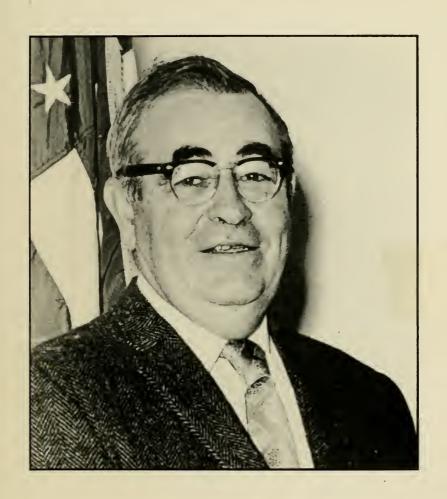

MALCOLM "Mac" "Mal" STEVENSON

"Mac" gave generously of his time and talents in serving both Bethlehem and the State of New Hampshire. He served two decades in the N. H. House of Representatives and was then appointed by Governor Meldrim Thomson to the NH Public Utilities Commission where he represented the northern part of the State for six years.

On the "home town" level he served thirty years as a Bethlehem Village District Commissioner, several years as moderator of the Profile School District, as well as being, with his wife, Doris, a trustee of the Jason C. Somerville Educational Trust. He also served his country in the US Maritime Service during World War II. He was a successful and respected small town entrepreneur yet still found time to be active in such organizations as the I.O.O.F.

"Mac", a modest, self-effacing man, possessed a parliamentary ability that enabled him to see and understand both sides of a problem, calm troubled waters and mediate a solution . . . a man who will long be remembered by family and friends throughout the entire State of New Hampshire.

At his funeral held at the Odd Fellows Hall in Bethlehem, where Governor Meldrim Thomson was an honorary bearer, an impressive tribute was paid to a man whose life so well mirrored the opportunities that a small town offers for public service encounters, and "Mac" met the challenge wisely and well.

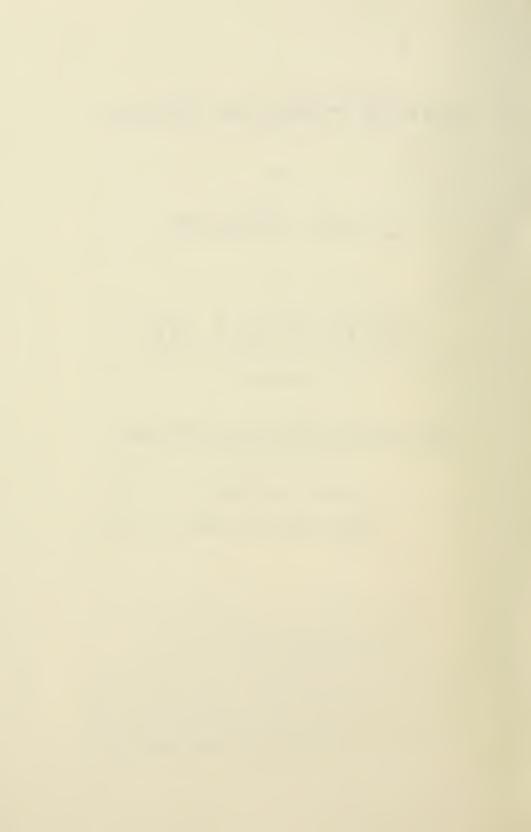

AUDIT REPORT TO THE TOWN 1984 Tax Year

This is to certify that I have, on a spot check basis, audited the accounts and records of the Town of Bethlehem for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1984. I have found nothing wrong of any magnitude. It is my view that the reports included herein reflect an accurate picture of the general financial condition of the Town for the tax year under review.

The following remarks cover areas in the operation of the Town that require urgent attention.

I. Outside Qualified Auditor

As stated in last year's audit report, the current audit system in not a satisfactory audit system for a Town of Bethlehem's complexities. It represents only a surface type audit. It is probably satisfactory in identifying major problems but it is not a true audit.

Procedures now followed by the Town for the greater part, have not changed over the last fifty years or more; the Town itself, however, has changed enormously and has become very much more complex.

It is this auditor's view that the Town, without delay, should hire a qualified Auditor to audit the Town records in depth and to recommend changes in procedures that would, if implemented, result in more efficient management of Town affairs. Such an audit could be repeated every five or six years with the interim period audits being carried out generally as per the present system.

II. Internal Auditing

It is recommended that the Town elect 2 or more auditors rather than only one so as to maintain continuity. Auditors could be elected for terms of two or more years on a staggered basis.

