THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 which has already been spent for road maintenance due to washout last fall.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the tarring of the old road from Munsonville church by the store to the foot of the hill on route No. 9.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate money for Calcium Chloride to be used on class V highways or take any action relating thereto.
6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairing highways and bridges or take any action thereto.
7. To see if the town will vote to repair the bridge on the old Holt road and raise and appropriate money for same.
8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for culverts for town roads.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for repairs on the Cletrack Tractor owned by the town.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$343.53 for construction of class V Highways, the State to contribute \$1,374.10, or if the new law is passed the town must raise \$363.09 and the state will contribute \$2,413.94.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate necessary money for a heating system for town barn.

12. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to paint the town barn and raise and appropriate the amount of \$100.00 for same.

14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for waterholes and clearing fire trails.

15. To see if the town will vote to have a telephone installed in the town barn and fire house combined.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to remodel the town hall or any part thereof, for town officials' office and town literature.

17. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

18. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

19. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and to see if the town will recommend to the association that the day be changed from Wednesday to Saturday.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association, in cooperation with the other 37 towns in the region.

21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$153.00 for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

22. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to a quit claim deed to a piece of road thrown up by the state, to Mr. John Walters.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 to purchase tools and plank for cemetery use by the sexton in performance of his duties.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00, Nelson's share in establishing a first aid station in cooperation with Harrisville and Chesham.

25. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application

against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to use the balance of last year appropriation (\$652.66) six hundred fifty-two dollars and sixty-six cents, to meet existing bills for tuition caused by moving the 8th grade to Harrisville.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

To see if the district will authorize the school board to use the balance of last year's appropriation (\$564.66) to meet an existing deficit.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The school problems of Nelson have multiplied this year, due chiefly to an increase in enrollment. When school opened in Sept. 1950, there were 33 pupils in the Munsonville school. This increased to 39 pupils. Mrs. Hastings felt that she did not have the time to adequately prepare the 8th grade pupils for high school and give the lower grades the attention they needed. The solution seemed to be to transfer the 8th grade to the Harrisville school. A meeting of all parents of 8th grade pupils was called and the problem explained to them. They un-animously agreed to the transfer to Harrisville and the board took this action. Pupils and parents have been satisfied with the results.

It appears likely that the enrollment condition will continue for several years, with attendance of the 8th grade at Harrisville as one of the solutions. Another solution would be that of changing the Munsonville school into a two-room building and hiring another teacher. The expense for alterations would amount to about \$500 and the salary of another teacher would be \$2,400. Cost of tuition at Harrisville is \$125 per pupil or about \$900 for the entire 8th grade. Another solution might be the re-opening of the Nelson school. After a discussion of this solution at a public meeting, and the consideration of the cost of reconditioning the structure, cost of another teacher, living quarters for a teacher and additional transportation, this solution seemed the poorest one.

Playground conditions at the Munsonville school have been bad for years and in June 1950, the school board decided to use part of the balance of the year's funds to grade the property, make necessary repairs and purchase needed playground equipment.

The State Dept. of Health has urged improved health facilities at the school for some time, especially with regards to drinking water. During the summer, water was piped from the well; a sink, drinking fountain and faucet were installed. A ready supply of water, plus surplus foods supplied the school by the Federal Lunch Program, has enabled Mrs. Hastings to prepare a hot lunch for the children at noon-time.

Keene High School Guidance Dept. has supplied the School Superintendent with the marks of all pupils attending that school from the town of Nelson and Munsonville. Out of a total of 54 subjects being taken, only two marks were below passing. This is an excellent record and a tribute to the teaching ability of Mrs. Hastings.

I have enjoyed working with the School Board, the teacher and the citizens of the community and feel that the year has been a successful one.
