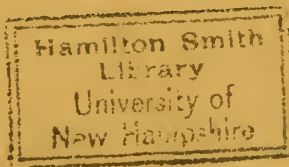

# INAUGURAL ADDRESS

by Mayor Walter H. Wood

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*Gentlemen of the Council:*

In order that the affairs of the people of Rochester should be conducted in an orderly and efficient manner, a City Government has been established; rules of conduct and procedure have been ordained. These rules apply alike to all the people; they are to be administered without fear or favor, without regard to position or influence. This is Government *of* the People.

The rules and institutions of our Government are intended for the benefit of all the people. In your deliberations concerning amendments or additions to and administration of these rules, you should consider their effect on the welfare of the whole people, and your every act should be for the benefit of the whole people, and not for any clique, faction, party or bloc. This is Government *for* the People.

The people of the City have chosen from among themselves men to represent them in their City Government. We, who have been elected by them to these responsible positions, are here to serve them. We are responsible to the people; we are answerable to them for our conduct in the positions we now hold, and not to any individual, faction or group. We stand here in the stead of and by the will of the people. This is Government *by* the People.

Twelve months ago a statement of policy was presented to the Council. It was a policy dictated by unusual and critical conditions throughout the world.

All members of the City Government in 1942 accepted the responsibilities imposed by wartime conditions, and in a very fine spirit of cooperation carried out their duties in harmony with that policy. That policy, which requires that all of our acts be weighed in their relation to the national program, must be continued through 1943. In general, expansion of the several services provided for the public must be postponed, not only because of the scarcity of labor and materials now, but because it will be necessary to have such projects after the war to furnish jobs to our boys when they return.

Our first consideration this year will be how best we, in Rochester, can serve our country in these trying times. The term, "Our Country," embraces the land in which we live—the people, the institutions, the form of government. Democratic governments in many other lands have been given up as failures. The recent trend, generally, throughout the world has been toward stronger, centralized governmental control, frequently to the point of dictatorship. Besides this tendency, in wartime people must relinquish many of their individual rights and per-

sonal liberties. Even though bending our every effort to war-time activity, we must give some thought to the future, that we may be prepared to meet the problems that even now confront us and endanger our democratic institutions, and that must be met and solved at the close of this war, if we are to retain government of, for and by the people.

These, you may say, are national problems that must be dealt with on a national scale, and have small place in our local considerations. If this is our attitude and the attitude of people throughout the nation, the problems will be handled by a stronger and stronger centralized government, which eventually may become a dictatorship. These problems are *our* problems. If we solve them locally, we but do our part in performing the functions of free people in a democratic government. If every city and every town throughout this land plan and act wisely, performing their full functions as self-governing units of a democratic government, the major problems will be solved, and the danger of losing the advantages of our democratic institutions will be gone.

Our City is progressive. Our people are awake. They are familiar with the rights, the privileges, the duties of the electorate in a free government. May not we with clear vision look to the future and plan with all the wisdom with which we are endowed to meet the conditions which we know must come? May not we chart a course that others may well follow? When the post-war problems come, problems of re-adjustment, of reconstruction and relief, may it be said, "There is a city whose people foresaw conditions that would exist; accepted their full responsibility; planned to meet those conditions; and succeeded. That city is Rochester, New Hampshire."

# IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

Passed by the City Council, 1943

## RESOLUTION TO TRANSFER BALANCES TO DEFICITS IF NEEDED IN CLOSING ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That if found necessary in closing the accounts of the year to transfer from a department where there is a balance to a department where there is a deficit, the Committee on Finance be authorized to make such transfer.

## RESOLUTION GRANTING V. E. NICKERSON A LEAVE OF ABSENCE

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Vane E. Nickerson be granted a leave of absence and that this Council recommends to the Council in power that all Patrolmen leaving their jobs for the service in the armed forces of the United States be given every possible consideration for the return of their jobs, but in the order of the length of their service to the City of Rochester, subject to an honorable discharge from the armed forces of the United States.

## AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATING TO PARKING RULES

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Section 5 of Chapter XIV of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as amended December 3, 1942, shall be amended by striking out the word "shall" in the next to the last line and substituting therefor the word "may," so that said Section 5 of Chapter XIV shall read:

There shall be no parking of automobiles between December 1 and April 1, between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight, and six o'clock in the morning, on either side of any highway in the City of Rochester, any and all public parking lots except in rear of City Hall.

All cars found on said streets and said parking lots except in rear of City Hall in violation of this ordinance may be taken to a public garage for storage at the owner's risk and expense.

## RESOLUTION TO HIRE MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the Finance Committee be authorized to hire in anticipation of taxes a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00). Said sum to be hired on notes of the City at such time as the best interests of the City require.

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## RESOLUTION TO INCREASE PAY OF SPECIAL POLICE OFFICERS ON SPECIAL GUARD DUTY

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the City Marshal, with the advice and consent of the Police Committee, be empowered to assign special police officers to special guard duty, as in the judgment of the Marshal and said Committee may be required during the present war emergency; such guards to be assigned to protect property, either publicly or privately owned, upon the request of the department, corporation or individual having the management of and authority over such property; such guards to be paid at the rate of \$.60 per hour, from the Police Department, and the Police Department to be reimbursed by the department, corporation or individual for whom service is performed.

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## RESOLUTION ALLOWING BIDS FOR COLLECTION OF RUBBISH

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the Highway Committee be authorized and empowered to secure bids and to award a contract for the collection of garbage, under the terms of the form of contract which has been recommended by said Committee.

