**The State of New Hampshire****TOWN WARRANT**

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 9:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at BARNSTEAD TOWN HALL in said BARNSTEAD on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Ninety-six dollars and eighty-two cents (\$296.82) for the continuation of services of the low income residents of Barnstead through the Laconia Area Center of Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$79,500.00) for the purchase of a new combination pumper-tanker for the use of the Center Barnstead Fire Department, and authorize the issuance of bonds in the same amount for this purpose; this combination pumper-

tanker is to be equipped with a fifteen hundred gallon/minute pump, a one thousand gallon water tank, hose bed, diesel engine, automatic transmission, and fully equipped. (By Petition)

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate monies for the purchase of a combination pumper-tanker fire truck, for the use of the Barnstead Parade Fire Company to protect the town of Barnstead. The Town to issue a bond in the amount of Seventy-nine thousand five hundred dollars (\$79,500.00) for the purchase of the fire truck which is to be equipped with a 1500 GPM pump with a 1500 gallon tank. (By Petition)

7. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand dollars (\$13,000.00) to be equally divided between the Center Barnstead Fire Department and the Barnstead Parade Fire Company to be used for operational expenses.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand three hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$1,397.00) in order to become a member of the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the New Hampshire Humane Society, and instruct the Selectmen to enter into an agreement so-called "The Animal Control Agreement" with the New Hampshire Humane Society.

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance of 1972, for the specific purpose of off-setting budgeted appropriations for a new Highway Sander.

11. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to appropriate the sum of One Thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) and



appoint the Barnstead Historical Society to name all town roads and erect markers for same. (By Petition)

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the specific purpose of off-setting budgeted appropriations for the purpose of constructing a complete kitchen facility to be used by the Senior Citizens and to furnish equipment for the new Town offices.

13. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the specific purpose of off-setting budgeted appropriations for the purpose of erecting a chain-link fence between the Barnstead Elementary School and the Barnstead Country Store.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) as a Capital Reserve Fund earmarked as "Bridge Account for Highway Department." This will be utilized with computed share set forth by the State of New Hampshire under the statutes relating to Bridge Construction and/or repair in the Town of Barnstead.

15. To see if the voters of the Town of Barnstead will vote to contract with the New Hampshire State Board of Taxation to have a complete assessment of Taxable Property in the Town of Barnstead made for the year 1978 and/or for the year 1979.

In the event that the Board of Taxation is unable to conduct this assessment, will the voters accept the recommendations from said Board to employ an approved firm of assessors. (By Petition)

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to be

deposited into a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of having the Town assessed by the Board of Taxation or an approved firm of assessors as recommended by the Board of Taxation. (By Petition)

17. To see if the Town will vote to require that all **new** mobile homes must receive a building permit from the Building Inspector.

18. To see if the Town will vote to designate the Vail Road and the Hazel Clark Road as Scenic roads in the Town of Barnstead. (By Petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to close Brindle Pond Drive from Peacham Road to Lot#531 in Section IX of Locke Lake Colony in the Town of Barnstead and Subject to Gates and Bars. (By Petition)

20 To see if the Selectmen of the Town of Barnstead will accept from the Barnstead Historical Society, Three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) in order for the Historical Society to reimburse the Town for monies borrowed by the Society. (By Petition)

21. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance Plan, services in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the renumeration paid for each service is less than Fifty dollars (\$50.00).

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept or contract for any local, state or federal assistance that the Town of Barnstead may be eligible for in the ensuing year.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or dispose of the Salvatore Polio property, Lot 26B Section 3, Locke Lake Colony by Public Auction and to

give the Selectmen the authority to reject or accept any bids.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) from the Estate of Fred Morrison, late of Barnstead, the money to be used as the Town sees fit.

25. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from Mrs. Cora E. Jenisch, the income from the said sum to be used for the perpetual care of Lot #90 in Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N.H. to be known as the Dodge-Jenisch lot.

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Three hundred dollars (\$300.00) from the Estate of Linn Dennett, Ruth D. Hayward, Executrix, the income from said sum to be used for the perpetual care of the Old Dennett Cemetery, located on Route 107 above the Shaw Road.

27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Four hundred dollars (\$400.00) from Ernest Otis, to be known as the Gieser-Otis Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care of Lot #109, Brookside, Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N.H.

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from Harvey and Helen Merrill, the income from said sum to be used for the perpetual care of Lots #64 and #64, in the South Barnstead Cemetery, N.H.

29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from William Higgins, the income from said sum to be used for the perpetual care of Lot #92, Brookside, in the Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N.H.

30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from Esther and Clyde Corson,

the income from said sum to be used for the perpetual care of Lot #48-C in Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N.H.

31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred and six dollars and sixteen cents (\$206.16) (\$200.00) principal, from the long established North Barnstead Cemetery Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery located on the upper end of Peacham Road, behind the Dow estate, near the North Barnstead Road, Barnstead, N.H.

32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from Henry P. Weeks, the income from said sum to be used for the perpetual care of a lot in Riverside Cemetery, Barnstead, N.H.

33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Thousand and twenty-one dollars and ninety-two cents (\$1,021.92) for the purpose of initiating a health insurance program under Blue Cross-Blue Shield for full-time employees of the Barnstead Highway Department.

