward the expenses of a series of Band Concerts during the ensuing year.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be paid as salary to the members of the New London Fire Company.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 toward maintenance of the Skating Rink at Little Lake Sunapee.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$194.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other towns of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for cooperating in the construction of "water holes" for fire protection.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to purchase and place on the graves of the Revolutionary Soldiers suitable markers as provided by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for Police Patrol for houses closed through the winter.
- 19. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken at a previous meeting adopting the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.



TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

Librarian's Report

The eleventh year of Tracy Memorial Building has been a year of increase in activities and service. A perusal of the statistics of the year presents this fact in

graphic manner.

The total circulation for the year was 16,323, an increase of nearly 1,000 over last year's record. Of these books 9,696 were fiction, 3,750 non-fiction. 2,499 magazines were circulated and 460 pictures. 28,489 people visited the building. This item alone shows an increase of 4,264 over the previous record of 24,225 in 1931-32.

1141 books have been added to the library this year. Of this number 530 were gifts as we have been the recipients of many generous gifts of books. Through the interest of Mrs. Helen P. Blake we received a gift of 52 valuable recent books from Dr. William Lyon Phelps. Other generous gifts have been made by Mrs. Jane A. Tracy, Mrs. Mary Prescott, Mrs. Henry Marvin, Mrs. Louise Q. Weed, Mr. Samuel H. Hollis, Miss Margaret Gilman and others.

Through the generosity of Mrs. Tracy many issues of five of our best magazines have been bound. We now have bound files of the Atlantic Monthly for 21 years, Harper's Magazine for 31 years, the National Geographic Magazine for 19 years, the Century Magazine for 16 years and Scribner's for 21 years. Mrs. Tracy also gave us two Royal typewriters and a painting of a red fox which is hung in the assembly hall.

Rear Admiral (Retired) Lloyd Chandler gave us a file of a newspaper printed in Lahore, India, for the British soldiers, containing the first edition of Rudyard

Kipling's autobiography "Something of Myself".

The building has been used by the various clubs and town organizations as usual. In addition to this the Colby Centennial Committee used our building for many meetings as well as pageant rehearsals; the Boy Scouts have had rehearsals in our hall; the School Board, Superintendent of Schools and High School Principal interviewed candidates in our club room; a group of 13 men had a checker tournament during the winter; the school used our basement for showing moving pictures and for a pageant; the Grange and Hospital Aid Association have had committee meetings here; while the town Budget Committee and Sunapee-Dartmouth Regional Association have used our building as a central

meeting place.

Besides these uses of the building, other services to the community have been cooperation with Colby Junior College in many ways connected with the celebration of its centennial including the lending of many books and magazines for reference and of articles for display in their historic exhibit; the borrowing of books from the N. H. L. A., the State Library, the Boston Public Library, and Dartmouth College Library for classes and individuals. We have given six boxes of books to the Wilmot Library, a large collection of books to the Danbury C. C. C camp, and a few books and magazines to the Alstead Library. We have secured each term Traveling Libraries for the grade rooms in the school from the N. H. L. C. Collections of books have been sent directly from our library to the Elkins School many times during the school year.

The Forum met 17 times during the winter. The meetings were well attended and much enjoyed. We take this opportunity of thanking the speakers who so generously gave their services to keep the 1935-36 Forum up to the high standard of previous years.

The personnel of the library staff remained the same as that of the latter half of the previous year. Dorothy

Goings acted as substitute at the charging-desk.

The musical activities were increased. In addition to choir rehearsals each week, music instruction in the Colby Hill School and the Elkins School four days a week, 487 private piano lessons were given in the building and 27 violin lessons to a class of seven. Instruments for this class were loaned by the building.

Good Book Week was observed by a lecture, "A Yankee in Africa" by Mr. Ira H. Morse. Through the cooperation of Colby Junior College this lecture was given in the Town Hall so that a large audience might be accommodated. Two store windows were decorated with new books illustrating the week's slogan "The world today for young readers." Two lectures on the use of the library were given to the school children and a test in the form of a "spelling match" was given to prove how well they had absorbed the information given them. From the N. H. L. C., a collection of new children's books called the Traveling Book Exhibit was borrowed and exhibited during this week. Other exhibits shown in the building at this time were: pictures of library buildings, and a bookcraft exhibit illustrated by some of the beautiful books which the library owns.

