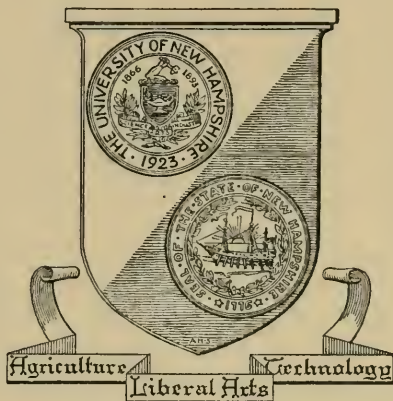

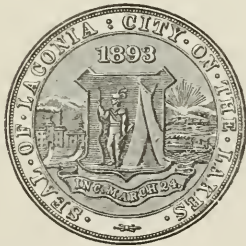

ORGANIZATION

of the City Government

Tuesday, March 26, 1940

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the City Council for the municipal year of 1940, and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Robinson W. Smith and prayer was offered by the Rev. Joseph H. Vatcher.

The records of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

The Clerk then read statement of the votes cast for Mayor and Councilmen on March 12th as returned by the Clerks of the several wards, and Mayor Smith referred same to the committee on Elections and returns, who retired, canvassed the returns, and reported they found the statement submitted by the City Clerk correct, and Councilman Hopkins declared Robinson W. Smith elected Mayor of the City of Laconia for the ensuing year, and Mayor Smith declared George R. Bowman, Theodore E. Laroche, Ralph C. Kimball, William W. Keller, Malcolm E. Barney and Kenneth D. Hopkins elected councilmen from their respective wards.

The oath of office was administered to Mayor Smith and the Council by Robert V. Johnson, Esq.

Mayor Smith then assumed the duties of his office and proceeded to deliver his inaugural address as follows:

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

Members of the Council:

At this time I deem it fitting and proper that we should take a few moments to pay tribute to two respected citizens and members of our official family who have been taken from us by death during the past year. I refer to the late John S. Gilman and the late Dr. J. Grant Quimby.

John Gilman came to Laconia from Lisbon, New Hampshire, in 1917, to accept the position of superintendent of our public schools. During the 23 years that Mr. Gilman was a citizen of Laconia he fulfilled his duties with credit, not only to himself but to Laconia and the entire state. Under his supervision the schools of our city have been developed until today they stand second to none in the state. His untimely passing is mourned by all who had the privilege and pleasure of knowing him.

Dr. J. Grant Quimby received his degree of Doctor of Medicine at Bowdoin College in 1888. Immediately upon his graduation he came to Lakeport to enter upon his professional career. However, he was not content with faithful and skillful service to his community as a general practitioner, but devoted much of his time to civic affairs and he had filled most of the municipal offices of our city except that of mayor. In more recent years he served Laconia as an assessor and at the time of his death he was a member of our local Board of Health. He also served his state as a Representative and as a Senator, serving as a member on the important Appropriation Committee of the House and on the Finance Committee of the Senate. He lived to see Laconia grow from a small town to a thriving, beautiful city. Few men gave more of their time and energy to civic affairs than Dr. Quimby.

Therefore, let us all rise and bow our heads briefly in memory of these two men.

1939 BANNER FINANCIAL YEAR

Last year in my inaugural address I outlined briefly the history of Laconia since it was incorporated in 1893. I pointed out many of the reasons for the increase cost of government and made certain recommendations that I believed would be of material benefit to our citizens and our city. Many of these recommendations have been approved by the Council; others are in the process of development. A careful study of the 1940 City Report tells us that the year 1939 was very successful from a financial point of view.

After a long and continued study of the proposed 1939 budget, the appropriations were made for the several departments, but due to the high County Tax, notwithstanding the fact that the State Tax had been eliminated and our city budget pared to a minimum, our tax rate was increased from \$39.50 in 1938 to \$41.30 in 1939. Nevertheless, by careful planning and careful spending during the past year, we have reduced our serial debt from \$373,750 to \$333,750. Notes issued in anticipation of taxes were reduced from \$75,000 in 1938 to \$50,000 in 1939—or a reduction of \$25,000—and the cash balance on hand from our budget savings last year was \$24,151.37, making a net saving to the city during the fiscal year of \$89,151.37.

FIRST BONDS RETIRED

Our City Auditor informs us that the net serial debt for the City of Laconia is \$333,750 and is the lowest it has ever been since 1922. It is also of interest to know that during this year the last of the payments of the first bonds

ever issued by the City of Laconia will come due and will be paid. These first bonds were issued during the administration of ex-Governor Charles A. Busiel who was our first Mayor and whose picture hangs on the wall at your right.

Our Treasurer informs us that the County Tax for 1940 will be \$81,318.02 or less than one-half of last year's County Tax. This will reflect approximately a reduction of \$5.82 in our tax rate this year. Therefore, if we are able to hold the 1940 city budget to our last year's figures, Laconia should have a tax rate of \$35.00 or less per thousand.

I have stated that the City of Laconia was able to make this fine record because of much study and careful planning on the part of the Mayor and Council, but I want you to know that no amount of planning or study on the part of your Council could have brought the savings as previously reported without the wholehearted and genuine cooperation of every division in our city government.

On page 134 of our City Report you will find a tax chart for the year 1939 as compiled by Councilman Ralph C. Kimball. At this time I want to thank Councilman Kimball for the many hours that he has spent in working out this tax chart. We believe it to be very valuable and should be very enlightening to those of our citizens who wish to make a study of the expenditure of the tax payer's dollar.

A year ago I also stated that: "In order to levy a fair tax we must first have a just valuation of our taxable property," and I recommended "that a long term program of revaluation of all taxable property in Laconia be adopted by the Board of Assessors."

RECOMMENDS CHARTING OF CITY

In checking further on our tax problem, I find that the City of Laconia has no data in the form of charts or

maps, giving definite information as to the location of property in the different wards of our city and that our assessors are obliged to depend on their previous year's records with their personal knowledge of the transfers of different pieces of property or any new real property that may come into existence during the year. I find that other cities have charts, maps and data that are very valuable to their assessors and I would recommend that a committee from the Council be appointed to investigate the feasibility of procuring such drawings as referred to above and such other data which will enable the Board of Assessors to perform their duties more efficiently. I believe that such information would be valuable and would eventually bring about a more equitable valuation of all of our real property and return good dividends to our city.

COLLECTIONS HIGH

I also stated that one other department of our city government directly involved with our tax problem was the Tax Collector's office, and I am pleased to report to you that during the year 1939 the total amount of taxes collected by the Tax Collector was \$629,742.87 which is the largest amount of taxes collected during any one year in the city's history. The total amount of tax sales unredeemed February 15, 1939 was \$42,185.53. The balance of unredeemed taxes to date is \$22,231.45. The amount of uncollected taxes due the City of Laconia amount to only \$83,501.44.

This is indeed a fine record for our Tax Collector's Office and this is one of the reasons why the year 1939 has been such a good financial year for the City of Laconia.

RELIEF

The office of Relief has been ably administered by our Overseer of the Poor, A. C. S. Randlett assisted by Mrs.

Mildred Bucklin as investigator, and I am pleased to report to you that payments in this department was \$21,-039.55 less than the previous year, notwithstanding the fact that the state contributed \$3,949.89 toward direct relief in 1938 and nothing in 1939. The continued drop in our relief load is a healthy indication that our citizens are finding more and more gainful labor. Let us hope that this condition continues throughout the year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year, two new pieces of apparatus purchased in 1938 were added to our Fire Department equipment and it is my opinion that our Fire Department is well equipped to handle any fire hazards that might visit us for sometime to come, regardless of the fact that the Laconia pumper was purchased many years ago.

On December 24, last, a very serious fire broke out at The Weirs and before it was brought under control practically the entire water front, from the Irwin property south, had been destroyed. Before the embers had cooled, interested citizens were in conference discussing ways and means whereby this water front could be restored. Your Mayor immediately called a meeting of all interested citizens to select a permanent committee to make an investigation and determine, if possible, just what could be done to rehabilitate this section of our city. Your Mayor was made chairman and was authorized to appoint his own committee. This was done and several meetings have been held. One conference has been held with His Excellency, Governor Francis P. Murphy, and his Executive Council with the result that the state has pledged its support insofar as state laws will permit. Further conferences will be held in the near future.

