TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, in the County of Sullivan, and the State of New Hampshire:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the eighth day of March next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$2,705.00 from:

a. Interest and Dividends Tax	\$ 550.00
b. Savings Bank Tax	70.00
c. Forest Fire	50.00
d. Dog Licenses	175.00
e. Rent of Town Hall	10.00

To defray Town Charges, estimated to be \$4,915.00.
Town Charges to include, but not being limited to:

Article 3. To see what sum of money in addition to the sum already appropriated under Article 2 of this Warrant, the Town will raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate, to be used together with, and in addition to the Class V Allotment (\$1,745.14), Duncan Money, so-called, for the Summer maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Winter maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate and/or authorize the Selectmen to borrow, in addition to that already appropriated under Article 2 of this Warrant, for construction of the Fire Station.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate, to be used together with and in addition to the \$500.00 appropriated in 1959, to put a seal coat on the Crane Brook and Hemlock blacktop roads.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$426.09 and apply for Class V Assistance, TRA, so-called. State to furnish \$2,840.59.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the Town Library.

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use for one year of the Alstead Public Dump.

Article. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the completion of the South Cemetery Fence.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to replace the McDermott Bridge.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an Inspector of Buildings who shall hold office for a term of one year, and by vote fix and regulate his compensation as authorized by section 1, chapter 156, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following Building Regulations as authorized under Sections 2-5 inclusive, Chapter 156, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

Building Regulations For The Town of Langdon

1. The Inspector of Buildings shall be appointed by the Selectmen annually and shall be the administrative officer of this ordinance. He shall receive applications and fees for the erection of buildings and electric wiring there-of as provided in this ordinance; shall keep complete records of all applications and his action on the applications; promptly survey and inspect all buildings, or uses proposed, accept and deposit with the Town Treasurer all fees collected by him under this ordinance, and may issue permits for erection of all buildings, and the use of the land, if in his opinion the proposal complies with the law of the State, this ordinance, and other town ordinances and by-laws, provided that in any instance where license or permit fees for uses are required his permits shall constitute only an approval on which the proper authority may issue a license on payment of required fees; any other duties prescribed by law shall act in cooperation with the fire warden in any matter in which their duties as prescribed by law may coincide or conflict; and shall take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the selectmen.

2. No building construction shall be started; and no building shall be put to any different use than on the day of enactment of this ordinance until a permit thereof has been issued under the terms of this ordinance.

3. No application for a permit required by this ordinance shall receive action by the Building Inspector unless made in writing. All applications for a permit to build or construct any building shall be accompanied by a sketch or plan for the proposed building, and a statement of its intended use when built or constructed. A fee of one dollar shall be paid for all permits issued. A building permit shall become void unless operations are commenced within six months from date of approval, unless such time is extended by the building official.

4. Upon receiving such application the Building Inspector shall promptly take such action as may be indicated in the way of investigation or public hearings to acquaint himself with the merits of the application. He may, without judging the application on its merits, refer the application to the Board of Adjustment. If, however, he finds the proposed building, or use of proposed buildings to conform with the law and this ordinance he may at once issue the permit in writing over his signature. If he finds the proposal in any conflict with the law or this ordinance he shall fix whatever restrictions or conditions on the proposed construction or use as may be in his best judgment, right and proper, or, for reasonable cause refuse the permit.

5. No building or structure shall be erected, unless in compliance with the following:

a. **Commercial Building.** No building intended or designed to be used for industrial, commercial or other public use shall be erected, or used for any purpose which does not provide non-combustible walls and partitions between its component parts.

b. **Exits.** No buildings intended or designed for any public use or congregation of people shall be erected, or used for any purpose which does not provide adequate exits, as described in Chapter 156 and Chapter 155, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and in the regulations of N. H. Fire Marshal's office.

c. **Garages.** No public garage for the storage of five or more automobiles, or having any service or repair enterprises, connected therewith shall be erected, unless the building is so constructed that it shall be of slow-burning or non-combustible material, except that use of automatic sprinklers may obviate the use of such slow-burning or non-combustible materials.

d. **Roofs.** No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole, in part save with non-combustible or fire resistant roofing materials.

e. **Chimney Construction.** Chimneys shall be constructed of brick stone masonry or any other materials suitable for chimneys construction and accepted by national standards. Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a building and at least two feet higher than any portion

of the building within ten feet. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material. Factory built chimneys that are approved as a result of tests and listing by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the condition of the approval. All chimneys shall be lined with tile flue-lining.

f. **Thimbles.** No wall paper or other combustible material shall be laid over any thimble or thimble hole in any chimney.

g. **Smoke pipes.** No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and combustible material.

h. **Electric wiring.** All electrical wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property.

i. **Foundations.** All structures shall be set on solid foundations of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable material of masonry except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal or masonry piers.

j. **Minimum building area.** Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of five hundred square feet.

k. **Outside walls.** shall be constructed of material commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted.

l. **Sewerage.** All dwellings and all commercial, public or industrial buildings shall have a sewerage disposal system. The type, size and construction of all septic tanks and drainage fields shall be approved by the town health officer.

m. **Exceptions.** All buildings existing and in use on the effective date of this ordinance and the construction of small accessory buildings not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance.

