TOWN WARRANT 1980 WALPOLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Cheshire SS

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the 11th day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects. Polls will remain open until 6:00 P.M. Following the counting of the ballots the meeting will recess until 7:30 P.M. March 25, 1980. The balance of the Articles will be acted on at that time.

Article 1. To choose the necessary Town Officers for their respective terms.

Article 2. "Do you approve of having two sessions for the annual town meeting in this town; the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot, and the second session, on a date set by the Selectmen, for transaction of other business?" To be voted on by ballot.

Article 3. "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 to change from Residential B to Commercial an area starting at the corner of Main and High Streets 240 feet northerly along Main and North Main Streets for a depth of 230 feet." To be voted on by ballot. The Planning Board is not in favor of Amendment #1.

Article 4. "Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 to provide for commercial uses in the Rural-Agricultural District by exception from the Board of Adjustment when fulfilling the requirements set forth in Article VII of the Zoning Ordinance? To be voted on by ballot. The Planning Board recommends adoption of Amendment #2.

Article 5. To vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$580,654.00 for support of the town poor, for Town libraries, to build and repair bridges and highways, and for such other expenses as may accrue.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectment to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds and bequests as have been left to it during the year.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the town by tax collectors deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the selectment as justice may require.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 30:95-b.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize prepayments as provided by RSA 80-1-a.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to retain for municipal uses the Stock Horse Land, on Valley Rd., map 12-lot 78; and the Andrew Barr land on Rt. 123, map 15-lot 10 under provision of RSA 80:42A.

Article 13. To see what action the town will take to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$125,000.00 to construct and equip a highway garage at the intersection of the Valley Rd. and the Old Drewsville Rd. Such sum to be raised by the issuance of notes and bonds in the face amount not to exceed \$125,000.00 under provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. (RSA 33:1 et seq) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiations, sale and delivery of such notes and bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole, for a term not to exceed four (4) years.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for a highway truck and snowplow attachment assembly, and authorize the withdrawal of \$25,000,00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sha ing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) to have three sleeves for sewer pipe installed under the section of Rt. 12 to be constructed in 1980 and 1981. Such sum to be raised by the issuance of notes and bonds in the face amount not to exceed \$25,000.00 under provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33:1 et seq.) and to authorize the Selectment to issue and negotiate such notes of bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiations, sale and delivery of such notes and bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole for a term not to exceed five (5) years.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for use by the library trustees to purchase library equipment, and to authorize the withdrawal of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Requested by the library trustees.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collectors to appoint deputy collectors with the approval of the Selectmen under RSA:38.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to base the tax collectors salaries on a percentage of their property and yield tax warrants, and to authorize administrative changes. The salaries are to be .33% (one-third of one percent) of the warrants. The tax collector for the area south of Cold River will be available for at least twenty-four hours a week, with at least two hours after 6:00 P.M. The tax collector for the area north of Cold River will be available at least ten hours a week, with two hours after 6:00 P.M. The tax collectors will file monthly reports to the Selectmen on a form similar to the present annual report, and will submit their books on a monthly basis.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the inclusion of the full time employees of the Town of Walpole in the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00. It is estimated that the 1980 cost to the town will be \$3,000.00. It is suggested that the cost of prior service credit be equally divided between the employee and the town.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 to replace the River Rd. Bridge over Houghton Brook.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-nine (\$39,000.00) for re-valuation of the Town, work to be completed in 1982.

Article 22. To see if the Town of Walpole will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Grand Monadnock Arts Council, or take any other action relating thereto. By petition.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 to construct a granite post and chain fence around the Washington Square Common. By petition.

Article 24. To see if the town will authorize a request to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to halt the operation of Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Plant at Vernon until all safety requirements are met without waiver, until all communities in Cheshire County are prepared to deal safely with any emergency situation and until Federal reorganization of the regulatory system pinpoints responsibility for the safety of the nuclear fuel cycle. By petition.

