## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:  
Polls to close at 12 o'clock.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Amherst on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Treasurer authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the town will vote to give discount on taxes at 1½ per cent to August 1st.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 to fix the Cemetery on Chestnut Hill.
6. To see if the town will vote to oil the road from Silva's to the Merrimack line and raise and appropriate money for same.
7. To see if the town will vote to oil the road at Cricket Corner from Roby's to the Merrimack line and raise and appropriate money for same.
8. To see if the town will vote to install an electric light on the Milford Road by the Lyndeboro Road and raise and appropriate money for same.
9. To see if the town will vote to widen and complete the bridge over Baboosic Brook on the road going towards Camp Judea and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$960.71 for T. R. A. State will contribute \$3842.82.
11. To see if the town will vote to put the Mack Hill Road in shape and oil it from in front of Ryan's to the foot of Mack Hill and raise and appropriate money for same.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$992.00 for a suitable War II Memorial Book.
13. To see if the town will vote to oil 3/10 of a mile of road

from the Bedford and Amherst town line in front of the Horace Greeley place and raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to oil Lake and Lake Front Street at Lake Baboosic.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to oil Clark's Avenue at Lake Baboosic.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to install and maintain a light on Public Service pole No. 20 near Wenzell's pavilion.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$132.98 (1/100th of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1946 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the roads in the bombing area.

19. To see if the town will vote to rescind the Zoning Ordinance which was adopted at the Annual Town Meeting held March 12, 1946.

20. To see if the town will vote to amend the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows, or take any action thereto. Add to Article I, District I, Sec. II. A. Any person wishing to erect a new building, addition to present building, establish new business, or erect signs, shall first receive a written permit from the Administrative official. B. Eliminate present Article II and substitute the following Article II. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Administrative official shall on his own initiative take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance. C. Add to Article III. The Moderator with the approval of the Selectmen shall appoint an Administrative official and fill this vacancy if one occurs.

21. To see if the town will vote to surface and treat with oil 1 1/10 miles of road on Christian Hill and raise and appropriate money for same.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to gravel and provide proper drainage on Main Street between Davis Lane and Locke's Corner.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the



sum of \$300.00 to oil Main Street between Davis Lane and Locke's Corner.

24. To see if the town will vote to surface and treat with oil that part of the road on Walnut Hill beginning where the present black road ends and continuing to Chisolm's farm buildings and raise and appropriate money for same.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$725.00 to complete the renovation to the town hall kitchen and to provide a dry well for kitchen sink drain as detailed in Item 1 of the report of your Town Hall committee.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$420.00 for urgently needed repairs and new installation as detailed in Item 2 of the report of your Town Hall committee.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be placed in a fund toward the purchase and installation of a heating plant for the Town Hall building as detailed in Item 3 of the report of your Town Hall committee.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.00, or any part of such sum, to be used for desirable improvements to the Town Hall building as detailed in Item 4 of the report of your Town Hall committee.

29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100.00 for the purpose of an audit of all the town's books and accounts, the audit to be made through the State Tax Commission. The purpose being to modernize and improve upon the system now being employed.

30. To see if the town will vote to direct the Selectmen to appoint within 30 days, three citizens, other than themselves, to serve as Road Commissioners. They are to aid and assist the Road Agent and will serve with no salary. The Selectmen to fill any vacancies when they occur, and the Commissioners to report at each town meeting, or at any special town meetings.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Amherst:

I herewith present my eighth annual report, the twenty-eighth in the series. I present three topics for your consideration; Teachers, Accomplishments, Suggestions.