The holiday season brought many pleasant activities. The outdoor tree was enjoyed by everyone as were the garlands and many-colored lights which made the entrance to the building resplendent. The interior of the building was decorated with evergreen garlands, red lights and silver bells. Christmas posters and picture bulletins were displayed. Little lighted Christmas houses arranged on cotton snow on a table, delighted the children. A decorated tree was placed in the Children's Room. This tree yielded gifts to the children on Saturday afternoon. The bulletin board in the entrance hall displayed a remarkable collection of photographs of many paintings of "Adoration of the Magi" by old masters. The usual Christmas gathering at the library took the form of a religious vesper service with a program of Scripture readings by Rev. H. W. Buker, Christmas carols played by some of the younger piano pupils, a Christmas prayer read by Miss Emily Squires, and other appropriate readings given by friends of the library. Piano and clarinet solos opened and closed the program.

Open House was held on New Year's Day. Many guests were present to enjoy our hospitality. The building was made festive with fires in the fire-places and the Christmas decorations. White and silver was the color scheme carried out in the basement where

library friends as hostesses served punch and cakes. During the afternoon music furnished by Alice Todd, pianist, Mildred Messer, soprano, and Barbara Bool, vio-

linist, was enjoyed.

Other Holiday-Week observances which took place in the building were: a children's New Year's party, a Christmas pageant presented to the Woman's Club, a King's Daughters Christmas party and a Christmas pageant given by the children of the lower grades.

A lecture "The Realm of the Honey Bee" was given in the spring by Phillip E. Crane of Middlebury, Vt.

Miss Vivian Nicholas of the Art Department of Colby Junior College held an exhibit of her paintings and drawings. To open the exhibit a tea was given to members of Colby faculty by Miss Nicholas and Miss Melanie M. Muller. Music was furnished for this event by Miss Laura Shields, Miss Florence Leach and Miss Florence Barbiers.

In December the Shimo Japanese block prints were hung. The Mary Vaux Walcott prints of flowering trees were displayed as a part of the Arbor Day observance.

During the summer months, when our library is visited by people from other communities, two exhibits of note were displayed. Oil paintings of landscapes in this vicinity were exhibited by Mr. Gustave Wiegandt of New York. On the opening day an invitation salon was held. The artistic photographs of Mr. George Slade of George's Mills and Chelsea exhibited for several weeks, have come to be anticipated with pleasure each year.

Four musicales have contributed to the pleasure of our guests. Sixteen pupils of Alice Todd gave a pleasing recital. Miss Phyllis Plumpton of Manchester entertained with a program of piano selections, readings and vocal solos on a Sunday afternoon. On September second, Edith Stearns, pianist, and Bernard Williams, clarinetist, gave a recital. Later in the month a musicale was given by Alice Todd, Barbara Bool, Edith Stearns and Bernard Williams. After the program a reception was given to Mrs. Tracy and the musicians.

Other social events of the year included a card party given by the Woman's Club, a St. Patrick's Day Party for the Stamp Club, a tea for visiting librarians during the N. H. L. A. convention, and a card party given by

the Hospital Aid.

There have been ten small exhibits. Among the most interesting were an exhibit of Pueblo Indian handcraft loaned by Miss Eleanor Hope Johnson and an exhibit of handwork by the local troops of Boy Scouts. Among articles shown in an historical exhibit was a very old tea pot loaned by Mr. James Hayes. This teapot came from the Fairbanks House in Dedham, the oldest house in America. It had been handed down in the family for nine generations, Mr. Hayes being a lineal descendent of Mary Fairbanks who first owned it.

Desk and table exhibits contributed by many people have included many old pictures, some tiny or very old books and newpapers, and the three prize poems written

by members of the Woman's Club.

To stimulate reading and to present books to fill every want, and appeal to varied interests, 38 book displays

under as many captions were arranged.

Instead of the birthday displays which were used last year, we now present a favorite author each week with a short biography, a portrait and a collection of his books on the study table.

From this mere summary of the work of Tracy Memorial Building during its eleventh year we believe you may realize in some measure its ever-increasing service

and value to the community.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

At the annual meeting, September 22, 1936, various suggestions were offered for improvements at the hospital. We feel quite pleased that so many of them have been taken care of, namely: repairing the operating room floor, replacing all old mattresses with new ones, and painting various articles of furniture in private rooms which our budget would not allow us to replace. Other improvements include new inlaid linoleum in the kitchen, a suction machine for tonsilectomies and the installation of electric refrigeration.