Afticle 25. To see if the town will vote to prohibit the storage of radioactive materials and the dumping of radioactive wastes from nuclear facilities within the Town lines of Walpole. By petition.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to prohibit the transportation of radioactive materials and radioactive wastes from nuclear facilities across the town lines of Walpole.

This article would except those materials to be used in medical treatment, but would require each shipment of such materials to be registered with local health and safety officials. By petition.

Article 27. To transact any other legal business.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES 1979

The Trustees wish to report a successful year for the public libraries. As partial evidence, the circulation figures at the Bridge Memorial Library show an increase from 17,255 in 1978 to 18,721 in 1979. The North Walpole library shows an increase from 3,046 in 1978 to 3,482 in 1979. These figures; of course, do not indicate the extensive use of the library for research, homework, browsing and the use of magazines in the library. To enhance the library as a place for leisure reading the Trustees have introduced newspapers. The daily Boston Globe, the weekly New Hampshire Times and the Sunday New York Times are now available.

We continue to add new volumes, though we are faced with the increasing problems of inflation. In 1979, for example, it cost about \$250 more to purchase about 200 fewer books than were purchased in 1977. The cost of magazines has also shot up. The McNaughton rental plan which we used last year for the first time is one way to keep book purchase expenses down. These books, selected by our librarian, circulate at a cost well below purchase price. In addition we continue to use the Bookmobile extensively.

The new chairs have been purchased for the Reference Room. These sturdy library chairs replace the chairs which were constantly coming apart.

Maintenance of the building is an important concern. Installation of a fire alarm system was the largest project. We have also added a storm door which, with previous insulating and tightening up, will help keep heating costs down. Next year we intend to repair the stone steps.

The Trustees spent some time reviewing and revising the "Policies of Government" for the library. We have raised the non-resident fee for use of the library to \$5.00 while exempting non-resident teachers in the Walpole schools. The library hours have been changed at the North Walpole Library in the hope that the new hours will be easier to remember and meet needs better. It will now be open from 2:00 to 4:00 P.M. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday.

The Trustees would again like to acknowledge with gratitude the many activities of the Friends of the Library. The winter season story hour, the summer reading program (33 children read well over 500 books), the puppet shows and Christmas party, the Great Books discussion groups, the crewel and embroidery classes, and the donation of money for the purchase of children's books, among other things, have added greatly to the library's services.

WALPOLE CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1979

The large picnic shelter in the northbound rest area on Route 12 was completed in early summer. A large, sturdy, 12-foot table with seats was built in place. Two steel charcoal grills were set in concrete bases in this rest area and one in the rest area on the west side for southbound users.

The State Department of Highways gave us excellent cooperation restoring the pavement, building suitable curbs, and laying the paved walkways. The Walpole highway crew under the leadership of Robert Smith located the large granite boulders, brought them over and put them in place, and had the bronze plaques fastened to the boulders, now giving suitable recognition in both areas to Fanny Mason for her splendid gift to the town of Walpole of this 267 acres of lovely forest land. These rest areas are pleasant picnic spots both for passing travelers and gasoline conserving local families.

We have continued our work with the hypovirulent strain of chestnut blight fungus we secured from Dr. James of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station in New Haven, Connecticut. Possibly within the next year there will be more evidence from which we can determine whether or not this is effective in saving our native chestnuts. The material for treating chestnut trees will be available again this season and can at certain times be supplied to anyone interested in treating chestnuts which may have come up from old roots.

With the cooperation of the Selectmen we now have a parking lot beside the highway at the Mill Pond. The Swimming Committee is studying the practicability of diverting water from Blanchard's Brook in sufficient volume to provide a clean, fresh-water swimming facility in this location.

We greatly miss the help and association of Walter Blake who died July 11th. He was deeply int rested in all of the Commission's programs and a dedicated worker. We speak of the second bridge on the Bellows-Knapp Trail up through the Ravine as the Walter Blake Bridge as he did much of the work in bringing in the material and • building this bridge.

