- 3. EVERY DOG must wear its license tag. (RSA 466:1).
- 4. License Fees: (RSA 466:4)
  \$3.50 all neutered dogs
  \$6.00 all unneutered male dogs
  \$6.50 all unspayed female dogs
  Failure to comply will make you liable
  with a penalty of \$15.00 (RSA 466:13)
- 5. SHELBURNE HAS A LEASH LAW

  No dog may be allowed to run at large
  unless it is accompanied by the owner or
  custodian (RSA 466:30a)

- 1. To CHOOSE ALL NECESSARY TOWN OFFICERS FOR THE YEAR ENSUING (printed ballot).
- 2. To HEAR SUCH REPORTS OF TOWN OFFICERS HERETOFORE CHOSEN AND PASS ANY VOTE RELATING THERETO.
- 3. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$141,135.00 for General Operations.

4. To see if the Town will VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO ISSUE NOTES AND BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) for the purpose of completing the engineering study for the Sanitary Land Fill.

(2/3 ballot vote required)

5. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE NINTEEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,900) for the purpose of purchasing a second radar unit and radios for the Police Dept.

(Budget Comm. not recommended)

- 6. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000) to be added to the Heavy Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established.
- 7. To see if the Town will VOTE TO RAISE AND APPROPRIATE TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS(\$20,000) for the purpose of constructing a storage building at the Sanitary Land Fill. Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) from the State Municipal Recycling program grants and \$10,000 from taxes. This appropriation is contingent upon receiving the state grant.

- 8. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95c to restrict revenues from recycling to expenditures for the purpose of solid waste disposal. Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be know as the Recycling Fund, separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the General Fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of revenues."

  (Ballot vote)
- 9. To see if the TOWN WILL VOTE TO MANDATE A PARKING BAN within the boundaries of town roads right of way twenty-four (24) hours before, during or after a snow storm. Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner expense.
- 10. To see if the Town will VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE SELECTMEN TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES.
- 11. To see if the Town will VOTE TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO APPLY FOR, RECEIVE AND EXPEND FEDERAL AND STATE GRANTS WHICH MAY BECOME AVAILABLE DURING THE COURSE OF THE YEAR, accordance with RSA 31:95B and also too accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which to the town may legally appropriate money.
- 12. To see if the Town will VOTE TO DISCONTINUE THE SPECIAL UNPAID COMMITTEE TO BE KNOWN AS THE ANDROSCOGGIN VALLEY REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE.

- 13. To see if the Town will VOTE TO DESIGNATE AND PROCLAIM APRIL 22, 1990, AS EARTH DAY 1990, and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment".
- 14. To TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS THAT MAY LEGALLY COME BEFORE SAID MEETING.

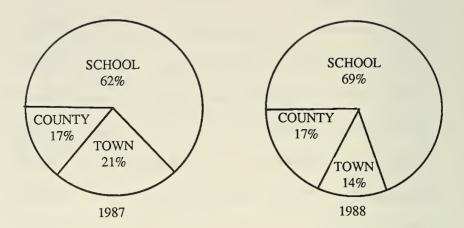

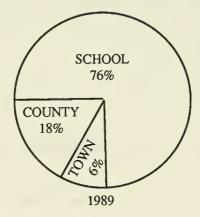

### NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

The year 1989 marked the North Country Council's seventeenth year of successful operation. As chartered under NH RSA 36:45, the Council provides non-profit local and regional planning assistance to member municipalities. In addition to general planning services, the Council offers its constituents specialty services in cultural resource management, solid waste management and transportation. The four standing Council committees, Economic Development, Housing, Land Use and Transportation, actively direct the Council's policies in these areas.

In Shelburne, the Council visited the Shelburne Landfill and provided technical assistance on recycling programs.

Community planning challenges dominated the Council's 1989 agenda. Changing state mandates and furthered residential and commercial prowth busied local planning and zoning boards throughout the year. Council assisted these boards in preparing for the challenges through regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters and as-needed assistance on technical and specific issues. The Council co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which addressed new case law, grandfathering and the revised excavation statute. The Council also assisted numerous towns in revising zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations and site plan review regulations, thereby updating these regulations to better meet and manage the new challenges.

It is important to understand that the Council is organized to provide these valuable services for the benefit of our local town governments. The Council's continued success in meeting the everchanging demands of the North Country is dependent upon the active participation of our members. We rely upon and enjoy your involvement as town officials and concerned citizens, and look forward to assisting you in this coming year.

At the Moose Fond Nature Trail, one footbridge was replaced and the sign at the entrance was redone.

While not a Conservation Commission project, we share the pride in the new sign at the Chester Hayes Park since the beautiful construction is the work of Commission member Phyllis Sears and her husband, Ken.

#### SELECTMENS REPORT

The Town enters 1990 in good shape. We have a great spirit of giving which is emulated by our neighboring communities. We would like to commend all those who volunteer jobs, time, and expertise throughout the year. Your efforts are not un-noticed - Thank you.