### Teachers

As the list of teachers is presented elsewhere, I will call your attention only to the changes since our last report. About a year ago, Mrs. Neugebauer resigned because of ill health and was succeeded by Mrs. Virginia Marshall of Milford. Mr. Bedell could not offer the subjects required and Mr. Richard Grodin of Lyndeboro was employed in his stead. Miss Marion Macklin from Massachusetts was obtained to fill the new Commercial position. Early this Fall, Mrs. Marshall had to leave, and Mrs. Eva B. Gagnon of Milford took over her work. This change occurred during the period of deliberation over the heavy enrollment in Grades I and II. Prior to opening in September, there were only nine first graders enrolled, but twenty-five came to school the first week, and extras had come to town for the second grade. After watching the situation for a month, it was decided to hire a part-time teacher to assist with the work of Grades I and II, and send home the first grade afternoons. Mrs. Gladys Larson consented to become the assistant. Then after due trial of this procedure, it became apparent that full-time service was needed; and Mrs. Larson was finally persuaded to continue on as full-time teacher. I regret that so many changes have been necessary with these small children, but feel that we did the best we could under the unusual conditions. Next year we anticipate a single first grade, single second grade, combined third and fourth grades for the Clark School.

Salaries are again of major importance. I again urge you to increase them to as high a point as you possibly can. Without adequate increases, we will have difficulties in securing teachers and keeping all departments in operation. I have presented a plan calling for salaries ranging from \$1,800 to \$2,400 for teachers with bachelor's degrees; more for master's and less with less preparation. I hope that plan or a better one will be used as a basis for employment next year and will insure an adequate staff.

There are a few points I wish to discuss relative to the employment of teachers. They are the barriers I must face and argue against as I interview teachers to go to smaller towns. First, the salary is inclined to be low in comparison with a larger town or a city. Second, living conditions for board and room might not compare with that to which the candidates are accustomed. This might be extended to include the lack of movies and other recreational pursuits. Third, the schools are organized with more than one grade to a teacher. Fourth, candidates have heard that people in the smaller towns are very critical of teachers, often to the extent of verbal abuse and social isolation. All of these factors contribute to my difficulties. Possibly they point to the salary scale—that it ought to be higher than the city or larger town in order to attract people and overcome these handicaps mentioned above. Surely, everyone can examine his part in the affairs of the town and see if there is something he can do to correct the difficulty.

### Accomplishments

I trust more stable conditions will soon prevail so that more time can be devoted to this subject. I desire to continue a testing program to determine educational possibilities as well as educational accomplishments. Without the benefit of this material, teachers feel handicapped in their work. We now have some test



material at hand ready to use in the next two or three months.

A study of pupil promotions, and the difficulties encountered, is interesting. The five towns of this Union are listed below by number only.

Your town is number three on the list and represents the most difficult problem in this Union. More than 30% of these children had difficulty last year in meeting the standards for their grades. About half of this group were allowed to go on to the next grade and the other half retained in the same grade. The greater part of these children came from Grades I and II, as is usual, but where so many teacher changes took place. The adjustment still continues and we hope these children may recover and advance normally during the rest of their school careers.

I am very proud to report about the Rural School Day Radio Program last October. Teachers and pupils made up a very good program about improvements in Amherst schools and presented them over the air from a Manchester station. Pupils from the second, fourth, eighth and twelfth grades were interviewed by Headmaster Small. We had some very favorable comments about their efforts.

### Suggestions

I trust you will examine carefully the other reports in this book.



My suggestions are mainly brief. I hope that the district will appoint a Survey Committee to act jointly with the School Board on school problems that concern Amherst. The population changes have been so numerous, it has been extremely difficult for a small group to estimate the needs for very long in advance. The high-school roof needs to be shingled. Two contractors have already seen the roof and advise that the work should be done.

I am very grateful to all who have assisted the school in meeting its goals, especially to the School Board and the teachers.

## REPORT OF HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools, the Members of the Amherst School Board, and the Citizens of the town of Amherst:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of Amherst High School and Village School, grades seven and eight.

Registration figures February 1, 1947, were: post graduate, 1; grade 12, 9; grade 11, 7; grade 10, 15; grade 9, 10; grade 8, 19; and grade 7, 15. These figures represent an increase over the last two years. Elementary school figures show greater increases. If the present trend continues, the town may well face the problem of insufficient housing at all grade levels—a problem already markedly in evidence at Clark School and apparent to an appreciable degree in grades five and six.

