Dear Residents and Taxpayers:

The year 1990 brought some changes to the town. We have a new bridge at Bell Hill Road, with an asphalt road to North Side Road. The Leighton Meadow section of the Bell Hill Road has been raised to allow access during high water (additional funding for this area will be addressed in the budget). A section of North Side Road has received a shim coat of asphalt, the Town Hall entrance and part of the cemetery road entrance have been paved.

TRANSFER STATION-

The application for our permit to build and operate our new transfer station, is in the process of being reviewed and hopefully approved by State officials in Concord.

We would like to take this time to thank the Arthur Whitcomb Company and Bob Holland for their generous donation of 8.4 acres of land to the Town for \$1.00.

The Town will be implementing a recycling ordinance before the town's trash can be accepted a the new Mt. Carberry landfill. The Town is applying for a matching grant from the State of NH, up to an amount of \$10,000, to help construct a recycling bin building. Hopefully, all will go well and we may be in operation by the middle of summer, then the old dump will be closed.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT-

The Town has been awarded a grant of \$350,000 to help rehabilitate housing units in Stark. We urge those who are interested in this program, to please contact the Stark Housing Improvement office at the Town Hall (636-2822).

CABLE TV-

This proposed project is still coming to Town, but exactly when, the Board of Selectmen can not predict. We have asked for monthly reports on their progress, but have not received anything. We are attempting to contact CableOne of Milan on a weekly basis, but are not having much luck.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT-

We have spent a frustrating year trying to keep the town truck on the road and operating. There have been many repairs which has caused us to overspend in this account. This year we are requesting an increase of \$5,000 in this account, hopefully the major repairs are behind us.

We are also requesting an appropriation of \$5,000 for the Town Truck Capital Reserve Fund.

The request for \$35,000 for the Construction and Reconstruction account will be put towards re-paving the last small section of gravel road on North Side Road, and doing some major re-graveling of our dirt roads.

CURRENT USE CHANGE TAX-

The Board has spent considerable time on this matter, with the town's assessor, Mr. Richard Stapleton, over the past year. After reviewing the current use program, the Board sent out change use tax bills in the amount of approximately \$109,000. This money will be used to offset our expenses and help with the tax rate.

LEGAL EXPENSES-

This item shows an over expenditure of \$6594. The Town was brought to court this year over a disagreement on the town's right-of-way. Mr. & Mrs. Joyce claimed the town had a 24 foot right-of-way through their property. The town insisted on a right-of-way of 33 feet. The court ruled that the town had a 28 foot right-of-way.

We start 1991 with a cash surplus. Last year the town meeting appropriated \$55,000 for solid waste disposal, we spent \$20,507 and encumbered \$34,493. The encumbered amount will be used for it's original purpose, constructing a transfer and recycling facility.

The Town now has a new school addition, which should make everyone proud. The new school will benefit the town in many ways and help our children prepare for the future. We would like to thank everyone for a job well done.

The Stark Village School celebrated its 100th birthday in August 1990. To this occasion and the construction of the new addition, we dedicate the cover of this years town report.

The Board of Selectmen would also like to take this opportunity to thank the many people, elected and volunteers, who help make this town operate, the giving of their time and experience benefits all of us.

This restriction shall not apply to emergency vehicles.

Section 2: Penalty

Whoever shall fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine of five hundred dollars (500.00) and one thousand dollars (1,000.00) for a second offense.

Section 3: Effective Date

This ordinance shall be effective upon asoption by the Board of Selectmen, publication in the Coos County Democrat and upon recording an attested copy of the same with the Stark Town Clerk.



RURAL SCHOOLS

The year is 1890. The students walk to school (for some, this is 2-4 miles); they help the teacher clean the school; they carry wood from the shed to the old wood stove in their classroom; they will use slate boards this day instead of paper and computers; they have no conveniences such as indoor plumbing and electricity; they begin their school day by reciting the Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance; and they will help one another throughout their school day.

This year, 1892, our teachers are: Bert L. Pike and Lottie Fisk at the Graded School; Florence Skiff at School No. 2; Electa Pike at School No. 4; Mildred Vining at the Crystal School; Susie Cole will teach at the Forbush School while Agnes E. Pike will be the teacher at the Percy School; and Hattie Cook will teach at the Plains School. Of all these schools and more, one still remains—The Graded School which today is the Stark Village School.



Stark Village School in 1907. The double entrance way was changed because ice falling from the roof caused an injury.

A century and a half ago, the schools were the responsibility of the town selectmen who usually appointed a school committee to oversee education for the town scholars. In the early 1800's our towns had three districts, and by the mid 1830's eight districts had been formed with plans to form seven more. Although the educational plan was to divide the town into fifteen districts, records indicate only 7 or 8 at the most ever became operational with their own building. Plain, Forbush, No. 2, No. 3, No. 4, Crystal, Percy, and the Graded (high, low) schools were functional schools around 1885.

By 1890, the State Legislature had passed a law whereby each town became a school district and each district was to elect three people from the community to form the school board

who would be responsible for the educational program of the district.

During 1890, three new schools were built; the Emerson School built to replace the school located at the foot of Lee Hill; the Crystal School built to replace the school located near the Paris Road railroad crossing on the E. Maguire land; and the new two room Village Graded School which replaced an old red schoolhouse at about the same location.

By 1898, the scholars were studying at one of these schools: Stark Graded, Plain, Percy, Crystal, Forbush, Blake or Emerson. The copy of the School Report from the Town Report of 1901 reflects the cost for operating the above schools during the school year 1900.

