Evening Session

Moderator, Peter W. Smith, called the meeting to order at 8:22 P.M. at the Town Building. The Moderator related that due to the lateness of the hour he would announce under Article 1 only the results of the top two vote getters where applicable, or the top two write-ins. The other results could be read in next years town report.

Article 1. Acted upon by ballot vote. The Moderator read the results of Article 1, and declared the following duly elected: Karleen J. Sanborn, Town Clerk; Donald Lavoie, Selectman; Nancy Dickowski, Treasurer; Pauline Keach, Tax Collector; Howard Sanborn, Constable; Daniel Tucker, Road Agent; George E. Tucker, Jr., Trustee of Trust Funds (three year term); JoAnne Hatch, Supervisor of Checklist (three year term to complete unexpired term due to resignation); Russell Bonnevie, Sarah Deabler, and Mortimer L. Fisch, Library Trustees (three year terms). Articles 30, 31, 32, and 33 voted upon by ballot all carried.

Article 2. (\$430,712.50 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same:

Ian MacDonald asked for an explanation of the increase in the appropriation for the Police Department. An explanation was offered by Selectman William Russell.

Ian MacDonald asked for an explanation of the \$15,405.48 over the cost of the Town Dump last year. Selectmen Bruce Kilkenny and William Russell offered an explanation that included that the Town Dump was contracted and the new State regulations had to be met.

John Rolli asked about the up-keep of the skating rink, Mr. Rolli moved to increase the Parks, Pool, Skating Rink, Ski Tow, and Little League appropriation by \$500.00 for the

up-keep of the skating rink, seconded by Richard Pollak. After considerable discussion in which it was revealed that last years appropriation had a balance, Mr. Rolli withdrew his motion to amend as did the second, Richard Pollak.

Ian MacDonald moved to reduce the Town Dump appropriation from \$42,000.00 to \$28,000.00 reducing the budget by \$14,000.00 seconded by Simone Stackpole. There was considerable discussion including concern about pollution, alternatives to the landfill and the expense of going with an alternative. Selectman William Russell introduced Barry Hagar and Roy Sanborn of Sanco Disposal and American Waste Systems. Mr. Hagar explained that the State has changed it's mandates and is requiring Sanco to line the landfill at considerable cost along with increasing transportation costs. Also discussed by Selectman Russell were the increasing possibilities of either a compactor or larger containers at the transfer station to reduce transportation costs. Selectman Kilkenny related that the cost of going with a compactor would be \$8,000.00 in concrete alone and \$47,000.00 over all cost. Concern was expressed by citizens as to the number of towns using the landfill. Leonard Reed moved the Motion. Moderator Peter Smith said he was reluctant to cut off discussion. After some other discussion a vote on the amendment to reduce the Town Dump appropriation from \$42,000.00 to \$28,000.00 was called. Richard Prescott expressed concern about persons present, but not on the checklist. The Moderator directed all those not on the checklist to move to the side of the Hall and refrain from voting. The amendment was duly voted and failed. There was little additional discussion on the Town Dump appropriation.

Anthony Pepitone asked why the appropriation for the Golf Course had been reduced. Selectman Bruce Kilkenny related that there was no monies included for the golf carts as the carts would be the total responsibility of the Pro, and also that the Pros bonus was cut in half. With some questions concerning the Golf Course income discussion ended.

Keith Houske asked what the \$1,500.00 for Holidays and Landscaping was used for. Selectman Kilkenny explained the mowing of Town property. There was some discussion on the frequency of mowing.

George Tucker asked for an explanation of the income from the Cemetery Trust Funds. Selectman Russell related that the Town had asked for and received the money from the Trustees of Trust Funds for the pruning of trees, etc. Mr. Tucker said he understood it was to be used for care of lots and flowers. With some other discussion it was advised by Alistair MacBain that the cemetery funds had been allowed to combine by RSA in 1976, which allows for more lucrative interest making possibilities.

George Epstein asked what the \$2,500.00 for the Information Booth was used for. Selectman Russell directed Mr. Epstein to page 49 of the Town Report - salaries, electricity, telephone, etc. Mr. Epstein moved to eliminate that expendi-

ture and have the Fraternal organizations and volunteers take it over; to strike the item. The motion failed due to a lack of a second.

With no other discussion Article 2 as written was duly voted and carried.