34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY REPORT TO THE TOWN

Each year we of the library ask ourselves, "What would the people of Barnstead like to know about their public library?" We can only guess at the answer, hoping that our attempt will be acceptable. This year our report will be divided into three sections — Past, Present, and Future. The Past is not the distant past as it covers only 1977. Our 300 or so borrowers have withdrawn about the same amount of material as they did in 1976. Our book and record holdings total 6,822. We added 383 books and withdrew 98. Thirteen recordings were added. The projector and copy machine were used quite regularly and both have proven to be useful to the community. Many generous gift books and records were received, including Memorial books for three good friends of the library who have died. A small but excellent collection of art books was given by friends of Mrs. Emma Parent, who until her death was one of our staunchest supporters. Others remembered this way this past year are Mrs. Priscilla Cotton Rines and Mr. Ely L. Webber. The three library trustees have been faithful and most supportive — we all share a realistic yet hopeful and optimistic view of library development in town. The trustees made several improvements this past year: a telephone line for our exclusive use was installed; a new science encyclopedia purchased; the library opened on Wednesday mornings through the summer; and, as an experiment, Saturday afternoon hours were eliminated. The pay schedules for Head Librarian and Assistant Librarian were revised to equal the salaries of other town employees. The librarians attended Statewide, District, and Area meetings and Book Displays whenever possible. Our special activities included selling antique town map reproductions as a 250th Anniversary project, sponsoring the second annual "Summersongs" program and holding an Open House in observance of the 60th anniversary of the Oscar Foss Memorial Building.

As for the Present — our number one problem is a



serious lack of space. You voters are supporting us financially so that we can continue to purchase current material for reference, self-education, and for recreational reading. Prices continue to rise — the average book now costs \$16.00 — but we buy as reasonably as possible by taking advantage of special sales and discounts. Our summer programs for children are well-attended and a pleasure to conduct.

We have recently installed a new audio system which will enable our patrons to listen on head phones to records, cassette tapes or AM-FM radio. We will have a collection of tapes for circulation. We are grateful to Jeph Boswell of North Barnstead for his interest and advice in planning this new phase of our service.

Ellen Grau, Head Librarian, is on medical leave of absence. She is very grateful for the friendliness and concern shown by Barnstead people during these months.

The future of Oscar Foss Memorial Library is dependent on the voters of the town. When the Town Hall restoration is complete we expect to occupy the whole Oscar Foss Memorial Building. Some renovations to that building need to be made before this is possible. In the budget for 1978 there is a request for \$2,500.00 to complete the first phase of the work we consider basic; that is, removing part of the dividing wall between the present Selectmen's Office and the Library, and improving the entrance to the building making it more accessible for the handicapped.

We welcome all the residents of Barnstead to make use of their library and to take an active part in its activities. It has been a great pleasure to serve the town this past year.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of  $\frac{1}{4}$  of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

We would like to see more wet lands including flood plain areas restricted from sewage disposal systems. We would also like to point out that the Barnstead Recreation Area on Upper Suncook Pond is there for the people to enjoy.

Again, the Commission would like to thank all of you for your consideration and for placing your confidence in us.

The year 1977 has seen tremendous pressures placed on the town and its services. Over-crowding of the school system, expanded road maintenance, more demands on the police department, and high taxes have been just a few of the pressures. Uncontrolled past growth has contributed much to this situation and present efforts to control growth will not show any immediate results but must be continued in order to reach a manageable level of growth in the future.

In order to preserve the natural resources and beauty of our town this board must continue to pursue means by which the quality of living, desired by the townspeople, is maintained. The Master Plan, as required by the State, and which is now being formed, will be our guide for the years ahead.

Many meetings, time, and effort have already been expended by the Planning Board and much more work is needed before the Master Plan is completed. **STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT**

**Jane F. Sanders

Anyone who thinks the New Hampshire General Court is just a place for those with little to do to generate a lot of hot air hasn't visited Concord during the 1977 legislative session.

Not only have the representatives changed in character, but also in attitude. The average age has dropped to 51 with the under-30 group currently numbering 71. There are even three representatives who were only 19 years old during the session. The House of Representatives also now boasts 106 lady legislators, the highest number in the nation. And state representatives don't just sit there anymore. Almost 2,000 pieces of legislation were considered during the session, an indication that your representatives want to work at state government.

Many important issues were considered over the past year, not the least of which was a complete examination and re-codification of our election laws. Among important areas affected are voter registration, absentee voting, public availability of checklists and voter qualifications. One measure, now law, which I sponsored prohibits candidates from counting ballots on which their name appears.

Other major areas of new law include such varied measures as a "sunset law" which requires state agencies to justify their existence, establishment of a municipal bond bank to facilitate municipal borrowing, and mandatory jail sentences for any felony in which a firearm is used. Consumer protection was also a major battle cry for legislators this year with topics ranging from full-disclosure on condominium purchasing to regulating automobile repairs to establishing a safe-water drinking act.

