WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to
vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:*

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - a. Town Officers' Salaries
 - b. Town Officers' Expenses
 - c. Election and Registration
 - d. Expenses of Town Hall and other Town Buildings
 - e. Police Department
 - f. Fire Department
 - g. Care of Trees
 - h. Insurance
 - i. Health Department (Hospitals under Art. 5 & 6)
 - j. Vital Statistics
 - k. Sewer Maintenance
 - l. Town Dump and Rubbish Removal
 - m. Highways
 - n. Street Lighting
 - p. Libraries

- q. Town Poor and Old Age Assistance
- r. Memorial Day and Other Celebrations
- s. Cemeteries
- t. Social Security
- u. Interest
- v. Sidewalk Construction and Maintenance
- w. Payment on Principal of Debt and Bonds

3. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expense of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.) for insulation and storm windows at the Torrent Engine House.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Concord Hospital.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Franklin Hospital.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for playground equipment at Rolfe Park.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Penacook Youth Center.

9. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, that section of road beginning at the easterly side of the Boston & Maine property at Stratton Crossing and continuing to the center of the Bridge over the Merrimack River.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept upon presentation of deeds the following extensions of streets: Commencing at the end of Academy Street,

so called, thence in an easterly direction to the land now or formerly owned by one Powell, thence in a southerly direction to Jackson Street; also a right of way commencing on the northerly side of Gage Street and continuing in a northerly direction to land now or formerly owned by one Baker, thence in an easterly direction to the land now or formerly owned by one Banfill.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.) for the purchase of a sewer cleaner.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make a survey of the Street lights in Town and to make such changes as are necessary to improve the lighting system.

14. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1400.00 for repairs to the main Library building. The Town to be reimbursed to the extent of any money available from the Valley Trust Co. over the sum due on notes at the Mechanics National Bank.

16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15 Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall

consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

* Business meeting for appropriations *only* will be called for seven o'clock in the evening.

Mrs. Elizabeth G. Hall, one of our eldest members of the Board of Trustees, a true and valued member for over thirty years, retired in the late fall of 1958. She had served for many years as Secretary and Chairman of the Board. Her interest, faithfulness and loyal service to the library will ever be remembered and missed. A dinner was given in her honor by the Trustees and the Librarians at the Highway Hotel last June to show their appreciation of the many years of service she has devoted to the library. A gift of money and flowers was presented to her from the group.

The Main library building is used for meetings of many groups interested in town affairs, as well as being the office of the selectmen.

National Book Week was observed by both libraries with displays of new books and posters. During the year we have had Bookmobile service from the New Hampshire State Library every two months with a large selection of fiction and non-fiction. The librarians also borrow books from the State Library upon request of readers.

A number of text books have been purchased which were requested by the Boscawen teachers. A gift of two large bookcases and a collection of books was presented to the Branch library by Dr. Mary Farnum, for which we are very grateful.

The Trustees wish to express their thanks and ap-

preciation to every one who has donated magazines and books this past year. \$50.00 has been received from the Thornton Fund for the purchase of children's books for the Branch.

Regular meetings have been held by the Library Trustees during the year. Repairs to the roof of the Main building have been made. Books were taken to the Merrimack County Home by Mrs. Iyla Bartlett. Both libraries were decorated for the Christmas season.

A "Friends of the Library" group was organized in December 1959 at Lower Boscawen to assist the librarian at the Branch. PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

You, the taxpayers of Boscawen, voted unanimously at the 1959 town meeting, an appropriation of over two thousand dollars to inaugurate an active Civil Defense program in Boscawen. You are to be commended for your action. You have had the courage to face up to the fact that Civil Defense is as necessary in this nuclear age as the finest fire equipment and other municipal property. The cost of a good workable Civil Defense program is small. It amounts to very little on a per capita basis or per thousand of assessed valuation. It is my sincere hope that you will never let this program die.

Voting the money, alone, however, is not enough. You, as an individual, have responsibilities to fulfill. These responsibilities have always existed and always will exist. There are five fundamental rules for local preparedness. You should know these five simple rules.

1. Know our local warning signals and what they mean.
2. Know what our local plan is for emergency action.
3. Know how to protect yourself from radioactive fallout.
4. Know the elements of first aid and home emergency preparedness.
5. Know how to use Conelrad — 640 or 1240 on your AM. radio.

