TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following Article:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Polls will close at 7:30 p.m.

You are hereby notified to meet at the American Legion Hall in said Kensington on Thursday, the fifteenth day of March, next at 7:30 p.m. to act upon Article 2 and subsequent Articles.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$224,578.22.

3. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 to 60 days after presentation of tax bills.

4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid to the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. By petition of Francis Pease, Jr. and others: "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to purchase equipment and services needed by the Planning Board."

7. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,520.00 to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

8. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$919.80 to the Rockingham Planning Commission.

9. By petition of Nancy Roffman and others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the continuation of the Mediation Program."

10. By petition of Edith M. Keough and others: "To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$476.00 to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 2.5% of \$19,077.00, the value of services rendered to Kensington residents from September 1, 1982 through August 31, 1983." 11. By petition of Judith Pease and others: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$345.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization. It has been established that our counseling services must be assessed at \$40.00 per hour. During the period July 1, 1982 through June 30, 1983, our fiscal year, 10 residents of the town of Kensington used this Counseling Center for a total of 29½ sessions at a cost of \$1180.00 to the agency. However, only \$373.00 was received. These funds requested to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing Individual and Family Counseling for residents of the town of Kensington whether or not said residents are able to pay."

12. By petition of James R. Rosencrantz and others: "To see if the Town of Kensington shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative (s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Kensington, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire."

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a police cruiser.

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,322.98 which includes interest of \$528.98 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be transferred to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the investment of a Town Office.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

On Ballot: To see if the town will adopt article 30, Wetland 3. Conservation District:

Purpose

I. The general purpose of this District is for regulation of wetlands in Kensington in such a manner as to preserve the Town's water resources for the benefit of public health, safety and general wel-fare. Correlated purposes are:

- To preserve wetland areas for their natural productivity, wild-life habitat, recreational and scenic enjoyment, and to en-courage uses that will enhance these values. To preserve natural wetland areas which provide flood protec-Α.
- Β. tion, nutritient absorption and augmentation of stream flows during dry periods. To prevent the development of structures and other land uses on
- С. naturally occurring wetland areas that would contribute to surface and ground water pollution or reduce surface and ground water supplies.
- To prevent unnecessary or excessive expense to the Town in pro-viding and maintaining obligated services which arise because of the inappropriate use of wetland areas. D.
- II. Definition and Designation A. The Kensington Wetlands Conservation District encompases specific areas mapped and delineated by the United States Department of Agriculture (U.S.D.A.) Soil Conservation Service. This District is shown on a map designated as the "Town of Kensington Wetlands Conservation District." These areas encompassed are:

Marshes, bogs

Swamps

Ponds Streams

- Poorly drained soils these soil areas in which the table rises to within six inches of the ground surface for
- Very poorly drained soils those soil areas in which the water table is at or on the surface of the ground for more than nine months of the year. Wetland area boundaries indicated on the Wetland Conservation

District map are based on soil survey field work conducted dur-ing 1978. This work was done in cooperation with the Rockingham

County Conservation District by staff scientists of the U.S.D.A., Soil Conservation Service. Copies of this work in total are on file with the Kensington Planning Board, Conservation Comm., and Town Clerk, as well as the District office of the Soil Conservation Service in Exeter.

B. In cases where areas designated by the Wetlands Conservation District are regulated by the Land Use Ordinance and Subdivision Control Regulations, the more restrictive regulations shall govern.

III. Permitted Uses

A. For areas with poorly drained soils:

- 1. General: Any use that does not involve the erection of a permanent residential, commercial or industrial structure and that does not alter the surface configuration of the land by the addition of fill or by dredging, except as a common treatment associated with a permitted use. A permitted use must be consistent with the purpose and intent of Section I. Fermitted uses include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Agriculture;
 - b. Forestry and tree farming;
 - c. Construction of well water supplies;
 - Drainage ways, to include streams, creeks or other paths of natural runoff as well as common agricultural land drainage;
 - e. Wildlife habitat development and management;
 - f. Parks and recreation;
 - g. Conservation areas and nature trails;
 - h. Open space as permitted or required by subdivision regulations.
- B. For very poorly drained soils and/or marshes, swamps, ponds, bogs and streams:
 - General: Such uses as specified by Section III-A for poorly drained soils shall be permitted except that no alteration of the surface configuration of the land by filling will be allowed, even if the proposed use is a common treatment associated with a permitted use. No erection of a structure will be permitted.