Of the nearly 2,000 bills considered, almost 500 concerned local municipalities. Among these were three measures which can only become law after approval by local voters. These are: expansion of the elderly property tax exemption from \$35,000 to \$50,000; a tax exemption for wind-powered energy systems; and adoption of a standard dog control law for dogs running at large. Other new laws of interest to such communities as Alton, Barnstead, and Gilmanton are removal of the \$300 annual limitation for care of uncared for cemeteries, initiation of a penalty for not filing completed annual property inventory forms, and extension of Vietnam veterans benefits to those who served before August 5, 1964.

My own efforts apart from work on election reform legislation were as varied as the entire session. Much of my energies were directed towards trying to establish more equitable telephone service for rural New Hampshire. A measure permitting toll-free calls to town emergency numbers made by residents within the community is now law, although it should be expanded to include all local emergency services, even if they may be in another town. A second effort in this area involved removal of all toll charges for calls placed within the boundaries of a town. Although this did not pass the Senate, it appears enough pressure has been placed upon the telephone companies to generate some results. The jury remains out, however, on the final disposition of this vital issue.

Another major concern for this area involves the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' jurisdiction over our waterways. A completely separate threat to state and local control from that of the Coast Guard of two years ago, I successfully sponsored a plea to our congressional delegation to take action to curb the Corps' jurisdiction. Unfortunately, for whatever reason, Congress has not yet been receptive to our request.

Other legislation in which I took an active role as sponsor or co-sponsor included: control of hazardous substances, continuing programs for the Commission of

the Arts, and revised licensing of child-caring and child-placing agencies.

A legislative session, however, is not just law making. It is also listening to you and weighing your opinion. It is also providing information and assistance to you at the state level.

Although the 1977 legislature faced many of the complex issues of our modern society, there were equally as many left unresolved. Among these unsolved issues are: land use, population growth and development; returnable containers; gambling; wine in grocery stores; changes in the drinking age; and utility regulation.

Whenever we are in session, I will resume regular office hours in each town. But in the interim, let me know your opinions on the issues of the day. It is the only way I can reflect your viewpoints in Concord. And don't hesitate to contact me with either questions or problems on state government. Remember, it is your government, and its responsiveness depends on your involvement.



**STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT**  
**Alton, Barnstead, Gilmanton, District No. 4**

In November, 1976 you re-elected me to my sixth term as State Representative from the Alton, Barnstead and Gilmanton area. During those years, I have worked hard to represent the people of this area and to make their concerns known in Concord at the same time that I addressed statewide problems. Now, in my second term as Speaker, I am in a position to help solve many of the problems which you and I together have tried to bring to the attention of state officials for many years. I am happy to report that the legislature is moving in the direction of creating a more effective and efficient state government and that my efforts to improve the legislature itself have met with broad support both inside that institution and among the people of this state and of my district. Many of my efforts as Speaker are the result of concerns you have expressed to me over the years as your State Representative; and I think it is only fitting that you share with me the sense of success and accomplishment that comes from helping to make your state government work the way it should.

One of the most exciting and promising changes in Concord is the new sense of responsibility on the part of the legislature to oversee an ever-expanding executive bureaucracy. In the last session, the legislature established a joint committee (commonly known as the "Sunset Committee") which is responsible for seeing that all state agencies are given a regular and thorough review designed to improve their effectiveness, reduce their cost and even to eliminate them if they are no longer needed. I was recently elected Chairman of that important committee. For too many years, government at both the national and state levels have created agency after agency without giving any thought to whether the money they were spending was producing the results intended. As Chairman of the Sunset Committee, I can help to accomplish something which my constituents and the people

of the state have repeatedly mentioned to me as one of their principal concerns — the growth of state government.

Another promising sign was the establishment of a special committee to review the creation of licensing boards and commissions. That important committee was established by a House resolution which I supported. Many people in my district and throughout the state feel strongly that the trades and professions have used licensing requirements to protect themselves and not to advance the best interests of the general public. This new committee is one more attempt by a revitalized House of Representatives to reduce bureaucratic red tape and to make state government more effective and responsive to your needs. This committee and the new Sunset Committee will both focus on the need to periodically examine state policies. They are part of a new spirit in the state legislature that is not afraid to ask, "What is state government doing, why is it doing it and how well is it performing?"

As of this writing, the question of whether we will have a special session or not is still unanswered. The members of the House of Representatives voted overwhelmingly to insist that the Senate report all House bills that it receives out of committee for action by the full Senate, just as the House does for all Senate bills. For years, special interest groups, the Chief Executive and executive agencies have used an antiquated and unfair Senate rule to kill bills without ever taking a vote on them on the floor of the Senate. Your State Senators often do not even have an opportunity to vote on those bills. I sincerely hope that the members of the Senate will change this rule so that an equal partnership can exist between the Senate and the House in conducting the public's business. Your "right to know" is one of your most important rights because you cannot vote intelligently unless you know whether your State Senators and Representatives are voting in your best interest. My position has not been popular with some of the state newspapers, but it has found strong support in the House of Representatives among both Republicans and

Democrats. I firmly believe that these changes in the way the legislature does business will bring about a more open and effective state government. All of these changes in Concord will, I hope, improve the delivery of services to New Hampshire citizens while reducing the cost to New Hampshire taxpayers of providing these services.

