#### TOWN WARRANT

# The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the twelfth (12th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Public Library.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the two vacant rooms at the Daniels Academy for the Brookline Public Library; said rooms to be used in place of the present library rooms.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of furniture and equipment for the Brookline Public Library.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in a Capital Reserve Fund for the celebration of the Bi-centennial anniversary of the Town in 1969, or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the annual payment of interest on the Bond Issue for the construction of the new Fire Station.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for the annual payment on the principal of the Serial Notes issued for the construction of the new Fire Station.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$766.20 to defray the annual cost of the "Group Alerting and Dispatch System".
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$660.00 for new fire equipment.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for water holes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Engineers and the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the said "Old Fire Station on Main Street", or take any action relative thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$533.33 to secure State Aid for permanent improvements of highways.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for cutting, spraying and removal of trees.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for cutting of brush along Town roads.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed \$17,600.00 to be made by the United States to the Town of Brookline to aid in defraying the cost of studies, designs, surveys, test wells, soil borings and preparation of a study and report, including preliminary plans, for a water system for the Town.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$126.00 for the purchase of a typewriter for the office of the Town Clerk.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property tax.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property on tax liens acquired by Tax Collector's Deed or Tax Collector's Sales.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for a swimming instructor.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to charge a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid after September first.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Memorial Day.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract for janitor at Daniels Academy Building.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a 9 P. M. Curfew Law for all minors under the age of sixteen years, in accordance with New Hampshire Statutes pertaining to Curfew Regulations.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the construction of, and removal of snow from, a sidewalk to begin at the Elementary School and continue towards the center of town.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to change the approach from the Bohannon Road to Route 130.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw \$1,200.00 from the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund for a curb at the Town Hall Lawn.
- 33. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to rent the Town Hall to the Brookline Grange on a contract of three years or take any action relative thereto.
- 34. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town History Books.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract for the purchase of fuel oil for the Town Hall and Fire Station.

- 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:
  - 1. The sum of \$100.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Arthur Carroll lot.
  - 2. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Ralph W. Peacock lot.
  - 3. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Walter Jackson lot.
  - 4. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Frank E. Gilman lot.
  - 5. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Raymond V. Ebbett lot.

# SPECIAL REPORT FROM THE TRUSTEES OF THE BROOKLINE PUBLIC LIBRARY

There are three articles in this year's warrant concerning the Brookline Public Library. The purpose of this report is to explain these articles to the townspeople.

The first is our regular library appropriation. This year we are asking for \$500, an increase of \$150. Some of this increase covers the purchase of more books but the majority of it will go toward an increase in the librarian's salary in an attempt to bring it up to a more realistic level according to today's standards. It would also provide money for a salary for the assistant librarian or a substitute.

The library is also asking for more room. Our shelves are nearly full and space exists for only one more bookcase. In a year's time, it is quite possible that no more bookcase space will be available in our present location. The crowded conditions in the present library make it impossible to give the best library service.

If the library obtains more room, we are asking for \$500 for library furniture and equipment. This would include more bookcases, tables and chairs for the children, an additional table for adults and a cabinet.

We are asking the townspeople to consider our needs and help us to provide the best possible library service in Brookline.

At this time the Selectmen were notified by the Townsend Branch of the Union National Bank of Lowell that the money for the Bond issue would be denied unless a completed building could be assured.

Meetings with the Bank, Contractor, Selectmen, Architect and the Fire Company were held, the results being that the Fire Company voted \$1700.00 to cover the cost of the items deleted from the original plans. Through many donations of time, labor and materials the cost of the five items came to \$858.33. There were also legal expenses

incurred which were assumed by the town and appear in the Town Budget under the heading of Dog Damages and Legal Expenses.

The Fire Company has painted the interior of the building and recently added window blinds to the exterior. Rough landscaping was done this fall with the finishing touches to be completed in the Spring.

Two public hearings were held on the proposed ordinance. Every effort was made to preserve the right of an individual to u e his land as he sees fit — restricted only by the greater needs of the community.

The Board strongly recommends that each voter consider the future growth likely in this area and not forget to vote on this proposal.

#### 1967 REPORT OF THE BROOKLINE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

January 15, 1968

The Conservation Commission has completed its first year engaged in the following activities:

TOWN SWIMMING AREA — Two areas on Lake Potanipo owned by Camp Tevya have been investigated as potential sites for a Town Beach Area. The first site, near the present state controlled facility, would be too difficult to police and maintain for the exclusive use of residents and their invited guests. The second site, which could probably be made available to the Town, is on the west side of the lake near North Stream. However, this site is unsuitable also because of its swampy nature and inaccessibility.

