## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,836.00 to be matched by a like amount from the State to complete the Blair Road.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other Cemeteries in Town.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Plymouth Memorial Hospital.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

11. To see if the Town will vote to add twenty cents to each poll tax not paid by December first of each year.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## LETTER FROM JOHN H. FOSTER

### State Forester Relative to White Pine Blister Rust

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Following our usual custom of rendering a report of expenditures and accomplishments to towns which appropriate for white pine blister rust control, there is attached a statement of the 1945 work.

An unusual amount of financial aid to towns from State and Federal sources was available during 1945. This was owing to the scarcity of labor which prevented control work from being conducted in all the appropriating towns. Therefore, in those towns where labor was available it was possible to allot a greater sum of either state or federal money than is the case generally under normal conditions. These additional funds enabled us to cover additional territory without cost to the town.

Investigations have indicated that in much of the pine area felled by the hurricane in 1938, as well as others logged previously, white pine is reseeding such lands. This offers a definite promise of future crops if given the necessary protection from disease and fire. The value of white pine to this state can not be over emphasized.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

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To Campton School Board:

I herewith submit the report of School Nursing from September, 1944 to July 1945:

Vision—2 new glasses, 4 changed lenses, 2 children had operations for strabismus paid by State Sight Conservation.

Two children attended orthopedic clinics at Laconia and had treatment recommended.

The audiometer test was given to children in the Grades Third to Eighth inclusively, by which six were found to have defective hearing. Three children had tonsil operations as result of this test and following examinations by physician.

Mumps was the only childhood communicable disease occurring in the schools. Several cases of pediculosis and skin diseases were reported.

105 school calls, 102 home calls.

31 business calls were made in connection with the work.

In the Fall, 1945, the inspection was made and symptoms of these defects found:

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Campton School Board:

My third annual report now submitted presents to you, and through you to the people of Campton, the customary information about the operation of our schools. Should any person desire information or answers to questions not found in this report they will be gladly given on request.

We have a comfortable enrollment in every school except the grammar room at the Village. In that room there are really too many pupils for one teacher to handle with four grades but there seems to be nothing we can do about it. It is a strange coincidence that most new pupils moving into Campton come to that room which already has the largest registration. Mrs. Dole has done an exceptionally fine piece of work in overcoming the many difficulties encountered.

If school enrollment throughout the town increases as it well may when more people follow those who have already moved to rural communities from crowded industrial centers we shall face a real problem whose solution has not yet been faced. It will then be advisable to set up a school in which children who could profit most from special instruction can be grouped together. Such a step has not yet been recommended because of lack of room and transportation difficulties. When and if an opportunity school is organized it will not only give all children more appropriate training but it will also make teacher time more productive.

Our children now have as modern and attractive textbooks in most subjects as they would find if they were to change to a city school system. The money spent for this equipment in the last three years is a good investment. However, one complete textbook change is still needed—geography for grades four through seven. When that is accomplished we shall be free to give science instruction to eighth grade pupils instead of geography as at present.

Teachers are continually urged to make sure that economical use is made of all school supplies. Pupils should be made to realize that the "free" schools provided for them are not free for their tax-paying parents. It is a valuable part of every child's training that he learn to make full and wise use of what the public generously provides. His adult ideas of thrift and values will be largely shaped by the practices of childhood.

While school attendance is generously good, considerable improvement is possible. Again, the practices of childhood will shape the ideals and attitudes which will either help or hinder in later life. In the case of high school pupils whose tuition is paid by the town regular and punctual attendance is all the more necessary. It is my opinion that the School Board may properly consider denying continued tuition payments for those whose attendance records show a lack of appreciation of the advantages they are now receiving.

Throughout my service in Campton schools the School Board has shown a deep interest in the welfare of our children and have cooperated splendidly. Townspeople and pupils have been responsive and friendly. For this fine spirit and assistance my appreciation is extended.
