#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We, your selectmen have had an extremely busy year. It has been our pleasure to serve you to the best of our ability.

Assessing was a major undertaking for this board. We have tried to protect the towns \$25,000 investment by following the formula and guidelines set up by the Sewall Company.

Houses not completed last year were viewed this year along with new houses, mobile homes, building alterations, additions, subdivisions and current use property.

Unlike other years, we personally viewed the interior and exterior of every piece of property, took measurements, and filled out the entire property record card. After calculations were made, the newly assessed were sent letters and hearings were held to discuss their assessed values. Changes could be made at this time if necessary.

We estimate that nearly 1,000 hours were used to accomplish the assessing, hearings and all that went along with this part of our job. It should be understood by the residents of this town that we have made every human effort to insure proper assessment. After discussing this years assessing experience we have taken some actions to make next years task easier and more efficient. The filing system has been changed, we are in the process of changing the building permits and have set up an entirely new system for pick ups. It is our opinion that this years experience and the new system set up for next year will enable us to continue on with the assessing without requesting monies from the taxpayers for this service.

The contract for the Kingston landfill was finalized along with the contract for door-to-door rubbish pick up. During this process the board interviewed many experts in the field of waste removal and it was brought to our attention that 'containerized compaction' is less

expensive and so we will be giving you the opportunity to make a decision on which method of rubbish removal you wish to pay for. We feel that it is our duty to include warrant articles for changing over to containerized compaction for your discussion, ultimately leaving the final decision with you, the taxpayer.

The board has worked closely with the Road Agent in the preparation of his budget. We are making every effort to review and plan for road and bridge needs for the town. Although his budget shows a large increase this year, we hope that by increasing now, the future will not bring bond issues for repairs to roads.

We have had open and honest communications with each and every department this year. The relationships we have maintained are due to co-operation and understanding on the part of all elected and appointed officials of this town.

In closing, it is our desire to communicate with you, the taxpayer. We are aware that misinformation abounds. Our office is here to serve you. Please feel free to contact us if you have any questions regarding your town and the officials serving it.

A message to the voters of Sandown. We are presenting two warrant articles for you to vote on this year, they are methods of rubbish removal from the town which will save you tax dollars. Of course the present system of door to door pick up as presented in line items on the budget, cost of door to door, \$15,480. No matter which method of removal is decided on the cost for using the Kingston dump will remain the same and that figure including partial years increase is \$11,974.00.

Compaction will cost us \$16,500.00, this price includes the purchase, set up and installation of a 2 yard compactor ready to go. The costs for hauling will be \$75.00 per pull, it is estimated that we will need 1 pull per week and 2 for summer months. The total cost of this for 1 year is \$5,000. Conversion could begin in May 1980 (possibly sooner) using a four month figure a break down on savings is listed:

4 months door to door 8 months containerized totals for year for removal 1980 Savings 5,160 3,725 8,885 6,595

If the town were to purchase the compactor from Federal Revenue Sharing the initial cost could be cut and a small savings could still be made for this years removal,

Difference between cost of compactor and revenue funds, \$3,122.08. If we then take the estimated savings of \$6,595 for 1980 and deduct \$3,122.08 we can still save \$3,472.93 from the present system.

The warrant article for 2 40 yard open top containers is another workable method. Prior to beginning door to door pick up, this method

