To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and polls close at six p. m., to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town highways.
- 6. To see if the Town will accept State aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$445.88.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$920.00 for street lighting.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for care of cemeteries as provided in Chapter 55, Section 4, Laws of 1925.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Northwood Public Library.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote a discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before July 15, 1943.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to make a map of wood and lumber lots.
- 14. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms, others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by wholehearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

- 1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.
- 3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.
- 4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.

5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

The schools have cooperated in many forms of war effort, and have handled some projects that the government felt no other agency could do. Some activities, such as war savings campaigns, junk salvage, and war information, have been special phases of the usual education in thrift, history, geography, and civics. Beginning with the sugar rationing and issuance of War Ration Book No. 1 last May, certain teachers have served as official "School Site Administrators" while others, together with citizen volunteers, have assisted in the Institutional Sugar Registration, two separate gasoline registrations, the oil registration, and (in the near future) the "Point Registration" of processed fruits and vegetables and issuance of War Ration Book No. 2. The first and last mentioned projects were conducted in the two elementary schools, the others at the Academy. School transportation has been subject to gasoline and tire restrictions of the rationing boards, while mileage and routes are subject to scrutiny by the Office of Defense Transportation, but so far without serious curtailment of service. During the shortest days of winter, the time of opening and closing school has been fixed at one-half hour later than usual by the clock, or half way between war time and standard time. This arrangement was deemed advisable to carry out the purposes of the time zone regulations to the greatest possible extent.

Undoubtedly the greatest influence now stirring within education, as within the human race as a whole. is caused by the development of the Air Age. stance, the subject of geography is profoundly altered. We look at the globe from a different angle, centering our attention upon the North Pole instead of the two great oceans. Natural boundaries, such as mountain ranges, deserts, bodies of water, which have hitherto determined the political relations of races and nations. now mean little to a transportation agency that speeds nearly as fast as a bullet along the "great circles" of the earth. Flying time is the modern measure of distance. Our children see airplanes flying overhead nearly every day; they learn to report their types and describe their courses as Air Spotters. Thousands will be trained to fight from these planes during this war and to fly the skyways or earn their living in the aircraft industry after the war. This new dimension of human activity has already a literature of its own, created to express the technical and emotional experiences involved. Aeronautics opens a new and wide field for the practical application of mathematics, all the sciences, and indeed every sphere of learning. A great part of the intellectual ability and practical skill of mankind will be occupied from now on keeping human affairs abreast of these soaring wings of Progress.

While the instruction in all school grades is affected somewhat by the Air Age, this is especially true in the high school, where the required knowledge and skills will be so soon put into practice by many about to graduate. In preparation for such instruction now being given in the Academy, Headmaster Foote took an intensive course offered by the Civil Aeronautics Administration at Plymouth Teachers College last summer.

David Little, a senior at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy, won first place in the "small school division" of the state one-act play contest, with his play entitled "Tomorrow." David also won first prize in the "original division" of the speaking contest at the University of New Hampshire with his oration "The American Way." He is at present a student at Keene Teachers College.

On account of war conditions, fewer contests and other similar student activities will be held. Rural teachers' institutes were omitted this fall, while the state convention of the N. H. State Teachers' Association was held in local sections for one day only, in combination with County Institutes (usually held in the spring). National conventions of the National Education Association and School Administrators have been called off. Local groups are thus more than ever put upon their own responsibility for upholding the standards of the profession.

One of the ways in which we can keep our country strong is by attending to the health of school children. While this must always be the responsibility chiefly of parents, the schools are doing much to help. Special instruction in nutrition is called for in war time. The school lunch, supplemented by federal surplus commodities, is now more valuable than ever. In many countries the war is taking a frightful toll from child health and welfare. The work of our school

nurses in constant examination, checking, and applying measures before serious epidemics or health deficiencies can get a foothold is important at any time, but especially now. Miss Margaret Macdonald, R. N., has continued to carry on this work, including the Dental Clinic sponsored by the Harvey Lake Women's Club, with Dr. C. H. Manning as the dentist.

During the present school year, the District has received from the Selectmen the sum of \$1,000 realized on the 99-year lease of school lots. This land was set aside in the early days of the town for the support of schools. Some income has been received every year. . but lately it has become evident that the land was more valuable for development. In laying out the lots recently leased, the advice of the State Planning Commission was sought and acted upon. The town will be benefited by the accession of considerable taxable propertv. It was deemed wise to devote the proceeds of the leases to permanent school improvements. Accordingly, by vote of the District, a new floor has been laid at Brookside School, and a stage and other improvements made in the hall at the Ridge School. The balance is available for general school purposes.
