1989 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March 1989 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and vote on any ballot items.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to add to the Bicentennial Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to place in the Dump Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the transfer of \$50,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to place in the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund

and authorize the transfer of \$25,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000.00 for a new highway truck and to authorize the transfer of \$65,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to amend the Floodplain Development Ordinance by adding Item X as follows:

Item X Activity in the Floodway

- 1. Application - This regulation applies only to designated Regulatory Floodways in the Town of Bartlett.
- 2. Procedure - State of New Hampshire Dredge and Fill Permit applications requesting development in any regulatory floodway will not be processed by the Town of Bartlett until determination has been made that the request meets all the requirements of the Bartlett Floodplain Ordinance.
- 3. Permitted Activities - The only development permitted in the Regulatory Floodway will be for the protection or preservation of public and/or private property.
- 4. Technical Studies - The Board of Selectmen may utilize technical studies and/or consultants as necessary to properly administer this amendment with costs to be borne by the applicant.
- 5. Waivers - The Board of Selectmen may waive any of the provisions of this item where unusual hardship can be demonstrated.

Selectmen Favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to adopt an ordinance governing septic system design and construction as follows:

TOWN OF BARTLETT ORDINANCE
GOVERNING THE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF SEPTIC
SYSTEMS

I. Reference

- A. NH Code of Administrative Rules, Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq
- B. Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Regulations, and Test Pit Ordinance.

II. Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the groundwater

resources; to insure the proper placement and construction of in ground septic systems; and to promote the general health and welfare of the citizens of the Town of Bartlett.

III. Design of the Septic Systems

Septic systems will be designed, constructed and/or modified to accommodate potential septage flow of the proposed use in accordance with the unit design flow figures contained in NH Code of Administrative Rules, Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq. Prior to expanding or revising the use of any land or structure, which would increase the potential load on septic systems the existing septic system will be modified to accommodate the increased potential flow in accordance with the unit design flow figures contained in Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq. Metering of actual septage flow in order to decrease the required size and capacity of a septic system as provided for in this section is not permitted.

IV. Procedure

All septic plans will be processed through the Town of Bartlett to the NH DES-WSPCC. The Town of Bartlett will review the plan and verify as necessary the topography, soil data, system sizing and compliance with other Town of Bartlett ordinances/regulations. This review will in no way imply approval or viability of the septic system design. A fee of \$50.00 will be assessed for each septic plan processed by the Town.

V. Definition

A dwelling unit is defined as one room or rooms connected together, constituting a separate, single-family, independent housekeeping establishment and physically separated from any other rooms or dwelling units which may be in the same structure and containing independent cooking, bathroom, and sleeping facilities.

VI. Use of More than One Lot

If for any reason any part of a septic system is proposed to be built on a lot contiguous to the lot on which the structure will be built, the two lots must be combined by a boundary line adjustment in accordance with the Town of Bartlett Subdivision Regulations.

VII. Waivers

The Board of Selectmen may waive any of the provisions of this item where unusual hardship can be demonstrated.

Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,000.00 for the preparatory expenses and editing of the History of Bartlett in conjunction with Bartlett's Bicentennial. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathleen Sullivan Head and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,597.00 for the purchase of a new Volvo police cruiser (to replace an existing cruiser) and authorize the transfer of \$15,597.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the first year costs of a full-time fire chief for the Town of Bartlett, an official vehicle, and associated costs. Submitted by the Selectmen at the request of Fire Chief Roger Labbe.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to purchase a 500 gallon per minute pump for the Fire Department and to authorize the transfer of \$6,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to change the procedure of selecting Planning Board members to be changed from the present method of appointing members to that of electing them as provided by NH RSA 637:2 (II) (b). It is further requested that an article be placed on the Warrant for the 1989 Town Meeting so that voters can decide if the procedure of electing planning board members is to be adopted by the Town of Bartlett, the first election of members to take place at the 1990 Town Meeting for terms as provided in NH RSA 673:5. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,185.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,905.00 for support of the Nutrition and Transportation Programs for the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gordon Robert Wentworth and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$685.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$875.00 to assist the Family Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Julie Bennett and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dale Goodwin and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Norman Laughlin and others. Hodgkins and Chadbourne favor; Chandler opposes - favors \$1,000.00.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$871.85 for Children Unlimited, Inc. said sum being equal to \$0.55 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen opposed.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,856.60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.80 per person in the Town of Bartlett (1,368 - Based on 1986 Census from the Office of State Planning). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,975.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Victoria Harlow and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to support the Saco River Advisory Council for the purpose of making recommendations to the Town and to the New Hampshire River Management Advisory Committee, as provided in Senate Bill 326 of 1988, for the protection and management of the Saco River and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint representatives to the Saco River Advisory Council. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard M. Plusch and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen

to accept a deed from the Forest Ledge Property Owners Association for a certain parcel of land intended for public use for a road or street and other utilities; said parcel being 66 feet in width and approximately 1450 feet in total length, more specifically being the Forest Ledge Road; said parcel being described and shown on a plan entitled Glen Ledge Area, Subdivision Plan, prepared by Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, Inc. dated 1976, updated 7/24/80. Further being described and shown on a plan of Forest Ledge a subdivision for R. Michael Lynn, dated 10/31/86. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to a standard established by the Town of Bartlett and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Russell Fish and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from West Side Woods, Inc. for a certain parcel of land intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66 feet in width and approximately 2350 feet in total length, more specifically being named "Effie Circle" (off West Side Road (River Road) on left heading towards Glen) and the continuation of to intersect back into West Side Road; said parcel being described and shown on a plan entitled "Squires & Callahan & Kyle", Proposed 29 Lots, Bartlett, NH dated December 3, 1987. Approved on May 2, 1988 by Town of Bartlett and recorded in Book 111, Page 70 of the Carroll County Registry of Deeds. Acceptance of deed is contingent upon construction of a road to a standard established by the Town of Bartlett and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert D. Kyle and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 30. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In nine months Bartlett will be celebrating its 200th birthday and as evidenced by the picture on the cover of this report, significant changes have occurred since those early days. While not everyone will agree that the changes are for the better, they are here nonetheless and we must deal with them in a prudent and hopefully cost effective manner. Some problems are inherent with "progress and growth" and among these are new schools, increased police activity, solid waste, town roads, lawsuits and a variety of other issues.

The Selectmen and School Board have worked closely in trying to implement necessary school funding for buildings and programs, yet minimize the impact to the taxpayer. While some differences still exist, the dialogue has been favorable and some positive results have been gained.

The Town was involved in three lawsuits during the past year. One concerned a suit against the Town for improper plowing or removal of snow resulting in injury to an operator of a vehicle exiting the dump. Another involved a West Side landowner unsuccessfully trying to overturn a Zoning Board of Adjustment ruling. The third concerns the construction of an amenities building on West Side Road. Along these same lines, the Selectmen and Planning Board are exploring administrative and legal remedies against a developer for violation of subdivision approvals, septic approvals, and building permit violations.

At the 1988 Town Meeting the Town approved a much needed expansion to the Town Hall. The expansion provided much needed office space for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Planning Board, and additional vault space for the storage of vital town records. The project is completed and you are invited to inspect the new facilities. The Board of Selectmen wishes to add that it accepts no responsibility for the color of paint that adorns its walls.

We are still negotiating with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the State concerning the April 1987 flood damage. You will remember that the major damage was to the River Street Bridge with relatively minor damage occurring to town roads and the Saco River flood berms just downstream from "Second Iron". It appears that we may be successful in obtaining reimbursement for the total costs of the damage and negotiations are ongoing.

The most important news, however, from Town Hall is concerned more with the future than the past. Most of you are aware that our

“dump” contract with Garland Ridge Corp. expires in December 1989 after ten years of operations. By the time you read this report the Carroll County Commissioners will have contracted with an engineering firm to recommend a solution and a site for a Carroll County owned and operated county-wide solid waste disposal facility. While your Board is enthusiastic about this approach we are fully aware that it will be three to five years before the plan can come to fruition and in the meantime Bartlett needs and must have an interim solution. We are exploring two possibilities; a revised contract with Garland Ridge Corporation to continue at the present dump site through a method known as “lift” which means when you run out of room to put it in a hole you pile it up, and secondly, hauling our solid waste to SANCO in Bethlehem. Under the second solution we would need to build a minimal transfer facility in Bartlett and funds would have to be provided in 1989 to construct such a facility. Recycling will eventually become an integral part of any solution. Whatever happens we reluctantly must report that garbage and its disposition is getting extremely costly and the days when we waited for a heavy rain and the Saco to rise so we could walk down River Street and throw garbage off the bridge are over. The one encouraging fact concerning garbage and maybe the only one is that a pervasive dialogue has begun in NH. We can only wait vigilantly for the results of that dialogue, do everything we can to influence its direction and costs, and keep our hands on our purses.

