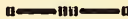

## A WORD FROM THE SELECTMEN

---

This is your 191st Town Meeting and your 108th printed report. We hope it meets with your approval as it has in the past.

We have been able to save money in several departments, but this does not mean we will be able to afford you the same savings next year. Let us impress upon you that the money voted at the annual School and Town Meetings will be what determines your tax rate for the ensuing year.

We received \$1,432.49 Duncan money from the state for highways. This money was spent to clean ditches on the tarred roads and to gravel several pieces of road in the northeast part of town. Next year this money will be kept separate and a special account made of it.

The little town hall was repaired at a cost of \$1,286.74, including heat. This makes an ideal place for smaller meetings and will accomodate between forty and forty-five people.

8. By Request— To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from a point one hundred twenty-five feet west of the residence of Ralph W. Emerson leading westerly to the Cornish Center Stage road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for a visiting nurse.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association for the purpose of promoting and publicizing the natural advantages of the town together with other towns in the region.

11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to trading the present road grader for a new grader with snow plow and wing and raise money therefore.

12. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to gravel and tar the Town road from the end of the tar to the Charles H. Johnson home.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE CORNISH CIVIL DEFENSE

---

As you know, your Civil Defense organization has been inactive for nearly a year, so your director has little to report to you. Insofar as we are organized, however, we have participated in the State and National tests.

The whole aspect of Civil Defense on the national scale has been in the process of complete reversal, and only now are the local directors beginning to get directions for entirely new procedures. Cornish will step up its program to comply with these procedures to become an effective unit in the over all plans.

The recommended stages on a national scale are as follows:

1. **To provide warning, where possible, and information about radiological levels.**

(This requires a monitoring system and radio-net. Both of these are being organized in Cornish right now.)

2. **Protection against fall-out.**

(This involves a "shelter-program." It means evacuating our school children to their own homes first, and setting up the entire town to receive evacuees from the south, or north if Canada should be hit. The state has designated Cornish to receive 2,117 refugees who will be housed in your homes for a limited period of time.)

3. **Protection against atomic blast and heat.**

(This is the major problem of large city and urban areas, and does not apply to Cornish particularly.)

In view of the above program, I hope all of you are asking what you can do now to help prepare for an emergency. I suggest the following items to aid you with your own program:

1. Prepare your home for radiological fall-out.
2. Stockpile extra food in tins or glass. Plant more this summer, and can much more than your family needs.
3. Check and protect your source of water against fall-out contamination.
4. Mend and wash outgrown clothing and household linens to have for your "guests" who will have little, if any, baggage.
5. Check your First Aid supplies.
6. Become informed on any of the above through your director.
7. JOIN your local Civil Defense organization, and be assigned to a definite post in the event of an emergency.

Our regular meetings are held on the third Monday of each month with all sessions open to any and all interested persons. Winter meetings are usually held at the members' homes and those in the warmer months at the Selectmen's Office. We urge you to bring your ideas for the betterment of our town to us. You are always welcome to join us.

## Forest Fire Prevention Is Everybody's Business

---

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem — 97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable — a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires — all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort — The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home — use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fireplaces and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted material — cigars, cigarettes matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER — The fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

REMEMBER — FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS AND OUR MOST IMPORTANT UNDERTAKING.

## REPORT OF GEORGE STOWELL FREE LIBRARY

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The trustees of your library decided this year to omit from the town report the list of the books purchased during the year. The cost of printing the town report is so high that we felt it wise to have the list published in the paper as they are bought. We hope you will look for them there.

As you will note from our budget this has been a year of high operating expense. From a total budget of \$1,042.56 only \$222.92 could be spent for books. The library's purpose is defeated when the expenses overbalance the purchase of books in this way. However, expenses do continue to rise. Our insurance agent tells us that the insurance inspector feels that the amount of insurance we have is very low. We would like to increase it. We also need to buy a set of encyclopedia of the type needed so often by students. This will be an expensive item. With all this in mind we have decided to ask you for \$600 instead of our usual \$500 figure.

