TOWN WARRANT

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 9:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of BARNSTEAD in the County of BELKNAP in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at BARNSTEAD TOWN HALL in said BARNSTEAD on Tuesday, the THIRTEENTH day of March, next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.) for the purchase of a new combination pumper-tanker, approval of Selectmen, or Selectmen Committee, for the use of the Center Barnstead Fire Department, and authorize the issuance of notes in the same amount for this purpose.
(By Petition)
5. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Thirty-four Thousand Dollars (\$34,000.) to be divided as follows: Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.) for the Center Barnstead Fire Department and Twenty-Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$26,500.) for the Barnstead Parade Fire Company. These funds to be used for operational expenses. (By Petition)
6. To see if the Town will vote to draw the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800.00) from the Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the specific purpose of off-setting budgeted appropriations for a new Highway Sander.

7. To see if the Town will vote to draw the sum of Five Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Three Dollars (\$5,953.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the specific purpose of off-setting budgeted appropriations for a new police cruiser.

8. To see if the Town will vote to draw a minimum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.) or a maximum of all available Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the specific purpose of offsetting the operating expenses of the Center Barnstead Fire Department and the Barnstead Parade Fire Company. (By Petition)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salaries of the Barnstead Highway Department so as to be equitable with the State of New Hampshire rates for highway workers.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Chief of Police of the Town of Barnstead, from Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,500.) yearly to Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.) yearly.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by Public Auction, a seventeen acre piece of land-locked property between the Province Road and Tilton Hill Road, bordering on the Pittsfield-Barnstead town line and known as and formerly owned by Joseph Murphy and acquired by the Town of Barnstead for taxes in the 1930's.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred and Seventeen Dollars and Fifty-Six Cents (\$617.56) for the continuation of services to low income and elderly residents of the Town of Barnstead, through the Laconia Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap/Merrimack Counties, Inc. (By Petition)

13. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to accept sixth-tenths of a mile on the Class VI road known as the New Road, and designate it as a Class V road. Said road running in a South-easterly direction from Shackford Corner Road toward the Hannah Nutter Road. (By Petition)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept or contract for any local, state or federal assistance that the Town of Barnstead may be eligible for in the ensuing year.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Before the annual library report is presented, I would like to express my sincere thanks and gratitude to all the good people of this town for the support you have given me in this past year. It was not an easy decision to make: to submit twice in three months to serious hip surgery. I am glad it is over. I can never be grateful enough to Mrs. Carolyn Johnson, the assistant librarian, for all the deep concern she has shown me.

The year has been a successful one, beginning with the children's program during the summer months. The young people's participation was enthusiastic, and our film programs were enjoyed by a larger group than in past years; 40 children were registered in our various activities. Our town is fortunate in having dedicated citizens who volunteered as readers; and what is also important, these same persons have expressed their pleasure in offering their services, saying, "I hope you will ask me again." Small children like to see their mothers, aunts, or big sisters helping the library by reading stories to them.

We have also had a new registration of borrowers; at the present time about 25 per cent of the residents are borrowers. The services in terms of books, magazines, and reference materials represent a cost of fewer dollars per person than almost any other agency in town. In view of this we are grateful for the continued moral and financial support you have given to your library.

Four-hundred new books, of which one-hundred were gifts, were acquired during the year. This entire number represents a potential cost of \$4500: the cost to the people of Barnstead was about \$1500. This

means that your librarians have spent a great deal of time tracking down best-sellers and reference books at greatly reduced prices. We have lost or discarded very few books this past year, and feel that our collection is quite up-to-date. We receive free magazines from Japan, Germany, and South Africa; we have also received donated subscriptions of various religious and secular periodicals.

We have looked forward to a renovation project, and some of this work was begun when the selectmen moved out. We hope when next summer is here, our warm weather friends will find a new face, an expanded library, and an entirely new look.

The Community Room continues to be used as a meeting place for various town Committee meetings. This room is offered free of charge to any group in Barnstead. The only requirement is to check with the Librarians to make sure there are no conflicts in time.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

REMEMBER ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES!

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

The New Hampshire legislature is once again living up to its advance billing of being the place "where the action is." As I dive into my second term as your state representative, I find the waters as turbulent and deep as they were when I arrived in Concord as a "freshman" two years ago.