The Bellows-Knapp Trail from School Street up through the Ravine and out the Old Meeting House Hill Road to the Fred H. Hooper Hall or a walk up to the Pinnacle off March Hill Road or the Resevoir Road past the Hooper Woodland and the Old Water Company pine lot or the trails through the Fanny Mason Forest are all most splendid areas for birdwatchers, photographers, nature walkers and hikers or cross country skiers.

James Hogan continued to represent the Selectmen on the Board. At the organizational meeting G. Allen Holmes was elected chairman, Edward Johnson Vice-Chairman, and Kenneth Fredette, Secretary.

Regular meetings of the board are held the second Tuesday of each month at the Walpole Town Hall. The public is invited to attend all meetings. A representative of the board is also available to explain the duties and work of the board to interested groups. The news media have been most helpful in providing information of planning activities to the public.

Consideration of proposed sub-divisions of land continue to be a major activity of the board. A public hearing is held on all proposed sub-divisions after due notice of the hearing and notification of all abbuttors by certified mail.

After study and public hearings a revision was made in the Land Subdivision Control Regulations in April and July to ease the requirements of landowners in mapping and recording.

Clerical assistance to the board by Mrs. Walter Campbell has contributed to ease in handling business and keeping records.

YES 97. NO 74.

Article 2. To vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$367,691.00 for support of the town poor, for town libraries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other expenses as may accrue. Meeting opened at 7:30 P.M. The Moderator announced election results and read the town warrant. Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate \$379,090.00 for support of town poor, for town libraries, to build and repair highways and bridges and for such other expenses as may accrue. This sum includes \$12,000.00 for town poor and not \$601.00 for Monadnock Regional Association. John Hubbard spoke in favor of the Assoc. and it was moved and seconded and voted in the affirmative to put \$601.00 back in the budget. When Article 15 was reached it was voted to reconsider Article 2 by a show of hands. YES 97. NO. 87

It was moved and seconded to raise \$50,000.00 this year to begin a fund for a new highway garage. Voted in affirmative.

This made the amount of money raised and appropriated \$429,691.00.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes. Motion made and seconded and voted in affirmative.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds and bequests as have been left to it during the year. Moved - Seconded and voted in affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to administer and dispose of, and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collectors deed, after being advertised. Moved - Seconded and voted in affirmative.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years. Moved - Seconded and voted in affirmative.

Article 7. To see what action the town will take to raise and appropriate for the Walpole Water Department up to the sum of thirty-seven thousand dollars (\$37,000.00) to improve the River well water supply pump station. Such sum to be raised by issuance of notes or bonds in the face amount not to exceed thirty-seven thousand dollars (\$37,000.00) under provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33:1 et seq.) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance. negotiations, sale and delivery of such notes or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole, for a term not to exceed ten (10) years, which notes or bonds shall be repaid by the Walpole Water Department. Moved -Seconded and voted by a show of hands. YES 184. NO 1.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to furnish two school crossing guards; one at the corner of Elm and Turnpike Sts. in Walpole and the other at a location deemed appropriate and necessary during the months of September thru June while school is in session. By petition.

It was moved and seconded to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for school crossing guards. It was amended to read \$5,000.00 to include North Walpole and double guards. Motion made and seconded and voted in the negative by a voice vote.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lay out a highway as a public road as laid out for Mable Jennison by Herbert Russell. By petition. Motion made and seconded and voted in affirmative by show of hands. YES 106. NO 65.

Article ll. To see if the town will vote to throw up the Whipple Hill Rd. from the County Rd. to the road laid out for Mable Jennison. By petition. Motion made and seconded to pass over. Voted in affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to become a member of the Regional Planning Commission, now organized and named the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town.

The commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36: 45-53, Revised Statutes Annoted, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed by the Town of Walpole. By petition.

