**TOWN OF HUDSON
ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
HUDSON MEMORIAL SCHOOL
SATURDAY, MARCH 13, 1982**

Moderator Richard E. Dolbec calls the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m.

Hudson Fire Cadets parade in with and post the Flags.

Rev. Paul Groleau, St. John's Parish, leads in the invocation.

Mr. Sid Basha sings the National Anthem and Fr. Paul asks for a moment of silence in memory of firefighter James Taylor who was killed responding to a fire call on 7/28/81. Father Paul Groleau also recites the Fireman's Prayer.

Moderator Dolbec asks for a roll call of the town officials including State Representatives, as requested by Mr. Bednar. All members are present except for G. Philip Rodgers, representative, and Therese Dubowik, treasurer.

Moderator Dolbec states that the official warrant is in the hands of the town clerk and the meeting has been duly warned.

He reads the recommendations of the Budget committee concerning the articles on the warrant. He explains the secret ballot process and the reading of the entire warrant is suspended at this time. The articles are read one at a time.

Article #1 — Mr. Malouin moves its adoption and Mr. Jacquet seconds the motion. The \$875,000. figure represents the town's 25% share of the total project. Mr. Bednar amends by striking out the entire article and inserting in its place — 'to see if the town will vote to rescind Article 2 of the 1979 town warrant in the amount of \$450,000. covering the reconstruction of Derry Street and apply the remaining bond proceeds of \$350,000. as partial cost for the reconstruction of Central Street from the vicinity of Lowell Road (N.H. Route 3A) to the vicinity of Burnham Road (N.H. Route 111); said project to include the reconstruction of Lowell Road Intersection and the Burnham Road Intersection'. Mr. Paul Guimond seconds the motion to amend. Mr. Lawrence speaks against the amendment and Mr. LeVasseur questions the total project cost of \$3.5 million. Mr. Malouin states that some of the money is for the taking of private property along Central Street. Speakers are — Leonard Smith, Gordon Tate, Leon Hammond, Mr. Bednar, William Irwin, Mr. Jacquet. Mrs. Constantian and Gordon Tate question the selectmen. Mr. Kenneth Clark asks if a $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote is needed on this article as it is a bond issue. The answer is yes. Mr. Shawn Jasper moves the previous question and Mr. Clinton Weaver seconds this motion and the question is moved.

Article #1 as amended is on the floor at this time. Mr. Bednar requests a secret ballot and the motion carries. At 10:10 a.m., voting on Article #1 as amended begins. Mr. Leonard Smith records his vote in the affirmative. Ballot #12 is used.

It is noted that Margaret Erb is sworn in as Budcom member and Paul Drew is sworn in as Trustee of the Trust Funds by the moderator.

State of the ballot on the amendment to Article #1 — YES 71, NO 133. The amendment is defeated.

Mr. Malouin asks for a personal privilege for the Town Engineer, Robert Perreault to speak on this article as he is a non-resident. Mr. LeVasseur seconds the motion and the house is in agreement and Mr. Perreault is permitted to speak.

Discussion carries with several speakers — Mr. LeVasseur, Mr. Lawrence, Mr. Malouin, Mr. Smith, Mr. Drew, Mr. Piantadosi, Mr. Madison, Ken Massey and Leon Hammond.

Mr. Jasper moves the previous question and this motion is seconded by several and the question is moved.

Article #1 as written is on the floor. Vote is to be by secret ballot #13. Voting starts at 10:50 a.m. and the polls will remain open for one hour as this is a bond issue.

It is also stated that Articles 2, 3, 4, 5 are all bond articles.

Article #2 — Mr. Frank Nutting moves its adoption and Mr. Rick LeVasseur seconds the motion. Mr. Jacquet amends by changing ‘110,000.’ to ‘90,000.’ which is the budget committee’s figure Mr. Shawn Jasper seconds the motion. Mr. LeVasseur questions Chief Nutting. The amendment carries by a voice vote. Article #2 as amended is on the floor. Mr. John Lawrence amends by putting a period (.) after the wording ‘ISO requirement’. Mr. Paul Madison seconds the motion and the amendment carries. **(The balance of article is deleted). Article #2 as amended is adopted** and is not a bond issue.

Article #3 — Mr. George Arris requests that the moderator suspend the reading of Article 3 and he makes a motion to indefinitely postpone this article. Beverly Hanks seconds this motion and the motion carries. **Article #3 is indefinitely postponed.**

Article #4 — Mr. Ken Clark moves its adoption and Mr. Nutting seconds this motion. Mr. Ken Clark moves to amend by striking out entire article and inserting in its place — ‘To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000. for the purpose of land acquisition and conceptual plans for the construction of a new vehicular garage facility for the highway department’. Mr. Nutting seconds the motion. Mr. Al Hogan speaks on the amendment. Mr. Earl Whitaker questions Mr. Hogan. Mr. Madison and Mr. George Farris question. Mr. LeVasseur moves the previous question and this motion is seconded by several and the motion carries. The amendment is put to a voice vote and the amendment carries. **Article #4 as amended is adopted.**

Article #5 — Mr. LeVasseur moves its adoption and Mr. Nutting seconds the motion. Mr. LeVasseur amends by changing ‘300,000.’ to ‘150,000.’ and this amendment is seconded by Mr. Nutting. Mr. LeVasseur speaks in favor and Mr. Nutting also speaks in favor. Mr. Shawn Jasper speaks against the amendment and other speakers are Mr. Lawrence and Mr. Arris. Mr. Ken Clark questions. Mr. LeVasseur amends by striking out the balance of the article after the word ‘thereon’ and the amendment remains in the amount of ‘150,000.’ Mr. Hogan seconds this motion.

Mr. Weaver challenges the chair’s ruling on allowing latitude in discussion of this article as amended. He believes the discussion is not germane to the amendment. The house upholds the ruling of the moderator. Article 5 as amended further by Mr. LeVasseur is on the floor. Article #5 as amended carries and William Tate amends further by changing the figure from ‘150,000.’ to ‘50,000.’ and Shawn Jasper seconds this motion.

Article #1 — The polls are closed at 11:51 a.m. and the state of the ballot YES 181 NO 80 — The $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote needed is (174). **Article #1 as written is adopted.**

Article 5 — William Tate’s amendment is lost and Article #5 as amended to ‘150,000.’ is on floor. Voice vote is in doubt so a division of the house is taken — YES 151 NO 59 **Article #5 as amended is adopted.**

Mr. Paul Drew moves to take up Article #36 at this time. Mrs. Parkhurst seconds this motion. Mr. Drew then withdraws his motion.

Mr. Lawrence moves that Article #6 be deferred until after all other money articles so that the exact budget figure could be known. This motion is seconded by Mr. Arris and Mr. Jacquet.

Ken Clark takes exception to this motion and the motion to defer Article #6 is lost.

Mr. William Irwin moves to bring Article #53 on the floor and Mr. Lawrence seconds this motion and the motion carries.

Article #53 — Mr. Lawrence moves to indefinitely postpone. Mr. Hetzer, Mr. Irwin and Mr. Kashulines second this motion. **Article #53 is indefinitely postponed.**

A 20 minute recess is requested at this time but the motion is lost. The Moderator declares a 15 minute recess at 12:20 p.m. The meeting is called back to order at 12:45 p.m.

Richard Tate moves that **Article #52** be taken at this time. Mr. George Arris seconds this motion, and the motion carries. Mr. Arris moves to indefinitely postpone this article and Richard Tate seconds the motion. Mr. Arris reads a legal opinion regarding this article and the selectmen have the power to govern with an ordinance on this issue. **Article #52 is indefinitely postponed.**

It is noted that Articles #49, 50, 51 will have no action taken as they were submitted by selectmen and not recommended by the budget committee.

Article #6 — Mr. Jacquet moves its adoption in the amount of **\$4,206,066**. This is the amount of the budget excluding the money articles. Mr. Malouin seconds this motion. Mrs. Constantian questions the selectmen concerning legal fees and Mr. Lawrence yields to the questions. Mr. Drew questions #24 line item on Animal Control budget and Mr. Malouin yields to the question. Mr. Drew questions further on Planning Board line item #73 postage, and Mr. Lawrence yields. Mr. Bednar questions the Town Engineer budget and Mr. Jacquet, chairman of the budget committee, yields. Mr. Drew moves that in account (5101) that \$4000. be taken out of line item #01 and the amount to be changed to \$62,900. under Payroll, due to the change in government eliminating the Town Manager position, and passing the budget in the amount of \$4,202,066. Mr. Jacquet seconds this motion. The motion to amend the budget by this \$4000 is lost. Charles Coughlin moves that in account (5101) item 01 that the figure be reduced by the total town manager's salary of \$29,000., changing the figure to \$37,900., therefore changing the total budget figure to \$4,177,066. Mr. Lawrence seconds this motion. The amendment to the budget is adopted. Mr. Bednar moves that the line item (5999) be stricken from the budget and the total budget be reduced in that amount. (\$10,000.) Mr. Kashulines seconds this motion. Mr. Bednar speaks in favor of this amendment and Mr. Lawrence speaks against along with Fidele Bernasconi and Mrs. Lorraine Tate speaks against this amendment and wishes that the contingency fund be included in the budget. The amendment is lost by a voice vote. **Article #6 as amended to \$4,177,066. is adopted by voice vote.**

Article #7 — Mr. Malouin moves its adoption and Mr. Hetzer seconds the motion and the article is adopted as written.

Article #8 — Mr. Malouin moves for its adoption and Mr. Hetzer seconds and the article is adopted as written.

Article #9 — Mr. Lawrence moves for its adoption and Mr. Hetzer seconds this motion. Mr. Gordon Tate amends by adding — 'No deeds can be given and signed by Selectmen for any land sold prior to 1982'. Mrs. Tate seconds this motion. Mr. Lawrence, Mr. Malouin and Mr. Tate speak. Article #9 as amended is on the floor and the amendment is lost by voice vote. **Article #9 as written is adopted.**

Article #10 — Mr. Malouin moves its adoption and Mr. Hetzer and Mr. Kashulines second the motion and the article is adopted.

