"Old Betsy" was Seabrook's first motorized fire truck. It was built by George Austin Weare (shown standing) who converted the 1932 Model "A" Ford into a tank and pump truck. "Old Betsy" was destroyed, along with the Passaconnaway hand tub, during the Barr and Bloomfield factory building fire in 1964.

Shown sitting on the truck is Weare's sister, Lydia Mary Weare Gould, then 16 years old. She drove the truck to a fire one day when none of the volunteer firemen came to get it. After the fire someone suggested that she drive it home and she said she shouldn't because she didn't have a driver's license!

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DEDICATION

This town report is dedicated to the memory of deceased Seabrook fire chiefs. These men served unselfishly and faithfully devoted much of their time to saving lives, protecting property and building a fire department to meet the needs of the future. It is obvious that the dedication of these men had an impact on the entire community and especially on their families. Many of their brothers, sons and grandsons have served as fire fighters and that tradition continues today. Many of their mothers, wives, sisters and daughters have served as members of the ladies' auxiliary.

DECEASED SEABROOK FIRE CHIEFS

This memorial dedication has been compiled from personal conversations with many people -- family members, firemen and friends of the chiefs -- and from information contained in town reports from 1932 to the present, as well as from news clippings, photo albums and scrapbooks loaned to the selectmen for this project. It would be a monumental task to prepare a complete history of the Seabrook Fire Department but I personally feel no better tribute could be made to all the brave fire fighters we all depend on throughout our lives.


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George Austin Weare, Fire Chief 1932 - 1933 and 1939 - 1944 Died November 11, 1979, age 72

> The town's first fire chief was appointed in 1932. Then 23 years of age, Weare was the youngest fire chief in New England. In the 1979 town report, which was dedicated to Weare, it is noted that he built the town's first motorized fire truck himself.



Frank Ashley Perkins, Fire Chief 1934 - 1938 Died February 14, 1958, age 61

Perkins was also tax collector from 1935 through 1937.



Alfred Waldo Locke Died April 19, 1955, age 43

Locke was a "temporary" chief prior to Henry Kendrick. He was issued the first Seabrook Firemen's Association membership card and the first key to the building. He was a fireman for many years and was elected a town constable several times. Locke drowned after his car went off the road and into the marsh in Hampton Falls during a high-run tide.



Henry S. Kendrick, Fire Chief 1945 - 1966 Died December 3, 1978, age 72

> Kendrick was a member of the fire department for 36 years, 22 of those as chief. At one time he was the foreman of the Passaconnaway handtub, was a fire warden for many years and was instrumental in the formation of the Seabrook Firemen's Association. During his tenure as chief his efforts to improve the department resulted in the purchase of two new trucks in 1946 and continued through the years to 1965 when a transistorized fire alarm system was installed at the fire station and in 1965 the purchase of a new tank truck was approved at town meeting. Kendrick was the son of Frank Kendrick, a long-time Amesbury fireman.



Albert M. Smith Died February 18, 1969, age 64.

> For many years "Al" Smith was an "acting chief" in the absence fire chiefs who were at work or out of town. Many people and Smith himself called him "chief". He wore a uniform, had a badge, and he went around to schools to talk with youngsters about fire prevention and safety. In 1963, Smith received a certificate of merit from the state for having served as a New Hampshire forest fire warden for 21 years before losing both legs by surgical amputation. He had been injured at Seabrook Beach while working as a police officer.



Myron Newhall Felch, Fire Chief 1957 Died October 16, 1963, age 47.

> Felch served as "acting chief" for several months during 1944-45. Sometime in the mid-1950's Chief Kendrick resigned and Felch was appointed fire chief for a short time. The 1957 town report shows payment of \$300 to Felch for "chief's salary". Felch died in the driveway of his home from a heart attack when he was returning from fighting a fire in Salisbury.

On June 28, 1957, town meeting voted to have the fire chief elected by ballot at annual town meetings.



Ronald Millard Eaton, Sr., Fire Chief 1977 - 1980 Died May 8, 1992, age 57

Eaton was elected fire chief in 1977 after having been a permanent fire fighter for four years and a call fire fighter for 24 years. He served as captain for six years and as deputy chief for nine years. Eaton was a firm believer in training, fire prevention, inspections, and utilizing the knowledge of all the firemen within the department. Eaton retired early as a permanent fire fighter in 1985 because of a health problem. He continued serving the town as chairman of the building committee and participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new fire station on May 21, 1988.

Article 2: Do you favor the continuation of the town manager plan as now in force in this town?

Article 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing zoning ordinance as proposed by the planning board which creates a wetland overlay district as follows?

ARTICLE X - Wetland Overlay District

SECTION 263-65 - Purpose: In the interest of wise land use and the public's health, safety, convenience, and welfare, the purpose of this article is:

- to encourage those land uses that can be appropriately and safely located in wetland areas;

- to protect wildlife habitat;

- to prevent the pollution of surface waters and groundwater;

- to prevent the destruction of wetlands which provide flood protection and storm water storage, recharge of groundwater supply, and augmentation of stream flow during dry periods;

- to prevent inharmonious use of wetlands which would cause excessive or untimely expenses to the Town.

SECTION 263-66 - Wetlands Defined: Wetlands are those areas having Poorly Drained Soils or Very Poorly Drained Soils, as designated by the National Cooperative Soil Survey conducted by the Soil Conservation Service, USDA.