Due to the fact that our State Legislature does not meet again until 1941, it may be necessary for the City of Laconia

to acquire the lake front at The Weirs from the present owners with the understanding that the same be turned over to the State of New Hampshire to be added to the Endicott Rock property, which they already own, for development.

I recommend to the Council that the City of Laconia lend its full cooperation in the project to rehabilitate the so-called Weirs Water Front.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

This past fall our Police Chief, George N. Hubbard, asked the Council to provide a suitable room to be used as a playroom for juveniles that were walking our streets for want of something to do. After some investigation the only room available where supervision could be had without extra expense to the city seemed to be the Police Court room just above us. After due consideration and with the consent of the court, this room was made available. The room has been equipped by the Police Department and by public subscription.

We are informed that from 75 to 100 individual boys ranging from the ages of six to 18 visit and use this playroom daily. We have watched this experiment with a great deal of interest and we are satisfied that such a project is needed for Laconia, and if it is continued we feel that it will have a healthy influence on our younger boys who use the room. Chief Hubbard and his force are to be congratulated for their progressive action in promoting this project, and we would recommend that as soon as possible a more permanent and better equipped home be provided for this activity.

CITY ELECTIONS

I am in a position today to call your attention to a matter that would have been more or less embarrassing for me

to discuss with you a year ago. That is, the changing of our City Charter to provide for biannual instead of annual city elections. Reviewing the past history of our city, it is very evident that voters would welcome such a change, and I am sure that citizens who hold public office would welcome the change as well, and I would recommend that the Council together with our City Solicitor check on the advisability of such a change and that it be thoroughly discussed at some future meeting.

CITY HALL

I hardly believe it is necessary for me to call your attention to the fact that Laconia has long since outgrown the accommodations provided for it by our present City Hall.

You are well aware to the fact that our Board of Assessors have no room in which they can carry on their business other than the Council Room, and this also applies to the Board of Supervisors. The Police Court room has been made use of for a purpose other than what it was intended. The vault space is already overcrowded. The Milk Inspector of our City Board of Health has his laboratory tucked away in the corner of our basement. Our Superintendent of Schools has been obliged to have his office at the High School, which I am informed is not for the best interests of our school system. Our Tax Collector has a very small office in front of this building which is entirely overcrowded. Our City Clerk has not sufficient room to economically and efficiently carry on the work of that office.

Our Overseer of the poor has a very small room just out of the hall. Our jail, as you know, has been condemned on several occasions during the past four or five years and our Council Chamber is being used for all kinds of meetings and office room as above stated.

Laconia is one of the fastest growing cities in New England. Its public buildings with the exception of City

Hall are such that all of us feel proud of them. The location of City Hall is ideal, but the building itself is not only inadequate to properly house the City Departments, but it is not in keeping with the public buildings that surround Veterans Square. It would seem to me that now is the opportune time to make some decision as to the advisability of erecting a new City Hall in Laconia, and with this thought in mind I recommend that the Council take immediate steps to ascertain if Federal funds are still available and are still obtainable to apply on a project of this kind, and I would ask the Chamber of Commerce, the Laconia Taxpayers' Association and all interested citizens to thoroughly investigate this proposal that they may discuss with us at some future date the advisability or non-advisability of starting such a project.

I will not take the time today to further discuss the work in each department of our city government. All have done excellent work and all but one have lived well within their budget.

NEW SUPERINTENDENT

The Board of Education, as we all know, has a task to perform and a decision to make that will require much time and thought, but we feel confident that their decision will be made only after careful consideration and proper investigation is made of each and every application that they have before them and I can assure them that their Mayor and Council are ready and willing to lend them any and all assistance that they have at their command.

To the member of the Council that has just retired from office, I want to say that during the three years that you have served with us we have recognized the valuable service that you have rendered your city and while, no doubt, your private and personal business influenced you in making

your decision to retire from public office we feel that your retirement is a distinct loss to our city government.

To the new member of our official family let us extend to you an official welcome at this time and we would remind that the ward you represent has the third largest assessed valuation of all wards in our city. Your responsibilities as a Councilman will be many, but I can assure you that regardless of the fact that you represent the minority party in the Council you will receive full cooperation at all times from the executive branch of our city government.

To the other five members of the Council who have worked with me for the past year, I need not thank you for the cooperation that you have given me at all times. The year's record speaks for itself.

Let us start the year 1940 with the same spirit of helpfulness and cooperation. Let us all strive to make this 1940 one of the best years that Laconia has ever known.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge, and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 p.m., at the City Clerk's Office.

Section 1. The Police Commission shall have the power to prescribe regulations from time to time designating the kinds, types and dimensions of fireworks which may be sold, exposed for sale or discharged; the kinds and types of devices for the discharge of fireworks which may be sold or exposed for sale; the days and hours of each day during which fireworks and devices for the discharge of fireworks may be sold or exposed for sale; the days and hours of each day during which fireworks may be discharged; the con-

struction and location of the buildings and the nature of the places of business where fireworks may be sold or exposed for sale; and the places where fireworks may be discharged.

Section 2. No person shall sell or offer for sale fireworks unless he shall have obtained a signed permit from the Chief of Police. All permits shall expire on December 31 following the date of their issuance. The fee for each permit shall be one dollar, which shall be for the use of the City. All permits shall be subject to the regulations prescribed by and amended from time to time by the Police Commission.

Section 3. Fireworks are defined for the purpose of this ordinance as including rockets, squibs, crackers or any other preparation of gunpowder or other explosives designed or discharged to cause a noise or attract the eye through explosion.

Section 4. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance or any regulation of the police commission pursuant hereto shall be fined not more than twenty dollars for each offence, and the violation thereof on each and any day shall constitute a separate offence.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made this eighteenth day of June, 1940, by and between the *BOSTON AND MAINE RAILROAD*, a corporation duly established under the laws of the State of New Hampshire, hereinafter called the "*RAILROAD*", and the *CITY OF LACONIA*, a municipal corporation duly established in the County of Belknap and State of New Hampshire, hereinafter called the "*CITY*",

WITNESSETH:

1. The *RAILROAD* agrees to convey to the *CITY* three certain pieces or parcels of land at the Weirs in said Laconia, bounded and described as follows:

Parcel No. 1. Beginning on Lakeside Avenue at a point fifty and fifty-five hundredths (50.55) feet Southwesterly from and at right angles to the center line of the location of the Boston and Main Railroad at Station 1778 +55.8 thence running Northwesterly by Lakeside Avenue three hundred twenty-seven and one tenth (327.1) feet to land formerly of A. Doe; thence turning and running North $70^{\circ}53'$ East partly by said land formerly of Doe and partly by other land or location of the Boston and Maine Railroad forty-one (41) feet; thence turning and running South $16^{\circ}44'$ East still by said land or location three hundred twenty-nine and one tenth (329.1) feet to a point fifteen and seventy-five hundredths (15.75) feet Southwesterly from and measured at right angles to said center line of location at Station 1778+55.8; thence turning and running South 74° West still by said Railroad land or location thirty-four and eight tenths (34.8) feet to the point of beginning, be all of said measurements more or less; said parcel containing about twelve thousand, four hundred thirty (12,430) square feet, and being shown as Parcel No. 1 on the plan hereinafter referred to.

Parcel No. 2. Beginning on said Lakeside Avenue at a point sixteen (16) feet Southeasterly from the Southwesterly corner of said Parcel No. 1 at other land or location of the Boston and Maine Railroad, thence running by said Railroad land or location North 74° East twenty-three (23) feet, South 16° East three hundred seventy-one and eight tenths (371.8) feet and South $11^{\circ} 39' 40''$ East one hundred forty-five (145) feet to Lakeside Avenue; thence turning and running Northwesterly by said Avenue five hundred seventeen (517) feet to the point of beginning, be all of said measurements more or less; said parcel containing about seven thousand, four hundred forty (7,440) square feet, and being shown as Parcel No. 2 on the plan hereinafter referred to.

