

### SULLIVAN COUNTY DELEGATION MEETING

### Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1950

The delegation met at 10.00 a. m. at the Sullivan County Home, the first order of business being the inspection of the Home.

At 12.10 the delegation enjoyed a very nice dinner with Mr. and Mrs. George as hosts.

At 1.15 the meeting was called to order by Chairman Tony Russell and in joint session with the County Commissioners and other County officials, the county budget was discussed. The following members of the delegation were present: Angus, Converse, Bissonnett, Simms all of Claremont; Carter of Cornish; Riley of Croydon; Walker of Grantham; Holmes of Langdon; Wirkkala of Lempster; Cummings, Downing and Farmer all of Newport; Gardner of Springfield; Russell of Sunapee; Alfred G. Violet represented the Town of Acworth. The following county officials were present: County Solicitor, Jarlath M. Slattery; County Commissioners, Perry, Pierce and Sullivan; County Treasurer, Merton J. Sargent; Register of Probate, Bernice Mac-Williams, and Register of Deeds, Clinton K. Barton.

Chairman Perry led the discussion on the income from the farm and all other sources and was followed by Commissioner Sullivan in discussion of same. Representatives Holmes, Riley and Carter at this time made remarks in regard to the subject.

### GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Register of Probate, Mrs. MacWilliams at this time asked for \$200 to cover additional expenditures for a stenographer for the Judge of Probate in the new records building. Pat Angus suggested that the stenographer of the Superior Court be used to take care of work in the probate office. This was ruled out of order as the two are separate services.

The appropriation for the Sheriff's department was discussed at length, and Commissioner Pierce felt that it could be reduced \$500.

COUNTY HOME: Commissioner Pierce at this time made reference to a pasteurization plant for the farm, stating that the State of New Hampshire Board of Health had advised them that they would either have to purchase a pasteurizer for the farm or have the milk pasturized elsewhere. Commissioner Pierce told the members of the need of a new truck with a stake body and hoist, and also suggested that we consider the purchase of a field chopper for corn.

Sid Converse inquired as to why Soldiers' Aid should be \$10,000 for Sullivan County and only \$1000 for Grafton County. Pat Angus volunteered the information to the effect that Sullivan County was much more industrialized than Grafton County and would be much more apt to call for Soldiers' Aid than Grafton County.

Commissioner Pierce at this time made an inquiry relative to the deed or agreement concerning the piece of land the new County Records Building is located on. It was the impression that the County Solicitor and the Town Counsel of Newport were to get together and draw up this agreement.

The county appropriation for Extension service came up for discussion at this time. Questions asked by Rep. M. J. Downing brought forth a lively discussion. The questions asked were: How much money was actually spent by this service and how much for actual salaries. No one seemed sure of this and it was finally agreed that in round figures out of \$17,000 handled, \$14,000 was expended for salaries.

Mrs. Bartlett (Helen) at this time reminded that the figures listed as "all other payments" had already been expended to the extent of \$500.

Question of remodelling the jail came up for discussion. County Solicitor Slattery remarked that it would be just as economical to house our prisoners in Hillsborough County Jail as to go to the additional expense of making our local jail over for this service.

Meeting adjourned at 3.30 p. m. and the county delegation went into executive session.

At this point Chairman Russell called the delegation meeting to order and Sid Converse, Chairman of the Finance Committee, brought in the recommendations of said committee. On motion of Pat Angus, the budget was adopted as amended with the exception of the appropriation for the extension service which was increased from \$6,800 to \$8,200, the finance committee having recommended \$7,600 instead of \$6,800. This motion was seconded by Simms of Claremont and the motion prevailed.

Chairman Russell called the attention of the delegation to the recommendation of the Commissioners regarding a pasteurization plant, and on motion of Holmes seconded by Converse, it was an unanimous vote to give the commissioners authority to have the milk pasteurized elsewhere for the ensuing year.