After consideration of all of the alternates, the Commission has concluded at this time that an ideal site would be on the Nissitissit River, close to the center of town, and suitably developed and controlled for residents and their guests. Specific plans should be formulated during 1968.

NISSITISSIT RIVER PLANNING GROUP — The New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development (an agency of the state) has formed a Nissitissit River Planning Group with the aim of preserving the river in its natural state. Members of the Brookline Conservation Commission are active participants in this group and have attended several meetings in Concord to exchange information and map plans for future work.

BUDGET — The conservation Commission has no resources of its own, and must rely upon donations or grants from conservation minded institutions or individuals. Funds are available from several state and federal agencies, but are mostly set up on a matching basis where the Commission must raise part of any project cost locally. These funds are also contingent upon development of a comprehen-

sive "master" plan for the Town, particularly with respect to recreation. Brookline presently has no comprehensive plan, so does not qualify.

All landowners are reminded that the Commission can accept land as a donation. Land which is turned over to the Commission can be used at full market value as a tax deduction on your income tax. The Commission is principally interested in obtaining a suitable area for a Town Beach, wetlands and marshlands and other land which has a low economic value but high conservation value.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Encouraging progress has marked the record of the Brookline School District this past year. Many people contributed to fashioning both immediate solutions and a foundation for continued research and study, to meet the problems of expanding enrollment, makeshift facilities in separate buildings, recruitment of many new staff memeber, and increasing demands of a modern educational program.

The citizens of Brookline acted favorably to extend the elementary school facilities by approving a six room addition to the present four room structure. At the same time, a budget was approved which provided for additional staff members to better meet the needs of an expanding school population. With this support, the School Board and School Building Committee gave unselfishly of their time to plan and commission the building of a functional school addition at a considerable saving to the townspeople. The efforts expended and results accomplished by your representatives on these boards deserve your warmest praise.

Returning and new staff members have worked particularly hard under the direction of Mr. McBride to provide the best possible guidance and instruction for Brookline youngsters. Improvement in the grouping and instructional pattern in grade one and further refinement in the Reading program in grades 4-6 have been impressive gains this year. At all grade levels, efforts have been made to improve teaching techniques. Brookline teachers, for example, have taken good advantage of the opportunity to visit and observe in other Union No. 40 schools, an in-service experience of considerable value. A general upgrading of teaching materials has been apparent. Teachers have made good choices in selecting these materials. Brookline teachers are taking full advantage of the in-service programs to review and implement the new Union No. 40 curriculum guides in Reading, Language Arts, Math and Science. Effective use has been made of the Union guidance, speech and hearing, and reading consultant service.

A thoughtful homework policy has been developed, and, a primary level physical education program is in the planning stages. In short, the School Board and teaching staff, in cooperation with, and response to, the citizens of Brookline, have combined to respond to the challenge of the increasing demands of modern education.

The School Board, in appointing a School Study Committee, has clearly indicated its intention to plan for Brookline's imminent and future needs. The Study Committee has already shown a sincere commitment to their task and their efforts should provide a thoughtful blueprint for the future. On balance then, this has been a year of progress, but more important, a year of promise as well. Brookline's citizens, School Board, School Building Committee, School Study Committee, and teaching staff members have shown that much can be accomplished by local effort, and, that much more is certain to be accomplished by their combined, sustained efforts.

#### SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Our enrollments continue to increase faster than our conservative estimates of previous years. We had 165 pupils in 1965, 184 pupils in 1966 and 210 pupils this year, 1967. This is a 27% increase in just two years.

After a difficult half year waiting for our new addition to relieve the congestion, we moved into the new addition in February. Our new principal and staff were patient and perservering during this trying period. Everyone, students, parents, faculty and School Board are happy to have completed a fine building and look forward to using these new facilities and have them consolidated in one location. The School Board extends its thanks to the Building Committee and the Greenville Construction Co. for a splendid job. The addition has 7,875 square feet for a total cost equipped of \$10.70 per square foot.

Next year we will need 10 teachers and 1 aide for 10 classes, and we anticipate the following enrollments, base don census figures with no projection for additional pupils who may move in:

2 Grade 1	45 pupils
2 Grade 2	42 pupils
2 Grade 3	39 pupils
1 Grade 4	28 pupils
2 Grade 5	46 pupils
1 Grade 6	24 pupils

We will utilize four rooms in the original building and five of the six rooms in the addition. The all purpose room will be used for music, art, gym, assemblies, etc.