During the past year I have been working with my staff to shape a program of emergency action for Boscawen. We find that it is an uphill battle and although we are not as far advanced as we would like, we feel that some accomplishments are worthy of mention in this report. Our major task was building and equip-

ping the control center in the cellar of the library. I feel that, because of the nature of the construction of the building and the communication equipment installed therein, Boscawen has one of the safest and most efficient control centers in New Hampshire. The Civil Defense staff and Selectmen can safely administer the affairs of the town and not leave the control center for long periods of time, *if necessary*. The communication system ties in with the State government through the Races network, the State Police through a mobile installed in a police car, local police and highway trucks through mobiles placed in those vehicles and the state forestry network and local fire equipment through a forestry base radio.

Three generators have been purchased to date. Two were purchased through matching funds and are being used in each fire department. The other was purchased on the surplus program and has been mounted on wheels and is housed at the town shed. Any one of these generators may be used to provide emergency power at the control center or elsewhere.

Twenty-nine people completed the course in Radiological Defense last fall. This perhaps will be the key department in any future disaster and I am happy to report that Boscawen has been provided with one complete set of instruments at no cost and that a radiological team will be ready if needed.

Our local Civil Defense has been given authority to supervise the handling of military aircraft crashes in Boscawen until proper military authorities arrive. A plan has been designed for this. I hope all of you will inquire about this and become familiar with it.

An active Civil Defense Police Auxiliary has been organized and equipped. Training is a continuing process. I think, without a doubt, that this unit will

have the most important duties in any emergency and I hope the public will realize that fact.

It is interesting to note here that I purchased equipment, deemed essential to our Civil Defense program, from surplus property, at a cost to us of \$314.41 but having a government value of \$4,069.50. It also should be noted that the reason the Treasurer's report shows an unexpended balance for Civil Defense is that even though the equipment, authorized for purchase at the last town meeting, arrived in 1959, the bills for this equipment had not reached us as of December 31st, 1959. However, this money is committed to that equipment when the bills arrive.

In closing, I would like to express appreciation for the cooperation given me by members of the staff, the selectmen, the library trustees, members of both fire departments, the police auxiliary and in particular to Mrs. Elsie Sanborn, Harvey Hollins, Bruce Merrill, Robert Knowlton, Hubert Boyd, Edward Osborne, Lawrence Young, William Bailey, Jr., and the Penacook crew of Concord Electric Company. I also wish to thank those who contributed materials for building and equipping the control center.

I ask that every person make a special effort to become familiar with the control center, the equipment and our plan for emergency action. It is your organization and your equipment and I would ask you to cooperate by participating.

WATER COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

During 1959 we have laid new mains on Park St., Lincoln St., Oak St., and another portion of Sweatt St.

This totals 2,545 ft. of 6" pipe and 250 ft. of 4".

The 4" pipe serves the new automatic laundry in the old brick store in Penacook.

It is our plan for 1960 to finish laying the 6" main on Sweatt St. about 1,400 ft. on Elm St., from the D. W. Highway to the junction of Sweatt St. and if possible a portion of Rte. 4 in Boscawen where there are still two sections of old wooden pipes.

The precinct is still handicapped to a considerable degree by the failure of many of its consumers to pay their water rental bills when due. If this situation could be remedied it would mean a substantial saving of time and expense.

In January of 1961 the last \$5,000.00 of the early borrowing of the precinct will be paid off and this will mean a reduction in the tax rate.

May we once again call attention to the injustice to many because of the present boundaries of the precinct.

Many property owners are subject to the payment of precinct taxes who can never secure water and they should be relieved of this unfair burden.

Any ten voters in the precinct may sign a properly worded petition to the selectmen asking for such action and they after a public hearing can take such action as seems needed.

The finances of the precinct will be helped when the liquidation of the Valley Trust Co. is completed, which we hope will be soon.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Boscawen, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 4th day of March 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the ap-

propriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the local school board to issue bus contracts for a period up to but not exceeding five (5) years, if the school board believes it to be necessary to do so in order to provide more economical transportation for the school children; and further to authorize the school board to call for bids in accordance with specifications required by the local school board, the State Motor Vehicle Department and the State Board of Education, for awarding of such contract or contracts; or to take any other action relating thereto.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure I submit a second annual report of the School Health Program of the Boscawen School District.