The Solid Waste Committee devoted alot of time and research this year reparding our Solid Land Fill. The engineering study is at the State and has returned with recommendations from the authorities. Every expert we have consulted recommends continuing with the study, it is felt that our permit will eventually be granted. In the meantime the requirements have increased and we must appropriate \$20,000 more to this study. Maintaining our independant Land Fill will ultimately save us future dollars but it is necessary to make a larger investment today. The Selectmen with the Committee are keeping a close watch on the progress. Elsewhere in this report the Committee has further information regarding the current operation of the Land Fill.

The Fire Hydrant project proposed at last Town Meeting has been put on hold. Water rights became a questions and the original plan has been shelved. We are investigating ways of completing the project and insuring the Town has original rights to the water supply. We will keep you informed.

The Selectmen felt it would be prudent to institute a driveway permit application through the office. This would affect any new driveways on Town Roads. (ex. In all

new subdivisions or on new house lots) The road system in town is growing. To insure safety, continuity, and good maintenance on our roads we felt it was time to institute this procedure. All subdivisions, site plans, etc. will still begin at the Planning Board level.

The Town secretary, together with the Postal system is working on a numerical address system for the Town which will be in effect in the near future. Along with assisting our mail carriers this will benefit emergency response services.

Litigation with Gorham Sand and Gravel has been closed successfully. We look forward to the 90's with hope, a spirit of independence and good will.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children, and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or caused to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the state are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000. and/or a year in jail, and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989, including several large fires in Alton, Allenstown, Concord, and Chesterfield areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning.

#### SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

Understanding the Federal and State regulations concerning Solid Waste Disposal and complying with them has been nothing short of a nightmare! Explaining them in detail would be a second nightmare, so this report will consist of activities with some editorial license along the way.

- 1. State of NH requires all municipalities to study their landfill situation and submit a report prior to October 1, 1989 with a detailed 20-year plan including eventual closing of the landfill site.
- 2. Moderator was asked by Selectmen to appoint a five person committee. This was done and consisted of Ken Simonoko, William Davenport, Tom Hayes, John Gralenski and Steve Tassey.
- 3. Committee met frequently and attended seminars, regional meetings, met with experts, helped by Ray Danforth, environmental chief at James River and completed the following:
- a. Established a system to separate solid waste into recyclable material, material to burn and material to bury in the landfill. b. Arranged a lease between Steve and Kay Tassey and the Town to provide storage at their barn on a temporary basis while determining long range needs for storage. c. Engaged the firm of Sevee & Maher Engineers Inc. to study our site, dig test wells and analyze ground water as required and then prepare the preliminary report required to the State of NH.

Their findings were good, with no apparent contamination of the site and a generally excellent rating. The report was submitted to the State on September 28, 1989

(Shelburne was one of the very few towns to meet the deadline). Based on the results of the tests and our communications with people at the State level, we were hopeful that the report, and our site, would be promptly accepted. But we must inject a note of caution. The people at the State level, with whom we have dealt for years, have left. Already the replacements have asked for additional testing, so the State is not done with us yet.

- 4. Committee held several public hearings to keep our people informed and the response has been excellent. Our thanks and congratulations for your help.
- 5. Committee established regulations for current and future commercial establishments and for the disposal of certain items such as white goods, brush, tires, etc.. Essentially these were developed to pass on excessive costs to users rather than the "average" taxpayer. Included in the regulations were penalties for violations.

Lastly, Shelburne has been one of several towns included in the Regional Solid Waste District. By law, we were required to be part of a district or be a district of one. After much deliberation and very objective analysis, the committee has opted to be an independent district with responsibility for our own town at our own cost rather than share with the other towns. Subsequent events have proved this to be right.

Much remains ahead with finding markets for recyclables, fine tuning the operation, solving a few individual problems and providing a permanent storage area. These will require some work and examining alternatives but at the moment we can be very proud of our operation which has no equal in the North Country.

- 5. To see if the District will vote to transfer the sum of  $\frac{\$5,000.00}{1}$  to the Bus Capital Reserve Fund.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of  $\frac{$392,339.00}{$\text{chool}}$  for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the Distirct.

 To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Report

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### Superintendent of Schools

To The Citizens of the Shelburne School District:

The decade of the 90's will bring with it a number of changes on the local, state, and national levels. Some of these changes will not have a direct impact on the Shelburne community but will bring with them suble differences which will begin to affect your children. On the national agenda these include national certification of teachers, a national curriculum, greater accountability on the part of school systems, choice of schools where parents will send their children, day care programs, 12 month school years, etc. On the state level one might reasonably expect us to buy in to many of the national trends as well as some exclusively state issues. Mose of the state issues will be associated with state financial aid and greater state control of public education. On the local level communities will find they will have less control over what may have been at one time a local issue. In the minds of some that may constitute an improvement. In the minds of others it may very well be a step backwards.