SECTION 263-67 - District Boundaries: The Wetland Overlay District encompasses all Poorly Drained Soils and Very Poorly Drained Soils in the Town of Seabrook. In all cases where the requirements of this article are inconsistent with the requirements of another zoning district, the district regulations which are the more restrictive shall apply.

BECTION 263-68 - Wetlands Delineated: Wetland areas shall be identified by a High Intensity Soil Survey

conducted by Soil Scientist who is certified by the State of New Hampshire.

SECTION 263-69 - Permitted Uses on Poorly Drained Soils: The following uses are permitted on Poorly Drained Soils:

A - Forestry, tree farming & agriculture;

B - Wildlife habitat development and management;

C - Parks and recreation uses that are consistent with the purposes of this article.

D - Conservation areas and nature trails;

E - Driveways serving single-family and two-family dwellings;

F - Single-Family and Two-Family Dwellings, and accessory buildings such as garages and tool sheds.

SECTION 263-70 - Permitted Uses on Very Poorly Drained Soils: All uses detailed above in Section 263-69 A thru E are permitted on Very Poorly Drained Soils.

SECTION 263-71 - Prohibited Uses: All uses that are not specifically permitted in Sections 263-69 & 263-70 above are prohibited. Prohibited uses include multi-family dwellings, commercial development, and industrial development.

SECTION 263-72 - Roadways: No roadway shall be constructed over wetlands until a Conditional Use Permit for same is obtained from the Seabrook Planning Board. The Planning Board shall grant such a permit only upon finding that all of the following conditions are met:

A - The proposed construction is essential to the productive use of non-wetland areas;

B - No alternative route is available, i.e. alternative routes that would have a less detrimental impact on wetlands;

C - Permits from the NH Wetlands Board and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers are submitted to the Planning Board, or evidence that such permits are not required. **SECTION 263-73 - Adequate erosion control measures** shall be maintained before, during, and after construction. The Seabrook Planning Board shall determine which measures are to be considered adequate on a given site.

Meeting called to order by Moderator Charles H. Felch Sr.

Warrant read at Town Election.

New law on RECONSIDERATION: 40:10 explained and read by Moderator Charles H. Felch Sr.

Salute to flag led by Lydia M. Gould.

Non-voters must sit on left hand side of hall.

Sponsor of article will be called on first to explain their article.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund town notes.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Frederick Moulton Jr. to adopt Article 4 as read. ARTICLE 4 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Donna L. Smith to adopt Article 5 as read. ARTICLE 5 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by William Hale, to adopt Article 6 as read. ARTICLE 6 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 7: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the board of selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the board of selectmen.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by John Yell, to adopt Article 7 as read. ARTICLE 7 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Municipal Capital Reserve Sewer Fund (\$6,464,898.59), the Municipal Capital Reserve Building Fund (\$2,563,957.78), and the Municipal Capital Reserve Motor Vehicle Fund (\$809,252.45). Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the town's general fund.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Frederick Moulton to adopt Article 8 as read. This Article explained by Selectmen and Town Manager.

After much discussion question moved by Francis Thibodeau, second by Frederick Moulton. ARTICLE 8 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Million Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$17,250,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying the judgements against the town in tax abatement actions for the years 1983-1986 by the owners of the Seabrook Nuclear Generating Facility, and to authorize the use/transfer of the fund balance in the amount of Seventeen Million Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$17,250,000.00) Dollars for this purpose and to authorize the selectmen to take all necessary action to carry out said payment.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Fred Chase, to adopt Article 9 as read.

Amendment to Article 9 by Donna L. Smith. second by Richard Keefe, to add GENERAL before fund. AMENDMENT ADOPTED.

Amendment by Timothy Willis, second by Richard Keefe, to add after to - carry out said payment with the agreement offered at this Town Meeting as read. AMENDMENT ADOPTED. ARTICLE 9 ADOPTED WITH TWO AMENDMENTS.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to rescind the authority granted by the 1988 town meeting approving Article 14 of the 1988 warrant authorizing the withdrawal of Four Million (\$4,000,000.00) Dollars from the municipal sewer capital reserve fund.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Donna L. Smith, to adopt Article 10 as read. ARTICLE 10 ADOPTED AS READ.

Motion by Timothy Willis, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to reconsider Article 9 at this time. We urge the people to vote no on this motion. This motion is so no one will ever be able to reconsider Article 9. MOTION DEFEATED.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of engineering, construction, land acquisition and studies associated with the ongoing plans for the construction of municipal sewers and pumping stations, road reconstruction, drainage improvements and appurtenances related thereto, and for the funding of eminent domain procedures as necessary for land takings, and to appoint the selectmen as agents for the town for the purposes of expending said funds.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Francis Warcewicz, to adopt Article 11 as read. ARTICLE 11 ADOPTED AS READ.

Moderator Charles H. Felch Sr. now announces that we will go to Articles 24 & 25 at this time.

Article 24: On petition of Charlotte K. Marshall and two hundred thirty-nine (239) other legal voters of the town: To see if the voters of the town will appropriate a sum of Two Million Three Hundred Thousand (\$2,300,000.00) Dollars to construct a new town library. The sum includes One Million Six Hundred Eighty Thousand (\$1,680,000.00) Dollars for construction of the building, plus Three Hundred Eighty Thousand (\$380,000.00) Dollars to adequately furnish and equip the facility, with the balance for related expenses.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Charlotte K. Marshall, second by Eric N. Small, to adopt Article 24 as read. Amendment by Eric N. Small, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to add the following sentence: "Construction of the new library shall not begin until voters accept the design of the new building at a speciel town meeting." AMENDMENT ADOPTED.