Many of the issues which I have reported to you previously are not totally resolved. For example, although the state's telephone companies have agreed to end the practice of charging a toll for telephone calls within the boundaries of a municipality by September, 1979, I have filed legislation to insure that this schedule is met.

In another area, that of the state highways in the Alton, Barnstead, Gilmanton area, the Department of Public Works and Highways scheduled Route 11 in West Alton for reconstruction by 1981. Because the project is to be more extensive than first thought, that date has been pushed back. My job is to make sure that the delay is a necessity and is not unreasonable.

Legislation which I sponsored which did not become law during my first term has been re-filed. One area concerns transportation of hazardous substances; the other, creation of a hazardous waste management program for the state.

Beyond these continuing projects are new legislative goals. I have filed legislation which would permit towns to enter into cooperative agreements in order to establish an emergency "911" calling area. Currently many small towns, such as Alton, Barnstead, and Gilmanton, cannot take advantage of this type of service because the costs of each town doing so independently would be exorbitant.

In the environmental sphere, I am also co-sponsoring legislation which would require soil filtration rates to be considered, as well as the existing percolation test, before granting of septic system permits.

I am also sponsoring legislation which would remove inequities in the collection of the Rooms and Meals Tax, and legislation which would restructure assessment procedures of mobile homes for property tax purposes. Both of these involve extensive changes in existing law and I expect much heated debate, as one would with any new idea.

I am also continuing my discussions and collecting voluminous correspondence with the Department of Public Works and Highways on the deplorable condition of Route 140 between Alton and Gilmanton Iron Works, as well as Route 126 in South Barnstead, which will be beyond redemption if some basic maintenance is not scheduled soon.

This term I have been appointed to the Committee on Resources, Recreation, and Development. This committee is charged with considering "all matters relating to natural resources, water pollution and control, parks and recreational areas, recreational industries, (and) matters concerning state controls on property development," all items of vital concern to Alton, Barnstead, and Gilmanton.

The legislature, however, does more than enact new laws, and correct old ones. The legislature must also set policy.

The next two years will decide our fate for the next century. With this decade's explosion of growth in both population and industry have come increasing demands for new services. With this pressure comes a hue and cry for the state to take over and centralize in all areas.

I see a major challenge to the citizens of New Hampshire, and especially to their legislature to assimilate that growth and provide those services, while refusing to take control away from local government in the name of centralization. Because, whatever so-called efficiencies may be gained from state-run agencies will be lost as that all-important monetary control gets further away from the people of this state who pay the bills.

Although I may vote on these many complex issues, my decisions should be a reflection of your thoughts. There can be no way by which every vote will satisfy all the diverse opinions I encounter throughout the three towns in the legislative district. However, your opinions *do* influence my vote.

Many of you have been in contact with me either through my regular office hours, by letter, or by telephone. It is most gratifying to me to both listen to your views, and assist you with any difficulties which may arise in day to day dealings with our already too complex state bureaucracy.

Our government is your government. All committee sessions and floor debates are open to the public and I would be happy to coordinate a visit for anyone who may want to see state government in action.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

New Hampshire's Constitution requires that the Legislature meet six months every other year in a Regular Session to consider the business of the state. In recent years, however, the increasing number and complexity of issues facing state government have demanded that the Legislature meet in Special Sessions during the intervening years to respond to those issues.

Several bills of importance and interest to our district were enacted during the 1978 Special Session of the Legislature. One requires electrical utility companies to make lower rates available to consumers based on the time of day the electricity is used. Because it costs the utility less to supply electricity at certain times during the day when demand is low, the Legislature felt that those savings should be passed on to the consumers who use their electrical appliances such as washers/dryers and water heaters during those low cost periods.

Another bill included a three million dollar appropriation to help the local communities with the cost of educating handicapped children by putting a limit on the amount local school districts have to contribute towards this expense.

Legislation was also enacted to make life a little easier for the elderly and the handicapped in our state by providing special decals to be placed on motor vehicles allowing free parking in any city or town in the state. In addition, a joint committee on elderly affairs was created to act as a liaison between the legislature and public and private individuals or groups concerned with problems of the elderly.

In another move to relieve some of the burden placed on property taxpayers by the operation of local government, the Legislature enacted a new law exempting school buses and other publicly owned and operated vehicles from state registration and gas taxes. As well, it also exempted from gas taxes diesel farm tractors and snowmobiles.