IV. Prohibited Uses

Uses prohibited in the Wetlands Conservation District include but are not limited to:

- A. Waste Disposal systems;
- B. Septage waste or sludge disposal;
- C. Storage of gasoline, fuel oil or other hazardous materials;
- D. Landfills or dumps;
- E. Commercial excavation;
- F. Roadsalt stockpiles.
- V. Special Provisions
- A. Poorly drained soils may be used to fulfill all but 3/4 of an acre (30,000 square feet) of any building lot minimum acreage requirement provided that the non-wetland area is sufficient in size and configuration to accommodate all required utilities, as determined by the Town of Kensington Test Pit Inspector.
- B. No very poorly drained soils or bodies of water may be used to satisfy minimum lot size.
- VI. Special Exceptions
- A. Special exceptions may be granted by the Board of Adjustment for the following uses within the Wetlands Conservation District, if if can be shown that such proposed use will not conflict with

the purposes and intent of Section I. Froper evidence to this

- effect shall be submitted in writing to the Board Of Adjustment.
 Streets, roads and other access ways and utility right-of-way easements, if such location is essential to the productive use of land not so zoned, and so constructed as to minimize any detrimental impact of such use upon the Wetland Conservation District.
- The construction of wharves, footbridges, catwalks, fences, water impoundments and beaches. The Building Inspector 2. shall ensure that all construction conform to standard construction requirements.
- The Kensington Conservation Commission and the Rockingham County Β. Conservation District may submit their comments on the anticipated environmental effects of these uses on the area proposed for such use, which will be used by the Board of Adjustment in its decision.
- All necessary state permits and approvals required by State Statutes shall be obtained prior to local special exceptions С. being granted.
- VII. Procedure for Review
- Α.
- Building Permits for Individual Lots: 1. Lots of Record The Building Inspector shall check the location of proposed construction relative to the Wetlands Conservation District to ensure compliance with this Article. Wetland information from the Wetland Conservation District map shall be submitted to and reviewed by the Building Inspector. The person applying for a building permit shall gather necessary information.
 - New Lots The Building Inspector shall rely on the review 2. of the Test Pit Inspector, as required by Section V-A.
- Subdivision Proposals: Upon receiving a subdivision proposal, Β. the Planning Board shall check the location of all proposal, lots relative to the Wetlands Conservation District to ensure compliance to this Article. The Town of Kensington Test Pit Inspector shall include, as part of his site information, whether the special provisions of Section V of this Article have been met.

Wetland information from the Wetland Conservation District map shall be submitted to the Planning Board by the person proposing a subdivision.

VIII. Procedure for Appeal of Wetland Classification

In the event that an area is alleged to be incorrectly designated on the Wetland Conservation District Map, the person or persons ag-grieved by such designation, or the Planning Board or Test Pit Inspector, may call upon the services of an independent qualified soil scientist to examine the area in question and report on the actual location of the Wetland area. Such investigations shall be undertaken at the expense of the person or persons so aggrieved. A oualified soil scientist is interpreted to mean a person qualified in soil classification and who is recommended or approved by the Rockingham County Conservation District Supervisors.

7. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Voice vote in the <u>affirmative</u> not to exceed \$375,000.00.

8. By petition of Judith S. Pease and others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$481.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit organization. The amount of this request is based on services rendered to 13 residents of the Town of Kensington during the period July 1, 1981 through June 30, 1982, inclusive. These residents used \$1,260.00 worth of services, however, only \$481.00 could be billed according to their ability to pay. We therefore request a match payment from the Town, in this instance being \$481.00. These funds to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing individual and family counseling for residents of the Town of Kensington whether or not said residents are able to pay." Voice vote in the affirmative.