III. Review of Town Operations as related to Financial Matters.

A. Budget Procedure

This is a repeat of last year's recommendations. Currently the Selectmen are the Budget Committee. This procedure does not result in the Budget receiving the review in depth that it needs for sound preparation nor does it result in proper follow-up to see that the authorized Budget is executed as approved. A Budget Committee should be established operating on an autonomous basis.

B. Gasoline and Fuel Oil

This is a repeat of last year's recommendations. Improved controls should be established.

C. Timber Yield Tax

This is a repeat of last year's recommendations. There has been no improvement in the administration of this tax at both Town and State level. The result of this is that the Town continues to be deprived of Tax income that it should, by law, be receiving.

Ian MacDonald asked for an explanation of the Town Dump appropriation. An explanation was offered by Selectman Bruce Kilkenny. Mr. MacDonald continued to question the \$25,000.00 for the Town Dump. The Moderator, Peter Smith, explained changes in State law required the Town to contract for the dump. Selectman George Hardy explained State requirements for landfill, etc. There was some other discussion on the Town Dump.

William Hatch asked about the increase of \$7,000.00 over last year for the Town Building appropriation. Selectman Raymond Little, related that the boiler

may have to be replaced.

Raymond Little questioned the need for the increase in the Police Department appropriation, \$2,000.00 for four trainees and \$4,500.00 for a third full time officer. Police Chief, Howard Sanborn, explained he is now working two shifts per day and needs the third officer so each man would work one shift. Chief Sanborn further explained that he has lost one part time officer and he needs the special officers for Saturdays and Sundays when the regulars are off and for special duty at the schools, etc.

Leonard Malenoski asked if the Insurance appropriation was put out to bid.

Selectman Raymond Little answered no.

There was considerable additional discussion on the Police Department appropriation including Fred Sleeper's statement that there has been no increase in crime in Bethlehem which proves the Chief's case. Mr. Sleeper's statement

brought a round of applause from those present.

Ian MacDonald again questioned the \$4,500.00 increase in the Town Dump appropriation. The Moderator said he would take note of the fact that Mr. MacDonald was opposed to the increase. At this time Mr. MacDonald made a motion to amend the Town Dump appropriation by decreasing it by \$4,500.00 seconded by Simone Stackpole, reducing the total of Article 2 from 388,260.00 to \$383,760.00. After some other discussion the amendment was duly voted and failed.

Raymond Little moved to amend the Police Department appropriation by decreasing it by \$6,500.00 for a new figure of \$55,000.00 seconded by Louis DeSouza, reducing the total of Article 2 from \$388,260.00 to \$381,760.00. After

some discussion the amendment was duly voted and failed.

With no other discussion Article 2 as written was duly voted and carried.

Article 3. (\$158,315.00 appropriated) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Richard Pollak To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highway purposes the following sums:

Raymond Ritchotte called for a secret ballot. After considerable discussion including Richard Pollak's statement that Danny Tucker does a good job which initiated a round of applause, eight persons joined Mr. Ritchotte in asking for a secret ballot. The Town Clerk furnished ballots, ballot box and Checklist. Supervisor's of the Checklist, Lorna Ray and Marsha Dickerman oversaw the Checklist and the voting proceeded. When all those present and eligible to vote had done so the Moderator proceeded to read the votes as the Town Clerk tallied them. The results of the ballot vote was Yes, 118 and No, 33. After considerable discussion including how the figure was arrived at (by population), and how the money was distributed, Selectman George Hardy related that the Town was charged for services rendered in addition to the amount appropriated and read a letter to that effect from the White Mountain Mental Health Center. A standing vote was called on the amendment. It was obvious without a count that the majority was in favor of the amendment. The amendment carried.

RESULT: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the White Mountain Mental Health Center. With no other discussion the amended Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 10. (\$3,129.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars (\$3,129.00) for the North Country Home Health Agency. With an explanation of services read by the Moderator discussion ended. The Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 11. (\$230.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$230.00) for the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 12. (\$500.00 appropriated) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Selectman, Bruce Kilkenny explained the Community Action Outreach Program was a self-help agency that distributed the cheese and butter, helped with fuel assistance, etc. Raymond Little said it was his understanding that forty-eight households in Bethlehem received fuel assistance, also that most of their help was volunteer, and that their services were not provided by other agencies. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 13. (\$500.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission. After some discussion on the benefits to Bethlehem including tourism and business benefits, the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 14. (\$1,593.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (\$1,593.00) for North Country Council, Inc. Richard Pollak. and Raymond Little spoke on the benefits to the Town including legal advise, grants, etc. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 15. (\$750.00 appropriated) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such expenditures as may be necessary to continue qualification of Ambulance operation under the Statute IIR151 effective September 1, 1972 in an amount not to exceed Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00). With no discussion the Article was duly voted and unanimously carried.