You are all aware of the problems many communities in the State of New Hampshire are experiencing with excessively high property tax rates and their attempts to control tax rate increases with tax caps. Bartlett is indeed fortunate to have one of the lowest tax rates in New Hampshire mainly as a result of the condominium boom of the past few years which has impacted moderately on town services. We cannot, however, expect this situation to continue. Big cost ticket items in our near future include a needed addition to our school, closure of the town landfill, a new solid waste disposition plan, and a new fire truck and ambulance. The Board of Selectmen will need your vigilance and support in avoiding the many spending pitfalls and habits that are currently bedeviling our fellow communities.

The Selectmen are sorry to report that the holder of Bartlett's Boston Post Cane, Ruby Mead, passed away during 1988 at the grand old age of 95. The Selectmen are now trying to determine Bartlett's oldest citizen. If you can help, please contact the Selectmen.

The Selectmen would like to thank all Town employees and department heads for their enthusiastic and capable work over the past year. We are indeed fortunate to have such dedicated employees. The Selectmen would also like to thank all the citizen volunteers who serve on the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Fire Departments, Ambulance Service, and the many other Town committees who really make a difference in helping to run the Town. 1988 BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The Bartlett Public Library circulated 7,230 books in 1988, and added 372 new books to its collection. Many of these books were gifts to the library. Special Library programs included weekly pre-school story hours during the school year and a book fair in June.

Your librarian has been appointed to the New Hampshire Library Council as a representative of rural and school libraries. This council meets monthly at libraries throughout the state or at the State Library.

The Bartlett Public Library's Board of Trustees has adopted the completion of a written town history as its goal for the coming year. The Bartlett History Volunteers meet every other Tuesday evening at 7:00 at the library to work on town records and history. If this goal is to be reached for next year's Bicentennial observance, the volunteers will need help. They need help in gathering historical facts about Bartlett. The following are ways that you can help:

- Donate pictures (which can be donated to the Town History or copied and returned).
- Compile brief histories of the inns and hotels of Bartlett.
- Donate materials and/or information relating to the industries of Bartlett.
- Gather information and pictures on the early history of skiing and other sports.

This history is an important opportunity to make a lasting contribution to your town. Please help.

This spring the library is sponsoring a series of programs through the New Hampshire Humanities Council. The first program, "New Hampshire on Skis: Past, Present, and Future," will be presented on February 28th at 7:30 P.M. in the Bartlett school gym by Mr. John Allen of the History Department at Plymouth State College. He will be showing an entertaining early film on ski instructing as part of his presentation.

Other programs being presented are:

- "The Notch through the Ages" - presented by William Taylor of Plymouth State College. His presentation will focus on the alteration of Crawford Notch by human activity and technology. It will be accompanied by a slide show.

- “The New England Town” - presented by Jere Daniell of Dartmouth College features towns of the White Mountains with a focus on the founding of Bartlett and surrounding areas.
- “The Tie That Binds” - a slide show presented by William Taylor of Plymouth College is an overview of the history of railroading in New Hampshire.

The librarian and trustees were saddened by the death of our treasurer, David Taylor. David served as a trustee since 1983. He contributed much time and enthusiasm to the Library Board of Trustees during his tenure and always had an abundance of good humor and common sense. We will miss him.

The library is seeking a part-time person as library assistant. This person would work two afternoons a week as well as fill in for the librarian on her vacation, or when she is attending workshops, library meetings or conferences. Contact the library for more information.

As this report is being prepared plans are being developed for school construction because of the overcrowded conditions in the present school. The library is also beginning to outgrow its space. If this construction becomes a reality, the library will have to be temporarily relocated during the construction period. We will find some place to continue providing library services.

Our public library hours are listed below. Public library patrons may use the library during school hours. The librarian may be busy with a class but will be happy to assist patrons whenever possible.

BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett:

1988 was our busiest year on record. We have had 240 calls for service, that is one every 36 hours.

We now have fifteen full time members of which most have advanced training. Like the local fire departments, we are always looking for new members who are willing to put in a lot of time and effort, with the greatest reward being a "Thank You" in someone's time of need. So instead of finding fault, contact your local fire or ambulance service, and help us to help others.

Our donations this year are about seven hundred dollars. This money can go towards training and equipment, updating our service to state of the art. It will also help offset the costs of being tested for transferable medical diseases for our members.