Parcel No. 3. Beginning on Simpson Avenue at land formerly of A. G. Macomber at a point forty-two (42) feet Northeasterly from the center line of the location of said Railroad, thence running South $18^{\circ} 41'$ East by said land sixty (60) feet to land now or formerly of J. R. Irwin; thence turning and running by said land now or formerly of Irwin South $17^{\circ} 7'$ East twenty-two (22) feet and South $49^{\circ} 7'$ East thirty-four (34) feet; thence turning and running Southeasterly still by same land on a curve to the right having a radius of three thousand, eight hundred seventy-nine and eighty-three hundredths (3,879.83) feet about one hundred forty (140) feet to Lake Winnepesaukee; thence turning and running Southerly by said Lake about one thousand, two hundred fifty (1,250) feet to land of the City of Laconia; thence turning and running South $3^{\circ} 58'$ East by said last named land about ninety-eight (98) feet to other land or location of said Railroad; thence turning and running by said Railroad land or location North $16^{\circ} 10' 10''$ West, one thousand, four hundred thirty-nine (1,439) feet and North $18^{\circ} 41'$ West, fifty-nine and three tenths (59.3) feet to said Simpson Avenue; thence turning

and running North 70° 53' East by said Avenue twelve (12) feet to the point of beginning, be all of said measurements more or less; said parcel containing about twenty-seven thousand (27,000) square feet, and being shown as Parcel No. 3 on a plan marked "Land in Laconia, N. H. Boston and Maine Railroad To City of Laconia. C. S. Robinson Asst. Chief Eng'r. June, 1940", a copy of which is hereto attached.

Also the right to pass and repass, in common with others entitled there to, over and across other land or location of said Railroad between Lakeside Avenue and said Parcel No. 3 hereinabove described by a private crossing at grade sixteen (16) feet wide located between said Parcels No. 1 and No. 2.

Being portions of the land described in deeds from James Gordon to Boston, Concord & Montreal Railroad dated June 22, 1848, recorded with Belknap County Deeds, Book 18, Page 223, from Lucy D. Porterfield to Boston, Concord & Montreal Railroad dated July 9, 1880, recorded with said deeds, Book 67, Page 267, from Jonathan Hay, et al. to said last named Railroad dated July 9, 1880, recorded with said deeds, Book 67, Page 249, and from Winnipiseogee Lake Cotton and Woolen Manufacturing Company to Concord and Montreal Railroad dated January 7, 1902, recorded with said deeds, Book 107, Page 569.

2. The *RAILROAD* agrees to grant to the *CITY* the right to enter upon its remaining land from time to time for the purpose of erecting and thereafter maintaining any structures of the *CITY* erected on any portion of the granted premises.

3. Said premises are to be conveyed by a Quitclaim deed from the *RAILROAD* to the *CITY* to be delivered within sixty (60) days after the passage of the necessary

votes by the Board of Directors of the *RAILROAD*, subject to the reservations, easements and conditions set forth in the four deeds hereinabove referred to so far as the same are now in force and applicable, and subject also to the provisions of deeds from the *RAILROAD* to Sidney F. Baker dated June 7, 1932, recorded with said deeds, Book 204, Page 89, and to James R. Irwin dated July 14, 1923, recorded with said Deeds, Book 168, Page 155, and to all attachments of record, and to any other incumbrances not on record, but the *RAILROAD* hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless the *CITY* from any executions that may be issued under said attachments.

4. The *CITY* agrees in consideration of the conveyance of said land and rights hereinabove described, to erect on the third parcel of land hereinabove described a building containing the following facilities: Office space measuring approximately nine (9) feet by nineteen (19), baggage and express storage space measuring approximately nineteen (19) feet by twenty-two (22) feet, sufficient waiting room space during the summer season to seat forty (40) persons, sufficient waiting room space during the winter season to seat ten (10) persons, and toilet facilities for eight (8) persons during the summer season only, but the income therefrom, if any, shall be collected by and for the benefit of the *CITY*. The *RAILROAD* shall have the right to use said station facilities so long as necessary for its railroad service, provided, however, that the waiting room and its toilet facilities at all times shall be available to the general public, that all the said station facilities may be included in a building housing additional conveniences for the general public and that the expense of making repairs to the space set apart for Railroad office, baggage and express purposes, and the furnishing of light, heat and janitor service therefor shall be borne solely by the *RAILROAD*.

5. The *CITY* shall have the right to erect, maintain and replace on the remaining land of the *RAILROAD* a platform adjacent to the main track of the *RAILROAD* extending Northerly three hundred seventy (370) feet from the center of said crossing and twenty (20) feet in width and extending Southerly two hundred eighty-five (285) feet from the center of said crossing and about twelve (12) feet in width, and the *CITY* agrees that it will construct and thereafter maintain, so long as shall be necessary for railroad service, a platform in the location and of the dimensions above described. Such platform shall be for the use, pleasure and convenience of the general public, the *RAILROAD* and *RAILROAD* patrons, and shall be constructed and maintained to the satisfaction of the chief engineering officer of the *RAILROAD*, and of the City Engineer.

6. The *CITY* also agrees in its discretion and at its own expense to move the existing fence from its present location Westerly or Southwesterly of the tracks of the *RAILROAD* to a location substantially along the Easterly or Northeasterly line of said Parcel No. 2 and will erect and thereafter maintain at its own expense a substantial barrier at least one (1) foot above the street level along the Northeasterly side of the first parcel of land hereinabove described to prevent vehicles from encroaching on the remaining adjacent land of the *RAILROAD*.

7. The *CITY* further agrees that in case of fire destroying or damaging the structure containing the above mentioned station facilities it will reconstruct similar facilities within a reasonable time unless such fire results from the negligence of the *RAILROAD*.

8. It is mutually agreed that the *RAILROAD* shall have the right to maintain on the platform hereinabove re-

ferred to a "safety stripe" and to install and maintain in the space provided for station facilities its communication lines, which however, shall be placed underground if the *CITY* so requires, and it is further mutually agreed that the poles and wires of the Western Union Telegraph Company and the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company may remain on said parcels of land until such time as the *CITY* shall request their removal, whereupon the same shall be removed within six (6) months after the receipt of written notice.

9. It is expressly stipulated that the *CITY* does not hereby obligate itself to the provision of any station facilities other than or more extensive than herein provided and does not assume the obligations and duties of the *RAILROAD* under any present or future laws and regulations relating to the *RAILROAD*, its successors and assigns, railroads in general, railroad facilities and stations. Nor does the *CITY* assume any responsibility or legal liability to the *RAILROAD* or to any other persons using any part of the premises or property herein mentioned on account of tort claims in connection therewith, it being intended that the facilities herein provided for, shall be for municipal purposes and for the benefit, pleasure and convenience of the general public, subject to the extent of their use by the *RAILROAD* and its patrons as herein provided.

Since the submission of my last annual report, there have been some very trying times for the school board, and especially for its chairman. More responsibility was placed upon the board by unforeseen events than it has had in recent years. Soon after the publication of our annual report a year ago, we were shocked by the sudden and tragic death of our superintendent, John S. Gilman. Few people in Laconia realize what an exceptional man he was, and how valuable his services really were. He knew so much about the details of our school system that he was truly invaluable to the board. Those of us who knew him intimately enjoyed working with him in the constant improvement of our schools.

With stunning suddenness the board found itself in complete control and at a hastily called meeting it was decided to carry on for a while, at least, without a superintendent in order to give ample time to choose a worthy and capable successor. This meant extra work for every member of the board. For several months there was hardly a day that went by when I was not personally called upon in one way or another to give my time and advice. I should like to take this opportunity to thank Miss Nell L. Doane for the assistance she gave us in such a difficult time. Without her knowledge and ability we would have been unable to do many things.

While things were thus in a state of extreme upheaval, Verne M. Whitman, headmaster of the high school for many years, was also stricken. Beloved by the many students who knew him in years past, he had been ill for several years, and was able to carry on only under severe hardship and

physical strain. Those who knew him only during the last year or two never had the privilege of knowing the real man. Nevertheless, his place was difficult to fill. A. Jerome Goodwin, who had been with us but a year, was immediately given complete authority over the high school.

During the next few months, with the help of the teachers and the cooperation of the students we managed to carry on with a degree of success. We had between forty and fifty applicants for the position of superintendent, which meant voluminous correspondence and interviews. The school budget for the coming year had to be prepared, teachers elected, plans for graduation made, and a thousand details attended to.