Last year the legislature passed House Bill 228 which increases the amount of money to be given to the towns in the state for construction and rebuilding of town roads (specifically Class IV or V highways). Under this new law money is collected through a 1 cent gas tax increase and will be distributed to the towns every three months based on the amount of taxes collected in a previous three-month period.

Estimated payments for 1978 under this additional subsidy program are as follows: Alton, \$13,070.90; Barnstead, \$11,826; and Gilmanton, \$9,897.

The following figures represent highway aid distributions from the state that the towns in our district will be receiving in 1978. Included in the totals are the additional subsidy monies listed above.

The work on Shellcamp Pond Dam in Gilmanton was finally completed last fall. That \$42,000 project provided for reconstruction of the dam and repair of the spillway. The Suncook Lake Dam reconstruction project in Barnstead, originally scheduled for the spring of 1977, was delayed, according to the Chairman of the Water Resources Board, because of unusually high water levels that prohibited draw down of the lake. Repair work for that \$40,000 project is scheduled to begin this month or next

so that the summer water levels will be adequate for recreational use.

The Department of Public Works has informed me that reconstruction of 1.2 miles of New Hampshire Route 28 has been slated for 1978. This \$1 million project will begin approximately 400 yards west of the Route 107 intersection and will run east on Route 28.

**REPORT OF THE ANNUAL  
SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING  
BARNSTEAD, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**March 4, 1977**

The Annual School District Meeting for the Town of Barnstead was held at the Elementary School. The meeting was called to order by Moderator Richard Golden at 7:02 p.m. Moderator read the following announcements: There will be no smoking in the auditorium. Town reports are available at the front of the room. Coffee will be available during the meeting, courtesy of the PTO. Only two amendments will be allowed to any motion. Motions must be made and seconded before any debate can be allowed to any motion. Motion must be made and seconded before any debate can be heard. I will accept no motions to kill. I will accept motion to lay on the table. Five voters may request a secret ballot. Moderator stated he had received a request for a secret ballot pertaining to teachers' salaries and additional teachers, and read the petition and the names of the signers.

Warrants and certifications of warrants being posted were read by the Moderator.

ARTICLE I: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

The following motion was made by William Jenisch and seconded by Lloyd Hanson: "I move the salaries of the School District officers be approved as follows: Moderator \$10.00; Clerk \$10.00; School Board Chairman \$75.00; School Board Members \$75.00 each; Treasurer \$100.00; Auditor \$25.00; and Truant Officer \$20.00." Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE II: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.



The following motion was made by Lloyd Hanson and seconded by William Jenisch; "I move that the reports of agents, auditors, and committees of the School District be accepted as printed in the Annual Report." Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE III: To see if the District wishes to exclude from its Social Security Plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$50.00.

Motion made by Jean Keefe and seconded by Lloyd Hanson to accept this article. Richard Collins asked for explanation of this article. Explanation was that a law had been passed requiring that social security be deducted for everyone. This involves a lot of paper work for such small sums of money involved for these people. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV: To see if the district will authorize the School Board to appoint a five member study committee to study the need for additional school facilities for the district and report their findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1978, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting.

The following motion made by William Jenisch and seconded by Jean Keefe: "I move that the District authorize the School Board to appoint a five member study committee to study the need for additional school facilities for the district and report their findings and recommendations to the School Board no later than January 1, 1978, as well as at the next Annual School District Meeting."

Motion made to amend Article IV by Peter James and seconded by Richard Collins as follows: "To see if the district will authorize the establishment of two study committees, one to study the need for additional school

facilities for the district, and a second to study the question of withdrawing from the Governor Wentworth Regional Union #49 and either joining another union or forming a new union with adjoining towns, which might include, but not be limited to Pittsfield, Epsom, and Northwood. These committees to be made up as follows: the school building committee to have four (4) voters appointed by the moderator, one (1) member of the school board and a member from the Superintendent's office. The committee to study withdrawing from the union to have four (4) voters appointed by the moderator and one (1) member of the school board." Under discussion, Mr. James brought out that he had met with the State Board and learned that re-organization of the supervisory unions was being planned and that Board will meet with the citizens of Barnstead to determine what their feeling is on this. He felt we would be better prepared for these meetings if a study committee was founded now. Mr. Hanson asked Mr. James if he felt Barnstead should withdraw from the Wolfeboro Supervisory Union. Mr. James' answer was "yes".

Vote on amendment: affirmative-voice vote. Vote on Article IV; passed by voice vote.

George Cotton asked if the Study Committees were to be paid. William Jenisch replied that Study Committees were never paid. The School Board agreed they had no objection to the Moderator appointing a study committee.

ARTICLE V: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Motions made by William Gosse and seconded by Richard Collins that the budget be taken up item by item as printed in the Town Report. Accepted by voice vote.

