It is hoped that the Meeting will, at its outset, vote to adjourn matters of appropriations and other Articles of Town business until Tuesday evening, March 14, 1972, at Rollinsford Grade School, at 7:30 PM.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF STRAFFORD, STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town, the 7th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To bring in your ballots for:
 - (a) Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman and Overseer of Public Welfare for a term of three years; Chief of the Fire Department, three members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years.
- ARTICLE 2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the appropriation of a sum of \$400. to pay for the services of a dcg officer to be appointed by the Selectmen, to enforce the dog laws as enacted by Revised Statutes Annotated 466:1 through 43.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to request the Board of Selectmen to draft a "dog leash" law under RSA 466:29.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of One

 Dollar (\$1.00) for the purchase of land, dam and rights of
 the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire, located on both
 sides of the Salmon Falls River, and to authorize the Selectmen to offer the dam to the New Hampshire Water Resources
 Board, and to negotiate the sale of land located in the Towns
 of Berwick and South Berwick to the respective Towns.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed

 Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) for the purpose of acquiring
 land for open space recreation, land fill, dump and town shed
 sites, one site being approximately 66 acres and Lot 14B, Town
 Tax Map. The Selectmen are authorized to apply for and acquire
 any and all State and Federal matching funds for the purchase
 of said land, and the Selectmen are authorized to borrow up to
 Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) and to execute bonds and/or
 notes for the Town's share, said bonds and/or notes to be
 liquidated by annual principal payments not to exceed Two
 Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) each year, plus interest.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000) for the purpose of acquiring a site, said site to be approved by a joint committee of firemen, Selectmen and Planning Board members, and to construct a new fire station on said site. The Selectmen are authorized to execute bonds and/or notes for the purchase of said land,

and construction of said building, not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000), said bonds and notes to be liquidated by annual principal payments not to exceed Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) each year, plus interest.

- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared and submitted by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 9. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 Session of the General Court shall be approved.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the voters of the Town of Rollinsford will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Jeep, old Police cruiser and snow loader which are stored in the town shed.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept and approve that portion of Millbrook Lane which has been hot-topped and constructed in accordance with the Sub-division Regulations, said portion to be accepted consists of the road in Subdivision 1 of the Millbrook Realty, starting at Pine Street and running approximately 1100 feet to the beginning of Subdivision 2.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will approve of having two sessions for the Annual Town Meeting, in Rollinsford, the first session for choice of Town officers elected by an official ballot, and other action required to be inserted on said ballot, and the second session to be held on a date set by the Selectmen for transaction of other business.
- ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Polls to be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and close at six o'clock in the evening.

The Rollinsford Sewer District was very fortunate indeed this past year in that it was chosen to be the location for the provision and installation of, at no charge, a new technique in sludge drying beds. This wedge wire bed was installed by the Hendrick Manufacturing Company of Carbondale, Penna., who are agents for the British based company who devised the beds and which are in use in many parts of Europe. This bed, in Rollinsford, is the first to be installed in this country and is the focal point of many inspection tours. It, so far, has proven very successful and, apparently, has solved our very serious "odor" problem.

Extension of the sewer lines and/or district is still being considered but the costs are frightening and serious consideration will have to be postponed until we can increase our income substantially without increasing our outgo. That is being done to some degree by the new construction within the district.

As always, vistors are welcome at the plant and the superintendent will be glad to answer questions.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT, 1971

Your Conservation Committee was reactivated November 23, 1971 at the request of the selectmen, and the Rollinsford planning board. Since that time several meetings were held to make plans for the improvement, and protection of the towns environment. Your commission is working closely with the planning board, selectmen, the N.H. extension service of Durham, and the Community Planning class also from Durham. Our future plans include the protection, and conservation of the Salmon Falls River, and the brooks, and streams in our town. We are also interested in the development of the playgrounds, and other recreational areas in our town. Our top priorty is the town dump, and the land between the dump, and the river as open space, and recreational purposes. The commission wishes to report that they have received the best of cooperation from the selectmen, and other agency's of the town, county, and state. Any constructive suggestions (in writing) will be most welcome. Citizens are invited to meetings, and to inquire of the members as to the progress being made by your commission.