Gifts include an emergency light for the operating room, to be used when electricity goes off, money for room furnishings, a picture for the reception room, bed linen, blankets and dishes and various other items of money and useful articles from other friends of the hospital for which we are most grateful.

Donation Day was the most successful since it was originated, bringing in the largest amount and variety of canned goods, and \$80.00 in money.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Attendance

There has been an improvement in attendance, with less tardiness. The Elkins School is to be especially commended for its high per cent of attendance (97.62) and low number of tardinesses (6). The cooperation of parents and pupils has made possible last year's good record.

The enrollment in the primary room (grades 1 and 2)

is larger than it has been for several years.

A New Department

This year we have a fifth full-time teacher in the High School, Miss Ruth Hafford, who graduated from Plymouth Normal School last June. She teaches typewriting, Junior Business Training, Economics, Bookkeeping, and History of Civilization. Since these courses are approved under the regulations of the State Board of Education, full credit is given to pupils taking them. Typewriting for the past two years has been an extra course without credit. An additional teacher made possible offering a new course:—
"The Home: Its Construction and Operation." Since everybody will live in a home it is very important that young people learn the essential principles of building or renting, equipping, and managing a home. Very few schools, outside of domestic arts courses, present such information to both boys and girls.

There is a noteworthy revival of Latin this year, thirteen

pupils enrolling in the beginners' course.

Besides Miss Hafford we have two other new teachers this year. Miss Alice Upton, a graduate of Keene Normal School, with two years' experience, teaches English and History in the High School. Miss Helen Fleming, also a graduate of Keene Normal School, with seven years' experience, is in charge of grades one and two.

Our teachers are unusually efficient and work together in perfect harmony. We appreciate, too, having a clean, comfortable building such as our conscientious janitor

maintains for us.

We are glad to have Mrs. Alice Drew with us again, through the continued interest and generosity of Mrs. Jane Tracy. She teaches music in the High School, grades seven and eight, and Elkins School, besides individual instruction given at the library.

School Work

Each year we give to the elementary pupils standard tests in fundamental subjects. Reading tests were given last fall in all grades except the first and all were well above the standard scores. Arithmetic and language tests were given in grades 4-8 inclusive. In language we were considerably above the standards. In arithmetic computation and reasoning we were above except in two tests (out of ten).

In the spring equivalent tests will be given to show the progress which individuals and classes have made during the year. The tests are useful for diagnostic purposes and indicate what type of instruction should be undertaken to

remedy defects.

Each year the State Department of Education gives to seniors in all high schools of the state a few tests in fundamental subjects. Last spring tests were given in English grammar and arithmetic. The New London Seniors were above the average in all these tests.

Free distribution of milk is being continued this year by the School Board. Forty pupils are each receiving a half-

pint bottle of milk every school day.

Teachers' Meetings

The teachers of this supervisory union have held several meetings, as in other years, for the study of a special topic. In the past three years we have discussed study habits, reading, and character education. This fall we studied methods of teaching arithmetic. Professional books on this subject were furnished each school. The teachers met in three groups according to the grades they teach, each group being in charge of a chairman. The discussions proved very interesting and helpful. The findings of each group were summarized and given to each teacher. A copy was also sent to the State Board of Education containing some suggestions for a future revision of the state program of studies.

Finances

The total of the budget for 1938-39 is practically the same as the budget for the present school year. The increase over last year's expenditures is due mainly to the fact that we have a fifth teacher on full time in the High School. This makes it possible to offer additional commercial courses and give credit for typewriting. The part-time instruction previously given, although entirely adequate and satisfactory, was not eligible for credit owing to the state ruling that high school teachers must have four years of post-secondary training.

There will apparently be fewer tuition pupils next year. The estimated balance of next June 30 (\$1,025.00) will be much smaller than the balance on hand last July 1 (\$1,536.13). The estimated income, therefore, for 1938-39, other than taxation, will be considerably smaller. The slightly larger appropriation needed this year is not due to increased expenditures as much as it is to decreased mis-

cellaneous income.

It is our earnest desire to cooperate with the parents whenever possible. Some of the parents have visited school this year but we should like to have others. We are always glad to welcome visitors even though they can stay only a few minutes. We are always open to constructive criticisms and suggestions.

I again wish to express my deep appreciation of the harmonious cooperation of School Board, teachers, and all

others connected with the schools.
