TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at 9:30 A.M., the polls to close not earlier than 5:30 P.M., to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$708.12 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,720.82.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and tarring of improved Class V Roads.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase of Forest Fire Equipment.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of Hospitals.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Old Cemeteries.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of New Hampton Village Cemetery.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$179.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500), from the accumulated interest of the Capital Reserve Fund, to improve and tar the lower river road from Central Bridge, so-called, to the Jimmie Bridge, so-called, and authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over the same amount to the Town Treasurer, any unexpended balance to be returned to the Trustees of Trust Funds.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to tar the new road, built with T. R. A. money in 1952, running from the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Robbins to the former school building at Reed's corner, being so-called back road between New Hampton and Bristol.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve and tar a section of the Gordon Hill Road, starting from Route 3 B and extending approximately 700 feet.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of black topping that portion of the road from the top of Cemetery Hill, so-called, to the top of Sinclair Hill, so-called.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for the purpose of constructing a skating rink for the children of the Town of New Hampton, this skating rink to be used solely by the children of the town.

20. To hear the report of the committee on the town history and to take any necessary action relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Testing of milk and water by the State Board of Health at unpredicted times during the year has resulted in favorable reports. Contagious diseases have been kept at a minimum and New Hampton may continue to be fortunate if diseases requiring quarantine are reported to the local Health Officer as quickly as possible.

REPORT OF TOWN HISTORY COMMITTEE

At the town meeting of 1940 a committee was appointed to consult with Mr. Clarence Swain and Mr. John Gowan relative to a history of the town. At the meeting of 1941 this committee reported favorably on the history being prepared by Mr. Swain and Mr. Gowan and on March 10, 1942, the town appropriated \$880 for the publication of this history. This money, together with like sums from the New Hampton School and the Gordon-Nash Library was deposited in a trust account in the Bristol Savings Bank with Mr. Edson J. Cheever as trustee and now amounts to approximately \$3100 with interest through July, 1952. War conditions and the rising costs of publication prohibited publication at that time, and the removal of Mr. Gowan from town and the subsequent illness of Mr. Swain brought the work to a standstill. Much material had, however, been collected, and a substantial start made on the actual writing. Recently Mr. Gowan sent his manuscript and data to the Gordon-Nash Library for deposit, expressing the hope that someone might be induced to edit and complete the work.

Mrs. Bernard Merrill has now agreed to undertake this, with assistance from Mr. Frederick Smith, Miss Ina Bickford, Mrs. A. H. Matthews and others, and the Library has made funds available to Mrs. Merrill for incidental expenses, as it was felt that the appropriations could be used only for publication costs. The services of Mrs. Merrill and the others co-operating are on a volunteer basis. Due to the greatly increased costs of publication as well as to the great amount of work still to be done to complete and bring down to date the genealogical data, it seems best to concentrate on completing and bringing up to date the volume of annals to be published

as Volume I, leaving the genealogical material to be edited and published as Volume II when time and money permit.

In this plan, your committee, the Executive Committee of the Library, and the committee for the New Hampton School, concur. Mr. Gowan has been consulted, and has most generously placed all his material at Mrs. Merrill's disposal. She also has all of her father's notes and, of course, the approval of his family. Considerable progress has already been made in sorting the material and assigning work on different sections to the persons collaborating in this task, and a start made on collection of additional data. Mrs. Merrill earnestly requests that anyone possessing any material or information relating to the history of the town, its old houses or inhabitants, communicate with her.

No estimate can be made at this time of the eventual cost of publication, but it is hoped that funds now on hand will permit the publication of the annals without further appropriation. It is recommended that this committee be continued or a new town committee appointed to cooperate with Mrs. Merrill, the Library and the School, to examine and approve the finished manuscript, to approve plans for its publication, and to report progress to the next town meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT of the SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the New Hampton School District:

I herewith submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

It has been one year since my last report was made. During that time we have been faced with many changes. These changes have occurred on the local, state, national, and international scenes. They have an effect on the political, social and religious life of all communities. They also have their effect upon the schools, its staff and the pupils.

Your school is doing an excellent job of keeping pace with these changes and programming their work in order that we may continue to make progress. Your school is stressing, along with this business of understanding, a real thorough background in the fundamentals, — the essentials for an enlightened people. Your school is meeting the educational needs of your pupils through constant alertness relative to the curriculum. It is meeting the social needs of your pupils through the many extra activities such as plays, group working, the lunch program and in the classroom. It is helping to meet the religious needs through the morning exercises, the reading of good literature, and by cooperation with the local church in youth activities. You may be proud of the fact that your school is doing its best to create the atmosphere in which learning can best take place.