Anyone who was in the past disqualified from receiving unemployment benefits because he or she was also receiving military or other pensions will find relief in action taken by the Legislature during the last Special Session that repealed the law which required unemployment compensation benefits to be reduced by the amount of such a pension.

In November of 1978, the House of Representatives elected me to my third term as Speaker. In that capacity, I will preside over the House as it employs for the first time the tools provided by the Sunset Act, passed by the Legislature during the last session. As I have reported before, that act provides a schedule by which House Committees will investigate each and every state agency with an eye to reducing waste, trimming excesses and improving effectiveness. It is a task that will require a great deal of the Legislature's time and resources but promises to meet head-on one of the major concerns of people I talk with these days and that is the haphazard growth of state government.

Another issue that will occupy a large part of the upcoming session's attention is the phenomenal growth rate of the state itself. As Speaker, I have appointed a special committee to work with executive and private organization and individuals to develop for the state a framework for future growth.

Construction Works in Progress, an issue that centers around whether or not the Public Service Company of New Hampshire is allowed to include construction costs for the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant in their electrical rates will continue to be a major focal point in the upcoming session.

As part of my ongoing commitment to constituent service, I will be meeting soon with Highway Department officials to urge major reconstruction and renovation of Route 140 between Gilmanton and Alton and promote betterment projects on Route 28 to Alton Circle and Route 11 in West Alton.

Representatives of the Highway Department have informed me that approximately two miles of New Hampshire Route 140 running west from Route 107 in Gilmanton have been slated for resurfacing as part of an overall three-R project including renovation and reconstruction of 1.7 miles of Route 107 in Gilmanton completed last summer. In addition, the Department's five-year plan calls for two more projects in our area slated for 1982; one provides for \$2 million effort on Route 111 proceeding from the Alton town line heading two miles northwest and the other provides for an estimated \$2 million project in Barnstead on Route 28 running south from the Alton town line.

As far back as 1969, I was introducing legislation to respond to complaints by residents in our area who have been paying tolls for calls within their towns. Last session, I introduced HB 2044 which required the Legislature to investigate the equity of such calls and at long last independent telephone companies in the state, including the New England Telephone Company, are responding by proposing a new

billing system which will go into effect in late 1979 ending toll calls within municipalities. Statewide, this action will affect about 37,000 customers in 72 communities.

I was also successful in 1978 Special Session to secure a supplemental appropriation so that restoration of Suncook Dam in Barnstead could be completed. That project had been jeopardized by unusually high water levels that had delayed its completion and complicated the repair work necessary.

**BARNSTEAD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
MARCH 10, 1978**

The School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Richard L. Golden at 7:30 p.m. The Meeting opened with the salute to the flag. Announcements were made as follows: no smoking in the hall, only in the corridor outside; moderator read article from the newspaper regarding the Center Barnstead Fire Department Open House; moderator stated he would not read the entire Warrant, as each article would be read individually, therefore, he read only the certifications. He called attention to page 127 of the Town Report, the tentative warrant for the school district. This is merely a tentative warrant, submitted to the printer before the official warrant was drawn, therefore, Article II as printed in the town report does not appear as such on the official warrant. The Moderator stated that election for school district officers would be on March 14th the same time as town officers, and read the specimen ballot for the school district.

ARTICLE I. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district. Motion made by Lloyd Hanson and seconded by Ernst Tiede as follows: I move the salaries of the school district officers to be approved as follows: Moderator \$10.00; Clerk \$10.00; School Board Chairman \$150.00; School Board Members \$125.00 each; Treasurer \$200.00; Auditor \$25.00; Truant Officer \$20.00. Accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE II. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and to pay any vote relating thereto.

Motion made by Bruce Caldwell and seconded by William Gosse as follows: I move that the reports of agents, auditors and committees of the school district be accepted as printed in the Annual Report. Accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE III. To see if the district will vote, pursuant to RSA 31:105, to provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property, providing the indemnified person was at the time of the