9. By petition of Edith M. Keough and others, to see if the Town of Kensington will: "appropriate the sum of \$244.00 to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 2.5% of \$9,787.00, the value of services rendered to Kensington residents from September 1, 1981 through August 31, 1982." Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

10. By petition of Nancy S. Roffman and others, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the continuation of the Mediation Program." Voice vote was in the affirmative.

11. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,517.00 to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

12. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$948.50 to the Rockingham Planning Commission. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

13. By petition of Sandra Gavutis and others, to see if the town of Kensington will require that any emergency response plans for the Town and the Seabrook Nuclear Project be approved by the town meet-ing as a condition for their acceptance by the town. 1. The Selectmen will cause any evacuation or other emergency re-

The Selectmen will cause any evacuation or other emergency re-sponse plans for the Seabrook Nuclear Project which affect the town which are developed by or for the town, the state of New Hampshire, the Fublic Service Company of New Hampshire, to come before the Town Meeting for approval by majority vote.
 No town official or agency shall promote the implementation of an emergency response plan for the Seabrook Nuclear Froject which has not been approved by the Town Meeting.

Voice vote in the affirmative.

14. By petition of Nora M. Tuthill and others, to see if the town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of our town, our state and the nation, and to the health and welfare of the people of our town, our state and the nation. These actions shall include: 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990. 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Concde that will cormit both potions to this care and The negotiation Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,000.00 for renovation of the interior of the Town Hall. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,503.21 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be transferred to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the investment of a Town office. This sum includes \$2,244.00 which is January 1983 allocation. This amount to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund as needed. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,597.08 toward office space at Town Hall, said sum is accumulated interest from Revenue Sharing Fund while invested in the Capital Reserve Fund. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

"The Herbert Lastman made a motion to adopt the following article: moderator be authorized to appoint a committee of 7 to study the organization of the Town Government, the duties of its officers and agents and to report its recommendations and findings to the next Annual Meeting." Voice vote was in the affirmative.

Charles Eastman made a motion that the present building committee continue. Voice vote was in the affirmative.

Herbert Fastman made a motion to increase Selectmen's salary to: Chairman, \$1,250.00; other 2 members, \$1,000.00 each. Motion accepted by several and voted in the <u>affirmative</u>.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The wetlands ordinance developed by the Conservation Commission and Planning Board with the help of the Rockingham Planning Comm., was adopted at the town meeting. This should significantly enhance the towns' ability to protect its wetlands and water resources and maintain its rural character as recommended in the master plan.

In December, Dr. Charles DeLucia advised former commission chairman, Nora Tuthill, of his desire to donate his 5 acre parcel of land in the Great Meadows to the town to be managed by the Commission. At years end Rockingham Land Trust attorney, Charles Tucker,was in the process of effecting the fee title transfer of this piece of prime wetland which is adjacent to Rte. 150. The Commission is delighted with the prospect of the gift of this parcel since it is in the same corner of the Meadows as the two tracts we were granted conservation easements on last year by the Smith's and Pease's. Plans are being made to install nesting boxes for wood ducks, tree swallows and bluebirds on these properties this winter. Bluebirds nested successfully in one of the boxes installed by

Bluebirds nested successfully in one of the boxes installed by the Commission on the Dingman property off Bartlett Road. A pair of kestrels were seen near a nest box provided for them but the female was killed by a goshawk.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board, in the conduct of routine business, held several Public Hearings during 1983. Landowners submitted applications for several minor subdivisions, creating three lots or fewer each, which were acted on fayorably by the Board.

A cluster type resident al development was approved after extensive study, including a commercial site plan review as well as a very well attended Fublic Hearing. Other site plans for commercial developments were approved, and at least one will continue into 1984.

A wetland zoning district and ordinance, one of Kensington's most important ordinances was enacted by the voters in 1983. The Flanning Board respects this ordinance and takes pride in its administration.