Other changes in the budget include our annual tuition increase for Nashua. Our rate will increase \$31.00 per pupil from \$518 to \$549 per pupil. Our senior high rate will increase \$48.00 per pupil from \$589 to \$637 per pupil. We allowed for the possibility of a 5% increase in numbers of pupils to Nashua, as we did last year. We es-

timate we will have 146 pupils attending Nashua high schools in 1968-69. Last year we budgeted \$78,421 and this year we are budgeting \$91,609, by far the largest item in our budget and the increase alone is more than the total increase in operating costs and debt service for the entire elementary school.

There are increases in the textbook and instructional supplies account to take care of increases in enrollment. We have budgeted a \$300 increase for each teacher. We have planned to start the new teachers at \$5,300 instead of \$5,200 in the present salary plan. We do not yet have our present teachers on the present plan. We feel the salary schedule must be restudied by the Study Committee next year because we will be in an unfavorable position in comparison to the rest of the Union, if we continue the present schedule which was adopted last year. We will need to increase our salaries at a faster rate if we are to keep up. We are presently experiencing difficulty finding fully qualified teachers and we should be in a position to keep some of our fine teachers.

There is no contingency fund in the budget. It is the policy of the present Board to allow for contingencies in the accounts where they are likely to occur. If we do not need the money in these accounts, we have returned the balance to the town to reduce the amount to be raised by taxes. We returned \$5,681.18 to the town last year and anticipate returning approximately \$12,000 this year.

Our total increase in the amount to be raised by taxes next year we anticipate to be \$17,554.00 or approximately 12% increase over our total assessment last year. This is a modest increase at a time when school budgets in our neighboring communities are increasing sharply. Every effort of the School Board has been made to limit the increase after last year's necessarily large increase to build a school and provide for additional enrollment.

# REPORT OF BROOKLINE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

On April 18, 1967, the Town of Brookline voted a \$69,000 bond is ue for the construction of a six room addition to the Brookline Elementary School. Added to this \$69,000, was that amount that had been deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund, \$17,592.56 and \$713.35 earned from investment of the original bond, giving a total of \$87,305.91.

On the 25th of April, an organizational meeting was held with the School Building Committee and School Board to discuss the specifications for constructing our new school. On May 1st, several contractors were interviewed and on the 9th and 10th of May, final specifications were drawn up for bidding. During the month of June, your Committee spent many hours researching contractors, making credit checks, and, in general, assessing the overall quality of the bidders. Early in July, the Committee met with the State Department of Education to determine procedures to follow for complying with State Aid requirements. After much careful deliberation, the Committee signed a contract with Greenville Construction Co. on August 16, 1967. On the 22nd of August, construction of the new building began.

Your Committee supervised construction from the start. In October, a new septic system was planned and approved by the State. In early November, the contractor had closed in the building and was ready to complete the project on schedule. The Committee is very pleased with the quality of work that went into our new addition, and feels that the town has received a sound return for the money invested.

A few of the features contained in this building include:

- 1. Poured concrete foundation
- 2. Blocks filled with insulation
- 3. Sealed double-glazed windows
- 4. Twice as much lighting as other buildings
- 5. Hung acoustical ceilings

- 6. Approximately 9 electrical outlets per classroom
- 7. New boiler system to heat entire school (new and old sections)
- 8. Multi-colored color scheme
- 9. Underground telephone service (10 line total)
- 10. Underground electrical service
- 11. 3,500 gallon septic tank, dosing tank (175 gal.)
- 12. Installed manhole cover on well for future access to well and power lines
- 13. Widening of existing driveway
- 14. Removal of dead trees
- 15. Enlarging of parking lots (15 cars)
- 16. Grading and drainage
- 17. Access road to rear of building for oil delivery and fire protection
- 18. Rough landscaping
- 19. Concealed wiring throughout, including recessed flush convenience outlets and clock receptacles
- 20. Built-in bubbler and sink in every room
- 21. Enlarged teachers' room, with baffle plate and restroom
- 22. Panic hardware on six (all) outside doors
- 23. Semi-gloss throughout the entire inside
- 24. Roof (built up) tar and gravel roof
- 25. Fans for girls and teachers restrooms
- 26. Excellent block work on building
- 27. Interior partitions, 6" block, angle iron attached on each end wall (for expansion)
- 28. Fire stops in each wall from ceiling to floor for each room
- 29. Building Committee made \$713.35 by investing money wisely during period that the Committee was negotiating with contractors
- 30. The new building has 7,875 square feet
- 31. Cost \$10.70 per square foot

To the Citizens of Brookline, we wish to express our appreciation for the support you gave this project. The efforts of many local citizens have gone into the successful completion of this building and the Committee is confident that the town has received a quality school building.

