SELECTMEN'S NOTES

The August 18, 1968, Flag raising ceremony in connection with the annual Old Home Day observance seemed to be of interest to many people. The flagpole and its fixtures was set and presented to the Town of Wilmot as a gift from Wilmot Grange. The Flag, a gift to Wilmot Grange from Congresman James C. Cleveland, was loaned for the occasion. This was the first flag to fly at full staff over the National Capitol Building in Washington, D.C., after the mourning period for assassinated President John F. Kennedy. The flagpole and flag are to be used at any time the Selectmen desire. The flag will be kept in the Town Vault for safety. Many people know the vault combination so that the flag can be easily taken out for use.

IN MEMORIAM

Clarence F. Howard passed away June 12, 1968. He had served the Town as its treasurer in days gone by.

BRIDGES

Stringing and anchoring the cable to the post is all that remains to finish the Collins Brook pipe arch project.

This year, after careful and extensive consideration for our next "must" project it was decided to repair the bridge near the Town Hall. Through permission of the State, the Duncan Fund money could be used. A pre-stressed concrete bridge was proposed and accepted. Structural Concrete Co. of Laconia was the contractor. Being late in the fall when the decision was made, the actual installation was postponed until frost-out this Spring. The construction is paid for and in storage at the Franklin yard. As soon as the frost is gone, the engineer and our road agent will get together and the bridge will be installed. We hope that this will open up the North Wilmot area.

THE TOWN TRUCK

Our Town Truck is five years old and beginning to show signs of the work that it has done. We are faced with a money situation. If the voters vote for a new truck, approximately \$6,000.00, this money or a part of it will have to be borrowed. On the other hand, if the voters do not want a new truck, repairs could be costly and inconveniences could be many.

CAUSEWAY AT CHASE POND

At a meeting with State authorites last summer, it was agreed that this project should be attended to. It was further agreed that the State would help out in this venture. We have hopes in the Spring of getting this dangerous spot taken care of.

ARTICLE 17

During the past year we have sought ways to overcome the problem of two major bridges in this short highway distance. As it appears that we cannot easily replace the outlet bridge from Eagle Pond by less expensive culverts and in that the replacement of this bridge and repair of the inlet bridge is needed and necesary at this time, a solution offered is to close this portion of the road. Alternatives to the closing will be to replace the outlet bridge at a cost of \$8,000 to \$10,000 (Town share), and to undertake period repairs of the inlet bridge, this latter expense for the next year estimated at \$600.00.

You are hereby notified to meet at Wilmot Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday the Eleventh (11th) day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

You are hereby further notified to meet at Wilmot Town Hall in said Wilmot the eleventh (11th) day of March, next, at eight of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

-1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 (ninety-five hundred dollars), for maintenance of Town Highways (\$5,000 Summer, \$4,500 Winter).
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$890.47 the State to contribute \$5,936.48 for Town Road Aid.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day observance.
- 7. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for New London Hospital.
- 8. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for Old Home Day observance.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent.
- 11. (Requested) To see if the Town wil vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the proposed Amendments to the Wilmot Planning Ordinance.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to elect Town Clerk, Tax Collector and Town Treasurer for three year terms.
- 14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the proceeds from the Harriott Property.
- 15. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36-A.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Townspeople of Wilmot:

Our town has an approximate population of 500. The libraries have 160 registered borrowers. Of these, 105 are children. In other words, 55 people, approximately 10% of the adult population, use the library. And when you consider that five of those people are your trustees and librarians, the remaining number is pitifully small.

At our libraries you will find New Hampshire Profiles, The National Geographic and Popular Science magazines. The Bookmobile visits us four times a year, bringing a wealth of good reading. Through the generosity of RCA we have the nucleus of a record collection — classical, country and western, jazz, popular and religious. We have some largeprint books for those with impaired sight and can borrow many others from the State Library. The State Library is also more than glad to fulfill any borrowing request for regular books made through the librarians. The library sponsors four film programs a year for grades 1-6. Many fine films are available, through your library, for showing to both adult and youth groups.

National Library Week and Children's Book Week are observed with book displays at the Flat post office. Last spring an exhibit of grade school art was held at the Center Library. These are just some of the many services offered, yours for the asking.

Considering our limited budget, we feel that we have a fine collection of adult and juvenile books. Proceeds from the annual summer food sale are a welcome addition to the book budget.

Center librarian Edith Locklin has shown much initiative and interest by taking two extension courses offered through the co-sponsorship of the University of New Hampshire and the State Library. Your trustees and librarians go to as many meetings as possible, both local and state.

Is it all worth it? If our libraries were closed, would anyone really care? We wonder.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Since its establishment by vote of the town meeting in 1967, the Planning Board has worked to create and improve Wilmot's Planning Ordinance which was accepted at the 1968 town meeting. After three public hearings proposed amendments will be presented to the 1969 town meeting with regard to nuisances, business permits, and signs.

Completion of Interstate Highway No. 89 in November has greatly reduced through traffic over Route 4A, the old New Hampshire Turnpike. At the same time new, high-speed highways make Wilmot more accessible from the population centers to the south, and growth as a residential community may accelerate. To assure future growth improves rather than detracts from the town, and we need your help. Only if you attend hearings and voice your wishes can the town's resources be wisely planned.

During the year the Planning Board sponsored a public meeting to explore the merits of establishing a Conservation Commission, and this question appears in the Warrant as Article 15.