Article #11 — Mr. George Arris moves its adoption and Mr. Hetzer and Mr. Al Kashulines second the motion. Mr. Arris amends by striking out entire article and inserting the words as follows: 'To see if the Town will vote to use the 1982 Revenue Sharing Allocation (estimated to be \$193,326.) to offset the cost of hydrant rentals, or to take any other action relative thereto.' Mrs. Bev Hanks seconds the motion and the amendment carries. **Article #11 as amended is adopted.**

Article #12 — Mr. Lawrence moves its adoption and Bev Hanks seconds the motion. Mr. Lawrence speaks and Mr. Charles Coughlin questions. Alida Weergang questions as to how many employees will be included. Mr. John Lawrence answers (70 employees). Mr. Kashulines, Mr. Bernarducci, Mr. Gordon Tate and Mr. Ken Clark speak. Mr. Charles Coughlin amends by inserting after the word 'plan' 'at 75% employer paid' and changing '22,000' to '16,500.' Mr. Hetzer seconds the motion. Mr. Paul Drew questions and Mr. Robert Keeser speaks against the amendment. Lionel Boucher questions and Mr. Jungkman speaks. Mr. Joe Field speaks in favor. The amendment is lost. **Article #12 as written is adopted.**

Article #13 — Mr. John Lawrence moves its adoption and Mr. Joe Jacquet seconds this motion. Mr. Lawrence amends by striking the entire article and inserting in its place — 'To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase for the Town sufficient land to provide access to and parking for Jette Field, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 therefor, or to take any other action relative thereto'. This is seconded by several and the amendment carries by voice vote. **Article #13 as amended is adopted.**

Article #14 — Mr. Malouin moves for its adoption and Mr. Jacquet and Mr. Bob Cote second this motion. Mr. Malouin amends by striking the entire article and inserting in its place — 'to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase for the Town from Gordon and Lorraine Tate, a piece of property on the south side of Second Brook, between Jacques Field, Jette Field and Second Brook (identified as a portion of Map 46, Lot 102-1), as authorized by Article 9 of the Town Meeting of 1979, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for said purchase; or to take any other action relative thereto.' Mr. Wozniak seconds this motion. Mr. Leon Malouin speaks and Charlene Fast questions. The amendment carries. **Article #14 as amended is adopted.**

Article #15 — Mr. John Lawrence moves its adoption and Mr. Paul Inderbitzen and Mr. Ed Palladino second this motion and the **article is adopted.**

Article #16 — Mr. Richard LeVasseur moves for its adoption and Mr. Joe Jacquet seconds the motion. Mr. LeVasseur and Mr. Palladino speak in favor. Mr. **Palladino asks for personal privilege** — to publicly thank the Town Manager and Selectmen for the confidence they've placed in him as Acting Police Chief. **Article #16 is adopted by voice vote.**

Article #17 — Mr. Malouin moves for its adoption and Mr. Palladino and Mr. Caputo second this motion. Mr. Palladino speaks. Mr. LeVasseur questions and Mr. James Hetzer and Mr. George Arris also speak. The voice vote on this article is in doubt so a division of the house is taken — **YES 146 NO 64 Article is adopted.**

Article #18 — Mr. Frank Nutting moves its adoption and Mr. Malouin seconds this motion. Mr. Malouin amends by changing 'd)' and 'e)' in the article to read as follows: 'd) Violation by owner/occupant of Section "A" shall be fined at the rate of \$50. per day, as may be determined by Municipal Court, and each day of violation shall constitute a separate violation.' 'e) Any person obstructing the free access and use of any fire lane is subject to a \$25. fine payable to the Town of Hudson.' Mr. LeVasseur, Mrs.

Hanks and Mr. Clark second this motion. Mr. Coughlin makes the motion to move the previous question and this motion carries. The amendment to this article carries and **Article #18 as amended is adopted.**

Vivian Maguire moves to take up Article #46 at this time. Charles Coughlin and Mr. Tate second this motion. The motion is lost.

Article #19 — Mr. Jacquet moves its adoption and Mr. Al Kashulines and Mr. Joe Caputo second this motion and the **article is adopted.**

Article #20 — Mr. Jacquet moves for its adoption and Suzanne Gordon seconds this motion. Mr. Jacquet amends this article in the amount of '4,000' and Mr. Shawn Jasper seconds this amendment and the amendment carries. **Article #20 as amended is adopted.**

Article #21 — Mr. John Lawrence moves for its adoption and Mr. Kashulines seconds. Discussion carries. **Article #21 is adopted as written.**

Article #22 — Mr. Joe Jacquet moves for its adoption and Mr. Malouin seconds this motion and the **article is adopted.**

Article #23 — Mr. Piper moves for its adoption and Mr. Bolduc seconds this motion. Mr. William Pointer requests a secret ballot. He speaks in favor of its adoption, along with Mr. Piantadosi, Gordon Tate, Lionel Boucher, Lorraine Tate, Frank Queen, Dick Tate, and Glenn Joziatis. The town election having been held on March 9, 1982 and a request for recount being received by town clerk on March 13, 1982, signed by more than ten voters and presented along with the required \$10. fee, the town clerk scheduled the recount on date 3-23-82, to begin at 7:00 p.m. in the selectmen's meeting room at the town hall.

The two questions to be recounted are: 'the continuance of the Town Manager form of government' and the 'establishment of a Police commission' in the Town of Hudson.

The town clerk, Karen Wisnosky, presides over the recount beginning at 7:00 p.m. Election officials present are — Moderator Richard E. Dolbec, Selectman John Lawrence and Selectman Leon Malouin Jr. Also present are Frank Nutting, one of the petitioners, and a few other Hudson voters.

The ballot counters are programmed with a program that will count just the two positions in question, but the Town Manager question was erroneously not counted.

The programs used at the town election on March 9th, counting the entire ballot are now used.

The ballots are recounted and during this second counting, Mr. Nutting called notice to chaff on the backs of the ballots and positions on the ballots which are not punched through completely. The town clerk examines the ballots and determines the intent of the voter and clears the chaff and the voting positions, so the ballots can be counted correctly. All ballots are examined for this existing problem. The chaff is removed from inside the reader of one of the ballot counters and then the recounting process begins again.

The total number of ballots counted is: 2391.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

FISCAL YEAR 1982

Fiscal Year 1982 (July 1, 1981 through June 30, 1982) continued the pattern of the two preceding years. Zoning violations continued at an unprecedented level. The Board of Selectmen is actively investigating new ways to bring offenders into compliance by substantial fines and other penalties which may be taken independently of any other court actions initiated or pending against violators.

Although the total noise problem is not yet resolved, considerable progress has been made by a joint effort of the new owners of the Hudson Speedway and the Board of Selectmen. Sources of noise generation and propagation are being investigated by a professional sound consultant. Implementation of specific controls will be phased over the next several racing seasons in order to continue the reduction of noise to the levels determined by the consultant to be achievable.

The gypsy moth caterpillar war ebbed this past summer. Although damage was evident, it was not at the same high level as in the prior year. Natural infestation appeared to have taken its own toll of the overpopulated caterpillars. Left to its own devices, Nature has a curious way of controlling its own excesses.

The problem of landlocked Jette Field has not yet been resolved; but, the Board and the Recreation Commission are pursuing a joint venture to resolve the problem before the 1983 ball season.

The Selectmen, in accordance with statutory requirements, completed the perambulation of Town boundaries with Litchfield, Pelham, Windham, Londonderry and Tyngsboro. This, by law, must be done every seven years. 1988 is the next required perambulation.

Vandalism of public property continued to grow this year. Outright theft of stop signs and street name signs, plus malicious damage to other signs and picnic tables at Merrill and Merrifield Parks have caused the taxpayers an unnecessary maintenance and replacement burden. All citizens are urged to report items of this nature to the Police Department.

Hudson now has a Cable TV Franchise. Selectmen signed a franchise agreement with Hudson Cable Television on November 1, 1982.

In order to further some of the work and findings of the Solid Waste Advisory Study Committee and the Metcalf and Eddy study, the Selectmen appointed David Miller as Recycling Administrator.

In separate actions, the Board of Selectmen is continuing to evaluate the use of the landfill in light of the recent Litchfield receipt of a water quality study. No final conclusions have been drawn by Hudson, but a sensible approach or alternative could be available as early as next summer.

In addition to Kimball Hill Road and Central Street reconstruction projects, the Circumferential Highway is still alive. The Environmental Impact Statement was due to be completed in December 1982. Although the Board of Selectmen will continue to press for early construction from Lowell Road to Route 111, we will also insist that studies on the northern portion continue without let-up.

The Board was pleased to appoint William Blake as Chief of Police. His academic and "hands on" administrative and management experience are expected to be definite assets to the law enforcement and crime prevention programs in our Town. The management analysis of the Police Department by the International Association of Chiefs of Police was received in July and the Board is hopeful that the new Chief of Police will find it useful in his administration of the Police Department.

The past year saw a slow but continued influx of small (and large) industry to Hudson. This expansion of the industrial base in our Town is expected to continue to favorably influence the tax base. Although this industrial base is not expected to reduce the taxes of individual home owners at this time, it is expected to eventually off-set some of the impact of the high intensity home developments which occurred in the 1970's.

As in 1980 and 1981, litigation against the Town continued unabated. Most of the suits concern decisions of the Board of Selectmen, the Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Planning Board.

Your suggestions and constructive criticism continue to be the basis for the betterment of Hudson. Please continue to inquire about what is happening in your Town. Good government comes not from those whom you elect to administer it; rather it comes from the people who subject themselves to it and who are willing to participate in the joys and disappointments derived from the process. Good government derives from being a participant, not from being a spectator. We welcome your involvement - we solicit it!

REPORT OF THE TOWN ENGINEER

As with previous years, the calendar year 1982 proved to be a continuation of substantial activity for the Office of the Town Engineer.

THE CIRCUMFERENTIAL HIGHWAY

As predicted in last year's annual report, 1982 saw many decisions made in regards to the circumferential project. As VTN Consolidated, Inc. (consultants for the NHDPW&H who are presently performing the bridge locations study and environmental impact study), continued their work on the environmental impact study, informational meetings were held in cooperation with the Nashua Regional Planning Commission and the NHDPW&H. In particular, the NRPC established a transportation task committee to seek the common ground aspects of the several major highway projects actively proposed in the Nashua regional area. Selectman George Arris served as a member of the task committee with the Town Engineer serving on the technical resource group available to advise the task committee. Mr. Leonard Smith, as chairman of the NRPC Transportation Committee, played an instrumental role in bringing the various project aspects before the public. The project received sustained attention throughout the year in the various towns of the Nashua/Hudson region. As the 1983 legislative session approaches, it is obvious that the Hudson Circumferential Highway will once again become a topic in the legislative discussions that will surround the proposal to upgrade the F.E. Everett Turnpike. As of this writing, a corridor hearing is scheduled for the early part of 1983 from which it is expected the future of the circumferential highway will be decided once and for all. Should Hudson officials prove successful in achieving the desired southerly corridor, the greater challenge of design/construction funding will then become of immediate concern.

THE SEWER PROJECT

Foremost in this writers mind, in regards to the sewer project, is the litigation previously filed in regards to contracts 1, 2, & 3. Various depositions in the litigation continued during 1982 and on December 20, 1982 trial commenced in the U.S. District Court in Concord, NH.

Contract 4 construction continued to completion and on October 7, 1982 was designated as acceptable to the present consultant engineer. Accordingly, the Town will have a one year guaranty at the end of which the project will come before the Board of Selectmen for acceptance.

Contract 5 which will serve the Clement Industrial Park and Centronics is now under construction as the Town entered into contract for such work with Pitt Pipeline, Inc. on July 12, 1982.

The Hudson Facilities Plan, i.e., Sewer Master Plan, funded at the March 1982 Town Meeting, is now under consideration by the Board of Selectmen as they review the consultant's proposal. Upon notice to proceed with the work by the Town, public hearings will be held as part of the contract provisions. Purpose of the plan will be to identify the future sewer needs for the Town of Hudson and to prioritize the construction of additional sewer lines and pump stations in order to achieve the future sewer goals.

In 1982, the Board of Selectmen adopted an ordinance to recover certain capital improvements costs as directed by Town Meeting votes during original authorizations of the sewer project bond.