During the past year we have had two changes in the teaching staff. It was with a great deal of regret that the Board accepted the resignation of Mr. George B. Rochfort, Jr. He had given the school the leadership during the first two years. He had developed the program which brought about a smooth transition from the one room rural to the consolidation system of education which we now have. His work was deeply appreciated.

We were most fortunate in being able to find an excellent replacement for the Principalship. Mr. Lionel Metivier, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College was elected by your Board. He brings to the school the same high grade leadership that it had enjoyed in the past. There has been a minimum of confusion and no interruption in our good program with this change in leadership.

It was with a great deal of regret that the Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Edith Plant who had served the Primary Room during the first two years of the Community School's life. Again, however we were fortunate in finding an excellent replacement. The Board elected Mrs. Cecile Smith of Tilton, a teacher of many years of exceptional experience and a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, to fill the position left vacant by Mrs. Plant. Mrs. Smith has brought a wealth of experience and knowledge to the primary room.

Mrs. Margaret Benson returned to serve the Intermediate Room. She is continuing her fine program and the pupils are benefitting greatly from her work. Mrs. Watts is again giving the pupils a well rounded program in Music Education.

The health program of the school is continuing to meet the needs of your pupils. It is with regret that we report the leaving of Mrs. Helen Thomas. Again, however because of the continued good cooperation of Headmaster Frederick Smith of the New Hampton School we can happily state that we have an excellent replacement in Mrs. Mildred Desmond. She brings to the school many years of excellent experience and has a genuine interest in the children of the school.

The School Lunch Program is continuing to meet a felt need for your children. We are indeed fortunate in having Mrs. Grace Davis as our director. She is doing an excellent job and the children are reaping the benefits of one of the best programs in the state of New Hampshire.

The New Hampton Parent-Teacher Association is continuing to give excellent support to the school and its

program. The community is most fortunate in having an organization of this caliber to help the school. They continue to give daily help to the lunch program. For this we are deeply appreciative.

The Gordon-Nash Library is continuing its close relationship with the school in furnishing good books and giving assistance in the many ways which they have found to help. The community is most fortunate in having a Library and staff which is so willing to be of service to the youth. It aids tremendously in developing good citizens.

In my report of last year I pointed out the cost of high school education for the community. As you look over the proposed budget for the coming year you will find that the cost of the program for the Community School has not risen appreciably. You will find, however, that the cost for high school tuitions has increased considerably. This is due to the fact that the cost of high schools has increased consequently the communities maintaining high schools have increased their tuition rates. Bristol will charge the State Average which will be approximately \$275 per pupil. Ashland will charge \$250 which was their rate this year. We were able, because of agreement, to hold this to \$225 for the current year. Laconia will charge \$305 of which the community will pay only the average of the state. The elementary tuition is expected to be \$150 in Ashland and Meredith for the coming year. You will notice that the total amount needed for tuition has increased about \$3000 over last year. This accounts for the increase in the school budget for the coming year.

Some may ask if it would not be cheaper to transport all of the elementary pupils to the Community School rather than pay tuition to Ashland and Meredith. Your Board has analyzed this situation and has found that the added cost for transportation, the addition of another teacher, and the necessary books and supplies would cost us more than it is now costing to send them to Ashland

and Meredith. When the time comes that tuition rates are excessive and we can educate our pupils more economically here we should consider doing so.

One item is being included in this year's warrant to which I wish to call your attention. This relates to the resurfacing of the school driveway. This problem has been with us since the school opened. An excessive amount of sand is tracked into the building and the stones in the driveway constitute a hazard for the children. It is our opinion that the driveway should be covered with the necessary gravel, levelled and covered with an asphalt material giving a good smooth black-top driveway. It will facilitate plowing, practically eliminate the tracking in of sand, and will rid us of the unsightly driveway. I hope that you will see fit to approve this article.

It has been a pleasure many times to hear the good reports from people who have visited your school. They have been impressed with the plant, the program, the staff, and the pupils. One foreign educator who visited was amazed at the progress made by the pupils in the grades since the opening of school in September. It is my hope that we can continue to merit this good publicity. It is only when we all do our part that we can arrive at these results. I trust that this spirit will continue for the good of the youth of the community.

I could write at length relative to other features of the school and its program. Instead I should like to invite all of you to visit your school and see the program in action. You will be pleased, I am sure, at what you find.

In closing this report I wish to express my appreciation to all who have helped in any way to make the school program a better one for your children. I am grateful to the teachers, the school board, the parent-teacher association and the Gordon-Nash Library as well as all citizens for their continued support. I hope that we may be able to work together for the youth of your community many years.