Martin P. Lussier, Chairman After nearly eighteen months of investigation the Rollinsford Plan Study Report was prepared by the Consulting Planners with the assistance of the Planning Board, Selectmen, other town officials, organizations, and citizens. On the broadest scale, this study has attempted to delineate the nature of Rollinsford, its future development, and the possible alternatives that might be applied to insure a course of development which is in the best interest of the town both physically and economically. Detailed inventories were made of the town's existing land uses, road pattern, school system, public utilities, fire, police, and other community facilities. The economic condition and development possibilities for Rollinsford and the future growth potential of the town's population were also studies. The findings from these inventories and the subsequent analysis and recommendations that were developed were presented in the Plan Report which was approved by the Planning Board and adopted on April 9, 1971, a copy of which is recorded in the office of the Town Clerk.

On April 20, 1971, a special town meeting was held to see whether the voters would adopt the "Zoning Ordinance" as proposed by the Planning Board. The voters approved the ordinance by a vote of 200 to 156. Copies of the zoning ordinance are available at the office of the Selectmen, Town Clerk, and from members of the Planning Board.

The Planning Board received applications from Mr. Douglas Rollins for two major subdivisions in the Millbrook Park area. After a public hearing, both subdivisions were approved. The Planning Board also approved Millbrook Road in Millbrook subdivision No. 1. Mr. Rollins posted a performance bond in the amount of \$10,000 for the completion of Partridge Lane, and a bond for \$30,000 for the continuance of Millbrook Road, through Millbrook subdivision No. 2, to Main Street. In addition, five other small subdivision applications (less than five lots per subdivision) were approved.

Under the subdivision ordinance, as approved in 1970, a five dollar filing fee was required. At the August 10th meeting, the Board voted to waive the fee for small subdivision applications where the town incurred no costs for advertising, etc., retroactive to June 15, 1971.

In September, the Planning Board requested planning assistance from the Community Development faculty and students at the University of New Hampshire. A public information meeting was held in the Rollinsford School, and the most discussed problems were the town hall, the town dump, open space, and recreation. The Community Development class at UNH worked with members of the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, and the Selectmen on various projects during the fall semester, and some of these students will continue during the spring semester on the development of a community attitude survey.

The Planning Board is currently working on a study of the Town Hall, Fire Station, and Police Station together with the Selectmen and a special study team comprised of interested citizens in the village.

Douglas Rollins was chosen Chairman, Ovid Viel was chosen as Vice Chairman and Fred Green chosen clerk.

The rules governing actions of the Board of Adjustment are included in the Zoning Ordinance, and, following them, the Board has acted on four cases.

PROPOSED SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Rollinsford qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School in said district on the fourth day of April 1972, at 7:30 0'clock in the after noon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the District will:
- a. Approve the dual enrollment plan between the district and the St. Thomas Aquinas High School, said plan to be: educational offerings will be provided approximately 12 students at St. Thomas Aquinas High School for the school year 1972-73: Algebra, Math 9, Geometry, Biology, Advanced Biology, Physics, Electronics, Art and Physical Education. The faculty will consist of an administrative staff and 8 1/5 teachers, and which plan shall be administered by school district of Dover and further authroize the school board to sign the necessary agreements to implement the plan.
 - b. Authorize the school board to assign certain students, who are residents of the districts to the dual enrollment classes administered by the district of Dover and further authorize the school board to make such contractural arrangements that may be necessary to implement said assignment of students.
 - c. Appropriate the sum of for the payment of the cost of tuition incurred by the assignment of said students to the dual enrollment program administered by the district and to authorize the school board to apply for any grants under RSA 198:21, which funds will be credited to the district.

ROLLINSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT

1972-72 Proposed Budget

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD:

Attached is the proposed School Board Budget for the 1972-73 school year. The budget has been reviewed by the Town Budget Committee and has its support.

The budget shows an increase of \$19,921 over the adopted budget for 1971-72. Of this increase additional money to be raised by local property taxation is \$7,801.69.

The major increases are represented in tuition and instructional salaries. The tuition increase is \$8,064 caused by the cost of sixteen additional students to Somersworth under the AREA school Plan.

Under instructional salaries the increase is \$8,351. Of this amount \$4,000 is for a recommended one-half time teading specialist, a priority in this budget. The remainder of the increase under this account represents an approximate four percent increase for teacher salaries.

