THE SELECTMEN

TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newfields, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newfields, on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the next year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will grant a discount of 2% on taxes paid in full thirty days after the taxes are committed to the collector.
- 4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate of \$15,000 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from Taxes collected within the current municipal year.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the authorization of the sale of real estate held or acquired by the Town on account of purchase at tax sale.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take toward the acceptance of reports of Town Officers, as printed in the Town Report.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Commissioners, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take relative to the bequests of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) under paragraph 2 of the will of the late Harry K. Torrey.
- 9. To see what action the Town will take relative to the bequest of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) under paragraph 8 of the will of the late Harry K. Torrey and to see if the Town will vote to expend the bequest, on order of the Selectmen, for the baseball diamond being constructed by the Newfields Youth Athletic Association.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning and Land Use Ordinance for the Town of Newfields, New Hampshire, Adopted, Adjourned Town Meeting, March 14, 1959, by striking out Section A of Article XVI and substituting the following new Section A, Article XVI:

"Home produce and products means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on, except pigs in a number greater than twenty at one time, on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property."

11. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate during the current municipal year for the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to return the sum of four hundred ninety dollars (\$490.00) in the aeronautical fund, established at the 1964 annual meeting, to general funds, and repeal action taken on Article 13 of the 1964 Warrant.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the unexpended balance of the 1964 Water Extension appropriation for water search.
- 14. To see if the Town will request the assistance of the Tax Commissioners in appraising all lands and buildings and raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) in the current year, the balance to be raised in 1966.
- 15. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate to hire an engineer for preliminary Engineering on the water search.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to enlarge the existing water system by acquiring land and easements by purchase, lease or condemnation, to be used for the well and location of mains leading from such well to the standpipe, and by acquiring all necessary pumps, pipe, fittings and other equipment to provide an additional source of water, conduct it to the stand pipe and enable potential users adjacent to the new mains to be connected to it; and for that purpose to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by issuance of its bonds or notes to defray the cost; and further to authorize the Selectmen to determine the rate of interest to be borne by said bonds or notes; the denominations and forms of said bonds or notes, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, and terms of sale; and further to authorize the Selectmen to sign and affix the seal of the Town to said bonds or notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Business meeting will be held at 8 p.m.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record vear of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2,280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest re-The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our more effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The annual School District meeting was held at the Town Hall on March 9, 1964. District officers elected for the following year were; George H. Phinney, Moderator; Mary B. Hallinan, Clerk; Frances Winkler, Treasurer; Frances P. Brigham, Member of the School Board for three years. The board elected William C. Tebo as Chairman and Frances P. Brigham as Secretary.

In accordance with Article 9 of 1964 School District warrant as adopted, the sum of \$2,000 was received from the Will of Ida A. Green and placed in a trust fund by the School Board, the income from said Trust to be applied each year for the teaching of temperance in the Public School.

Improvements at the school buildings have been routine repairs which included spot painting of the exterior and front steps, re-glazing windows and roof repairs and at the Library, painted the floors and weather stripped the bulkhead doors. Major improvements have included a new bike rack, storm windows on Mrs. Mead's room and a new septic tank drainage field.

Due to the constant large enrollment the Board has had to again utilize the Town Library basement for the second grade. Although this has the approval of the State Board of Education, it is a necessary arrangement rather than a good classroom for either teacher or students. We again wish to thank the library trustees for their co-operation in renting us this needed space.

The Robert C. Lawrence Memorial Library at the School is in full operation with reference books and reading materials suitable for elementary grades. The students are making full use of it and we are indeed

fortunate to have this addition to our educational system.

Three buses continue to transport the children in town and to and from Exeter.

We again thank the P.-T.A. for its continued support of better schools through its soup, milk and dental programs and especially through the opportunity it provides for parents, teachers and School Board to reach a better understanding of mutual problems.

At this time, we should also like to thank Mr. Hoyt, our superintendent; Mr. King, our teacher consultant; our staff of teachers and nurses, our janitor and all others who contribute towards the education of our children.