Subjects offered this year in the high school by courses are: *Academic*, offering: English, French 1, French 2, civics, biology, Latin 2, United States History and advanced mathematics; *General*, offering: English, general mathematics, civics, French 1, French 2, algebra, biology, United States History, bookkeeping and advanced mathematics; *Commercial*, offering: English, general mathematics, civics, French 1, biology, typewriting 1, typewriting 1 and stenography, personal typewriting, bookkeeping, and United States History. The seventh grade teaches English, history, geography and arithmetic; the eighth grade—English, history, science and arithmetic. Music, choral singing, occurs one period a week for all seventh and eighth graders and is elective for the high school pupils.

I believe that we have accomplished much that is of value in the past year. Our commercial course is functioning very well and is a real addition to the curriculum. A great deal of credit for the success of the course belongs to Miss Marion Macklin who instructs in the commercial subjects. French has been re-established in the curriculum of the high school. French 1 and French 2 are offered this year. Mr. Richard Grodin instructs in French and in English. The results obtained in these subjects are gratifying indeed and are in large measure due, I am sure, to Mr. Grodin's competent tutelage. Miss Miriam Roby instructs in science and mathematics; Miss Bertha Piper, social

science and Latin. Their excellent work in their respective fields of instruction contribute immeasurably toward the better *development of the pupil in his entire personality*, which, after all, is the prime aim of public education.

It is your Headmaster's sincere belief that Amherst has a *good* school system. A pupil who maintains a fair scholastic average through the twelfth year in Amherst High School need not fear for his academic prowess in competition with pupils from other schools. He will have obtained more than sufficient background to hold his own. Amherst High School need make no apologies. Its course of study, its teaching staff and its pupil-product will compare favorably with other school units in any overall comparison.

In the extra-curriculum: Amherst is founder of the Southern New Hampshire League which at present includes school participants from Amherst, Hollis, Troy, Merrimack, Hudson, New Boston, Antrim and Hancock. Baseball and basketball are for the boys; softball and basketball for the girls.

The school annex has been entirely renovated and is ready for use. The work of plastering, painting, carpentering, etc., was done by volunteers. The finished product stands as evidence of what community enthusiasm and cooperation can accomplish. The school staff is grateful to those people who contributed so generously of time and effort.

Seldom has there been a project manifesting more efficient planning and execution than the hot lunch program. The Parent-Teacher Association and its assistants are performing an inestimable service in furnishing nourishing lunches to approximately one hundred pupils each day at a price of 17 cents per pupil per meal.

Mr. Malcolm D. Clark has given free use of his bus to all basketball games this season. I wish to hereby publicly acknowledge this generosity and say "Thank you, Mr. Clark."

Audio-visual-physical examinations were given and parents have been informed of the results of the same.

Instruction through the use of our movie projector continues as a regular part of the school activities.

School parties, dances, suppers, etc., are interspersed among

the more academic pursuits to provide normal and healthy recreation that at the same time develops individual and group responsibilities.

I wish again to thank the School Board members, the Superintendent of Schools, the School Faculty and the Citizens of Amherst for their cooperation and for the privilege of working with them in this business which aims at serving our community, state and nation by training today for a better tomorrow.

## REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE TOWN OF AMHERST, N. H., FISCAL YEAR '46-'47

Your Ways and Means Committee for 1946 has been faced not only with higher costs for materials and higher salary and labor rates, but also with the accumulated needs of several years for maintenance and repair of town property. Yearly appropriations for that purpose either have been inadequate or omitted entirely, in the interests of economy. The members of the committee feel that it is false economy to neglect such matters further inasmuch as deterioration becomes cumulative. Beyond that, indications are that the purchasing power of our dollars will decrease as time goes on.

The cost of bringing back town property to sound condition is greater than it seems advisable to assume in a single year. By way of making a start this committee is recommending that sums be spent for the more urgent needs and urges that such sums be considered as the first in a program of yearly expenditures, the objective of which will be to bring town property to a state of repair that can be maintained from that point on at a modest annual cost.

Your committee recommends that estimated expenditures as presented by the various departments and listed in your town reports be accepted and that the town raise and appropriate sufficient sums to provide for them, with these exceptions:

1. That the estimate for Town Officers' salaries be reduced to \$1496.25, which sum provides for a 15 percent increase in salaries and the payment of \$15 each to two auditors.
2. That the estimate for Town Officers' expenses be reduced to \$1150.

