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### **ANDOVER FIRE DISTRICT # 1**

A new land mark for the Town of Andover. After many years of struggle, a new fire house has been built on property acquired from Edward Hamp.

The building is 40 feet x 60 feet made of cement blocks with brick veneer on the front. It has three large doors in the front and one on the west side. The center door in the front is electrical or radio controlled.

Total cost of the building construction was \$21,912.17. Two thirds of the work on the parking lot has been completed with one third to be completed in the spring at a cost of \$2500.

# ADDENDUM

## TO 1972 TOWN WARRANT

### Article 1a. BY BALLOT

#### PROPOSED TRAILER ORDINANCE

The use of land for the accomodation of trailers and/or mobilehomes is prohibited, except as provided below in this article. However, any property owner or leasee may accomodate one trailer of a non -paying guest for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days in any one year.

The above applies only to trailers and/or mobilehomes utilized for residential purposes, and is not intended to cover single trailers and/or mobilehomes owned by residents and stored or parked during periods of non-use on the premises of the owner.

The Board of Selectmen may approve the temporary use of a trailer or mobilehome to be maintained as living quarters by a person employed in adjoining construction work or for whom a residence is being built, or as an office, storeroom or shop in connection with construction work, provided that such use is for not more than two years, and also that the use will conform with sanitary protection requirements.

The aforesaid ordinance shall not apply to trailers and/or mobilehomes already situated in Andover providing they remain at their present location, or existing trailer parks as long as they remain within their present boundaries.

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.



**TOWN WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Andover Elementary School in said Andover on Tuesday, the sixth (6th) day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$14,535.04 - Highway Subsidy Funds as granted by the State of New Hampshire and to authorize the use of same as provided under R.S.A. 241 and 241-14 - Class 5 Highway Maintenance.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of nine thousand eight hundred and fourteen (\$9,814.) as granted by the Federal Revenue Sharing Act of 1972 and to authorize the expenditure of three thousand (\$3,000.) to build a fireproof vault in the basement of the town hall and three thousand (\$3,000.) to surface and blacktop yard at the town house.

6. To see if the town will vote to reclassify the following roads: Part of Hoyt Road, so-called, from the home of David Newton to Jean Tally from Class 6 to Class 5; the road from Theodore Hall home to the two Stetson homes from Class 6 to Class 5, a distance of 800 feet; the road in Lakeview Park known as Applecrest Road as Class 5, a distance of 2/10 mile; the road leading to Highland Lake Beach as Class 5, a distance of 3/10 mile; West Shore Drive as Class 5, a distance of 7/10 mile; Chase Hill Road as Class 5 from Chaffee's to Flag Hole Road, a distance of 1.2 miles.

7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the two short sections of the former Fox Farm Road in West Andover, rendered obsolete by the relocation of Route 4A as it passes through the lands of Winslow and Frances Eaves and Mrs. Carl Smildsen.

8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate from surplus a sum not to exceed twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500.) for the purchase of a new ambulance for the Andover Rescue Squad, PROVIDED that a federal grant of matching funds for one half the amount appropriated is approved under the terms of the Highway Safety Act. If so voted, the town will be reimbursed for one half of the purchase price by the Andover Rescue Squad at the time of purchase and for the remainder by the federal grant at a subsequent date.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to take all necessary action to clear the title of the town to the following parcels of real estate, and to sell the same at public auction between the dates of May 26, 1973 and September 3, 1973, inclusive:

Parcel # 1. The Old Bailey Farm, so-called, located on Putney Road, consisting of 160 acres more or less land and buildings, and formerly owned by the Bertha Thisel Heirs.

Parcel # 2. A three cornered field, so-called, located near Dyers Crossing, consisting of one acre more or less, and formerly owned by Barbara Shaw.

10. To see if the town will vote to ratify the action of the Boards of Selectmen in 1970 and prior years in disposing of real estate obtained by the town for nonpayment of real estate taxes. (By petition)

11. To see if the town will vote to have the town road agent appointed and hired by the Selectmen, rather than elected by the voters.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to abolish the Budget Committee.

## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

A year of major changes in the town.

The library has been painted and new windows installed. Two new furnaces for the Library and Selectmen's offices were installed, replacing the old, worn out one, showing a decrease in the amount for fuel for the building from last year, and noting that the Old Town House is a lot warmer.

A new card system has been adopted for keeping records on evaluation of property which will be more efficient. This is the same system used by the N. H. Tax Commission.

This past year the Selectmen reevaluated approximately sixty pieces of property utilizing the new card system - noting size of buildings, number of rooms, baths, type of structure and other pertinent information. The filing system within the office has been updated, facilitating the administrative work. There is an extreme limitation for filing space of past years' records which should be put on micro film. All available space is presently filled to capacity. We are requesting an appropriation to build a fireproof room in the basement of the Town Hall. Presently, if a fire occurred, irreplaceable documents would be destroyed.

### Town Roads and Road Agent

There has been a large improvement in the town roads this year. The Road Agent has done a remarkable job with what funds remained when he became Road Agent.

Town roads must be kept in repair. Repairing roads is much cheaper than rebuilding roads. The worst sections of our roads may be rebuilt through Town Road Aid. This year two stretches were rebuilt - from the corner of Hall and Beach Hill west to the gates of Camp Marlyn and on Bay Road from Route 4 to Andover - Salisbury town line.

The Duncan Fund, unfortunately, was not applied to Hoyt Road which it was scheduled for. Due to heavy rains washing out both sides of Shaw Hill Road, the Duncan Fund had to be used to rebuild that road.

The Town received an army truck, through the Office of Civil Defense. Mr. McLeod, the Road Agent, had this truck equipped with a snow plow, resulting in a savings to the town.

A heavy duty tractor with a bucket was leased by the Road Agent for the winter, also affording a savings to the town,

i.e. The cost to the town is \$4.95 an hour when used and the Lessor supplies cost of gas, oil and repairs compared to \$16.00 an hour in past years.

The Road Agent has a 4-wheel drive loader available for any large jobs that the smaller tractor cannot do. The town would pay \$12.65 an hour for rental on this when used, which includes operation and repairs.

The town has a large supply of hand tools and supplies to maintain equipment.

The Road Agent has had a considerable amount of difficulty with the road grader this year. Many of the problems are attributed to repairs that supposedly were done last year. The Road Agent has had to drain the fuel tank and replace filters five times, because someone deposited sand, water or both in the tank. The grader is in very poor condition and should be replaced.

Even though the Road Agent had to exceed his budget, he has done an excellent job, considering what he had to work with.

We have had many complaints from tax payers this year on the condition of our roads. Many of our roads are still in poor condition and should be repaired properly. The appropriation should be larger this year to meet these needs, which in the long run will save the town money.

### **Taxes**

Taxes are still rising. The overall evaluation is higher this year, placing the rate lower than last year. The town is still not valued at 100%, but we are trying to achieve this goal.

### **Town Beach**

The inclement weather this summer and the restriction of taxpayers only at the beach, resulted in a minimum amount of receipts from the beach. Some measures should be taken to have toilet facilities closer to the beach, as suggested by the Water Pollution Board in Concord, to eliminate pollution of the lake. A full time attendant must be on duty next summer during open hours. Our suggestion is to hire an attendant who will also maintain the beach, i.e. mowing grass, removing trash, etc. It has been proposed to increase the ticket price to defray the cost of an attendant.

### **Cemeteries**

Much work was accomplished this past summer in the cemeteries. Top soil was hauled in to fill depressions and grass and weeds were kept cut and under control. About twelve large dead maples were removed from the entrance to Proctor Cemetery, the cost of \$312. paid by the Proctor Trust Fund.