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## RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE OF FRONT STREET AREA

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the proposal of the Boston & Maine Railroad to make a grant of the Front Street area, as shown in yellow on Blueprint Issue A-11-27-42, for highway purposes, for a consideration of \$1,000.00, be accepted by the City of Rochester; and that the Mayor be authorized to complete the negotiations and sign the necessary papers; and that upon the transfer of this property, the City Treasurer be instructed to pay \$1,000.00 to the Boston and Maine Railroad.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE TAX COLLECTOR TO  
APPOINT A DEPUTY COLLECTOR

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Eugene C. Howard, Tax Collector for the City of Rochester, be authorized to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector from the regular Police Department to assist him in his duties as Tax Collector for the year 1943.

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RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF CITY-  
OWNED PROPERTY

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the Finance Committee of the City Council be, and hereby is, authorized to make sale of the land and buildings owned by the City of Rochester, and known as the Chester Page Farm, located above Meaderboro Corner in said City.

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AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATING TO  
PAY OF SPECIAL POLICE OFFICERS WHEN ON DUTY

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Section 8 of Chapter XXIII of the General Ordinances, under the heading "Payable from the Police Department," be amended by striking out "three dollars and fifty cents a day," and substituting therefor "sixty cents an hour," so that said Section 8 shall read:

Section 8. Special police officers, when on duty, sixty cents an hour.

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AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATING TO  
SALARY OF THE JUDGE OF THE MUNICIPAL COURT

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Section 1, under the heading "Payable from the Police Department," of Chapter XXIII of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, as amended November 4, 1942, be further amended by striking out the whole thereof and substituting the following:

"Judge of the Municipal Court \$900.00, as established by Chapter XIV of the Public Acts and Joint Resolutions of the Legislature of 1941, this amount to be paid in equal quarterly payments."

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AMENDMENT OF THE ORDINANCES RELATING TO THE  
AMOUNT OF THE TAX COLLECTOR'S BOND

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Section 1 of Chapter 27 of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester, 1935, be amended as follows:



That that part thereof referring to the Tax Collector's Bond as being set at twenty thousand dollars be stricken therefrom, and in its place and stead there be enacted the following:

That the bond for the Tax Collector of the City of Rochester shall be in such amount as may be determined by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission.

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#### RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING LICENSE TO INSTALL BURIED CONDUIT

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the petition, dated February 17, 1943, for license to install and maintain underground conduit on North Main Street, northerly from Union Street, in Rochester, be granted.

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#### RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO PETITION THE SUPERIOR COURT TO APPOINT BAIL COMMISSIONERS

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That whereas, a vacancy has occurred in the Office of the City of Rochester Bail Commissioner, and whereas it is necessary that a petition be made to the Superior Court to secure the appointment of Bail Commissioners to serve in criminal cases,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Honorable Mayor be and hereby is authorized to petition to the Superior Court for Strafford County, for appointment of Bail Commissioners.

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#### RESOLUTION ON PROPOSED BUDGET FOR 1943

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the appropriations for 1943 submitted by the Finance Committee be approved, and that action on the total amount to be raised by the City to defray the necessary expenses for 1943 be deferred until such time as the Finance Committee can submit to the Council the amount of the County Tax and a more accurate statement of the estimated receipts than is possible at this time.

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#### AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATING TO PARKING RULES

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Section 6, Chapter XIV of the Public Ordinances of the City of Rochester as amended on June 4, 1940, October 1, 1940, and December 5, 1940, be further amended by

inserting after the words "following streets" the words "Northwesterly side of Pine Street between a point 250 feet southwesterly from North Main Street and North Main Street" so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 6. No vehicle shall be parked or left standing within the City of Rochester upon parts of the following streets: Northwestery side of Pine Street between a point 250 feet southwesterly from North Main Street and North Main Street; southerly side of Bridge Street between Bridge and Main Streets; Union Street between a point one hundred feet easterly from Main Street and Main Street; Congress Street from Central Square to Arrow Street; easterly side of Congress Street from Arrow Street to Charles Street; Liberty Street between a point fifty feet westerly from Main Street and Main Street; and between a point fifty feet easterly from Charles Street and Charles Street; Hanson Street on the northerly side between a point fifty feet easterly from Central Square and Central Square; Sturtevant Court; no person shall park or leave standing a motor vehicle within ten feet of any fire hydrant; no parking on either side of Linscott Court, so-called.

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#### RESOLUTION ACCEPTING PRESTON, COLMAN AND BROOK STREETS

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the locations and lengths of Preston, Colman and Brook Streets, as accepted October 1, 1940, are as designated on the plan of Brookdale, dated May 27, 1943.

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#### RESOLUTION ACCEPTING EXTENSION OF HARDING STREET

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the extension of Harding Street 430 feet from the point 705 feet from South Main Street, as shown on the plan of Brookdale, dated May 27, 1943, be accepted.

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#### AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATIVE TO BOXING AND WRESTLING EXHIBITIONS

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Chapter XVI of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by inserting the following Section 2A between Sections 2 and 3:

Section 2A. The holding of boxing and/or wrestling exhibitions or bouts within the City of Rochester, under license issued by the State Athletic Commission of New Hampshire, and permit issued by the Licensing Board of the City of Rochester, is hereby permitted and authorized, subject to the provisions of the statutes of the State of New Hampshire relating to athletic exhibitions.



No permit for the holding of boxing and/or wrestling exhibitions or bouts within the City of Rochester shall be issued by said Licensing Board unless the place for holding such exhibition or bout shall have been approved by majority vote of the City Council.

The City Council may revoke or suspend said license after due hearing, for any cause which said Council may deem sufficient.

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RESOLUTION TO ERECT AN HONOR ROLL FOR  
CITIZENS OF ROCHESTER IN THE U. S.  
ARMED FORCES

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That there be appropriated \$1,000.00 to defray the expense of construction and maintenance of an Honor Roll for citizens of Rochester who enter the service of the Armed Forces of the United States in the present war;

And that this amount of \$1,000.00 be added to the 1943 Budget.

