(TOWN WARRANT)**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of
Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in the
said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at
ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- Art. 1. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three
years.
- Art. 4. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary
to defray town charges, for the ensuing year and make appro-
priation of the same.
- Art. 7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary
for the support of the poor.
- Art. 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary
for repairing highways and bridges, and see if the Town will
vote to apply for State Aid, and permanent improvement of
highways in accordance with an act of the Legislature of 1905.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for State Aid maintenance.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent upon all taxes paid previous to July 5th of the current year, and instruct the Collector to collect all poll taxes before June 1st, 1923.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to apply to outstanding notes.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the interest on the water bonds.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for libraries one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in addition to the amount required by law, in order to receive the income from twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) left by the will of the late Elizabeth Ripley and accept the same.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and choose a committee to have charge of the same.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow the American Legion the use of the Town Hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Art. 19. To bring in your ballot upon the question as

to whether the amendment proposed by the Convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund to pay off the water bonds at maturity.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for fire escapes on Town Hall.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day, and appoint a committee for the same.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Art. 24. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen and take any action relating thereto.

Art. 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Troy School Board :

I herewith submit to you my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-third under district supervision.

The schools of Troy were extremely fortunate at the close of the school year in June in being able to retain nearly the entire teaching force of the past year. In the primary building every teacher accepted a re-election, while in the High School Mr. Graser and Miss McGregor returned. Miss Mary D. Sullivan, who taught French and English last year declined her re-election, and was succeeded by Miss Elizabeth M. Knowlton, a graduate of Wellesley.

For the position of supervisor of music Mr. Harry W. Davis, who substituted in this position in grades VII, VIII and the high school from Jan. 1, to the close of the school year was elected supervisor of music for all the schools. Mr. Davis is a graduate of Keene Normal School. Under his direction the schools have made excellent progress in music.

The work of all the schools has been excellent, many of the grades showing even better progress than last year.

The work in the high school is now carried on much more effectively than was formerly possible due to the addition made last summer to the seventh grade and high school rooms. These rooms are now of ample size, well lighted, and with plenty of black board space.

The great need at the present time in Troy is more room in the primary building. For several years the rooms in this building have been overcrowded. For the school year 1918-19 the enrollment for the five rooms in this building was 205, an average of 41 for each room. During the year 1919-20 there were 243 pupils enrolled, an average of nearly 49 in each room. For the year 1920-21 there were 237, an average of 47 in each room, and last year, 1921-22 there were 259 enrolled, an average of nearly 52 in each room. In fact two rooms had an enrollment of 60 pupils.

The most effective work, giving pupils the individual attention they should receive, cannot be done in rooms with more than thirty-five pupils. Instead of having six grades with a total of nearly 250 pupils in five rooms, there should be six regular grade rooms with one, possibly two, additional rooms to care for the pupils who need special attention.

At the last school meeting a committee was appointed to consider the situation and report to the coming school meeting. This committee has given the matter careful attention, and with the school board have gone over the matter very carefully with Deputy Commissioner Pringle.

This committee has a plan that will take care of the housing problem of the primary school for many years to come. When the present building was constructed it was so arranged that when needed an addition could be built on the northerly side of the original structure, using the present hallway for an entrance. The committee's plan contemplates an addition of four class rooms, with interior dimensions of 24 feet by 30 feet 3 inches with a folding partition between the two new second floor class rooms. This will allow the conversion of these rooms into a convenient assembly hall for school and community purposes.

The Troy primary building, after long years of service, is still one of the most substantial and attractive buildings of its

size in the state. The proposed addition would be entirely in harmony with the original plan, and would be a school building of which the town might well be proud. It is certainly to be hoped that the plan submitted may be adopted and that this much needed addition may be secured for the next school year.

For the second consecutive year Troy has secured the maximum \$6,000 of state aid. This is due, in a large measure, to the high rating of our teachers during the past two years. Only ten towns in the state were able to secure this amount. In fact the total allowance to Troy, Fitzwilliam and Jaffrey of \$15,365, represents the largest allotment granted to any supervisory district in the state.

The general expenses for another year should not vary much from those of the present year. The foresight shown by the school board three years ago in the matter of appropriations and teachers' salaries has enabled the school district for another year to come through with a good balance instead of having to meet a deficit. This policy should not be departed from. While salaries have reached about the maximum, teachers of training and experience who have rendered faithful service should be rewarded by at least a slight increase from year to year, while new teachers should be started at a salary considerably less than is now being paid.

In looking over the results accomplished during the past two years there is certainly cause for encouragement on the part of those interested in school affairs. For a long time the accomplishments of the first six grades, in spite of the congestion in that building, have been gratifying, and last year there was developed in the high and junior high schools a spirit of co-operation and interest that has been marked. During the present school year this spirit has not only been maintained but has increased. The high percentage of attendance in the high school during the past year with only one tardy

mark as against 37 for the previous year is a good indication of the interest shown in that school.

I desire to thank the citizens, teachers, pupils and members of the school board for the continuance of their loyal support.