### **Miscellaneous**

It has been noted that a former resident of Andover has passed away. Mrs. Addie Emerson Fletcher who was born in Andover on February 5, 1872. Father - John Francis Emerson. Mother - Susan Estelle Heath (Emerson). Her father was a Selectman from 1876 to 1877. Mrs. Fletcher was a school teacher and married to Daniel Howard Fletcher on August 14, 1899. Her brother, Fred E. Emerson was also a Selectman from 1922 to 1927, 1930 to 1932 and 1936 to 1944. He died while in office. It is apparent that Fred was well thought of as a Selectman. Mrs. Fletcher died at the age of 100 at Mt. Clemens, Michigan.

## ANDOVER PLANNING BOARD

During 1972 the Planning Board not only held its 12 regular monthly meetings but also found it necessary to hold seven special meetings in order to keep up with the greatly increased number of land subdivision requests.

The Board of Selectmen appointed Winslow Eaves to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Robert Ward.

Regarding land subdivisions in Andover the Planning Board received 15 applications for subdivisions of land totaling over 1,084 acres and averaging four housing lots per each subdivision request. This represented an increase of 375% of the number of subdivision lots applied for in 1972 over the number applied for in 1971. This tremendous increase in land subdivision has created great concern with many of the citizens in town who have personally expressed their concerns to the Planning Board.

In 1971 the Planning Board conducted a public opinion survey in which a great majority of the town's residents expressed their desire that the town adopt some sort of protective plan that would control the future development of the town. The Planning Board is proceeding with such a project and has formed a Citizens Committee to prepare a town plan and to prepare a protective zoning ordinance to be brought before the town voters in a special town meeting in June of this year. There will be a series of informal meetings conducted by the Citizens Committee to formulate the town plan and all citizens will be invited to attend. The final protective zoning ordinance will be presented at two required special town hearings before being decided upon by the voters at a special town meeting to be held in June.

Finally, the Planning Board wishes to remind everyone in town that the regular meetings of the Planning Board are held the first Tuesday of each month at the Town Hall. These are open to the public and everyone is invited to attend. Notices of special meetings and hearings will be widely advertised in order to keep everyone informed of the activities of the Planning Board.

## ANDOVER RESCUE SQUAD

1972 has been a year of challenges for the Rescue Squad, all of which have been successfully met. Key personnel losses were keenly felt with the removal of its medical advisor and good friend Dr. Emile Boselli from town, the retirement of Capt. Hazen Aughterton and the death of active member Gerald Walker. Last September 1st, when new ambulance laws went into effect, the ambulance was licensed and fully equipped to meet the new specifications and fourteen squad members were trained and licensed as driver-attendants.

Now a new challenge is imminent. Our 1956 Cadillac ambulance, already once retired from service by a New Jersey rescue squad before it came to New Hampshire, is fast nearing the end of its usefulness and dependability. Its replacement during the coming year is almost a must if the squad is to continue to serve the town.

When the rescue squad first fell heir to the present ambulance in 1966 its future replacement seemed a dim and distant dream. After giving the town six more years of good service there is now a reasonable probability that the aging vehicle can be replaced by a suitable substitute (not another Cadillac) with a minimum of expense to the town.

From the beginning the town has voted an annual appropriation which has covered about one-half of each year's actual operating expense. This has enabled the rescue squad to save each year a substantial portion of the generous contributions from the townspeople and earnings from its July 4th and other squad activities. Placed at interest this surplus fund, which has been dedicated from the start to the future purchase of a new ambulance, now totals over \$6,000 -- about one-half the amount needed for a vehicle which will adequately serve the town's needs.

Among the provisions of the Highway Safety Act is one which provides matching federal funds for the purchase of safety equipment, including ambulances. These funds are not unlimited and the New Hampshire quota will be spread over the state according to greatest need and established priorities. As the Andover Rescue Squad is a private non-profit corporation it cannot do business directly with Uncle Sam. Application for a grant must be made by a town thru an established ambulance district of which it is a member, which in turn passes on the application to the state authority if approved by the district governing board.