ARTICLE 24 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 12: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars as the total cost of a Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grant, to apply for Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars from the state and federal government as the fifty (50%) percent match to the above grant. BOARD OF SELECTMEN/TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT - 1992

We are pleased to be able to provide you with the following report summarizing the events and activities of 1992:

The year saw normal growth activity in the residential area while several large commercial projects such as Wal-Mart and Sam's were completed.

The actual expenditures for 1992 were under the amount appropriated while revenues were higher allowing for a reduction in the tax rate. We reached an agreement with the power plant (North Atlantic Energy Service Corporation) concerning the tax abatement litigation, which saved the town a large refund.

The state approved a \$50,000 grant for the restoration of the dunes which the town voted to match in the March town meeting. The town plans to start construction in March, 1993, with the final phase to be completed in the fall/winter of 1993/1994. The state has authorized funds for dredging the harbor which should be completed in April, 1993.

The Community Action Program office has been temporarily relocated and a project has been initiated to restore the Sanborn School on Rte. 1. The Community Action Program staff in conjunction with the town personnel have initiated a grant proposal to upgrade the building as a human services facility while maintaining its historic appearance.

The sewer construction project is on target to start construction in 1993.

We would like to thank our former Town Manager Steven Clark for his dedication to the town over the last four years and wish him luck in his future endeavors.

This board would like to encourage your participation in Seabrook's government. This can be accomplished by serving as a volunteer on many committees which town government has, or attending meetings and voicing your input on how you would like to see us function. The office of the selectmen and town manager is here to serve you. Please let us know how we can improve our service.

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

It becomes apparent from viewing the examples shown in the charts, that the Utility Valuations are crucial to the financial structure and outlook for the Town of Seabrook.

Utility Valuations Primarily Consider: Finance, Accounting, Economic Theory and Investment Appraisal Theory. Based upon the "EXPERT APPRAISER" the Valuation outcome can vary considerably from one value to another; even into many many MILLIONS of DOLLARS difference.

But the future outlook for the utilities is good and no drastic valuation changes are expected in the near future.

TOWN VALUATION:

The Real Estate Market seems to have leveled off at the low end of the recession values. At the present time, there is inadequate market data to support a conclusion that the market is either growing or continuing to decline. The months ahead may produce data which will give a better indication for a valuation projection down or up.

NEW CONSTRUCTION AND ADDITIONS TO CONSTRUCTION: "WAL-MART AND SAM'S" have been the major growth areas for construction, but there has also been other new construction and quite a bit of additions to present construction. Considering the general state of the economy, Seabrook growth did very well.

ANNUAL RE-VALUATION:

The Assessing Department is still maintaining the policy (and work load) of keeping property values at 100% of Market each year.








SEABROOK BEACH VILLAGE DISTRICT BUILDING INSPECTOR'S REPORT - 1992


1992 was an active year at the Beach Precinct seeing Charles M. Kaslow appointed as permanent Building Inspector and completion of a thorough reorganization and computerization of office's records. During the year the Precinct also became an associate member of the NHMA making its resources available to this office.

To heighten home owner awareness of zoning requirements, a mailing of the District's Zoning Ordinance to each property owner of record was completed in December. Also during December, in conjunction with the NH Office of Emergency Management a review was instituted of the Precinct with respect to Flood Control Regulations to ensure the community's continued eligibility for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program. During the month of July a photographic record and review of all waterfront properties was completed in cooperation with the NH Coastal Program.

The cooperation of home owners during 1992 has been very much appreciated.

1992 was an active year for Emergency Management. A new fax machine was installed in the Emergency Operating Center. This has been an asset to both the Fire Department and this Office.

Several training exercises were conducted regarding the Radiological Emergency Response Plan. The training sessions were held prior to a Federal Graded Exercise in June. The graded exercise was very successful and we received high grades.

Several hazardous material spills occured in 1992. All were handled with professionalism by the Town Departments and private Waste and Spill Companies. I would also like to thank the North Atlantic Energy Service Corporation for their expert manpower and equipment when assisting the Town with the large fuel spill on Dec.29th, 1992.

Meetings were held each month involving our Local Emergency Response Committee. This committee consists of all the local Companies that are hazardous material generators and also store large quantities of chemicals. As a result of these meetings training was offered to front line responders, and all were invited to the Companies to tour their buildings and property. This is beneficial to our front line responders.

The town Dive Team has been active this year, they are still training through-out the year to keep up their expertise.

Special needs people who need information or would like to fill out or update the survey forms should call this office at 474-5772.

This office is looking for two responsible people to be involved with the Radiological Emergency Response Plan, to be trained at the Newington Incident Field Office by the New Hampshire Emergency Management Office. They would represent the Town of Seabrook during any radiological emergency incident.

Again, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, Fire Chief, Police Chief, Water Superintendent, Road Agent, and all the Emergency Responders and volunteers that assisted in making this Office of our Town Government a success.

Fire Department - Annual Report for 1992

The Fire Department is dedicating this report to the memory of Ronald M. Eaton Sr. who passed away this year on May 8th. Ron dedicated most of his life to the Fire Department working his way up through the ranks. He was Fire Chief during the years of 1977-1980. Ron retired in 1984 and he is sadly missed by our Department.