## SYNOPSIS OF ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING March 9, 1967

The annual School Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Thomas I. Arnold. The Warrant was read and the Meeting opened for business under Article I.

- Article 1. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and seconded by Allan Fessenden to pass over this Article and act on it with Article 10. The motion was carried and the Moderator closed under Article 1 and opened under Article 2.
- Article 2. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and seconded by Geraldine Phillips that all reports that appear in the 1966 Town Report be accepted. The motion was carried and the Moderator closed under Article 2 and opened under Article 3.
- Article 3. The motion was made by Clarence Farwell to nominate Auditors from the floor and was seconded by Beatrice Hall. Phillip Chandler, Allan Fessenden and Charles Rutter were nominated. It was voted that nominations were closed and there were three candidates for two positions. Allan Fessenden withdrew his name and from the nominations. Allan Fessenden moved that the Clerk cast a single ballot and it was seconded by Quentin Young. Clerk cast a single ballot and Phillip Chandler and Charles Rutter were elected as Auditors. Moderator closed under Article 3 and opened under Article 4.
- Article 4. The School Building Committee had no discussion at that time and Allan Fessenden made a motion to pass over this Article. It was seconded by Geraldine Phillips. Motion carried and Moderator closed under Article 4 and opened under Article 5.
- Article 5. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and was seconded by Allan Fessenden "that the sum of \$150,500 be appropriated for the constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Elementary School; that to raise this appropriation the School Board be authorized to borrow \$150,500 under the Municipal Finance Act; that in addition to the foregoing appropriation the

School Board be authorized to apply any State, Federal or other Funds towards the foregoing purposes according to the terms under which such Funds are received; that any interest received shall likewise be applied for such purposes; and that the School Board be authorized to take all action necessary to carry out this vote."

The floor was given over to Beatrice Hall in discussion of the cost of present Elementary School vs. cost of proposed new addition considering increased percentage rise in building costs. The floor was then turned over to Allan Fessenden in order to discuss cost of deletion of "frills", i.e., brick facing, exposed joists vs. dropped ceiling, oil heat vs. electric heat. Beatrice Hall asked permission of Moderator to have Mr. Hersey discuss cost of proposed building. Mr. Arnold then asked permission of meeting to hear Mr. Hersey discuss Labor and Union wages under State Wage Contract; also electric heat versus oil heat.

After a lengthy discussion, a motion was made by Gardiner Benson and seconded by Quentin Young, to table the motion on the floor and to expand the School Building Committee to include the Planning Board and to recess upon completion of other business, until April 13, 1967 in Daniels Academy Building at 8 P. M., at which time the motion would be discussed. It was requested by Beatrice Hall that the vote be taken by ballot. The vote by Checklist and ballot was taken and result were as follows:

Yes — 73 No — 47 Disallowed — 1 Cast blank — 1

A motion was then made by H. William Snell and seconded by Allan Fessenden to take from the table the tabled motion for further action and discussion in the light of the effect it would have on the ability of the meeting to determine the budget. Following the discussion, Mr. Snell withdrew his motion and Mr. A. Fessenden refused to withdraw his second. Beatrice Hall moved to have question of motion put to the floor with a written ballot requested. Mr. A. Fessenden withdrew his second and the motion therefore remained tabled until April 13.

Article 6. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and seconded by Carl Ander on to table the Article until the meeting reconvenes on April 13, Daniels Academy Building at 8 P. M. Motion put to a vote and carried and Moderator moved to Article 7.

Article 7. The motion was made by H. William Snell and seconded by Carl Anderson to table the Article until April 13 meeting reconvenes. Motion put to a vote and carried. Moderator then moved on to Article 8.

Article 8. The motion was made by Allan Fessenden and seconded by Geraldine Phillips that the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept in behalf of the School District any and all Grants or other Funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source. Motion put to a vote and carried. Moderator moved to Article 9.