was instituted for the purpose of saving money, this eliminated burying the dump with sand each week. This method is not as practical as the town grows. The cost of pulling each container is \$75.00 and it is estimated that 2 pulls per week will be necessary and possibly more in the summer months. The total estimate per year for hauling is \$8,500. This system may work well for a time but in the event of more serious growth, longer hauling distances and other proposals that may come from the county, it would most likely have to be discontinued and the initial investment lost, whereas with a compactor, hauling is easier, and other methods will most likely call for compaction of rubbish.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE The Polls will be open 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sandown in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Sandown on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town and School District Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 1a. The following articles are to be voted at adjourned meeting Wed. March 12, 1980 at 7:00 P.M.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will accept Town Road Aid, State to contribute \$4,116.07 Town to raise and appropriate \$617.41. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 4. To see if the Town of Sandown will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00) for the construction and equipping with improvements of a permanent nature, of a new Fire Station, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed eighty five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33:1, et seg 2 as amended), and authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such Bonds or Notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; and to take such other actions that may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such Bonds or Notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Sandown. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 5. Contingent upon passage of Article 4, to see if the Town of Sandown will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) to be applied to the first interest payment of the Bond issue due fiscal 1980. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 6. To see if the Town of Sandown will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply all interest received from investment of Bond Program and to make application for, to receive and spend in the name of the Town of Sandown such advances, grants in aid or other funds as may or herein after be forthcoming for Federal or State sources for the Fire House Building Program.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00) to construct a new fire station for the Town of Sandown. By Petition. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000.00) to repair bridge on Fremont Road (Chapman's Bridge). With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to install a 2 yard trash compactor to raise and appropriate the sum of sixteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$16,500.00) for this purpose; to authorize the use of revenue sharing funds to defray the expense of such purchase; or to take any other action hereon. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new Police Cruiser to replace the existing one, such funds to come from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended or to be raised by tax dollars with the balance to be withdrawn from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund Account, and to apply for, receive and expend such Federal, State and County Funds as they may be available for these purposes. By Petition. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two (2) forty yard open top containers to be placed at the Sandown dump for the purpose of rubbish removal; to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand seven hundred and seventy dollars (\$6,770.00) for this purpose; to authorize the use of Revenue Sharing Funds to defray the expense of such purchase; or to take any other action hereon. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to install sanitary facilities and provide a life guard at Seeley Park, as per order of State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,100.00) to support the services given to the Sandown by the Derry Visiting Nurses Association. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Account for the purpose of a new fire truck. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand nine hundred and thirty five dollars (\$2,935.00) for the completion of the depot. This sum is for materials only, with labor to be donated by friends and occupants. By petition. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated ammended by Chapter 302 and 322 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (2,500.00) to defray the town's share of the cost thereof. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 16a. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

Article 16b. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

Article 16c. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services performed by election officials or election workers for a calendar year in which the renumeration paid for such service is less than \$100.00.

Article 16d. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in a Capital Reserve Account for the purchase of a new police cruiser. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred and eighty seven dollars and twenty five cents (\$1,187.25) for the support of the work of the Mental Health Center for Southern New Hampshire. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand six hundred and twenty four dollars (\$1,624.00) being a contribution to the Vic Geary Drop In Center for Senior Citizens. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for the purpose of supporting the Newmarket Regional Health Center, Inc. for transportation service for the elderly and handicapped. Without Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00) for Recreational and Educational purposes for the elderly, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount requested from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and as amended in 1976. By Petition. With Recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Article 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey property acquired by Tax Collector's deed, by public auction (or advertised sealed bid).

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sale by bid or trade-in of the Police Department's 1976 Pontiac LeMans Cruiser. Contingent upon passage of Article 10.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Door to Door Pick Up. Contingent upon passage of Article 9 or Article 11.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for, to receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants in aid or other funds as may now or herein after be forthcoming from Federal, State and local or private agencies.

Article 27. To see if the Town of Sandown will open a Capital Reserve Fund and deposit in that fund a gift of \$704.51 to be used to defray the costs of a well for the Town Hall. Name of reserve: Town Hall Well Capital Reserve.

Article 28. To see if the Town of Sandown under the authority of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 185:1 through 185:3 and Chapter 35-B:1 through 35-B:7 will create in the Town of Sandown a Recreation and Park Commission. The members of said commission shall be appointed according to R.S.A. 35-B:4 by the Board of Selectmen and said commission shall consist of five members who shall be citizens of the Town whose terms and powers shall be governed by the authority granted under R.S.A. 35-B:1 through 35-B:7. This article shall take affect upon its passage. By Petition.

Article 29. To see if the Town of Sandown will vote to adopt the following ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of RSA 31:39:

Purpose: It Shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle on any way in the Town of Sandown to make any loud, unusual, or other unnecessary noise as hereinafter defined.

Section 1. Vehicle. The word vehicle shall include a bus, highway building equipment, motorcycle, motor truck, motor vehicle, semi-trailer, side car, tractor trailer and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, all mechanical devices defined as "vehicle" under the terms of RSA 259:1 (XXXIV).

Section 2. Way. The word way shall include all areas defined as such by RSA 259:1 (XXXV).

Section 3. Loud, Unusual, or other Unnecessary Noise. The words loud, unusual or other unnecessary noise shall include any noise occasioned by any one or more of the following actions of the operator of a vehicle:

- a. Misuse of power exceeding tire traction limits in acceleration, sometimes known as "laying down rubber" or "peeling rubber" or
- b. Misuse of braking power exceeding tire traction limits in deceleration where there is no emergency, or
- c. Rapid acceleration by means of quick upshifting of transmission gears with either a clutch and manual transmission or automatic transmission, without need, or