Work on the Master Plan, which is to be re-certified by the Planning Board, continued during 1983.

At the state level, the 1983 legislative session passed several significant laws affecting the Planning Board. These laws provide the basis for a major regulation reorganization which will continue at least through 1984.

Planning Board meetings, held monthly on the first Thursday, are always open to the public and any citizen of the town is welcomed to attend and comment on issues raised.

REPORT OF THE ROCKINGHAM PLANNING COMMISSION

Local technical assistance continues to be a major emphasis at Regional Planning. In response to requests from various town bodies, the Commission has assisted in several ways. For the Planning Board, the Commission worked on such things as home occupation ordinances, multi-family and mobile home regulations, revisions to the wetlands ordinance and commercial use ordinances. A review is being made of the site plan and subdivision regulations. The Conservation Commission is being aided in the development of a conservation plan and in its coordination with the Rockingham Land Trust. Information relative to weight limits on town roads was furnished to the Selectmen.

Several of the Commission area-wide projects are of interest to Kensington. The Law Lecture Series, the Erosion and Sedimentation workshop and the upcoming Natural Resources Lecture Series, as well as publications such as the Zoning Calendar, and Rockingham Notes, help keep town officials informed. Copies of the State's newly recodified planning laws were provided to the Selectmen and the Planning Board members.

Virtually all of the federal funds received by the Commission are "earmarked" for specific projects. The most important of these are transportation planning and historic preservation work. One result of the latter is the recently published, and available to towns, "Historic Preservation and Master Plans: A Manual for Local Officials."

The Commission has worked to help establish the Kingston Solid Waste District, to which Kensington belongs. Work is continuing on this project to provide for septage waste disposal, a provision mandated by state law.

Prospects appear good for the Commission's continued service to its members, despite a complete lack of unencumbered funds from the state or federal governments.

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EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association experienced a year of growth and change in 1983. The EAVNA operated with the largest budget, caseload and staff in the history of the Agency. The two new services, speech and occupational therapy, were very well utilized. The other disciplines, nursing, physical therapy and home health aides all show a marked increase in visits. Needs are changing. People are staying in hospitals for shorter periods of time and frequently staying at home rather than being cared for in nursing homes. HOME CARE now requires increased skills and up to date technology to meet the needs of the acutely ill as well as the chronically ill. Service was provided as needed 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.

In addition to the HOME CARE program, the MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH PROGRAM was ever responsive to the needs of its population, working closely with local pediatricians and the state and federal policy makers.

The Agency's ADULT HEALTH PROGRAM was expanded to meet the needs of the adult population. Foot Care Clinics provided a new service for people needing assistance caring for their feet. Self help sessions were held to assist elders in independent living. Immunization clinics for adults were added to the program and blood pressure clinics were increased to serve the middle and younger adult.

The EAVNA continues to promote a clinical setting to students of health care as well as provide continuing education for its own staff to enable the Agency to continue to meet the changing needs of its clients and of the community.

15,313 units of service were provided to residents of the ser-vice area between January 1, 1983 and December 31, 1983. (Indivi-dual town statistics are sent to the selectman of each town.) In the 80's, the shift of health care is to the HOME and the COMMUNITY. The EAVNA is meeting the challenges and will continue to callaborate and coordinate with other health providers to assure that quality health care is available to residents of the area.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The circulation total is down from last years figure. The largest drops in circulation was in the Children's Room. I suspect that this was partly due to a drop in the school enrollment. The adult circulation was up in the fiction category, down slightly in non-fiction, up in magazine circulation, down in reference assistance and slightly up in the miscellaneous items. Miscellaneous items include maps, puzzles and other non-print items.

We received 577 gift books during 1983 and 240 were purchased from the library budget. The cost of books has increased so dramatically in the past few years that our budget doesn't stretch very far. Children's books have more than doubled in price and even paper back books cost as much as hard bound books did a few years ago.

