State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote on Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday the 10th day of March next, at ten of the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

The polls will be open from ten o'clock in the A. M. until six o'clock in the P. M. for you to cast your ballot for the following officers:

Selectman	for 3 years
Town Clerk	for 3 years
Road Agent	for 1 year

and to vote on anything that may be on your ballot.

Article 2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$40,000.00 for Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year, and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,475.17 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Act of 1972, to be used towards this appropriation.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V Roads, and will raise and appropriate \$752.23 with a State Contribution of \$5,014.86.

Article 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Street Lights.

Article 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance.

Article 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Orford Free Library and the Orford Social Library.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,600.00 for Ambulance Service.

- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for the use of the Orford Community Health Service.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,300.00 for fire protection.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of the Trust Funds towards the purchase of a Fire Engine.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Parks & Playground Commission.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$694.00 for the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$246.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 to cover the expenses of Memorial Day.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Police protection.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of the Trust Funds towards the purchase of a Town Truck.
- Article 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Planning Board.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Conservation Commission.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the Grading and Reseeding of the Community Field.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for the purpose of updating the Tax Maps.

- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Cottage Hospital to purchase new or replacement equipment used in the diagnosis and care of patients.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with a Data Processing Firm for more efficient management of Town Records.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to hire an outside auditor and if so, to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for said purpose.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of Economic Development for the Town of Orford as seen fit by the Selectmen and the Planning Board.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any City, Town, or other governmental unit of the State to five percent. This article submitted by petition.
- Article 29. To see if the Town of Orford will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the Orford Children's Ski Program.
- Article 30. To see if the Town of Orford will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 for the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council.
- Article 31. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and receive Federal Disaster Assistance Funds, through the State Disaster Coordination Office, and to expend the funds so received to repair the damage to Town Roads and/or Bridges caused by any disaster for which Federal Funds are available.
- Article 32. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees, heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year has been a rather quiet year. We had a difficult spring with several major repairs required on the Piermont Heights Road and the Baker Road. The Town experimented with the concept of recycling at our dump. Otherwise, it has been business as usual with the two new members learning the requirements of the job.

Because of the lack of snow last winter, many of our culverts and bridges filled with ice and, well, you know the rest. We totally rebuilt a 3/4 mile section of the Piermont Heights Road and the lower section of the Baker Road. The culverts on the Piermont Heights Road were increased in size with an additional culvert being added to help prevent the reoccurrence of this expense. The two culverts on the Baker Road which plugged and washed out the lower 1/4 mile of road, were replaced with one large "squash pipe". This project was financed largely with state funds. As a cost saving technique, the culvert by Bert Bean's residence was replaced with two culverts. This winter has demonstrated that this should have been replaced by a single larger-capacity culvert to reduce the ice build-up.

The two photographs of Glenn Pease and Hazel Huckins were completed by Gary Quackenbush and may be seen in the Town Office.

In the Spring, this Board held several meetings on the possibility of recycling at our dump. A committee of David Smith and Richard Bean was appointed for this purpose. David Smith managed the recycling project on a three-month trial basis with his compensation being the materials collected. The project had about a 15% participation from the townspeople. Because of the fluctuating markets, the high cost of transportation to these markets and the necessity of storing large amounts of material, this project has been discontinued.

The Board wishes to thank Richard Butman for all of the work that he has done in moving the town records into the new vault. Since its construction this vault was plagued with a high moisture content. Because of this problem we installed 2 inches of Celetex insulation on the outside of the vault. This was very effective and has solved the problem.

1981 again promises to bring new faces into our town government. The town will miss the dedication and devotion that H. Horton Washburn has contributed to this office. The new Board will face quite a challenge this year.

REPORT OF THE ORFORD PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board met monthly during the past year, and again issues a standing invitation to all with an interest in, or suggestions concerning the present or future development of the Town of Orford, to attend any of its meetings. The meetings are held in the Town Office, Orfordville, on the third Monday of each month at 8:00 p. m.

During the course of the year the Board acted upon a half dozen minor subdivision applications, one of which has made possible a site for the Fire Dept. sub-station near the south end of Indian Pond Road on Route 25-A.

The Board also continued work on a Master Plan under the provisions of RSA 36. A questionnaire was mailed to residents in the summer to help the Board measure public sentiments towards future growth and development. The response in numbers of questionnaires returned was, to say the least, discouraging. Any conclusions that are to be drawn were overshadowed by what the Board and Selectmen can only assume to be apathy.

