THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to gravel the Town Hall yard.
4. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$56.24.
5. To see what action the Town will take relative to the Post Office Building, so called. Raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for road construction, raise and appropriate money for same.
7. To see if the Town will vote to use the Australian ballot for the election of Town Officers.
8. To see if the Town will vote a 3% discount on such part of Taxes as are paid on or before August 15th.
9. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
10. To see if the Town will vote to close Stratham Lane, so called, from Portsmouth Ave., to Greenland line Providing, Greenland votes to close their end.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

It gives me pleasure to submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the nineteenth in the series.

The statistical tables with this report have several points of special interest at the present time and, I hope, will convey information often asked for by interested tax payers or parents. The information furnished by Table I is, to some extents a matter of common knowledge but is made general in this definite way. We are required by law to put into our register each year certain statistical information such as Table II contains. The history of the Stratham Schools for the past ten years is told in the same language in Table III which records the enrollment of the last school year as the smallest in the last ten years. It is of interest to call attention here to the fact that the local enrollment of the current year is sixty eight. New Hampshire contains two hundred and forty-one districts, large and small, and, of course, with varying school costs. In Monroe, designated No. I (see Table VI), we find the lowest cost; Alstead is No. 241, having the highest cost. It will be noted that Stratham stood, last year, No. 140 in this range, next to the lowest in Union 16. Stratham's place in the range in recent years is shown in Table V. Table IV furnishes an interesting comparison of Stratham with the districts associated with her in this Union.

In my report of last February I said in part, "Since the enrollment has fallen so much and seems likely to remain at its present level, and since the numbers in the various grades of the local schools are nearly equal, the time is favorable for a combination and reassignment of grades, with grades one and two in one school three

and four in another and five and six in the third." Apparently it is not possible accurately to predict how many families will move into or out of a district in a year and it was not foreseen by any one that we should have in our present first grade ten more pupils than estimated, a fact which has been of the greatest importance in view of the wish of the district, that two schools of three grades each instead of three schools of two grades each be opened for this year. Even with the large enrollment as noted in Table I, the move for rearrangement has been a sound one. Both schools are happy, well governed and well disciplined, making good progress in studies. They, of course, receive grade by grade more specialized attention from the teachers. That the pupils assemble from the various parts of the town and so become better acquainted is a fact of some importance. But to be of the best service they are too large. It will seem by a glance at Table I that, had we adopted the three school plan, we should now have twenty-six in one school, twenty-one in the second and twenty-one in the third.

Without the finest kind of cooperation on the part of the teachers, the two big schools would be less efficient than they are. For the good of the schools the teachers have made a considerable sacrifice of their own leisure, making long days and enjoying fewer free week ends. They have foregone the benefits of an extension course of professional lectures held for teachers in Exeter. They have visited and helped sick children, and in general have been completely and unselfishly devoted to their work. Schools cannot be at their best without cooperation from the parents. Our new combination of grades has been successful so far not only because of the earnestness of those officially in charge of the schools but because of the cooperation of parents, some of whom, I suppose, were not sure that the experiment would succeed. With further cooperative study of difficult problems and the

use of patience in trying situations we hope that the schools will continue to improve. Children who have a mental age or maturity of six years are generally able to make good progress in the work of the first grade. Those who are less mature than that, in degree varying with their age, find progress slow or even impossible. We know, of course, that children do not all learn to walk or to do various other things at the same chronological age and we are wise enough not to force them to start to walk when a certain birthday is reached. Ability to learn to read comes with mental maturity, not necessarily with chronological age. For that reason I recommend that we determine by proper examination the mental age of all prospective first grade pupils who will not have passed their sixth birthday before January first of the school year they propose to enter, and that only those, in this group, found to have a mental age of six years be admitted to Grade I. This procedure has been found to be of considerable use in neighboring districts and elsewhere.

The benefit of our new grouping of grades is very evident in the work in music. Methods of teaching music to primary pupils are definitely different from those adapted to older pupils and the results which Mr. Wilson and the teachers reach are evidence of the worth of the reorganized schools.

I heartily commend to your attention the report of the School Nurse which follows. Mrs. Sheehy has been as successful in the correction of defects as in their discovery. Her work would be more difficult without the cooperation of Mr. Bowley, the local Health Officer; their work is, I am sure, much appreciated by parents.

Our physical equipment is very satisfactory and is kept in good condition by your careful attention. The unusually large size of our school rooms is of great ben-

efit and the installation of electrics and clocks last summer has made them still more efficient. The Parent-Teacher Association deserves our thanks for the play ground apparatus installed a few years ago and for the more recent gift of radio sets. So long, however, as schools, especially for primary children, are large and situated on main roads with as swift and heavy traffic as that which Portsmouth Avenue carries, there will be serious danger of accident. By your plan of transportation for all, without regard to the distance of their homes from school, you have removed much danger. More hazards could be removed by the erection of such fences on the school grounds as would make it difficult for children, in thoughtless play, to rush headlong onto the road. I cordially recommend such a move.

I speak for the teachers as well as myself as I thank all concerned with the schools for their hearty interest and generous support.