Memorial books were placed in the library in memory of Clark Jacobs, Ruth Sawyer, Martha Thorndike, Jeffrey Kuegel, Faith York and Mari Welch.

We received a number of books from the state when the Bookmobile ceased to function. We can still obtain books direct from the State Library but non-fiction, only. The neighboring librarians have been most generous in loaning us books. The Lane Memorial Library in Hampton is most willing to lend us collections of books that we may circulate to our readers.

Sally Head has continued to provide programs for the children during the summer months. The craft programs are very popular. We regret to say that only ten children can be allowed to participate in each session of the crafts due to space limitations. We always feel sorry when we have to turn children away. The Summer Reading Program continues to be popular as is the party at the end of the program. Summer movies were continued during July and August and were well attended. The Friends made possible for us to have the Ha'Penny Puppet come and amuse the children in August and we had a family movie one evening during the school year for parents and kids. Sally also continued her pre-school story hour for four and five year old children during the school year.

Our annual book and bake sale was post-poned until the fall this past year and was most successful. We held our annual tree trimming and Christmas punch party this year.

We wish to thank the members of both boards of trustees for their support and the many ways they helped out during the year. Our thanks to our faithful volunteers, without whom we would

be lost.

And my personal thanks to June Armstrong, Sally Head and Priscilla Prescott, the rest of the library staff, for always being willing to tackle any task I ask of them and doing it well.

REPORT OF THE 1983 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING KENSINGTON, N.H. - MARCH 5, 1983

The Annual School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Stephen Smith, at 7:00 P.M. Lester Briggs opened the meeting with the salute to the flag. The Moderator read the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the School District.

Hal Bodwell motioned the article remain the same. Linda Blood seconded the motion. Joe Ripel asked how long the present salaries have been in place. Hal Bodwell answered about three years. The vote was taken and was affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

Hal Bodwell motioned to table the Article. It was seconded by several people. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the District wishes to request from the Commissioner of Education a waiver of the requirements stated in RSA 189: 11-a which requires the establishment of a school lunch program.

Hal Bodwell moved to accept Article 3. Emmons Sanborn seconded the motion. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, accept, and expend on behalf of the School District, all gifts, advances, grants in aid, revenue sharing funds or any other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be available or forthcoming from the U. S. Government, the State of New Hampshire or any of its municipalities or any other state, local or federal agency. John York moved to adopt Article 4. Emons Sanborn seconded

John York moved to adopt Article 4. Emons Sanborn seconded the motion. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the District will recess the meeting to Saturday, April 2, 1983 at 7:00 P.M., Kensington Town Hall, for the sole purpose of acting on the following:

A. To see if the District will vote to approve or reject the fact finder's recommendation under the provisions of Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 273-A with respect to the impasse presently existing in negotiations between the Kensington School District and the Kensington Teachers Association. B. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the School District teachers and all other cost items as defined by Revised Statute Annotated Chapter 273: A.I.

C. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Because of the agreement reached by the Kensington School District and the Kensington Teachers Association the Moderator went directly to part C of Article 5.

The Moderator recognized Hal Bodwell who changed the Budget figure from Seven Hundred Eight Thousand, Six Hundred Four Dollars (\$708,604.00) to Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty Five Dollars (\$712,455.00) because of the increase in teachers salaries. Hal Bodwell motioned to raise the sum of Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty Five Dollars (\$712,455.00). Joe Ripel seconded the motion. Seavie Rideout asked what % the teachers salaries increased. Hal Bodwell answered 6% plus step. Mr. Rideout asked about the \$4000.00 line item for a teachers aide. Hal Bodwell explained the school would be losing a part-time teacher therefore necessitating the hiring of an intern. Raymond Bisbee questioned whether the budget was sufficient to give the children of Kensington a quality education. Hal Bodwell answered he thought it a good budget. Seavie Rideout asked if there would be a surplus as in the past suggesting the budget was padded. Dick Drew answered that in the past they have budgeted for the possibility of new students entering school. Mr. Rideout suggested there may be a surplus again this year even though the budget was cut last year. Linda Blood answered saying they would not know the repercussion of last years budget cuts until the fiscal year ended. Michael Balfe asked if there would be a surplus this year. Hal Bodwell answered he would rather not speculate on that. They would not know until the last tuition bill was paid to the Junior and Senior High Schools. Joe Ripel congratulated the School Board for not wasting surplus funds but rather returning it to the Town. Seavie Rideout asked about the increase in Special Education. Hal Bodwell stated last years budget for Special Education was insufficient and that the school spent approximately Forty Six Thousand Dollars (\$46,000). Seavie Rideout asked what the dues were under Administrative Services. Hal Bodwell answered it was dues for the New Hampshire Association of Elementary School Principals. Seavie Rideout moved to amend the budget to read Six Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$680,000.00). Mr. Page seconded the motion. Tom Kerr asked Mr. Rideout to explain in detail where the budget