- d. Rapid deceleration by means of quick downshifting of transmission gears with either a clutch and manual transmission or an automatic transmission, without need, or
- e. Racing of engines by manipulation of accelerator, gas pedal, carburetor, or gear selection whether the vehicle is either in motion or standing still, without need, or
- f. The blowing of any horn, except as a warning signal, or the use of any noise-making device whether the vehicle is either in motion or standing still.
- Section 4. Penalty. Any persons convicted of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$50.00 (fifty dollars) for each offense, which fine shall inure to the benefit of the Town of Sandown General Fund.
- Section 5. Validity. If any portion of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent authority, such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other portion of the ordinance.
- Section 6. Effective. This ordinance is in addition to all other ordinances heretofore adopted and becomes effective immediately upon its passage.
- Article 30. To see if the voters of the Town of Sandown will adopt the provisions of the Ordinance in accordance with RSA 31:39 as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to loiter, park automobiles, or make any other use of the Town property known as Seeley Park, without written permission of the Board of Selectmen, between the hours of 9:00 PM and 6:30 AM.

No permit for the use of Seeley Park between 9:00 PM and 6:30 AM shall be issued unless the applicant has a reasonable need for the use of Seeley Park. All applications for the use of Seeley Park must be in writing setting forth the intended use and must be received by the Board of Selectmen at least seven (7) days before the applicant wishes to use said park.

Any person convicted under this Ordinance shall be fined a sum not exceeding \$25.00 (twenty-five dollars) for each offense, which sum shall inure to the benefit of the Town of Sandown General Fund.

This ordinance will become effective immediately upon its passage.

Article 31. To see if the voters of the Town of Sandown will vote to adopt the provisions of this Ordinance in accordance with RSA 31:39, as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to use or consume any alcoholic beverage while in or upon the following:

- 1. Any public way as defined in RSA 259:1 (XXXV), park, playground or any way or place in which the public has a right of access as invitees or licensees, except with a permit issued by the Board of Selectmen.
- 2. Any private land, building, structure or place without the consent of the owner or person in control thereof.

Any person convicted under this ordinance shall be fined a sum not exceeding \$100.00 ( one hundred dollars ) for each offense, which sum shall inure to the benefit of the Town of Sandown General Fund.

This ordinance to take effect immediately upon passage.

Article 32. To see if the voters of the Town of Sandown will adopt the following curfew regulations as authorized by N.H.R.S.A. 31:43-a,c,d,e,f and g:

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of sixteen years to be upon any public street, or in any public place, after the hour of nine o'clock in the evening, unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other suitable adult person.
- (b) Whistles which can be heard in every part of Sandown shall be blown at 9:00 PM and shall be called the curfew signal, after which all children under sixteen years of age shall be required to be off the street or public place, except when they are in company of a parent, guardian, or other suitable adult person.
- (c) Any parent, guardian or person having the control of any minor under the age of sixteen years who shall permit any such minor to be upon any public street or in any public place, in violation of this ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (d) For the first violation of this ordinance by any child it shall be taken to its home by the officers, and the parents or gaurdian shall be notified of the penalty for any subsequent violation.

(e) Upon any subsequent violation by any child, said parents or guardians shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. In the event a fine is imposed, the amount of such fine, up to the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), shall inure to the benefit of the Town of Sandown General Fund. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage.

Article 33.To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set offs against budgeted appropriations for specific purposes and in amounts indicated; and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make prorata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon.

Article 34. "Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?" (Ballot Question)

### Article II Part A Section 2

To read as follows:

It shall be unlawful to construct, add to, alter, remove or demolish, or to commence the construction, addition, alteration, removal or demolition of a building or structure or install plumbing and electrical equipment, or modify the same for the operation of a building or structure or to convert any summer, recreational or other similar seasonal dwelling into a dwelling which is or is intended to be suitable for year round habitation without first filing with the building official an application in writing and obtaining a formal permit.

### Land Regulations-Zone A Part B Section 3 Paragraph C

- C. Non-sewered lots- Every residential lot not served by town sewer shall be subject to the following:
  - Receiving Soil Every lot shall contain at least 20,000 square feet of contiguous natural in-place soil having the following characteristics:

- a. The depth to ledge or impermeable stratum (soils in which the percolation rate is greater than 60 minutes per inch) shall be 2 feet or greater.
- b. The depth to a seasonal high groundwater shall be 1 foot or greater.
- c. The average slope of the land shall be 25 percent or less. The above items shall be determined by use of current Soil Conservation Service United States Department of Agriculture soil classification, or Soil Conservation Service United States Department of Agriculture and New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission reclassifications on conjunction with on-site testing.

The receiving soil shall not include filled lands except borrow or gravel pits renovated to meet the above specifications.