As a result of town meeting appropriations and lengthy meetings with several venders, a contract has been signed with Simon/Ladder Trucks Inc. (L.T.I.). The ladder truck committee consisted of the following Fire Department personnel- Captain Clarence Fowler, Captain David Downs, Firefighter Horatio Lattime, Firefighter Everett Strangman, and myself. All worked hard and long to put together specifications we feel will best suit the Town of Seabrook. Delivery is expected in mid May of 1993. It will be a piece of apparatus for all of us to be proud of.

As a result of town meeting appropriations the Fire Department awarded the bid for two (2) defibrillators, delivery is expected soon. This is advanced modern equipment to better serve the townspeople.

Firefighter training is on going with some of the call and reserve firefighters. Training is conducted by Firefighter Jeffrey Brown. A Haz-Mat course was held at the Bailey Corporation facility this December. Captains Ronald Eaton Jr, David Downs, and Firefighter Jeffrey Brown attended, along with other area business employees. Several extinguisher classes have been held at various businesses this year, conducted by Captain Furmer Eaton.

Fire Safety classes are on going at the School for the students in grades 1 to 6. Tours and classes were held at the Station for the Day Care and Kindergarten children. These classes are now being conducted by Firefighter Stanley Saracy III.

Smokey the Bear was at the School on April 1st. to teach grades 1-4 how to prevent Forest Fires. This was accomplished through the N.H. State Forestry Department, at our request. The teacher was Lee Gardner, Forest Ranger.

A Firefighters exam was held in mid July to establish an eligibility list to draw from if the need arises in the future. There were fifty seven (57) applicants. The exam was conducted by the N.H. Fire Standards and Training Department.

A weather monitor was installed at the Dispatch console this year. This will be a great asset to the Department in determining weather conditions and wind directions. This plays a very important role to us, especially at a Haz-Mat incident.

Fire Alarm cable work was completed at Seabrook Beach and South Main Street earlier this year and is now back in service.

A hose testing program has been established this year with bad results. We are finding that a lot of our hose is old and will not pass the required pressure test. As a result of this I will be putting an article in the town warrant to purchase new hose and fittings, your support would be greatly appreciated. Again, as always, my personal thanks to all the Fire personnel of this Department, and the surrounding towns, all other Departments of this town, and you- the townspeople- for your continued support.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT - 1992

1992 has been a year of waiting for approvals to start the sewer project. We have received the long awaited EPA permit for the ocean discharge and as soon as the Corp of Engineers issues our final permit for the plant site we can begin this much needed project. The urgency to get the sewer system operational as soon as possible is high lighted by recent changes in the states regulations for repairs to the hundreds of existing septic systems and the large expense of complying with the new requirements.

The testing the state has done on the river has shown levels of coliform too high to reopen the clam flats and the pollution in our streams is still with us.

BROWN LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 1992

The Library's building expansion program is now well underway - and this is the big story for the year 1992. Yes, this year was a momentous one at Brown Library for in March at the Annual Town Meeting the voters supported funding for a new building, and in October at the Special Town Meeting again the voters overwhelmingly approved of the plans and design of the project.

Other aspects of the year have been fairly typical. Library usage is up once again. The annual Book Sale was held thanks to many generous donations of materials from the public and to those who purchased items at same. The Library once again sponsored a booth at Seabrook's Old Home Days, this year an informative one depicting the expansion project. The Friends of Brown Library were active - chiefly providing support for the Building Project. Additionally, the Library's spirited Book Discussion Group continued to meet monthly - providing its participants with both a rewarding intellectual as well as social experience. Children's programs remained a focal point of the Library's activities with both an active summer program and a year-long schedule of story hours and special events.

But the real story is the new building. Currently, preparations are being made to clear the Centennial Street site, final design plans are all but completed and construction documents are being worked on by the architects. The project is slated to go out for bid in March of 1993 and the opening ceremonies should be held in April of 1994.

Although it has proved difficult to continue to uninterruptedly provide the level of Library service that the public has come to expect of Brown Library while planning for and working on the expansion project, the Library Staff has risen to the occasion and is to be commended for accomplishing just that. Stanley A. Hamel Stanley A. Hamel, Treasurer Field work began on April 6th with surveillance of freshwater mosquito breeding sites created by snow melt and spring rains. Treatment of areas found to support mosquito larvae (aquatic stages) commenced a week later. Following the monthly "high-run" tide and 3.2" of rain in two days, salt marsh site surveillance and larvaciding treatments began on April 20th. Treatments of breeding sites continued throughout the summer after heavy rainfalls (and in the case of the saltmarshes) after the monthly "high-run" tides which reactivate these areas. This year, Field Assistant Derek Griggs returned for his sixth season working for the department.

The adulticiding phase (evening spraying of the town with the spray truck) got underway on June 3rd and continued through Sept. 17th. Adulticiding was accomplished on 42 separate nights throughout the season. Up until July 12, 1992, the Town was adulticided over two nights (east & west routes). After this date the Town was split into 3 sections (west, central, south) for better coverage during mosquitos peak activity time (the hours around dusk). Scourge (tm) adulticide (active ingredient: resmethrin) was used in the Leco Ultra Low Volume sprayer at 10 mph.

Adult mosquito population monitoring was accomplished using 3 CDC light traps baited with CO₂. As in the past eight years, specimens were trapped, counted, and identified. After four straight years of high mosquito populations (directly related to heavy seasonal rainfall) 1992 monitoring showed considerably lower population levels, overall. A relatively dry spring (only 1.45" rain in May) led to lower mosquito populations throughout the summer. There were some heavy weeks, however, for the saltmarsh species <u>Aedes</u> sollicitans (a vicious,daytime biter) following the monthly "high-run" tides, but this species overall numbers were down for this year. Over 50% fewer specimens were trapped and identified than in 1991.

