

1894 — 1953

Ansel Norris Sanborn will long be remembered by his fellow townsmen. He was born in Sanbornville on January 22nd, 1894, the son of Dyer H. and Minnie Wiggin Sanborn.

After becoming a successful motion picture exhibitor he entered public life. He served his town as Moderator, Selectman and as Precinct Commissioner. In Concord, he was a member of the House in 1925, 1931, 1933 and 1937, holding many vital committee appointments. In 1939 he was Speaker of the House. He served twice in the Senate, being named President in 1943. He was a member of Governor Blood's Council taking office in 1941.

Among his positions of trust and service were Trustee of the Gafney Library and of the Huggins Hospital. He will long be remembered as one of Wakefield's distinguished citizens.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield, on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March next at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects.

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$47,426.98 to defray Town charges, as submitted by the Town Budget Committee for the ensuing year as follows:

4. To see if the town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Town Budget Committee.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for playground equipment, said equipment to be used at the Taft Memorial

Playground, Union; and the John H. Garvin Memorial Playground, Sanbornville.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

6. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$2000.00 to be raised and appropriated, said sum of money to be used to construct a drainage system on Church Street in the village of Sanbornville. (by petition of 55 voters)

\$700.00 approved by Budget Committee

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the repair of Cemetery Road. (by petition of 22 voters)

\$300.00 Approved by Budget Committee

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old - Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

Approved by Budget Committee

9. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

10. To see if the Town will vote to designate the Ballard Ridge Road (so called) as that section of the Town Roads which the T. R. A. Fund for the year 1954 is to be expended.

(by petition of 23 voters)

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the free use of the Banquet Hall in the Town hall to all Civic Organizations of the Town with the further provision that each Civic Organization of the Town be allowed the use of the Town Hall once each year free of charge. (by petition of 31 voters)

12. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a committee of five members, (2 for 1 year, 3 for 2 years) to assist and aid the Board of Selectmen in the formulating, developing and operating a Plan for the Betterment of Town Roads. (by petition of 12 voters.)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to enclose an open ditch, either by culvert or cover from State drain under the Ralph Kennett Home where sewage is passing through.

(by petition of 27 voters)

14. To see if the Town will vote that "all payments of money by the Wakefield Playground and Recreation Commission shall be made on the regular Selectmen's vouchers as per order of the Commission. Any unexpended funds shall lapse into the general Town fund at the end of the fiscal year."

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by Bond issue or otherwise the sum of \$12,000.00 for the construction of a bathing beach and park on Lovell Lake to be known as War Memorial Park.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

GAFNEY LIBRARY REPORT FOR 1953

Gafney Library suffered a great loss in 1953 through the passing of Honorable Ansel N. Sanborn, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Sanborn was appointed a trustee on August 7, 1928 and for twenty-five years gave unselfishly of his time and his exceptional abilities in guiding the development of the library.

Circulation for the year was 4,216. Of this total, 2,250 was fiction; 508 was non-fiction; and 1,458 was juvenile.

The library collection of books was increased by 75 during the year. Of these, 60 were gifts; 15 were purchased with library funds.

For a long time the library has needed an up-to-date encyclopedia for the use of the younger patrons, especially those of grade school and high school age. As no funds were available for the purchase of a set, it was decided to have a whist party to raise the money. The sum of \$129.50 was realized from the party — enough to buy the newest edition of Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia in the most durable binding, and the portable table for its convenient use. Special commendation for making the whist party a success goes to Alden Young, particularly for his tireless efforts in selling tickets. Star ticket salesman among the juniors was Johnny McDonald. Mrs. Richard Swinerton, Mrs. Frances Welsh and Joseph Soucy made a substantial contribution in assistance at the party.

The work of maintaining the card catalog has progressed during the year, Richard Sanborn, Jr., having devoted many hours of his own time to this work as a contribution to the library.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

The fire season of 1953 was not a very pretty picture. It started out in fine shape with plenty of rain during the spring months. The month of June was the end of the rains and then a period of dry weather. During June we had quite a few lightning storms without any rains. On June 21 and 22 we had one of these storms that started over 43 fires in this state including the Mt. Shaw fire.

People burning without a permit or burning in unsafe places or at unsafe times were the cause of our largest number of fires. It is hard to believe why people do this when they have the expert advice of their town warden who is as close to them as their telephone. Your town Forest Fire Warden is not going to stop you from burning your rubbish or your old fields, but he wants you to burn in a safe place and at a safe time. You must remember it is unlawful to burn without a permit from your Forest Fire Warden.