The entire question of trailers and mobile homes is one issue to be reviewed in the coming year, and clarification of Section III of Article III of the original ordinance will be presented for vote a year from now. In the meantime, under Section III the Planning Board has limited the location of mobile homes to mobile home parks, the plans for which shall have been approved by the Planning Board. To allow for future growth, a minmum of 25 acres is required to start such a mobile home park.

The status of many old roads is another question which needs to be carefully considered by the town.

We urge you to participate as much as possible as these and other questions are considered.

WILMOT COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

Our organization is now in its fifth year and we felt it was time for a report to show the progress that has been made during this short time.

It was disappointing to see a small group of our members at the annual meeting, but to get a date that is suitable to everyone is quite impossible.

Most of us realize the situation of the Community Center when it was purchased. To recapitulate, the following is a partial list of what has been done to the building since the inception of the Association.

 $FIRST \ FLOOR$ — New floors, walls, ceilings, lights, partitions. Two new bathrooms, complete kitchen with stoves, equipment, hot water heater, 100 folding chairs, 10 collapsible dining tables, dishes and silverware (service for 112), two large coffee makers, Kindergarten, chairs, tables, toys, books.

SECOND FLOOR — Extension on front of stage, new paneling, lights, curtains, entire auditorium and anteroom painted and papered, sound system for auditorium, six foot extension porch to the rear of stage.

GENERAL BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS — New entrance cable and electric wiring, two heating systems, cement floor and bulkhead in the basement, cemented around building foundation, artesian well (producing 20 gallons per minute) plus pump and plumbing. New entrance door, lock and side lights. Front half of building shingled. Curtains and shades. Two coats of paint and trim on entire building, combination windows, complete equipment for Little League and men's softball team.

The above mentioned have been donated or received through donations from memorials, interested members,

friends and businesses in this town and surrounding towns. All of this would not have been possible without the combined efforts of many people.

There have been numerous activities from which many have benefitted as well as enjoyed. The annual plays have not only been most enjoyable, but each year have taken care of the major part of the operating expenses. The Nursery School is now in its fourth year. At present, there are fourteen students and room for two more.

In 1967, a Teen Council was organized for our older children. It has grown from thirteen members to thirty. This group has had many activities which the Board of Directors feel have helped them become useful and interested citizens in their community. Their projects have realized over \$400 for the New London Hospital, plus many more dollars that have been turned over to the Association for the benefit of all members. The boys and girls of the Teen Council were granted permission by the Board of Directors to fix over the room in the front of the building, upstairs, for their own meetings or for study. Not more than five members can sign in at one time.

The Center has also been used for suppers, children's parties, 4-H, painting classes, dog training classes square dance club, flower arranging, wreath making, and Teen Council hops.

For some time, many members and the Board of Directors have felt that an outside area, for sports that cannot be confined, has been needed by the children as well as adults of the community. Last year, after a donation was made of a parcel of land adjoining the Association, work was started on a small scale for a combination skating rink-tennis court. To date, our project has totaled an approximate value of \$2400 consisting of land, hardware and boards, trucked fill, surveying, bulldozing, backhoe work, light poles, lights and wire, plumbing changes, cash pledges, inside and outside music system, and tree removal.

In order to complete this project for use this winter, the crushed rock foundation and black topping had to be done. We applied for a Spaulding-Potter grant for this project, but this was denied because their allotted funds were already distributed. The Board of Directors went ahead and borrowed the \$1500 needed for the crushed rock and paving. L. M. Pike is paving the parking area for the same price. On October 19th, the Teen Council had a food sale and earned \$87.00 toward this project. On the 26th, they had a car wash, but due to the inclement weather, only netted \$10.00. However, this is certainly a good start. After the first of the year, we will have suppers, bingo games, and a raffle (Boston Rocker) with all the proceeds going towards this project.

We feel quite fortunate, for a town our size, to be able to have a Community Center that has had so much use and is helping to keep our young people away from many of the problems that other communites are confronted with. Our teenage group has so far been quite eager to work for the benefit of our Association and we want to continue to hold their interest. This is one reason we felt another project could be undertaken at this time.

We realize this letter is quite lengthy, but it is not easy to put nearly five years of effort into a few paragraphs. We are urging members to send in their dues of \$1.00 each which are payable at this time. Needless to say, any donations (which are tax deductible) would be greatly appreciated.

If you have a neighbor or friend who would like to become a member, please advise them of the \$1.00 dues for each member over 18 years of age. Each child in town under 18 is automatically a member whether the parents belong or not. May we count on the continued interest of our many members to keep our projects alive?

During the past two years the monies credited in the New London Trust Co. to this account have reached the sum of \$893.63. Of this amount \$200.00 has been given to Mr. Peter Rayno of Wilmot Flat at his request, \$100.00 in the fall of 1967 and \$100.00 in the fall of 1968, payable to Plymouth State Normal School to assist in the purchase of books. This leaves a present balance of \$693.63. The townspeople of Wilmot have unanimously supported the purpose of the fund by summer food sale and a luncheon. The incorporators acknowledge with thanks the food given by our New London and local food markets to enable the proceeds of this luncheon, \$75.00, to be given entirely to the account. REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND FIRE CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young, lighted matches are an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older, we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke, but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump.

If you must burn —

- a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on *grass* by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire *before* you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.