With the help of a Highway Dept. truck, 100 greenhead fly traps were placed along the edges of the saltmarsh. These flies are attracted to the shade of the traps, fly up inside and are trapped in the screened-in section where they die of dehydration. Each trap catches literally thousands of these viciousbiting flies before they can reach upland areas.

ANIMAL CONTROL DIVISION REPORT - 1992

The animal control officer ends another busy year.

With 1993 coming, and the real danger of rabies coming into our state and town this year, the most important thing you as a pet owner can do to protect the lives of your pet and family members is to get a rabies shot for either your cat or dog. If you get bitten by an animal, whether it is a pet or wild animal, seek medical attention immediately. Again, I stress to you -- DO NOT feed wild animals or any other animal that is not yours. It may be carrying many kinds of diseases which may also include the rabies virus.

This year, we were unable to adequately control the feral cat problem mainly due to state law not addressing this troublesome animal.

The rabies clinic held in May, 1992 was not as successful as anticipated. Only 62 dogs were presented and unfortunately, only 48 cats received their rabies vaccination.

As pet owners, you should care enough about these "members of your family" to tie them up and thereby avoid the sad news "your pet will never come home again". Securing your dogs would also save you the cost of being fined if your dog is picked up wandering the streets. It could further save you kennel fees for the security of your pet.

Amend chapter 254-2, section B, by deleting the words "from the office of the Selectmen" after "obtained" and adding instead "at the Town Hall".

Amend chapter 254-2, section D, by changing it to read "All permits will be renewed anually in conjunction with motor vehicle registrations".

These amendments shall be effective upon passage.

Article 15: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 254 of the Seabrook Code entitled Waste Disposal as follows:

Amend chapter 254 by adding the following section and to renumber the chapter accordingly:

254-5. Violations and penalties.

The following penalties are hereby imposed for violations of this article:

A. Thirty (30) days loss of privilege for the use of the town waste transfer station, and for each subsequent violation twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars fine.

B. Illegal entry and/or use of the town waste transfer station can result in arrest for criminal trespass (RSA 635-2).

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic as follows:

Amend Article III, Parking Restrictions, chapter 249-10, Violations and Penalties, A., by adding "at the owner's expense." after the word "towing" at the end of the section.

Amend Article II, Parking Restrictions, chapter 249-10, Violations and Penalties, B., by adding "if the parked vehicle impedes or interferes with proper public safety and traffic control" at the end of the section.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 152 of the Seabrook Code entitled Dogs as follows:

1. Amend section 152.12 by changing the word "dog" to the word "animal".

152-12. Animal bites.

A. Whenever any animal bites a person, the owner of said animal shall immediately notify the chief of police, who shall order the animal held on the owner's premises or it shall be impounded for a period of two (2) weeks.

B. The animal shall be examined immediately after it has bitten anyone and again at the end of the two-week period by a qualified veterinarian.

C. If, at the end of the period of confinement, the veterinarian is convinced that the animal is free from rabies, the animal shall be released from quarantine or from the pound as the case may be. If the animal dies in the meanwhile, its head shall be sent to the State Department of Health for examination for rabies.

2. Amend section 152-3 by adding the categories of goat, fowl and swine.

152-3. Running at large.

It shall be unlawful to permit any dog, goat, fowl or swine to run at large at any time.

3. Amend section 152-10 by adding the category of cat.

152-10. Redemption of impounded dogs or cats.

The owner or keeper of any dog or cat impounded hereunder may redeem the same by paying all assessed costs, charges and penalties that have accrued up to the time of making the redemption. A current cat or dog rabies vaccination certificate and a valid dog license must be shown at the time of redemption. When the above requirements are met, the dog or cat shall be released to its owner.

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of engineering, construction, land acquisition and studies associated with the ongoing plans for the construction of municipal sewers and pumping stations, road reconstruction, drainage improvements and appurtenances related thereto, and for the funding of eminent domain procedures as necessary for land takings, and to appoint the selectmen as agents for the town for the purposes of expending said funds.

During the compilation of criminal statistics for 1992 it was noticeable that although the number of new cases received increased by forty-five [45%] percent [833 cases in 1991 - 1519 cases in 1992], the felony crimes still constituted approximately one [1/3] third of the whole [496 in 1991 - 429 in 1992]. Although the felony issues we faced were slightly lower, the violence of many remained high. The tragedy of this years homicide of a local businessman required many months of intense investigation. We take this opportunity to thank the N.H. State Police Major Crime Division for its assistance in this matter. Violent activities, unfortunately, continue and obviously require a more expeditious response. There is still no doubt that the socially crippling drug subculture continues to take its toll criminally and; as was noted in last years report, clearly the economic condition of the country has played a critical part in the continuation of property crimes as well.

The detective devision continues to be staffed by only two officers - Det. James Cawley and myself. Det. Cawley's continuing efforts have certainly allowed us to maintain a reasonable response to most of the case load. Unfortunately, we lost Det. Cawley to the National Guard for the humanitarian effort in Somalia, fortunately, he has returned and is continuing with his efforts. Of the one thousand five hundred nineteen [1519] new cases noted this year, one thousand three hundred seventy one [1371] cases required further investigation or follow-up. Of the one thousand three hundred seventy one [1371] cases, one thousand twenty seven [1027] cases were ultimately cleared by arrest, indictment, unfounded status or exceptional means [for a clearance rate of approximately 74.9%] - the remaining three hundred forty-four [344] cases are still open/pending or suspended. It should be noted that the clearance rate for crimes against persons shows over ninety [90%] percent. This is not inclusive of the two hundred eleven [211] cases which still remained under investigation from 1991.

