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

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby Notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March next, at two of the clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the next year ensuing.

2. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

3. To vote on the question "Shall Sweepstake tickets be sold in this city or town?"

4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

5. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the collector.

6. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$15,000 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

7. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sales.

8. To see what action the Town will take toward the

acceptance of reports of Town Officers, as printed in the Town Report.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) bequeathed to the Town of Newfields by trust and Will of Ida A. Green under certain conditions as set forth in the Trust and Will as follows: "To the Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, for public school purposes the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00). Said distribution is to be made only if the governing body of said Town of Newfields shall forthwith upon my death enter into a written undertaking with my Trustee that a course in temperance will be taught in the town school system. If such written undertaking is not forthcoming, the distribution directed in this subparagraph shall not be made;" and further to authorize the Selectmen to pay the bequest over to the School Board for public school purposes, subject to the approval and under the direction of the School District of Newfields, N. H.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to file in behalf of the Town an application (in form and manner required by the United States and in conformity with P.L. 560, 83rd Congress) and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in the amount of \$5,000.00, to be made by the United States to the Town of Newfields to aid in defraying the cost of preliminary report and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Newfields, and, further, to see if the Town will make the necessary arrangements to provide such additional funds as may be required to defray the cost of preparation of the report and plans.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed four hundred ninety dollars

(\$490.00) for the establishment of an aeronautical fund as provided by RSA 423:6.

13. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Aeronautical fund to the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission the sum of four hundred ninety dollars (\$490.00) for use for the purposes authorized by RSA 423:7 & 8.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of a representative to represent the Town at future regional meetings in connection with a regional airport.

15. To see if the Town will vote to set up a Capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck and, if so voted, to see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for that purpose during the current municipal year.

16. On petition of Primo Semprini and eighteen others to see if the Town will vote to extend the existing water system from present termination on Piscassic Road to Dixon Avenue and including Dixon Avenue and Otis Road to McLeod residence; and for that purpose to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary funds by the issuance of its bonds or notes to defray the cost of extension of mains and erection of other necessary facilities to provide an adequate system; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest to be borne by said bonds or notes; the denominations and form of said bonds or notes, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, and terms of sale; and further to authorize the Selectmen to sign and affix the Seal of the Town to said bonds or notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for construction of a skating rink on town property.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has held 10 meetings during 1963 on the third Tuesday of each month with the exception of August and December. These meetings are held in the Selectmen's Office at the Town Hall, and any one is welcome to attend.

Allen Wright was appointed by the Selectmen to the Planning Board when Thomas J. Kimball's term expired and he did not wish to be reappointed. At an organizational meeting Reginald Sharp was elected chairman of the Planning Board and Mary B. Hallinan clerk.

In February the Planning Board made a listing of the various areas in town that might be suitable for industrial use; wrote the owners of each piece of land to see whether or not they might be interested in declaring said land for this purpose. Four replies were received in the affirmative. These pieces of land are now listed with the State Planning Board, who has brought at least one party, seeking an industrial site, to look at the land. We are in hope that something might still develop at one of the sites.

The Planning Board has met with the Water Commissioners, the Chief and Assistant Chief of the Fire Department, the Chief of the Police Department, the Highway Agent, and the School Board for a discussion as to whether or not there might be something the Planning Board could do to be of assistance to the various town agencies as far as long-range planning is concerned.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Fire Chief

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire services expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention, however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump — its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year-round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

SCHOOL WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newfields qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Newfields Town Hall, in said district, on the ninth day of March, 1964, at six o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

(Business Meeting to be Held at 8 p.m.)

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the Districts.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against and appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Equalization Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

9. To see if the School District of Newfields will vote to authorize and direct the School Board to enter into a written undertaking with the Trustee under the Trust and/or Will of Ida A. Green in which the School Board shall agree that a course in temperance will be taught in the town school system; an affirmative vote to be effective provided that Article 10 in the Town Warrant is adopted; said Article 10 reads as follows: "to see if the town will vote to accept the sum of Two Thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) bequeathed to the Town of Newfields by the trust and will of Ida A. Green under certain conditions as set forth in the Trust and Will as follows: 'To the Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, for public school purposes the sum of Two Thousand dollars (\$2,000.00). Said distribution is to be made only if the governing body of said Town of Newfields shall forthwith upon my death enter into a written undertaking with my Trustee that a course in temperance will be taught in the town school system. If such undertaking is not forthcoming, the distribution directed in this subparagraph shall not be made.' And further to authorize the Selectmen to pay the bequest over to the School Board for public school purposes, subject to the approval and under the direction of the School District of Newfields, New Hampshire."
10. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.43 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
11. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from

the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

12. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
13. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the chairman of the school board as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual School District meeting was held at the Town Hall on March 11, 1963. District officers elected for the following year were; Lindsey R. Brigham, Moderator; Mary B. Hallinan, Clerk; Frances Winkler, Treasurer; William Tebo, Member of the School Board for three years. The board elected Alfred Conner, Jr. as Chairman and William Tebo as Secretary.