Holly Bickford asked if the additional teacher and speech therapist were included in this amount. Included in the \$11,884, explained Mr. Jenisch, \$4,000 is for speech therapist. School compelled to provide this by the federal government as of law of November 1975 regarding handicapped children. Mr. Jenisch read this law. The amount of \$133,061 includes base plus \$300 raises. Mr. ENISCH READ A LIST OF THE BASE PAY IN OTHER N.H. towns as a comparison with this town. Explanation of the track system was requested by George Cotton. Mr. Hanson read this. R. Collins asked the Board to explain the fringe benefits regarding Blue Cross/Blue Shield. Explanation was that the family plan of Blue Cross/Blue Shield was fully paid by the School District.

There were many questions and much discussion regarding the manner in which the payroll manifests were checked for accuracy and how many signatures were required on the manifests. It was brought out that occasionally an improper name was on the manifest and method of correction. Questions were asked regarding how frequent the practice was of only one board member signing the payroll manifest. It was stated that three board members signed the monthly manifest, but quite often only one member signed the payroll manifest.

Holly Bickford asked if there would be a part time speech therapist next year. W. Locke asked what the dollar comparison was between hiring a part time speech therapist and sending the students to another school or institution. According to Mr. Jenisch, there are six students at present who need this help. The cost of tuition, plus transportation costs, would be approximately \$5,600.00.

Robert Simpson made a motion to amend the motion on the floor as follows: "I move that the figure of \$133,061 be amended to read \$144,945." Second by Ursula Simpson. Ronald Gauthier made motion to move the question—second by Gary Ezzo. Those in favor of ending debate, say yes, against say no. Motion carried by voice vote — no further debate. Explanation of meaning of yes and no vote was clarified as follows: A yes vote means you are in favor of \$144,945; a no vote means that you are against this figure. Paper ballot was used. Result: yes-35; no-94. Motion made by Holly Bickford to amend the motion to read \$137,061. (This figure would include part-time speech therapist). Second by Ronald Gauthier. Explanation: a yes vote would mean you were in favor of adding \$4,000; a no vote would mean you were not in favor of adding \$4,000. Vote was by secret ballot. Result: yes-73; no-55.

Main motion: Richard Collins to approve \$132,341, second by Kenneth Collins. This figure would not include increase above normal step. Moderator ruled this figure did not need paper ballot. Warren Fraser made statement he felt the teachers should be able to have a normal, reasonable increase. Peter James made a motion to move the question; second by Warren Fraser. Passed by voice vote. Moderator explained that to accept the amendment to the main motion, to change the figures to \$132,341, yes would be for the change; no would be against the change. Standing vote: yes 68; no 48. William Gosse called for the original question; second by Peter James; standing vote: to end debate yes-84; no-26. The vote on the budget item: yes-73; no-40 — voted to accept the figure of \$132,341.00.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my twelfth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Two study committees have been active this past year — School Facility Needs and Supervisory Union Study. A complete copy of each report has been made a part of this annual report.

The committee to study the need for additional school facilities did a very in-depth analysis of the past and future growth of Barnstead and the impact this growth will have on the school system. With the present enrollment, plus new students, there will be four temporary classrooms established in the multi-purpose room. This creates two major problems. First, the area will not be available for use for which it was designed. Plays, chorus groups, exercise room and physical education, large group sessions, cafeteria, as well as no longer being available for public evening use will all need to be curtailed, or seriously limited. The second major problem is even more serious. Students will be placed in very inadequate learning areas. The lighting, heating and ventilation was not designed as it would be for a classroom. There will be the problem of more distraction along with poor acoustics. Every attempt will be made to provide the best conditions possible under such difficult circumstances.

The problems are before us. The students are present and deserve the best educational opportunity possible. The present solution is temporary, or better described as makeshift. The permanent solution needs careful study and analysis. A professional architect needs to be available to assist in the best way to expand the school facility. Through an architect you will be able to not only consider the design of additional facilities, but also appropriately examine the mechanical aspect, the heating system, electrical services, structural analysis and adaptability to the site. An architect can be engaged for



this feasibility aspect of the study without obligation for the adventural construction project.

Time is of the essence. Your students will be given the best learning opportunity possible, but in a makeshift environment, it can not help but be less than the opportunities normally available. Not only the students in the multi-purpose area will be effected because the entire student body will be denied the use of the multi-purpose room.

The second study dealt with the supervisory union. Union #49 consists of the town of Pittsfield, Barnstead, Alton and the Governor Wentworth Regional School District (Effingham, Brookfield, Moultonboro, New Durham, Ossipee, Tuftonboro and Wolfeboro). Barnstead is paying 6.98% (\$10,068.00) of the cost for the professional services of a Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Business Administrator, and support staff (payroll bookkeeper, accounts bookkeeper and secretaries). All of the purchasing and payment of products necessary to support Barnstead's educational program are handled through the union office. Payrolls, bidding procedures, instructional planning and coordination, recruitment of staff, facility planning, budgeting and legal guidance are examples of services provided by the union office. Such services can't be provided by an individual school district, thus districts are combined to more efficiently provide them.

Each of the districts in the union have been examining the organization of supervisory unions, even to the extent of discussing this issue with neighboring districts. Just recently the Regional School District's Board voted to request the State Board of Education to establish the Regional as a separate supervisory union. If the State Board concurs, then Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield will be combined, possibly with still other districts, into a new supervisory union. It is very obvious there will be a need to continue a study of the supervisory union organization and more particularly, the impact re-organization may have on Barnstead.