We brought forty-two [42] indictments to the Grand Jury of the Rockingham Superior Court and received forty-one [41] True Bills with one [1] case being remanded to the District Court level.

In many instances throughout the year, we have found ourselves involved in cases involving multiple agencies local, state and federal. The cooperation between our agency and others has certainly positively influenced the clearance of criminal activity in all locales. This writer continues to be active in the interviewing and investigation of cases in which children have been allegedly physically or sexually abused and/or seriously neglected. My continued activity in this area has been largely due to the recent transfer of juvenile officers [continued training] and the case load with which the Youth Services Division was faced this year [nearly tripling the number of cases from 1991]. Officer James Deshaies has spent his first full year as Y.S.O. and has adapted admirably to the task. His rapport and positive influence with the children has been noted and his participation within the school system has resulted in much positive input from teachers.

Our Prosecutor, Melissa Walker continued to handle all cases which found themselves within the Hampton District Court. During the course of the year, Off. Walker has maintained all of her duties [inclusive of all clerical requirements] as well as having been very active in the in-house computer system which went on-line this very year in May. This additional responsibility has been quite time-consuming; however, she is continuing as systems administrator for the department. Her responses to crises with the new machinery have been consistent and helpful.

The Investigations Division continues to process, control, transport and secure all evidentiary and/or possessed property. We are additionally responsible for security of all major crime scenes and the collection [as well as possible processing] of latent evidence. This Division acts in a liaison/advisor/assistance capacity to the Patrol Division with cases on which they will be following up as well as coordinating efforts between this agency and outside law enforcement agencies.

Once again, we must make note of the excellent job being done by the Patrol Division. Their diligence and dedication to their jobs have resulted in recoveries of property, much needed intelligence and first responder security of scenes pending our arrival. Further, officers within the Patrol Division have followed up on cases of their own with success. This coordinated effort has resulted in clearances of many cases as well as arrests and/or indictments. The Investigations Division clearly would suffer greatly without the consistent input and assistance of Patrol. We are very pleased with the return of our department's drug officer - Sgt. Mark Preston. Sgt. Preston's return from Task Force Duties has resulted in his bringing a great deal of knowledge in this area to the department and we look forward to a more effective impact on the drug problem in our town. The Animal Control Officer's position is part-time within this Division. A.C.O. Jeffrey Baillargeon's report will show an obvious increase in calls consistent with other areas of this Division. In the face of limited time on duty, Jeff continually responds to assist in animalrelated situations. His tenacity in his job has certainly had a positive effect on the community at large and we look forward to his continuing with the Seabrook Police Department in the future.

The Investigations Division handles administrative duties pertinent to all felony criminal cases handled through this office as well as records keeping for NCIC [National/Statewide Criminal Network], responses to inquiries, etc... This writer remained active through most of the year with the State Incident Based Reporting System Committee which is preparing the standardized statewide reporting IBRS system in New Hampshire. Det. Cawley has taken over the completion, maintenance and appropriate distribution [federal/state/in-house] of fingerprints for us. We continue to respond to crime scenes [where applicable] in order to process those scenes for evidentiary/forensic items, latent prints, etc... All of these activities require manpower hours to accomplish and do NOT include all aspects of the clerical requirements which we handle exclusively. This is primarily due to there being no clerical staff for the Investigations/Prosecution or Youth Services Divisions. This writer further reviews ALL initial investigation reports submitted within the department for status assignments.

This writer supervises the activities of the Investigations, Prosecution and Youth Services Divisions as well as Animal Control. We are also active in the inhouse training of new officers as well as some in-service training. Officer Walker continues to volunteer her time to train officers at the New Hampshire Standards and Training Facility in Concord, N. H. as well. All of the officers in these divisions are cross-trained so that they can fill in for each other in one's absence.

Last year, we installed a crime line for confidential informants. Although this line is not funded and no one receives money for calling, we have found that we do receive calls and the information is often of consequence. We hope that as our community awakens to the need for a joint effort between police and civilians, this line will be used on a regular basis. It is clear that many of our citizens are realizing the need to get involved in crime prevention and police follow-up in order to more firmly establish a safe and secure environment. We look forward to 1993 to be even more challenging. this division has been quite fortunate over the past year or so to have obtained equipment which affords us the opportunity to more professionally and successfully follow-up in evidentiary/latent matters. It is natural, however, that in light of the increase in case load, we hope to add to our staffing in order to more effectively serve the town.

YOUTH SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1992

This has been a most challenging year for the Youth Services Division which experienced a marked increase in total case load compared to last year. This increase in activity is consistent with increases shown throughout the Services Division. It should be noted that the entirety of the Seabrook Police Department's Patrol Division offered continued assistance in dealing with criminal activity and although the number of court cases increased as well, we still maintain our position on attempting out-of-court diversions, mediation options and developing positive input with parents and school in order that difficulties may be addressed in all arenas.

In the face of these activities, this division continues to see a positive effect on our children by virtue of the efforts of the entire Seabrook Police Department to be more than enforcers. We are pleased with the response we are met with by children who understand that police are also friends and care-givers.