SOLID WASTE

The Solid Waste Management Plan previously authorized by the March 1981 Town Meeting was completed in February 1982 by the firm of Metcalf & Eddy, Inc.

The work on the application to extend the present landfill continues. At the same time, the Town of Litchfield retained a private consultant to prepare a preliminary study to address their concerns on the possibility of the Hudson Landfill impacting groundwater quality of the site vicinity, including Litchfield. Although state officials resist citing Hudson for any specific problem, the NH Bureau of Solid Waste and NH Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission continue to expect Hudson to perform at their own cost a complete engineering study in order to determine if a basis for concerns exists or not.

HIGHWAY PROJECTS

In addition to the Circumferential Highway project noted above, the following projects were of concern during 1982:

The Derry Street Reconstruction Project continues to remain in limbo as of the end of 1982.

The Kimball Hill Road Reconstruction Project, having been originally scheduled for 1981 construction, is yet to be built. However, right-of-way acquisition activities are continuing and it is now hoped that the project will be constructed in 1983, thus eliminating the serious, unsafe curve that now exists in the vicinity of Benson's Wild Animal Farm property.

The Central Street Reconstruction Project, including intersections with Burnham Road (NH Route 111) and Lowell Road (NH Route 3A), was heard by a Commission of the Governor and Council. In early 1983, the town received word that the design hearing was "affirmative." As a result, final design will be initiated by the State Highway Department and right-of-way acquisition activities will commence, resulting in a reconstruction project in the near future.

The Town once again had a town-wide paving project in 1982 and specifications were prepared by this office.

SUBDIVISIONS

New subdivision proposals again remained at a relatively low level as compared to activity in the late 1970's. Bonding matters continued to receive attention with the Planning Board experiencing a fair amount of activity in bond-default discussions with various developers. An attempt was made to bring some of the "old" subdivision bonds up to date and that work is reported in the Civil Engineer's Report.

SITE PLANS

Site Plan activity in Hudson was at a more intense level than in 1982. Most notable, of course, is the Sanders' site plan which received Planning Board review and approval in 1982. As a result of that project, several highway projects especially in the Lowell Road corridor will be necessary in the near future. Other notable projects included construction of the Teledyne site on Lowell Road as well as continued activity in Hampshire Drive Industrial Park. Also approved in 1982 was the south side of Executive Drive in that industrial park, resulting in a roadway connection with the Hampshire Drive industrial park. The huge washout at the Merrimack River in the vicinity of the DeMoulas outfall received continued attention throughout 1982, and at the end of the year appeared on-track for resolution by construction remedy in early 1983.

PERSONNEL

Mrs. Loni Weston continued to serve as secretary/receptionist in the Office of the Town Engineer. The position of Civil Engineer continues to be filled by Denis M. Boisvert and his individual report follows.

During 1982, the Board of Selectmen re-organized the structure of certain town hall employees such that the Building Inspector now is under the jurisdiction of the Town Engineer. Richard Millard's individual report follows.

John Bean, a civil engineering student at the University of New Hampshire, joined the Office of the Town Engineer as a summer intern during 1982.

Mrs. Vilma M. Ratte' continued her work jointly as a draftsperson in this office as well as for the Assessor's Office. Additionally, she provided research assistance in preparation for the sewer project litigation and continued her mapping activities of the existing landfill. Also added to her workload was the task of notifying abutters for the numerous projects appearing before the Planning Board.

MISCELLANEOUS

Participation of the Town Engineer as a member of the Highway Garage Task Committee continued in 1982.

The Town Engineer also served as a member of the Planning Board's sub-committee, the Building Code Advisory Committee.

As part of outside professional activity, the Town Engineer continued with his reelection as a Director of the NH Section, American Society of Civil Engineers. Also, the Town Engineer was re-elected to the executive committee of the NH Municipal Engineers Council.

COMMENTARY

As February 1983 approaches, it brings with it my fifth anniversary as your Town Engineer. Looking back at my five years in Hudson, I am at times amazed to recall the many changes and the growth dynamics that the town itself has experienced in those past five years. Hudson's unique position as one of the so-called "southern-tiered towns" affords it an enviable status in many respects as the economic hardships

experienced by the rest of the region and the country in general were less severe in Hudson compared to other municipalities. The benefit of growth that Hudson has been able to experience has been a blessing in many respects. But that blessing brings a continued concern that the Town as a whole, not only my office, must be responsive to the pressures and the impacts of the growths that are on the horizon. As active as the past five years have been, the next five years bloom even greater.

Appreciation is again extended to Selectmen Arris, Malouin and Lawrence for continuing the respectable working relationship with this office.

Again, this year I feel that it is warranted to mention that the efforts of the members of the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, and the Zoning Board of Adjustment too often go unnoticed; of particular note, due to our coordinating efforts, the devotion of Planning Board Chairman Paul Inderbitzen should be recognized.

And, as is an annual event, special thanks are directed to Road Agent Al Hogan and his ever-reliable secretary Mrs. Carla Anger.

Special praise is also once again afforded to Civil Engineer Denis Boisvert, Mrs. Loni Weston, and Mrs. Vilma Ratte' who all contribute to making the Office of the Town Engineer a professional part of the Town Hall Staff. In particular, as I review the 1982 events, it is apparent that the efforts of Representative Leonard Smith cannot go without recognition and thanks for his involvement in virtually every public works project that is of interest to the Town's future welfare.

In closing, there is no way that I can conclude this annual report without stating the high regard I hold for Selectman George Arris, who has decided to end his present tenure on the Board of Selectmen. His innumerable efforts during the past five years in working with this Office has been and will remain sincerely appreciated.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL ENGINEER

This year has brought some new responsibilities to the Civil Engineer. The most important is the administration of the Driveway and Other Access Regulation, adopted by the Planning Board. This regulation was created to promote the safety of driveways at their intersections with the public streets and to maintain adequate roadside drainage. The new duties include the issuance of driveway permits and the day to day enforcement of the regulation.

As a result of office re-organization by the Town Engineer, the Civil Engineer and Building Inspector now share the same office space. The sharing of office space has been beneficial to both of us since the Building Inspector's zoning activities and my activities with the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission are so closely related. This move has also resulted in my involvement in several zoning enforcement cases.

CONSERVATION

Since November, 1981, I have been monitoring the water surface level of Robinson Pond. Also, photographs of landmarks around the pond have been taken during the same period. This data will be used to help determine the elevation at which the pond should be maintained. A lake level hearing is scheduled for early in 1983.

There has been a marked increase in requests from the Zoning Board of Adjustment to construct within the wetland areas of Hudson. As the Conservation Commission's staff representative, I have been active in the Commission's field inspections and recommendations toward these requests. The Planning Board has also requested the Commission's input for some of their projects in order to protect wetlands, streams and the Merrimack River.

ROADS AND STREETS

Other activities include working with the Hudson Highway Department staff to determine the status of many Hudson streets. Many field inspections by engineering assistant John Bean with the Highway Department and considerable research has resulted in a list of streets recommended for Town acceptance at the 1983 Town meeting. Many others are in a "near acceptable" category and our goal is to prepare another list of roadways for acceptance next year.

The rapid growth of Hudson in 1982 has created a busy and challenging atmosphere for this office. Our close association with the Planning Board translates this growth into an increased demand for engineering reviews as well as the administrative services we provide for the Board. I look forward to the Town's continued growth with the hope of meeting those challenges.

RECYCLING CENTER

Hudson's Recycling Center began operation in September 1982. A 1966 Ford step-van has been recycled into a storage and transportation vehicle for papers. Bottles, motor oil and cans are the other items being collected.

In the last two months of 1982, the Town sold 38,830 pounds of paper and 58 barrels of glass producing a small income of \$250.15. This reduced the volume of input to the landfill by some 2,400 cubic feet. More important than the income is the cost avoidance and the reduced volume going into the landfill due to the fact that these items do not have to be disposed of.

Large scale recycling offers other advantages also. Materials are removed from the waste stream and put back to use. This improves productivity. Energy savings range as high as 95% when compared to using virgin materials. Recycling offers opportunities at several phases for reducing air and water pollution. Those citizens who have been participating in our program can rightfully be proud of their contributions.

Everyone in town is invited to participate in this voluntary program. The procedures to be followed are:

For Bottles: Separate by color (clear, green and brown). It is not necessary to wash them or remove caps or labels.

For Papers: Easiest to handle if bundled, boxed, or placed in grocery bags.

For Motor Oil: Is poured into the tank provided and cans require no processing.

As an optional bonus, aluminum cans, if kept separate from non-aluminum, can be placed in the barrels for the library addition fund.

Some items are not accepted. Ceramics (plates, mugs, bowls, etc.), light bulbs and window glass all contaminate the other recycling items. Reluctantly, they go into the landfill.

Plans for the immediate future are to build a permanent collection facility at the entrance to the landfill, hopefully in the spring. This will be cleaner and more convenient than the present temporary facility. Vandalism of the paper truck at one point in December resulted in broken windows and a \$500.00 insurance claim. The new facility should add some security for the truck.

HUDSON ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT

Those of us presently in Animal Control feel the animal problems in Hudson are growing faster than our department, which is designed to control them. In order to keep pace with the problems we need to modernize the way in which our department handles the animal complaints we face daily. Due to limitations set upon us by the Budgetary process of the Town we feel the seeking of outside assistance from the people here in town is justified. What we have asked for is donations of food and of equipment not allowed for in our budget that will help us to Capture, Handle and Care for the Animals we contend with. Our major problem is the equipment that we have to use on Dogs. It consists of one old trap and half a dozen chains. To help US solve the problems YOU the public are faced with, it is important for us to have your support in getting the equipment that will better enable us to Capture, Handle and Care for animals we continually deal with.

Animal Control has also been trying to reach the public with educational material that will help people understand what happens to animals placed in the hands of cruel or careless owners. Take our advice and Spay or Neuter your pets. Do not create lives you are not prepared to care for. You cannot always rely on family and friends to take a puppy or a kitten, and a pet not truly wanted can become a victim of neglect when the newness runs out.

Another problem we in Animal Control feel is important is how to fully express our appreciation to the people in town that have helped over the past year. To those people we say "Thank You".

Remember when you see wildlife in the forests, stop and enjoy the sight. Try not to disturb it. Do Mother Nature a favor leave the beauty she created Alone.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FISCAL YEAR OF 82/83

The fiscal year ended June 30, 1982. Financially we ended this year with a surplus of about \$15,000. The delay in hiring new personnel made it possible to cover heavy over expenditures in equipment repair, electricity and telephone. These costs are very difficult to estimate as rate increases for utilities are granted during the year, maintenance and repair cost are always on estimate as our budgets are made up as much as 18 months in advance of the expenditure and in no way can anyone anticipate what repair costs will be in 18 months or 18 days away.

Training nowadays require considerable time. About 50% of our EMT's have taken advanced life support training. This alone requires recertification every six months as well as EMT recertification every two years and CPR each year. Training is held here at the station almost every Monday night by our state qualified instructors and daily with on shift permanent personnel. Attendance at state fire training schools in N.H., and special seminars in all New England states are regularly attended. These schools cover general fire fighting, EMT, hazardous spills and fires, officers training and size up. The cost to the town for training is well worthwhile. Much of the cost is paid for by the firefighters as they want to better themselves.