Income from the State Foundation Aid and from Federal Aid under Public Law 874 continues to be substantial. In State Foundation Aid \$10,852.69 was received for 1962-1963; \$12,325.88, for 1963-1964; and \$12,591.79 has been received for 1964-1965.

Under Public Law 874 for 1962-1963, \$6,492.00 was the income from Federal Aid; for 1963-1964, \$11,506.00 was received and during 1964-1965 it is expected that \$9,400 will be the amount.

Newfields has also received \$4,519.81 as its share of the Sweepstakes for the year.

Following is a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union 16, on his work as supervisor of elementary education:

It is inherent in the nature of our education that the schools are responsive to the society's changing needs. Schools have and will continue to make changes to meet these needs.

Last year at this time I reported that a committee was formed to study various arithmetic programs and to select one that could be used in all of the towns of this school union. I am happy to report that after careful study and much discussion the Elementary School Mathematics Series was selected. It has been widely adopted and successfully used in thousands of classrooms. It reflects much of the thinking and findings of leading educators, psychologists and mathematicians over the past decade. It incorporates proven teaching techniques with the latest findings in learning theory, blending the best of the old with the exciting, creative ideas of the new.

All of our first three grades are working with this program now, and I expect it will be expanded to the intermediate grades next fall. A workshop for teachers will be held soon in which teachers will have a chance to discuss any phases of the new program that need further explanation.

Public elementary schools will soon get a chance to look at themselves through a new State of New Hampshire Department of Education publication, Guidelines for Public Elementary Schools. I have had the pleasure of working as a member of the state committee responsible for the new ninety-page booklet which discusses all phases of elementary education from the building itself to the facilities and teaching within the walls. I feel there will be much material here for discussion in the coming months as we move toward the maximum standards and practices recommended in the publication.

Much profitable time this year has been spent in introducing new media and materials. We are continually developing new ways of reaching major understandings with learners through a variety of resources. The accessibility and correct usage of printed materials, graphic materials, audio-visual materials and television programs become more important each year. We need the best possible resources for teaching and learning, and we hope for these resources to be used as well as they can be. Demonstrations, bulletins, and discussion sessions have helped teachers with the many resources available.

As teacher consultant I shall continue as a part of my work to study new approaches to learning, and to evaluate curriculum changes throughout the country and to present to the staff only that which best fits our needs in this school union.

The Parent-Teacher Association contributes to the School program in various and important ways.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

Again I wish to express my appreciation for the continued support of the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Health services to children have grown by leaps and bounds in the last few decades. The schools, with community backing, have provided (especially in our own Union #16) the services that are important if each child is to take full advantage of the educational facilities offered. The best trained teacher in the best equipped classroom cannot teach a child who is beset by the ills of the flesh and spirit. How much can a child learn who cannot see the blackboard, who can't hear instructions, who is listless from lack of proper rest or food, or who is emotionally disturbed?

For this reason, all of our schools in Union #16 have a health service program with excellent equipment to detect such problems as vision and hearing. All have a school doctor — a specialist in children. Physical examinations are given in certain grades and to children who need special attention. Glasses are provided by the Lions Club, State Sight Conservation program, or the Salvation Army.

Hearing aids are still hard to obtain due to cost, but so far we have been able to see that the child gets one where help is needed.

We have children in our classrooms who, until recently, would have been excluded. The epileptic sits right along with the normal child, his spasms controlled with medication; the diabetic, the cerebral palsy, and the severely physically handicapped child can receive the education he deserves. Even the retarded child goes to school and receives an education with the help of special teachers and program.

Immunization clinics are held to provide each child with necessary "shots" or to be kept up to date on his immunity. Every child has an annual vision and hearing test. Sight conservation clinics are held weekly, sponsored by the Exeter Lions Club and the Kingston

Lions Club. Exeter has weekly dental clinics. Speech clinics are also available for each town but one. Some of the finances for this clinic are provided by school boards where necessary. T.B. tests and urinalysis for the detection of diabetes are also done each year.

Pre-school clinics are held in each town to provide the in-coming first graders the chance of starting school in tip-top condition, or providing time for the correction of remedial defects. There is a long journey ahead of each child during his school years. We must give him the chance to start this journey at maximum ability.