### Part 2b, last sentence to read as follows:

- 2. Receiving Layer Every receiving soil area, defined as aforesaid shall contain within it an area of at least 4,000 contiguous square feet having the following characteristics:
  - a. The depth to ledge or impermeable stratum shall be 5 feet or greater.
  - b. Land which is wet more than 6 months of the year and existing or proposed wells shall be a minimum of 75 feet distant from said 4,000 contiguous square foot area.

The above items shall be determined by the use of current Soil Conservation Service United States Department of Agriculture soil classifications or Soil Conservation Service United States Department of Agriculture and New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission reclassifications in conjunction with on-site testing.

Two test pits are required on each lot containing 5 acres or less and to be separated by at least 50 feet from each other in order to determine that the requirements of Section 3-C-2 are met.

### Land Regulations-Zone A Part B Section 3 Paragraph D

### To read as follows:

D. Soil Groups are defined in New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission publication "Guide for the Successful Design of Small Sewage Disposal Systems", published December 1974, now in force, or as may hereinafter be amended.

### General Regulations - All Zones Article II Part A Section 12

To read as Follows:

The premises from which clay, sod, loam, sand or gravel is removed shall be left in a safe and sightly condition and protected against erosion. Such restoration shall be done within six months after said removal.

Article 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

It has been a busy year. The town's growth is reflected in the need for more varied services within the library. Mary Ellen O'Neill and Catherine Pinard have helped me attempt to fill these needs. Their professional attitude and dedication is much appreciated.

As a small library, we rely heavily on outside resources. The N.H. State Library filled 194 special requests for us this year and we make liberal use of their films, large print books, extended reference service and professional advice. We attended two ten week courses offered at UNH in Public Library Techniques. Our own book collection is supplimented by three visits from the Bookmobile. We borrow more than 2,000 volumes from them.

Our local co-operative of sixteen libraries continues to benefit each town by giving us additional discounts through co-operative buying power, shared resources and meetings of professional interest.

The Sandown Elementary School has generously loaned us many books and materials for the summer.

In addition to traditional library services, we have offered several courses, held story hours, borrowed films, held a tee shirt contest, conducted a summer reading contest and a reading program and introduced elementary school classes and Girl Scout Troops to the library. By writing early, we were included on Mrs. Santa Claus' personal visiting list. When not in use, the downstairs room has been a meeting room for five community screening programs and committees.

The Friends of the Library under the leadership of Catherine Pinard and Nel Cameron held several programs and an historathon to further the progress of the Sandown history being written by Matthew Sandy Thomas.

Trustees Hazel Rogan, Eleanor C. Bassett and Emily Lovell join me in thanking the indespensible volunteers who make our many programs possible and who aid in day-to-day library business. We also thank the many residents who thoughtfully donate books, displays and services in an effort to make the library more reponsive to your needs.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORTS

The energy crunch has not forgotten Sandown residents in 1979 by the number of stove and chimney problems that have required a call to the Fire Department.

With the increased useage of wood as a major heating fuel the related dangers will also become a larger problem to the users and the Fire Department. There are many pitfalls to wood burning and if a user is not aware of them he or she may be inviting a disaster, that is, a loss of property or a loss of life. With this thought in mind it becomes necessary to point out that there are State rules and regulations to comply with, also some Insurance Companies have stipulations in the policies that should be checked.

After viewing some stove installations I wonder why there have not been more fires (maybe the good fairy is looking over these people) most people have not read the instructions that come with the stove. To operate a wood stove or furnace there has to be an approved chimney, not a smoke pipe stuck through a window or wall, any chimney flue that is used for an oil burner furnace must not have a wood burning device connected to it. This is a violation of codes.

Again anyone burning wood should have the chimney cleaned and checked at least once a year before starting to use it for the season. Homes that use wood stoves should have at least one smoke detector on the floor level of the stove and an escape plan for all members of the household, used with fire drills. This may sound silly but it does save lives.

A comment about the Bond article for a new building: the voters have spoken their mind which for the short term may be all right but in the long term may prove to be an unwise vote.

On or about 1982 the Underwriters rating for Engine One will expire, this means a new rated piece will have to be purchased in order to continue the reduced fire insurance cost to property owners.

The present building will not have room to house all the vehicles and equipment. Now comes the problem, two bond issues in one year?

The study committee was looking in the long term needs, not a stop gap measure. I feel that they found a reasonable approach to the future needs of the department.

Again my thanks to all that made this a working department.

### FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipalty as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municiple forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The 1979 Police Department Summary of Services shows a marked increase in the community utilization of the department. With proper administrative control over personnel, equipment and budget, we were able to meet the needs of the town and remain within the budget allowed by the voters.