Motion made and seconded and voted in negative by show of hands. YES 78. NO 90.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,044.08 based on 68 cents per capita (population - 3,006) as the Towns share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. By petition.

Motion made and seconded to pass over - vote in affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200.00) for use by the Library Trustees to purchase twenty-four library chairs and a fire alarm system, and authorize withdrawal of twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Requested by the Library Trustees.

A motion was made and seconded to appropriate \$2,200.00 to use to buy chairs and fire alarm system from Revenue Sharing Fund for the library. It was voted in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take to raise and appropriate up to the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) to construct and equip a highway garage at the intersection of the Valley Rd. and the Old Drewsville Rd. Such sum to be raised by the issuance of notes or bonds in the face amount not to exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) under provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33:1 et seq.) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiations, sales and delivery of such notes and bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole, for a term not to exceed six (6) years.

This article ruled improperly warned, as no public hearing was held, as required when raising over \$100,000.00 for bond issue. A motion was than made and seconded to reconsider article 2. It was a vote in the affirmative by a show of hands. YES 97. NO 87.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to make traffic on High St. one-way west to east, between Main St. and School St. Motion made and seconded, voted by a show of hands overwhelmingly in negative.

Article 17. Be it resolved by the Town of Walpole that the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Walpole, in the State of New Hampshire, that said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project for elderly/low income persons under section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937 as amended, for any of the following accommodations or a combination thereof:

(a) existing standard housing - 10 dwelling units:

(b) substantially rehabilitated housing -20- dwelling units:

(c) newly constructed housing -25- dwelling units.

A motion made and seconded to allow New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate in Walpole. It was voted not to allow.

Article 18. To consider any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

As the vital statistics were omitted from annual report (because they are not complete) it was voted to make arrangements with Vermont for copies to be sent to Town for records, and that they be published in next report.

Motion made and seconded to adjourn at 11:00 P.M. - so voted. Virginia Baldwin, Town Clerk

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING SEPTEMBER 27, 1979

The meeting opened with the Moderator reading the warrant as follows:

Article 1. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Section 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$60,000.00 under and in compliance with the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. 33.1 et seq. as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole, N.H. and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. Section 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

The moderator opened the floor for discussion, there was no discussion.

A motion was made and seconded to vote on the question, the result was in favor of raising the money 32 for and 3 against with 39 people attending the meeting.

Article 2. To transact any other legal business.

No other legal business. Motion made and seconded to adjourn. The meeting adjourned at 7:45 P.M.

REPORT OF FIRE DISTRICT COMMISSIONERS

The Commissioners would like to encourage your attendance at the annual District meeting at 8:00 P.M. Thursday, March 20, 1980 at the Town Hall. Please bring this Town Report with you.

During this year the side windows of the station and some of the door lites were blocked up to decrease heat loss and decrease the adverse effects of sunlight on the paint of the trucks. Since one of our major increases in expenses is in the cost of heating the station we feel that any method of reducing heat loss would have long term benefits.

Much discussion has centered on a new Fire House site with several possibilities having been suggested, however, no definite steps have been taken as yet. We plan to pursue this more in the next year.

The Fire Department and the Ambulance Corps have been engaged in a house numbering project for the Town with much progress turned in by many interested persons. The Commission has become involved in this project since there will be a need in the future for continual responsibility for keeping the system current.

The State of New Hampshire is promoting a new concept in Fire Service Personnel training. This concept is just getting started in this area and we have heard much speculation about its future effects on volunteer departments. Basically it is an attempt to require all firemen to be either school trained or to pass an exam for competency. As yet there are few specifics as to a timetable for compliance. We are pleased, however, to hear the atiitude of many firemen to get started on a program of training that will qualify with these standards, thereby getting a head start on the process. We plan to keep informed on the progress of this program to gain every advantage possible for the department.

We wish to thank the members of the Fire Department, the officers of the District, and many interested citizens for making our District function so smoothly.