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RESOLUTION FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1943

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That there shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, with such overlay as may be found necessary, on the polls and ratable estates within said City the sum of \$376,034.18 to defray the necessary expenses of the City for the ensuing year, which together with the sums which may be received from various sources is hereby appropriated.

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RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT BEQUEST OF SARAH S.  
VARNEY TO THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY

*Be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That said City of Rochester accept the bequest to the Rochester Public Library, made by the will of Sarah S. Varney, to be held in trust, in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof, a copy of which is hereto attached.

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RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT BEQUEST OF JENNIE  
FARRINGTON TO THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC  
LIBRARY

*Be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That said City of Rochester accept the bequest to the Rochester Public Library, made by the will of Jennie Farrington, to be held in trust, in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof, a copy of which is hereto attached.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT BEQUEST OF ETTA R.  
HANSCAM TO THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC  
LIBRARY

*Be it resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That said City of Rochester accept the bequest to the Rochester Public Library, made by the 11th Clause of the will of Etta R. Hanscam, of the sum of five thousand dollars, to be held in trust and known as the John Hanscam Trust, in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof, a copy of which is hereto attached.

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RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE COMMITTEE TO SELL PROPERTY IN HANSONVILLE OWNED BY THE CITY OF ROCHESTER

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the Finance Committee of the City Council be, and hereby is, authorized to make sale of approximately ten acres of sprout land, owned by the City of Rochester, and known as the Daggett Property in Hansonville.

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AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATIVE TO STOP SIGNS

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Chapter XIV, Section 8, be amended by adding at the end of said Section 8 the following sub-section:

(49) On Chamberlain Street before entering Whitehall Road from said Chamberlain Street.

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RESOLUTION THAT THE FINANCE COMMITTEE BE AUTHORIZED TO TRANSFER TO THE PUBLIC BUILDING ITEM \$600.00

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the Finance Committee be and hereby is authorized to transfer to the Public Buildings Item from the unexpended balance of the Fire Department Item in the Annual Budget Appropriation, such amount not exceeding \$600.00 as may be necessary to cover the cost of repairs to the Central Fire Station as authorized by the Public Buildings Committee.

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* Whereas the Water Department of the City of Rochester is possessed of land bordering on Brock Street in said City,

and whereas there is occasion to straighten a portion of said street near the French Cemetery along the land now held by the Rochester Water Department, we do now therefore establish the following as a portion of the northeasterly side line of said street:

Beginning at a point on the present side line 30 feet north-east of a stone bound set in the ground 1940.15 feet southeast of the center line of Washington Street; thence running  $842\frac{1}{2}$  feet more or less to a point on the present side line 5 feet north-east of a stone bound set in the ground at the side of said street.

Be it further resolved that the strip of land included in the highway by this relocation of a portion of the northeasterly side line of said street is hereby transferred from the Water Works Department of the City of Rochester to the Highway Department.

Passed October 5, 1943.

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RESOLUTION GRANTING ONE WEEK'S VACATION  
WITH PAY

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the regular employees of the Water and Sewer Departments of the City of Rochester as of September 1, 1943, be granted one week's vacation with pay. Each regular employee shall take his vacation a week at a time or otherwise when and as directed by the head of each department. Beginning with the year 1944 such vacation with pay shall be granted only to such regular employees as shall have been employed in said departments one year or more.

Passed October 5, 1943.

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RESOLUTION GRANTING ONE WEEK'S VACATION  
WITH PAY

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That the regular employees of the Highway Department of the City of Rochester as of September 1, 1943, be granted one week's vacation with pay. Each regular employee shall take his vacation a week at a time or otherwise when and as directed by the head of said department. Beginning with the year 1944 such vacation with pay shall be granted only to such regular employees as shall have been employed in said department one year or more.

Passed October 5, 1943.

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RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE TWO PLOTS OF LAND  
FROM THE BOSTON AND MAINE RAILROAD CO.

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* Whereas the Water Committee of said City, believing that provision should be made for probable installation of gravel packed wells in the near future, have recommended the

passage of a resolution authorizing the purchase of a plot of ground in the area where satisfactory tests for water were made in 1941,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Finance Committee be, and hereby is, authorized to negotiate with the Boston & Maine Railroad for the purchase of a plot of ground lying between the Chestnut Hills Road and the tracks of the Lakeport Branch of the Boston & Maine Railroad, and another plot of ground across the tracks from the first mentioned. These plots are those shown on a blueprint attached hereto, entitled "Land at Gravel Pit—1.5 miles north of Rochester, N. H.," and dated November, 1941.

Be it further resolved that this land be deeded to the Water Department of the City of Rochester, and that the Mayor be, and hereby is, authorized to sign the necessary papers to conclude the purchase, the price of which is to be \$600.00.

Be it further resolved that the Highway Department is hereby granted permission to use sand from these lots without charge.

Passed October 5, 1943.

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#### AMENDMENT TO THE ORDINANCES RELATIVE TO SUNDAY AFTERNOON MOVIES

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Chapter XIII, Section 8, of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by striking out the word "six" in the fourth line thereof and inserting in its place the word "two" so that said section as amended shall read:

Section 8. Moving Pictures and Theatricals. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day to conduct motion pictures, lectures, concerts, theatricals, and vaudeville performances, but not earlier than two o'clock in the afternoon, provided that no unreasonable disturbance of peace and quiet is caused thereby. The Mayor and City Council may make regulations controlling such entertainments as do not now require to be licensed, to the end that no unreasonable disturbance of peace and quiet shall be caused thereby, and nothing in this section shall be construed to permit without license, any such entertainment now requiring license.