Many hours of work, both by our on duty and call personnel, are put in each year in rebuilding and repairing equipment. This year a good used tandem tractor and used 6100 gallon tank were rebuilt, upgraded and made into a good tanker to replace the old 4500 gallon unit. We now have about 11,500 gallons of water on wheels for rural fire fighting and an equal amount available thru Mutual Aid.

Also, thru the generosity of Selectman John Lawrence, a one ton Chevy van was given us to make a rescue truck. The old military half ton 1970 van formally used was unable to continue as a dependable unit. This 1975 van has more room, better access to equipment, has better road stability and should last for a few years to come.

Last Fall long hours were spent in replacing the heating system in Central Station. This required removing the floor, replacing the piping and drains as well as the boiler. Used fluorescent lights purchased at practically a donating price were installed with hopes that the heating change and light change will offset cost increases which always seems to come about during the budget year after the budget has been finalized.

The new car, a Chevrolet Impala, with the small V8 engine arrived and after two days the equipment was transferred from the old 1975 cruiser. The gasoline consumption runs almost 40% less so it should help pay for itself over a few years.

The new pumper voted at Town Meeting was ordered from Grumman Emergency Products, a subsidiary of Grumman who made the Lunar Module. This is being built on a commercial international chassis purchased from Charles Demers of Nashua. This Grumman unit will be made of aluminum and hopefully will eliminate the rust problem that we are currently experiencing on our equipment.

The past three years we used one of our old military jeeps to plow snow around the three stations as well as the town building it also served as a brush fire unit and it finally broke down. This unit was on loan from the State of N.H., Forest Dept., and has been returned to them so at present we have no plowing equipment and will have to ask for a new 4 wheel drive truck and plow this coming year. This will probably let us get rid of or retire another old military vehicle of the 1952 series.

The past session of the Legislature in its wisdom voted to approve the so called unvented space heaters, over strong opposition from the fire service. The fire department has to sign the necessary papers which approves your purchased. This does not mean that we approve the heater or its use, as we don't, but if you use one please read and follow all the instructions sent with each unit and use the utmost care at all times.

The members of the Fire Department and I want to thank voters, children, town officials and town department for their help and cooperation the past year. The Jr. Women's Club for the chimney brushes which we loan to you for cleaning your chimney. It seems to have reduced the chimney fire problem to a minimum.

Don't forget we are as near as your telephone twenty four hours a day to assist in fire or medical problems as well as other emergencies.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Hudson:

The past year, as previous years, has proven to have been both challenging and productive. We have concentrated an extra effort on equipment maintenance throughout the year. Vehicle maintenance sheets have proven invaluable as we worked our way through one of the toughest winters in recent years.

Because of the poor condition of our roadways and sewer manholes that have caused such extensive damage to our snow plows, we took the time to build two plow pushframes, which we will have in service for the winter of 1982-83. We hope these new plows will lessen our 'down time'.

I am pleased to say that our Town Wide Paving Project Contract was awarded to Continental Paving, Inc. and the following list of streets were resurfaced:

West Road, Burnham Road, Bockes Road,
Kienia Road, Barretts Hill Road,
Marshallow Path, Iris Path, Magnolia Path,
Waterlily Path, Musquash Road, Griffin Road.

I would like to add a special Thanks to Continental Paving for a job well done.

Again this year we performed drainage reconstruction in several areas. One that I feel sticks out above all the others is the intersection of Belknap Road and Central Street. The reconstruction has practically eliminated a very serious icing condition. I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Lawrence Pelletier for his cooperation, and patience during this time. Without his cooperation this project could have been delayed for several years.

The Highway Department worked in a joint effort with Tate Bros. Paving Co. and completely reconstructed a hazardous section of Spear Road. The Tate Bros. were invaluable on this project, as they made readily available their equipment and expertise. Considerable money was saved through field engineering and therefore holding costs to a minimum.

Streets and Subdivisions that have been constructed and are not accepted by the Town pose one of our greatest problems. In many cases the streets are not constructed properly causing excessive drainage problems and in some cases total deterioration of the road surfaces.

The major problem occurs when we try to plow and sand these streets. State Law forbids the expenditure of Town monies on a non accepted street. Therefore we cannot repair any of these problems. I have prepared a list of such streets, for this Town Meeting, to be accepted so in the future we can start repairs.

This past July marked the retirement of Foreman Roland E. Pelletier. Roland joined the Department in 1960. His devotion and unselfishness were truly appreciated and definitely will not be forgotten.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all the Highway Department Employees, Townspeople, and especially to the Board of Selectmen and Town Administrator for their relentless efforts to help solve the problems that the Department faces.

On November 13, 1981, a special Town Meeting was called to reconsider a New Zoning Ordinance. The Ordinance was narrowly defeated.

A committee was established to review the Hudson Building Code for the purpose of adopting and amending the BOCA Code to be presented at the March 1983 Town Meeting.

The Planning Board has continued to see many proposals for commercial and industrial developments. While a number of small 2 to 5 lot subdivisions have been approved, only 1 large residential subdivision of 42 house lots was approved this year. There have also been a number of multi-family proposals in the form of apartments or condominiums which will have an effect on the population growth of Hudson in the next few years.

New amendments to the State laws on Planning Board procedures will necessitate revisions to the Subdivision and Site Plan review Regulations.

The Board wishes to thank all those who have worked with and appeared before the Board for their patience and cooperation. We will continue our efforts to assure everyone a fair hearing.

A special thank you is extended to the Town Engineer Bob Perreault, and his staff, Denis Boisvert, Loni Weston and Vilma Ratte. Their extensive technical and administrative support has been invaluable.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Since townspeople frequently come before the Zoning Board of Adjustment and demonstrate a disturbing lack of understanding about the Board's purpose and operations, it would seem useful to use this space to explain why the Board of Adjustment exists, what it does, and how it functions.

Your Zoning Board of Adjustment is the local manifestation of a movement hardly more than a half century old. During the first quarter of this century, people noted that haphazard community growth and the indiscriminate intermixing of residential housing, commercial buildings, and industrial facilities causes both a reduction in property values and a real loss in land-usage efficiency. As an outgrowth of that realization, both large and small communities across the nation have established zoning ordinances and zoning maps to define the proper use of property within the community and to prevent the indiscriminate use of property within respective zones. At the same time, local Zoning Boards of Adjustment have been organized to provide local-level flexibility. This necessary flexibility allows relief from bureaucratic interpretation of the zoning regulations for people faced with unique property hardships involving nonstandard size, shape, topographical peculiarities, access difficulties, drainage conditions, and the like.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment reviews and judges applications for variances from zoning/use restrictions and reviews applications for special exception permits. The board also hears appeals from decisions made by Town administrative officials. The vast majority of the Zoning Board of Adjustment's activities, of course, have to do with the hearing and adjudication of variance applications.

A variance can be applied for by any citizen who feels that literal enforcement of the existing ordinance gives him or her unnecessary hardship because of the peculiarity of the applicant's property compared to equivalent property nearby. The Board can agree to allow a variance from the specific restriction (s) provided that each one of the following statements holds true:

1. That granting the variance does not violate the spirit and intent of the Hudson Zoning Ordinance and/or the Hudson Zoning Map.
2. That granting the variance will not adversely affect the value of abutting property.
3. That granting the variance will not be contrary to the public interest of the citizens of Hudson and/or New Hampshire.
4. That granting the variance accomplishes substantial justice to the applicant, whereas denial would cause injustice to the applicant because of the special nature of the property concerned.

During the 1982 fiscal year, the Hudson Zoning Board of Adjustment was raised to its full complement for the first time in several years, currently having five regular members and four alternates. The Board has met on a regularly scheduled basis every fourth Thursday evening of each month, plus eight additional special meetings, together with additional workshop sessions. During the course of the year, the Board adjudicated 54 variance requests (granting 33, denying 14, and deferring 7), reviewed 7 special exception requests (granted 5, denied 2), affirmed 2 administrative appeals. Granted 1 extension, processed 15 rehearing requests (granted 6, denied 5, and let 4 withdraw), and passed 2 resolutions.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OF NASHUA, INC.**

7/1/81 - 6/30/82

The Visiting Nurse Association of Nashua, Inc. made over 2,000 visits to provide skilled nursing, therapy, homemaker and home health aide services to Hudson residents. While the majority of visits were reimbursed by federal or state funds, private insurance and private fees, approximately 31% of these visits were funded by Town, United Way and other community contributions. This is twice as many charitable cases as in the previous year.

Compared to 1980-1981, there was a 61% increase in the number of homemaker services provided, 45% increase in physical therapy, and a 14% increase in home health aide services. In addition, over 400 elderly were screened in monthly blood pressure clinics and 55 children, 0 to 6 years of age, were immunized in our semi-monthly program.

The demand for these important services which help Hudson residents improve their health and maintain their independence and self-sufficiency continues to grow. The Visiting Nurse Association of Nashua is pleased to play an active role in meeting the town of Hudson's public health needs.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission had an active year highlighted by efforts to establish baseline data on the level and quality of Robinson Pond and on the quality of Ottarnic Pond. The water level of Robinson Pond was monitored regularly from its ice level of 1982 through the level of ice reformation in 1983 to determine whether or not a regulated low water level should be maintained. Some residents expressed concern that the surface elevation is historically low while others consider its level normal. The Commission, therefore gathered information upon which to make a recommendation. Two public meetings were held and considerable time was spent reviewing reports and volunteered information. The NH Water Resources Board also held a Lake Level Hearing to gather information and offer assistance.

Water quality data was collected weekly throughout the summer in both Robinson and Ottarnic Ponds in conjunction with the University of New Hampshire Lake Lay Monitoring Program. The large amount of data was summarized in a report by the UNH Botany Dept. The Conservation Commission intends to continue this activity in order to determine trends in the quality of both ponds. We wish to express sincere appreciation to the volunteers who spent many hours collecting water samples.

The Commission's primary function continued to be review of development plans with an eye toward protection of the Town's natural resources, particularly wetlands. The Wetland Ordinance was reviewed and found to be basically adequate. Other activities included treatment of Elm trees for Dutch Elm Disease, assistance to the Hunter Safety Training Program, a canoe trip on the Merrimack River with neighboring towns, studies into Hudson's ground water situation and coordination with the NH Association of Conservation Commissions.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

1981-1982

Hudson residents have continued to enjoy the expanded programs being offered by the Recreation Department.

During the summer the Youth Center on Oakwood St. in Hudson is the site of the Town's Summer Playground program. During summer vacation, children participate in a wide variety of activities ranging from active games such as soccer, softball, or basketball to quiet games such as monopoly, knock hockey, or checkers. to arts craft activities. The program is supervised by 3 full time counselors, and is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Periodic field trips to outside facilities and cookouts are also offered.

Robinson Pond is also utilized during summer months as a swimming area and picnic area. This recreation area is open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. during the swim season for free swimming, picnicking, cookouts and swim lessons. Life guards are on duty during in season hours. Peter Jean, the Town's Director of Recreation was in charge of all activities at the Youth Center and at Robinson Pond.