Finally Mr. Leonard Morrison of Keene Teacher's College was appointed acting superintendent, and Dr. Clark W. McDermith, of Berlin, New Hampshire was then elected superintendent, to take office in August. A. Jerome Goodwin was appointed headmaster. It would be hard to conceive of any better choice being made in respect to any of these positions. Mr. Morrison stepped right in the breach and took over all responsibility, but at the same time was most amenable to suggestion. We feel that we have chosen as successors to Mr. Gilman and Mr. Whitman two men who will work well together and with the board; who will grow into the community; who will use their power, ability and education to further improve our school system.

One significant change has been made in the removal of the superintendent's office to the Academy Street School. Since the high school building was erected, the superintendent and headmaster have shared offices. While this is not necessarily bad, it does lead to many problems and it was felt that this was the propitious time for a change, which is working out very satisfactorily to date. The responsibility for running the high school is now centered in the headmaster.

There have been several new teachers added during the year to fill vacancies caused by resignation, and also as additional teachers to relieve congestion in some departments. A complete reorganization of the music department was carried out and Mr. Wendell L. Withington elected supervisor of music. The board feels that music is important and looks to Mr. Withington to maintain the highest standards in this department.

Numerous requests come to the school board for use of our buildings for various purposes. While the board favors extensive use of the buildings for educational, recreational, and charitable purposes at all times, it has become necessary to point out that the buildings are not to be hired for private, partisan or exclusive use. Sometimes it is difficult to draw the line between what is permissible and what should be prohibited, but the high school, at least, is almost in constant use now.

The school board has continued to cooperate with the federal government in carrying on nursery schools, and this year has granted use of the Practical Arts Building for defense classes in pattern making and sheet metal work.

All in all the year has been marked by reverses, but from our difficulties we have all learned much. Your school board has gained invaluable experience which will be very helpful. We have capable personnel and see no reason why our schools should not continue to maintain and improve their high standards.

We wish to express our gratitude to the members of the City Council, to the citizens, to the teachers, and to the students for their cooperation and assistance during this exceptionally troublesome year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

I find myself in the peculiar position of attempting to write an annual report of a school year (1939-1940) with which I was not associated. The fact that the annual report has to be prepared seven months after the close of the year which it covers makes it somewhat out-of-date. Also the fact that the report is written at the midpoint of the current year makes it difficult and perhaps unnecessary to confine all statements to the school year for which the report is prepared. Consequently, the reader will find therein some statements and statistics covering the first half of the current school year, as well as the year ending June 30, 1940.

At this point I must express my recognition of the long period of devoted and effective service which the late John S. Gilman, my predecessor, gave to the schools and to the city of Laconia. I take up where Mr. Gilman left off with a deep sense of responsibility for the educational and general welfare of the children and young people of Laconia and with a realization of our place in the state and national educational programs.

PERSONNEL

Pupils

In keeping with local, state, and national trends during the past few years, the elementary school enrolment as of June, 1940, (880) was slightly less than the preceding year. The January, 1941, enrolment is somewhat lower than the figure of June, 1940. However, we still have some class-

rooms with more pupils than a teacher can effectively handle, particularly where she is working with two grades. Currently, the largest enrolment in one class room is 48 pupils in a 5th grade and the smallest enrolment is a 1st grade class of 20 pupils. A more even distribution of the teaching load and much better grouping of pupils for instructional purposes could be affected if there were fewer and larger attendance areas.

Special opportunities were provided 18 pupils who have been retarded in school because of illness, physical handicap, loss of school time or other reasons, in Miss Hammond's room in Batchelder Street school. During the current year these opportunities are being enriched and certain retarded pupils from schools as far distant as Lakeport are enrolled in the class and are being benefited by this type of curriculum.

The enrolment in the supper six grades was approximately the same in June, 1940, (1110) as in the preceding year. The current enrolment of 1092 is less than in June by approximately 20 pupils due perhaps in part to more work opportunities. However, we may expect the present crowded condition in the high school to continue for several years, because in general a higher percent of pupils of high school age are entering high school and more are staying in school longer than in previous years.

Instructional staff

The total instructional staff in June, 1940, numbered 74 teachers distributed as follows: 4 teachers of special subjects, 6 federal-local nursery school teachers, 11 teachers of adult evening classes drawn from the high school faculty, 25 teachers of the elementary grades, and 38 high school teachers. This faculty ranges in terms of service in Laconia from 1 to 35 years and in professional training from no post high school work to 5 years of college training. It is

considered desirable to have somewhat near an equal number of men and women on the high school faculty and at least a few men on the elementary school staff. At present the division of the high school faculty between 17 men and 22 women is desirable, but there are no men teachers except the music supervisor with whom the elementary school pupils come in contact.

Although in recent years a salary schedule for teachers was adopted by the School Board, the school budget has not been adequate to put it into operation. At present there are some glaring inequalities in local salaries. Considerable study should be devoted to salary scheduling and the related problems of sick leave, professional growth in service, and retirement.

The janitorial staff totals six men and one woman who have records of service in Laconia of from 1 to 28 years. Three full-time janitors are assigned to the high school, while the remaining 4 have the care of the 6 elementary school buildings. They are employed for 11 months of the year on a no-contract basis. In general their service to the pupils, teachers, and the public is commendable.

SCHOOL PLANTS

Six buildings house the elementary and federal-local nursery schools. The two high school buildings house the upper 6 grades (junior and senior high school), evening school, and the vocational school for defense workers instituted during the current year. In general the buildings are clean and in a reasonably good state of repair. Due to the age and general condition of some of the grade school buildings the cost of operation and maintenance of these plants is rather high. The high school buildings, although overcrowded, are in good condition and are better adapted to the high school curriculum than is the case in the elementary schools. The prac-

tical arts buildings has some of the best equipped shops of the high schools of the state and currently some additions are being made to this equipment. One shop room not now in use should be equipped for woodworking by next year. The hard wood floors of the large high school building should be cleaned of floor oil, sealed, and maintained with wax.

Academy Street school is being completely rewired by the high school electric shop pupils and will be furnished with next fixtures that are greatly needed. One class room not needed for classes was remodeled during the current year to house the superintendent's office and elementary school supplies. The foundry room of the practical arts building which had never been adequately equipped or used is now being developed by the Emergency Defense classes into a most unusual high school foundry.

Although the high school has an attractive campus, fairly adequate gymnasium facilities, and a good athletic field, the elementary schools have almost no suitable playgrounds, no indoor recreational facilities and meager outdoor and indoor play equipment. Adequate and safe play facilities and opportunities should be provided the children at the period of their growth when wholesome play means so much to their normal development.

CURRICULUM

The school curriculum encompasses everything that pupils do in their relations with the school. Due in part to limited plant facilities the curriculum of the elementary schools is largely confined to classroom activities closely related to the course of studies recommended by the State Board. During the past few years considerable emphasis in the primary grades has been placed on a basal reading program designed to improve the quality of reading throughout the city. It is likely that this emphasis on good reading will

be extended to the upper elementary grades in the immediate future and later to the high school. The current year's city-wide adoption of manuscript writing in the first grade will be extended to the second grade next year.

The elementary school art program has been expanding in scope and growing in influence through the combined efforts and talents of teachers and the art supervisor. This and the elementary school music program which is currently being developed through the close co-operation of teachers and the supervisor of music provide experiences and appreciations which are assential to a well-rounded school curriculum.

The high school curriculum with its college preparatory, commercial, applied arts, and general programs, and its numerous and varied extra-curricula activities of clubs, athletics, dramatics, music, and the like provides rather well for the needs and interests of its students. Some of the opportunities for boys in vocational courses are unusual and excellent. More room is needed to accommodate the large number of boys and girls who should be enroled in the home and industrial arts program.

Although the high school library has been well-administered by a part-time librarian with student aid and its volumes have gradually been increased, it is quite inadequate for a student body of over a thousand pupils and a faculty of forty teachers. To give the library its proper place in the high school curriculum it should have the full-time services of a competent librarian, all rather than a part of the room in which it is now housed, reading room furniture, and many additional carefully selected volumes of books and other printed matter, all of which should be made easily accessible and attractive to pupils and teachers.