Article 16. (\$10,000.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund to acquire highway equipment and to designate the Board of Selectmen to carry out the objects designated by the Town. With considerable discussion both for and against the benefits of establishing Capital Reserve Funds the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 17. (\$5,000.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund to acquire fire equipment and to designate the Board of Selectmen to carry out the objects designated by the Town. With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 18. (\$5,000.00 appropriated) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund to acquire police equipment and to designate the Board of Selectmen to carry out the objects designated by the Town. With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 19. (\$27,000.00 *appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Twenty-seven Thousand Dollars (\$27,000.00) for the updating and correction of errors and omissions of the Town Maps. After some discussion which revealed that all three Selectmen were in favor of the Article, Selectman Raymond Little displayed the maps now in use, which were revealed to be in very poor condition. Richard Pollak made a motion to increase the appropriation by \$5,000.00 to maintain the maps seconded by Alistair MacBain. After some discussion the amendment was duly voted and failed. With little discussion the original Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 20. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy If the foregoing Article No. 19 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated and for this purpose in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. or any other enabling authority, delegating to the Board of Selectmen the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, or discount rate or notices providing for the sale thereof. With no discussion a standing vote was called. The results were Yes 98 and No 0. The Article unanimously carried.

Article 21. (\$3,000.00 appropriated) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the purchase of equipment for the Golf Course/Country Club, as follows: (a) Two thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for a Blitzer mover: (b) One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) Gary Farway Units new blades, roller, etc. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 22. (\$800.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for the preparation and correction of the cemetery maps. Richard Pollak asked if two copies would be made and one would be allowed out of the office. Selectman Bruce Kilkenny answered in the affirmative. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 23. (\$4,500.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500.00) for the drainage and exterior foundation work necessary to resolve the water problem of the Town Building. After considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 24. (\$26,000.00 authorized) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, and/or Anti-recession Funds for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated, or take any other action hereon:

Total Authorized Withdrawal \$26,000.00 After some discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 25. (\$45,000.00 authorized) It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00) of surplus monies to aid in defraying the current year's budget (1984) and ease the effect on the tax rate. William Russell made a motion to reduce the authorized amount by \$4,700.00 for a total of \$40,300.00 the \$4,700.00 to be used to clean up Main Street by using high school students to mow lawns and do general clean up work, seconded by Clare Brown. The Moderator informed Mr. Russell that his motion was out of order as his proposal would have had to be a separate Warrant Article. Eleanor Corliss informed Mr. Russell that the money in this Article could not be used for the purposes he proposed as it was to be used only to off-set taxes. After considerable discussion Mr. Russell propsed that Article 2 be reopened under other business and withdrew his amendment. The second agreed to withdraw. With no other discussion the original Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 26. It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 27. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Raymond Little To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time to pay current maintenance and operating expenses for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 28. It was moved by Raymond Little and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector and a Deputy Town Clerk. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 29. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Deed of Tax Collector by public auction or sealed bid after advertisement of intention to sell. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 30. To see if the Town will choose one auditor for the ensuing year. Lorna Ray nominated Oliver Underhill for auditor for the ensuing year seconded by Pauline Keach. There was some discussion raised by Richard Pollak to hire professional auditors in the future. Margaret Gale related that she had investigated the possibility and had an estimate of around \$3,000.00 for professional audits that could be put into next years Warrant. Eleanor Corliss nominated Madeline Caswell for auditor for the ensuing year seconded by Dorothy Tupper. It was asked if either of those nominated was present and if they would accept the position if elected. Mrs. Caswell replied in the affirmative. Mr. Underhill was not present. With no other nominations offered the Moderator declared the nomination closed. A standing vote was called. The results were Oliver Underhill 43, and Madeline Caswell 20. The Moderator declared Oliver Underhill duly elected auditor for the ensuing year.

Article 31. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Raymond Little "To see if the Town will authorize action as called for by the recommendations of the Study Committee. The recommendations are included in the report to the Town by the Study Committee as authorized and funded by the Town at the 1983 Town Meeting." (This Article inserted by Petition.) With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 32. (\$300.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by George Hardy "If the foregoing Article is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of (\$300.00) Three Hundred Dollars to cover travel and clerical costs etc. incurred by the Committee." (This Article inserted by Petition.) Margaret Gale explained that only \$30.00 was spent last year for the equalization study, but Mr. Underhill anticipated further expenses this year. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 33. It was moved by Richard Coney and seconded by Howard Keach "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue a permit, or permits, at their discretion for the operation of taxicabs in said town. Also that no person, persons, Company or Corporation shall operate, or solicit for. taxi business in said Town until a permit is obtained." (This Article inserted by Petition.) An explanation was offered by Richard Coney. After considerable discussion the Article was duly voted and failed.