Our ambulance is now seven years old. At the end of 1988 we have invested about fifteen hundred dollars in repairs to engine and electrical systems. In 1990 we will have to purchase a new ambulance at an approximate cost of seventy-five thousand dollars. Any and all tax deductible specified donations would be gratefully accepted and recognized. Please help us to keep all costs as low as possible. I would like to take this opportunity to assure everyone, that when your ambulance is down for repairs, our team is not. Our response time is still just a matter of a few minutes. Actual transport to Memorial Hospital would be made by North Conway Ambulance Service, with our personnel in attendance. We all work as a team, and many thanks to all.

In closing, I would like to thank the local fire and police personnel for their help on many of our calls.

In January of 1989 we responded to 24 calls, compared to 18 for 1988. As you can see our calls are increasing, and should continue to do so as the town grows.

Our members are continually improving in their skills as fire-fighters; this involves many hours of training for all members, while some members have taken more advance courses such as firefighter I, the handling of propane, and air packs. Presently all but 7 members are certified with the air packs.

At present we have a complement of 29 volunteers, but more are needed. We are continually looking for more members.

We appreciate the support from the community, and that of the Police Department, and Ambulance Service. You all help in making our job easier.

Please remember, only YOU can prevent fires.

**REPORT OF
TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with YOUR help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, he uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. 1988 MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

Meeting opened at 7:05 PM by Moderator William Paine.

Selectman Hodgkins led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Paine read the posted warrant as follows:

“To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the eighth day of March 1988 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 22, 1988 at the post offices in Glen and Bartlett, at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School, the places of meeting, all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Signed, Frederick T. Hodgkins, Gene G. Chandler, James F. Chadbourne, Board of Selectmen.”

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and vote on any ballot items. Moderator Paine read the results as follows:

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion to accept the budget of \$685,920.00 by Frederick Hodgkins, seconded by Gene Chandler. Moderator Paine recognized Frederick Hodgkins to explain the budget. Brief discussion on various items. No further discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED (\$685,920.00).

At this time Moderator Paine recognized Gene Chandler who made a motion to take Article 14 next (out of order), seconded by James Chadbourne. Chandler explained the reason for taking this article out of order is to facilitate a ballot vote if it is necessary since it is a bond issue (which requires 2/3 vote) and the polls need to be open for an hour. Vote was taken - PASSED.

Moderator Paine read the article as follows: ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112,000.00 for the purchase of a new pumper fire truck and to borrow in the name of the Town by issuance of serial notes and bonds, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), a sum not to exceed \$112,000.00 for the purpose of defraying the costs of the foregoing, and to authorize the Town Officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Selectmen favor. Motion was made by Chandler, seconded by Chadbourne to amend the article to read a sum not to exceed \$99,000.00 with the balance of \$13,000.00 to be raised by taxes. Chandler explained that by reducing this to under \$100,000.00 that a 2/3 ballot vote would not be required. Brief discussion on what type of truck it is, where it will be housed, and what it is replacing were answered by Fire Chief Roger Labbe. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment - PASSED. Vote was taken on the Article as amended - PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the

current municipal year. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to add to the Bicentennial Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion on amount in Capital Reserve now (\$1,585.87), when the Bicentennial is (1990) and whether there is a committee working on it (No, volunteers should contact Jean Garland at the library). No further discussion. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money for the purposes of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purpose of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriate funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the Selectmen. Selectmen favor. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No discussion. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following pursuant to NH RSA 673:6-1 to provide for the appointment of not more than 5 alternate members to the Planning Board who shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a term of three years. Selectmen favor. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chadbourne spoke to the article. Joe Heuston volunteered to be one of the alternates. No further discussion. Vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to advertise for lease the town-owned Stillings Farm property on Allen Road. Said lease shall be limited to any resident of Bartlett. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Discussion ensued re: insurance on the property, state of repair or disrepair, potential uses, and stipulations in the lease. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to provide \$2,500.00 for emergency repairs to the building and to allow it to be used by various non-profit organizations. More discussion on use of property and asked to do the repairs and come back to Town Meeting next year with a proposed use. No further discussion. Vote was taken on the amendment - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended -PASSED (\$2,500 for emergency repairs/no lease/use by non-profit organizations).