Passed November 3, 1943.

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#### RESOLUTION TO TRANSFER BALANCES TO DEPART- MENTS WHERE THERE ARE DEFICITS

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That if found necessary in closing the accounts of the year to transfer from a department where there is a balance to a department where there is a deficit, the Committee on Finance be authorized to make such transfer.

Passed December 9, 1943.

RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO HOLIDAY PAY OF REGULAR EMPLOYEES OF THE WATER, SEWER AND HIGHWAY DEPARTMENTS

*Be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That all regular employees of the Water and Sewer Departments including those classified as trench workers and general helpers; and all regular employees of the Highway Department including those classified as laborers, receive pay for any holiday falling in a regular work period, whether or not work is performed on such holiday. This resolution, if passed, to be retroactive to November 1, 1943.

Passed December 9, 1943.

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AMENDMENT RELATIVE TO TAXI LICENSES

*Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:* That Chapter XVI of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester be amended by adding at the end of Section 10, and making a part thereof, the words "and schedule of rates to be charged"; and by adding at the end of Section 13, and making a part thereof, the following sentence, "The schedule of rates shall be prominently displayed in the vehicle at all times," so that these sections shall read as follows:

Section 10. A petition for said license shall give petitioner's name, place of business, post office address, make, type, serial number and seating capacity of vehicle, and schedule of rates to be charged.

Section 13. The City Clerk shall issue without charge to every licensee a metal plate bearing the words, "Licensed Motor Vehicle, No. , Rochester, N. H., 19 ," setting forth the serial number of the license and the year in which the license runs. Said plate shall be attached to and kept on the dash of said vehicle at all times during the license term when the vehicle is in operation under said license within the limits of the City.

The schedule of rates shall be prominently displayed in the vehicle at all times.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

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*To the Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library:*

Gentlemen: This year, 1943, has been a year of gifts. In addition to the legacy of \$5,000.00 given by the late Etta R. Hanscam, the library has received the subscription to 26 newspapers and periodicals, many of them the special publication of various organizations and clubs. The *New York Times*, the gift of the Rochester Woman's Club, *Fortune*, the gift of the Harmonie Club, the *Rochester Courier*, *Rochester Observer* and *Foster's Daily Democrat*, each presented by the publishers, were among them.

Among the interesting curios was a silk mantle, once worn by the daughter of Parson Main, a large collection of shells, classified and arranged, old maps, clippings and pamphlets of local interest.

Other gifts of interest to the patrons were 110 magazines and 498 books. One hundred and eighty-two volumes were received from Mrs. Barbara Newhall of Lebanon, Maine, and 227 volumes, many folios and pamphlets from the library of Mr. Ashton Sanborn, a set of standard novels from Leonard C. Hardwick and a valuable set of children's books from a friend of the library. All gifts have been presented with the proviso that, if not needed by the library, they could be passed on.

It has been impossible with the pressure of regular work to prepare and catalogue all the gifts of the year. Two hundred have been added, others will be made a part of the library as soon as possible.

In addition to the 200 gifts, 982 books have been purchased and 29 have been added by binding magazines.

By a careful checking through the nine accession books we find that of the 44,390 volumes accessioned since the library was opened, 5,001 have either been lost, destroyed, worn out or discarded through the years, thus making the total number of volumes in the library at this date, not including the 1,827 volumes in the Franklin McDuffee memorial collection, 39,380.

In addition to this number there are hundreds of volumes of unbound and unaccessioned magazines made available for reference by means of the Readers Guide to Periodicals, a complete index from 1802.

As one reads the names of Rochester men on the Roll of Honor and realizes that the families and friends of those men are trying to do their part and recalls the embargo on the family car, it is not to be wondered at that the circulation of library books has been dropping a little lower each of these war years. The older people and those living some distance from the li-



brary have been obliged to give up their library cards. Many regrets have been received.

Every ban possible has been lifted. There is now no limit to the number of books a patron may take out, with the exception of the books in great demand. All but recent books may be renewed by telephone or post card. Any book in the library may be reserved for twenty-four hours for the price of a post card.

When one remembers that in 1939 a total of 105,945 books were given out, the circulation of 71,365 for this year seems small. Patrons have been reading differently, many are studying. It is gratifying to note the large proportion of non-fiction and especially the increase in history and kindred subjects.

The children's room is a very busy place during the after school hours. The room is outgrown and inadequate for the work which is carried on. The shelves are crowded, the books cannot be kept in classified arrangement and the placing of new books is a problem.

The resignation of Miss King, who had served as children's librarian for ten or more years, was a loss. Mrs. Evans, who at the suggestion of the trustees, accepted the position has taken a great interest in the children and their reading. A larger and more convenient desk and large bookcase have been ordered for the room and will relieve to some extent the congestion.

It would be a grand thing if some beneficent fairy would turn the little used lecture room into a regular children's room with modern equipment. What a splendid memorial for a loved one.

The reading and reference rooms have been open through the regular hours and 11,543 readers and students have been counted. This is not a correct number as visitors often come and go during the busy hours without notice.

The branch libraries have carried on as usual. East Rochester opens two days each week for fifty weeks of the year. Gonic was open two days each week for eight months of the year. Each of these branches have done good work and rendered the usual reports.

The library has done what it could to assist in the war effort. Perhaps the most important has been the attention paid to the reading needs of the men in the armed forces. During 1942 and 1943, 1,525 books and 257 periodicals have been brought to the library for the camps. These have been carefully sorted according to the instruction of the committees, with the result that 1,353 interesting or helpful books in suitable condition have been packed and shipped to the stations designated. The balance, books with broken bindings or of a type which those in charge of the campaign did not want, are awaiting the advice of the secretary of the State Library Commission as to their disposal.