Such an ambulance district is presently being set up to include Andover and five other towns centered around the New London hospital orbit. It seems probable that the district would look with approval on an application from Andover for a grant from federal funds becoming available after July 1, 1973.

Membership in this Kearsarge Ambulance District will in no way restrict the right of the Andover Rescue Squad to carry patients to the Franklin or any other hospital outside the district.

If the Town of Andover is willing to sponsor the purchase of a new ambulance from its surplus funds (see article in 1973 warrant) the rescue squad is in a position to reimburse it for one-half the amount appropriated if the application for a matching federal grant is approved. The remainder will be refunded by the federal grant at a later date, limiting the town's actual cost to a small amount of interest loss while awaiting the federal refund. The rescue squad wishes to present this proposal for your consideration at the town meeting.

Due to extra equipment needed to certify the ambulance for licensing, the license fees themselves, and repairs to the vehicle, operating expense for 1972 was higher than usual, totaling \$1,009.80. This breaks down as follows:

The number of calls for service during the year, forty-five, was about average, but less than the fifty-eight answered in 1971. Forty-four patients were transported to or from hospitals, and First Aid was rendered in a few other cases.

Eight persons were involved in automobile accidents, four in other accidents. Fifteen persons were victims of emergency illness. Seventeen trips involved only routine transportation of senior citizens or convalescents.

Ambulance travel included thirty trips to New London Hospital, ten to Franklin Regional Hospital, one each to Hanover Laconia and Concord hospitals, and two within the town.

Once again our sincere thanks go to the town for its financial support and to the Andover Service Club, the Ladies' Aid and Benevolent Society and to nearly two hundred other townspeople and summer residents who have contributed so generously to our service.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

During 1972 nine new trust funds for perpetual care were established, four in the Proctor Cemetery and five in Lakeview Cemetery. Proceeds from the sale of five burial plots in the Annex were added to the Proctor Cemetery operating fund.

Interest earned at 5% on the one hundred and twenty-three cemetery trusts totaled \$1,573.37, and \$1,339.61 was expended by the selectmen on the care of the lots covered by them. The interest covers the twelve month period from November 1, 1971 thru October 31, 1972, as does that shown in the following tabulation on the library trust funds.

One additional trust fund covering care of the Andrus lot in the Lakeview Cemetery, received just before the year's end, is not included in this 1972 report.

Three new capital reserve funds were set up as voted by the 1972 town meeting; for tax mapping, town dump and future equipment purchases. All are in special extra interest accounts in the Franklin Cooperative Bank. The reserve for a new bridge over the Blackwater River on Lawrence Street, established in 1968 and increased each year, now totals \$11,364.52. The interest given on capital reserves covers the first three quarters of 1972.

Not included therein are two shares of Boston & Maine Railroad common stock, of doubtful value, from which no income has been received or is anticipated.

## REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee is comprised of six elected and unpaid members, and one member each from the Board of Selectmen, School Board, and each Village District and Fire Precinct in Town. The Budget Committee has the responsibility and authority by statute to prepare a budget for the Town, the School District, Village District, and each Fire Precinct. It is aided in its work by the cooperation received from the Selectmen, School Board, and Village District and Fire Precinct Commissioners and officers. The annual work of the Budget Committee is presented to the Town at a Public Hearing at which copies of the proposed budgets are distributed and discussed by all concerned citizens of the Town. The Public Hearing was held this year on February 8, 1973.

In addition to its regular work, the Budget Committee was called upon in July and August, 1972 to prepare a budget for the newly formed Andover Fire Precinct. The Budget Committee would have preferred to have had more detailed figures available in the form of estimates on the construction of the new firehouse, and estimates and specifications for the new fire truck. However, the need for a firehouse and fire truck was apparent, and in order not to lose the momentum and support which had built up at the time of the Special Meeting of the Andover Fire Precinct on August 10, 1972, the Budget Committee approved and submitted a total budget of \$60,000 for the consideration of the Precinct voters. The proposed budget was passed overwhelmingly and a new firehouse has been built, and the new fire truck is scheduled for delivery during 1973.