accident acting within the scope of his employment or office. Motion made by William Jenisch and seconded by David Gregoire as follows: I move the district authorize the school board, pursuant to RSA 31:105, to provide indemnification for district officers or employees, school administrators, school board members or agents from personal loss, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property, providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his employment or office. Discussion: John Saliba asked the reason for this article and asked if it was the intent of the school board to purchase this insurance. Damon Russell replied that the school district already has this insurance coverage, but the law requires voter acceptance. Article 3 accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$22,894.00 as a deficit appropriation to be applied against the 1977-78 appropriation; this sum to be turned over to the School District prior to June 20, 1978. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Motion made by Lloyd Hanson and seconded by Leonard Tasker as follows: I move the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,894.00 as a deficit appropriation to be applied against the 1977-78 appropriation; this sum to be turned over to the school district prior to June 20, 1978. Discussion: Robert Simpson questioned the date in the town report – June 20, 1978: moderator stated official warrant stated June 20, 1978. William Jenisch explained what the \$22,894 was for – this money needed when so many more children enrolled in September than anticipated. The contingency fund was used, and this amount of money was needed in addition. Robert Simpson asked how the school board went about this. Peter James said the school board could have spent the money without going to the budget committee, but went to the budget committee and explained their problem. After considerable discussion, Article IV was accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE V. To see if the District will vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a building committee of five members to work with an architect to prepare a formal solution, including all associated costs, and report such findings to the School Board no later than September 1, 1978.

Motion made by William Jenisch and seconded by Peter Yelle as follows: I move the district vote to authorize the moderator to appoint a building committee of five members to work with an architect to prepare a formal solution, including all associated costs, and report such findings to the School Board no later than September 1, 1978. Discussion: Holly Bickford asked that the moderator appoint some of the people to the committee who have been long time residents in the town. Moderator noted suggestion. Peter James made the motion That Article 5 be amended as follows: "To see if the District will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five members to study the cost, feasibility, and desirability of purchasing, and/or leasing, five modular classrooms to be added onto the present school building. This committee to report back to the School Board no later than May 31, 1978, in order to allow possible action in time for the 1978-79 school year. In the event that the above report is in the negative, the Moderator is to appoint a second five member committee to select an architect or engineering firm to prepare possible solutions using a built in place building, to include possible re-use of the existing school plans. This committee to report back to the School Board no later than November 1, 1978." Considerable discussion followed. Mr. James said he felt the idea of modular classrooms should be looked into more thoroughly. William Jenisch said the Board has not come to a decision one way or another as to the best solution. The cafeteria is feeding 100 more than last year — the cafeteria might not be able to be used as such if the space was needed for classroom area. Mr. Hodgman asked if the committee was recommending 7 new classrooms. Mr. Jenisch stated that there was a projection figure listed in the committee report. Mr. Gosse explained the intention of the amendment. Clint Whiting asked how inadequate the present set-up is. Mr. Erhard spoke briefly concerning his classroom, stating the noise from the other classroom is difficult to cope with, the lighting is poor, not always warm, etc.

Bruce Caldwell asked Peter James if the first committee recommended yes on May 31st, how do we raise the money for construction. Mr. James said possible would have to go to court to hold a special meeting. Mr. Lavin asked if there was enough playground space available if a five room addition was built. Mr. Russell stated the requirement is 5 acres for each school plus 1 acre per 100 student.

Vote on the amendment on article 5 was taken by a show of hands — to accept 105, to defeat, 17. Vote on article 5 as amended was by voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000.00 and authorize the school board to engage an architect to design an addition on or adjacent to the existing elementary school. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Motion made by Bruce Caldwell and seconded by Clint Whiting as follows: I move the district vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000.00 and authorize the School Board to engage an architect to design an addition on or adjacent to the existing elementary school. Discussion: Mr. James stated that the budget committee did not intend this \$2,000. to be used to hire an architect, but for expense money for all the travel involved for this committee. Warren Fraser said article should be amended. The following amendment to article 6 was made by William Gosse: To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to reimburse building study committee for expenses not to exceed \$2,000. Seconded by Fred Jenisch. Vote on amendment to Article 6 accepted by voice vote.

Warren Fraser suggested that only one committee be appointed inasmuch as the first committee would have gained knowledge they could use in furthering the investigation.

ARTICLE VII. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Motion made by Richard Collins and seconded by Peter James to act on the Budget item by item. Vote by show of hands – in favor 93, against 38.

**BARNSTEAD SCHOOL DISTRICT
MEETING****BARNSTEAD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL****September 21, 1978**

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Richard L. Golden at 7:40 P.M. The meeting was opened with a salute to the flag. The people on the stage were introduced. Article 1 was read by Lloyd Hanson, copy of which is attached. Mr. Hanson noted that the notice was posted as required by law.