ORFORD SENIOR CENTER

The Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, a United Way Agency, established a Multi-Purpose senior center to provide services at five sites, for people over 60 in Grafton County, with funding from the Older Americans Act through the State Council on Aging, Town and County monies. Each of these sites have an Advisory Council, which consists of resident representatives from the areas which they serve.

In 1975, the Mascoma site for meals on wheels was opened in Canaan Masonic Lodge, and on July 1976, the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council began managing the Nutrition Sites in Littleton and Plymouth at the request of the State Council on Aging, and on December 21, 1976, the first dinner was served in Orford, on a twice a month base, and with great success, and in March 1979, we started serving dinners and meals-on-wheels once a week "Tuesdays" with the exception of July and August, and holidays. Residents from twelve N. H. towns and Vermont are served in the Congregational Church.

Other services which we extend to the seniors are, Friendly Visitors, Information and Referral, Transportation and Good Neighbor Aide.

Volunteers are available to transport seniors that have no other means to make Medical and Dental appointments, we would like to have advance notice for this service, call Douglas Rolfe 353-4826 or Howard Sommer 353-4576.

REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Due to inflated Nursing Home expenses with somewhat reduced revenues and rapidly increasing costs of welfare reimbursements to the State, our budget year ended very close to the line, with a \$3,620 surplus. Because of the Delegation's decision to use a two-year surplus in one budget year to allow citizens a reduced county tax in FY 1980, the 1981 fiscal year budget resulted in a heavier tax factor making up that decrease as well as offsetting reduced revenues and allowing for standard budget increases.

As with towns, the county welfare assistance programs are increasing and becoming more involved, especially with the current energy crunch and rapidly inflating economy. We also foresee a possible decrease in Federal and State contributions to social service programs which could have considerable impact on local budgets.

The sewage disposal system has progressed slightly, with planning completed and ready to go out for bid. If all goes well, we may be able to submit a final report next year.

The Commissioners worked closely with the Nursing Home Employee Council to set up a wage/benefit package more compatible to the State program for Glencliff employees. The Commissioners hope to work out a job description/wage scale plan for court-house employees in the near future.

Grafton County is gradually converting from a bookkeeping machine system to a computerized system for all county accounts. Payroll was converted effective January 1, 1980, and vendor payment and receipt programs were recently added. Patient accounts and purchase order programs will be added later. The system is too new for comprehensive comments, but we anticipate constructive changes in the overall accounting and reporting system.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday (except holidays) at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m. which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.

DLSRA also funded a seven day a week live ski information phone during the winter of 1979-80.

In addition to these major achievements DLSRA mailed nearly 4,000 vacation kits to people who wrote our office, handled several hundred phone inquiries, prepared several news releases and feature stories for over 90 travel editors throughout the East and established a unique theatre/lodging/dining discount program for summer arts enthusiasts.

(RSA 76:11; 11-a; 13)

RSA 76:11 provides for delivery of the list (warrant) to the collector within thirty days of receipt of approval of the tax rate unless for good cause the time is extended by the department. The collector shall within thirty days after receipt of the warrant from the selectmen (assessors) send out the tax bills unless for good cause the time is extended by this department.

RSA 76:11-a Information Required. The tax bill which is sent to every person taxed, or his agent, if known, as provided in section 11, shall show the rate of municipal, school and county taxes separately, and each bill shall also show the assessed valuation of all lands and buildings for which said person is being taxed. The 1980 rate breakdown reflects a proportionate share of the Reimbursement a/c Property Exempted by 1970 Special Session for each unit of government.

RSA 76:13 provides that interest at 9% per annum shall be charged on all taxes except resident taxes not paid on or before December 1, except that in the case where a tax bill was sent to a taxpayer on or after November 2 and before April 1st, interest shall not be charged until 30 days after the bills are mailed. The collector shall state on the bill the date from which interest will be charged.

The tax bill which you mail must contain the date from which interest will be charged and this date is determined by the date you send the last bill on the list committed to you. RSA 76:13 also requires that you notify this department in writing of the date on which you send the last bill. There is enclosed a form for this purpose.

You are hereby notified to meet at Memorial Hall in said district on Friday, March 6, 1981, at 5:00 P.M. to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer, and two Auditors, each to serve one year, and one member of the School Board, to serve three years. (Polls will open at 5:00 P.M. and will close no earlier than 10:00 P.M.)