The summer months also offer Hudson residents a number of athletic opportunities. Bill Coronis directs the Town's baseball programs which include a Prep League (13 year olds), a Babe Ruth League (14-15 year olds) and a Senior Babe Ruth Team (16-18 year olds) which travels throughout the state.

Tennis lessons are also available for those interested children and adults. The program is under the direction of David O'Meara and is offered at the Dr. H.O. Smith Tennis Courts week nights.

This year's Jr. Miss Softball Team, ages 14 thru 17 won the State Modified Pitch title, under the direction of Pat Robertson. Home games were played at Jette Field, and many away contests were played in neighboring towns.

Men's Softball is one of the most popular recreation programs, an 8 team league, each team plays 17 games during the summer months at Jette Field, plus playoffs. This program is directed by Joyce Cloutier.

The Men's Adult Minor League Soccer entry played their home games at Alvirne H.S., the program is open to men 18 and older, and was under the direction of Jeff Cyr.

Two High School Aged Soccer Teams under the direction of Peter Jean are actively involved during the summer months in the Southern N.H. Soccer League. Home games are played at Alvirne H.S., and away games are also played against neighboring towns.

Youth Soccer continued this past fall at Memorial School Field. A 4 team league was set up for children in grades 5 thru 8, and an instructional program was set up for children in grades 1 thru 4. Both programs were under the direction of Peter Jean.

Another Fall activity is the Referee School. Open to High School students, classes are held to teach the basics of scoring, timing and refereeing basketball. This program was directed by Bill Makarawicz.

The Winter Basketball programs for children in grades 5 thru 8 were run by Paul Dufour (boys) and Bill Vermette (girls). All children who try out are placed on a team which plays a ten game schedule, plus playoffs. The program which runs from Nov. to March, also includes traveling All Star teams, which also host their own tournament, the Hudson Invitational Tournament. Hank Center runs the instructional program at Library St. School for 3rd and 4th graders.

Another popular adult program is Volleyball, under the direction of Alden Marshall. Games are played Tuesday evenings at Memorial School, weather permitting. Greely Field, and the parking area at Memorial Field are flooded each year for ice skating.

The Spring Recreation season returns us back to the outdoors for a Soccer Clinic program for 5 weeks, before preparing for another year's activities. This program is under the direction of Peter Jean.

Major improvements during the past year included the addition of outdoor lights and extending the parking area at Robinson Pond to meet the needs of this recreation facility.

In addition more outdoor grills were also added at this facility.

Many "Spring" toys can be found at the Youth Center and at Greely Park for youngsters to ride on.

All of our fields are still at maximum use because of the growing needs for recreation we have continued to require that all youngsters participating in our programs be Hudson residents, and that all adults either be Hudson residents, or employees of the Town.

In closing we would like to thank all volunteers who have donated their time, effort and support to make recreation in our Town possible.

HILLS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In years past the Report of Hills Memorial Trustees has only expounded on the achievements of our dedicated Library staff, and Friends of the Library and interested patrons and have always appreciated the Town's financial backing.

But alas, the time has come to speak of other things like:

1. There is not an area for student study.
2. Not enough workroom for staff.
3. Inaccessible to handicapped and the elderly. Without the Bookmobile they could not receive books.
4. Special programs and services are limited because they must be held elsewhere.
5. No room for displays by community organizations.
6. The space for equipment that we have is not conveniently accessible. Any additional equipment such as computerizing the Library system or computers available to patrons—that space is non-existent.

It is our suggestion that this building, beautiful as it is, be used but we feel that we now are faced to rent commercial space for closed stacks and work area until the library addition is a reality. This building is just not large enough to function adequately in our modern progressive society. Hudson needs to keep up to date with the educational and cultural demands of its taxpayers.

We now have six trustees to better serve with the overseeing and maintenance of a safe well-kept and serviceable building; to help with bookkeeping, public relations and hiring outside people to repair the building; assist the director with decisions as to purchases and other Library problems; a liaison between Friends and Library; and last but not least, to seek out ways and means of maintaining a resource educational center.

The population of a town is a determining factor for State Library assistance and admission to library coop such as the Urban Libraries. Our membership enables Hills Memorial Library to receive van service from the State twice a week. Hills Memorial Library is a member of a seventeen library coop called the Merri-Hill-Rock Cooperative. Hills Memorial Library and Nashua Public Library are the only two public libraries in NAME (Nashua Area Materials Exchange), along with special libraries such as Sanders, Digital, Wang, college libraries, Rivier, St. Anselms, Daniel Webster and St. Joseph medical library. The Hills Memorial Library is also a member of the State-wide coop which buys encyclopedias and other reference materials cooperatively at a discount.

The Hills Memorial Library will continue to serve the residents of Hudson as best it can with the space available. We anticipate your valued support to provide Hudson with an adequate library.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining individual fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire, as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1982, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1-C, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the paragraph above, the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements referred to above, present fairly the financial position of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire at June 30, 1982, and the results of its operations for the fiscal year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining, individual fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1982

NOTE 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

The accounting policies of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units. The following is a summary of the significant policies.

A. Basis of Accounting

The accrual basis of accounting is used for all non-expendable Trust and Agency Funds. The accrual basis recognizes income when earned and disbursements when incurred. The modified accrual basis of accounting is used for the general, special revenue, capital projects and nonexpendable trust funds. The modified accrual basis records revenues as received in cash except for revenues susceptible to accrual and revenues of a material amount that have not been received at the normal time of receipt and records expenditures on an accrual basis except for disbursements for inventory type items which may be considered expenditures at time of purchase, pre-paid expenses, interest on long-term debt and the encumbrance method of accounting.

B. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which constitutes a separate entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenues and expenditures. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped, in the financial statements in this report, into four generic fund types and one broad fund category as follows:

Governmental Funds

General Fund — The General Fund is the operating fund of the Town. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. From this fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds — Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trusts, or major capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. Types of sources and uses of funds in this fund are Federal Revenue Sharing, Hills Memorial Library, Sewer Department and Conservation Commission funds.

Capital Projects Funds — Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of or improvement of major capital facilities. Resources are derived principally from proceeds of long-term notes or bonds and federal and state grants.

Fiduciary Funds

Trust and Agency Funds — Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for assets held by the Town in a trustee capacity or as agent for individuals, private organizations, or other funds. These include expendable trust, nonexpendable trust and agency funds. Nonexpendable trusts are accounted for in essentially the same manner as proprietary funds since capital maintenance is critical. Expendable trusts are accounted for in essentially the same manner as governmental funds. Agency funds are custodial in nature and do not involve measurement of results of operations.

C. Fixed Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

The accounting and reporting treatment applied to the fixed assets and long-term liabilities associated with a fund are determined by its measurement focus. All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included in their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses available spendable resources during a period.

Fixed Assets that have been acquired during the year have been recorded as an expenditure in that fund.

These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Hudson does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principals, is not included in this financial report.

Long-Term Liabilities expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group, not in the governmental funds. This account is not a fund, but is concerned only with the measurement of financial position. It is not involved with measurement of the results of operations.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations.

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts and other commitments for the expenditure of monies are recorded in order to reserve that portion of the applicable appropriation is employed as an extension of formal budgetary integration in the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, and Capital Projects Funds. Encumbrances outstanding at year-end are reported as reservations of fund balances since they do not constitute expenditures or liabilities. F. Investments

Investments in all instances are stated at cost, or in the case of donated investments, at market value at the time of bequest or receipt.

G. Inventories

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost or market. Inventory in the General and Special Revenue Funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are purchased.

H. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town of Hudson has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services and fund capital outlay. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect transactions as transfers.

I. Interfund Receivable and Payable Balances

J. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

The Town's policy is to recognize the cost of sick and vacation leave only at the time payments are made. Permanent full-time employees may accumulate 60 days sick leave at the rate of one day per month. Vacation is granted in varying amounts based on length of service. At June 30, 1982, the amount of accumulated vested sick leave and vacation time was approximately \$113,487. Vacation pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance.

K. Taxes Collected for Others

The property taxes collected by the Town of Hudson include taxes levied for the Hudson School District and Hillsborough County, which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The payments are recorded in the general fund as intergovernmental transfers.

All debt is general obligation debt of the Town of Hudson which is backed by its full faith and credit.

NOTE 3 — Sewer Department Fund Deficit — \$737,326

The Town of Hudson has paid \$791,192 in principal and interest payments and \$49,374 for sewer maintenance at June 30, 1982. Of these amounts, the Town Selectmen have determined \$737,326 is due from sewer user fees. Therefore, this amount has been recognized as an interfund receivable on the general fund financial statements at June 30, 1982. A sewer users fee system is presently being developed by the Town's Consulting Engineer and the Town's Selectmen intend to commence billing the respective users in 1982-1983.

NOTE 4 — Capital Projects Funds:

A. Unreserved — Undesignated Fund Balance

The capital projects funds unreserved — undesignated fund balance represents uncommitted funds in the Derry Street Project at June 30, 1982. The Town issued \$450,000 of general obligation bonds in 1979 for this purpose. However, the Selectmen have determined not to carry out the project. Therefore, \$50,000 is being transferred annually to the general fund towards the debt service.

B. Interest Earned on Invested Funds

Interest earned on the invested capital projects funds is part of the estimated revenue in the general fund.

NOTE 5 — Pension Plan:

Substantially all employees of the Town of Hudson participate in the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. Under this plan, participants annually contribute a percentage of compensation, which is fixed by law and dependent upon age when contributions begin.

The Town's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State Plan and the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets is not available. The Town of Hudson does not have accrued liability for past service costs. Pension costs amounted to \$102,620 in 1981-1982.

NOTE 6 — Trust Funds:

The principal amount of all nonexpendable trust funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's nonexpendable and expendable trust funds at June 30, 1982, are detailed as follows:

NOTE 7 — Litigation:

The Town was included in an action filed in the United States District Court of New Hampshire on October 15, 1979, by Seaward Construction Company, Inc. The action alleges violation of contractual agreements covering the design and construction of sewers and seeks damages of approximately two million dollars. The Town has counterclaimed for two million dollars and has included the engineer, Morgenroth and Associates, Inc., as a third-part defendant for the alleged failure of Morgenroth to require proper compaction and for other contractual violations. Legal counsel is not in a position to predict the outcome of the suit with respect to the Seaward claim or the Town's counterclaim.

There are several eminent domain cases pending against the Town. Collectively, judgements against the Town in all cases could result in a total expenditure of Thirty Thousand Dollars.

There are other pending lawsuits in which the Town is involved. However, counsel has advised that none will result in a direct expenditure of Town Funds, other than funds required for costs and legal fees for said litigation.

NOTE 8 — Changes in Accounting Principles and Financial Reporting Practices:

Changes in accounting principles and financial reporting practices effective July 1, 1981, to correct and restate the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The following corrections and restatements of beginning fund equities were made to give retroactive effect to those changes.

Dear Members of the Board:

As part of our examination of the financial statements of the Town of Hudson, New Hampshire for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1982, we made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Of primary interest to us in such a study are those key accounting controls, the effectiveness of which will influence the nature, timing and extent of our financial statement audit procedures.