For a complete and detailed report of the work of the year your attention is called to the tables of statistics and circulation which follow and are a part of this report.

The changes in the personnel of the staff has disrupted to some extent the usual routine and led to some confusion behind the scenes. The resignation of two experienced assistants who had found what they thought better positions and a much needed leave of absence granted to Miss Foss, one of the assistant librarians, has caused the work to lag a little as it takes time to train a new assistant, even one who is an expert in other lines of work. Today with so many opportunities in various lines of work new assistants are hard to find.

Much credit and our sincere appreciation is due Miss Baril, the assistant librarian, and Mrs. Scott, the efficient general assistant, for their splendid work, especially during the last two months, when they have been obliged often to do the work of three assistants, also to Mrs. Evans, who so kindly took over the children's work during the busy period of the summer reading contest.

My thanks and appreciation goes forth to all who have helped in the work of the year, to the donors of flowers, plants, curios, books and magazines and to the Board of Trustees for their continued confidence and advice.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Rochester School Board:*

I have the honor to submit to you my first annual report as Superintendent of the Rochester schools, a report which must necessarily cover only the period from July 1, the date upon which I became Superintendent, to December 31.

Working with you has been a pleasure to me. I have appreciated the high degree of interest in school affairs and the fine spirit of cooperation which has been evidenced by you. I am also grateful for the assistance given to me by the entire school personnel in my work in an unfamiliar situation.

During the first two months of my tenure much of my time was spent in locating teachers to fill vacancies in the teaching force, and in seeing that the repairs and improvements in the school property which you authorized were satisfactorily completed.

Working with the Committee on Teachers and Salaries, whose members gave unstintingly of their time, I was able to fill satisfactorily all of the teaching positions left vacant. Because of the wartime demands of industry and of the armed forces it was, however, necessary to go above the salary schedule in certain teaching fields wherein there were shortages of teachers.

While in many cases it seemed that we were required to take the last available teacher to fill particular positions, I am happy to report that the new teachers, as a group, are doing very satisfactory work.

We were particularly fortunate in securing Mr. John M. Cotton as Headmaster of Spaulding High School. In carrying out his duties in the position, he has more than justified the outstanding reputation which he holds among the educators of the state.

Only three other changes were made in the school department personnel. Mrs. Stephen W. Wallace resigned from her position at the Spaulding High School cafeteria and was replaced by Mrs. Susie Smart; Mr. Eugene Huntoon was added to the janitorial staff at Spaulding High School; Miss Barbara Horne resigned her post as secretary to the Headmaster of Spaulding High School and at the time that this report is being written has been replaced by Mrs. Dorothy Foss pending further action by the School Board.

During July a complete inspection of the school buildings of the city was made by the Committee on Schoolhouses and Grounds. Upon its recommendation extensive repairs were made to the heating system of the East Rochester school and to

the roof of the building; also a new ceiling was installed in the Grade 2 room at the Allen School. Other repairs and improvements, in addition to the usual repairs and cleaning, voted by you were completed during the summer. These included the re-roofing of the Gonic school, the installation of new toilets at the School Street School, and at Spaulding High School, the repairing of the roof, and the heating system, and the painting of that part of the trim of the building not painted in 1942.

Since the beginning of school in September, I have spent considerable time in becoming acquainted with the Rochester school personnel and in acquiring a background for what I hope will be a continued improvement in our educational offering. I have found in the Rochester schools an excellent group of young people and a very cooperative group of teachers.

It is gratifying to note that the enrollment at Spaulding High School has not suffered the decrease which it was anticipated would result from the lure of wartime wages in industry. To recognize that their interests and those of our democracy will best be furthered by the continuance of young people in school, speaks well for many of the high school pupils of Rochester and for their parents.

Federal subsidies received under a plan proposed by the Food Distribution Administration and adopted by you have enabled us to increase the quantity of food in the servings given at the Spaulding High School cafeteria and to lower prices materially. The number of pupils taking advantage of the cafeteria has increased to such an extent that it has become advisable to add another woman to the cafeteria staff.

The report of the school nurse appears separately, but it should be noted here that we have been able to continue the Dental Clinic for under-privileged children. Much credit is due the local dentists who, at considerable personal sacrifice, have made the continuance of the clinic possible.

To assist the War Effort Rochester pupils and teachers have willingly cooperated in the salvage drives, and in the issuance of Ration Book No. 4. They have also liberally contributed to the United War Fund and Community Chest, and to the Junior Red Cross. War stamps are sold each week in the schools, and Rochester pupils have purchased \$7,847.00 worth since the beginning of the school year in September. For their achievement of goals established in the form of articles of war equipment to be purchased with money from stamps and bonds, a number of our schools have received government citations. Also a large number of high school pupils are working after school hours,

and in so doing are helping materially in meeting the man-power shortage.

The subject of "Schools and the War Effort" should not be left without giving a word of caution concerning the extent of the demands, financial, physical, and emotional, made upon the pupils in our schools. It should be noted that the most important work of the schools, the real education of our children, must take precedence even over the demands of the War Effort which are essentially demands upon adults.

I believe it axiomatic to say that to the parents of a child entering school at the beginning of a year, particularly in the elementary field, the most important question is, "Who is to be my child's teacher?" If that teacher is to be one who is kind, considerate, pleasant, understanding, and competent, it matters little to the parent who happens to be superintendent, or principal, or school board member. I, therefore, say that we must give careful consideration to our teachers, who, next to our pupils, are our most valuable asset. We should assure that they receive adequate compensation for their services, and that they are given sufficient equipment with which to do their work properly. We should make certain that they are given helpful supervision, and an administration which not only gives them an opportunity to perform their duties with a minimum of friction, but which also provides for their active participation in the establishment of its policies.