Article 9. The motion was made by Grover Farwell, Sr. and seconded by Geraldine Phillips to Pass the Article. After some discussion, Mr. Farwell withdrew his motion and Mrs. Phillips withdrew her second. Mr. Gardiner Benson moved to table this Article until April 13 and was seconded by Mr. Thistleton. Moderator asked floor if it wished to vote on this motion by ayes and nayes — no objections were voiced. Motion put to the floor and voted on. The nayes prevailed. Motion was defeated and the floor was open to a motion under this Article. Beatrice Hall made a motion and was seconded by Edward Gay, that the District vote to approve the position of Business Manager for Union No. 40 and accept State Aid for that position. Motion put to a vote and ayes carried.

Mr. Gardiner Benson requested the Clerk to put in the record that he had voted in the affirmative on this Article.

Article 10. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and seconded by Sidney Hall to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,630 under Item 210 and table all other Items under this Article until meeting reconvenes on April 13. Put to a vote and motion carried. Moderator moved to Article 11.

Article 11. The motion was made by Beatrice Hall and seconded by Allan Fessenden to table the Article until the meeting reconvenes on April 13. Motion put to a vote and carried.

Allan Fessenden then made a motion to recess until March 14, to count ballots and was seconded by Beatrice Hall.

Motion carried and Meeting recessed until March 14th.

The Meeting was reconvened at eight p.m. by the Moderator Thomas Arnold and the meeting was opened under Article 5.

An amendment was made by Beatrice Hall to substitute the sum of \$130,000 in place of the \$150,500 in the motion on the floor at the time of recessing. It was seconded by Allan Fessenden.

A discussion period followed and an explanation was given by Thomas Moran concerning the five proposals offered by the School Building Planning Committee.

Mr. Whitcomb requested Beatrice Hall to withdraw the amendment and she refused. Mr. Q. Young presented a figure of \$84,000 for a four room addition with the same advantages and in the same category as 2b on the chart. This chart is to be found at the end of this report.

Mr. Clarence Farwell raised a point of Parlimentary procedure and requested that it be put to a vote. It was carried by a show of hands to vote for the \$130,000 amendment.

A written ballot was requested by Beatrice Hall.

A written ballot was taken by the checklist and the vote was:

The amendment was defeated.

Mr. Earle Soper then made an amendment to the original motion to substitute the sum of \$89,000 plus the Capital Reserve Fund and to restrict the addition to the building and constructing of a building noted as 2b on the chart and to be consistent with the present Elementary school and that it be required to have six rooms.

It was seconded by Quentin Young. Mr. Grover Farwell, Sr. requested a voice vote rather than a written ballot to accept the amendment. Put to a show of hands and the vote was:

The vote was carried. It was then requested by Beatrice Hall to have a written ballot and was seconded by Allan Fessenden.

A written ballot on the motion was taken by the checklist and the vote was:

A two-thirds majority was needed and therefore a vote of 82 — YES was required.

Sidney Hall made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000 plus the Capital Reserve Fund for the addition of a building consistent with that of 2a on the chart shown. It was seconded by Allan Fessenden. The motion was balloted on by the checklist. A vote of 72 — YES was needed for a two-thirds majority vote. The vote was:

The motion was defeated.

Charles Bunker then made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$77,000 for a four room addition similar to the existing Elementary School and contingent upon the continued use of the two classrooms in the Daniels Academy Building.

It was seconded by Dorothy Haight.

Mr. Eddy Whitcomb requested Mr. Bunker to delete the wording of four rooms so that a six room addition could be built if possible, with the addition of the Capital Reserve Fund. Mr. Bunker accepted the deletion of the four rooms and it was agreed to, that it would read — not less than four rooms and not more than thirty-two rooms — be built under his motion. It was pointed out that under the motion as it stood, the money would be appropriated in one year if put to a vote.

Mr. Bunker then requested that his motion be worded so as to be similar in terms to the original motion made under Article 5, under the Municipal Finance Act etc., etc. . . . and to delete the two classrooms in the Daniels Academy Building and to have not less than four rooms and that the sum of \$77,000 plus the Capital Reserve Fund be set in the motion.

It was put to a written ballot by checklist. The vote was:

50 — NO

48 - YES

The motion was defeated.

Phillip Chandler was sworn in as auditor by Thomas Arnold.

Beatrice Hall made a motion to have the meeting recess until Friday, April 21, 1967 at eight P. M. in the Daniels Academy Building. Seconded by Carl Anderson. It was moved and supported that the meeting be recessed until April 21, 1967 at eight p.m. in the Daniels Academy Building.

### SYNOPSIS OF ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING (recessed from April 13)

### April 21, 1967

Meeting was called into session by the Moderator Thomas Arnold. The Meeting resumed under Article 5.