In October, it became apparent to the Selectmen that additional funds over and above those voted at the 1972 Town Meeting would be needed to run the Highway Department for the balance of the year. Accordingly, after conferring with the Selectmen and the Road Agent, the Budget Committee approved the request of the Selectmen for an additional \$3000 for this purpose. In the opinion of the Budget Committee, this shortage of funds was due to excessive spending of road maintenance funds during the first two months of 1972 by the former Road Agent. The Budget Committee is impressed with the efforts of the present Road Agent, Dale McLeod, to keep expenses within bounds while properly maintaining the Town roads.

On the often ignored income side of the budget, the Budget Committee pointed out to the Selectmen that property taken over by the Town for failure to pay real estate taxes should be disposed of only after and pursuant to a vote of the Town Meeting, as required by law. During 1971, two such properties were sold without such a vote. One of these properties was sold for only a fraction of its current market value, and since neither sale was specifically authorized by vote of the Town as required by law, the Selectmen have taken steps to rescind the deeds to these two properties. The Town will be asked to vote on the disposal of these properties through an article in the Warrant for the 1973 Town Meeting. The Budget Committee recommends that both these properties be sold at public auction this summer. It is estimated that these two properties should bring about \$30,000. After considering back taxes and legal expenses, the Town should net \$25,000 or more from sale of these properties. This income is sorely needed, as both the Town and School Budgets have increased dramatically this year.

The School Budget proposed expenditures for the next fiscal year have increased by about \$45,000 or 20%. Tuition accounts for about \$33,000 of this, as a result of an increase in the tuition rates of both Franklin High School and the Kearsarge Regional High School, plus an increase in the number of tuition students. The School Budget has been thoroughly reviewed by both the School Board and the Budget Committee, and there is just no room for further cuts in proposed expenditures without shortchanging our school children.

The proposed Town Budget has also increased dramatically over last year. Much of this increase is due to the rise in labor and material costs, coupled with increased demands by townspeople for more and better services. Also, in 1972, payments to Capital Reserve Funds were allocated from surplus. In 1973, such payments must come from taxes. It should be noted that the \$12,500 budgeted for a new ambulance will be reimbursed to the Town, partly from the Andover Rescue Squad and partly from a Federal grant. In addition, the \$3500 proposed for Damages and Legal Expenses should result in about \$30,000 of income to the Town as noted above.

The Budget Committee thanks the Selectmen, the School Board, the Andover and East Andover Fire Precinct Commissioners, and the Clerk of the Andover Village District for their help and cooperation.

## REPORT OF ANDOVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1972

This year the Conservation Commission's main program was the procurement of water testing equipment and educating the members as to its use. Special thanks should be given to Bruce Kelsey, a summer resident, who shared his knowledge of water analysis with the members of the commission. The commission has and will continue to monitor Andover's lakes and streams. We would like to compliment Proctor Academy on its new sewage system and its efforts to help cleanup the Blackwater River. Along these lines the commission would strongly recommend new toilet facilities for Highland Lake Beach. Chemical toilets with holding tanks can be reasonably rented as an intermediate step in obtaining new facilities.

In other areas, the Conservation Commission sent two members of the dump committee to a special meeting on solid waste disposal in Conway. We would like to stress the importance of a well thought out program for our refuse needs in anticipation of the 1975 deadline on open burning. The commission would appreciate the opportunity to work more closely with the dump committee on this important matter.

The commission would also like to recommend a review of all roads that are closed subject to gates and bars. We are also keeping in contact with any proposed improvements to Route 11 and its effect on our town's natural resources.

The commission would once again like to stress the importance of your opinions on the proper use of our resources. Interested citizens are encouraged to attend our meetings, communicate with and/or write to Andover Conservation Commission, Box 195, Andover, N. H., 03216.