The shortage of teachers is becoming increasingly critical. Neighboring states which are economically more favored have already taken many teachers from New Hampshire. We should be remiss in our duty to the parents and children of Rochester were we not to make every effort to retain our teachers.

In planning for the future, there is little question that we may anticipate the use of the facilities of the schools for the vocational training of returning service men under an organization similar to that used in the training of workers for the defense industries. There will also be an increased use of the Spaulding High School plant by the community under regulations established on the basis of past experience.

Since juvenile delinquency is much in the news, a word should be said concerning its extent in Rochester. It is my judgment, based upon information received from reliable sources, that it is not, at the time that this report is written, a problem with us. While it would be unwise to be smug or complacent about this very serious national problem, we are safe, I feel, in commending the parents of Rochester children, for juvenile delinquency is fundamentally the result of parental delinquency. The extra-curricular program at Spaulding High School, the offerings of the Community Activities Association, the provision of playgrounds and skating rinks, and the work of the various church groups, are also preventive factors of great importance. More should be done in the providing of a program of recreational activities to meet the needs of that group of juveniles who have left school before completing the twelve grades.

Two problems concerning Spaulding High School should receive our careful attention. The first of these is concerned with the advisability of continuing the so-called "semester plan" of scheduling classes for pupils in grades 11 and 12. It is my understanding that this plan was introduced as an experiment. While it has proved beneficial in certain courses, particularly in the fields of industrial arts and commerce, the results in courses where continuity is advantageous do not seem to justify its continuance. In cases of the transfer of pupils to or from Spaulding High School during the twelfth year of school the plan works a very definite injustice in that it practically precludes the possibility of such pupils graduating with their class.

The second of these problems concerns the introduction of an adequate program of Guidance, including its educational, social, and vocational phases, at the school. The help that such a program, established under the leadership of a person competent in the field, can give to students in their vocational selections, in their solutions of personal problems, and in their planning for further education, is invaluable. There are few modern high schools which do not make provision for this important work.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

January 31, 1944.

Harold T. Rand, Superintendent

Dear Mr. Rand,

I submit my report as Headmaster of Spaulding High School.

## ENROLLMENT

Our enrollment has remained about the same as it was last year, in spite of enlistments and high wages. Seniors are allowed to remain until graduation if they are in their second semester and are called by the draft; if they enlist in the Navy they are allowed to remain until graduation no matter what part of the year they are in. This has encouraged many to remain in school and graduate. A comparison table of enrollments follows:

Our percent of attendance for last year in the Senior High was 91.9%, slightly below the State average of 93.5%. The Junior High average, 94.0%, was slightly above the State average of 93.3%. Mr. Russell Heath, the Attendance Officer, is urging pupils and teachers to assist in bettering that record this year. Much progress has been made. However, largely due to sickness, our percent of attendance is still much lower than it should be.

Our number of tardinesses per pupil is higher in both Junior and Senior High Schools than the average for the State. Much of this tardiness is due to late bus arrivals.

## SCHOLARSHIP

Our teachers are endeavoring to maintain a high degree of scholarship. Many pupils are finding it hard to do all the required work partly because they are doing so much extra work outside of school. This problem must be faced by parents as well as teachers. The job that is most important must come first.

Some of the teachers are using the unit method in their teaching. This method provides very well for individual differences. I hope to find more teachers using this type of teaching in the near future.

## TEACHERS

Many of the teachers are new this year. We are meeting every week for administrative purposes and at least once a

month for professional purposes. We have been studying our philosophy of education so that we will all understand in what direction we are going and why. The interchange of ideas has been very stimulating.

Spaulding High School is cooperating with the University of New Hampshire by having practice teachers in the English and Home Economics departments. These university students are under the guidance of our teachers and are receiving the practical experience which should help them to become good future teachers.

#### WARTIME ACTIVITIES

Our pupils, under the direction of Submaster Harold Hanson and the home room teachers, have been buying War Stamps and Bonds regularly all year. They have assisted in the apple harvest, scrap metal, tin can and waste paper salvage, and in the distributing of materials to the homes.

Many pupils work after school in the mills, offices, and stores and thus help to relieve the manpower shortage.

#### EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Mr. Lawrence Gates has charge of the physical education work and has organized intra-mural sports for the boys after school; while Miss Virginia Gardner has the girls' intra-mural activities.

Mr. Walter Mirey, athletic coach, has had a fine football season, winning four and losing four games. The boys showed evidence of good coaching and sportsmanship. Mr. Gates assisted with the football team.

The basketball season has begun and our team has great possibilities. We lost to Dover in a thrill packed game witnessed by a large crowd of enthusiastic rooters. This game and the football game marked the resumption of athletic relations with Dover which were broken off last year after the basketball game. Our pupils and the citizens of Rochester have shown great interest and enthusiasm in their attendance at all our games. The cheering and support has been fine.

Our band was a great asset at all our games and has been an inspiration at all times. Under our new instructor of instrumental music, Mr. Everett Firth, I hope to see the band increase in numbers and ability. Every Wednesday he has classes in the various instruments and some time during the day he has a period or more with the band, and later plans to have the same with the orchestra. Music is one of our greatest assets; we should encourage participation by the pupils at every opportunity.

The pupils, under the direction of Miss Marion Dow, are rehearsing a play for production in the near future. Two more plays are planned for the latter part of the year; one of these is to be a senior play, under the direction of the senior advisers.

The *Red and White* has made one appearance and a second issue is at the printers. This magazine offers a splendid op-



portunity to our pupils to have original poems and essays published. Mrs. Irene Wight and Miss Edith Kelley have charge of this activity.