In May, Mrs. Tatro and Mrs. LaClair attended a book meeting at the Congregational Conference Center in Pembroke and gained thereby.

The Reading and Discussion Group of the Women's Fellowship have been meeting in the library on the second Wednesday afternoon of each month. These meetings are open to all.

In August we presented our usual exhibit at the Cornish Fair.

In November during Book Week Mrs. Tatro conducted a poster contest in the seventh and eighth grades. The posters were judged and were on display at the library. Janet Tracy and Priscilla Marsh received first prizes and Ernest Hodgedon and Susan Brooks second prizes. The prizes were books and were donated by a friend.

We wish to express our heartfelt thanks to the following friends for gifts of books and periodicals: Viola Brown, Ford Kinsman, Mrs. J. Crane, Mrs. E. Bugbee, Mrs. A. Hunt, Lillian Tyrrell, Mrs. G. Runnals, Elbert Bannister, Alvan Barrus and Elizabeth Barrett. To Mrs. Bert Huggins for the gift of a Bible belonging to the Chase family; to Mr. Robert Rossiter for the

# SCHOOL WARRANT

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March, 1958, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts, and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1958-59, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.
8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to arrange a program of music for the school, and to see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to finance this program.
9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate to provide hard top drives, parking area and walks for the school approach.
10. To see if the school district will adopt as its school check-list the town check-list, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by laws of 1957, chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

We wish to report three teacher changes in the school faculty. Mrs. Germaine Hrydziusko replaced Miss Grace Cole in the primary department and is teaching the second grade. Mrs. Kidder was transferred to the first grade room. Mrs. Marion Stone replaced Douglas Leslie in the sixth grade and Mr. Charles Howe was appointed to the principalship and has taught our eighth grade class.

Among the teachers returning, we are happy to list the names of Mrs. Kidder, grade 1; Miss Abbott, grade 4; Miss Williams, grade 5; Mrs. Symons, grade 3; and Mrs. Bernard, grade 7.

Mr. Howe is a graduate of Gorham State Teachers College and also holds a University Master's Degree in education. He formerly taught at the Adair School in Minnesota and at Jaffrey, New Hampshire.

Mrs. Hrydziusko is a graduate of Castleton Teachers College in Vermont. She taught primary grades at the Albert Bridge Memorial School in Windsor from 1953-1957.

Mrs. Stone, a former teacher of many years' experience, returned to service after a number of years at home.

I have enjoyed very much my visits to the Cornish School this year and my work with the members of the faculty. There is a very fine spirit among the teachers, who have been most cooperative. Through effective administration and good work on the part of the teachers, we can point to a very successful year. Certainly the children of Cornish are fortunate to have such a fine school in which to live and work.

This report would not be complete without due mention of the good work done by Mr. MacMillan in the care and maintenance of the building. We appreciate his loyalty and interest in all our school activities.

Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Weld have continued in charge of our school cafeteria. They have provided very fine lunches for the children and have kept the records of this department. Surplus foods from the federal government have materially aided in the operation

of the cafeteria, without any appreciable increase in cost to the pupils.

As a result of our town census, we are estimating an entering class of about twenty-three for the first grade room next year. With some thirty pupils graduating from the eighth grade, we can expect, therefore, a slight decrease in total school enrollment for the school year 1958-1959.

The transportation of school pupils is a matter of major importance. The routes this year have been covered by Mr. Hood and Mr. MacMillan, and the service has been most satisfactory. Our improved roads help to make a safer and more efficient system.

This has been a very busy year for our school nurse. I am sure everyone appreciates the very fine work done by Miss MacIver in providing a sound health program for our school.