The development of greater participation in and responsibility for student activity on the part of pupils them-

selves offers fine opportunities for pupil growth and for the development of a curriculum that will better meet the interests of modern youth.

SUPPORT

Although American public education is definitely a function of state government, historically state governments have delegated a large measure of the control and support of education to local school districts. This practice has produced a unique, democratic system of public education, but it has at the same time imposed the responsibility of financing schools upon many local districts which do not have sufficient wealth to support a satisfactory program of education.

Recognizing the marked inequalities in educational opportunities which this practice has created, most states have in varying degrees assisted with the important problem of support by collecting revenue for education from wealth wherever it may be in the state and redistributing it among local districts that are unable to support an acceptable program of education. New Hampshire has taken a short step in the creation of an equalization fund, but Laconia participates in the equalization program only as a contributor to the small fund which properly is used to help support the very poor rural and village schools of the state.

The federal government provided a measure of support to public schools, particularly in the area of vocational education and in recent years in the development of school sites and buildings. Laconia is at present receiving almost no federal aid and no state aid at all, so practically the entire burden of school support must be borne by the taxable wealth of the local district.

For the school year ending June 30, 1940, the city appropriated \$156,461.64 for the current operation of its

schools, for building debt reduction and debt service and for the state equalization fund. This appropriation was supplemented by receipts from dog licenses, tuition, and miscellaneous sources in the amount of \$10,417.35, making a total of \$166,958.99. After the \$24,971.03 spent on building indebtedness and debt service and state equalization was taken out the amount of \$141,987.96 remained to finance the city's schools for one year. This amount has proved adequate in recent years to support the present school program and to maintain the schools plants in their present state of repair, but it does not provide a sufficient margin for the constant improvement of the curriculum and plant that is necessary in keeping abreast of modern education and modern living.

HEALTH SERVICE AND ATTENDANCE

The services of a competent school nurse are provided for eleven months of the year. She co-operates with the physicians of the city, parents, teachers, and other local and state officers and agencies in the improvement of the general health of all public and parochial children. The school health program is broad and entails many and varied specific services, such as the pre-school check-up on the health of children entering school for the first time, a limited inspection of children in school, co-operation with local service clubs, relief officers, and other persons interested in the general welfare of children. These facts are indicative of the fine relationship which exists between the school health program and the homes and organizations of the city. Many of the services of the school nurse are financed in whole or in part by local individuals or groups.

In November of the current year city-wide audiometer tests were administered and follow-up treatment was recommended in cases of defective hearing. The school nurse has been instrumental in the establishment of a new mental

hygiene clinic which provides the services of child guidance experts once each month.

The school health program has a very definite bearing on the general health of school children, school attendance, and school success. A good health program is indispensable to a city school system.

The attendance service rendered to public and parochial schools by a part-time attendance officer in co-operation with the school nurse, teachers, and welfare agencies has its influence on regular attendance and the success of the school program. Pupils who have the fine record of not being tardy or absent throughout the school year of 1939-40 are listed below.

TRANSPORTATION

The school board is obliged by state law to provide free transportation for all pupils in attendance below the ninth grade "who live more than 2 miles from the school to which they are assigned"; also to pupils under the age of fourteen in grades above the eighth if they live 2 miles or more from their assigned schools.

Transportation of pupils entitled to this service required the operation of two privately operated bus routes costing \$1987.90 for the year. Currently a third short bus route is being operated in a portion of the district not reached by the two established routes.

Standards for school bus equipment and operation developed by the State Board of Education and the Motor Vehicle Department in the interest of safe transportation of school children have been appreciably raised during the course of the year.

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Federal-Local Nursery Schools

The school board has continued its co-operation with the federal government in the operation of its three nursery schools for children between the ages of 2 and 5 of families certified by the overseer of the poor. The administration of these schools is a function of the superintendent. Close supervision of their work is shared with a state supervisor of federal-local nursery schools and their support is divided between the local school district and the federal government. At present the local district provides all the funds needed in their operation except the salaries of the 11 staff members, the former representing approximately 21% of the total cost. Nine other cities of the state are operating one or more or more nursery schools on a similar basis.

The nursery school is a worthwhile educational and social project, but it is unfortunate that its opportunities are limited to children of welfare families. Also, the breach of a year between nursery school and the beginning of elementary school is undesirable from the standpoint of continuous educational and social development of a child.

Evening Classes

Adult education through evening classes running for a period of approximately 20 weeks from October to March

is a regular feature of the total school program. The total enrolment for the year of 196 adults represents a substantial decrease in enrolment figures from those of several years ago when there were large numbers enrolled in English and citizenship classes. During this year's adult evening school, instruction was available in English, sewing, cooking, beginning and advanced shorthand, bookkeeping, beginning and advanced typing, shop mathematics, drafting, wood-working, and machine operation. During the current year a popular art metal class has been added to the curriculum.

If employment opportunities within the city continue to increase during the next few years, there will be less need for the type of evening school program that the school has offered.

Vocational Classes for Defense Workers

This phase of the school curriculum was not a part of the school program of the year covered in this report (1939-1940), but it is so unique and important that it deserves at least brief mention.

Through the co-operation of the federal government working through the United States Office of Education, the State Board of Education, the local school board, and a local advisory committee representing local industries, labor and education, a program of training for adults in work essential to national defense was established in July, 1940, in our industrial arts shops. At the outset approximately 60 men from W.P.A. and state unemployment rolls were selected on the basis of their interest, experience, and aptitude and enrolled in the sheet metal, machine operations, and wood pattern-foundry classes. Classes were organized on an 8-hour day 5-day-a-week basis and a thorough training in the fundamentals of each trade constituted the curriculum.

With the aid of these refresher courses and the opening of several new jobs in local industries directly or indirectly

affected by the national defense efforts, a large per cent of the original enrollees have been placed in private industry essential to defense, while new trainees have filled the vacancies in the classes.

The high school shop classes and the defense classes have been synchronized so that both groups of classes operate without conflict. The entire cost of the defense classes is borne by the federal government. This defense program is Laconia's first important contribution to the present national defense program. These defense classes may be expected to continue through many months.

COMMUNITY-SCHOOL RELATIONS

A successful progressive school system requires far-sighted professional leadership, a competent and alert professional staff, and adequate financial support, but it also needs the understanding, co-operation, and moral support of the people it is attempting to serve. It is one of the functions of the staff and the pupils to interpret the policies and the program of the school to the parents and citizens of the city. At the same time, it is a responsibility of these same parents and citizens to be concerned about what the school is doing for the young people of the community.

One of the most common organizations working for community-school understanding and co-operation is the Parent-Teacher Association. During the year the high school Parent-Teacher Association had a series of four meetings which brought together a small per cent of the faculty and the parents. The Gilford Avenue school had a Parent-Teacher organization that was active throughout the year.

In the current year the high school Parent-Teacher Association has planned a series of 5 meetings and to date has enjoyed somewhat greater interest. Home-School organ-

izations have been established in the 2 Lakeport schools and monthly meetings have been held alternately in the 2 schools. It is possible that the organizations might become more stable and active if they were to affiliate themselves with the state and national organizations of parents and teachers. Such an organization, centered in each of the schools of the city, working together through a co-ordinating committee offers possibilities for a fine program of community-school relations.

Many aspects of the Laconia school system are excellent, due to the untiring efforts and sincere devotion of those persons most closely associated with its development through the years. But to rest upon the accomplishments of past years is to lose ground. The aim and the driving purpose of the pupils, teachers, school board, parents, and citizens of Laconia must be better schools, better educational opportunities for all the children and youth of the city.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

The following is the report of the Board of Health for the past year :

The work has proceeded on the same lines as previous years with the average number of complaints made and investigated. As in past years the complaints were found to be justified in about one-third of the number received. Those which were found justifiable were adjusted, in two cases it being necessary to call on the city solicitor for his aid in securing the necessary adjustments.

There was an increase in the number of Wassermans taken the past year over previous years and also in the number of venereal cases treated.

Quarantinable cases were at a minimum for a three year period. One such case required hospitalization and special nursing care at the hospital which it became the duty of the Board of Health to furnish and for which we were financially responsible.