On the next page you will find a listing of increases by account with an explanation. The beginning of the budget will be found on the third page.

The increase this year represents an attempt by the board to recognize the present state of the economy to maintain the present quality of education for Rollinsford students and to go on record as supporting reading as a priority area.

Still to be settled is the issue of participation in the dual enrollment plan between St. Thomas and the Dover School District. The Rollinsford School Board has woted to support participation in the plan as it will result in a lesser cost to the taxpayer.

Initial figures showed that on a first year basis it would cost Rollinsford \$2,844 to support students under dual enrollment compared with \$12,699 for full time education at Somersworth.

When final cost figures are available a special hearing will be held on the dual enrollment issue and a separate article will appear in the school district warrant to seek support for the dual enrollment program.

It is again with pleasure that I present to you a report that covers in part some of the activities of the Rollinsford Grade School during the past year.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE SCHOOL

In accomplishing its purpose of educating for well rounded citizenship, the school is not alone in its efforts. The Home, The Church, and other community agencies share this great responsibility. Schools are established to teach those esentials not taught by other agencies of society. If one of these other agencies fails in its duty toward the education of the child, the responsibility falls upon the school, thereby increasing its already heavy responsibility. Schools began originally with the introduction and wide use of written language, and in the beginning the curriculum were limited to reading, writing, and arithmetic. Cultural advancements and changes in our way of living brought new things to be taught, new methods to be employed, new devices to be used, great expansion of the things to be taught, together with the broadening, and deepening of the scope of the elementary school curriculum. Today because of the ever increasing amount of knowledge that is available. material that was formerly taught in high schools, and in some cases on the graduate level in college is now being taught in the elementary school. The result is that our equipment needs have been and steadily increasing from year to year, in order that we may best help the pupils to successfully compete with youngsters of other

No other people have ever expected so much of its schools, and no other people have ever been so well served by its schools. The amount of education required for complete living has greatly increased while the educational service rendered by the home and some community agencies has declined substantially. As a result, the school's responsibility has increased disproportionately.

The public schools have primary responsibility for some phases of education, partial responsibility for other phases of education, and an over-all responsibility for educational leadership in the community. However the school can affectively assume its role only when it is supplied with the tools with which to work. If tools are lacking then the efforts of the school are curtailed and circumscribed by this lack. Of course the results are observable in that the pupil cannot compete successfully with his peer groups.

- (1) The phases of education for which the school has primary responsibility include reading, handwriting, arithmetic, spelling, and the basic essentials of oral and written composition, the social studies, and science. Reading is an important primary responsibility of the school. Legible handwriting, and proficiency in arithmetic for ordinary needs, and the ability to spell one's written vocabulary are also essential elements of the social studies and science together with a working proficiency in the use of English are also primary responsibilities of the school.
- (2) Responsibility for some phases of education are shared jointly and in varying degrees by the school and other educational agencies (home, church, community, movies, television, and radio

and press). These shared responsibilities include vocational fitness and the broad outcomes of general education such as the American Way of Life, scientific attitude of mind, health and safety, consumer competence, conservation, ecology, thrift and family living, the arts, and moral, ethical, and spiritual values. These shared outcomes include also proficiency in the worthy use of leisure time.

(3) The school has a community-wide responsibility for educational leadership. It supports and encourages other educational agencies in the performance of their established educational functions in order to provide a well-rounded educational program for the community as a whole.

These three responsibilities of the school are not separate and apart, but are interrelated. They operate at the same time. The school, however, sees all three of these functions clearly and strive not alone but with the active aid of the other educational agencies, to perform each of them well. Unless the school performs well the first function (1) it cannot perform well the second (2); and unless it performs the first two efficiently, it cannot perform the third and provide an adequate educational leadership for the community as a whole.

The general aim of elementary education, like the aim of education as a whole is the fullest development of each child to the utmost of the child's own abilities. The child himself must assume responsibility for his own actions and aims for furthering himself along the educational way. The day is long gone when the school could be considered a place for fun and games.

