TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

The polls will be open beginning at 10:00 a.m. on March 8, 1977 and will not close before 6:00 p.m. The polls are located at the Canaan Elementary School, Canaan, New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Canaan in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Canaan Elementary School in said Canaan on Tuesday, March 8, 1977, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

And then, beginning at seven o'clock in the evening, to vote on the following articles:

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of tax revenues.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to the highest bidder by Quitclaim Deed all property acquired by tax deed or to take any other action pertaining thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes, in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80: 52-a.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or federal or state aid in the name of the Town of Canaan.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to fix a three (3) year term of office for the Police Chief, beginning with the March, 1978 elections, such that the Police Chief will be elected every three (3) years beginning in March, 1978.
- 7. Pursuant to a Petition by ten or more voters or legal property owners abutting South Road, Canaan, New Hampshire: to see if the Town will vote to designate South Road from the intersection of Upper Lockhaven Road at West Canaan and including Potato Road intersection and continuing on South Road to the intersection of Westcott Road as scenic under the provisions of R.S.A. 253:17 and 18, for the purpose of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Canaan.
- 8. Pursuant to a Petition of ten or more voters to see if the Town will vote to reopen and accept a section of road leading from Prospect Hill Road to the Barrows residence.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$360) as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the intersection of Route 4 and John Roberts Road, to pay such amounts as may be necessary for the operation thereof and to authorize the Selectmen to take all necessary action to effect the purpose of this article.
- 11. To see if the Town of Canaan will vote to approve the following Resolution:

Whereas, that there continues to exist within the state a serious shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations at rents which elderly and low income persons can afford, and that such persons are forced to occupy sub-standard dwelling accommodations; and

Whereas, the General Court of the State of New Hampshire has enacted Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated establishing the New Hampshire Housing Commission; and

Whereas, Section 9 of that Act provides that in a municipality where there is no local housing authority operating, the Commission shall not operate without the consent of the governing body of a municipality; and

Whereas, said Section 9 provides that consent of the governing body must be given for each project; and

Whereas, under the provisions of Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, is authorized to enter into annual contributions contracts with public housing agencies pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Town Meeting of the Town of Canaan, Grafton County, State of New Hampshire as follows:

That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Canaan, Grafton County, State of New Hampshire.

That said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, under Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof;

- (a) existing Standard housing; (b) rehabilitated housing; (c) newly constructed housing; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed fifty dwelling units.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm the deeds from the Town of Canaan to Elmer and Mary Dulmage dated March 6, 1963 and November 22, 1972, which conveyed a portion of a former street known as Barney Avenue, and to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver corrective deeds to said land, or any portion thereof, and to further authorize the Selectmen to make other conveyances of said Barney Avenue, and to execute deeds therefor, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may determine; and to authorize the Selectmen to take any other action that may be necessary or convenient to effect this purpose.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Resolution:

We, the people of Canaan, support the Town of Seabrook in their formal opposition to the construction of a nuclear-powered electricity station within their borders. We express this sentiment publicly in recognition of the vulnerability of both our present community and our future generations to the effects of radiation from a source as near as our own coastline. These hazards. which include increased incidence of cancer and birth defects, are caused by the radioactive fuel, and waste generated. Both of these highly toxic materials would require absolutely leak-proof transportation within our state: the waste would require absolutely leak-proof storage for thousands of years. In light of recent disclosures on the failure of the industry to contain these substances. we consider it foolhardy to consent with our silence to this so-called "solution" to our energy needs.

14. The Crystal Lake Water Company has offered to sell the company to the Town. The Town is contemplating this purchase. Prior to further negotiations between the Crystal Lake Water Company and the Town, the Selectmen wish to determine the opinion of the townspeople regarding the proposed purchase. Therefore, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 38: 5, the following Article is submitted for consideration and vote:

A. To see if the Town will vote by ballot (2/3) that it is expedient for the Town to acquire the Crystal Lake Water Company for a sum not to exceed \$50,000 and thereby manufacture and distribute water for municipal use and for the use of the Town's inhabitants and others, and for such other purposes as may be permitted, authorized or directed by the Public Utilities Commission.

If the vote of the Town is in the affirmative, the Selectmen will negotiate with the appropriate officials of the Crystal Lake Water Company in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 38 relative to the terms and conditions of the purchase and, thereafter, to report their findings to the Town at a continued session of this Town meeting to be held on the 21st day of June, 1977 at 7:00 p.m. at the Canaan Elementary School in said Canaan. At that continued Town meeting a vote will be taken on the following questions:

B. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the agreement regarding the purchase price which is negotiated between the Selectmen and the officials of the Crystal Lake Water Company.