In closing, I wish to thank the members of the School Board for their patience, understanding and dedication. My appreciation also goes to the citizens, parents and school personnel for their continued interest and support in your school system.

## REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my sixth annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I have selected the following areas to report on: (1) Title I; (2) Staffing; (3) Education of the Handicapped.

### I

This is the fifth year of a Title I Cooperative Early Childhood Project with the School Districts of Pittsfield and Alton. The primary objective of the program is still to develop instructional programs to meet the individual needs of Title I children. Last spring a comprehensive Needs Assessment was conducted by a group of teachers and parents under the supervision of Mrs. Judith Bush, program director. As a result of the assessment the following program priorities were established for the next three years:

1. Continued attention to the educationally disadvantaged children on a one-to-one basis.
2. Academic emphasis on language development with attention to reading skills.
3. Home-school coordination with an emphasis on parent education and more parent involvement.

After four and one-half years with the Title I program, Mrs. Bush resigned from her position in December. Her services will be missed.

### II

Mr. William Lance was elected to replace Miss Dagmar Franke as principal. Mr. Lance comes to Barnstead with extensive experience in teaching and administration. Two additional classroom teachers were

added because of increased enrollment. Mrs. Lynn Alden is teaching grade 3 and Mr. Laurence Erhard is teaching reading at the Junior High level. Miss Sharon Briscoe has replaced Mrs. Katherine Latchaw who has a one year leave of absence and Miss Ellen Watts has replaced Mrs. Patricia Rogers at grade one.

### III

The Education for All Handicapped Children Act, P.L. 94-142 requires that handicapped children have available to them a free, appropriate public education which includes Special education and related services to meet their needs. Barnstead has added the following programs in an attempt to provide necessary programs for its students: (1) a speech therapist for three days a week (2) a resource room in order that individual educational plans can be developed and implemented and (3) consultant services to diagnose and prescribe individual plans for identified handicapped children.

Additional services will need to be added as educational handicaps of students are identified. Some of these services will have to be acquired from outside the school district for economical reasons as small numbers of students for various handicap categories will now warrant establishing full-time positions.

It has been my pleasure to enjoy the support and friendly cooperation of the Barnstead School Board, Principal Lance, and the School Faculty.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit this report.

The opening of school on September 7, 1977 found the enrollment to be 299 in grades 1-8. This was a considerable increase over the 263 students enrolled in September 1976. Our present enrollment is 306.

This increase in enrollment has resulted in a serious overcrowding situation in our facility. Two new teachers were added to the staff in October, and two temporary classrooms were established in the multi-purpose room. The need for additional classrooms as well as expanded services to the students is, and should be, of vital concern to the citizens of Barnstead. The excellence of the report of the "Committee to Study the Need for Additional School Facilities" eliminates the need for me to write further on the subject of space needs. However, a few words on the need of an expanded junior high program would seem in order.

Historically, the junior high years have been used as an exploratory experience for students. While the basics are still taught with strong emphasis, the need for students to explore areas such as art, music, home economics, industrial arts, physical education, and other career areas is important. Many potential high school "drop-outs" find success in one or more of these areas and remain in high school because of that successful experience. Others find they have talents in these areas which can be developed into worthwhile careers. These experiences help the student to develop a stronger self concept and makes school more meaningful and worthwhile.

Art, music and physical education should be offered to all children of the district from the time they enter school.

I would like to thank the many people and organizations who have done so much for us at school. The Police and Fire Departments, the P.T.O., the many volunteers who contribute their time and talents in so many different ways.

In closing I want to thank the staff for their dedication, the administration and the board members for their support, the parents, students and citizens for their cooperation during this year.

The first meeting was held on May 19, 1977 with all in attendance. The Committee felt letters should be written to the following organizations:

1. GOVERNOR WENTWORTH REGIONAL SCHOOL — inquiring as to their intent as far as leaving or remaining in Supervisory Union #49.

2. BARNSTEAD SCHOOL BOARD — as to whether Barnstead is getting its worth out of the present Supervisory Union Office.

3. SEVERAL SURROUNDING TOWNS — as to their interest in forming a new union or obtaining more information relative to forming a new union. (Pittsfield, Alton, Strafford and Northwood.)

Letters were requested to be returned to the Committee no later than June 20, 1977.

A letter was written to the Commissioner of Education stating that the Chairman of our Committee was in receipt of a letter dated May 20, 1977 from the Chairman of the Governor Wentworth District stating that they have

requested from the Department of Education a possible separation from Supervisory Union #49.

Our requests from the Commissioner were as follows:

1. What are the procedures for forming a new Union?
2. A map showing the various Supervisory Unions state-wide, especially surrounding Barnstead.
3. What are Barnstead's alternatives?

On June 29, 1977 Commissioner Brunelle answered the Committee. A letter is on file with the Secretary.

On July 29, 1977 a letter was written to Mr. Paul Fifield, Chairman of the Governor Wentworth Regional School Board, requesting a meeting with the Board.

On August 5, 1977 a letter was received from the Assistant Superintendent of Supervisory Union #49, Mr. Elton Knowles, stating it would not be possible to meet with the Committee until early fall and that would only be a sub-committee.