We have inherited a tremendous responsibility in the priceless treasure of our natural resources. To keep these natural riches we must guard them from all destructive agents. The foremost among these is Fire — man's best servant but worst enemy.

During the school year 1952 - 53 the teachers in the Wakefield schools were: — Sanbornville Primary, Miss Abbie F. Tuttle, grades one and two; Mrs. Blanche Wentworth, grades three and four; Sanbornville Grammar, Miss Pauline Dudley, grades five and six; Mr. Carl Griffin, Jr., grades seven and eight; Union Primary, Mrs. Florence Gerrish, grades one to four; and Mrs. Helen Abbott, grades five to eight. Wakefield was very fortunate to have such a competent and devoted staff.

Teachers in the Sanbornville Primary School and the Union School returned to their respective positions for the current year. Miss Dudley was succeeded by Mr. Theodore M. Blanchard, and Mr. Griffin by Miss Frances Togus. Mr. Blanchard is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and has had several years' teaching experience. Miss Togus is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and has taught in New Hampshire and Massachusetts schools. Mrs. Edith Horne, a former New Jersey teacher, teaches at East Wakefield.

Total enrollment was 154 pupils with an average membership of 143. Average membership for the previous year was 126. At the time the superintendent's report was written last year the enrollment of 32 in the Sanbornville primary room was a matter of concern. At the opening of the current year 35 pupils enrolled, with others registering at a later date. This situation of a crowded classroom and an overloaded teacher is now more serious than it was a year ago. With the opening of school in September, 1954, according to census returns there will be over 40 pupils in grades one and two in this room. Adequate instruction

cannot be expected under such conditions.

High school pupils enrolled as follows: — Spaulding High School 21, Nute High School 23, and Farmington High School 1. Nine pupils were graduated. During the current year high school enrollment is as follows: — Spaulding High School 11, Nute High School 21, and Brewster Academy 6.

A report issued by the State Department of Education for the year 1952 - 53 shows that Wakefield's tax rate for school purposes was \$21.44 per \$1,000.00 assessed valuation, while the median tax rate for all New Hampshire towns for the same purpose was \$28.60 per \$1,000.00 assessed valuation. No state aid for schools was received, and none will be received during the current year. Compared to all other states, New Hampshire provides the lowest amount of state aid for cost of operation of schools. This places the burden of support of schools upon the local real estate owner. This fact is reflected in the relatively high tax rates for school purposes.

Supervision of the health program is provided by Mrs. Rebecca Sanborn, R. N., of Effingham. Mrs. Sanborn began the work of school nurse in November of the last school year, and is rendering very competent and efficient service.

The earnest cooperation of the school board, teachers, parents, and pupils is gratefully acknowledged.

We are pleased to report a total expenditure of \$632.88 as per treasurer's detailed report below. This sum has been spent without any help from the town, monies being raised by various means.

The plans for recreation in town are progressing rapidly. We have started two fine playgrounds, namely the John H. Garvin Memorial in Sanbornville and the Taft Memorial in Union — both have been outfitted with swings, teeter boards, sand pits with Union have a slide. We hope we can purchase a slide for Sanbornville and two Gym bars, one for each playground, this year.

Our commission feels the value to our youngsters in better health and happiness cannot be measured in this wholesome recreation. 172 children registered under the fine supervision of Mrs. Doris Duchano and Mrs. Arlene Tibbetts, assisted by Mrs. Hazel MacBrien of Brookfield and 40 volunteer helpers. The Recreation program is the most important program facing our people this year. We earnestly hope each and every one of you will back this Commission's recommendations 100% at town meeting.

John H. Garvin Memorial Playground

We assigned twenty regular assistants and 8 teenage helpers. Average daily attendance 30. Total enrollment 121 children. Children ranged from five years to twelve years. Open 9 a. m. to 12 noon and 1 p. m. to 4 p. m. weekdays; 9 a. m. to 12 noon Saturdays.

Outstanding activities:

1. Red Cross Swimming classes at Lake Wentworth each Monday.
2. Dramatics.
3. Square dance groups.
4. Arts and Crafts.
5. Supervised games with trained physical education instructor.

Hopes for Summer of 1954.

New metal fence, posts and gate and an attractive entrance as a worthy memorial to the late John H. Garvin whose heirs, by gift, gave the land in 1950 to use for playground purposes. It is also necessary for the safety of our children and the good will of neighboring property owners.

We hope the town meeting will approve the budget for additional playground equipment and recommend the purchase this year of a slide and gym bar, commonly known as monkey bars.