In October the annual physical examinations were conducted (nearly 100%) by the two local doctors with the school nurse in attendance. All defects were promptly reported to parents and have been taken care of or plans have been made for their corrections.

Routine visits are made daily to all classrooms and health problems are discussed with the teacher in attendance and home calls made as necessary. The nurse's schedule since September includes the following functions:

Twenty-six children were treated for dental work last year in Boscawen. This included cleaning, fillings, and extractions where necessary. This year, these same children have been checked and care given where needed. This clinic is made possible through the generosity of the Thornton Fund in cooperation with our local dentist.

I attended the School Nurse-Teachers' section of the Teachers' Convention in Manchester in October. I also attended a very informative winter conference in Concord on "the motionally disturbed child". This was arranged by Miss Annette L. Eveleth, Director of School Health Services, and included school nurse-teachers from the State of New Hampshire.

A speech therapist was made available to this area through the Easter Seal Fund and I am transporting a third grader to Concord for weekly lessons. Next year we hope the therapist's schedule can be so arranged to include other children who would benefit from these classes.

The Concord Lions Club has generously donated for eye care (including doctor examinations) glasses, and in one instance are going to provide for corrective eye surgery if it is determined necessary — at this time, resultant tests are incomplete. I extend my thanks for the "Lions" program of Sight Conservation in behalf of the Boscawen children and their parents.

In May, the Tuberculosis Association will provide the "Patch Tests" for the students in grades 1, 3, and 7 as they have in past years. This is made available through your cooperation in buying "T. B. Christmas Seals".

To Superintendent William B. Hounsell, the Teaching Staff, School Board, and Parents, I wish to express my thanks for your extensive cooperation and generous support in the School Health Program which is an ever-increasing challenge in the school systems.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC BOSCAWEN

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Junior High unit, the seventh and eighth grades, that has already been established is progressing well in their music program. There seems to be much interest in the class and supplementary music, which we have been using, has proved very successful.

Two-part singing is being emphasized in the fifth and sixth grades as well as in the Junior High. Music theory is being stressed, too.

The fourth graders continue to have special work with the symphonettes. At Christmas time we had some special music appreciation in the form of records of the "Nutmcracker Suite". The fourth graders are doing well with their reading of notes in music theory.

A singing book that was purchased for the third grade in times past is proving very successful in keeping the third grade happy with their music. There are many folk songs with accompaniments that make the songs more enjoyable. The third grade is learning to sight read and are doing well in music theory.

Supplementary songs were used with the first and second grades at Christmas time. A part of the time for each class is allotted for the fundamentals of music and then the remainder of the class time is used for singing.

Each music day there is a special class for the children of the first and second grades who need more attention with their singing.

There are tentative plans for future music programs for all of the classes. The parents will be invited to come and hear the singing of their children.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the children for their enthusiasm in music, to the teachers for their constant cooperation, and to Mr. Hounsell for his continued interest in the music program.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Boscawen School Board and Citizens of Boscawen:

This past year has seen some changes in the Boscawen Schools. The enrollment has continued to increase. The teacher load is therefore increasing. The lower grades are all large in number. This may necessitate changing some children next year. If grades one and two are any larger next year it may be necessary to move them to the Plains School and bring grades five and six to Main Street building. To adjust for crowding at Main Street, we may use the so-called assembly room as a classroom. The School Board and Superintendent will make such changes as are necessary to take care of the pupils in the best possible manner.

The School Board has done a considerable amount of repairs and improvement of school property. All required changes suggested by the City Fire Marshal's report have been carried out. The buildings are better and safer because of these changes. New floors have been laid in the upstairs rooms of the Main Street building. This is a great improvement to the rooms. If these rooms could be painted and renovated next summer, it would be better still. Children should have clean and cheerful surroundings in which to spend their school time.

We have a full-time custodian this year. This has added much to the general improvement of the buildings.

After considerable difficulty we finally secured a competent director for the school lunch program and it is now operating successfully.

We accepted with deep regret the resignation of Mr. Karl Hislop as school principal last December. He has been replaced by a young and promising teacher, Mr. Bernard LaCroix. We sincerely hope there will be no further changes in the school staff. Boscawen now has a corps of good teachers who are doing good work for and with the children. All are capable, conscientious and interested in teaching.

I want to thank these teachers, the school board and the good citizens of Boscawen for their help during the past year.