should be cut. Mr. Rideout answered he thought it not his responsibility to explain where the budget should be cut but thought the budget was just too high. Hal Bodwell remarked that most of the budget was out of the hands of the School Board. He said most of the increase was due to the increases in tuition at the Jr. & Senior High Schools. Hal said he would not like to see the Elementary School budget cut. Hal said if it had to be cut it would almost have to be in transportation. John York commented the problem was not with the School Board or the Town but with Concord. Mr. York praised the School Board for doing a good job. Hal Bodwell commented that N.H. provides only 7% State Aid to Education and that New Hampshire received the least amount of any state. Marilyn Evans said it would be a crime to cut the budget. Mrs. Evans commented the children in Kensington got a good education and the teachers were doing a very good job. Mrs. Evans also said that many of the children on the Honor Rolls at the Jr. & Senior High Schools were from Kensington. George Gavutis asked the board if it was locked into Blue Cross-Blue Shield Insurance for the teachers. Hal Bodwell answered no but that Blue Cross Blue Shield was the most popular.

Stephen Smith, School Moderator, called for a vote on the amended budget. The vote was in the negative. John York asked for a vote on the original question. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To choose Agents and/or Committees in relation to any subject embraced by this Warrant.

Hal Bodwell moved to table Article 6. The move was seconded by many. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Dick Drew was recognized and told the audience that Fred King, Superintendent of Schools, was leaving to accept another position in Maine. Mr. King spoke briefly and told the audience that he would miss Kensington. Mr. King said he was very proud of Kensington, its School Board, teachers and principals over the years. Mr. King also remarked that Kensington had scored higher than any town in the Seacoast area on its Accountability Tests. Mr. King commented on the fact there would be very few money problems where he was going as the Special Education budget is 100% funded by the state and the school budget is 53% funded by the state. Joe Ripel moved to adjourn the meeting. John York seconded the motion. The vote was affirmative. The Moderator, Stephen Smith, declared the School District Meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

It is a pleasure for us to write our first Town Report. This year's report will be a combination of thoughts from the SAU #16 office and a report on school activities and events from the building administration.

One of the first things we did this year was to meet with each of the Boards plus the SAU Board and institute a goal setting process to mutually develop goals for each district plus the SAU. The SAU Goals for the year were:

- 1. Improve Communication in Areas of Budget and Curriculum
- 2. Raise Standards, Expectations and Quality of Education at the High School
- 3. Coordinate Curriculum Among All Elementary Schools and Between the Elementary Schools and Exeter AREA Junior High School

Each of the goals has been addressed during the current school year. The activities related to Goal 1 are ongoing and will be continued in the years ahead. A partial listing of the activities involved in this goal follow:

- 1. the format for 1984-85 budget proposals incorporate the major goals of each educational program underscoring the relationship between the budget and curriculum development.
- 2. a monthly Superintendent's report is forwarded to all SAU members. This report includes information on events at the AREA Junior High and High Schools, as well as other information of interest to all SAU #16 Board members.
- 3. a periodic curriculum newsletter is distributed to all SAU #16 teachers and Board members. The newsletter describes exemplary teaching practices in the SAU, and includes articles on major educational issues and research.