The establishment and maintenance of a system of internal accounting control is an important responsibility of management officials. The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by officials.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally either with respect to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of the financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

The study and evaluation previously described was made primarily for the purpose of performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. It would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system because it was based on selective tests of accounting records and related data.

We would be pleased to discuss our comments further with you should you so desire.

LETTER OF COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS
JUNE 30, 1982**

I. General

A. Organization of Town's Accounting Functions

Our examination of internal control and the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 1982 revealed a marked improvement as compared to the prior year report. The general ledger has been maintained and supporting accounts were reconcilable in the normal course of operations. The following items are pointed out to help with the ongoing improvement and refinement of the system.

1. Documentation of Accounting Policies and Procedures

As of the date of our field work, the town has not documented its accounting procedures. The creation of these manuals of accounting and procedures is underway and should be completed within the year.

We would like to point out the importance of these procedural manuals in any accounting system. The reliability of and dependability of the accounting records are directly related to the people creating and entering the data in a consistent and customary manner. The knowledge of these people and the orderly transfer of that knowledge is controlled by these procedures manuals. These manuals also control the slow erosion that could occur over a period of time thereby creating a system that does not follow good accounting procedures.

2. Purchase Order System

The Town of Hudson, New Hampshire installed a purchase order system during the Spring of 1982. At the date of our field work, it had not been fully installed in that the receiving reports have not been created. We have recommended that this link be completed.

3. Control Collection Function

The accounting department performs the function of central collection for all departments except Tax Collector and Town Clerk. Each department is receipted for those funds submitted.

4. Surety Bonds

Adequate coverage for employees with access to town funds has not been secured. This matter has been taken under advisement by the Selectmen.

II. Treasurer

The Treasurer currently supplies reports monthly to the accounting department of cash balances which are reconciled to the general ledger.

A. Numerous Cash Accounts Maintained

The Town Treasurer maintains numerous cash accounts. The special developers escrow fund and some special purpose accounts are maintained in separate passbooks. The procedure has developed to maintain segregated funds and to reduce the additional burden of accounting. These funds are in interest bearing accounts.

III. Cash Management — Revenue Source

With the new and improved services provided by the banking industry, the Town could take advantage of these services and realize a new revenue source. We estimate that approximately \$55,000 would be generated from this source over a fiscal period. We feel that the town should take advantage of these services.

IV. Periodic Reconciliation of Tax Accounts

The general ledger balance for the tax collector and town clerk's office are accumulated and posted monthly from transmittals generated by those respective officers. We would recommend that those control balances be reconciled monthly to the general ledger to insure adequate control and timely correction of possible erroneous entries. We noted that yield taxes and such are not included in the listing. We recommend that these items be included.

V. Trust Funds

For the period under audit, we noted that no meetings were convened. It is required by RSA 31:22 that at least one meeting take place during the year.

It was also noted that disbursements recorded in June were not actually disbursed until August and receipt of checks in November were not deposited until March. Other duties such as disbursing funds to the library were not done on a timely basis.

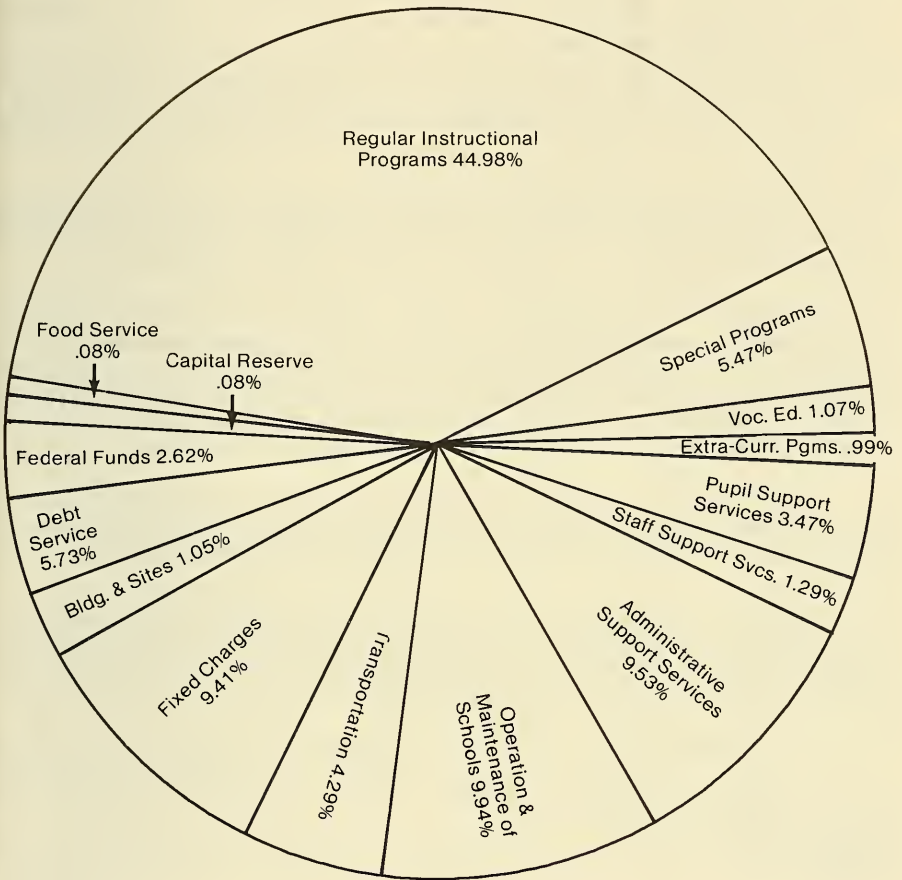

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN HUDSON SCHOOL BOARD 1982-83 SCHOOL YEAR

Since the 1982 School District Meeting, a number of notable changes have taken place or are about to take place.

The voters have approved the expansion of the School Board from three members to five. This expanded Board should have an even wider base for community control of the schools.

We have continued to maintain and improve the quality of the physical plants within the school district. Roofing projects at Memorial School and Dr. H.O. Smith School have been performed. There is still a need for more work in this area.

The Alvirne farmhouse has been completely renovated and our new farm manager and his family have moved in. This project would not have been completed in a timely manner had it not been for the unselfish efforts put forth by community member Elaine Brody and by School District Business Administrator Richard O'Shea. The citizens who attended the open house saw the quality of the results. The Board is also in debt to the Hudson Junior Women's Club for their assistance with the open house.

Later this spring, a visiting committee from the New England Association of Colleges and Schools will evaluate the quality of the Alvirne High School educational programs. The results of this evaluation will probably be available this summer.

Last spring, the Alvirne Charitable Trust trustees graciously financed a study of the agriculture and industrial arts programs at Alvirne. The study was performed by a team from Rutgers University. The recommendations made will have budgetary and curriculum impacts over the next several years.

Finally, I would like to commend all involved with the Hudson Schools; central office personnel, building staffs, support personnel, and the citizens of Hudson, for their support during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hudson:

The following paragraphs constitute my Annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

In making this report I will attempt to review the highlights of the past year, particularly our annual goals and objectives, as well as to look ahead toward the major issues of the current year.

In reporting to you on the well being of education in our community I must regretfully begin, once again, by reporting on the financial support of our overall educational program. Since 1977, the Center for Educational Field Services (CEFS) at the University of New Hampshire, has been conducting an exhaustive research project on school finances in New Hampshire with particular attention to the obvious relationship that exists between financial resources and the level of educational opportunities. Those school districts in New Hampshire with better than average resources are better able to meet the state minimum standards for elementary and secondary students. They have more comprehensive facilities and better equipped library resources. Among other program advantages, they have broader foreign languages in high school, with home economics and industrial arts being offered to all junior high students.

According to the most recent figures released by that agency for the 1980-81 school year Hudson ranked lowest in the state in per pupil expenditures at the high school and middle school levels and 79th out of 155 districts at the elementary level. Our per pupil expenditure at the high school level was \$1,218 compared to a state average of \$1,914 per pupil. At the middle school level we expended \$1,043 per pupil compared to a state average of \$1,931 per pupil. At the elementary level we expended \$1,611 per pupil compared to a state average of \$1,724. However, it must be pointed out that when property tax assessment is compared to equalized evaluation Hudson ranks 186 out of 258 districts as far as its "effort" is concerned. Unfortunately, this effort raises very few dollars per student due to a dearth of taxable property.

The state funding program that is intended to equalize the burden on property poor districts such as our own, is the Foundation Aid Law. This program is currently funded at approximately 10% of its intended level and, consequently, Hudson only receives approximately \$69 per pupil instead of \$498 per pupil if the program were fully funded.

Overall we receive approximately 5% of our funding from the state level, while nationally school districts receive approximately 44.7% of their funding from the state, up from 42.7% for the previous year. This increase in state support nationally resulted in a corresponding decrease in property tax revenues going to schools, from 29.6% to 27.6%. In New Hampshire, which already has the highest percent of its educational funding coming from the property tax, the reverse is true, with state support declining and consequently local support increasing. This is particularly difficult on property poor districts, such as our own. During the current year we have lost 100% of our School Administrative Unit (SAU) support, 12% of Building Aid and 100% of Foster Children Aid. The most ominous sign from the state level has been the elimination of Sweepstakes revenue for 1983-84 fiscal year. This is a program that was originally sold on the premise that the money would help to support education, but now it is needed to help "bail out" the state's serious financial problems.

In his gubernatorial campaign, However, Governor Sununu placed increased foundation aid to school districts as a top priority in his administration. In his address to the annual luncheon meeting of the Joint Educational Council on October 22, 1982, Governor Sununu stated,

"The first priority, and I've said this over this eight months, is a restructuring and an increasing of foundation aid to our communities that need it. It is time we understood that the state obligation to fill in the valleys is still there. I am still committed to the structure that requires the bulk of money to come from local aid; I am still committed to a recognition that the property tax structure is what is going to provide the primary funding for our educational system, but I am as much and even more committed to the fact that there is a state obligation in the form of foundation aid to make up in those communities where they have not the breadth of tax base that is necessary to deal with the issue."

A major goal of the Hudson School District over the past two years has been the introduction and development of a program of computers in education. To that end a committee was established in September of 1980 and charged with:

- developing a position paper and five year plan for the implementation of computers in education,
- assisting in the implementation of Computer Assisted Instruction in at least two subject areas.....and
- developing an in-service program for training staff in the use of computers in the classroom.

In their five year plan, presented to the Hudson School Board in November of 1982, the Committee stated, "In the meantime the growth of this technology, the use of existing equipment, and the interest of teachers and students has caused this project to take on a life and destiny of its own. Much that has happened and will happen, was not, and will not be, foreseen or planned by the Computer Committee although it will be documented here and in the future reports. This is part of the excitement of the project for us and for the use of computers in education as a whole."

At the present time we have ten Apple II+ systems in use in grades 1-5, purchased through Bloc Grant funds. We have 5 Apple II+ systems in the Gifted Program at Memorial School, purchased through Title IV of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 (ESEA) and 6 Apple II+ systems in grades 6-8, purchased through Bloc Grant funds.

At Alvirne High School we have two TRS 80 model I's and 18 TRS 80 model III's, purchased through the Alvirne Trustees. We also have two CPT word processors, purchased through the Alvirne Trustees and Title IV of ESEA. Our work at the elementary and middle school level is primarily introductory in nature, with some elementary programming at the middle school level. We are offering Basic I and Basic II at Alvirne, with word processing being taught in the Business Department. We also hope to offer introductory courses in COBOL, PASCAL, and FORTRAN through independent study.