Modern elementary school is concerned with helping each child to affect a behavioral change of each of the following types:

- (A) Knowledge and understanding
- (B) Skill and competence
- (C) Attitudes and Interests

These changes would be applied in the following areas:

- (A) Physical Development
- (B) Individual Social and Emotional Development
- (C) Ethical behavior
- (D) Social Relations
- (E) The Social World
- (F) The Physical World
- (G) Esthecic Development
- (H) Communication
- (I) Quantitative Relationships
- (J) Qualitative Judgments

The following is an extract from the manual published by the State of New Hampshire Department of Education entitled "Minimum Stand-ards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Schools."

The New Hampshire Elementary School Should:

- Have clearly stated purposes that represent its commitment to children, to knowledge, and to society.
- 2. Have a responsibility beyond the teaching of the "basic skills"
- Reflect a concern for self-concept and personality development of children.
- 4. Provide opportunities for children to practice and to learn the skills of effective group living as a part of their learning experiences.
- 5. Demonstrate its respect for the individual.
- Foster creativity in children.
- Recognize and must make provision for meeting the individual differences among children.

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Relate the learning expereinces of children to their world and 8. to reality as they know it.

Provide opportunities for children to share in planning and 9. organizing their classroom activities.

View evaluation as a continuing activity, that is, an integral 10. part of learning rather than an aftermath.

Be responsive to children's needs that arise from conditions 11. peculiar to the home, the community, and the neighborhood. Be free to develop the specifics of its instructional progress.

12.

Use the time of children and staff in ways that are consistent 13. with the purposes of its instructional program.

14. Be of reasonable size and must maintain classroom units that foster optimum learning opportunities.

Purposely place each child in a setting that best promotes his 15. learning

Be attentive to the problems created by transitions from grade 16. to grade, and school to school.

17. Effectively utilize the strengths of its staff.

18. Extend beyond the four walls of the classroom and beyond the physical limits of the school building.

19. Have superior leadership.

20. Have a competent staff.

Assume a leadership role in the community. 21.

FACULTY

There have been several changes and additions to the staff of the Rollinsford Grade School during the past year.

Mrs. Philip Chagnon resigned as teacher of the third grade to devote her full time to the care of her home. She was replaced as a one-half time teacher by Mrs. Evelyn Hodgdon. Mrs. Hodgdon came to us well recommended and having seven and one-half years of previous teaching experience. She teaches the third grade for a half-day and the balance of the day is covered by Mr. Hatfield.

Mr. Anthony Iorio was hired to fill the vacancy in the sixth grade left when Mr. Konczeski resigned to pursue graduate studies at Boston University. Mr. Iorio came well recommended from Somersworth, where he had had a year of teaching experience.

This year we have the services of Miss Elaine Lauterborn Title 1 director of Somersworth. She is working well with the children in the field of Guidance on the Elementary Level.

Mrs. Sterling resigned to devote her full time to her duties in Somersworth. Her place is being capably filled by Miss Janet Snyder. We are sharing her with Somersworth on a half time basis. that is, she is at the Rollinsford Grade School $2\frac{1}{2}$ days per week doing remedial reading, and very capably.

A new addition to the staff is Miss Jean Main, Speech Therapist. We are sharing her also with Somersworth on a part time basis.

Reference to the Faculty Data Sheet will give all the facts concerning these teachers.

HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

The hot lunch of the school is under the management of Mrs. Kathaleen R. Burke, aided by Mrs. Rose Roberts and Mrs. Omer Morest. These ladies are charged with the preparation and serving of the noon meal. They handle their assignments in a very capable manner with menus that are well prepared, well balanced, and appealing. Of economic necessity we are somewhat limited in the kind, and variety of offerings that can be made. We have been forced by the Federal Government to provide a large number of free meals per day. We have not been allowed to raise the prices of the school lunch and the milk to meet the increased costs of purchased supplies.

If the cost of foods continues to rise, and if reimbursement from the Federal is not forthcoming, it will become necessary for the lunch program to increase its prices substantially.

Each meal is a type A meal consisting of:

- A main dish (of meat, or poultry, or fish, or cheese
- (2) A vegetable
- (3) A sandwich of some sort. (Either sweet or plain)
- (4) A $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of homogenized, pasteurized milk
- (5) A dessert

Cost per lunch per child - 30¢ per day

The number of meals served varies from day and from week to week.

The average number served per day - 180 or approximately 69% of the school enrollment.