Goal 2 relates to the mission of the High School Curriculum Committee. The Committee, composed of parents, Board members, administrators and teachers, is reviewing and refining the curriculum areas at the High School, and developing strategies for increasing student expectations.

To help fulfill Goad 3, we have established an Elementary Curriculum Committee composed of parents, Board members, teachers and administrators from all the towns in the SAU. Their task for this year is the total review of all elementary curriculum, establishment of a priority list for reviewing and revising curriculum, developing a consistent format for curriculum development, the monitoring of curriculum as well as making recommendations for the implementation of new curriculum and teacher training in the curriculum area. A complete report with specific recommendations will be presented to all the Boards in late spring.

Aside from the many activities associated with individual district and SAU Goals - numerous other activities have taken place throughout the SAU. Some have been mainly administrative - such as the establishment of job descriptions for all employees. Others have resulted in the addition to or updating of physical plants and many have resulted in the improvement of instruction to the children. These instructional activities which are the most important have included but are not restricted to the implementation of enrichment programs, computer instruction and drug and alcohol abuse curriculum.

All in all it has been a very productive, stimulating and positive year. We are looking ahead to our continued association and and work with the Board members, parents, teachers, administrators and most importantly the children of SAU #16 in the years ahead.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Kensington Elementary School once again continues to illustrate fine quality education. Standardized testing places our students in the high national percentile. Parents and staff support our programs and the results are evident.

Staff changes include the leaving of Suzette McKenzie replaced by Ms. Wendy Simmons as Physical Education Teacher. Miss Mantarian replaced Miss Bernier as the Speech and Language Therapist and Mrs. Beach replaced Mrs. Bailey as the Art Teacher. Miss Diglio, a University of New Hampshire Intern, in the first grade helps to get our children off to a good start.

The one major curriculum area change was Reading. We have recently implemented a new reading program. It appears to be more stimulating and enriching to the students.

Within the past year the school underwent Minimum Standards Evaluation by the State Department of Education. There were only two recommendations made to the school by the evaluation. We are in need of a school-based library and we also need a guidance counselor. All other areas were satisfactory and commendable.

Parents participation through the New Hampshire School Volunteer program has been of great value in strengthening education in our school.

New interests include the acquisition of our third computer. We continue to meet the needs that emerge in education and the staff will meet those needs head on and continue to improve your children's education. We trust your support will also be to meet that goal.

INFORMATION FOR KENSINGTON RESIDENTS

RULES & REGULATIONS FOR WASTE OR REFUSE DISPOSAL

- 1. There will be a house to house pickup every Wednesday of each week.
- 2. Waste must be contained in plastic bags or trash containers, not to exceed a capacity of 30 gallons.
- 3. Solid waste must be placed at end of driveway at 7 a.m.
- 4. Weight of any container not to exceed 100 pounds.
- 5. No brush or stumps will be picked up and no 55 gallom drums are to be used.
- 6. Refrigerators, stoves, washing machines, dryers and tires will be picked up the first Tuesday in May and November.
- 7. Providing leaves are to be disposed of along with solid waste, the limit for each week will be four 30 gallon trash containers or 8 plastic bags.
- 8. There will be a container placed at the Elementary School for the use of the school, fire house, library, town hall, church and american legion.

LICENSING OF DOGS

Each owner of a dog 3 months old or over must register the dog with the Town Clerk before May 1st. Each dog over 3 months must have received a "rables vaccination" certificate of vaccination to be presented to the Town Clerk at time of licensing. Each dog must wear a collar around its neck; attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registration number.





JUNK CAR REGULATIONS

A recent N. H. Statute requires anyone with two or more unregistered or old cars no longer intended or in condition for legal use on highways or used auto parts equal in bulk to two vehicles must obtain a license or be subject to a \$10.00 a day fine and a mandatory injunction to end the violation by the selectmen. New and used car dealers registered as such are not considered auto junk dealers but must remove any junk cars from their premises within 160 days.
