

(TOWN WARRANT)

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of of Cheshire, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in the said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a selectman for the ensuing three years.
 - Article 4. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- Article 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing town highways and bridges.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid and permanent improvement of highways in accordance with an act of the legislature of 1905.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for state aid maintenance.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for trunk line maintenance.

Article 10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent upon all taxes paid previous to July 5th of the current year, and instruct the collector to collect all poll taxes before June 1st, 1925.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to apply to outstanding notes.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the interest on the water bonds.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be set aside as a sinking fund to pay off the water bonds at maturity.

Article 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to the maintenance of fire protection, and see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase new apparatus, and appoint a committee for the same.

Article 18. To see if the town will purchase and erect a flag pole on triangle lot near town hall.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of employing a district nurse.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and choose a committee to have charge of the same.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion to use the town hall one Friday night each month without pay.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in the control of the white pine blister rust in the town of Troy.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in addition to the amount required by law for public library.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for repairs to town hall.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and

appropriate a sum of money to place a fence around the water reservoir.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the unused highway from the home of William Parker to the state highway near the home of John Letteney.

Article 29. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Article 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Troy School Board:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twenty-fifth under district supervision.

At the close of the school year in June it was found that while Mr. Eaton was to return as principal of the high school that it would be necessary to secure successors to Miss Mc-Gregor, who had been assistant for three years, and to Miss Knowlton who had been assistant for two years.

For Miss McGregor's position we secured Miss Filomena Romano, a graduate of Keene Normal School, who had done excellent work in her practice teaching in Keene Junior High School, and for the position of teacher of French and English Miss Ruth G. Chisholm, also a Keene graduate, who had been in charge of the junior high school in Wilmot, N. H., was chosen.

All the teachers in the primary building returned, but since the opening of school there have been several changes. Miss Catherine Dunn was married during the fall term and desired to be released at the Thanksgiving recess, and her place was filled by the election of Miss Dorothy D. Platts, a former teacher in grades four and five.

At the Christmas vacation Miss Mabel F. Johnson, who was serving her fourth year as principal of the primary school was released to accept a better paying position in Massachusetts and Miss Mary Catherine Barrett, teacher of grades four and five was promoted to the principalship, and Miss Charlotte R. Woodbury was transferred from the fifth grade in East Jaffrey to succeed Miss Barrett. Both Miss Barrett and Miss Woodbury are graduates of Keene, and both were teaching their third year.

Owing to her continued ill health Miss Chisholm lost considerable time from her school work which was taken over by substitutes from Keene Normal School, but she has now asked for and been granted a leave of absence and a permanent substitute will take charge of the department early in February, and we expect her to remain the rest of the school year.

During the past school year the work of the schools has shown encouraging results. Tests from the state department were given in some of the higher grades in November, 1923, and in January and June, 1924.

The result of the first tests in arithmetic and spelling in the eighth grade was somewhat disappointing, but the later tests showed marked improvement, due largely to more intensive drill in arithmetic and spelling in the higher grades.

This year standard tests in these branches as well as in geography and history are to be given for the purpose of comparison with other schools doing similar work.

The need of more room in the primary building has been a matter for serious consideration for some years, but as yet no satisfactory solution has been reached. Three of the rooms have from thirty-five to forty-two pupils, which is about the average membership in the larger villages, but two rooms have sixty or more pupils.

It is unnecessary to note that a teacher with sixty or more pupils finds it very difficult to give to each the individual attention that is needed, and the fact that these schools have made satisfactory progress under these conditions speaks well for the able and conscientious work of the teachers.

When financial conditions warrant it a suitable addition should be made to the present primary building unless some other building is available which can have the proper amount of light and the necessary sanitary conditions.

The general expenses for the coming school year will probably not vary very much from those of the present year.

The items of fuel, transportation, text books, scholars' supplies and teachers' salaries are likely to be about the same for another year as at present.

To some the school expenses may seem large as compared with eight or ten years ago, but it must be recalled that the expense of board, rent, and practically all living expenses have more than doubled in that period. Troy has, during the past five years qualified annually for state aid and has received each year from \$5,000 to the maximum amount of \$6,000 allowed by law. Had the schools of the town been less efficient the amount received would have been much smaller.

Good schools cost money but poor schools are expensive.

I am glad to note the support and assistance rendered during the past year by the Parent-Teacher association, which has taken a keen interest in the welfare of our teachers and pupils and has done much to arouse public interest in our schools.

I desire to thank the school board, teachers, parents, pupils, and all citizens who have co-operated in advancing the welfare of our schools during the past year.
