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TOWN MEETING WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the report of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges and take any vote relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$245.21, the State to contribute \$1,634.76.
6. To raise and appropriate money for Civil Defense.
7. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
8. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to

pay Town note due Laconia National Bank December 31, 1953.

9. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

10. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library purposes.

11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

12. To raise and appropriate money for Parks and Playgrounds including Band Concert.

13. To raise and appropriate money for Doctor's bonus or take any action relating thereto.

14. To raise and appropriate money for Cemeteries.

15. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Week and raise and appropriate money for the same.

16. To raise the sum of \$1,000.00 toward Village Sidewalks and authorize the Selectmen to hire money to complete the same, payable \$1,000.00 a year, the first note payable December 31, 1954.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$56.85 for the White Mountains Regional Association.

18. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Industrial and Development Committee and raise money for the same.

19. To see what action the Town will take relative to

the purchase of chairs for the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

20. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the Town.

21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

22. To see if the Town will vote to install chemical toilets in the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

23. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing and installing a four inch fire hydrant at Glencliff and raise and appropriate money for same.

24. To see if the Town will vote to employ a caretaker for the Town Clock and raise and appropriate money for same.

25. To see what action the Town will take about a Town Dump and raise and appropriate money for same.

26. To see what action the Town will take toward the purchase of a parcel of land from the Boston & Maine Railroad located on North Easterly side of railroad track near Warren Town Hall and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

27. To see what action the Town will take toward providing additional fire warning for the Town, such as installation and maintenance of a Red Network or otherwise, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Town Officers and take any action relating thereto.
29. To see if the Town will vote to raise some money for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
30. To see if the Town will grant a discount on property taxes of 1953 and determine date and percentage of same.
31. To authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We sponsored a gun raffle, an auction, a dance, and put on the Powr Pack Fire Extinguisher Drive of which results were two-fold: it placed some fire protection in many homes and at the same time raised money for the Fire Department.

We have a beautiful and very practical new piece of equipment in our new Ford fire engine, which is the pride and joy of every fireman. We have 34 firemen insured, covered under the New Hampshire State Firemen's Association, the premium being paid by the men themselves.

The cooperation of the firemen and the townspeople has been wonderful, without which none of these fire protection measures could have been accomplished. The State of New Hampshire Underwriters' Bureau has inspected our town and granted us a new lower fire insurance rate on dwellings and some other risks. This over a period of years will to some degree reimburse us for the investment we have in our new equipment, which in turn makes the work of the firemen somewhat easier.

The Warren consolidated school opened for the 1952-1953 school year on September 3d, with an enrollment of 94 pupils including seven non-resident pupils from Benton. The 24 secondary school pupils attending high schools registered as follows: 3 at Orford, 3 at Woodsville and 18 at Plymouth. There being only four students graduating from Grade XII in June 1953, while 15 will graduate from Grade VIII, the secondary enrollment will be increased by approximately ten, thereby increasing tuition costs about three thousand dollars, partly due to number of pupils, and partly to increased tuition rates.

One change occurred in the teaching staff this year. Mrs. Marian Clarkson of Whitefield replaced Mrs. Rita Blaney Guarino. Mrs. Clarkson is a graduate of Keene Teachers College, has had several years of teaching experience, supplemented by extensive travel in the west and in South America.

The Warren school continues to function efficiently under the leadership of Principal Ahern and his able and conscientious assistants, Mrs. Pike, grades I and II, Mrs. Evans, grades III and IV, and Mrs. Clarkson, grades V and VI.

The physical plant is in excellent condition, due to a long-range plan of the school board. A few more movable seats and desks were purchased, making complete the furniture for the two upper rooms. Only when one visits the classes in session can one realize the value of having such flexible units with which the pupil and teacher can work.

Expressing appreciation for the contribution to the school system by interested individuals or groups in the community is always a pleasure. The conscientious efforts of the individual members of the school board, the continued support of the P.T.A. in sponsoring the lunch program and playground equipment, as well as the interested efforts of others in the community, are greatly appreciated by me.

W. E. Givens, Executive Secretary of the N.E.A., has stated that "the educational programs of our schools have developed in response to the needs of the individuals and the communities they serve."

Our early schools were largely influenced by a concept that education was memorization. A person may be well stuffed with information and still be very poorly educated. Education for tomorrow includes **thinking** as well as knowing.