Article 3. (\$162,300.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highway purposes the following sums:

With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 4. (\$100.00 appropriated) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the Littleton Hospital. There was some discussion concerning the reduction in the requested appropriation this year. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 5. (\$2,682.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-two Dollars (\$2,682.00) for the White Mountain Mental Health Center. Richard Pollak moved to reduce the appropriation to \$1,500.00 the same as we gave last year, seconded by Wayne Derby. Leonard Reed spoke for the White Mountain Mental Health Center's requested amount. Mr. Reed related Bethlehem had received in excess of \$38,000.00 in services, and funding also came from the State, the Federal Government and the County. After further discussion, it was brought up that White Mountain Mental Health Center maintains a 24 hour crises line, confirmed by Mr. Reed. The amendment was duly voted and failed. With no other discussion the original Article as written was duly voted and carried.

Article 6. (\$3,129.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars (\$3,129.00) for the North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 7. (\$750.00 appropriated) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for Community Action Outreach

Program. James Norris moved to increase the appropriation to \$1,500.00 seconded by George Epstein. After some discussion concerning the adequacy of the \$750.00, George Epstein withdrew his second. With no other second to Mr. Norris's motion the amendment to increase to \$1,500.00 failed for lack of a second. With no other discussion the original Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 8. (250.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) for the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 9. (\$1,593.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (\$1,593.00) for North Country Council, Inc. Richard Pollak spoke in favor of the appropriation relating the many services provided. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 10. (\$500.00 appropriated) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission. Keith Houske asked where does the money go? Richard Pollak felt our support was needed as it is the only airport in the area capable of handling commercial flights which would be a boom to the Town. With little other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 11. (\$500.00 appropriated) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such expenditures as may be necessary to continue qualification of Ambulance operation under the Statute HR151 effective September 1, 1972 in an amount not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00). Richard Giunta as an ambulance volunteer spoke asking for additional volunteer support, asking that any interested person contact anyone on the Ambulance crew, or Kay Keiler the coordinator, or Howard Sanborn our Police Chief. John Rolli asked that we might consider paying the Ambulance volunteers as we do the volunteer firemen. Evelyn Garneau an EMT on the Ambulance volunteer crew related that the volunteers do not wish to be paid as it would increase their liability. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 12. (\$9,001.00 appropriated) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Nine Thousand and One Dollars (\$9,001.00) for the purpose of purchasing property owned by Phillip Martignetti on Prospect Street and consisting of the third tee and a portion of the fairway of the Bethlehem Municipal Golf Course. Bruce Brown asked how many feet were involved. Selectman William Russell

related about 396 linear feet or 1 1/2 acres. After some discussion Selectman Russell said the \$9,001.00 was set by Mr. Martignetti as it was listed on the market for \$10,000.00. Neil Chase remarked that it would be a mistake to end up with a seventeen hole golf course. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 13. (\$3,500.00 appropriated) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to employ the services of a certified public accountant to audit the Town accounts for 1985. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 14. It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will choose one auditor for the ensuing year. Bruce Kilkenny moved we pass over the Article due to the action taken on Article 13 seconded by William Russell. With a short explanation given by Selectman Kilkenny and Selectman Russell, and Moderator Smith, the motion to pass over was duly voted and carried.

RESULT: No action taken.

Article 15. (no appropriation) It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to purchase a tank to store gasoline for the Police Department. There was some discussion concerning leaded and unleaded gasoline and the vehicles using each. With little additional discussion the Article was duly voted and failed.

Article 16. (\$24,000.00 authorized) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, and/or Anti-recession Funds for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated, or take any other action hereon:

With little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 17. (\$72,500.00 authorized) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize a sum not to exceed Seventy-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$72,500.00) for the Reappraisal of the Town. James Tibbetts spoke for the reappraisal relating it had been thirteen years since the last reassessment. Mr.

Tibbetts also stated that the Statutes say we should be taxed at 100% of market value and that we are keeping people from investing in the Town as we need to be on a fair and equal basis reducing the tax rate. There was lengthy discussion including costs of State versus a private firm, approval by State, financing, etc. Selectman Kilkenny assured the Town that the reappraisal would go out to bid. After additional discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 18. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell If the foregoing Article 17 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town the sum of money so raised and appropriated and for the purpose in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, delegating to the Board of Selectmen the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, or discount rate or notices providing for the sale thereof. After some discussion concerning the cost to tax payers if the money (\$72,500.00) was to be expended all in one year, a division vote was called. The result of the division vote was Yes, 100 and No, 12. The Article passed by a two-thirds majority.