The funds of the Conservation Commission are non-lapsing accumulating from year to year for our expenses as necessary. Contributions to the commission are tax deductible.

## ANNUAL LIBRARY REPORT 1972

At a special meeting held in August, the trustees met to write a project in hopes of securing matching federal funds for renovations and improvements at the Andover Library. However, our library did not meet the specifications for the grant and the improvements made were paid for from town funds. These improvements were: additional shelving, made possible by the replacement of the large windows with smaller ones; ceiling and walls painted; and the creation of a children's corner with new book shelves. The elementary students use the library one afternoon a week and the children's corner is a popular area.

At the William A. Bachelder Library wall-to-wall carpeting and additional folding chairs were added to the Molly Bachelder room. This room was used 112 times during the year by various groups. A new outside book depository was installed to enable patrons to return books when the library is not opened.

Anyone interested in securing a State-Wide borrower's card, which enables them to borrow books from most libraries in the state, can obtain one at either library. Both libraries have participated in this service since its inception.

**Nurse's Annual Report**

This is the second full year the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has provided nursing care services and physical therapy to Bradford, Danbury, New London, Springfield, Sutton, Warner and Wilmot, with Andover joining April, 1972.

Statistics for 1972 are: total visits 1043; total mileage 11,800.

653 visits for a conference with a family or individual for educa-

653 visits for a conference with a family or individual for education or guidance. This includes assistance in the obtaining and use of auxiliary equipment, pre-natal and newborn care, disease prevention to the well adult, follow-up of the handicapped and mentally retarded.

Communication and referrals are constantly made with welfare, nursing homes, mental health clinics, hospital, physicians, police, alcohol and drug abuse program, social workers, selectmen, schools.

There is no charge for these visits.

10 immunization clinics were held in New London and Warner with no charge to the individual. Totals: 616 immunizations were given to 392 children-

390 visits for skilled nursing care, which includes care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, heart and lung exams, blood pressure check, injections, medication supervision, foot and nail care, etc. Physical therapy was also provided in the home, mainly to stroke patients.

These visits are ordered by the physician and there is no fee.

Regardless of ability to pay, service is provided. The agency is sometimes reimbursed by Medicare, Medicaid, Cancer Society, and other insurances.

Referrals and cases are received from various sources such as patient himself, family, neighbor, friend, hospital, physician, welfare, police, churches, other VNA's and organizations.

Town appropriations (on a per capita basis) and contributions are necessary to provide the no charge visits, clinics, and services to the patients unable to pay.

We appreciate all the donations of clothes, medical, equipment and other items we have received which have assisted us in starting a loan closet for our patients.

We look forward to increasing our services next year so that we may provide health care to a greater number of area residents.

Andover children (school and pre-school) have received a total of 388 immunizations at the immunization clinics held. This service alone is of immeasurable value since there has been a recent upsurge of communicable diseases in New Hampshire because children have not been receiving adequate immunization. Also, a state law is now in effect which requires that children entering first grade must complete all immunizations except smallpox. Parents may bring their children of any age to these clinics at no cost to ensure that they may fulfill the children's necessary immunizations.

As the 1972-73 school year is well underway, we find an excellently staffed and functioning facility.

We have many teachers who are applying wonderful learning techniques to the children and we welcome anyone to come and sit in on some of their classes.

The fall census of children in town found that many new families have moved into town and there have been several more families that have moved into town since the census was taken. This means an increase in our tuition students which is reflected in the higher cost in our tuition for the 1973-74 school year. The board can only project a census figure and add a couple students to each school and hope that our projection figure will not be exceeded by too many new high school age students.

Mr. Seymour is doing an excellent job in keeping the school clean and attractive. Some of the ceilings in the old part of the school were lowered this past summer and two more ceilings in the class rooms will be lowered this coming summer. This creates better lighting and easier heating.