Title I of the Federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act provides compensatory education for economically and educationally disadvantaged students. Essentially it consists of federal funds allocated to State agencies and thence to local school districts. Grants depend upon the number of low income children who reside in the area. Program planning and development are based upon a realistic assessment of the educational needs of these students. However, once the program is established, any child who has an educational need in the area covered by the program is eligible to participate.

Somersworth and Rollinsford are joined in a cooperative Title I project for the 1971-1972 school year. This is the first year that the two districts have combined to provide for the special needs of the disadvantaged child. Rollinsford's allocation for 1971-72 is \$3,120.00. In addition, \$1,318.88 in unspent funds was carried over from the 1970-71 school year. Added to Somers worth's allocation, the budget for the 1971-72 cooperative project is \$26,620.44.

There are two Title I staff members who serve the Rollinsford Grade School on a regular basis. Elaine M. Lauterborn, Title I Director, is in Rollinsford on Wednesday, all day. Miss Lauterborn is an elementary school counselor working with children individually or in small groups. She helps in the diagnosis of learning disabled children and coordinates school referrals to outside agencies. Mrs. Janet Snyder works $2\frac{1}{2}$ days a week as a reading tutor in the Rollinsfor Grade School. Mrs. Snyder serves primarily the learning disabled child, diagnosing his specific learning problem, and preparing and carrying out remediation programs, and in the consulting with the teachers.

Title I has an advisory committee made up of parents from each school involved in the project and local school and community workers. The Somersworth-Rollinsford Advisory Committee consists of a school nurse from each district, the local Head Start Director, the local Vista Worker, a representative from the Somersworth Catholic School and eight parents. Miss Lauterborn serves as advisor to the committee. Rollinsford participants are Mrs. Lillian Dodier and Mrs. Teresa Cass. This committee plans monthly programs for parents to which all parents of children in the Rollinsford Grade School are invited. There is also another parent group for parents of children with specific learning problems who are receiving special help under this program.

We are very encouraged by the warm response we have received from the Rollinsford School Staff for this program and we hope to continue this Special Services Cooperative Project during the 1972-73 school year.

This class is mainly concerned with language development and aquisition of practical knowledge as a means to effect integration with other students. The students also complete the required grade level work.

This year the morning is spent in Somersworth at the Middle School where the students are integrated with others in shop and gym. The afternoon is spent in Rollinsford where projects are the main concern. The two students make every effort to help other students in the school. Sometimes they help the lower grades in completing some project or exchange some information that they have acquired.

A small mini-grant has been awarded the class to study the correct method of taking pictures and to build a library of photograps to aid in language development.

This class is funded by the State Department of Education.

The height, weight and vision of every student was checked. All defects were reported to the parent. No hearing tests were done at school as all areas are being utilized. A quiet atmosphere is needed for valid results. I did 3 hearing tests in my home at parent's requests.

After many years of service as school physician, Dr. John Murphy resigned. Dr. Peter Lampesis was appointed school physician by the school board.

No immunization clinics were held, but the State of New Hampshire Dental Hygienist spent a day visiting all classes and instructing the students in proper dental hygiene.

The Rollinsford PTO sponsored another successful Dental Clinic in May. The State of N.H. provided all equipment and supplies and the Rollinsford PTO paid the 2 Dental Hygienists. There was no cleaning of teeth allowed by the State Dental Public Health without a fluoride application. 87% of the students took advantage of this program.

RE: Immunization Requirements for School Entrants

Commissioner of Education

I am taking this opportunity to forward to you the information recently received by the Department of Education which relates to Immunization Requirements for school entrants. The purpose of this directive is to make clear to you which immunizations are now required, RSA 200:38 "Control and Prevention of Communicable Diseases" was passed during the last legislative session, July 1971.

200:38 - I states "All children shall be immunized prior to school entrance according to the current recommendations of the State Public Health Agency."

The recommendations of the Division of Public Health become requirements of the State Board and local school boards by this Statute.

The immunizations listed below must be completed prior to school entry:

- Measles Vaccine (live-attenuated) (Having had measles is acceptable, when verified)
- 2. Oral Trivalent Polio Vaccine (Sabin)
- Diphtheria, Pertussis, and Tetanus (DPT) (Adult type DT when over 6 years of age)
- 4. Rubella Vaccine

Routine smallpox vaccination is not recommended.