Some of this divisions collective preventative efforts have included fingerprinting of young children, continuation of department programs such as "Hug-A-Bear" and "Adopt-A-Cop" as well as programs within the school i.e. "Officer Phil Safety Program" and last but certainly not least, the continuation of the D.A.R.E. program.

The D.A.R.E. curriculum was presented this year by Sgt. Michael Frost within the Seabrook Elementary School, pending this writer's completion of the D.A.R.E. training program. This program has been met with such a profoundly positive reception, it will certainly remain a part of the Seabrook Police Department's proactive planning for the youths of the town. We thank Sgt. Frost for his continued commitment to the children and the program during this transition period.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the business community of Seabrook for their support, not only for the D.A.R.E. program, but for their willingness to afford space for the fingerprinting of children, bicycle registrations, etc.

NOTE: A bicycle registration is planned to be held during the month of May, 1993. Please check your local newspapers for specific dates, times and locations. Although this Division must continue with its role of investigatory responsibilities and the protection of abused, neglected or exploited children as well as delinquent youth, our focus is on the positive development of our children - the early interaction between the police department, schools, parents and these children. We see this as the most beneficial avenue we can take for our children to help guide them away from the dangers that may await them.

This Division would like to envision its future role as proactive rather than reactive and we will continue to work towards that end.

1992 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are: Vernon Small, Chairman; William Moore, Jr., Vice Chairman; Charlotte Dow, Secretary; Rosemary Eaton, Parks Department; Asa Knowles, Selectmen; Elliot Eaton and Salvatore Rubera. The administrative staff of the Seabrook Recreation Department are Sandra Beaudoin, Director of Recreation and Edward Pickard, Assistant Director.

The Recreation Commission and Staff continue to provide many of the favorite established programs and leisure services for Seabrook residents of all ages. Year after year, the Recreation Department has been subjected to budget cuts during budget reviews. The year 1992 was no different, again it took the staff and volunteers dedicated efforts to meet most of recreational interests as in the past. The parent volunteers are constantly donating their efforts to fund raise and cover the cost that the recreation department is unable to fund. department's chance to grow was limited in 1992, but some new programs and special events were added which included a Gingerbread House Craft Workshop, RSVP Social, Sr. Citizen Awareness Day, Youth Soccer Team, trip to the Circus and others. The variety and number of programs are displayed further within this report.

Projects for the year of 1992 included purchasing a new copier for the Community Center to replace the old copier which was breaking down often. To aid in making the center more comfortable during cold and hot days, four adjustable ceiling fans were installed in the lobby area of the Community Center. The department also purchased two more sections to add to the portable staging for the Center's gymnasium to be used by pageants and special events. The Center's two single bathrooms were reconditioned with new wall material which should be easier to maintain. Annually, the Center is shut down for two maintenance weeks to help keep up the Community Center, in which great pride is taken by all those involved.

RECYCLING FEASIBILITY STUDY COMMITTEE

The recycling committee wants to thank Steve Clark for his assistance and efforts in developing a recycling program. We have two new members -- Russ Bailey, new town manager, and Jim Fuller.

The recycling committee is proposing several warrant articles for the 1993 town meeting. There is new legislation in Massachusetts that requires communities to have a recycling program for cans and bottles by April Since we send our waste to Ogden-Martin in 1993. Haverhill, we will also be impacted. Due to this legislation and the overall need for a program, we are again asking everyone to support funding for a recycling program. We have proposed two options, one, a recycling program that will provide curbside pickup of newspaper, aluminum/steel cans, glass and some plastics. This would be a one year contract with a private company who would collect and process all of the materials at a maximum first year cost of \$110,000.

The second option would be a curbside collection program of the same materials as option 1 except this would be a town operated program including the collection and processing at a maximum first year cost of \$137,000.

We hope that enough people will support one of these options as the town needs a recycling program which will meet the requirements of present and future regulations, reduce our costs at Ogden- Martin and meet our commitment to the environment.

SEWER COMMITTEE

Construction on the town-wide sewage system has been scheduled to start in April 1993. This has come about through the efforts of all involved to obtain the EPA NPDES and the Army Corp of Engineers 404 permits. The Massachusetts CZM finally signed off on our project in October of 1992 and the EPA followed closely behind with approval of their discharge permit in November 1993.

There will be ten contracts covering the construction of the plant, outfall pipe, pump stations and overall collection system. The easement sub-committee has been busy contacting residents and businesses to obtain approval to construct the collection system pipe through their properties. Our plan is to have the entire collection system installed by the time the waste treatment plant is operational and ready to receive effluent. This means that construction activity will be almost continuous in some part of the town during the next 3-4 years.

We plan to request an additional \$5,000,000 in 1993 as planned and our original finance projections are on target. We will start the bonding in 1993 to ensure sufficient cash flow during 1994-1995. The project will also include drainage improvements and paving of all town roads upon completion of the construction.

During construction there will be some inconvenience due to trenching and road reconstruction causing traffic delays. We will do everything we can to minimize these items, but would ask for everyone's cooperation and patience. This project is very important to the town of Seabrook and upon completion it will provide for an infrastructure that will meet our future needs and provide for economic growth.

The welfare budget has spent an aggregate of \$73,659.00 which is an over draft of \$1,812.00 and has received a total of \$9,430.00. The monies received on welfare is the result of the persons receiving assistance and repaying the town's general fund through agreements, court actions, assignments and/or liens.