We are very fortunate to continue to have the wonderful Hot Lunch Staff. They plan and produce nourishing meals for all our children.

Our new nurse has done a very good job trying to get all of our children up to date on their immunizations. She has had some clinics and plans for more.

The School Board has met regularly and tried to weigh all possibilities to get the maximum for your school tax dollar.

The board realizes how fortunate we are in have Mr. Corson as our Principal. His ability to manage a well functioning facility provides us with a successful and productive school year.

Our appreciation goes to Mr. Corson, the Teachers, the Hot Lunch Staff and Mr. Seymour for a job well done.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools. I would like to express my appreciation for the support of the school staff and community, and again express a special word of thanks to the school board members and school administration for their help and support during the year.

During the past year the staff has spent much time studying through workshops and staff meetings some of the new ideas and innovations in education. Efforts to work toward the implementation of individualizing instruction in certain areas has proven successful and will be expanded on in the future. Another objective has been to create an awareness and understanding of the Career Education Concept. Career Education is conceived as being aimed at assisting students to become familiar and appreciative of a work-oriented society, and to integrate these values into their lives so that work becomes possible, meaningful and satisfying.

The library program has continued to expand its services and materials. The volunteer aide program has been extremely effective and made possible the success of this program. The library now has approximately 1000 volumes, of which 800 volumes have been added during the past two years.

The overwhelming support of the citizens to develop the playground area has made a tremendous improvement in providing opportunities for outside activities and programs for the students. It is well on its way to completion and will be seeded in the spring. The entire school community expresses its gratitude and 'thank you' to all the individuals and organizations who contributed in any way to the success of this project.

As we look to the needs and problems facing the school district, it would appear from enrollment projections and census figures that our existing program and facilities will meet our needs in grades 1-8 for the next few years.

The main consideration facing the School Board and District are the students in grades 9-12, and also the possibility of public education for 5 year olds. The School Board has discussed and studied the alternatives open to the district in educating our high school students should existing receiving schools find it impossible to continue with Andover students. These studies were generated also by the cost of tuitioning students to other districts, and by the fact that movement of children now in our elementary school to high school would mean an increase of 45 high school tuition students in the next five years. Projections indicate that we will have approximately 105 students in grades 9-12 by 1977.

The alternatives considered by the board included providing a facility in the district for high school students, considering a cooperative district or AREA Plan with another school district, or arranging to tuition to a private institution, which is not at this time possible under State Law. These studies have shown that for the best possible education for our children at the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer, we should continue with our existing tuition practice.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Andover School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1972, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and the School Lunch Program.

**FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

**General Fund:**

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the financial condition of the General Fund as of June 30, 1971 and June 30, 1972, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the District increased by \$8,351.67, from \$3,365.70 to \$11,717.37, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1972.

**Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1972 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$9,001.31, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,489.53, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$10,490.84.

Comparative balance sheets which disclose the outstanding long term indebtedness of the District as of June 30, 1971 and June 30, 1972 are presented in Exhibit A-5. A statement of debt service requirements as of June 30, 1972 is contained in Exhibit A-6.

**MISCELLANEOUS**

**School Tax Account: (Exhibit D)**

A statement of the school tax account with the Town of Andover is included in Exhibit D. As indicated therein, at June 30, 1972, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1971-72 School Tax of \$209,814.51, less a prepayment of \$2,425.43 received during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, plus an advance of \$3,108.33 on account of the 1972-73 school tax. (The latter amount is shown as a liability in

the general fund Balance Sheet (Exhibit A-1) at June 30, 1972.

### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

#### **Treasurer:**

A considerable amount of time was required during the course of this examination to reconcile the Treasurer's records with those of the District bookkeeper. This factor resulted in increasing audit expense to the District. It is recommended that the treasurer and the bookkeeper reconcile their accounts on a monthly basis in order that discrepancies occurring in the accounts from time to time may be detected and corrected as soon as possible.

#### **Conclusion:**

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27-a, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Andover School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.