Other vaccinations are optional.

200:38 - III states "All children shall be examined prior to school entrance to detect symptioms of tuberculosis and may be periodically examined during his school experience."

Tuberculin Test (intradernal) (Within one year prior to school entrance)

It is urgent that parents be informed of this requirement at the earliest possible date, so that the necessary plans can be made with the family physician or other medical resource to accompolish this standard prior to opening of the next school year.

A recommended schedule for intial immunizations and boosters will be made available to all health care providers at an early date by the Division of Public Health.

Nominations for Moderator were apened and Lester Eldridge nominated Edmund Janse, seconded by Robert Garneau. Edward McCann moved that nominations cease, seconded by Ovid Viel.

ARTICLE II. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Nominations for clerk were opened and Edward McCann nominated June Barry, seconded by Jean Dionne. Lester Eldridge moved that nominations cease, seconded by Maureeen Nilson.

ARTICLE III. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE IV. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE V. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Mr. Burke made a motion to accept Article V as follows: School Board \$100 - Truant Officer \$40 - Treasurer \$100 seconded by Edward McCann. Motion carried.

Clara McCann made a motion to establish a salary of \$10.00 per year for the moderator, and a salary of \$25.00 per year for the clerk and that the budget should be increased for the above salaries. Seconded by Maureen Nilson. Motion carried.

ARTICLE VI. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Edward McCann made a motion to accept article VI as read, seconded by Lewis Hatfield. Motion carried.

ARTICLE VII. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mr. Burke made a motion to have the state perform the audits as in the past, seconded by Mr. Eldridge, Motion carried

ARTICLE VIII. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to

be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Paul Janetos made a motion to accept the school boards budget of \$387.195.22 seconded by John Burke.

Mr. Dube made an amendment to the article as follows: That there be no increase across the board on teachers salaries, they should stay on the present budget figure.

After much discussion Mr. Viel suggested that Mr. Janetos and Mr. Dube rescind their motions and start with the budget committees figures and amend it from there.

Mr. Janetos withdrew his motion, Mr. Burke withdrew his second.

Mr. Dube withdrew his motion to amend the article.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Viel made a motion to accept the budget committees budget, seconded by $\mbox{Mr.}$ Eldridge.

Mr. Lawlor made a motion to amend the article by increasing the budget committees budget by \$5,233, which will keep the teachers on the present scale. Seconded by Mr. Dube.

Original motion and amendment carried.

ARTICLE IX. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for education-al purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof.

Mr. Viel made a motion that article IX be accepted as read, seconded by Mr. Eldridge. Motion carried.

ARTICLE X. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Under new business Mr. Viel asked if we had heard anything on the area vocational school hearings. Mr. Janetos said that we had heard nothing but it would be coming up soon. Mrs. Grace Joncas said the hearing has already been held.

Mrs. Rollins made the following motion: I move the school committee district pass a resolution against House Bill #505 and that copies be sent to Mr. Bowles, and subcommittee, Senator Marcotte and Representative Joncas on the basis that it is discrimatory, for further action. Seconded by Mr. Eldridge. Motion carried.

A motion to adjourn was made by Paul Janetos, seconded by John Burke. Motion carried. $9:30\ P.M.$

THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING Rollinsford, New Hampshire March 9, 1971

The Rollinsford Annual Town Meeting which was held at the Grade School was called to order at 8:03 p.m. by the Moderator, Mr. Edgar Gray. He read the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting and reported the following results of the day's voting. A total of 261 ballots were cast.

To bring in your ballots for: ARTICLE I:

ARTICLE II: To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Trustees of Trust Funds

Joseph Porter nominated Eugene Berube and Lester Eldridge seconded the motion. Ovid Viel made a motion that nominations cease and a vote was carried for Eugene Berube.

Surveyors of Wood & Lumber

Mr. Ovid Viel stated that the present members of the Committee were Albert Viel, Raymond Chase, Joseph Labreque, Jr., and himself. He made the motion that Paul Janetos be elected to the Committee also. Lester Eldridge seconded the motion and it was voted to make this a five-man committee as stated by Mr. Viel.

At this time, the question was raised by Edmund Jansen as to what procedure is used to establish the committees as stated under Article II. It was pointed out by Ovid Viel that all of these committees are covered under State Statutes.