Again the New Hampshire economy has a direct effect on welfare budgets. It would be redundant for me to address this in my report, and the whole economy here in New Hampshire portends it will worsen. The agencies which help in indigent cases are all operating on less monies and town welfare is the last resort.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT - 1992

The conservation commission has not been required to be as involved this past year as it has in previous years. However, with the expected change in the economy and town projects that are in the planning stages, such as the town sewerage system, the Cains Brook project and possible plans to clean up and put back to its original state, Chases Pond which is located in the rear of the community center.

There are also many other progressive plans to utilize questionable areas of the town. The town has already put into motion the dunes restoration project at Seabrook Beach and is anticipating making use of the spoils from the dredging of Seabrook-Hampton Harbor to rebuild that natural barrier as protection from severe ocean storms.

The commission is aware of requests being made to the New Hampshire Wetlands Board by owners of the beach front properties, to place rip-rap and sand on the beach front north of Hooksett Street to correct serious erosion from recent storms and protect valuable property. The property owners have requested this at their own expense.

It looks like a busy year ahead and the commission will be prepared to deal with conservation matters.

Cable Franchise Agreement Committee

In July of 1992 the Board of Selectman formed a cable franchise agreement committee. The newly appointed members were William E. Kelly, James C. Falconer, Tracy Dow, Robert Tiffany, and Charles A. Polito Jr.

This Committee is charged with the responsibility of negotiating a successor franchise agreement and/or an alternative agreement with Continental Cablevision. The current agreement is due to expire in 1995. Federal law requires that the initiation of negotiations of a successor agreement begin 30 to 36 months before the current agreement expires.

In the beginning of the renewal process things move along slowly, there are rules and regulations and Federal guidelines to follow. As I write this, the first steps in the process have been taken by forming the Committee, meeting with Continental Cablevision, and also having the first of two public hearings. This first hearing was to review the past performance of Continental Cablevision in the Town. Approximately thirty Townspeople attended this meeting. The majority of the comments made were that Continential Cablevision had been doing a good job in answering complaint calls, and in their service calls to customers. Most of the complaints addressed to the Committee were of subscribers having poor reception or that the cable company did not provide certain programs, such as CPAN fulltime or the Monitor channel for example.

We as a Committee are dedicated to seeing that the Town of Seabrook is provided with the best cable system feasible, and when new technology is developed it will be incorporated into our system as soon as possible, and also that the subscribers get the most value for their money.

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager Town of Seabrook Seabrook, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of Seabrook as of and for the year ended December 31, 1991, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Assets Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Seabrook as of December 31, 1991, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town as of December 31, 1991, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

1992 WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There were 463,219,114 gallons of water pumped in 1992. This 16,586,858 gallon increase over the previous year was due to the increase in both the domestic and industrial-commercial use.

Industrial-commercial use increased from 126,496,670 gallons in 1991 to 130,433,526 gallons in 1992. Five commercial meters were added with Wal-Mart, Shaws, and Sam's Club using 1.5, 1.0, and .9 million gallons respectively. While Seabrook Station had a 3.5 million gallon decrease, Bailey Co., Spherex, K.J. Quinn and Dexter Hysol had increases of 2.6, 1.2, 1.0 and 0.4 million gallons respectively.

Only 12 water services were installed in 1992. Of these three were commercial including a minor sub-division off Weare Road, the Banana Tree, and a 10 lot sub-division off Whittier Drive.

Four fire hydrants were repaired after being damaged by motor vehicles. The hydrants were located on Railroad Avenue, Route One, Folly Mill Road, and Riley Road.

Several leaks were reported last year but only a few had to be repaired by the crew. The larger of these were 2" mains on River Street and Adams Avenue, a 6" main on Causeway Street and we assisted with an 8" main at the Bailey Company.

At our rock well pump station off Route 107, we updated some of the equipment by replacing all 4 water meters and recorders.

Gravel packed well #4, off Ledge Road, was cleaned by Hydro Group of Dracut MA.

Water mains and services were located and marked for test boring pertaining to the upcoming sewer project.

All the water mains in town were flushed twice, once in May and again in December. Also in December the Route 107 water standpipe was drained and chlorinated.

The crew observed the installation, flushing, testing, and chlorinating of an 8" water main, with 10 services and 2 fire hydrants to a sub-division off Whittier Drive.

We have completed the first round of water sampling for levels of lead and copper in the drinking water. This was accomplished in December with the town submitting samples with the help of 41 home owners who participated. The results showed that Seabrook's water fell well below EPA maximum limit standards and the town will not have to take any corrective measures.

The crew assisted Hydro Group of Dracut, MA in a pilot program at the Gruhn contamination site in Hampton Falls. Water contaminated with Trichlore Ethylene and Tetrachlore Ethylene was pumped and cleaned through a stripping tower erected on the property. This program lasted about three weeks. Through our engineers, Whitman and Howard of Wellsley, MA., we will be doing more extensive work in the near future at this site.

Whitman and Howard of Wellsley, MA., also engineered the drilling and developing of a new 12", 500' deep rock well. A & W Artesian Well Co. Woonsocket, RI accomplished the drilling. Site and road work was completed by the water department crew. Preliminary reports show this well is of a good quality and quantity. When approved by the State of NH, a new pump station will be constructed.

Again we would like to thank everyone for observing our partial water ban which was imposed over the summer months. This ban limited outside use of water except between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. and between 7:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Hopefully the new well and pump station when constructed will eliminate a future ban.

Remember water is a precious and useful resource and should be used wisely and not wastefully.