During the current year we will attempt to refine the curriculum, while giving students the maximum exposure possible to this new technology which is going to have such a significant impact on their future lives.

Another major goal during the past year was the completion of the first phase of the state accountability project. The first testing occurred during the past spring with results being completed and tabulated during the summer. The Accountability Planning Group is currently in the process of drafting the first management plan, which is intended to implement those changes deemed necessary through the testing program, to improve student performance. Meanwhile, the second testing under the new accountability program will occur during the late spring.

A complete revision of the Science Curriculum, grades 1-8, was another major goal of the School District during the past year. On October 11, 1982, the Science Curriculum Committee presented the revised curriculum to the School Board. Their work represented a complete redrafting of the elementary science curriculum, with desired student outcomes and performance indicators identified at every grade level through grade eight. Their guide also included a supplementary materials list and a source guide for teachers.

At the request of the Hudson School Board, through the vehicle of the annual goals and objectives, we have completed an exhaustive review of the "year-round" program at Alvirne High School. The advantages originally cited with the establishment of this program are still very much in evidence. The year-round program permits the use of our major capital investment over a full 12 month period, while generating a net gain in tuition revenue of approximately one-half million dollars. This revenue potential would not be possible without the space made available through a full year program.

Statistical data relative to academic achievement also indicates improvement under the quarterly program, with approximately 19% of the student body on the honor roll as opposed to 9% prior to the adoption of the plan. The dropout rate is also reduced under the year-round program, with attendance increased by approximately three percent.

Perhaps the most significant advantage remains the overall flexibility in program offerings. Students are rescheduled each quarter and can pursue course offerings in the fourth quarter that would not be possible in the regular three quarters. There are also unique opportunities for early graduation and course makeups.

Without any doubt our schools are the vehicles where we pass on our curriculum of values from one generation to the next. Out of this exercise the future course of society is plotted. There is not an institution that touches as many lives as our schools. As we enter what appears to be a new era in education, namely the "high tech" era, we are making every attempt to keep your schools, and ultimately your children, as current as possible.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board, Mr. Burton, Mrs. Roody, Mr. O'Shea, Mr. Nase, Mrs. Stone, Mr. Cunneen, Mr. Keeser and the entire school staff for their unfailing cooperation and, finally, the citizens of Hudson for their commitment to excellence in the total educational program.

HUDSON MEMORIAL SCHOOL
March 5, 1982**

Hudson School District Moderator Richard Dolbec called the annual Hudson School District meeting to order at 7:19 p.m. on March 5, 1982, in the Auditorium at Hudson Memorial School. School Superintendent Peter Dolloff read the opening prayer, and Budget Committee Chairman Joseph Jacquet led attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Moderator Dolbec read to the School District Meeting attendees a letter, dated March 5, 1982, directed to the voters from the Budget Committee. The letter stated that Articles 3 and 4 were recommended, that Article No.4 was recommended only to the dollar amount of \$30,000, and that the total proposed budget amounted to \$7,636,527.

Article No. 1- The Moderator read Article No. 1 aloud to attendees. Mr. Joseph Jacquet moved for the adoption of Article No. 1. Mr. Cote seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared **Article No. 1 was adopted.**

Article No. 2 - The Moderator read Article No. 2 aloud to attendees. Mr. Levasseur moved to postpone discussion of Article No. 2 until later in the meeting. Mr. Shawn Jasper seconded the motion. A standing vote was taken in favor of postponement of Article No. 2, being tallied as 35 YES votes and 108 NO votes. The Moderator declared that **the motion to postpone discussion of Article No. 2 was lost.**

Mr. Jacquet moved to adopt Article No. 2 in the amount of \$4,660,070. Mr. Levasseur seconded the motion. Mr. Jacquet spoke on the motion. Mr. Cote moved to amend the article by changing the amount to \$4,735,070. Mr. Madison seconded the motion. Mr. Cote explained his reasons for moving for the \$87,600 increase by showing slides in reference to the School Board's considerations at the end of the Budget year, as represented by the figure proposed by his amendment, as opposed to the originally recommended figure in the budget proposed by the Budget Committee.

Mr. Risten, Mr. Ken Clark, Mr. Levasseur, Mr. Philip MacSweeney, Mr. Michael Stetson, Mr. John Bednar, Mr. Paul Madison, Mr. Paul Drew, Mrs. Margaret Erb, Mr. Clark Graves, Mr. Leslie Erb and Mr. Fidele Bernasconi questioned Mr. Cote on several issues during and after his slide presentation. The slide presentation was followed by lengthy discussion in which the aforementioned speakers raised various questions relative to the expenditures listed in the Budget. At the end of this discussion, Mr. Levasseur stated that he felt the voters had already made up their minds during this considerable discussion, and he therefore moved the question. Mr. Robert Gosselin seconded the motion. A request was made for a secret ballot. The secret ballot began at 8:05 p.m., using Ballot No. 1, and balloting was closed at 8:20 p.m. The collected ballots were then counted, being tallied as 135 YES votes and 100 NO votes. The Moderator declared that **the amendment was adopted.**

The Moderator stated that the question was now on Article No. 2 as adopted. Mr. Bednar chastized the School Budget Committee's tabulation system, contending that actual figures spent should be shown on expenditures from the previous year. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared that **Article No. 2 as amended was adopted.**

Article No. 3 - The Moderator read Article No. 3 aloud to attendees. Mr. Ken Clark moved for the adoption of Article No. 3. Mr. Graves seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared that **Article No. 3 as amended was adopted.**

Article No. 4 - The Moderator read Article No. 4 aloud to attendees. Mr. Joy moved for the adoption of Article No. 4. Mr. Graves seconded the motion. Mr. Joy moved to amend the article by changing the authorized dollar amount from \$30,000 to \$42,600. Mr. Dolloff seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared that **the proposed amendment was defeated.**

The Moderator declared that the question was now on Article No. 4 as originally stated. Moderator Dolbec recognized Mr. Joy to speak on the article; Mr. Joy complained that he had attempted to gain recognition to speak on the defeated amendment, contending that he had in effect been shut off by the Moderator's haste into a voting mode. Moderator Dolbec apologized for having overlooked Mr. Joy's earlier attempt to speak. Mr. Joy then spoke on Article No. 4, explaining cost figures to attendees with respect to the restoration of the Alvirne Farmhouse. Mr. Leonard Smith raised questions regarding the extent of renovation. Mr. Madison stated that funds would not be sufficient for the restoration of the building, because the voters had disapproved the School Board's proposed amendment to increase the appropriation for Article No. 4, and the probable decision would be not to start work that could not be completed. Mr. Bernasconi spoke on the question. Mr. Risten moved for reconsideration of the previously defeated amendment to Article No. 4. Superintendent Dolloff seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of reconsideration, and the Moderator declared that **reconsideration of the proposed amendment to Article No. 4 was adopted.**

The Moderator stated that the question was now on the proposed amendment to change the dollar amount of Article No. 4 from \$30,000 to \$42,600. Mr. Dolloff explained that the purpose for the \$12,600 increase in appropriation for this article was to cover costs of needed renovations of the Alvirne Farmhouse. Superintendent Dolloff discussed the necessity of this increased appropriation in detail.

Mrs. Judy Jacquet and Mr. Richard Lefebvre questioned why the students of Alvirne's Industrial Arts classes couldn't do the work, as they believed was done in Nashua. Superintendent Dolloff challenged the accuracy of this comparison, discussing the differences between the Industrial Arts programs of the Nashua and Alvirne High Schools and elaborating on the difficulty of the work that had to be done at the Alvirne Farmhouse.

Mr. Shawn Jasper spoke in opposition to the motion, asserting that the \$30,000 figure which had been approved by the Budget Committee ought to be as much as should be spent on the renovation project.

Mr. Ken Clark asked why competitive estimates had not been solicited from local contractors. Superintendent Dolloff explained that professional estimates in fact had been received and had been presented to the Agriculture Committee, which had supported the proposed figure.

Mr. Al Kashulinas spoke in opposition, recommending that the Alvirne Farmhouse should be torn down, instead. Mr. Leonard Smith spoke in favor of renovating the 125-year-old property, but he voiced opposition to the proposed conversion of the house into a two-family unit, as proposed. Mr. Drew spoke in opposition to the article. Mrs. Cloutier spoke in favor of the motion, alluding to various other comparable cost or even more expensive projects that had been authorized without opposition but which she asserted would be of less long-run value to the Town. Mr. Madison spoke on the extensiveness of the repairs needed on the property, adding that he felt that \$42,600 might not be sufficient. Discussion followed between Mrs. Erb and Mr. Joy regarding the need to replace antique doors and windows of the structure.

Mrs. Sylvia Jurkowski asked how a candidate would be selected to live on the property and what type of rent would be charged. Superintendent Dolloff stated that the School District was in the process of interviewing a candidate at the present time, and that a rental fee would be charged. Mr. Joy moved the previous question, and Mr. Drew seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption of the amendment, and the Moderator declared **the amendment of the dollar amount for Article No. 4 from \$30,000 to \$42,600 was adopted.**

Moderator Dolbec stated that the question on the floor now was Article No. 4 as amended. A division vote was requested. A standing vote was taken in favor of the adoption of Article No. 4, as amended, with the results being tallied as 119 YES votes and 90 NO votes. The Moderator declared that **Article No. 4 as amended was adopted.**

Article No. 5 - The Moderator read Article No. 5 aloud to attendees. Mr. Graves moved for the adoption of Article No. 5. Mr. Drew seconded the motion. Mr. Joseph Fields asked how much money Alvirne would donate and what monies would be left in the fund. Superintendent Dolloff explained that the Alvirne Trustees already had contributed \$21,000 to the Alvirne Field Project. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared **Article No. 5 was adopted.**

Article No. 6 - The Moderator read Article No. 6 aloud to attendees. Mr. Cote moved for the adoption of Article No. 6. Mr. Madison seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared **Article No. 6 was adopted.**

Article No. 7 - The Moderator read Article No. 7 aloud to attendees. Mr. Joy moved for the adoption of Article No. 7. Mr. Madison seconded the motion. Mr. Joy spoke on the motion, stating that he was in favor of a five-man School board because of the large number of students and school employees in the district, not to mention a \$7,000,000-plus budget. Mr. Levasseur asked if elections would be combined with the Town elections. Mr. Madison replied in the affirmative. Mr. John Bednar contended that the vote at the School District Meeting in reference to combining local School and Town elections is an irreversible decision. Mr. Bednar demanded to know who was responsible for this article's being placed on the warrant. Mr. Joy stated that the article was the unanimous vote of the present School Board. Mr. Bednar spoke in favor of a five-man board for both the School Board and the Town's Board of Selectmen. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared **Article No. 7 was adopted.**

Mr. Cote moved to adjourn the meeting, and Mr. Joy seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken in favor of adoption, and the Moderator declared the meeting to be adjourned at 9:49 p.m.