- Article 34. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.
- Article 35. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.
- Article 36. Acted upon by ballot and adopted,
- Article 37. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.
- Article 38. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

William Russell moved to put into next years Warrant an Article to hire a CPA firm to audit the Town at least every three years seconded by Ian Mac-Donald. Richard Pollak offered an amendment to delete three years and add every year seconded by James Tibbetts. The amendment was duly voted and carried. After some discussion James Tibbetts gave an explanation of the different kinds of audits. Mr. Tibbetts said he would recommend a "full blown" audit for a community this size. With no other discussion the amended motion was duly voted and carried.

Leonard Reed made a motion that no smoking be allowed at the 1985 Town Meeting seconded by Richard Pollak. With little discussion the motion was duly voted and failed.

William Russell moved to reopen Article 2 and increase the Holiday and Landscaping appropriation by \$4,700.00 to be used for mowing and clean-up of the Main Street seconded by Alistair MacBain. The Moderator related that if Article 2 was reopened it would be reopened in it's entirety not for one line item only. The motion to reopen Article 2 was duly voted and failed.

Suzanne Derby asked to instruct the Selectmen to pay attention to the recommendations of Oliver Underhill on page 14 of the Town Report especially in regard to Warrants seconded by Clare Brown, adding to establish a broadbase committee to see to it. The motion was duly voted and failed.

Clare Brown asked the Selectmen to take a look at the Town properties and if money is available to take care of mowing and maintaining Town property.

William Russell thanked everyone that voted for him. A round of applause followed.

Alistair MacBain recommended a electrician take a look at the wiring in the Town Building due to the problem of fuse blowing in the court room when the polls were open.

Margaret Gale asked that we thank outgoing Selectman Raymond Little for his three years of service to the Town. Those present responded with a round of applause. Raymond Little thanked the people.

Martin Tirrell moved to get as unbiased newscoverage as possible and get more positive coverage seconded by Alistair MacBain. The Moderator said that should be a statement of policy for the entire Town. The motion was voted and carried.

William Hatch moved we adjourn seconded by Alistair MacBain. With all in agreement the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 11:34 p.m.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

BRETZFELDER MEMORIAL PARK COMMITTEE

The Bretzfelder Memorial Park Committee is now in its second year as a legal body of the Town of Bethlehem. The committee's nine members (three ex-officio and six appointed) provide guidance in development and use of this community resource. The Park, which opened to limited use in 1982, is owned and managed by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests under the terms of the will of Helen Bretzfelder in trust for the good of the Town.

In the term since the last biennial report, there have been these developments:

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES - The Park now has a central parking area which provides convenient access to the Bretzfelder Memorial grove and to a sturdy new picnic shelter ideal for family and group gatherings. The lower road and pond area serves as access to ice skating and cross-country skiing on a trail built with the help of 6th grade students at the Elementary School. The Committee is now finalizing plans for a facilities building which will make the park fully "functional" by late this year.

LAND - The area of the Park has been expanded from 17 acres to 77 acres through donation and purchase. These acquisitions provide a buffer along the northern edge of the park and access to a large "wild" tract which provides superb wildlife habitat and opportunity to establish a demonstration forest for the Town.

EDUCATION - Perhaps the most visible values of the Park are its Conservancy or educational functions. For the second year the Committee is sponsoring the Nature Day Labs at the Elementary School. These weekly sessions bring the benefits of Environmental Education to all our youngsters at no charge to the Town. Forest Society Education Coordinator Jeff Wallner also leads a number of summer evening programs, winter nature study workshops, and summer nature sessions for youngsters. (You can get the current schedule by calling the Forest Society office at 444-6228.)

The Park Committee is enthusiastic about the progress of the Park and hopes the community will continue to support our efforts to develop both a community resource and an attraction for visitors. We invite you to drive down Prospect Street to visit the Memorial grove or join us in a scheduled program.

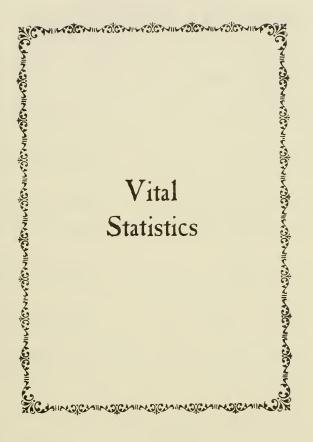