A motion was made by Lloyd Hanson as follows:

Mr. Moderator, I move the Barnstead School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$445,000.00 for the construction of an addition to the existing elementary school, for alterations and renovations to said building, for originally equipping and furnishing said addition and renovations, for architectural and other services fees, for site development, for any other items incidental to or necessary for such construction, on land presently owned by the Barnstead School District; that such appropriation be raised by the issuance and sale of bonds or notes upon the credit of the Barnstead School District in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33, as amended; that the Barnstead School Board be authorized to invest said monies and to use the interest earned thereon for said projects; that the Barnstead School Board be authorized to obtain State and other aid which may be available; and that the Barnstead School Board be authorized to determine the time and place of payment of principal and interest, to fix the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of notes and/or bonds, and be authorized to do all other matters in connection therewith and to take any other action relative thereto.

Motion was seconded by Dr. Harold Conrad.

The motion was presented to the floor for discussion.

The Moderator announced that at the end of the discussion, survey sheets would be passed out allowing each person to make a choice from the four plans presented. This would decide which plan the people present would vote on by secret ballot. The plan chosen by the majority will be acted upon and the polls would be open one (1) hour to vote on the bond issue. A two-third majority would be required. When the ballots are counted, this will close the meeting.

The meeting was opened for discussion:

The study committee was introduced by Mr. Fraser, Chairman; Mrs. Sheila Walsh, S. Edward Neister, Wesley Lavin, Peter Yelle.

Since the article was on the floor it was asked if it were necessary to go through the general presentation.

Motion was made by Rodney Boyd and seconded by Mr. Gosse that "Each plan should be explained". Approved on a voice vote. Mr. Fraser explained each plan in detail and added that because of the school population we will have to double the size of the library.

Mr. Hazeltine asked what the projections are for the next five or six years regarding school population. In response Mr. Damon Russell stated that last year, based on a normal projection of 350 by 1981 and 1982 it could be increased by about 30 at that time or 380. According to standards set down it would require 15 classrooms, 6 more than we now have, plus additional library space.

It was explained that Mr. Stokes was present at the meeting because the committee asked several contractors for plans and asked the contracting company to work with the committee, draw up definite plans and see it through to completion. Mr. Stokes has done this at no cost whatsoever to the town so far. That is why the firm of Bonnette Page and Stone was chosen. Mr. Stokes has worked with the committee from the start.

The cost per room for each plan was discussed and estimates were given:

Plan A 6 rooms, \$105,000.00 per room

Plan B 7 rooms, \$101,000.00 per room

Plan C 7 rooms, \$ 77,400.00 per room

Plan D 8 rooms, \$ 88,435.00 per room

In each case future expansion was taken into consideration by the architect.

Some concern was voiced about the location of the water tank and oil tank in relation of Plan C. Mary Gosse also mentioned that delivery trucks create a hazard for small children and Plan C would add to the congestion in the area, and this area could well be used for future parking area since the present parking space is already inadequate.

Members of the School Board were asked for reasons why they preferred Plan B. Some reasons mentioned were:

Immediate access to the library.

Provision is made for a new boiler room.

It would be located closer to the septic system.

The multi-purpose room would have easier access and better

ventilation with room for future expansion if it becomes necessary.

It would be away from the play area so the small children would be no problem.

Mr. Russell supports the position of the Board for Plan B with 8 rooms.

Mrs. Simpson asked if some provision could be made for better ventilation in the office. She was informed this could be taken care of.

In response to Mrs. Lickty's question, "could the new plan support a second story in the future?" she was informed that the walls and foundation as submitted would not carry a second story and had not been considered. To do so would increase the cost considerably and would require the installation of an elevator should a second story be built.

When called on for his opinion, Mr. Caldwell stated that Plan B was his choice.

A short debate was conducted between Mr. Fraser and Mr. Hanson on the pros and cons of Plan C against Plan B.

It was noted that any future Jr. High School would have to be located on a separate piece of property. It would need 300 or more students to do anything in that direction. Alton will no longer take any new students, unless some members of the family are already enrolled, however, the enrollment in Pittsfield has decreased during the past five year making room for Barnstead students.

For the benefit of those present Rodney Boyd, Fire Chief read from the Safety Code Book 101 and stated that Plan B would be a much safer plan than C or D because they would put the kitchen in the middle of the building. Mr. Gosse added that the present location of the kitchen and boiler room give easy access in case of fire for early surveillance and agreed it would not be advisable to block off any of these access routes.