6. **Board of Adjustment.** The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, one of whom may be a member of the Planning Board, said Board of Adjustment to serve without compensation. The Board of Adjustment shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result.

7. **Amendment.** This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

8. **Enforcement.** Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of violation.

9. **Takes Effect.** This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

10. **Conflicting Provisions.** Whenever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance, or other regulations, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall govern.

11. **Validity.** If any section, clause or provision portion, or phrase of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent authority such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause, provision, portion or phrase of this Ordinance.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance:

No person or persons may establish, maintain, have, or engage in the business of junk yard or automobile used car or part yard on any property within the Town, along any highway in Town which bears a State route number.

Article 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State to be used for opening back roads and trails.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds received for the perpetual care of Cemetery Lots.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 23. To allow accounts.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF—1959

The year 1959 saw only a few small chimney fires. Our neighbor towns, however, suffered some very serious losses. The Mutual Aid System to which our town belongs contributed heavily to the control of these fires.

The major effort of our fire department this year was expended on the beginning of a fire station. Elsewhere the detailed finance and man power report will be found. A good start was made on the building. In fact there was much more accomplished than we had hoped for. Some difficulty was encountered in co-ordinating the work so that not all those who wanted to help had a chance to do so. This was a matter of timing which was hard to arrange. It was very gratifying, on the day the foundation was poured, to have almost everyone in town on hand to help.

One great step ahead was the grading of the yard. The department meant to spread the work over two or three years. However, Harold Lamb, in addition to his generosity in improving the Lower Cemetery, trucked an immense quantity of rock and gravel fill from the cemetery job to the Fire Station yard. This was contributed by Harold; and with the gravel that was carted by the Fire Department crew, accomplished about 4/5 of the needed fill.

REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDEN—1959

The town of Langdon has again been fortunate in avoiding the expense of Forest Fires. But it has not been all luck. The one most important contribution to this happy situation is the fact that the Townspeople have been very careful.

In 1959 we only had one small grass fire. It started late in the afternoon near the bridge where the Hemlock Road begins. Man power and water were available. There were several houses near by. A two and one half hose line made short work of the fire. This was classified as a fire drill instead of a forest fire; and so was no expense to the tax payers.

During the year, personnel of the Forest Fire force have been active in the State and County Associations.

To the Selectmen:

Each year there is a demand for a statement on forest fires for publication in the annual town report. It is believed they serve a good purpose locally in preventing fires. May we respectfully request publication of the following in your town report.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a co-operating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple—

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home—Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

Assessment of property by the Selectmen is based upon actual observation of the property and a study of the Inventory returned by each taxpayer. It is of vital interest to each person who files an inventory to treat the Inventory as carefully as any other legal document and to describe his property exactly, together with any changes thereon. Each person who holds property in the State of New Hampshire is required by law to return a properly filled out Inventory, and by failing to do so makes himself liable to Taxation of four times the value of his property as assessed. (Section 74:13, Chapter 74, New Hampshire Revised Statutes). Of over three hundred Inventories distributed in 1959, only one third were returned. It is recommended that the reverse side of the Inventory Blank be studied carefully and the provisions contained therein be complied with.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Langdon, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

Miss Cleo Duncan and Mrs. Harvey Putnam returned this year as teachers in our Elementary School. The people of Langdon may feel very fortunate in having two well qualified and experienced teachers to guide their children. Miss Duncan is Principal of the building and teaches the primary room. Mrs. Putnam has the upper grade room, grades four to six.

Due to a decrease in enrollment, the Langdon School Board has voted to retain the seventh grade in the local school, beginning September 1960. This will save the town over \$1,500 in tuition charges next year.

The Superintendent's office has recently completed a survey of expected school enrollments over the next four years, 1960-1963 inclusive. The results of this research are shown below as follows:

Our first grade entering class next fall is expected to be only five pupils. This should give us an opening day registration of about 42 pupils.

The School Board has met regularly each month during the past year, with the exception of the months of July and August. The members should be commended on their fine work and genuine interest in the welfare of the school. We regretted very much the resignation from the Board of Mr. Stanley Bicknell, due to his change in residence to the town of Alstead. His replacement will be selected at the School District Meeting in March.