Article 19. (\$40,000.00 authorized) It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) of surplus monies to aid in defraying the current year's budget (1985) and ease the effect on the tax rate. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 20. (\$35,000.00 authorized) It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the construction of two (2) tennis courts with all appurtenances, fencing and landscaping. Also to construct additional cross country ski trails as may be deemed feasible. And to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend federal Land and Water Conservation Funds, grant funds or other federal or state funds which may be available for this project to reduce the cost to the Town. Richard Coney said matching grant funds would be applied for making the cost to the Town \$17,500.00. There was considerable discussion including location, when the monies would be expended, whether to include snow mobile trails, the cost of the courts, and the possibility of not receiving matching grant funds. Selectmen Russell related if the matching funds are not granted the appropriation would be dropped. There was other discussion including users fees. Selectman Kilkenny stated he was not in favor of users fees for the Town's people and should be used for the Town only. Selectman Russell agreed. Neil Chase recommended a hard court with a skating rink in the winter, as maintenance of clay courts is difficult. After some other discussion Michael Whitcomb moved to table the Article seconded by Leonard Malenowski. Selectman

Russell reminded that if it was tabled we would loose the grant funds until next year as the deadline date for application is March 22, 1985. After some discussion the motion to table was duly voted and failed. With no other discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 21. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell If the foregoing Article 20 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the Credit of the Town the sum of money so raised an appropriated and for the purpose in accordance, with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, delegating to the Board of Selectmen the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, or discount rate or notices providing for the sale thereof. With no discussion the Moderator called for a division vote as a two-thirds majority was needed for passage. The result of the division vote was Yes, 81 and No, 3. The Article passed by a two-thirds majority.

Article 22. It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 23. It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time to pay current maintenance and operating expenses for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 24. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector and a Deputy Town Clerk. James Norris asked if any salary was involved. Selectman Russell replied no. With no other comments the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 25. It was moved by William Russell and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Deed of Tax Collector by public auction or sealed bid after advertisement of intention to sell.

Selectman Russell reverted back to Article 24 to say he did not know about salary for a Deputy Town Clerk and Deputy Tax Collector now that Eleanor Corliss is no longer Tax Collector, as Eleanor and Karleen always covered for one another without compensation.

Continuing with Article 25, with little discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 26. It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue a parking ban on Main Street for the hours from 11:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. There was considerable discussion as to the purpose of the Article. Keith Houske moved to amend the motion to an overnight parking ban on Main Street seconded by William Russell. There was continued discussion on inforcement, regulations, and the necessity of the ban. The amendment was duly voted and failed. The original Article was then duly voted and also failed.

Article 27. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by William Russell To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen the right to negotiate for cable television under the provisions of RSA 53C-2. Neil Chase asked for an explanation. Selectman Russell related that the Board must have the authority in case a cable company should come to Bethlehem. The Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 28. It was moved by William Russell and seconded by George Hardy To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the "old" Pierce Bridge. Selectman William Russell moved to pass over the Article seconded by Bruce Kilkenny. Mr. Russell explained that the State will not give the Town title. The motion to pass over was duly voted and carried.

RESULT: No action taken.

Article 29. It was moved by George Hardy and seconded by Bruce Kilkenny To see if the Town will vote to extend the Planning Board's site plan review authority to cover multi-family dwelling units, as authorized by and in accordance with RSA 674:43-44. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 30. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 31. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 32. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 33. Acted upon by ballot and adopted.

Article 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Alistair MacBain related that the Ski Club would have an activity afternoon on Friday, April 3rd, and that they were asking for volunteers for the Bethlehem ski slope. Mr. MacBain said in order to keep the ski slope open volunteers were badly needed; please come and help out.

John Stevenson thanked the Selectmen for honoring his father Malcolm Stevenson by having his picture on the Town Report, with a summary of the many years of service his father had given to Town and State government.

Mr. Stevenson thanked Moderator Peter Smith for his many years of service as Town Moderator as Mr. Smith will not be able to continue as Moderator due to his appointment by Governor Sununu as a Superior Court Judge. A round of applause followed.

Wayne Derby made a motion to set up a committee to do a study on the landfill and its impact on Bethlehem, seconded by Neil Chase. The motion was duly voted and carried.

Bruce Brown moved that the Selectmen be directed to set up a study committee for the location of the tennis courts as passed in Article 20, and the cost to maintain and operate said courts, seconded by Keith Houske. The motion was duly voted and carried.

Margaret Gale moved to direct the Selectmen to study all reasonable improvements in the management of our transfer station including solid waste separation, compaction, and to present complete facts and figures to the 1986 Town Meeting, seconded by Richard Tremblay. The motion was duly voted and carried.

Edgar Davis asked that our new Selectman Donald Lavoie be introduced. A round of applause followed the introduction of Mr. Lavoie.

