WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stewartstown, in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Stewartstown on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE:

- To bring in your ballots for the election of the following Town Officers:
 - (a) Selectman for the three year term ensuing
 - (b) Town Clerk
 - (c) Town Treasurer
 - (d) Two Road Agents
 - (e) Two or more Auditors
 - (f) Collector of Diamond Pond Rents
 - (g) One or more Sextons
 - (h) Overseer of Public Welfare
 - (i) Trustee of Trust Funds
 - (j) One Library Trustee for the three year term ensuing
- To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article No. 1.
- 3 To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept and spend any Federal grants received.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget made up by the Budget Committee and to raise money for the same. If not, to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to defray Town charges for the ensuing year as follows:
 - (a) Town Officers Salaries
 - (b) Town Officers Expenses
 - (c) Election and Registration Expenses
 - (d) Town Hall, Office and other bldgs.
 - (e) Damages and Legal Expenses
 - (f) Health Dept.
 - (g) Sanitary Landfill Rental
 - (h) Highway Safety Program

- (i) Vital Statistics
- (j) Interest on Temporary Loans
- (k) General Expense of Highway Dept.
- (I) Patriotic Purposes
- (m) Park Maintenance
- (n) Insurance
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of Public Welfare.
- 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of Libraries.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise two thousand, five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the care of cemeteries.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise seven thousand, nine hundred dollars (\$7,900.00) for street lighting.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the following departments:
 - (a) Police Dept.
 - (b) Fire Dept.
- To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Summer Roads.
- To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Winter Roads.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise two thousand, eight hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,850.00) for the winter maintenance of Diamond Pond Road.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise ten thousand, seventy dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$10,070.59) for highway and street reconstruction or construction and authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend Highway Subsidy Fund monies for this purpose.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise six thousand, four hundred, ninety three dollars and nine cents (\$6,493.09) for highway and street construction or reconstruction and authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend Additional Highway Subsidy Fund monies for this purpose.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise thirteen thousand, nine hundred twenty dollars and eight cents (\$13,920.08) for highway and street construction or reconstruction and authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend Duncan Fund monies for this purpose.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise eight hundred thirty one dollars and thirty-five cents (\$835.35) for Town Road Aid in the event the State will contribute \$5,542.34.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise one thousand forty-five dollars (\$1,045.00) for Emergency Radio Communications.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for revisions to the Tax Map.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise eight thousand three hundred eighty dollars (\$8,380.00) for payment of principal and twenty-four thousand, four hundred sixty dollars (\$24,460.00) for payment of interest on the Sewer Bonds.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise six thousand, eight hundred seventy three dollars and eighty-four cents for payment of Stewartstown's share of Canaan's Sewer Bonds as required in the Inter-Municipal Agreement between Stewartstown and Canaan.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise six hundred sixty-eight dollars (\$668.00) as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year beginning July 1, 1983.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950.00) for the Upper Conn. Valley Hospital to help defray the cost of maintaining standby alert personnel to cover medical emergencies.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950.00) for the operating expenses of Ambulance District A-1 services.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) as a contribution for the support and services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Association, Inc.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) as a contribution for the support and services of the Vershire center.

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise one thousand, seven hundred dollars (\$1,700.00) for the operating expenses and for matching funds for the Northern Coos Community Health Association.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for repairs to the Town Hall.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise one thousand, seven hundred dollars (\$1,700.00) for replacement of the Town Office roof.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise two thousand, six hundred dollars (\$2,600.00) for the purchase of a new hydraulic sander for the Highway Dept.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for the purchase of ten new arm chairs for the Town Office.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any action hereon:

- 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes of the municipal year and pay out of the tax money when received.
- To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of R.S.
 A. 76:15-a relative to the semi-annual collection of property taxes.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of the Town of Stewartstown and to the health and welfare of the people of Stewartstown.