If the vote of the Town is in the affirmative, votes will be taken on the following questions:

(1) Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments thereto, to see if the Town will vote by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of all the voters present and

voting, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purchase of the Crystal Lake Water Company by borrowing the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purchase of the Crystal Lake Water Company by borrowing the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) through the issuance of serial notes, which are to be signed by the Board of Selectmen and counter-signed by the Town Treasurer and to have the corporate seal of the Town affixed thereto; and to delegate to the Board of Selectmen the authority for fixing the date, maturities, denominations, the interest rate, the place of payments, the form and other details of said notes and of providing for the sale thereof as the Board of Selectmen deem necessary or advisable. The Selectmen are authorized to take any other action which may be necessary to effect this purpose.

(2) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint three (3) commissioners to manage, construct, control and direct the municipal water works system, to receive and collect water rentals, to maintain separate books of accounts pertaining to the operation of the municipal water works system including separate checking and savings accounts, to pay bills incurred in the operation of the system, to hire and appoint such officers, employees and agents as they deem necessary and to fix their compensation, to establish a capital reserve fund only from surplus from water rentals for the financing of all or part of the cost of (a) the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of a specific capital improvement, or the acquisition of a specific item or specific items of equipment, or (b) the construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of a type of capital improvement or the acquisition of a type of equipment, and to do all other things allowable by law in order to manage and operate the municipal water works system.

- (3) To see if the Town will vote to fix the compensation of the three (3) water commissioners at \$100 per commissioner per annum.
- (4) To see if the Town will vote, until such time as this vote is amended, to establish the water rates charged to users at those rates which are charged by the Crystal Lake Water Company in accordance with its "Schedule for Water Service applicable in Village of Canaan, New Hampshire (so-called), Town of Canaan, New Hampshire: effective July 1, 1962, amended July 1, 1971 (effective date) and amended January 1, 1976 (effective date).
- (5) To see if the Town will vote to empower the water commissioners to amend the water rates charged to users, after holding one public meeting which is warned at least fourteen (14) days in advance of the public hearing by posting notice of said public hearing in two (2) public places within the Town and by publishing two (2) notices of the public hearing in a newspaper of general circulation within said Canaan, the first notice to be published seven (7) days prior to the public hearing and the second notice on the day of the hearing.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Providing for the Regulation and Licensing of Music Festivals" as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. A copy of the aforesaid ordinance is to be posted together with an attested copy of this Warrant at the place of the meeting and at one other public place in Canaan, at least fourteen (14) days before the day of the meeting.
- 16. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 17. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or any other officers here-to-before chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and, further, to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

CANAAN POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

A total of 316 complaints have come before the Canaan Municipal Court as a result of Police work performed in the Town of Canaan this year.

Again this year we had crosswalks painted in the Village for the safe crossing of street for those who wish to use them (You are protected by law when you are on a crosswalk when crossing a street). The New Hampshire State Law says in part 262-A:33 that all traffic shall yield to pedestrians on a crosswalk, slowing down and stopping if need be.

I am sorry to say we are not free of a fatal accident this year as we had a fatal on Sept. 27th, 1976 which occurred on the Potatoe Road.

This year has been a good year as far as major crimes in the Town of Canaan as the burglary rate was down about 50% or better.

The Canaan Police Department has recovered or has helped recover about \$4,250.00 in stolen property this year.

I again this year have a request with the Budget Committee for a Radar Unit to help to reduce the speeding in different areas of the Town. It has been a big help in the past year that the Police Department of the Town of Enfield has let us borrow their radar unit.

I am very happy that we now have the F. A. S. T. Squad as this very efficient and effective organization has been a great help to me and the Police Department.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

This year we were able to pave 3.6 miles of Goose Pond Road and South Road under the town road aid subsidy from the state.

During the summer I initiated a program of cutting trees and brush along the roadsides to allow increased visibility and to permit the sun's penetration. In this time of energy conservation, opening the roads to the sun can save sanding and spring maintenance during mud season. This cutting, in general, was done by local residents who received the wood for fuel thereby saving the Town labor expense.

Our growing population requires better roads and this winter we increased the sanding program for travel ease. I acknowledge, we do not have the funding to allow for major road rebuilding. However, I feel by wise continuous maintenance we can revitalize our existing system.

5. Receipts

Capital gains on investments from unexpended income amounts and proceeds from the sale of lots and other unrestricted receipts are included as additions to unrestricted income for the year.

6. Disbursements

For the year ended December 31, 1976, unexpended income in the general fund was not sufficient to fund all the disbursements in excess of accumulated unexpended income for some of the cemetery accounts. The deficit balances shown in unexpended income totalling \$566 represent borrowings from other funds in anticipation of appropriations from the Town of Canaan.