MILK INSPECTOR

The milk inspection department carried on as usual in 1940. The work was carried on with the fullest possible cooperation with the State Board of Health.

There was an increase in the consumption of pasteurized milk over raw milk in the last year. The total consumption of milk and milk products remained about the same in 1940.

Very few complaints of unsatisfactory milk or milk products were brought to the inspector's attention during 1940.

There was a drop of nine in licensed stores selling milk in Laconia. The number of producer-dealers dropped from sixty-three to fifty-nine. The number of dealers remained the same and the tendency seems to be towards fewer small producer-dealers.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council
of the City of Laconia:*

I herewith submit my report as Fire Chief for the year ending February 15, 1941.

During the past year, the Fire Department responded to thirty box alarms and two hundred forty-seven telephoned reports of fires. There was one false alarm and one out of town call. All of the fires were covered by insurance. The total fire loss insurance paid during the year 1940 was \$29,601.36.

Additions to, and replacements of the equipment of this department during the past few years have contributed greatly to the efficiency, morale and general adequacy of the organization. Our recently increased and modernized facilities should permit of effective control of fires in this community for the next ten years. In my report of last year, I respectfully called your attention to the need for a modern piece of apparatus in our Central Station. This equipment is now in active service and thus far, has contributed greatly to the efficiency of our force.

The personnel of this department are enthusiastic, capable and experienced. Each of our companies has a full authorized quota of members. There are several substitute

firemen rendering invaluable service and it is hoped that at some time in the near future the Mayor and City Council may deem it advisable to approve and authorize a reasonable compensation for their work.

All of our public institutions are thoroughly cooperative in the elimination of fire hazards. Thorough indoctrination of our citizenry in the essentials of fire prevention is our most difficult problem. It is hoped that through continued attention to the education of our public in this matter, we may realize an even further reduction in our fire loss.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, N. H.
February 15, 1941

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

The fortieth annual report of the Board of Public Works is hereby submitted, together with the detailed report and certain recommendations made to us by the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

The regular or routine maintenance work has been carried on throughout the year as far as funds would permit, and the authorized betterment or special work completed.

The Department, operating under reduced appropriations, has been unable to produce results desired in some cases but in the circumstances has attempted to do its part and cooperate in your efforts to relieve the tax burden by keeping expenditures down at this time.

Appropriations and Expenditures under the several accounts or subdivisions are shown in detail in the following pages of the financial report and we invite a study of the City Engineer's report appended hereto, which report shows under appropriate headings the nature of the work of this Department performed during the past year and certain valuable suggestions or recommendations or needs and requirements for the year ensuing.

Sections of Union Avenue, Elm Street and Pleasant Street macadam were surface treated with good results, using bituminous material with a coarse sand aggregate and mixing and smoothing with the road hone and we strongly

urge that funds be provided to extend this treatment over other sections which are badly worn and uneven. This method of repair of bituminous surfaces is cheap in cost, greatly improves the riding qualities and postpones the time when the road must be reconstructed.

During the past year no funds were available for rebuilding or extending surface drains. We would renew our suggestions made in previous reports that there are several drains that have become entirely inadequate to handle the water in times of heavy rains with the result that travel is greatly inconvenienced and abutting land owners are seriously affected. This condition should receive early attention and steps be taken to rebuild such existing drains as are known to be inadequate and insufficient and also make a start toward constructing new surface drains in several locations where the need is urgent.

There are certain streets which have been laid out by the Council where draining, grading and surfacing should be done as soon as practical and although a few sidewalks were built last year there is a strong and continual demand for more at various locations in the city.

Town Road Aid funds in the amount of \$4392.14 were expended on Class Five Roads, four-fifths of this sum being furnished by the State.

In the matter of State Aid for the ensuing year the proposition, as now appears, is similar to that of last year. The City offered an option of one of two proposals, viz: to reconstruct a section of Elm Street which is on the State Highway Secondary System or Orange System, so called, the State furnishing \$3518.50 and the City an equal amount; or to accept Town Road Aid for use on Class V Roads the City appropriating \$916.76 and the State furnishing \$3667.05.

Whatever the policy determined upon as to new construction and additions we would urge as a necessity a sufficient and adequate appropriation for routine maintenance, winter expense and the customary all year services rendered by this Department.

BRIDGES

Only minor repairs were needed on several bridges during the year. The Mill Street wooden bridge was given some repair but the time is not far distant when rebuilding will be necessary.

CLEANING STREETS

The appropriation for this work proved sufficient for the past year.

COLLECTION OF REFUSE AND GARBAGE

The contract with Mr. W. G. Hamilton was extended for the year as he had rendered satisfactory service.

The ordinance covering the operations of this service is not lived up to by many people. One especially bad practice is the setting out of material in paper cartons. They are not suitable containers as required by law. They are flimsy, inflammable, fall apart when wet. The ordinance specifies that paper and paper boxes are not to be collected by the scavenger service and when set out with other waste are left by the collector. A great many are left out by the owners and become scattered around the streets and sidewalks.

Suitable metal cans are required and should be furnished in every case.

DRAINS

No funds were available to rebuild or enlarge inadequate drains or build any drain extensions. This matter should be given serious attention, as soon as possible, as there are several streets that are flooded in times of heavy rains, causing damage and inconvenience to abutting owners and the travelling public.

MAINTENANCE OF MACADAM PAVEMENTS

Thirty-five hundred dollars was appropriated to re-surface bituminous macadam streets and was expended on Elm St., Union Ave., Pleasant St., and small areas on other streets.

This amount was not nearly enough to cover the areas badly in need of attention. It is not good economy to neglect these pavements as the cost of repairs is much more than would be the case if prompt repairs were made and I would renew my statement of last year that \$7,000 be appropriated for this work.

SANITARY SEWERS

Sewers were built on Davis Place and Sanborn Street. 403.25 feet of 6 inch sewer was laid on Davis Place, at a cost of \$781.17 and 250 feet of 6 inch sewer was laid on Sanborn Street at a cost of \$348.38. Gillette Street sewer was extended 149 feet, at a cost of \$249.52.

The outfall sewer on Whipple Avenue, running under the Normandin boat house into Lake Winnisquam became rusted out and broken. It was replaced and extended farther into the lake with 8 inch Transite (asbestos) pipe at a cost of \$530.17.

The usual maintenance, repair and cleaning was done to the sewer system as a whole and it is in good condition.

SIDEWALKS

New bituminous sidewalks were built as follows: Cedar St., on north and south sides; Holman St., west side; Adams St., east side; Pine St., at school House; Baldwin St., west side; Mechanic St., from Clinton to Harrison St., including a retaining wall. Total area of new sidewalks was 1,175.33 sq. yds.

A crushed stone sidewalk was built on the south side of Fenton Avenue.

3,296.04 sq. yds. of bituminous sidewalk were repaired and recovered.

NEW STREET CONSTRUCTION

Holman St. was extended northerly a distance of 586.35 feet. Winnisquam Drive was built for a distance of 911.07 feet and Winnicoash Street was extended through to the O'Shea land; Sanborn St. was extended.

STREET OILING

Eight thousand dollars was appropriated for this work but owing to street extensions it was found necessary to expend \$8,208.71. A like amount should be appropriated for 1941.

WINTER EXPENSES

Weather conditions caused an overdraft in this item as much snow had to be removed, and plowed off the roadways and sidewalks. About 2,000 cu. yds. of sand mixed with calcium chloride was needed to overcome the slippery conditions.

It is difficult to plow streets and remove snow from them when congested with motor vehicles, and overnight parking is a great handicap. The Police Department has cooperated with us in this work and has greatly aided us in keeping overnight parking at a minimum.

The problem of obtaining a sufficient supply of screened sand, for covering icy pavements, is a serious one and causes a large proportion of the winter expense.

GENERAL

We were able to exchange one worn out dump truck for a new one and half ton dump truck, which is a help in plowing snow. One other dump truck should be exchanged

this year, as it is badly worn, and the cost of repairs is excessive.

The storage building at Messer St. yard was completed and a concrete floor installed. Repairs were made to other department buildings but more work of this nature is needed.

The appropriation for cutting trees, roadside bushes, grass and weeds was not enough to do what was absolutely needed, and the item was overdrawn to the amount of \$545.39.