Hudson, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Hudson School District as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1982, as listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Hudson School District at June 30, 1982, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Hudson School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

JUNE 30, 1982

STUDENT ACTIVITIES FUNDS

Our audit engagement included the examination of the various student activity funds. There was approximately \$265,000 expended through these activity accounts in 1981-82.

Our examination of the Memorial School Activity Funds revealed the following weaknesses in the record-keeping system.

- a. There is very little control over receipts in that cash is not counted at the time of receipt and receipt slips are not being used. Cash should be verified by count upon initial receipt and prenumbered duplicate receipt slips should be utilized.
- b. The book balances were not reconciled with the monthly bank statements submitted by the depository bank. After considerable effort, we were able to reconcile book balances with the bank statement as of June 30, 1982. We do recommend that the accounts be reconciled monthly with the bank statements and any discrepancies be investigated and corrected.

Due to numerous transactions reflected in the Alvirne High and Memorial Schools Activity funds, we recommend that consideration be given to the implementation of a so-called "one-write" type of bookkeeping system. Such a system would permit the issuance of receipts and bank drafts, in addition to journal posting, in a single entry. This would reduce present bookkeeping time and facilitate timely and accurate reports.

We also recommend that a monthly report of receipts, disbursements and reconciled cash balance be filed with the administrative office for review and approval by the Business Administrator. In addition to ascertaining that book balances are in agreement with bank balances, a monthly review of the individual student activity accounts would disclose any deficit balances, which should prompt investigation. For example, the High School Student Activity account entitled "Roderick's Flowers" indicates an overdraft of \$497 at June 30, and we have not been advised as to why this did occur, nor the remedy to eliminate the deficit.

Note, Bond and Coupon Register

As mentioned in previous management letters, the Treasurer does not maintain a note, bond and coupon register as required by the New Hampshire Revised Statute Annotated (RSA 33:12). We recommend that the Treasurer comply with this requirement.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

JUNE 30, 1982

NOTE 1 — SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the School District are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the School District:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund — The General Fund is the general operating fund of the School District. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds — Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Food Service, Federal/State Projects, and Alvirne Farm funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust and Agency Funds — Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust or as an agent by the School District for others. The Capital Reserve Funds, Alvirne Trustees Fund, and Student Activities Funds are shown in this fund type.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets and Long-Term Liabilities)

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the School District does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

Long-term liabilities expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue, and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the School District, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: 1) accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay, and 2) principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Agency funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the School Districts' operations. State Statutes require balanced budgets and the use of beginning general fund unreserved fund balance to reduce District Assessments. In 1981-82, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are, therefore, reported as part of the fund balance at June 30 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

F. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

G. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Teachers accumulate sick leave at a rate of 15 days per year at the elementary and middle schools, and at 18 days per year at the senior high level, accumulative to a maximum of 90 days. Vacation is granted in varying amounts based on length of service for employees other than teachers. At June 30, 1982, unrecorded General Fund liability included approximately \$992,567 sick pay. Vacation pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance.

H. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations the School District has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services. The accompanying governmental fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

All debt is general obligation debt of the School District, which is backed by its full faith and credit.

NOTE 3 — PENSION PLAN

The teachers and employees are covered under the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The District's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Hudson School District is not available. The District does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. The retirement cost for 1981-82 was \$57,461.

NOTE 4 — ALVIRNE TRUSTEES FUND

The Alvirne Trustees Fund consists of monies received from the Alvirne School Trustees, a private charitable corporation. An annual budget is prepared by the School Board for approval by the Trustees. Throughout the year, separate expenditure manifests are approved by the School Board and submitted to the Trustees for reimbursement for payments made from the fund.

There is no inclusion of either the estimated revenues or expenditures in the general operating budget of the School District, contrary to State requirements, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law.

RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended); and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes, and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Hudson; and to allow the Selectmen and/or the Library Trustees to apply for, accept, and expend such Federal funds or grants as may be available from Federal Agencies or programs, and such State or private grants or funds as may be available for the project, utilizing such grants or funds to reduce the funds to the raised and appropriated hereunder as may be determined by the Selectmen: or to take any other action relative thereto.

The second plan is entitled "Plan of Land of Gerald Mercier," dated August, 1974, and recorded as Plan #8568 at the Hillsborough Registry of Deeds.

25. To see if the citizens of Hudson, New Hampshire will vote to ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries.

To see if the Town will vote that in all buildings which are required to have a fire detection or a sprinkler system under the Life Safety Code #101, the Fire Prevention Code, the Town adopted Building Codes: The sprinkler system must be connected directly into the Hudson Fire Department controlled monitoring system, and the fire detection system must be installed as directed and approved by Chief of the Hudson Fire Department.

27. To see if the Town will vote to extend the sewerage line to serve Frenette Drive, from Greeley Street.

28. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the health and welfare of the people of New Hampshire.

29. To see if the Town will vote to rescind their affirmative vote on Article # 1 of the 1982 Town Warrant relative to appropriating \$875,000.00 as the Town's share of the Central Street Improvement Project and further to see if the Town will vote to withhold any funds for any major highway improvements (other than Derry Road) until the completion of improvements to the Derry Road, making it a three lane street.

30. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to publish a list of assessed property valuations for all the property owners in the Town, both resident and non-resident, and paying taxes to the Town. This listing, in pamphlet form, shall include the assessed valuations of each parcel of property in the Town, by property owner, map and lot number, tax account number, and street address, as of April 1, 1983 and every three years thereafter. This pamphlet shall be available to all the voters in the Town at the same time as the Annual Town Report and the Article shall remain in effect until rescinded by the voters of the Town at a future Annual Town Meeting.

To see if the Town will vote to place a freeze on the hiring of any new personnel and on payroll increases to elected and appointed officials, supervisory personnel, and personnel above the class considered laborers, until such time as personnel classifications are completed and put into effect by the Selectmen.

To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen to submit, in Article form, all new additions to Town personnel and monies to be paid to them, and all salary increases to elected and appointed officials in all departments or offices in the Town, notwithstanding any previous articles passed at any previous Town Meeting, such previous articles to be deemed null and void. This action shall remain in effect until rescinded by the voters of the Town at a future Town Meeting.

33. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to hire the same auditing firm as the Hudson School District for the purpose of consistency in the auditing of Town and School District records. The audit form shall follow the procedures laid down in Article # 13 of the 1975 Town Meeting; Article #36 of the 1976 Town Meeting; and Article #33 of the 1977 Town Meeting.

34. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to use the unexpended balance of the \$450,000.00 nond issue raised for the improvement of Derry Street (N.H. Rt. 102) for improvements to be made by local paving contractors. Said improvements shall consist of and be limited to:

- a. Adding a third lane within the existing right of way and restriping the section of road from the power lines at 45 Derry Street to Elm Avenue to provide for a center turning lane.
- b. Constructing such drainage as may be necessary and obtaining drainage easements if necessary.
- c. The total width of pavement is not to exceed 12' per lane or 36' width maximum 4' paved shoulders if adequate space is available.
- d. A traffic light at the MacDonald's restaurant if money is available.

Under no condition is money to be used for eminent domain proceedings to take additional rights-of-ways.

35. To see if the Town will vote to abandon, subject to approval by the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board, of an alternate road to be constructed by Oscar L. Frost, Jr., that portion of Lakeside Drive between marshmallow Path and Walter Lily Path, as shown on a plan "Ottarnic Lake Park", recorded in the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds as Plan #543.

(By Petition)

36. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance, to be known as Motor Vehicle Race Track Ordinance, as follows:

1. **Authority.** This ordinance is enacted pursuant to the provisions of RSA 31:41-a.

2. **Definition.** For purposes of this ordinance, the terms below are defined as follows:

"Motor Vehicle" — Any self-propelled vehicle, except tractors, activated by an internal combustion engine and not operated exclusively on stationary tracks.

"Person" — Any individual, partnership, corporation, or other entity proposing to or operating a motor vehicle race track.

3. **License.** Annually, before April 1, any person proposing to operate a motor vehicle race track within the Town of Hudson shall obtain a license from the Hudson Board of Selectmen. The fee for each such license shall be \$100.00 per annum.

4. **Regulations.** At any motor vehicle race track operated within the Town of Hudson, the following regulations shall apply:

- (a) No alcoholic beverages shall be sold, served, dispensed, distributed, or consumed at any time.

- (b) The hours of operation shall be:
 Afternoon Races — 12:00 Noon to 5:30 P.M.
 Evening Races — 5:00 P.M. to 10:30 P.M.

- (c) Night or evening races are only permitted during the summer season; specifically, after the Hudson Public Schools have closed in June and prior to the date on which they open in September.

- (d) Every motor vehicle participating in any races sponsored by a motor vehicle race track in Hudson will be equipped with mufflers or noise reduction devices which shall be approved by the Board of Selectmen.
 - (e) Any person operating a motor vehicle race track shall permit Town officials, or their designated representatives, to conduct, from time to time, at said person's expense, such noise level tests or readings as may be deemed appropriate and necessary by the Hudson Board of Selectmen.
5. **Restrictions in License.** Any license issued by the Hudson Board of Selectmen pursuant to Paragraph 3, shall contain the following:
- (a) A requirement that proposed schedule of racing days and hours be submitted to the office of the Board of Selectmen at least two weeks prior to any race meet.
 - (b) A requirement that the person operating the motor vehicle race track shall make public announcements, during and at the conclusion of a day's racing activities, requesting that spectators and participants observe local speed limits, refrain from littering and excessive noise, and refrain from using streets when prohibited by local ordinance.
 - (c) A requirement that the person operating the motor vehicle race track provide adequate trash receptacles on the premises, that said receptacles be emptied on a regular basis, and that the premises constituting the race track be maintained in a neat and orderly fashion, including the parking areas, and that all clean up activities be completed within 24 hours of the conclusion of any day's racing activities.
 - (d) A requirement that the race track be kept secure from unauthorized entry when not being used.
6. **Inspections.** The Hudson Board of Selectmen, Building Inspector and Health Officer are authorized to make announced or unannounced inspections of the property to insure compliance with the requirements of this ordinance and any license issued hereunder.
7. **Liability Insurance.** Any person operating a motor vehicle race track shall be required to provide such insurance as may be deemed necessary and appropriate by the Hudson Board of Selectmen. Certificates of said insurance shall be filed with the Board of Selectmen prior to the commencement of any racing season or meet.
8. **Violations.** Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of a license issued by the Board of Selectmen hereunder, shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 for each day that said violation exists. Any fines collected hereunder shall be paid into the general fund of the Town of Hudson. In addition to or instead of monetary fines, the Board of Selectmen is hereby authorized to revoke any permit issued hereunder where a violation of this ordinance or of a license issued hereunder exists and the same has not been corrected within five (5) days of sending notice of the violation to the person operating the motor vehicle race track.
9. **Variations.** The Board of Selectmen is hereby authorized to vary the requirements set forth in Paragraph 4 (b) and (c) and the restrictions in Paragraph 5 if, in the opinion of the Board, a significant hardship exists for

the person operating the motor vehicle race track and no significant harm will result to the public health, safety and welfare.

10. **Effective Date.** This Ordinance shall be effective on the date of its adoption by the 1983 Annual Town Meeting.