John Rolli moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Richard Pollak. With all in agreement the Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 11:45 P.M.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING MINUTES

October 17, 1985

Moderator, Alistair MacBain, called the meeting to order at 8:00 P.M. at the Town Building. The Moderator commented on the order of business for the meeting and the procedure to be followed. The Warrant was read by Moderator MacBain:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bethlehem in the County of Grafton and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Building in said Bethlehem on Thursday the seventeenth day of October next at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote on Warrant Article 17 at the 1985 Annual Town Meeting.

It was moved by Donald Lavoie and seconded by Bruce Brown to delay the reading of the Warrant and to take one Article at a time. With no discussion the motion was voted on and carried.

It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Paul Gruber To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote on Warrant Article 17 at the 1985 Annual Town Meeting. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 2. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Lorna Ray To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote on Warrant Article 18 at the 1985 Annual Town Meeting. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 3. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by James Tibbetts To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$72,500.00) for the purposes of reappraising the Town, said sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Seventy Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$72,500.00) and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town. There was some discussion on the progress of the reappraisal. Selectman Kilkenny related that the reappraisal should be complete by October of 1986, and that 90% of the homes will be entered.

A ballot vote was called. The results of the ballot count was:

Yes - 50

No - 11

The Article was passed by a two-thirds (2/3rd) majority.

RESULT: \$72,500.00 appropriated.

Article 4. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Eleanor Stephenson To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote on Warrant Article 20 at the 1985 Annual Town Meeting. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 5. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Lorna Ray To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote on Warrant Article 21 at the 1985 Annual Town Meeting. With no discussion the Article was duly voted and carried.

Article 6. It was moved by Bruce Kilkenny and seconded by Richard Pollak To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) for the purpose of constructing two tennis courts with all appurtenances, fencing and landscaping, and to construct additional cross-country ski trails as may be deemed feasible, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds in a sum not to exceed Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and/or bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and/or bonds as shall be in the best interests of the Town and further to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend federal land and water conservation funds, grant funds, or other federal or state funds which may be available for this project to reduce the cost to the Town. Leroy Deabler commented on the fact that the Grant had been approved, the bids, and what the committee had planned. With no other discussion a ballot vote was called. The results of the ballot vote was:

Yes - 47

No - 23

The Article carried by a two-thirds (2/3rds) majority.

RESULT: \$35,000.00 appropriated.

It was moved by Richard Pollak and seconded by John Stevenson to adjourn the meeting. With all in agreement the meeting was adjourned at 8:40 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bethlehem, in the County of Grafton, and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Building in said Bethlehem on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon (the polls to close at 6:00 p.m.; business meeting to be held at the Town Building at 8:00 p.m.), to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. (*Ballot vote*)

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

This Amendment would add a new paragraph to Article B-3 of Single and Two-Family Cluster Developments allowing clustered building on substandard size lots as long as the current density requirements are maintained by the use of common property which cannot be further subdivided.

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the new flood plain regulations provided by the state office of civil defense, thereby automatically converting to the current regular flood insurance program.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-two Dollars (\$2,682.00) for the White Mountain Mental Health Center.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for Community Action Outreach Program.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$1,170.00) for the Upper Valley Senior Citizens Council, Inc.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (\$1,593.00) for North Country Council, Inc.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Nine Dollars (\$3,709.00) for the Upper Grafton Solid Waste District.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for snowmobile trail maintenance with funds to be expended at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to choose one auditor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such expenditures as may be necessary to continue qualification of Ambulance operation under the R.S.A. Chapter 151-B effective September 1, 1972 in an amount not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

ARTICLE 21. ARTICLE 25. REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulations is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

BRETZFELDER MEMORIAL PARK COMMITTEE

During the last part of the summer season the Park's nature trail, linking the memorial tree to the pond was completed. Two wooden bridges across Barrett Brook make possible a lovely walk of $\frac{1}{4}$ mile through the heart of the park. For a longer hike, the Four Seasons Trail is now open - a project of the Elementary School, the 6th Grade. Signs and a trail guide are now in production for these trails - the guide is being written by the present Sixth Grade Class.

The Education Program at the park continues to offer quality conservation sessions for our youngsters. Weekly sessions at the Elementary School are augmented by field trips to the park for all classes. This winter the Park Committee is also sponsoring a lecture series at Profile High, including a two week exhibit of "White Mountain Landscape" paintings. Last summer's Youth Program attracted 20-25 per week and 8 evening programs served over 200 people. Coordinator Jeff Walner is now Forest Society liason with all State Environmental Education groups.

Plans proceed for construction of the park facilities building with a planned May 1 date for start-up. This building will house public restrooms, conference room, and living space in two stores. Designed for year round use the building will allow 24-hour supervision of the park and indoor classroom space for education programs. Nearby, a picnic play field is planned. This will complete the development of the park called for in the 1982 Master Plan.