NOTE: ARTICLES 2 THROUGH 9 WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED UNTIL 8:00 P.M.

Article 2. To see if the District will adopt the town checklist as the school district checklist as provided in RSA 671:15, such checklist to be used for school district elections and for any other business which may come before the school district meeting.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Article 4. To see what sum of money, in addition to the sum appropriated in Article 3, the School District will raise and appropriate to comply with RSA 273-A (Public Employee Labor Relations Law).

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to establish a contingency fund as part of the regular school district budget and to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for this purpose.

Article 6. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Citizens of Orford:

The Orford schools present unique and significant advantages for the children of our community. Because we are small, students' learning is individualized and much educational growth is evident. The accessibility of the staff to the community provides parents with the opportunity to participate in these individualized concerns. The willingness of a dedicated staff to share amongst themselves and with the community is further evidence that the Orford schools provide positive programs.

Staff and Enrollment

New staff members have joined the Orford ranks. They are: Mr. Gerald Fournier, Principal; Ms. Jody Norskey, first grade teacher; Mrs. Ila Douple, second grade teacher; Mrs. Adrienne Brown, Middle School science teacher; and the new high school teachers: Mrs. Susan Johnson, guidance-English; Mr. Gregory Vennell, science; Mr. Joseph Hadley, art; Mr. Walter Westcott and Mr. Alfred Rucker, custodians. The enrollment has increased since the beginning of the year; so far, it has peaked at 208, up from 197. Some of these are tuition students.

Repairs and Up-Keep

Maintenance is an on-going process. Over the summer the C. E. T. A. program workers, under the able direction of Mr. Robert Thatcher, painted the walls in Memorial Hall, in the high school offices and in some of the high school classrooms. The lawn outside Memorial Hall was reseeded and the rest of the grass area attended to. Some floors were stripped, scrubbed, and either re-waxed or re-sealed. The Middle School rugs were shampooed and all windows in all buildings were washed. Since then, attention has been paid to the boilers, plumbing and electrical aspects of the plant, since they all needed work. Consequently, to reduce future costs, there is now a schedule for maintenance. Dynamic Integrations, of Fairlee, has completed a detailed energy audit, and as a result of this study steps are being taken to reduce energy consumption. Results of our taking action on these suggestions will be announced as soon as they are available. Half of the Middle School has new carpeting, which was donated from the Ray School in Hanover. A special thanks goes to Mr. Barry LeBarron and his Property Maintenance students for their help in repairing equipment that needed attention. These were: Bim & Kerry Willey, Courtney Nolan, Richard Bean, Howard Noyes, Larry Ward, and Dennis Taylor.

Curriculum

Essential student outcome tests, required by the State Department of Education, will be given semi-annually, with the results published later in the spring. The staff has put in many appreciated long hours developing these tests. Also revamped this year as a result of

the district's goals are the program of studies and the curriculum guides. Significant changes were made in some areas which demonstrate the on-going concerns the staff has for quality education. In their on-site visit, the state monitoring team for special education has unequivocally given us high marks for the efforts and emphasis by which identified students are mainstreamed. In fact, it was suggested that we could be a model for other districts throughout the state for those having difficulties with this issue. Thus tributes for their efforts must go to Mrs. Kay Duranty and to her aides, Mrs. Peggy Wedgewood and Miss Linda Sohigian, for their excellent devotion to their students.

At my suggestion, the staff has taken advantage of monies allotted to the field trip account. As a consequence, students have had a chance to see things available to them in near surroundings. Some classes have gone on field trips, while others have had guest speakers. Career education continues to play a role in our plans. Mrs. Johnson has made efforts to that end. ASVAB has tested students' natural aptitudes; colleges have been visited and recruiters have lectured; occupational awareness has begun and career options have been explored. All in all, it was a very good transitional year.

Conclusion

The role of Principal is a demanding one. My appreciation for direction and assistance from Superintendent Dr. Hugh Watson, Assistant Superintendent Larry Cornell, Special Education Director Eugene Roddy, and from Assistant Principal Gerald LeSage is sincere and deep. My gratitude is extended to the various selection committees and to the School Board for having the confidence in my abilities to appoint me to such a responsible position, to the Superintendent's office staff, and to my ever responsible secretary, Janet Kee. Finally, my heartfelt thanks go out to the community and especially to the staff for a job well done in making this a successful school year.