Marge Lank had to resign from the Committee due to a job conflict.

In summary the Committee feels:

1. That Governor Wentworth is still vague on the course they are going to take.
2. The Barnstead School Board feels they are getting their money's worth from the Supervisory Union Office.
3. The Committee feels that Barnstead should continue the way we are, presently due to the possible additional money involved to the taxpayers.
4. The Committee should be continued on a year-to-year basis.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE NEED FOR ADDITIONAL FACILITIES

### Background

By action of the voters at the 1977 Annual Meeting of the Barnstead School District, the Moderator was instructed to appoint a "Committee to Study the Need for Additional School Facilities for the District." This committee was further instructed to report its findings and recommendations, if any, to the Barnstead School Board no later than January 1, 1978 and to the next Annual School District meeting.

The charge of the committee is as stated in its name and reporting deadline. No further instructions were provided.

The committee membership appointed by the Moderator is as follows:

J. Keefe

M. Pszonowsky

R. Nelson

J. Saliba

B. Caldwell, School Board member, was designated by that group as its representative and is the fifth member of the committee. Other members of the School Board would substitute as necessary. The Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Damon Russell, indicated that he would attend meetings on a request basis, which was agreeable to the committee. He further offered the facilities of his office, which were used repeatedly by the committee, as a source of school-related data. In mid-November the committee was informed by Mr. Jenisch, School Board chairman, that he had officially replaced B. Caldwell on the committee. This had been at the request of Mr. Caldwell because of a continuing conflict with his regular employment.

At its first meeting, May 23, 1977, Jean Keefe was elected committee chairperson. Attending were J. Keefe, R. Nelson, M. Pszonowsky, and J. Saliba. At this meeting committee objectives were re-affirmed, types of information to be analyzed were agreed upon, and data gathering assignments made.

### **Enrollment Review — 1970's**

Barnstead Elementary School has not experienced an enrollment decrease since 1971, at which time we had two pupils less than the prior year, 165 vs. 167. The following is a summary of this period:

The seven-year increment of 132 pupils (167 to 299) is a 79% increase. During this same period, 1970-1977, the general population of the township has also increased substantially, 1,119 to 1,726, which is a rate of 54.2%.

### Physical Plant Utilization Review — 1970's

The existing plant of 10 classrooms was being utilized as of the opening of school in September, 1977 as follows:

1 classroom for special students (Resource Room)  
 9 classrooms for regular grades 1-8 (2 rooms for Grade 1, and 1 room each for Grades 2-8)

State **recommended standards** are 20 students per room for Grades 1 and 2, and 25 students per room for Grades 3 through 8.

For planning purposes, and throughout this report hereafter, we have assumed 22 pupils per classroom. On this basis, and with 9 regular classrooms, our current average capacity is for 198 pupils plus those in the Resource Room. Whereas 22 students per room is still not optimum, based on historical use of the school it does allow for reasonable growth prior to the point of again finding

ourselves in an over-crowded situation. It also provides a degree of flexibility for shifts in population between classes, as opposed to changes in total enrollment.

As of September, 1977, thirteen pupils were assigned to the Resource Room and the remaining 286 were assigned to the other 9 classrooms. The latter averages to 32 per room, but even this is not totally indicative of the current problem. Class sizes ranged from a high of 50 in Grade 1 to a low of 27 in Grade 5. On this basis, the "extra" (9th) classroom was allocated by school officials to the first grade. All other grades were in the 30-40 range and housed in single classrooms. The latter does not present a conducive learning or teaching environment by any known standards.

Because of the above, the School Board in October, 1977 analyzed and implemented emergency measures to alleviate, but not eliminate, the classroom over-crowding. This was accomplished by adding two temporary "makeshift" classrooms within the multi-purpose room, one of which was on the stage. This brought the average classroom size to 26, but for all practical purposes eliminated the use of the multi-purpose room for its original intent. Physical Education and other assembly programs have been curtailed, as well as most evening use for community activities.

We entered the 1970's with a seven-classroom school. The latest addition was contracted in September, 1971 and opened in September, 1972. This was the kitchen, multi-purpose room, and 4 classrooms. The net result of the latter was the library plus 3 additional classrooms for a current total of 10 classrooms. In retrospect this addition served its intended purpose for 5 years (1972 through 1976), and the warning signals surfaced in September, 1975. A brief recap is outlined in the following exhibit.

### Enrollment Projections

We make no claim to an accurate prediction of the unknown — tomorrow. Nevertheless, some reasonable attempt must be made to estimate the population at Barnstead School, and for that matter our high school tuition students, for the remainder of the 1970's and well into the 1980's.

To give some idea of the uncertainty of population projections, the New Hampshire Office of Comprehensive Planning in 1975, using the previously mentioned 1970 base population of 1,119, projected an increase in our population to 1,630 in the year 2000. At 1,726 we are already well beyond that figure. Minimally, we must assume a growth rate in excess of 7% average per annum, as already experienced during the 1970's to date. This average growth appears conservative for projection purposes, given new home permits of 19 in 1975 and 35 in 1976. In 1977 through

October 31st, 19 new housing permits have been issued. More significantly, during this same 10-month period of 1977, 51 permits for septic systems for 2-3 bedroom homes/trailers have already been issued. The latter, undoubtedly, will result in requests for building permits with the exception of the 19 already issued.

