## TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs. You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in Bath on Tuesday, March 13, 1961 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Treasurer, an Auditor, a Highway Agent, and all other necessary officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the poor, Town Library, for old age assistance, for the protection of the public and all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class 5 roads and to raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$763.32.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$125.68 for the town's share of cooperative participation in the White Mountains Region Association. Article 6. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall the provisions of the Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expense of the same.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the delivery of inventory blanks until April 1st.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through the Tax Collector's deed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to observing a 200th anniversary in 1965.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legaly come before this meeting.

The State Library Commission awarded the Shieling Fund Grant, of \$1,000, for the establishment of a cooperative book selection group, including the following libraries: Bath, Franconia, Lincoln, Lisbon, Sugar Hill, Littleton.

Through this group, which meets regularly, the libraries are afforded the opportunity to select and order books through the State Library at a substantially larger discount than would be possible if ordered individually.

The Shieling Fund is used to purchase books to be shared cooperatively with the other libraries. At the expiration of the grant the books will be divided among the libraries. These books are superior volumes that would ordinarily be beyond the price range of the smaller libraries.

# REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER TOWN OF BATH For Year Ending Dec. 31, 1961

Three Well Child Conferences and immunization clinics for polio, smallpox, whooping cough, tetanus and diphtheria were held at Lisbon town hall and the children of Bath were included in these clinics.

This year we are particularly urging parents to see their family physician for polio shots. It is important for mothers and fathers to see that they themselves are protected against this disease as well as their children.

Home visits were made by the state public health nurse to infants, pre-schools and adults for counseling and assistance with health problems.

### **REPORT OF BATH FIRE DEPT.**

In the year of 1957, through the Selectmen, we purchased a Gorham Rump Portable Pump and 250 feet of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch hose. It was delivered to the Town garage and was there a few months before anyone knew about it. The Warden was notified that a pump and hose was in the garage.

The Warden contacted Arthur Minot, Vale Badger and Albert Lamarre, and they were undecided if a trailer should be made or to purchase a small truck. Through the generosity of G. C. Minot, a pick-up frame was donated. A body was made and hose and pump were mounted. This was kept in Roscoe Olney's barn for a time.

In 1958 we held a meeting with the Selectmen, hoping to obtain a stall in the garage. They decided to give us room under the Selectmen's Office. We lost no time in digging out the front and installed a set of doors in a cement wall, and insulating and covering walls and ceiling. Next we purchased a Boyer truck with a 500 gal. pump with our own money. Then we purchased an oil furnace to heat the station. Wilfred Lamarre installed fixtures and pipes without charge for his work, which was appreciated.

In 1958, through the generosity of a businessman in town, we were able to get a 2-ton Chevrolet truck. An 850 gal. tank was mounted on same. This also has a portable pump, stationary, on the rear to pump water. In winter the pump is started before the truck goes out in order that it may circulate and not freeze on the road. Another business concern in town has helped us greatly with donations and we wish to thank these people. In 1959 and each year since, the town has appropriated \$1,000.00 for the Fire Dept.

In 1960 firemen purchased 2 ten-wheel, four-wheel drive (surplus) Air Force trucks. We have an 800 gal. tank mounted on one. We are still working on it and expect to equip it with a portable pump and hose.

During the past year we decided to try to purchase the Cities Service building for a fire station. Through the help of one of the businessmen, we were able to purchase this building.

Much appreciation is given to Lawyer Robert Hobbs for giving his time on all legal matters for the Dept. At the present time we are undertaking a big job, remodeling, as well as insulating and adding new wire for electric fixtures. We were able to borrow money through a long term loan, and are making payments. The Ladies Auxiliary have formed a group and are helping in every way possible. The upstairs will be made into a hall for meeting and recreation. This work is being done by the firemen themselves, evenings and Sundays.

Since this Department has been organized we have pumped out many flooded cellars, springs and wells. In 1957 we had 1 fire; 1958, 10 fires; 1959, 11 fires; 1960, 13 fires; 1961, 10 fires.

We have about 25 members in the Department. Meetings are held on the first and third Wednesdays of every month which are open to the public. Since the Fire Dept. was organized in 1957, we have earned money by serving an annual Turkey supper, through raffles and donations. We have earned to date \$2,-577.13 and spent it on equipment and supplies for the fire station.

Equipment to date consists of:

Boyer truck with a 500 gal. pre-minute capacity

### An Appeal from Your Forest Fire Warden

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook—yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness—our carelessness. This, we—you—and I can do something about. When we require you to obtain a permit for out-ofdoors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations—hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you—

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

### *1961 - 1962*

The teaching staff of the primary and elementary grades remains the same as for the previous year. Mr. Cox resigned at the close of school to accept a position in Hooksett, N.H. A professional as well as a financial advancement for him.

Mr. Robert Savoy was elected to the position of principal and teacher of grades six, seven, and eight. Mr. Savoy, a resident of Woodsville, graduated from Norwich University, Northfield, Vermont, receiving a B.A. degree. He had one year's teaching experience at Bradford Academy, Vermont, before coming to Bath.

Mrs. Leona Johnson replaced Mrs. Esther Whitney in October as school lunch cook and supervisor. Mrs. Whitney had served for four years in this capacity.

Linwood, "Gramp", Tewksbury resigned in December as janitor, having served the district as such since September 1950. Arthur Gilbert was employed as the new janitor.