With one hundred and fifteen students enrolled in the Newfields School, it was necessary to continue to use the basement of the library for the second grade. Although this has the approval of the State Board of Education, it is a necessary arrangement rather than a good classroom for either teacher or students. However, we are grateful to the Library Trustees for their co-operation in renting us this needed space.

Improvements at the school building have been routine repairs, with the exception of painting the sixth grade room, which completes the repainting of the two older classrooms. All floors are refinished twice a year, which makes a major job unnecessary.

A memorial fund established in memory of Robert Collins Lawrence, by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. Kent Lawrence, will provide a central library for the school. Books chosen by Mrs. Phinney and Mr. King, who is an authority on School Libraries, will make it possible for all classes to have reference books and reading material for use in class projects or by individual pupils.

Bookcases and all cataloguing materials are to be provided by the School District. Volunteer help will be needed to assist during the school hours when the library will be open.

A new screen was purchased for the movie projector, which is in demand for many classes. The fourth grade

is having a T.V. program on Social Studies. The third, fifth and sixth grades are having a Science program.

Three buses transport the children in town and to and from Exeter, with the cost of one bus being shared by a neighboring town.

With the discontinuance of the noon train, the basic reason for having a policeman on duty has been eliminated. However, it was felt important to retain him to slow down traffic on Main Street, during the lunch hour. Since the middle of January, this has been discontinued. We do thank the Police Department for their support of the School Safety Patrol.

The P.-T.A. once more deserves our thanks for its continued support of the dental, hot soup and milk programs. Volunteer drivers and hot soup volunteers make it possible for these programs to be carried on.

At this time, we should also like to thank Mr. Hoyt, our Superintendent, Mr. King, our Teacher Consultant, our excellent staff of teachers and nurses, our janitor and all of those people whose continued interest help to further good education for our children.

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The art program has enriched the school curriculum by providing experience in this field for all of the pupils. Many of the boys and girls show interest and talent.

It is worthy of note that the Newfields School District has received increasing amounts of Federal Aid under Public Law 874 and of State Foundation Aid during recent years. For the school year 1961-1962 \$5,763.00 was the income from Federal Aid; for the year 1962-1963 it was \$6,492.00 and it is expected that about \$9,400.00 will be received during the school year 1963-1964.

The income for 1961-1962 in State Foundation Aid was \$8,355.09; in 1962-1963 it was \$10,842.69; and \$12,325.88 has been received for 1963-1964.

A portion of this report is a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union #16. He presents some of the work which he is doing in his role as supervisor of elementary education. He reports as follows:

In the constitution and by-laws of the New Hampshire Association of Teacher Consultants there appears as part of the purposes "to promote means of bringing the highest educational standards to the communities." One of the items that affects educational standards most is the responsibility that the teacher consultant has for providing leadership in curriculum development.

One of the areas of the curriculum that has given us a chance for a great deal of in-service work is that of mathematics. You may hear young primary grade children speaking of "sets," "equations," "base ten" and "inverse operations." There is no cause for alarm. The children are probably a part of an arithmetic program being tried in the grades.

The trend in arithmetic is toward a more meaningful, exciting and discovery presentation. It has been labeled "modern mathematics," but merely means that approaches and some of the content are new.

As teacher consultant I have tried to provide opportunities for teachers in this area to become familiar with some of the new methods. Last spring many teachers took an extension course in modern mathematics sponsored by the University of New Hampshire and held in

Exeter. This fall I held a series of meetings where teachers could view some films in new mathematics approaches and discuss them. I have encouraged teachers to watch a weekly television program on the same topic. Many opportunities have been provided for sharing ideas, materials and techniques. I am happy to say that teachers are taking seriously the roles that they may play in new mathematics presentations.

Curriculum change of a major nature is a slow process. One does not rush the school system into a new program without all the in-service background mentioned above. New mathematics is not in an experimental stage. The research, as well as some of the practice in the elementary classroom, has been going on for twenty years or more. Now, however, new text materials have been written for the elementary grades. We have tried some of these in our classroom this year on an experimental basis with consumable forms. At this writing an extensive testing program of arithmetic concepts is underway. I am attempting to evaluate the results and reach some conclusions about the programs being used.