These actions shall include:

- 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
- Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (By Petition)

- 36. To see if the Town of Stewartstown, New Hampshire will vote to form a voluntary committee which will investigate the possible hazards of toxic and nuclear waste and make a report to the Selectmen on this subject. (By petition)
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget for the operating expenses of the Sewer Dept. as made up by the Budget Committee. Revenues to cover operating expenses shall be raised by sewer taxes assessed to the users of the public sewers.
- 38. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N. H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost of forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizentry can this record be maintained.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC. TOWN REPORT

In 1982 in the Town of Stewartstown, North Country Council conducted a survey of flood hazard properties and recommended that the Town remain as a flood hazard community.

In addition to providing specific assistance to your town, the Council works on activities that benefit several towns and the entire North Country. In economic development, the Council has provided direct local assistance to several communities in their local development programs and has continued to seek approval from the Economic Development Administration for a revolving loan fund to assist small and medium-sized businesses in eight communities. As a member of the Small Business Development Program for Northern New Hampshire, NCC has provided information to prospective businesses on the available training and financial programs. The Economic Development Committee has met on issues such as trends in the wood products industry, the future of the North Country railroad system and small business development and financing.

One of the major efforts for towns is community planning. The Council staff met throughout the year with numerous planning boards, selectmen, and master plan committees to discuss community issues and provide solutions such as zoning, subdivision regulations, site plan review, sign, parking, septic system and mobile home regulations, recreation planning, business and traffic surveys, and more. The Council organized a subdivision workshop in the spring for planning board members, coordinated the municipal Law lectures in the fall, and provided information to towns on HUD's Small Cities Community Development Block Grant and Urban Development Action Grant programs. In an effort to maintain essential planning assistance to our Towns given the somewhat smaller budget, our Community Planning Committee established a clear policy on membership services. This is described in a brochure we recently mailed to you entitled "North Country Council, Inc.: What's In It For Your Town?"

In transportation, the Council's Transportation Committee assisted the NH Department of Public Works and Highways with the Annual Highway Action Plan Meeting. This meeting is usually very productive as it is the major way that the public can participate in identifying and supporting needed highway improvements.

NCC is assisting the state, the new rail operator, and rail users in marketing the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line to make the line more economically viable and eventually self-sufficient. In the Mt. Washington Valley, NCC surveyed businesses to determine the potential for utilizing a truck/rail terminal. We are also following the proposed New England rail reorganization and its impact on our region. The Council continues to work with the Whitefield Regional Airport in an on-going effort to secure commuter air service.

The Council is providing planning recommendations and some technical assistance to towns in anticipation of the solid waste district planning scheduled to occur in late 1983 and 1984. We had a voice in amending the state's solid waste law to make it more flexible in local situations. Sharing of ideas and coordination in this field is aided by staff member Fred Moody's position as a director of the NH Resource Recovery Association.

To assist town governments with administrative and financial tasks (e.g., tax billing, accounting, etc.), NCC has acquired a minicomputer with programs to accomplish these functions. At this time, we developed our tax billing services and look forward to offering additional services in the future.

The Council has also conducted historic buildings inventory in a few towns and will be serving as a clearinghouse on historic preservation planning and activities.

The Council closely followed the proceedings for the Quebec Hydro powerline in 1982 and presented our position before the Site Evaluation Committee in March. We recommended construction of the line in Vermont which provided the most economical, direct, and least environmentally-damaging route. As of early 1983, it appears the powerline will follow the Vermont route and will come into NH in Littleton, NCC also testified before the NH House and Senate in support of the Pontook hydroelectric facility in Dummer.

For the last year and a half, the Council has published NEWS FOR SELECTMEN, an informative report on local, regional, state and federal activities and trends. The Council is active on the state and national level through the NH Association of Regional Planning Commissions and the National Association of Regional Councils. We were very fortunate to have our former President and Jackson representative Oliver Nelson serve as the Chairman

of the National Advisory Committee on Rural Development. This past summer, the Committee prepared a rural development strategy. The Council set up one of two in-state meetings to solicit views from the public on rural needs and practical solutions.