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund (pursuant to RSA Chapter 35) for the future revaluation of the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 towards this purpose, and appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer this fund. Selectmen favor. Motion made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion on timetable and cost. Vote was taken on all three sections of the article - ALL PASSED.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for an addition to the Town Hall to expand the vault for safe and fireproof storage of property records and to authorize the transfer of \$50,000.00 of the December 31, 1987 fund balance for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler gave brief explanation of diagram on wall. No further discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 to purchase a brush chipper for the highway department and to withdraw \$11,500.00 from the Highway Capital Reserve Fund to pay for same. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler gave explanation. No discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500.00 for the purchase of a new Volvo police cruiser. A 1985 cruiser will be sold to the highest bidder and the funds used to reduce the \$15,500.00 cost of the cruiser to \$12,500.00. Selectmen

favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion on what was being replaced and mileage. No further discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 which will enable the Town to hire a fourth full time police officer. Said money to cover that portion of the 1988 salary, benefits, and retirement for said officer. Submitted by the Selectmen at the request of the Chief of Police. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion on salary amount, need for officer, Garcia decision, and time period this covers. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote - PASSED. No further discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to raise the light poles approximately 20 feet with a new lighting system for use at the Bartlett ballfield. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joe Heuston and others. Selectmen favor \$2,250.00 with solicitation from the private sector. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Joe Heuston spoke to the article. Discussion ensued re: actual cost of lighting system, who uses the ballfield, and who owns the ballfield. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$2,250.00 with the matching funds to be raised from other sources first before the town pays its portion. Vote was taken on the amendment - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended - PASSED (\$2,250.00 with matching funds raised first).

Moderator Paine then recognized Gene Chandler who made a motion to accept and vote on Articles 17-21 as a group, seconded by Chadbourne. Moderator Paine then read the articles. Discussion then ensued on Article 17:

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 to hire a Summer Recreation Director and Red Cross Swim Instructor to work in coordination with the Bartlett Summer School Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joe Rivers and others. Selectmen favor. Discussion re: hiring a person to handle special ed. children. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$2,800.00 in order to pay for a special ed instructor for the summer program. Vote was taken - DEFEATED.

Moderator Paine then returned to the original motion to accept and vote on Articles 17-21 as a group. Vote was taken - PASSED (Articles 17-21).

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,880.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Victoria Harlow and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,550.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services and the Gibson Center Meals and Wheels Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Hellen Hayes and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for support of the Community Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,560.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gayle Richards and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

Moderator Paine continued with the following articles:

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,060.00 to provide a Valley Social Service Worker to assist the eight towns now served by the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by Hellen Hayes and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to pass over the article. Vote was taken - PASSED OVER.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Jane Stoutermire spoke to the article as did the director of the program. Discussion ensued. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$1,000.00. Vote was taken - DEFEATED. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote was taken - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article - PASSED (\$400.00).

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$825.00 to assist the Carroll County Family Planning and PreNatal Program (Family Health Center). Agreeable to a petition signed by Helen Kurz and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the

article as read. Julie Bennett spoke to the article. Discussion ensued re: policies of the program. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote was taken - Moderator ruled it passed, Richard Patch challenged the ruling. Moderator called for a division of the house - Moderator's ruling sustained, question was moved. Vote was taken on the article - Standing vote was necessary - Yes = 55/No = 48 - PASSED.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the support of the Young Mothers Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gayle Richards and others. Selectmen oppose. Motion was made and seconded to pass over the article. Vote was taken - PASSED OVER.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph D. Van Note, Jr. and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Van Note spoke to the article. Discussion re: who should pay. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote was taken - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article - Standing vote was necessary - Yes = 45/No = 49 - DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Hodgkins spoke to the article. Discussion re: who should pay for it and who uses it. Motion was made to amend the article to \$7,000.00 but failed due to no second. Vote was taken on the article - DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by William C. Lepis and others. Selectmen favor \$1,000.00. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Don Knowles spoke to the article with permission from the Moderator. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$1,000.00. Vote was taken - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended -PASSED (\$1,000.00).

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$759.55 for Children Unlimited, Inc. said sum being equal to

\$.55 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen opposed. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. Brief discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the Bartlett Express newsletter. A total of \$4,000.00 is needed to pay the costs of publishing and distribution over and above the funds received from advertising and donations. The balance of the \$4,000.00 (\$2,000.00) appears in the school budget. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Duggan and others. Selectmen favor \$1,000.00 with increased solicitation from the private sector. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Joe Rivers spoke to the article. Discussion re: solicitation from private sector, funds from ads, and its purpose. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote - PASSED. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$1,000.00. Vote was taken - PASSED. Vote was taken on article as amended - PASSED (\$1,000).