Chairman Russell brought up the question of the Sullivan County Jail. On motion of Pat Angus, it was voted to continue housing prisoners at the Hillsborough County Jail.

The subject of a corn chopper for the county was brought up, and on motion of Angus, seconded by Carter, it was voted to give the commissioners authority to buy a chopper. At this time an amendment was offered by Converse to limit the purchase price to \$2500. The amendment being accepted, it became a part of the main motion.

Discussion of a new truck for the county home followed. It was voted on motion of Holmes and seconded by Cummings that the Commissioners be authorized to purchase a two ton truck with a stake body and hoist not to exceed \$3000. Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Chairman Russell at this time read a letter from Bernice Sawyer MacWilliams, Register of Probate in regard to the new Records Building. On motion of Cummings, seconded by Holmes, it was voted that the letter be referred to the County Commissioners for action by that body.

On motion by Angus and seconded by Converse, it was voted that we adjourn. Motion prevailed. Adjourned at 4.15 p. m.

All voted in favor. Meeting adjourned.

### **COMMISSIONER'S REPORT**

In accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith present the Annual Report of the County Commissioners, the County Home and House of Correction, Treasurer, Auditors, Solicitor, Clerk of Court, Sheriff, Chaplain, and the Physician of the County Home for the year ending December 31, 1950.

We regret the passing of Clinton K. Barton, Register of Deeds for Sullivan County. He exemplified the highest type of public official, possessing a thorough understanding of the duties of his office and an unselfish devotion to them. He was honest, efficient, logical and kind. His counsel, sympathy and helpful cooperation will long be pleasantly remembered by the citizens of Sullivan County.

### RELIEF

Relief in the County continued well into the spring of 1950 to show the increase discernable in the last months of 1949, due in large measure to a heavy medical relief load. From May of 1950 to the end of the year, the amount of relief declined to a more normal level through the placing of quite a number of relief recepients in self-supporting employment. In the expectation that the relief load will continue normal, and giving due consideration to increased cost of services, we will strive to keep the expense of this department to approximately the same figure as for the preceding year.

### COUNTY HOME

Due to weather conditions the crops were not as good as in the previous year, but as the Superintendent's report shows, despite handicaps of weather a substantial amount was harvested. All four silos were filled with grass and corn silage and a fair quantity was stored temporarily beyond the capacity of the silos. The practice of using government potatoes has been continued.

The income from the farm we consider satisfactory, amounting to over \$52,000. At the beginning of 1950, we were of the opinion that the income from poultry and hogs would be lower than in the preceding year. This proved to be the case and the income from poultry and hogs declined during 1950, but this was offset in part by an increase in income from the dairy herd and the final result was the second best income for the year in the history of the farm. During the past year Mr. George has continued to make further progress with the dairy herd and the DHIA report for the year shows an average of over 11,000 pounds of milk per cow.

The authorized purchase of a new truck and harvester has resulted in a substantial saving in the cost of transporting coal to the farm and in preparing corn and hay silage.

The program of improvement of the timber land owned by the county is continuing under the supervision of Forester Mr. William E. Dussault. This consists of selective cutting, brush removal, etc., and the planting of small white pine. Continuation of good forestry improvement should prove of increasing value to the citizens of the county in the not too distant future.

Some of the buildings at the farm suffered considerable damage during the severe wind storms in November. The damage occurred mostly to roofs of the several buildings. By reason of the extended coverage of our insurance policies, repairs were made on all the buildings with no financial loss to the county.

One of the continuing problems is the upkeep of the physical property at the farm. Much of the piping, both steam and water, has seen years of service. We hope to set up a schedule whereby each year a certain sum of money may be expended to bring this part of the property into good physical condition. Considerable cement work will have to be replaced and repaired at the Alms House and plans to do this work are now under way. It is planned to raze the old horse barn and other out-buildings no longer needed. This should prove a saving to the county in both taxes and repair.