As in the past, the Council's major emphasis will continue to be technical assistance and information on matters of concern to local governments. The Council staff is always available to meet with local officials to discuss projects and needs of the towns.

On behalf of the Council and its Board of Directors, we thank you for your support during the past year and hope that the Town will continue to use the services of NCC during 1983. Please feel free to contact either one of us or the Council staff in Franconia at 823-8108 or 823-5566.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Across the United States there is escalating awareness that educational systems are facing severe problems in trying to meet the needs and demands of the nation in our rapidly changing and growing technological society. The current and anticipated shortages of a labor force adequately prepared to take on the tasks needed for the development of our economy, culture and security are rightly being called a crisis by leaders in the fields of education, business, industry and government.

As the total number of 18 and 19 year olds in our population continues to decrease into the 1990's, the percentage of high school graduates entering preprofessional and college level courses in humanities, science and engineering must be increased to meet manpower needs and to address the problems of a rapidly changing world.

Already the nation is faced with a decline of talented students considering or entering the field of teaching on any level or sector be it private, public or post-secondary. Such a severe shortage of qualified science and mathematics teachers exists today that the problem is presently being addressed by industry, education and government on a national level. All are in agreement that incentives must be provided for high aptitude and motivated students to encourage them to pursue professional and scientific studies and that computerized instruction in all aspects of education can no longer be regarded as an innovative practice or technique but as a necessity in a rapidly growing technological society. In addition, incentives must also be provided for those presently in the teaching fields to reduce the exodus into private industry.

Although an awareness of the pending crisis exists, solutions to the problems are not as readily evident. Providing quality education programs with limited financial resources is as difficult and challenging today, if not more so, as it was during the time after the launching of Sputnik. The continuing loss and reduction of federal and state monies coupled with a matching increase in mandated programs for specialized support services for handicapped students and adults is approaching and may shortly exceed the ability of local school districts to support all educational programs in its public schools. Adding to the problem of dwindling financial resources is the recent announcement by the State Department of Education that it will be reducing by 4 percent all aid monies presently being paid or owed to local school districts. The effect that this will have on existing local budgets that reflected this anticipated and assured revenue will be realized shortly. Of encouragement is the statement made by President Reagan in his recent State of the Union message in recognition of the crisis

in meeting technological change and the financial support that is to be rendered to state and local school districts in the form of Block Grant monies.

Perhaps no greater dilemma is faced by school board members developing and presenting budgets and by taxpayers who must support public education than the issue of what must legally be provided in the education program and what should be provided to assure that all students achieve their educational goals based on individual ability, all within limited financial resources available. The average cost to educate a student attending 12 years of public school varies in the United States from \$15,000 to \$25,200. The average cost of providing support services for exceptionally handicapped students over an 18-year period varies nationally from \$62,000 to \$216,000. Programs for exceptionally gifted and talented students vary in cost nationally from \$40,000 to \$120,000 over a 10-year period. The dilemma must be met and resolved if we are to provide a meaningful and realistic public education program for all students.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Health appears to have a direct relationship to a person's quality of life. The World Health Organization asserted that "health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity". Therefore, the main objectives of our school health program were to develop a pattern of health care for the children that included prevention, maintenance, direction and referral. Our programs strove to help reduce susceptibility to disease, to enable students to make decisions about health and to increase their abilities to perform as assertive individuals.

Dr. Marjorie Parsons again provided her professional medical advice as our school physician. Mrs. Mary Sasser, family nurse practitioner, assisted Dr. Parsons.

This year the following services were performed through the combined efforts of our health team:

- 1. Height, weight and dental checks.
- 2. Hearing and vision testing
- Physical examinations as standard requirements for grades 4, 8, 11 and new students as well as students participating in sports.
- 4. Tuberculin testing in grade 11 and as needed for other students
- 5. Immunization clinics to update students' health records to state requirements.
- 6. Urine testing for students in grades 4, 8 and 11
- 7. Scoliosis (curvature of the spine) screening for students in grades 5, 6, and 7
- 8. First aid and emergency care
- Phone and letter contacts for follow-ups on health care and health care problems.
- 10. Home visits
- 11. Encouragement and aid in promoting good mental health
- 12. Health instruction, counseling and supervision of general health.