The final step is the formation of a committee made up of selected classroom teachers and principals with the teacher consultant acting as co-ordinator. This group will have regular meetings twice each month. It will be the job of the committee to make a text-book selection in mathematics that we can use in the school years ahead. This is a big responsibility and will take many hours of working, thinking and talking before any results will be realized. The goal will be to select the best possible program for the highest educational standards we can achieve in mathematics.

Another important area which I should like to mention briefly is that of providing students with a wealth of materials both of a non-fiction and a fiction nature. Many educators feel today that library provisions in elementary schools are an essential and basic service. Our children today require a full range of materials, accessible to and serving all of the children. Research has shown that learning takes place faster when it is reinforced with many supplementary materials. In schools sufficiently large enough we are either moving toward or now have a centralized school library. In the smaller schools we shall attempt to build up classroom collections necessary to provide proper sources to aid children in their "quest for knowledge." I am working

closely with teachers and pupils not only to aid in the building up of these services but to provide help and guidance in the use of them.

These two mentioned areas of work indicate some of the curriculum development that is taking place. Continuing along with these are the classroom visitations, teacher conferences, classroom demonstrations, supervision of the testing program, preparation of guides and bulletins, and any of the other "service roles" that the teacher consultant feels are aimed "to promote means of bringing the highest educational standards to the community."

It will be a very worthwhile project if a school library can be initiated as a memorial to Robert Lawrence. As our fund of knowledge increases, it becomes more and more important for every school, whether on the secondary level or on the elementary level, to have a resource library within the school where materials can be obtained readily when needed. This should be a valuable asset to the school.

I am sincerely hoping that Congress will pass legislation which will permit prayers and Bible readings in the schoolroom.

In the light of recent events, we should all rededicate ourselves to the task of inculcating love of country and patriotism in the hearts and minds of our school children.

The Parent-Teacher Association demonstrates its interest in the school program in several ways.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

It is gratifying to receive support from the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Child health is a community concern, but parents have the primary responsibility for the health of their children. Good health services exist where there is cooperation among parents, the school and community agencies.

Although Speech Therapy is available, some parents seem to consider such help a disgrace to themselves and to their children. Probably nine out of ten cases of speech difficulties in children are correctable. They *all* need attention, however, since very few ever recover spontaneously. Many will become worse if neglected. The ability to express oneself today is of increasing importance — so why handicap a child needlessly?

A society changing as ours is today increases the uncertainty and unpredictability of life which is shared by all generations. Some of our children, first grade through senior high, show this anxiety in their unstable behavior. We are fortunate in our area to have psychiatric and Family Service help, but the needs for stable emotional health are far from met. The increase in numbers of disturbed children far outdistance the available services. The schools and communities cannot solve these problems alone. Help is needed from the State and Federal levels.

Naturally, your School Health Services deal with problems, but our report is not all in this category. We are pleased to write that on the whole we are above the average community in health and protective measures, and that most of the children are healthy and happy. We can thank the excellent cooperation we receive from school boards, administrators, teachers, parents and community agencies in bringing this about.

One request we would like to make is for better community education at the adult level in all phases of physical and emotional health. In this way, the family will be better prepared to instill in its children good health habits and practices.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

As the music supervisor, I have tried to include, in my teaching, as many as possible of those musical activities recommended for today's school music program.

In addition, an excellent television program in music education is now available, which helps to enrich the school program.

Placing of the child's voice, ear-training, rhythmic activities, work with rhythm band, learning to play tonettes and the auto-harp, becoming familiar with the fundamentals of music, reading notes, singing in unison and in parts, participation in singing games and folk and square dancing are all included in the school program.

A school record player may be used at any time for listening, music appreciation, or singing with sing-along records.

In the spring, the operetta, "The Magic Charm," was presented at the Town Hall by Mrs. Chick's pupils. With the proceeds, Mrs. Chick's class took a history trip to Boston, and a contribution was made to a library fund for the school, which has since been named the Robert Lawrence Memorial Library Fund.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The importance of creative expression in the growth of children has long been recognized. Most concepts of Art Education demand a broad field of art experience, enabling a child to work in many media.

The purchase of more art supplies for the year 1963-64 has made possible a much richer program for every child. For example, the fourth, fifth and sixth grades have their own water color boxes and brushes, for which they are responsible. With more poster paint, the children have been able to do more painting. Some have never worked in this medium. More pastels has meant that each child has had his own box to work with, rather than sharing with another child. Work in a material much like clay, has given the children an understanding of sculpture.