Article 5. Mr. Orville Fessenden made a Motion that the sum of \$69,000 be appropriated for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Elementary School; that to raise this appropriation the School Board be authorized to borrow \$69,000 under the Municipal Finance Act; that in addition to the foregoing appropriation the School Board be authorized to apply any State, Federal or other Funds towards the foregoing purposes according to the terms under which such Funds are received; that any interest received shall likewise be applied for such purposes; and that the School Board be authorized to take all action necessary to carry out this vote. It was seconded by Beatrice Hall.

A question from the floor asked for information concerning the Steel Building under consideration on the Chart. A lengthy discussion followed and the pro's and con's of such a building were aired. This building, being the first of its type to be used as a School in New Hampshire gave rise to many questions. The Questions were mainly answered by the Chairman of the School Building and Planning Committee, Thomas Moran, who had done considerable research into this particular building.

The questions of Life Expectancy, Fire Danger, Insurability, length of actual building time, State Aid, general design, physical comfort and adaptability for future additions were given as favorable by Mr. Moran.

The question of the Capital Reserve Fund asked by Mr. Phillip Chandler was deferred until Article 7. A question of the number of rooms was brought up by Mr. Chandler.

Mr. Orville Fessenden then made an amendment that the restriction of six rooms be included in his Motion and Beatrice Hall consented.

Mr. T. Denehy questioned, who, other than the School Board members would be on the Building Committee. Mr. Whitcomb then made an amendment to the Motion to include the School Board, the two members previously appointed by the Moderator and the Planning Board, but after a short discussion, the amendment was withdrawn.

Mr. Orville Fessenden then made an amendment to the Motion that the School Board use the services of the two Building Committee members appointed by the Moderator and the three School Board members. This was accepted by Mrs. Beatrice Hall.

Mr. Grover Farwell moved the Question and it was put to a vote by Ballot and Checklist. A total of 159 votes were cast and a twothirds of 106 was necessary in order to carry.

Yes — 113 No — 46

The Motion carried and the Moderator closed under Article 5 and opened under Article 6.

Article 6. The article was taken from the table and the Motion was made by Allan Fessenden to pass over this Article. It was seconded by Mrs. Harry Chorney. It was carried by the ayes and the Moderator closed under this Article and opened under Article 7.

Article 7. Mrs. Beatrice Hall made a Motion to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to expend invested Capital Reserve Funds to defray the costs of adding additional classrooms to the Elementary School. Seconded by Orville Fessenden. Ayes carried without dissent. The Moderator closed under Article 7 and opened under Article 10.

Article 10. Mrs. Beatrice Hall made a motion to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$257,093 for the support

of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. It was seconded by Allan Fessenden. Since the sum of \$49,630 was appropriated at the March 9 Meeting for the payment of salaries, the sum was then changed to read \$207,463 and Allan Fessenden consented. The Motion was carried without dissent. Closed under Article 10 and opened under Article 11.

Article 11. Mr. Clarence Farwell made a Motion that a Committee of three be appointed by the Moderator to investigate and report on ralaries of the School District Officers and that a report be ready for the following Meeting. It was seconded by Mr. Thistleton. The Ayes carried without dissent.

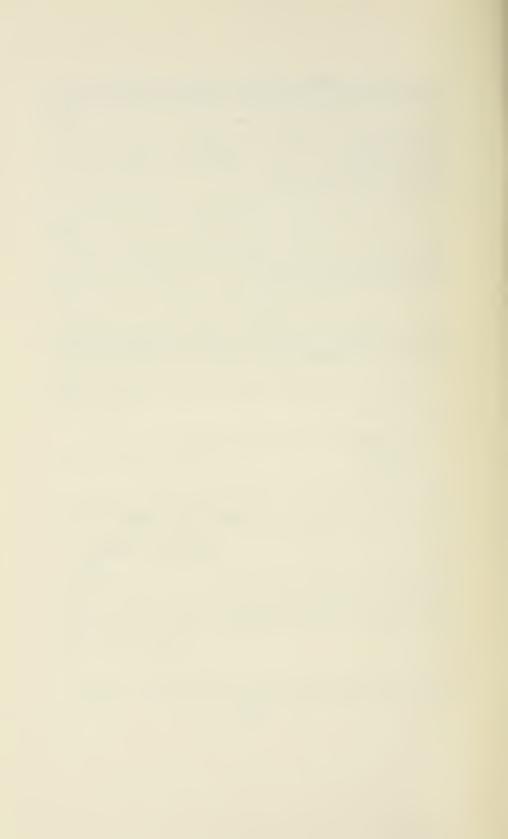