Everyone interested in education should have important national facts on the educational enterprise of his interest, both accomplishments and shortcomings.

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"Forty years" holds a different meaning for each of us, depending on our vantage point. In retrospect, we must concede the unreliability of memory, but we may also rationalize that the intervening years have brought important changes and significant improvements—both in the schools and in society as a whole.

In broad terms, the major changes in the schools during the past four decades have developed in a setting of great social and economic change. The automobile, a mobile population, high standards of material living, working mothers, television, and increased leisure are illustrative of new ingredients in the complex social recipe for rearing children.

Changes in the school's physical plant and equipment are evident from observation. The Rip Van Winkle school administrator of 1921 would marvel at the increased size of school buildings and the space for work and play.

The principle that learning is affected by one's attitude toward learning and the atmosphere in which it takes place now extends to school construction. Children and human nature have changed very little during the last 40 years.

Recognizing the educational lag and the wide diversity in classroom procedures, let us list some general trends in the classroom:

- 1. Recognition that children learn and are not "taught" in the usual meaning of the word has altered classroom procedures. Learning is an individual matter.
- 2. Learning is best achieved, whenever possible, through problem solving, use of children's interest, and actual situations in which knowledge is functional. Real learning is a process of changing behavior.

- 3. The importance of understanding individual children to provide better educational opportunities for them has captured the thinking of modern teachers.
- 4. Schools use standardized tests, record the results, analyze the data, and apply the findings in guiding children to an extent undreamed of 40 years ago.
- 5. Use of increased amounts and kinds of instructional materials of multilevel difficulty. Provision for individual differences through a variety of purposeful activities based on units, problem solving, and research. Identification of and provision for groups of children such as the gifted and the retarded.

The over-all picture in respect to both school organization and classroom procedures has been one of development and improvement.

If we could view the future in a crystal ball, the educators work would be much easier. That is not possible. But we do know that the next 40 years will bring accelerating change far beyond the scope of the years from 1921 to 1961. The past and the present give us our vantage point for the challenge of the persistent future.

The continued interest of the individual members of the school board, the professional attitude of the teachers, and the cooperation of the citizen is a tribute to the educational system.

Your attention is directed to the report of Mrs. Muriel LaMott, R.N., which follows.

Routine screening tests were completed.

The audiometer was lost in the Woodsville Graded School fire January 12, 1961. The Woodsville Cohase Lions Club purchased a new Maico Audiometer to replace the one lost in the fire. This is the latest model available and with it we can test either ear by turning a switch on the instrument panel of the machine. This is a great saving in time as with the older model we had to remove the head phones and turn them when we had finished testing one ear.

During December, Dr. Prince, from the State Department of Health, assisted by Mrs. Russell, Public Health Nurse, and myself, gave the new Heaf tuberculosis tests in grades 1 and 8. Pupils in grades 1 and 8 received permission slips to be signed by their parents giving consent for this test. The teachers and lunch workers also had an opportunity to take the test. The test results were read by Mrs. Russell and myself. When a positive reaction to the test was noted, a home visit was made and all members in the home were given the test. Later in June, pupils with a positive reaction were referred to the Chest Clinic for an X-ray. There were 36 Heaf tests done. One pupil was X-rayed at the Chest Clinic in June.

One pupil was tested at the Child Guidance Clinic in Concord.

One pupil attended the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic at Littleton.

In May and June, we had two polio clinics. Dr. H. Pickwick gave the shots assisted by Mrs. Russell, R.N., Mrs. Betty Minot, R.N., Mrs. Marion Whitney, R.N., and Mrs. Esther Whitney. I am most grateful to Mrs. Marion Whitney, Mrs. Betty Minot, and Mrs. Esther Whitney who generously donated their time to help with these clinics. A total of 52 fourth polio, 2 third polio, 1 second polio, and 8 first polio shots were given.

I want to thank Mr. Bennett, Mr. Cox and his staff, the parents and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in the health program this past year.

## Program of the White Mountains Region Association

The White Mountains Region Association as a voluntary nonprofit organization, receives support from the communities of the Region, the state and from individual members so that a program of cooperative promotion and development of northern New Hampshire may be carried on.

The Association publishes and distributes six different folders a year advertising the many advantages of the Region. It receives and carefully answers about 6,000 letters per year from people interested in a vacation in the North Country. The value of this single service cannot be over-emphasized. Recent surveys have shown that the tourists attracted by this mailing service have spent many hundreds of thousands of dollars in the Region. The Association sponsors the annual fall foliage tours, and represents the Region at national travel shows.

Through its board of directors, it is able to speak for the Region's needs at state and national hearings and at important meetings within the Region. It maintains a news release service to local newspapers to help inform the citizens of the North Country of worth-while activities and economic trends.

This winter the Association is running a cooperative ad program with the chambers of commerce in the ski areas to promote skilng in the White Mountains. It cooperates with private promotional groups, local chambers of commerce, and with the state promotional agencies. It promotes the sale of real estate through the mailing of real-estate purchase bulletins to real estate brokers. It conducts labor surveys for groups interested in industrial development, maintains an award program for the 4-H Clubs, and promotes agriculture within the Region.

In uninterrupted service since 1938, it has helped establish the White Mountains Region as a vacation center as fine as any in the world and contributed in many other ways to the economic better ment of all forty-six communities in northern New Hampshire.