Random radar patrols of the town have revealed a marked decrease in the amount of speed violations. Vandalism continues to be a problem and the department looks to parents for their continued support in this juvenile crime area.

This year daytime patrols were instituted on a regular basis with specific officers assigned on call and on duty time during the day. With a part-time police department and the majority of officers unavailable during the day, this move has maintained a high visibility factor, a reduction in response time and has become a valuable part of the overall police coverage in the town.

The cruiser has been a valuable tool in supplying police service to our residents. Our present vehicle has needed expensive repairs in 1979 and again in 1980 to keep it in operating condition. Very little had been expended in this area until 1979. The replacement of this vehicle at this time may eliminate possible future expenses for maintenance and allow a higher trade in or sale price this year as opposed to next year. The use of the Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund monies would not increase the tax burden to the people.

Assistance to the department by residents has enabled us to bring seven people before the Grand Jury and then to Superior Court in relation to crimes committed in Sandown in 1979. Residents were instrumental in providing leads that resulted in arrests of suspects in connection with the Breaks experienced in October. Residents are the greatest asset this department has in the prevention of crime. Residents have instituted the "Neighborhood Watch" techniques discussed at a public service meeting and are utilizing the "Vacation Check" house check system when they will be away for long periods of time.

I would like to take this opportunity to make the residents aware of the outstanding job done by the volunteers who man the police telephones providing this town with 24 hour a day coverage at no cost to the town. A sincere "job well done" is extended to the men and women who have faithfully fulfilled their commitment to the town and provided the best trained and most experienced force in recent history.

We as constables are requesting at this time in increase in hourly wage from \$3.00 per hour to \$3.50 per hour, an increase in the mileage rate from .15 per mile to 18.5 per mile and two dog houses for Constable Casey.

The town at this time now owns two dog houses at the Adams residence. Two houses are needed at the Casey home as the stray dogs are destroying her kennel.

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The year 1979 has been a very busy and a very difficult year, requiring many hours of time gathering information for proposed subdivisions and inspecting roads under construction.

Under a new law passed by the 1979 Session of the New Hampshire Legislature, Planning Boards are now required to regulate all sand and gravel excavations. The Board will immediately start procedures in adopting gravel pit rules and regulations governing the same.

The Planning Board meets the 4th Tuesday of the month. As stated in the past we would welcome the public to attend all of our meetings to offer their points of view, for or against. Remember our goals are all the same, to do what we think best for Our Town.

## ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF SANDOWN (For Period July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979)

During the past service year our agency's services provided to Sandown residents increased overall by 30%. Some individual programs reflected much higher increases. All programs increased with the exception of the Home Health Aide visits/hours.

A summary of services provided to Sandown residents over the past two (2) years is as follows:

During 1978-79, a separation of our homemaking service from our certified home health aide service was accomplished, and this is enabling us to provide homemaking assistance to more of the elderly or handicapped or chronically or temporarily ill than was true in the past.

As of this writing our agency is also now operating a monthly Well Child Clinic which is a new service. Young families who are unable to afford "wellness check-ups" privately are eligible to bring children from birth to school entry to this clinic after first being enrolled and getting an appointment. We believe this will provide a valuable resource to Sandown's young population in the future.

While Sandown comprises 4% of the total population servced by our agency, it has increased to receiving 9% of our total services, so that utilization of our agency is excellent and is continuing to grow. Individuals served include many senior citizens, but also included are young couples who are starting families. All indications are for a continued growth in the need for Home Health Services of all kinds.

### **BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT**

During the year 1979, ten appeals to the Town of Sandown Zoning Ordinances were received and acted upon at public hearings. Of these appeals, seven were in the form of a Special Exception and were in regard to commercial ventures. All seven were granted with stipulations. A Special Exception is defined as a special allowance, granted under specific authority of the local ordinance when conditions stated in the ordinance are found to exist which permits use of land or buildings in a manner that would otherwise be prohibited. The purpose of providing for exceptions is to make it possible, within a district, to allow uses under conditions when desirable and still prohibit them under conditions when they are not.

Three requests for Variances to the Zoning Ordinances were also received and acted upon at public hearings. All three Variances were granted without stipulations. A Variance is the waiving of strict requirements of an ordinance when there is a showing of peculiar conditions inherent in the property which causes a hardship under the terms of the Zoning Ordinance. In other words a grant of a variance is the relaxing of the strict interpretation of any provision of the ordinance by the Board of Adjustment upon an appeal.

This Board is in dire need of two alternate members. The addition of two more members to the Board of Adjustment would help immeasurable to serve the Town in the coming years as the community grows and more and more adjustments become necessary. Any interested party should contact the Selectmen for particulars. Thank you.