Mrs. Foss asked what the estimated time of completion might be and also how much more will we be asked to come up with next March. It is now costing \$50,000 a month.

She was told the completion date would be September 1, 1979 and that no figures have been estimated yet. The figures will be in the next budget.

We were told that all rooms are the same size, roughly 25' x 36'.

Mr. Wesley Lavin reiterated his opposition to Plan C because of the necessity of using the gym as a corridor. He recommends Plan B. Plans B and D were also the choice of the School Administrator, Ms. Dudley.

Any of the plans shown include a new septic system.

The discussion period concluded, the Moderator asked "Are you ready for the question?" What plan is approved could 10% be added to the cost if necessary? The answer was yes.

At the request of the Moderator, survey slips were distributed so that those present could specify which of the four plans they prefer.

Motion was made by Lloyd Hanson and seconded by Mary Gosse to have the main motion read "accept plan B at the cost of \$445,000.00." Motion was passed by a show of hands. Counting was done by Peg Foss and Betty Conrad:

112 in favor 4 opposed

The Moderator announced "The amendment is carried," but went on to say "This does not preclude additional amendments. Another choice may be made or any other change."

It was voted to accept the motion as amended.

It was announced that some provision will have to be made for pegs on which to hang clothes in each room and also a storage cabinet for the teacher's supplies. This would add approximately \$600.00 to the cost of each room. This is not included in any plan.

Peter James asked "Are we going to allow the School Board and the architect some flexibility?" Mr. Russell reminded him that they have the legal right to alter the plans as presented. They are empowered to make changes as they feel necessary.

No positive solution on changes to be made to the office could be offered at the present time.

Interest on the money will be voted on at the meeting in March.

The Moderator asked if there were any objections to the meeting so far before the voting? None were raised.

The Moderator announced that if those present were ready to vote they would be handed a yes and no ballot to vote for Plan B and to spend \$450,000.00 or to spend nothing.

The polls were opened at 10:01 P.M. and closed at 11:02 P.M.

Town Ballot Clerks and the Supervisor of the Check list were in attendance. Ballots were counted by the Ballot Clerks and the School Clerk.

Results: Yes 106 No 40

The moderator announced that the motion as amended "To accept Plan B at a cost of \$445,000.00 is passed."

The meeting adjourned at 11:10 P.M.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the school district, I respectfully submit my thirteenth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The State Legislature last year started to examine the role of supervisory unions and several specific pieces of legislation were introduced relative to this subject. The most radical proposal would have eliminated supervisory unions, school districts, school boards, and superintendents and create a single, statewide school district.

Bills of this nature were referred to interim study, however, similar proposals are being introduced in the 1979 Legislative Session. A special committee was established by the New Hampshire School Administrators Association which includes representatives from the House and Senate, school board members from four supervisory unions, the State Department of Education and professional administrators from all regions of the state.

BACKGROUND

Looking back in history, in the mid 1800's there were 2343 school districts in New Hampshire governed by citizen commissions. Complaints grew concerning the number of small districts which led an "infinite divisibility" of districts. A change took place in 1885 back to the township system, reducing the number to 267 school districts by the year 1889. School districts at this time relied upon a superintending school committee composed of selected laymen. The first full-time superintendent was hired in 1855 by Manchester, soon to be followed by other largely populated areas in the state. Authority was not forthcoming until 1899 which enabled two or more towns to join together in the employment of a professional superintendent. The legislature reacted strongly to a report on "Defects in the System of Public Schools in New Hampshire" and adopted legislation in 1919 granting authority to the state board of education to set qualifications, certification and duties for superintendents, and further, placed each district within a supervisory union.

Little change has taken place in the organization design of supervisory unions since the law of 1919. The scope of responsibilities have changed considerably over the last sixty years.

SUPERVISORY UNION SERVICES

The services provided by the superintendent of schools back in 1919 were identified as:

1. Direct the work of all teachers and janitors
2. Nominate all teachers
3. Select and purchase textbooks, apparatus and supplies.
4. Keep records and make reports on his doings, condition of the schools, and the financial standings of the districts.
5. Remove immoral or incompetent employees.
6. Secure fuel and other supplies.
7. Admit pupils according to their capacity and attainments.