The following two exhibits, which project enrollment for the elementary and high school grades respectively, are conservative at best in what has been a growth environment within the Town of Barnstead. Except as otherwise noted, the projections are based solely on the percentages developed from the actual births registered in the township and the subsequent actual enrollment figures in the Barnstead School District during the period 1967 to 1977. The present over-crowding in the elementary school, at a minimum, continues to worsen through 1981-82, at which time it peaks at 350 students. It then decreases slightly for 3 years until 1985 when it reverts approximately to our present situation. The upward spiral then begins again.

#### Space Requirements

The elementary school, at 22 students per average class and with a population of 350 students in the foreseeable future, presents a requirement of 16 regular classrooms plus a resource room. This translates to a need for an additional 7 classrooms. Given the 7 additional classrooms, there may be some surplus space for one to two years until the next projected major peak in 1981-82, at which time all of the proposed classrooms would be utilized. However, our growth pattern could take another sudden unpredictable upturn prior to 1981, as we experienced this year, which would eliminate this aforementioned surplus space during the interim period.

Assuming the 7 new classrooms are approved by the township, there will still be a continuing space deficiency for the next two years. This would mean continued and, most likely, expanded utilization of the multi-purpose room for temporary classrooms for that period. If the addition is not approved, the multi-purpose room would be discontinued and have to be converted to permanent classrooms. This action would not be in the best interests of the students, who would lose their assembly and lun-

cheon facilities as well as their dramatic arts and athletic programs. The adult population of Barnstead, who make regular and meaningful use of this room, would likewise suffer from its unavailability.

Nowhere in our analysis have we considered expansion of the curriculum. It has been recognized that the junior high students should have many and varied experiences; for example: arts, music (chorus and band), home economics, industrial arts, physical education, science laboratory experiments and guidance services. These exploratory experiences would enable the student to make better choices when entering high school as well as being better prepared. Such an expansion in our curriculum would require separate, additional facilities when and if ever pursued. Should we be mandated by the State of New Hampshire to implement a kindergarten program, then yet another additional classroom would be required — and one classroom for kindergarten assumes two half-day sessions utilizing the same room. We make no comment, pro or con, on these latter matters. Our analysis, once again, was limited to space requirements for existing services/programs and projected enrollments.

### **Recommendation**

Based on our analysis, we are requesting the Barnstead School Board, after due consideration, to initiate whatever formal steps are required to include in the 1978 school warrant:

— an article authorizing the Barnstead School Board to appoint a Building Committee to prepare a formal solution including all associated costs:

— an article to raise and appropriate a sum of \$18,000 to engage an architect to design, prepare specifications, and proceed with the bidding under the direction of said Building Committee for the proposed addition to the Barnstead Elementary School.

— an article recessing the Annual Meeting to a recommended meeting in late September for the purpose of approving a bond issue as a result of the bids received.

The resolution of the above articles will serve to accomplish our recommendation:

“PROVIDE WITHIN THE EARLIEST POSSIBLE TIME FRAME THE APPROPRIATE SPACE FOR SEVEN (7) ADDITIONAL CLASSROOMS SO AS TO MAINTAIN A REASONABLE WORKING AND LEARNING ENVIRONMENT FOR 350 STUDENTS AND THUS FREEING THE MULTI-PURPOSE ROOM FOR ITS ORIGINAL INTENDED USE.”

By adhering to this time frame, it is reasonable to assume that permanent additional space, if approved by the townspeople by September, 1978, can be available for use as of September, 1979.

There is one final matter on which preliminary review was begun and of necessity is left to the proposed Building Committee for their consideration. As earlier indicated in the Exhibit on High School Projections, the increased enrollment in the elementary school translates into 200-plus high school students, an increase in excess of 100 percent. We have separately requested of the Pittsfield School Board their advice as to whether or not they can continue to accept our students given the increased enrollment and, if not, then at what point must our present arrangement cease. Our only point herein, and we emphasize that this is not a recommendation, is that if we are advised, or can reasonably conclude, that alternate arrangements must be made for our high school students, then perhaps a combined Junior/Senior High School facility, unilaterally or in combination with another district, be considered as an alternative to expansion at the present elementary school. We ask that the Barnstead School Board follow through on our original questions to

the Pittsfield School Board, a copy of which has been made available for this purpose.

We wish to thank each of those who have contributed in any way with this effort.

**TENTATIVE WARRANT  
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Barnstead qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Elementary School in said district on the tenth day of March, 1978, at 7:30 in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the district will vote, pursuant to RSA 31:105, to provide idemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property, providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his employment or office.

4. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$22,894.00 as a deficit appropriation to be applied against the 1977-78 appropriation; this sum to be turned over to the School District prior to June 30, 1978. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a building committee of five members to work with an architect to prepare a formal solution, including all associated costs, and report such findings to the School Board no later than September 1, 1978.

6. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000.00 and authorize the school board to engage an architect to design an addition on or adjacent to the existing elementary school. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