Many more teachers are contributing to the school morale and efficiency by being sponsors of clubs and class advisers. They have participated in these activities very willingly, frequently volunteering. These extra-curricular activities are very essential to the school and much appreciated.

### BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

The building is in fine condition, kept so by constant, faithful and careful work of our janitors. The pupils appreciate their surroundings and are very helpful in keeping the building in good repair. Very few instances of destructiveness have been noted.

### CAFETERIA

The Cafeteria has been providing for an increasing number every week. We are serving about 625 each day. We are receiving a subsidy from the government. This subsidy helps us to provide more food for the same money, 15c per plate. It also increases the number of pupils getting a well balanced diet for their lunch every day. Four women prepare the meals; about forty pupils help in the serving and cleaning up process. These pupils get their hot lunch in return for their labor. A financial report is included with this report.

### STUDENT ACTIVITY ASSOCIATION

The members of the Student Activity Association meet with Mr. Hanson every Monday during club period. Here bills are approved and plans for school improvement discussed. All monies received from athletics, plays, student dues, or any other student activity are paid out under their direction with the approval of the Headmaster. A financial statement is appended.

### SEMESTER PLAN

After much discussion among the teachers, a vote was taken as to the desirability of continuing the semester plan. The vote showed a large majority in favor of a return to the former plan, or year plan. The reasons for their desire to return are many but may be summarized as follows:

1. The standards of the various classes are not being met under this plan.
2. In order to cover the amount of work required the assignments would be too long for one day. As for example, an assignment of sixty words in French or shorthand might be too long for one day's work, but all right for two days' work.
3. Make up work is difficult as pupils lose so much when they are out; twice as much under this plan as under the former plan.
4. It is difficult to maintain a high degree of interest over the longer period.

5. There is too great a lapse of time between this year's (Language) class and the second year.
6. Because of the "speeded up" process pupils have too much work to comprehend in any one assignment. (Chemistry, shorthand, mathematics.)
7. Pupils coming to us from other schools have great difficulty in being adjusted to our plan. They are taking, usually, four subjects and are able to have only two under our system. The same thing happens in reverse when our pupils transfer to other schools.
8. This system prohibits transfer between classes. It is almost impossible for seniors to have classes with underclassmen as is often necessary in making up lost credits or getting subjects necessary for entrance to other institutions.

In fairness I should add that many of the teachers see advantages in the semester plan especially as applied to shop courses, and the opportunity of having two full credits at the half year. However, they feel that these advantages are far outweighed by the disadvantages.

#### CONCLUSION

I have found the pupils and teachers of Spaulding High School very helpful, willing, and cooperative. I would like to express my appreciation to Mr. Hanson, especially, for his helpfulness at all times. It has been a great pleasure to me to work in such a fine building, with excellent equipment and with the splendid cooperation of all concerned. With such unity of purpose by all, Spaulding High School cannot help but progress.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

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*To the Superintendent of Schools:*

I herewith submit my report as School Nurse for the year of 1943.

In connection with my weekly visits to the schools physical inspections were made, the pupils of the grammar schools were weighed and measured three times during the school year, and frequent class room inspections were done. The defects found during this time were reported to the parents of the children by written notice or home visits. The parents have been very co-operative in remedying the defects which were found and called to their attention.

In the fall of 1943 a very small percentage of the children contracted chicken pox and two cases of poliomyelitis were reported to the local Board of Health. These were the only contagious diseases reported during the year.

The Dental Clinic was resumed in December. Each local dentist is correcting the dental defects of seven children. These children were selected by a committee consisting of Violet Bliskey, R. N., Visiting Nurse, Charles E. Goodwin, and myself.

Dr. N. K. Chesley continued the physical examinations of the children. Pupils of grades one, four, seven, and eleven were examined. It is the intention of Dr. Chesley to examine the students of grade nine in the spring. In addition to the doctor's work in the schools I find it very helpful to be able to refer cases to him and to consult him concerning problems.

Six Orthopedic Diagnostic Clinics, under the direction of Anne Lally, R. N., Orthopedic Nurse Consultant, of the State Board of Health, were held at the Frisbie Memorial Hospital. The child, referred to the clinic by his family physician, is examined and treatment as recommended by Drs. Jones, Friborg, and Stone of Manchester. Follow-up work on these cases is done at the Orthopedic Physiotherapy Clinic which is held at the Spaulding High School on the first and third Mondays of each month.

At this time I would like to express my appreciation in behalf of the children of Rochester to the local charitable organizations and the Red Cross Motor Corps for their many kindnesses.

I want, Mr. Rand, to thank you and the teachers for the cooperation I have received during the year of 1943.

# INAUGURAL ADDRESS

January 5, 1944

by Mayor Walter H. Wood

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*Gentlemen of the Council:*

A door has been opened for us to possibilities for unusually great and effectual service.

For two years our country has been engaged in the greatest war in history. During this period we, who have been entrusted with the conduct of the affairs of the City of Rochester, have endeavored to select a course and follow a policy which would be most helpful to our nation in these trying times. We have believed that in this time of war that the common good could best be served by a program of economy; an economy of materials, of money, and of manpower, doing only what is necessary for the maintenance of the services we already have, and postponing until after the war, extensions of these services and desired new projects.

The people of Rochester have approved of our efforts and supported us in our endeavors. *They* know the needs of the times and they are doing their part:

They are giving of their time for the various phases of Civilian Defense, the several services carried on by the Red Cross, and in many other activities made necessary by the dislocations brought about by the war. Many unaccustomed to manual labor are working in factories at all hours of the day and night.

They have saved metals, papers, rags, tin cans and fats.

They have contributed their money to varied war relief agencies.

They have been generous in their purchases of War Bonds.

They have given their sons and daughters, husbands, brothers, sisters and sweethearts.