The present supervisory union structure was formed so that local school districts could join together to provide themselves with necessary administrative services they could not furnish efficiently and economically alone. Services now provided through the Superintendent's Office include:

1. Budget preparation and control.
2. Central purchasing.
3. Building programs and maintenance.
4. State and Federal record keeping reporting.
5. Recruitment and employment of all staff.
6. Public relations, annual reports.
7. Supervision and evaluation of all staff.
8. Curriculum development and coordination of school programs.
9. School health services.
10. School lunch programs.
11. Assessment and placement of handicapped children.
12. Payrolls.
13. Negotiations of teachers and support staff master agreements.
14. Personnel management.
15. Inservice programs.
16. Staff development.
17. Regulatory and administrative functions established by the State Department of Education.
18. Transportation planning and supervision.
19. Professional assistance to each school board.
20. Educational leadership.

These services cannot be provided by one person and the legislature recognized this problem. The state board was authorized to establish not only the position of the superintendent, but also one or more

assistant superintendents when the interests of the schools required it. Since 1919, the state board also has been given the power to certify professional business officials and teacher consultants for supervisory unions.

SUPERVISORY UNION #49

The supervisory union to which your school district has been assigned is known as the Governor Wentworth Supervisory Union #49. The office is located in Wolfeboro, which is approximately twenty-seven miles north of Pittsfield, twenty miles south of Moultonboro and twenty-two miles west of Effingham. There are four school districts assigned to this supervisory union: Alton, Barnstead, Pittsfield and the Governor Wentworth Regional School District consisting of Brookfield, Effingham, Moultonboro, New Durham, Ossipee, Tuftonboro and Wolfeboro. Each school board meets at least once a month, with several board meetings twice, or even more often during negotiation, budget preparation, or special studies, such as building expansion, curriculum revisions, accountability, etc.

This supervisory union ranks second from the top as to the amount of equalized evaluation per pupil while it ranks seventeen out of fifty as to the number of students. The combined districts employ 205 full-time classroom teachers with a near equal number of support staff (custodians, cafeteria workers, secretaries, teacher aides, bus drivers). The central office is responsible for approximately \$6,500,000 appropriated by the four school districts for the support of schools. There is also one building construction project being administered with a potential of over ten million dollars of construction next year.

The educational leadership, program management and fiscal controls are provided by three professional staff members – Superintendent of Schools, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and Business Administrator. The professional staff is supported by a payroll bookkeeper, accounts bookkeeper, secretary, receptionist, and bookkeeper/clerk. The total cost for the management system is approximately two percent of the total amount appropriated for the support of the schools in the supervisory union.

SUMMARY

Schools like other public agencies and business corporations, must have a management system. The New Hampshire school management system is the supervisory union. School board members who are elected by the voters of their individual school district comprise the policy making supervisory union school board. The Superintendent serves as the executive head of the public schools and is responsible for planning

and administering their affairs subject to statutory requirements, the regulations of the State Board of Education, and the policies of the local districts. In performance of these duties, the Superintendent is directly responsible to the State Board of Education through its Commissioner, and the boards of the Supervisory Union.

It has been a busy, productive, and rewarding year. My sincere appreciation to the members of the school boards, assistance and cooperation of professional colleagues, and the students and citizens who have contributed to the improvement of the education provided for your youth.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my sixth annual report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I have selected the following areas to report on: (1) Staffing; (2) Education of the Handicapped; and (3) Accountability.

STAFFING

Five positions, including the principalship, were filled for Barnstead this year. Four of the positions were replacements and one was an additional position to provide for the rapidly increasing student enrollment.

EDUCATION OF THE HANDICAPPED

On November 25, 1975, President Ford signed into law the Education for All Handicapped Children Act, P.L. 94-142. The basic provisions of this act are as follows:

(1) To insure that all handicapped children have available to them a free appropriate public education which includes special education and related services to meet their unique needs.

(2) To insure that the rights of handicapped children and their parents are protected.

Barnstead has placed emphasis on making improvements in its programs in order that the educational needs of handicapped students are being met. To meet these needs, speech therapy and diagnostic prescriptive services from the Spaulding Youth Center have been added. Additional services will need to be provided in future years in order for Barnstead to meet the requirements of the handicapped legislation.