Fence Viewer

Ovid Viel nominated Bliss Garvin and Helen Rollins made a motion that nominations cease. Mr. Garvin was reelected.

Parks and Playgrounds

Lester Eldridge nominated Edward Glovinski and O. Viel made the

motion that nominations cease. The motion carried to elect Edward Glovinski.

Following the election of these officers, the new Town Officers were sworn into office by the Moderator, Mr. Edgar Gray.

ARTICLE III: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed:

- A. \$10,000.00 to purchase the building presently owned by Mr. Douglas Rollins for a Town Shed to be used by the Highway Department.
- B. \$15,000.00 to erect a new building on Silver Street to be used by the Highway Department.

Ovid Viel made the motion that Section B of Article III be amended to read "to erect a new building on Town Property" instead of "to erect a new building on Silver Street". The motion was seconded by Robert Eastman. The question was then raised by Mrs. Lillian Dodier as to what property would be available for the construction of such a building. After some discussion as to the various possibilities, Kenneth Bolduc made the motion to accept Article III, Section B, as amended. The motion was seconded by Mr. Harold Knowles, Jr.

Several questions were brought to the attention of the selectmen as to the pros and cons of A vs B concerning -

- the type of building under consideration for construction as compared to the existing building - materials, flooring, roofing, heating, footage, etc.
- what type of repairs would be required and how much it would cost to put the present building in the same state as the proposed new building.
- 3. How much land was available and what would we have in the end as far as an investment is concerned were we to buy the present building from Mr. Rollins. (At this time, Mr. Rollins presented a description to the Town's people of the property which was read by Edgar Gray.)
- 4. if the new building had been considered as part of an overall plan for a new municipal complex which is certainly going to be a problem to be considered quite seriously in the near furture.

Also, at this time, Mr. Lewis Janetos, a member of the Board of Selectmen, pointed out the fact that we are going to have a problem with Sanitary Fill in the next couple of years which will be made mandatory by the State. The citizens of Rollinsford should be thinking about this and be prepared to express their views when the time comes.

Article III, Section B, was finally voted in with a show of hands as amended.

ARTICLE IV: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared and submitted by the Budget Committee.

Robert Eastman made a motion to accept the Budget as presented and Ronald Brown seconded it.

It was noted that the Town officers' salaries should read \$3,300

instead of \$3,000.

Robert Eastman explained the reason why there is much repetition of police officer's equipment from year to year. Mainly, there has been no follow-up on equipment after a man leaves the Department. He also explained that the Scuba Diving equipment mentioned in his budget was eventually purchased by the men on his department and therefore is no longer town property.

The insurance increase was questioned and it was stated by Arthur Osbon, Outgoing Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, that the insurance premiums had been reevaluated and brought up to date. It was noted by Mr. Lester Eldridge that some of the insurance policies only come due every two to three years.

It was pointed out that the Fire Truck Fund should read Fire Truck Note.

The Budget was accepted as submitted.

ARTICLE V: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

Ovid Viel made the motion to accept the Article and Lester Eldridge seconded the motion, which was accepted.

ARTICLE VI: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Joseph Porter made a motion that the Article be accepted and Robert Eastman seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

ARTICLE VII: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Arthur Osbon, Selectman, read a Dog Lease Ordinance that had been presented to him by Glen Davis for the approval/disapproval of the Town's people. He suggested that the Ordinance could be voted on at the Town Meeting as it was a public hearing, but there were some objections voiced as to the validity of the law being acted upon at the Town Meeting where all interested parties may not be represented Therefore, Mr. Martin Lucier introduced the motion that a separate hearing be held by the Selectmen at a later date. Richard Bradbury seconded the motion and it was approved.

Robert Eastman explained the parking ordinance now in effect in the Front Street downtown parking area. He and his department are doing all that is possible to clear the streets for people doing business in Town.

Joseph Caouette brought up the question of Town Manager again. Mr. Arthur Osbon stated that nothing had been done as there had not been enough volunteers last year to form a committee. The article still stands as voted in and will carry.

At 10:05 p.m. Robert Eastman made a motion that the meeting be adjourned and Ovid Viel seconded it.

The meeting was then adjourned by the Moderator, Edgar Gray.