MASCOMA AREA HEALTH COUNCIL

The MASCOMA AREA HEALTH COUNCIL established at the Town Meetings in 1969 will, this year, start its eighth year of service to the Towns of Canaan, Enfield, Grafton and Orange and its second year to Dorchester. Serving a population of approximately 5500 the Councils two nurses provide nursing service in the home and a complete health promotion and disease prevention program. The Council receives referrals from hospitals, local physicians, relatives, concerned neighbors or the patient. The Nurses' home visits now average about 210 per month. A Physical Therapist, Elaine Mackin, of Enfield, is on contract with the Council and available when needed as are the Home Health Aides.

The free WELL CHIL CLINIC, held every month, has an enrollment of approximately 250 pre-school children. These children are eligible to participate in the bi-annual Dental Clinic sponsored by the N. H. State Department of Dental Health. These clinics are now held in Enfield Town Hall, "Whitney Hall," where the MASCOMA AREA HEALTH COUNCIL office is located, telephone 632-7234.

From time to time the Council cooperates with other agencies and the N. H. Department of Health to provide Adult Health Screening clinics and a Women's Clinic sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

Council support comes from the Five Towns served on a per capita bases, plus fees collected from Medicare, Medicaid, Third Party Payers and private paying patients. Of necessity we must set a fee for skilled nursing service rendered other than the free clinics. However the services of the Council are available to everyone regardless of ability to pay.

The Council is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors elected from the five towns. Its Medical Policies and Practices are supervised by a Medical Advisory Board consisting of area physicians and nurses.

Susan Schleich, R.N. of West Canaan is Nurse-Director of the Council. Betsy Larison, R.N. of West Lebanon is a full time nurse and our office and administrative duties are assisted by Sharron A. Wheeler of Enfield.

CANAAN HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION 1976 Annual Report

From May to November of 1976 the Commission held five meetings in the Town Building. It was formally agreed at the July 29th meeting that the Commission should continue to deal with major applications and discussions at the monthly meetings. However, minor or uncomplicated business can best be settled by agreement of three or more members, with the secretary noting the decisions in the minutes of the next formal meeting. This has proved to be a useful procedure, since it expedites on-the-spot consultation and quick decision on requested approvals.

During the year eleven applications for certificates of approval of revisions and additions to property in the Canaan Historic District were reviewed, discussed, and approved. Five of these involved minor alterations or painting, two covered construction of new out-buildings, one was a major building addition, two were temporary approvals to lead to final applications in 1977, and one was later filed for reference after the project was abandoned (parking lot and fence at the Town Beach). One of the temporary approvals covered limited demolition needed to permit assessment of the extent and method of restoration and structural repairs to the old Methodist Church building.

In addition to the foregoing, a temporary application pending from 1975 was settled during 1976 when the property owner removed the temporary structure in question from his premises.

Restoration work on the Old Meeting House was reviewed at meetings of the Commission, but details are omitted because they are covered in the report of the Old Meeting House Committee.

A request from a real estate broker for a copy of "Regulations for Canaan Historic District" was fulfilled. The Commission is again distributing this information to other real estate brokers in the vicinity.

During one Commission meeting a review of a possible technical violation of Historic District regulations emphasized that no accurate map of the Historic District showing property ownership and precise District boundaries is known to exist. It will be an objective of the Commission to develop such a map at such time as a Town property map becomes available. Up to the present, there have been no applications which would have been affected by lack of such a map.

REPORT OF OLD MEETING HOUSE COMMITTEE --- 1976

Physical restoration of the Old Meeting House was resumed in 1976. The main building was re-roofed. The belfry was rebuilt structurally and re-roofed. The exterior of the clock tower was renovated. including repair or replacement of loose or damaged sheathing and clapboards, caulking, and exterior painting. The clock dials and weathervane were overhauled and refinished with gold leaf. A new three wire electric service was installed with the feeder relocated to the rear of the building.

The foregoing work consumed the greater part of the available money, and the restoration fund stood at \$1,491.32 at the end of the year. No major donations were received in 1976.

Following up the general plan established in 1975, the Committee prepared in 1976 a detailed analysis of the restoration. This will be the working guide. It comprises a breakdown of the project into individual jobs, an outline of the interrelationships and required sequence, and a listing of points that will need additional information, design decisions, or special skills.

Formal application was made to the New Hampshire State Historic Preservation Office for a grant of matching funds from the Historic Preservation Grant-in-Aid program of the National Park Service. Approval was received for a grant of \$5,000 for 1977. Actual receipt of this will be contingent upon our providing the matching amount from the restoration fund, and upon eligibility of expenditures under the detailed rules of the National Park Service.

The goals of the Committee for 1977 are as follows:

(1) Intensify fund-raising to build the fund to at least the \$5,000 needed to match the available grant.