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mary Eliason and others. Selectmen oppose and favor increased solicitation from the private sector. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Mary Eliason spoke to the article. Discussion re: solicitation from private sector. Motion was made and seconded to amend the article to \$1,000.00. Vote was taken - PASSED. Vote was taken on the article as amended - PASSED (\$1,000).

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,462.40 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.80 per person in the Town of Bartlett (1,368 - Based on 1986 Census from the Office of State Planning). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. Vote was taken - PASSED.

Moderator Paine then recognized Gene Chandler who made a motion to accept and vote on Articles 33 and 34 as a group, seconded by James Chadbourne. Chandler spoke to his motion explaining that

the roads were subject to the approval by the Selectmen and the road in Article 34 is already maintained by the town but just was never deeded properly. No discussion. Vote was taken - PASSED. (Articles 33 and 34 both accepted).

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Goodrich Joint Venture for a certain parcel of land intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66 feet in width and approximately 4,150 feet in total length, more specifically being the Ellis Ridge Road (first left off the Glen Ledge Road) and the continuation of Goodrich Falls Road to intersect with Ellis Ridge Road; said parcel being described and shown on a plan entitled "Ellis Ridge Subdivision Phase I prepared by York Land Services Company dated July 31, 1987". Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to a standard established by the Town of Bartlett and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Glen Acres Corp. for land sixty six (66) feet in width for Public street or highway and utility purposes, as shown on a plan entitled "Kearsarge Heights" recorded at the Carroll County Registry of Deeds at plan book 40, page 47, and at the Town Office. Said highway being an extension of Skyline Drive, approximately 1650 feet in length, running from lot 20 to Lots 10 and 12 on said recorded plan, meaning all of the balance of Skyline Drive, as shown on said plan, not previously deeded to said Town. Agreeable to a petition signed by Irene R. Rice and others. Selectmen favor. (PASSED)

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of NH RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure. These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. Agreeable to a petition signed by Howard C. Nichols and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Howard Nichols spoke to the article. Brief explanation by Gene Chandler. Moderator Paine declared that if the vote is unanimous, then a ballot vote will not be necessary. Vote was taken - PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

ARTICLE 36. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting. Moderator Paine asked if the body felt that the polls should be open until 6:30 PM. Discussion re: who sets the polling hours, no matter when you set them you still get people who miss, and logistics of getting to Town Meeting. Selectmen agreed to take this into consideration when setting the hours for next Town Meeting.

Joseph Keleman raised a question on parking. Moderator Paine ruled him out of order and suggested he see the Selectmen on Friday morning. Mary Eliason raised a question of some unpaid bills she had. Moderator Paine ruled her out of order and suggested she see the Selectmen on Friday morning.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Town of Bartlett has met unprecedented growth with a strong and dynamic zoning ordinance, a competent staff, and a Planning Board, that has undertaken as one of its major goals and objectives, to preserve the quality, traditions and character of a 200 year old New England town.

In response to overwhelming pressure to develop large tracts of land, the planning board spent nearly two years meeting with engineers, land planners, environmentalists and hydrologists to develop a proposal that would address future development and preserve in perpetuity, the large open tracts of land and the rural quality of life in New Hampshire.

The proposal failed to draw the support it needed to pass, but valuable tools and information were gained and a clear direction for the future was established.

With the invaluable aid of the Planning Board assistant, Beverly Weld, an extensive and comprehensive study of all condominium projects was undertaken and completed. An update of town owned roads was completed, and a study to determine all approved and unapproved septic systems within the town is nearly finished. Work has begun on updating the master plan and discussions for drafting a capital improvements plan are underway.

The goals of this board are clear and simple: to manage the growth we are unable to stop, preserve the pristine quality of our rivers and forests, provide for the safe protection of our groundwater and plan for a viable economic future for the children who shall inherit.

TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY-LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more and/or construction which would affect the assessed value of the property. Violation = fine of up to \$100/day.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

PARKER PIT REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation = fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of \$10.00+ board reimbursement.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation + fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.

ZONING ORDINANCE: covers setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, signs, etc. Copies available at Town Hall.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs the excavation of gravel pits.

Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.