### **COOPERATION**

To the citizens of the county who have assisted us in our work during the past year, to all those employed by the county; town officials, chaplain, physician, and to all clubs and organizations who have so kindly contributed to the welfare and happiness of the inmates and patients at the county institution, we are sincerely grateful.

### SUPERINTENDENT AND MATRON

It is a continuing pleasure to work with our superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. William H. George. Their tasks are manifold, and the day to day problems are numerous and difficult. At all times they are most anxious to cooperate in any way to make the Home more efficient and more pleasant for those who have to come there. They, with the Commissioners, welcome any suggestions from the citizens of the county that will tend to make our work more efficient. The Commissioners take this opportunity to express to Mr. and Mrs. George their appreciation of their cooperation and help in our mutual endeavor to operate to the best interest of the inmates of the Home and the people of Sullivan County.

### **INVITATION TO THE PUBLIC**

We, as Commissioners, invite and urge the citizens and public in general, to visit the Home and inspect it. We would welcome any suggestions that might be helpful to us. We are sure you would be very cordially received and would find the Superintendent and Matron very hospitable.

January 1, 1951

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County: ... Gentlemen:

In submitting our annual report of Sullivan County Home, it seems fitting that some of our activities at the Home should be re-viewed.

The Dairy herd seems to be making definite progress, production has continued to increase, herd health has never been better. Mr Perkins, the Herdsman is doing a good job.

A tremendous crop of grass silage was harvested in excellent shape.

The corn crop was all used for silage, and a heavy crop of hay, and rowen was cut or grazed.

Due to the dry weather, some of our vegetable crops were not as abundant as usual. Blight caused considerable loss in our tomato crop. We feel that some irrigation equipment would be a good investment for the vegetable field.

The facilities at the House of Correction have been heavily taxed during the whole year.

The Hospital, much of the time has been filled to capacity with patients requiring much care, medication, and supplies.

The record indicates that 349 more weeks board and care were supplied at the Home, than the previous year.

Considerable repairs have been necessary to the plumbing, heating, and water systems, a new forage chopper was purchased, also a much needed truck.

In spite of the increased population load, new equipment, and rising cost of supplies, operating cost of the Home was below the year of 1949.

There has been practically no change in our staff of employees, most of whom have been here several years.

We deeply appreciate their good work and friendship.

Rev. Max Goldman, the Chaplain, takes a deep interest in the people at the Home as does Father Robert Griffin.

Every person at the Home appreciates, and wish to thank the various Groups, Organizations, and Individuals who have given of their time, cars, and talent, also for the gifts, flowers, books, and magazines.

We thank Doctor Stearns, and the Commissioners, for their kindness, and help the past year.

### **Report of County Solicitor**

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County: Gentlemen:

I herein submit my report as Commissioner to Perform the Duties of County Solicitor for the year ending December 31, 1950.

At the February term of the grand jury six indictments were returned. Five indictments were disposed of at that term; the sixth is pending as the respondent has been confined in another jurisdiction and until such time as he is released he can not be arraigned.

Three indictments were returned at the September term of the grand jury and all three were disposed of at that term of the court.

During the year twelve respondents waived indictment and their cases were disposed of. Two respondents who had been indicted prior to 1950 were also arraigned and their cases disposed of.

During the year about seven hundred and forty-five respondents were brought before the four municipal courts of Sullivan County charged with the commission of various misdemeanors. The solicitor aided in the prosecution of some of these respondents. One respondent appealed and it is expected that this case will be disposed of at the February term of the Superior court.

Three petitions were filed with the Superior court pursuant to Chapter 314 of the Laws of 1949 entitled "An Act Relating to the Care, Treatment and Rehabilitation of Sexual Psychopaths." In one case there was an adjudication that the individual was a sexual psychopath and in a second case that the individual was not. The third case was pending at the termination of the year.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the various local police departments, sheriff's department and the state police for the excellent cooperation rendered the solicitor and for the efficient manner in which they conducted their duties.