The town of Cornish can well be proud of its fine school and feel fortunate in having a very capable and efficient school board. Mrs. Hunt, as chairman, with many years of experience, has given real leadership and support to us all. It has been a pleasure to work with the board members and the school personnel. We have a sincere desire to continue to provide a worthwhile educational program for the children in your community.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

---

This past year has been one of much activity for me in the town of Cornish. Making new friends; working with School Board members, Superintendent, teachers, pupils and parents, has been a most satisfying experience for me. My appreciation goes out to all who have helped in making this a most pleasant and successful year in your town.

Aiding the classroom instruction, has been the addition of free film service. This service allows the school an average of a film a week. All the films shown in the classroom are previewed first to insure the suitability of age and grade level and subject matter. Bernard and myself. Although this has been done on a small scale, Bernard and myself. Although this has been done on a small scale, it has proved to be very successful. We are hoping that it may be possible to carry on this phase on a larger scale in the future.

The Science program has been given quite a lift by additional books loaned to us by the Superintendent.

The hot lunch program has been progressing very well since the lunch hour has been divided into four separate sittings. The supervision is of real value with the small number of pupils in each group.

Outside activities have been increased this year by additional equipment supplied by the P.T.A. and the community. We have made great use of the lower field by the Town Hall. A volleyball net has been set up, a football field lined out, and this winter a makeshift skating area was made on the lower field. Next winter we hope to have a permanent skating rink. On the school playground additional box hockey games and tether balls have been put into use. This Fall most of the playground equipment was painted.

The excellent cooperation from the parents has done much to keep the school well organized and well disciplined.

The Eighth Grade in their club activities sponsored a dance at the Town Hall in December. The profits they made were used to purchase three turkeys which were given to residents of the Town of Cornish.

Our Christmas program was very limited due to the great absenteeism caused by the flu.

The reading program has been improved by additional instructional material for the slow readers given to us by Superintendent Stickney.

Some field trips are in the planning stage. Grades 7 and 8 went to White River Junction to see the movie "Ten Commandments."

We shall carry on the programs already begun and we hope to add many new and varied activities.

## SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

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Many times during the past 5 years I have been asked these questions: "Do you work for just this school district?" or "How many schools do you visit?". I would like to take this opportunity to answer these questions.

Your school nurse is employed by Supervisory School Union No. 5. Union No. 5 is comprised of six school districts—one of which is a consolidated school district serving two towns. We have approximately 1300 children in 9 school buildings. The building and opening of three new schools within the last four years resulted in the closing of 14 old one room school houses. The opening of these new buildings has resulted in my having more time to work with the children and more time to visit with parents. Both of these factors have lead to a better understanding of the children's problems as well as better means to cope with them. Most important, however, is the fact that these new buildings have provided a more healthful and wholesome atmosphere for both pupils and teachers.

The main office of the school nurse is in Charlestown. As most of you know our Union covers a large area. One of our districts is 30 miles from Charlestown, another is 21 miles, another is 20 and the other two districts are 7 and 9 miles from Charlestown.

A monthly schedule is set up by the school nurse. Certain days of each month are set aside for each school district and a copy of this schedule is posted in each school. Unless an emergency arises or the weather prevents traveling this schedule is met. Needless to say this type of schedule must be flexible to a certain degree. The same type of health program is carried out in all areas.

Salk Vaccine Clinics have again been made available to all areas. Everyone wishing their children to have Salk Vaccine have had several opportunities to do so. At the present time there are no plans for further Salk Clinics in the schools. It is hoped that the pre-school children will have their Salk Vaccine through the Pre-School Immunization Clinics. These clinics will be available to all areas.

Our routine testing programs were carried out this past year as usual. The fine response and cooperation of parents and interested individuals resulted in many more corrections of defects than

we have had in the past. These defects include problems in vision, hearing, dental needs, orthopedic needs, general health, social and classroom adjustments, as well as speech difficulties. In instances where financial assistance was necessary, it was provided by private citizens, service clubs and State agencies.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all of you who have helped so much with the school health program—parents, School Board, Superintendent, teachers, principals and those of you who have helped so much with our various clinics. Thank you.