New services provided were as follows:

 Acquisition of equipment through an EMS Federal Grant for the purpose of teaching First Aid classes and CPR in the high school.

- The Red Cross Standard First Aid and Personal Safety course was taught at Pittsburg School to some of the junior and senior high students (using the above mentioned equipment) by Madelene Judd.
- The SNAP (School Nurse Achievement Program) was made available to the New Hampshire nurses for the purpose of increasing and updating the nurses' knowledge and skills in dealing with the handicapped child. Both school nurses in our S. A.U. attended these classes.

The N. H. Division of Public Health again sponsored a preschool hearing and vision clinic in May for the early detection of vision and/or hearing problems.

The Sight Conservation Program provided by the State of New Hampshire helped students receive vision examinations and glasses when financial assistance was needed.

The Bureau of Handicapped Children provided or arranged for diagnostic and therapeutic medical, surgical, corrective or other services and care for all eligible children requiring assistance.

The N. H. Bureau of Dental Health once again presented their Dental Disease Prevention Program to our schools. In their program, elementary students were first examined by a state dental hygienist and instructed in proper brushing techniques. Proper flossing was taught to the students in grades 4 and up. The students then carried out daily brushing in school under teacher supervision. There was a fluoride rinse that was used once a week. The purpose of this program was to develop good oral hygiene habits and reduce dental disease.

The Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center was available to our. area with a mobile unit used for evaluation of students having failed screenings at school.

Northern Coos Community Health Agency assisted the schools by making available a speech therapist for students who needed this help.

As a reminder, the State Department of Education still requires each child entering our school system to meet the following requirements:

- 1. Physical Examination
- 2. Complete diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus vaccine series
- 3. Complete polio vaccine series

- 4. Rubella vaccine (German Measles)
- 5. Rubeola vaccine (Measles)
- 6. Mumps vaccine

Pre-school clinics are available in this area to meet the above requirements. For more information and/or clinic dates, call the Northern Coos Community Health Agency at 237-8083.

All of the school health programs were planned to maintain the highest of health standards. As always, they greatly depended upon the support and interest of all parents.

STEWARTSTOWN TITLE I PROGRAM

Providing assistance for all children who have a need to improve reading, comprehension and spelling skills is the objective of the Stewartstown School District Title I Program. By improving these skills it is hoped to improve not only inschool production but motivate recreational reading and prepare these children for productive lives.

Title I teachers Betty Raymond and Mary Ann Lawton strive to meet the needs of 45 children at St. Alberts, the Hollow School and West Side Elementary with the capable assistance of Priscilla Gaeb, a veteran teacher aide.

A specific objective of the program is for each child to increase at least 7 NCE's in the area of reading. The children are tested annually and these test scores indicate to teachers the weak areas of each student. Each child also completes an "Interest Inventory" that enables teachers to select material which will best stimulate an active interest in reading and correlate student needs and abilities.

All Title I planning, progress and evaluation processes are reviewed by the Parent Advisory Council and classroom teachers as well as the Title I staff. An active Council and dedicated classroom teachers provide invaluable input which aids Title I staff in molding programs to fit individual students.

Throughout the year, Title I staff attend various workshops conducted locally by the S.A.U. No. 7 Staff Development Committee as well as conferences held on a statewide basis. These meetings offer Stewartstown staff the chance to compare its program with others and glimpse new methods which can be incorporated in the Stewartstown program.

School year activities such as the Christmas Program, Open House and spring plays give Title I students goals to strive to achieve, events to anticipate and opportunities to show parents and friends just what they have accomplished. Everyone is welcome to attend.

My thanks are extended to the School Board, parents, teachers and administration. Through cooperative efforts, our Title I program has progressed well.