They and theirs share in the sufferings of the world.

They give their portions of sweat, blood and tears.

They have made the sacrifices they have been called upon to make.

Gentlemen, we here on this platform are, and are proud to be, a group of these people. We have the honor to represent them in their City Government. It is manifestly our duty, as well as our privilege, to conduct ourselves with the same sacrificial spirit and zeal which they display.



The young men now battling for us in the far corners of the world have this spirit, zeal and courage in highest degree, and where did they get it? It was instilled in them in the homes, the schools, the churches of Rochester, and in the homes, schools and churches of cities and towns all over our nation. It is the spirit of America, whether we serve at home or abroad, whether in the household, in industry, on the farm; or at the battlefield, on the sea, in the air, or in the jungle.

Our young men at the front have made sacrifices far greater than we at home are called upon to make. They encounter dangers and hardships that we cannot even comprehend. They are subjected to bombings and gun-fire. They suffer discomforts in snow and rain, frigid climate and tropical heat, on frozen ground and in mud, vermin and insects, many times without regular meals, and for *what* do they undergo these—for *what* are they fighting?

Not for some high sounding principle, but just to get the job done and come home—home to be an individual again, to be independent, to make a living for themselves and their families, to be useful in the community; not to be a problem.

They have had enough of regimentation. They have seen enough of the results of the totalitarian and collectivist systems. They want now to be individuals. They want the opportunity to direct their own lives. They want to live in a community where the opportunity for the advancement of any individual is limited only by the limits of his own native ability, his own industry and energy. May we plan and conduct the affairs of this City so that such opportunity will be found here.

The greatest assets of any nation or community are not their material wealth and resources, but their people. Our young soldiers, when they return, will be the strength of our community. They are young, strong, ambitious. We need them. We need their resourcefulness, their enterprise, but there will be a transition period when they will need our help to get re-established in the life and work of the community. There may be, also, some who are not physically whole, and they will need our help more than the others.

These young men of ours, whom we so sadly sent away, will be welcomed home again, but we must do more than welcome them. They must be made to feel and to know that they are needed here, and not one of them must be allowed to feel that he has become a problem or a burden to his community. The only way that this can be done is to have work—opportunities for jobs awaiting them—so that they will be enabled to do worthwhile things as soon after they return as they are ready to undertake them. Now this is not going to just happen. It must be planned for.

Perhaps much of the preparatory work can be done by volunteer citizens, but they will need your interest, your backing. It is to be hoped that every industry, every employer, will reinstate those who have left their employ to enter the service of

their country. It is hoped that surveys can be made to determine new opportunities for employment, and even after all this planning, no doubt it will still be necessary to find some more jobs, at least to tide over to full peacetime production.

Our Public Works Program, carefully planned to meet the needs of the community, rather than just to make jobs, should solve this problem.

We now step over the threshold of the open door to a new year. Nineteen forty-four will be a year of great possibilities and grave problems. The same conditions still exist that have dictated our policies during the past two years, but we now look forward to the end of the war—to victory.

The victorious termination of the war will end some of our present problems. Some of them will continue into the post-war period. Other and various new problems will be raised. Many of these problems will be national and international in scope, and many will be of vital concern to Americans in their local communities.

The way in which these several communities in the nation handle these local problems will determine the seriousness and magnitude of many of the problems which may face the nation. It is a tremendous burden that America must carry as an aftermath of this period of destruction. As we cooperate with our nation in the war, so must we cooperate with our nation in the peace, and this can best be done by our acceptance of all the duties and responsibilities which go hand in hand with the rights and privileges of self-government. Our greatest contribution will be to solve our own problems, to carry our own load, and not to add to the burden of our national government.

Besides continuing our cooperative efforts in the present emergency, it seems wise that we should now plan as definitely as possible for the post-war era. Expansions of our public services are desirable and necessary, soon after wartime restrictions are lifted. Some surveys for these service extensions have already been made by our Planning Board, and these projects have been included in the Capital Budget program drawn up by this Board. The Planning Board can be of further help, I believe, in conducting investigations and surveys, and in the development of plans relative to any projects the Council may refer to them, and I recommend that you avail yourselves of their services at every opportunity.

I recommend for the consideration of the several Public Works committees, the making of rather definite plans for proposed, needed projects, so that there may be no delay in starting work on them when the proper time comes. Our community must be ready.

A nation is but the sum total of its many communities, its many towns and cities, such as ours. It is our opportunity and responsibility to make of this City the ideal community where each citizen will have the right and the opportunity to provide



for his own welfare and happiness, and where all will cooperate for the common good.

We can do this if we hold fast and zealously guard the principles of individual liberty and human rights, which are the American way of life and which are our heritage from the founders of this nation.

We lay no claim to being a master race. It is our good fortune that the principles on which our nation was founded were laid down by men of rugged, sturdy character—men whose experience had shown them the oppression, the suffering, the lack of individual opportunity under totalitarian systems of government.

These men, from the lessons of their own experience and from lessons drawn from the experience and failures of others in attempts at free government in other lands, with great wisdom and with the help of Almighty God, wrought for us a form of government which sought to provide individual liberty and equality of opportunity for all; and they wrought, also, a constitution to guarantee the continuance of the principles upon which this government was founded. They wrought well, and though perfection has not been attained, though there is still much to be achieved, their efforts were crowned with success so far beyond what has ever been achieved elsewhere in the world, that there is no comparison.

Under this government of the people, there has been continued development of their love of freedom, of the desire to provide greater opportunity for the individual, of a spirit of independence and self-reliance, a spirit of good will and cooperation toward other men. It is because our people have these qualities and spirit in such large degree that I am so proud to be an American, a citizen of the State of New Hampshire, and of the City of Rochester.