The amount of \$3,513.72 was furnished by the State Highway Department and \$878.42 was furnished by the city for improvement of Class V roads. This amount was expended in improving the drainage system of the Daisy Gardner Road, widening, straightening and surfacing the White Oaks Road and the Hilliard Road.

CITY SOLICITOR

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

The past year has seen two progressive steps by the city which have entailed a very considerable amount of legal work for your solicitor beyond the ordinary work of this office. I refer to the new municipal airport now under construction in Gilford and the Weirs municipal building and waterfront development. Both matters involved several advisory opinions on the rights of the city; many conferences, in the one instance with officials of the Boston and Maine Railroad, in the other instance with land owners and federal officials; and the drafting of a considerable number of agreements, contracts and conveyances.

The usual duties of this office have in addition been tended to including advisory opinions both oral and written to most if not all of the city departments, as well as to the Mayor, the Council and the various members thereof, attendance at Council meetings in an advisory capacity, the drafting of contracts, conveyances and ordinances, and the prosecution of numerous criminal cases in police court. Especial cooperation with the Overseer of the Poor has been continued. In one of the prosecutions for non-support instituted at the request of that department it was found necessary to call for a mittimus committing the defendant to sixty days in the House of Correction for failure to comply with the Court's order. In two instances involving disputed liability between the city and towns in relief cases your solicitor, at the request of both parties, drafted and submitted to the office of the Attorney General agreed statements of facts for opinions on the law. In both instances the rulings by assistants in that office were unfavorable to the city. It is the opinion of your solicitor that one such ruling was correct, and that the other was incorrect. It is further the opinion of your solicitor that the submission of

such questions to the office of the Attorney General for advisory opinions in the nature of arbitration decisions is of doubtful wisdom and that the better policy in the future would be to institute legal proceedings in Superior Court where there is opportunity for full hearing and argument on all pertinent facts and law and from which court the city would if necessary have the right of appeal to the Supreme Court. The relief law is so constantly changing, so difficult by nature of interpretation, and so replete with unlitigated questions that the forum provided by law furnishes more satisfactory and enlightening solutions than decisions by an administrative office.

In Superior Court litigation the claim of the City in the G. H. Tilton & Son Company receivership, for taxes, was settled favorably to the city. The case of Charles Cheney vs. The City of Laconia continues to stand on the docket, not having been pressed by the plaintiff.

Your body authorized me during the past year to revise the city ordinances with the assistance of Councilman William W. Keller. The revision has been completed and will be submitted in typed form for your consideration at the February meeting of the Mayor and Council. The revision is the first in twenty-five years and is from a legal viewpoint the most distinct accomplishment of the city in the past year.

Since I have recently taken office as Solicitor for Belknap County I will not be a candidate for reelection by your body as City Solicitor. I appreciate the confidence and good will shown by you in your refusal to accept my resignation at the time I took over the duties of the larger office. The past two years as City Solicitor have been most enjoyable to me for their associations and their opportunities.

OVERSEER OF THE POOR

*To the Honorable Mayor and Council
of the City of Laconia:*

Gentlemen:

It is my privilege and duty to submit herewith my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending February 15, 1941.

There were 224 persons on relief February 1, 1940 and 179 February 1941, a reduction of 45 persons; the decrease is largely to be credited to more private employment. There are a few able-bodied persons without jobs, several of them are aliens and, consequently, not eligible for W.P.A. work and have no qualifications, or are too old for available work. The question is often asked why not have them chop wood or get farm work, the answer is, wood lot owners will hire only real woodchoppers and lumbermen want only experienced lumberjacks and farmers want only men who can milk; very few of these men can qualify for any of the named jobs, but do get jobs when construction work demands such labor. As far as possible the City furnishes work for them to reimburse for aid given them. Age is a hinderance for many men past middle life in finding employment, and where evidence of physical fitness is required, many are found ineligible by doctors for strenuous work, mostly for reason of a weak heart.

Federal projects are still quite a factor in keeping the relief load at a low figure. Many Laconia men are now employed on the new airport and will continue to be for many months. The sewing project is employing several women who are keeping their families off the relief roll. The

disbursement of surplus commodities to people of scant incomes is a God-send to many families.

It is to be regretted that the State has fallen down in its obligation to aged people, needy blind and aid to dependent children, thereby, placing an extra cost on the City. It is to the credit of Governor Blood that he is endeavoring to have this condition changed.

It is the policy of this department to see that men with families who are able and can get work but refuse it are haled into court for sentence.

It is gratifying that the needs of this department have not been as great as conditions at the beginning of the year indicated, leaving several thousands of dollars for other city obligations. The treasurer's report will give a complete statement of income and expenses of this department.

I wish to extend my thanks to the Mayor, Council, Solicitor Johnson, members of the police department, City Clerk Flanders and all others who in any way have cooperated with me in performing the duties of this office.

PARK COMMISSION

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

As Secretary of the Park Commission, respectfully submit this report for the year ending December 31st, 1940.

The Park Commission feels that they have tried to meet the needs of the citizens of Laconia in the activities connected with each City Park. The social clubs affiliated with Leavitt, Opechee, and Wyatt Park have each done their share in cooperating with the Park Commission. There has been two changes in the personnel of the Commission Mrs. Marjorie Philbrook was elected in Feb. 1940, to fill the term of Mrs. Bernice Seaverns, who resigned. In August Mrs. Marion Holt was elected to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Eliza Soule, who moved to Lancaster, N. H.

At Leavitt Park, the Community House has kept a very busy schedule, with Lakeport Woman's Club, the Leavitt Park Club and the Young Peoples Social Group dances each week. The increasing use of the house makes it a fine center for many community projects.

Leavitt Park Playground was again in charge of Mr. Charles Peterson and Miss Jessie Dutrizac as instructors with a large average attendance of boys and girls. As usual swimming was a major activity. Both Mr. Peterson and Miss Dutrizac are qualified Red Cross Water Safety Instructors and this year took an additional brush up course at Opechee Park under Mr. Nat Parker of National Headquarters. Cards were awarded to 26 Beginners and 5 Intermediate swimmers with many more ready to qualify next summer after a few more hours work. A canoe was made avail-

able for Park use, that instructions in the use of small water craft might be given. The annual trip to Mt. Belknap found some 20 girls and their mothers, accompanied by Miss Dutrizac enjoying the overnight trip up the Belknap Trail. Later 50 boys and adults with Mr. Peterson took the same trip. Athletic badges were awarded this year for sports of all kinds, some younger boys going to Camp Moccassin to compete.

At Opechee Park one new concrete tennis court was added. The old bath house was moved from the Point to a position directly in front of the bathing beach. An appropriation of \$900.00 from the City Council and \$500.00 from the Opechee Park Club was used to build an addition to the present Ward Room House, adding a building 40 x 30 feet to the house. The hall is a Community House used by the Opechee Park Club for all its activities, also used by the newly formed Junior Hi-Y club for boys and girls called the Opechee Hi-Y. The boys and girls of High School age have formed a club sponsored by the adult group and hold dances each Friday night. The hall is equipped with dishes, spoons, card tables, chairs, coat racks, sink, 2 wood stoves, window curtains, all, furnished by the Opechee Park Club. Gifts to the Park include a grand piano, a combination gas and electric stove, 14 card tables and a Victrola. These are gratefully acknowledged. The Opechee Park Club sponsored a Community Bonfire and good time for all on the night before the Fourth. The City contributed the band, and all parks donated to the fireworks fund. This seems a fitting and safe project for all children and adults for Fourth of July and it is hoped to make this an annual affair. A Christmas Party for some 300 children under 12 years of age was given the night before Christmas and Santa Claus came across Lake Opechee to greet all children and bring them gifts. The building was informally dedicated on January 3rd, 1941. Mrs. Maynard M. Smith

is president of the Club. An additional appropriation of \$150.00 by the City Council was used for a toilet and water connections for the Ward Room.

Opechee Park Playground was again in charge of Mr. John Hobson and Miss Phyllis Caswell with the addition and splendid cooperation of Miss Mary Hayner. The Park Commission felt that a third person was necessary, due to the extensive water front program and the unusually large attendance from all over the city. The instructors have been very fortunate in not having any accidents on or near the water and the third instructor was able to greatly reduce any hazard on park or water front. Life Saving classes were especially successful— 6 Senior and 13 Junior Life Savers—also 41 Beginners—18 Intermediates—17 swimmers passed their tests. A new diving board was supplied by the Opechee Park Club.