### Gorham Master Plan

Well over two years ago Gorham began to take steps to plan for the future of its school system. It hoped to develop a master plan for the decade of the 90's. The first steps have already been taken and others are on the way.

Early in the fall of 1989 the Center for Educational Field Services from the University of New Hampshire was employed to conduct a demographic study inclusive of Randolph and Shelburne to better predict the future growth of the three communities. That study is now complete and the trends are obvious. Randolph and Shelburne show the greatest growth over the past 10 years and Gorham shows a decline over the same period. The decade of the 90's however shows a more moderate growth rate for Randolph and Shelburne, a bottoming out for Gorham with a moderate growth during the second half of the decade. Combined one would find some growth for the decade.

The second phase of the master plan is well underway and is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1990. The architectural firm called The New England Partnership, Inc. from Montpelier, Vermont, will be working with the school boards of all three communities, the administration of the Gorham School System, and the members of the professional staff to better define what we want our schools to provide to our children and

what changes in our bhildings will be required to carry out its mission. In addition to spaces for future programs the need for renovations will be looked at, health and safety codes will be checked, and accessibility for the handicapped will be studied. Ample opportunity will be provided for the public input before any final recommendations are made. Upon completion of this phase our building and space needs should be well defined.

The third phase of the study will be conducted by the professional staff under the auspices of the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Previously scheduled for completion in the spring of 1991 this part of the study will make an assessment of all current programs and make recommendations as to how they might be improved. Completion of this part of the study, however, may have to be rescheduled for the fall of 1991.

When completed the various components of the study will be pulled together to form the foundation of Gorham's 10 year master plan for the education of its children to the year 2001. This study represents a massive undertaking but one which is critical to the future of the greater Gorham community. It is essential that the changes which will occur be well planned. The choice is ours. We can either control out destiny or we can allow events to dictate what we will become. I urge you to take the lead and determine what you want your future to be.

The Gorham tuition rates have continued to climb and are predicted to continue doing so for the next three years. They do, however, compare favorably with state averages with the exception of the junior high school.

### Grade 6

I have recommended that Grade 6 be moved to the junior high school for the fall of 1991 and the program be changed to that of a middle school rather than what it is now, a junior high school or in the minds of some a mini-high school. The change would create a school within a school where the differentiation between a junior high school and a senior high school would become more distinctive and would more nearly address the needs of the 11-14 year old student.

The movement of the 6th grade would result, in addition to educational benefits which would accure to the students, in two economic benefits to the school district. The first of these would be the creation of space at the Edward Fenn School for the addition of a computer laboratory and the re-establishment of a remedial program. It would also make more effective use of our facilities at the present junior-senior high school. Secondly the change would have a dramatic impact on the per pupil costs for the communities sending their children to what would become the Gorham Middle School. All three of these benefits: education, space, and cost represent more than enough justification to make the move.

### Summary

The future will see many changes. If we plan well these changes will create more opportunities for our children. Their future rests with us today!

The pace of events this past year have made the year a difficult and challenging one. The completion of the new Errol Consolidated School, the planning of a new addition to the Milan Village School, and the unsettled teacher negotiations in Gorham have all taken time. We are moving forward, however, and yet much remains to be done before the school year comes to an end.

Many individuals contribute to the accomplishments of a school year. Many thanks go to the parents of our children for their understanding during the most difficult of school years, to our moderator, our clerk, and our treasurer for their efforts, and most assuredly to the members of the school board for their many hours of hard work and dedication.

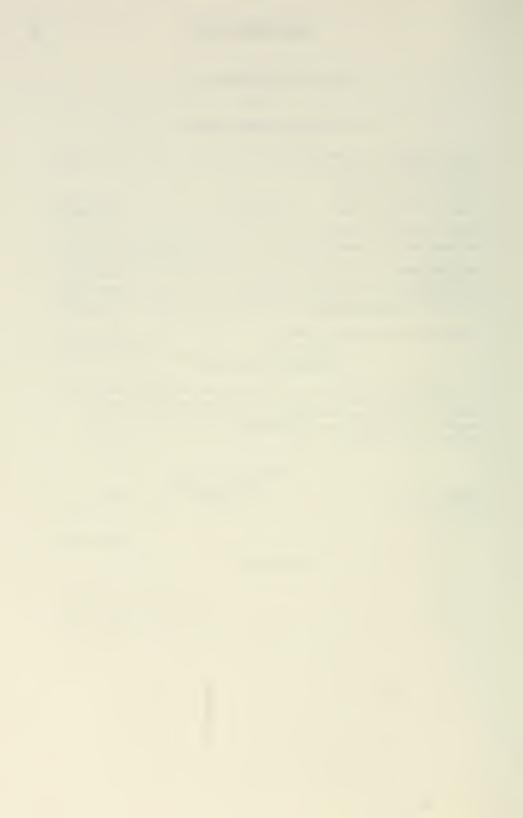

Tractor Tires \$5.00 per tire
White Goods \$4.50 per item