- Do this early enough in the year to have the money to spend during the building season.
- (2) Continue the exterior renovation of the main building by repair or replacement of sheathing and clapboards, caulking and exterior painting, and complete overhaul and refinishing of all sash. It is estimated that this will approximately match the 1977 funding goal.
- (3) Prepare plans and specifications for the first phases of interior work, get estimates, and apply for matching funds for 1978 to correspond to a reasonable goal of work and fund-raising.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD 1976-1977

The Canaan Planning Board held seventeen meetings during 1976-77. The chief piece of business to come before the Board this year was its first major subdivision application. After many revisions and ten meetings including two abutters' hearings, the subdivision application was approved on February 2, 1977, seventeen months after its initial submission. Needless to say, the Board's review process was long and detailed; however, the subdivider himself took no action for ten of those months.

In addition to approving one major subdivision, the Board also approved two minor subdivision applications and found thirteen applications not to be subject to the regulations. All applications which were denied at any point were subsequently approved after revisions. Eight public hearings were held for abutters and other townspeople to express their feelings about particular subdivisions. The Planning Board twice granted variances after holding Public Hearings.

In 1976, the Town voted to make the Planning Board an elective rather than an appointive body. Six persons are to be elected in 1977 to fill two three-year, two two-year, and two one-year posts. In each succeeding year, two persons will be elected to three-year posts. The Selectmen will appoint one of their member to be the Board's seventh member.

In 1977-78 the Planning Board will continue to administer the subdivision regulations as well as continue gathering information it needs to compile an Official Map of the Town. When engineers have outlined the

flood plain limits in more detail as required in the National Flood Insurance Act, the Planning Board will be required to draw up and recommend to the Town additional land control ordinances.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION For the Year Ending December 1976

The Canaan Conservation Commission was reorganized this year and held its first meeting on April 26, 1976.

The primary order of business was to effect a new COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT between the TOWN OF CANAAN and the CANAAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION, and the GRAFTON COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT, the SOIL CONSERVATION SERVATION, UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT of AGRICULTURE relative to: Acceleration of soil surveys for land use planning in certain areas of CANAAN, N. H., Grafton County.

The first Agreement effected on the 15th of June 1974 ran out without utilizing a \$2,750.00 grant from the Ford Foundation. The new agreement effected on the 6th of July 1976 will utilize all of this Ford Foundation grant. All work under this agreement is to be completed and in the possession of the TOWN of CANAAN on or about September 1, 1977. It is hoped that this effort will complete the soil sampling of all the acreage of the TOWN. However the COMMISSION is anticipating a shortfall of completing approximately 2000 (two thousand) acres and has therefor requested a modest sum of money be incorporated in this years town budget to continue this effort. Money not expended cannot be carried over to the next fiscal year for the COMMISSION.

The CONSERVATION COMMISSION will upon the completion of this soils mapping project have in its possession a base soil map for the TOWN and soil survey interpretation sheets which provide information about engineering properties of soils, the suitability of soils as resource material, and major soil features affecting engineering uses of soils. The interpretation sheets also

contain information relative to the degree of soil limitation for TOWN and COUNTRY planning and recreational uses, and suitability for farm, woodland and wildlife uses.

All information obtained under the terms of this agreement is public property.

The CONSERVATION COMMISSION has been consulted on several state and local projects prior to the initiation of the work requested.

The conservation Commission will be as effective as the citizens of the TOWN of CANAAN desire it to be. Anyone interested in being a member of the COMMISSION or who has information, projects, or ideas to offer is encouraged to contact any member of the COMMISSION or the selectmen.

REPORT OF THE WILLIAMS FIELD BICENTENNIAL PROJECT

A Bicentennial Committee was formed early in 1976. One of the requirements for becoming a Bicentennial community was to choose a project that would benefit the town, but it must also be one that would not, in all probability, be done under normal circumstances.

The project chosen was the restoration of Williams Field. This included building a 50x100 ft. skating rink, replacing and restoring playground equipment and refurbishing the existing dugouts. We applied for and received matching funds from the New Hampshire American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. We received \$1,000 from the town and \$1,000 in matching funds.

Fill was hauled in and graded. Then clay was placed over the top and leveled to make a waterproof base for the rink. Then planks were placed all around and a clay cove was built to hold the water. The rink has been flooded and is being used by area children and by the Mascoma Area Recreation Committee for Saturday morning skating lessons.

The dugouts were repaired and painted. The balance of the money was spent on playground equipment. The playground was covered with woodchips and a light was installed over the skating rink.

Equipment purchased for installation in the spring includes: three spring animals, three park benches, 1 four board seesaw, two basketball backboards and hoops and six new seats and chains for the old swing set.

Our hopes for the future include: a fence between the playground and Rt. 4, a new backstop, picnic tables, a set of bleachers and more playground equipment.

I would like to thank those people who donated their time, equipment and materials to make this dream a reality.