The Club also placed Mr. Stephen Sleeper to keep the bath house open for the convenience of the public on Saturdays and Sundays and evening. The average park attendance was 80 children in the mornings and 300 in the afternoon. The Soft Ball League had 6 City teams, playing 2 games a night for two night a week, sending two teams to the State tournament. Also a girls league played regular soft ball games.

Wyatt Park Playground. The Wyatt Park Club has functioned all year with its social activities and Young Peoples Club. An appropriation of \$700.00 from the City Council and \$500.00 from the Wyatt Park Club was used to enlarge the building at Wyatt Park to twice its size, adding a large porch to be used in winter as a skating shelter. Also a fully equipped kitchen inside the building. The building was dedicated on December 11th 1940, with a splendid turkey dinner prepared by the ladies of Wyatt Park Club,

who invited the Park Commission, the Mayor, and the City Council and their wives as their guests of the evening. Mrs. Sarah Ford is president of the Club. They sponsor a winter carnival for children under 14 with prizes for skating events and serve refreshments. Also a summer carnival which was held for two evenings. Card parties are held regularly in the new Park building. Anna Hawkins was instructor in charge of summer playground.

Skating Rinks. The Park Commission added one more rink to the City Skating Rinks for 1940, that of Pearl Street. Mr. Joe Morgan cares for the rink at Leavitt Park—Mr. John O'Connor at Wyatt Park—Mr. Theodore Laroche at Casino Square—Mr. Burlon McGowan at Pearl Street and Mr. Louis Felker at Opechee Park Cove. A hockey rink was added to Pearl Street, built and cared for by the boys of the YAC group, independently.

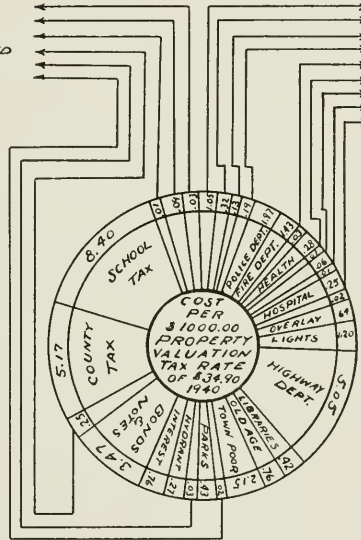

Gentlemen :

Having completed the audit of the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ended February 15, 1941, I present the following Statements showing the financial condition of the City as of that date.

Exhibit I—Appropriation Account year ended February 15, 1941.

Exhibit II—Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as of February 15, 1941.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as of February 15, 1941.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows :

<i>Cash</i>	\$47,373.84
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This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements with the records of the City Treasurer and compared with the ledger of the City Clerk; all receipts and expenditures of the City Treasurer were properly checked with the different departments of the City; an audit of each monthly draft is made by the City Auditor as a final check upon all bills before payment is made by the City Treasurer. All Bonds, Notes and Coupons paid are carefully checked with the Records of the City Clerk.

Property Sold to City for Taxes \$20,790.15

During the fiscal year, the 1939 sale of property to the City for Taxes amounted to \$19,863.22 which was about the same as for the year before; during the present year many of the old accounts have been redeemed so that at the present time there are small balances left on 1936 and 1937 amounts and 1934 and 1935 have been settled in full. As a result of this, the amount has been lowered considerably.

Accounts Receivable—Taxes \$58,706.86

The Collector's record of unpaid taxes was examined by me and compared with the records kept by the City Clerk; the record of taxes paid was examined and compared with the report of the City Treasurer; all payments made by the Collector to the City Treasurer were properly vouched for by the Treasurer's receipts.

Warrants from the Board of Assessors to the City Tax Collector covering the commitment of all taxes were examined and all abatements were compared to see that they were approved by the Board of Assessors.

The Tax Collector has made a fine showing in the collection of taxes for the fiscal year, a balance of \$46,309.71 being unpaid as of February 15, 1941 as compared to a balance of \$56,706.08 for the previous year; many of the older accounts have been redeemed or taken by Tax Deed.

Accounts Receivable :

Balance Due from Martha E. Johnson \$7,096.24

A Court action in the name of the City of Laconia as plaintiff for the recovery of \$22,096.24 against Martha E. Johnson resulted in a judgment in favor of the City

for the full amount; the Bonding Company having paid the \$15,000 limit of the Policy, the above amount remains unpaid and must be carried as an asset.

Property Acquired by Tax Deeds \$3,527.37

Tax Deeds were taken by the City during the fiscal year in the amount of \$1,188.00 on several parcels of land and buildings and redemptions amounted to \$880.06 thereby leaving the above amount.

Miscellaneous Liabilities \$1,419.37

Leavitt Fund \$836.37

This account was examined and verified.

Gale Park Fund \$157.58

This amount of balance is still very small owing to the fact that the income from the fund has been reduced considerably.

Motor Vehicle Taxes 1941 \$2,055.61

This source of revenue has increased during the past year; the amount received by the City Clerk was checked and verified with the receipts of the City Treasurer and also with the Permit Cards.

Notes \$50,000.00

The above amount of Notes represents money borrowed in anticipation of unpaid taxes on short term notes to meet the current expenses of the City.

Unexpended Appropriations \$59,414.27

Appropriations made during the year were verified with the records of the City Council and expenditures were properly approved by Treasury Warrants; all transfers were approved by the Mayor and City Council. A detailed report of these may be found in Exhibit I of this report.

Laconia Shoe Company \$1,133.22

This amount has been increased during the past year by rents collected by the City in anticipation of repairs to the building as per the agreement in the lease; no repairs of any consequences having been made, this year's receipts have accumulated in addition to the previous balance.

Laconia Airport \$236.91

This small balance is being carried over by the City due to the incompleteness of the project.

Overlay for Abatements \$165.50

During the fiscal year, the amounts of added taxes were sufficiently large so as to leave a small balance in this account.

Credit Balance \$22,314.54

The above amount represents the excess of current assets over current liabilities and is nearly as large as the one for the previous year; I mentioned in my report last year that no taxpayer of the City could fail to recognize the achievement of last year as it was surely bound to aid materially during this year.

To show that the Mayor and City Council have accomplished fine results during the year, I shall enumerate some of the highlights at this time.

A total of \$54,500 has been paid on the Serial Debt during the year with no additional Bond Issue thereby reducing the Debt to \$279,250 which is a new low for many years; the Tax rate was reduced from \$41.30 in 1939 to \$34.90 for the past year; the amount of \$7,850.00 has been spent on the new Airport; a new Fire Truck for the Central Station was purchased at a cost to the City of \$5,918.-50 during the past year and is now in service; the Davis Place sewer was completed at a cost of \$464.55; the amount of \$800.00 was spent in making a new set of offices at the Academy St. School building for the Superintendent of Schools; the Opechee Community House was erected at a cost to the City of \$1,050.00; the Weirs Municipal Building and Boardwalk at the Weirs was completed at a net cost of \$10,689.30 for the building and \$5,824.63 for the boardwalk; this is surely bound to be of great advantage to the Weirs as the City's acquisition of water frontage formerly owned by the Boston & Maine Railroad and the agreement with the Railroad Co. to take up one set of tracks, deeding the land to the City,

gives the City a chance to widen Lakeside Avenue thereby improving parking facilities.

In spite of the above mentioned improvements, the Mayor and City Council have succeeded in having a Credit Balance for the year of \$22,314.54 for which showing they should be commended by every taxpayer in the City.

SERIAL DEBT

The Serial Debt outstanding as of February 15, 1941 is detailed in Exhibit IV of this report and shows a Net Debt of \$279,250 as compared to \$333,750 on February 15, 1940; this represents a decrease of \$54,500.00 during the fiscal year.

CEMETERY TRUST FUNDS

The following statement of Trust Funds was verified by examining all pass books of Savings Banks and Securities held by the Trustees and by checking all the expenditures with the Savings Bank Books. All receipts and expenditures are properly recorded on their books.