3. That in addition to \$100 for spraying, the sum of \$300 be appropriated to be used as follows:

\$100 for loam around trees in the park.

\$150 for trimming trees outside of park.

\$ 50 for fertilizing trees.

The additional sum is recommended because your Committee feels that spraying alone is inadequate. The care of our trees has been neglected for several years. As a result there is urgent need for trimming, feeding and replacing. The cost of a complete program is too great to absorb in one year. It is recommended that the foregoing sum be appropriated as the first step in a program of tree conservation and that added sums be appropriated yearly.

4. That the estimate for General Expense of Highway Department be increased to \$300 to cover the estimated expense (\$200) of building a shed with lumber owned by the town, for sheltering the town snow plows.

5. That the estimate for oiling be increased to \$9500. The sum of \$2500 is estimated for re-oiling. There are 3.6 miles of road to be initially oiled. Estimates as to the cost per mile vary, but \$2000 per mile appears to be the minimum for new oiling.

6. That the estimate for Town Aid be reduced to \$750 inasmuch as some persons who required aid in 1945 will not require it this year and others will not require as much as in 1945.

7. That the estimate for Parks and Playgrounds be increased from \$300 to \$575, seventy-five dollars of which shall be used for painting the wooden rails of the fence around the common. Your Committee feels that the present cost of labor renders a sum of \$300 inadequate to provide proper care of one of the town's greatest assets.

8. That the estimate for Town Dumps be increased from \$50 to \$75 to provide for the cleaning and fencing off of the Baboosic Dump, which has become an eyesore.

9. After careful consideration it is the conclusion of your committee that the benefits to be obtained from a Commercial Course for Amherst High School do not warrant an added expenditure of \$2500 a year for that purpose, as called for by Article 11 in the Warrant for Annual School Meeting.

### Warrant

Article 1. No recommendation necessary.

Article 2. Your committee recommends that such sums of money be appropriated as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Your committee recommends that the town authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. Your committee recommends that the sum of \$25 be raised and appropriated for a sign to read: Town Hall, Amherst, N. H., and that such sign be in gold leaf and that it be placed at the base of the gable over the front door of the Town Hall Building.

Article 5. Your committee recommends that the sum of \$300 be raised and appropriated to gravel and tar Jail Avenue.

Article 6. Your committee recommends that Milford Street at Baboosic Lake be made a one-way street, that gravel only be used, and that the cost of graveling be paid from the money appropriated for Town Maintenance.

Article 7. Your committee recommends that the sum of \$150 be raised and appropriated to repair and paint the roof of the Town Hall building. It is esti-

mated that such repairs will be effective for about two years.

Article 8. Your committee recommends that the sum of \$100 be raised and appropriated to repair the roof of the library building, with the understanding that if the repair work can not be guaranteed, the entire amount is to be placed in a permanent fund to be used toward a new roof.

Article 9. Your committee recommends that the town does not raise and appropriate the sum of \$1915 to be spent with a like sum by the State of N. H. on the Baboosic Road. Your committee finds that no estimate of the total cost of the project is available. It is not known when the project will be completed nor for exactly what purpose an initial payment of \$1915 would be used. Because of the project there is no assurance that the Town of Amherst will receive Town Road Aid until the project is completed. It is felt that no money should be raised or appropriated in the absence of complete information concerning the project.

Article 10. Your committee recommends that no committee be appointed to serve as Park Commissioners. With the appropriation recommended by your Ways and Means Committee, it is felt that supervision adequate to insure proper care of parks and playgrounds will be available.

Article 11. Your committee recommends that the town does not allow discount on taxes.

Article 12. Your committee recommends that the town vote to discontinue the cross-driveway between the black roads that cross at the northwest corner of Mr. Knight's property.

Article 13. Your committee recommends that the town does not accept the road described in Article 13 of the warrant.

Article 14. Your committee recommends that the

town authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to draw money from the Town Maintenance Account or from Town Surplus rather than from the Oiling Account for the town's share of T.R.A. if it develops that T.R.A. is available.

Article 15. Your committee recommends that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used toward remodeling the kitchen in the Town Hall Building and that a committee be appointed in accordance with the provisions of Article 15, with duties as given in that Article.