Intelligence Tests, Reading Tests, and General Achievement Tests are given each year to the children in Langdon School. This is a part of a standard testing program which is given in all towns within Union No. 5.

It is expected that our proposed 1960-1961 budget will be reduced about \$1500 to \$1600, due to a smaller school enrollment and a decrease in tuition costs to outside towns.

At the January meeting of the School Board it was voted to require a pre-school test for admission to first grade. Children **six years of age** by September 30th must attend school in accordance with New Hampshire School Law. Those whose birthdays fall between September 30th and December 31st may attend school if they successfully pass the readiness test. Those whose birthdays fall after December 31st must wait and enter school the next year.

I have enjoyed my year working in the town of Langdon. The members of the School Board have been most cooperative and have had the best interest of the children in mind in shaping their policies concerning the school. I appreciate the support and cooperation given me by the teachers. The people of Langdon may justly feel proud of their children, who go on into high school to enjoy greater accomplishments and honors. Each year brings a new challenge to all of us.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Our emphasis during the past year has been on Reading. For the winter carnival, sponsored by the American Legion, the school depicted our motto: 'Reading is our Business' in snow sculpture. Besides our regular reading program, a special remedial reading club was organized. This club took a trip to the Roger Pelton sugar house last spring. They also made a special trip to the library in Alstead to procure books on their reading level, and took a train ride from Bellows Falls to Charlestown. The boys and girls wrote of their experiences and a special reading book of their own was compiled. While I supervised the reading club, Mrs. Barbara Putnam taught French to the group that didn't need special help in reading. This experiment, introducing a language to elementary school children, was most successful and she is to be congratulated on pioneering in this field.

The children in the primary grades visited the Shedd Porter Memorial Library in Alstead during Book Week. We are indebted to that library and the librarian, Mrs. Laura McLane, for the loan of a hundred books during the school year. We are also indebted to our Langdon library and Mrs. Lydia Hatch, librarian; and the Bookmobile, for many additional books. We want to especially thank Miss Patricia Gude for her gift of forty-seven children's books, which she donated to the school library.

To supplement our program in science and social studies, we have ordered approximately twenty-five free films. We have also adopted the policy of sharing scientific experiments with all the pupils in both rooms.

The entire school participated in the Memorial Day Exercises at the lower and upper cemeteries. In September, we attended the Vilas Fair at Alstead. We set up an exhibit and entered two floats in the parade depicting "School Fashions Fifty Years Ago" and "School Fashions Today". The boys and girls were pleased to receive second prize in the out-of-town competition. We are grateful to Mr. Oren Sheldon and Mr. Roger Pelton for driving the tractors, and to Mr. Carroll Robbins and Mr. Sheldon for providing trailers. Your teachers also directed the Community Hallowe'en Party which was held in the Sarah Porter School in October. The Parents Club provided prizes and the refreshments. In December, the school dec-

orated the Town Hall and produced an operetta, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas", for the Community Christmas Party. The Community Club gave the boys and girls gifts and decorated a Christmas tree; the Parents Club gave them candy canes.

Mrs. Putnam received three graduate credits from Keene Teachers College for an extension course, Measurements and Evaluation, which was given in Charlestown the first semester.

We wish to thank our local School Board members and the citizens of Langdon for the wonderful spirit of cooperation which prevails in this community. We appreciate the new drapes in the primary room, the new steps and the spotlight outdoors, and the typewriter. The unfinished portion of the cellar has been cemented and we are looking forward to the time when it might be used as a play area on rainy and stormy days.

Mrs. Barbara Putnam and I are also grateful to our Superintendent, Mr. Noyes Stickney, and our school nurse, Miss Florence MacIver, for their services and supervision.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

Immunization Clinics have again been an important part of our School Health Program. This past year, for the first time, fourth inoculations of Salk Vaccine were made available to all persons desiring them. A large Clinic was held at the High School in Charlestown and the Langdon children were transported there. At this time, all of the children with the exception of one have had at least three inoculations of Salk Vaccine. Clinics were also held for the administration of Triple Toxoid and Smallpox Vaccine. These latter mentioned clinics are mainly for pre-school children and children of the first and second grades needing the booster inoculation of Triple Toxoid. All clinics were well attended.

Tuberculin Patch testing was done on children in the first, third and fifth grades. There were no reactors among the children tested. In the event of a positive reaction, a follow-up visit is made by the County Tuberculosis nurse and a chest X-ray is done through the clinics sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

The routine screening tests were done—vision, hearing and general inspection, including weighing and measuring. Dental defects still seem to be one of the greatest health problems. Response to the treatment of defects reported by the nurse to the parents was very good and in all cases an effort was made to remedy the problem.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your fine cooperation and for your interest in the School Health Program.