Orthopedic clinics are held monthly with over 200 children in attendance during the school year and chest X-ray clinics periodically. Other special clinics, such as amputee clinics and convulsive disorder clinics are available as the need arises. The number attending these latter clinics varies each year.

Another most important role of the service is Health Education in the classroom. Teachers are doing more of this each year, incorporating it with science and social studies. Excellent TV programs and other visual aids are available today for each class at its own level.

This is a far cry from the scattered, unorganized beginnings of School Health Services — but there is yet much to be done. You, the parents, the school boards, the school staff, and the general community, have made all this possible. Your help is still needed. "No man is so tall as when he stoops to help a child."

Our thanks to all for their generous help and cooperation.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 16 CLASS

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The enrollment of the Union Class is at the capacity figure this year of fifteen students, thirteen boys and two girls. The grade levels range from low primary through sixth.

There is interchanging with other classes in science, New Hampshire History, physical education and special activities. Art and music supervisors come weekly to the group. The six boys who are covering in a modified degree the sixth grade curriculum join Mrs. Trefethen's group on three days a week. This proves to be challenging and rewarding.

We are continuing the experiment of having students from Phillips Exeter help the boys whose reading difficulties have hampered their progress. With their twice weekly tutoring, we have now no non-readers.

Boy Scout Troop 322 meets each Thursday at the Community Center. Dr. Pitchforth and his Academy assistants are very faithful. All boys are 2nd Class Scouts.

The variance of the class this year as regards achievement, aptitude, grade ranges, chronological age and physical size make the necessary individual attention and standards difficult to maintain. As we saw the need for continued personal assistance at the junior high level, it is apparent that the little people with special difficulties need more person to person relationship and guidance at the primary level than one teacher can adequately give. A part-time assistant in such instances would improve the learning situation.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The purpose of music in the classroom is to give the pupils a general knowledge of music and to subject them to as many different musical experiences as possible. It is hoped that from these experiences everyone will find a lasting musical interest.

Music in the classroom this past year has consisted of ear-training, music appreciation, rhythms, action songs, singing games, folk and square dances, work with rhythm band instruments, singing in unison and in parts, learning to play the tonette and auto-harp, and learning the fundamentals of music.

Outside of the classroom, the musical experience of participating in operettas or special programs gives the pupils not only pleasure but also a chance to gain self-confidence and poise by appearing before an audience.

The pupils of Mrs. Chick and Mrs. Pulsifer participated in the Memorial Day program which was held at the Town Hall in May.

Special music was prepared and sung by the fifth and sixth grade students at a program given in Mrs. Mead's room in June to honor the sixth graders who were leaving the Newfields School to attend school in Exeter.

I extend my sincere thanks to Mr. Hoyt, the members of the Newfields School Board, the P.-T.A., Mr. King, Mrs. Phinney, the teachers and the parents for their kind cooperation at all times.

REPORT OF THE ART SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

There has been much progress in Art Education during the past twenty years. Teaching has broken away from copywork and pattern; today Art programs emphasize a more creative expression. It is generally felt that most children are creative and with the proper stimulation and guidance, can develop a genuine appreciation that will carry over into many phases of their lives.

The Art program in Newfields stresses individual creativity. Everyday happenings are the springboard for expressions of original ideas. Often the Art work is correlated with studies, thus enriching understanding. Of course, materials and varied methods can do much to inspire a child's imagination. A variety of media has been used this year; crayons in many ways, pastelle, watercolor, posterpaint, clay, cut paper, pen and ink, and needlework have had their place in enriching the program.

For example, the third grade made Halloween masks from papier mache. Gay Christmas mobiles decorated the first and second grade rooms during the holidays. The fourth and fifth grades have designed samplers and learned basic stitches, in keeping with their studies in American history. Using a variety of materials, the fifth and sixth grades have made diaramas, representing their work in social studies.

It is hoped that next year with longer art periods for the fourth, fifth and sixth grades, a more varied program can be provided with some time for craft work.