During the next several decades, as new modes of transportation and better roads became available, several of the historic schools were closed. Forbush at the turn of the century; Emerson in 1937; Blake in 1942; and Percy School in 1944. Now with the opening year of 1945, the scholars will be taught at the Crystal School (grades 1-8) and Stark Village School (grades 1-4 in the lower room, grades 5-8 in upper room). As in the past, high school students will be tuitioned to either Berlin High School or Groveton High School. For the next two decades, things remained static. But, in June 1964, when schools closed for summer vacation, the Crystal School was closed forever. The Stark Village School was now the only school left from a long an interesting history of schools.

Stark Village School opened in September 1964 with only six grades instead of eight grades as in the past. Students of grades 7 and 8 will also be tuitioned to the Groveton High School. Over the next several years, many new challenges and changes for education occurred in Stark.

Nineteen Ninety was a year of remarkable advancement for education in Stark. In July, a major construction program began and, during the next few months, the 100 year old Stark Village School would be renovated and a new addition would be added. It was the Centennial Anniversary for the Stark Village School and on August 11, a Centennial Anniversary Celebration was held to commemorate this educational milestone.

For well over 100 years, the citizens of Stark have been committed to providing every student a full opportunity for growth and development for citizenship in a democratic society through public education.

RIGHTS OF PARENTS OR GUARDIANS

As the parent or guardian of a child who may require or who is receiving special education and/or related services, you have the following rights:

- *You have the right to have access to and examine all records relating to your child's education.
- *You have a right to receive prior written notice whenever the local educational agency proposes to begin or change the special educational referral, evaluation and/or educational placement of your child. You also have a right to give your written consent before initial special education placement and before any individual evaluation of your child.
- *You have a right to question any matter, decision, or recommendation relating to your child's referral, evaluation or educational placement.
- *You have a right to request an independent educational evaluation obtained by the local educational agency. If your request is accepted, the evaluation will be conducted by a certified or licensed professional examiner who is independent of the local educational agency and will be performed at no cost to you. Should your request be denied, you have a right to appeal this decision as described below.
- *If you have any complaints regarding the referral, evaluation or educational placement of your child, you have a right to meet with the school board. If any agreement is unable to be reached, you have the right to an impartial hearing conducted by a state appointed due process hearing officer.
- *At this hearing, you have the right to be assisted by person(s) with special knowledge or training, or by an attorney, and the right to present evidence and confront, cross-examine and compel the attendance of witnesses.
- *After this hearing, you have the right to a written or electronic verbatim recording of such hearing. You have the right to obtain written findings of fact and decisions of the hearing at no cost.
- *If the decision of the impartial hearings at the local level is not acceptable to you, you have the right to appeal this decision to the State Board of Education or Civil Court.
- *During any of the hearings or appeal procedures your child shall remain in the current education program, or if applying for initial admission to the public school, shall be placed in a regular program until all proceedings have been completed, unless you and the school official agree otherwise.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 Public Law 92-318

Subpart A, Section 86.8 of Title IX requires public notification that the Stark School District does not discriminate in their educational programs, activities or employment practices on the basis of race, language, sex, age or handicapping condition under the provisions of Title IV of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; and the Education of All Handicapped Children Act of 1975. MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The big event this year in Stark is, of course, the completion of the addition and renovation to the Stark Village School. A handsome new facility is now available for the education of Stark children; we believe it will also serve as a comfortable, useful and convenient meeting place for citizens in the years to come. This major, successful project reflects the hard, dedicated work of many Stark residents and the town's strong commitment to its young people.

Programs in art, music and physical education complement classroom instruction weekly. Although the school does not yet meet the Minimum Standards for Public Elementary School Approval, it offers a good education to the children of Stark. A competent, caring and industrious faculty and staff provide a variety of important and useful learning opportunities for all students.

An important activity this year has been a look at the curriculum in the schools of SAU #58. The School Board has adopted a five-year plan for assessing and revising what we teach and when, focusing each year on different subjects. Faculty and administrators have been attending workshops and courses, as well as visiting other schools, to learn what is needed to improve our program. Federal monies help support these staff development opportunities. If we are to make best use of our limited educational resources, it is imperative that we insure that our curriculum is as effective as it can be.

This year mathematics has been the major curriculum priority. A recent publication by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, CURRICULUM and EVALUATION STANDARDS for SCHOOL MATHEMATICS, has provided impetus for many school districts in the United States to take a hard look at what we are teaching in math, in part, because of concern that so few children complete math through twelfth grade. A small group of teachers and administrators, after studying the excellent research material now available in this area, is preparing a new K-12 math curriculum manual for use next year.

Another area which we are examining is that of children's expository and creative writing. The ability to write well is a critical skill and one that needs more attention. To be able to express one's thoughts clearly and succinctly is the essential ingredient in being a good student at any age. Schools, everywhere, are stressing this important outcome, not just in language arts but in all subjects. So, too, Stark teachers and administrators have been studying, in workshops and courses, how to improve students' writing ability. A first step, this year, has been to allocate more time in the elementary school day for writing.

I have appreciated especially the warm welcome given to me by so many Stark folks in and out of school. It's a delightful challenge to take on the

role of Superintendent of Schools here in this beautiful country and I thank you for the opportunity to work with the wonderful staff, school board members, parents and children that make up the Stark school community.

Although we were eating bagged lunches through February, we look forward to seeing Mrs. Helen Rice, our cook, when we begin serving lunch from the new kitchen.