ACCOUNTABILITY

The New Hampshire State Board of Education authorized the Commissioner of Education to develop and implement Accountability Plans throughout the school districts of the state. This plan has been developed to assist local school districts develop systematic planning and evaluation procedures which result in the formulation of formal management plans for improvement by June, 1981.

In order to formulate the management plan, each school district needs to: (1) identify expected student outcomes (2) assess student

performance against the expected outcomes (3) report the result of the assessment (4) interpret the results, and, (5) design a local improvement plan.

The Barnstead administration and instructional staff are working with the other districts of Supervisory Union #49 to identify the expected student outcomes and assessment procedures in the subject areas of English language arts, mathematics, United States history and government, and New Hampshire history and government.

This project will require considerable effort on the part of the professional staff over the next two years. We are optimistic that this effort will be rewarded with a process that will better enable the Barnstead School Board to make decisions about program improvements and allocation of its available resources.

It has been my pleasure to enjoy the support and cooperation of the Barnstead School Board and professional staff.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Barnstead School District, I am pleased to submit this annual report as Principal of Barnstead Elementary School.

The following areas are addressed in this report: 1) Curriculum, 2) Staffing and Enrollment, 3) Accountability Model.

CURRICULUM

This year we have stressed the areas of mathematics and reading. We have tested all students in these two areas using a criterion referenced test. The results of these tests help inform the student, teacher, and parents of 1) what specific skills need to be learned, 2) what skills have to be mastered, 3) what skills need review and 4) a grade equivalent score.

In the fall of 1979 we will continue to work to improve the mathematics and reading programs. We will also at this time begin to organize the social studies and science curriculums to improve the quality of the program and the use of existing materials.

In January of 1979 our program was assessed by the New Hampshire State Department of Education. The results of the first assessment determine our rating as an elementary school in the state. The second review evaluated our Special Education program. Information obtained from both of these reviews should be helpful in our efforts to improve the quality of our program.

STAFFING AND ENROLLMENT

We opened school in September with two new staff members, Monique Lamoureaux and Ralph Peacock in grades two and six respectively. Maxine Cleveland was hired in October to teach grades seven and eight. She replaced Candice Chamberlain who resigned.

The entire staff has worked very hard to do the best job possible in spite of severe overcrowding. We, as a staff, are enthusiastic about the space which will be provided by the new addition. Many times the knowledge that we will have an appropriate facility next year has served to boost morale. The attention and interest that the School Board and community have given to the overcrowded situation is appreciated by the entire staff.

ACCOUNTABILITY MODEL

Our district is at the initial stages in developing a three year accountability plan. As the State Commissioner of Education indicated, "We are fortunate, in New Hampshire, in being able to develop local accountability programs rather than to have one plan adopted by legislative action for all school districts". Our accountability model should 1) address state-mandated areas of English language arts, mathematics, United States history and government, and New Hampshire history and government, and other areas we feel appropriate 2) outline steps to implement the plan and identify a means to know when these steps are completed, and 3) have a time line for the steps of the plan to be accomplished. A good accountability plan should result in sound management and planning processes which will lead to program and individual student performance improvements.

It is important to recognize the many people who have given of their time and expertise to the students of our school including the Barnstead School Board, the staff of the school, the Citizens of Barnstead, and the Central Office Staff. I hope that next year continues to be an effort directed towards the improvement of the programs for our students.

HEALTH REPORT

Most of the children in Grades 1 thru 5 have had their annual eye and ear exam. Children who did not pass the exam had a notice enclosed in their report card indicating this. The children in Grades 6 thru 8 will have their examinations shortly, and parents will be notified of failure in their report cards.

Most parents have been very good about returning emergency cards, but we still have some unreturned. As our school enrollment has increased and many new families have settled here, it is vital that we have this information in the event that we have to contact parents.

Grades 1 thru 6 are participating in a dental fluoride rinse program. The children brush their teeth daily and rinse with fluoride once a week under the direction of the classroom teachers. This should reduce cavities in the children by 30%. All of the teachers have been very supportive and enthusiastic about the program. We hope to continue the program for several years. The Bureau of Dental Health Services provides the fluoride rinse and the toothbrushes for the children at no cost to us. Parents must sign a permission slip to have their children participate. We also have a matching funds dental program. The children are taken to Dr. Gruette in Northwood for necessary dental work.

Class physicals are scheduled for Grades 3, 5, and 7 during February. Dr. Conrad and Paula Golden will be doing the physicals this year.
